



Board members Lockney's City Council convened last Thursday to address some key issues on this month's agenda. Starting off the meeting, were reports from council members and advisory boards. In his report on police matters, Chief of Police Casey Wallace told the council that they were starting to prepare for a possible rise in crime due to the up-coming holiday season. Traditionally, reports of theft and burglary seem to increase as Christmas gets closer. During a report from the Administration department, City Secretary Charlotte Hooten gave a status report concerning the renovation of the City pool. In her report, Mrs. Hooten explained to the Council that

the engineers of the pool renovation where currently constructing a site plan to meet with the requirements set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Some of the improvements to the pool will include; a resurfacing the pool floor as well as the sidewalk repair, the renovation will also fix the deck and the pump house. Also in her report, Mrs. Hooten informed the council that the City will begin work on the new sidewalk grant on the first Monday of January. Starting next year, the City will work with Thrasher's Concrete to repair the sidewalks on the east side of Main Street as well as several other damaged sidewalk locations around the city. In the Sanitation

the council that they are still under negotiations with the Fair Board over the use of the collection point/burning site located near the newly renovated Fair Building. Mr. Schlueter reported that the City is getting closer to reaching an agreement with the Fair Board on what they can and can't do in the collection site. A possible outcome to the negotiations may include a leasing of the land to the City, nevertheless what ever the outcome is the agreement will be writing. After the conclusion of Council reports, the Council moved on to approve the Consent Agenda which included the payment of the

Shortly after, the Council moved to appoint Bil Anderson as a member of the City Council. Mr. Anderson, who is also a member of the Lockney EDC, was appointed to the position to replace former council member Shanna Jackson. Following the Oath to Office, the council appointed new department heads. Michael Deleon will be in charge of Fire Department matters, Tina Graves will be charge of Water and Sewage, Shad Schlueter will be over Police and Street matters, Mayor Rodger Stapp will head Municipal Court matters, Kelly Prayor will head Administration matters, and Bil Anderson will be in charge of Sanitation. After the appointments, the Council discussed and considered allowing Lyndon Morris

Shad. Schlueter reported to to put up a RV Park north of his Floyd County Farm Supply building. Mr. Morris explained to the council that the new RV Park will greatly benefit the City of Lockney once construction to the wind farms begins. Mr. Morris explained that location was ideal for temporally housing construction crews that will travel to build wind turbines. Mr. Morris expressed that the construction crews will greatly improve commerce in the City. Pleased with the idea, the Council informed Mr. Morris that there were still some ordinances that needed to be followed, the Council then gave Mr. Morris a copy of the ordinances so he could review them and plan accordingly.

Next on the agenda, the Council collected the signatures required for opening up a bank account so the City could start raising money for the paving grant. The money will be used to match the grant money that will be awarded. Shortly after, the Council accepted OJD. Engineers bid for the Water and Sewer grant, and also appointed Dennis Carter to the Floyd County Appraisal Board of Directors. Due to time issue a couple of agenda items were tabled for next month's meeting, these include; consider financial benefit analysis for the purchase of 20 water meters from Western Industrial, Consider a bid from Isler Demolition, Inc. to tear down the old water tower above the Police

Floydada's Economic Development Corporation has recently published its Program of Work booklet for upcoming fiscal year. The new EDC booklet, which highlights the economical strengths of the City of Floydada, introduces the unified theory that the Floydada EDC will use to promote and attract new and current businesses in the

Even in this excerpt from the preface of the booklet, the EDC reinforces its plan to achieve economic development through consistency and focus, "An organization without a focus lends itself to constant change of direction by the latest idea that seems like the best thing to do at the time. As a result, the leadership finds it difficult to answer the question, "What have we accomplished?" Therefore, the drafting of this document aims to focus the organization's energies in such a way that creates a sense of continuity. In doing so, goals are met, programs





South Plains Hobby Club News

The South Plains Hobby Club met at the South Plains Baptist Church on November 10, 2010 for a portrayal of Belle Starr, by Lou Burleson, the History Teller. Members present included Janis Julian, Betty Deavenport, Carolyn Helen Teeple, Glenda Ford, Margie Young, Turner, Peggy Roberts, Mary Quattlebaum, Ann Hartman, Margaret Kitchens, Joy Smitherman, Lou Burleson, Wanda Lane

and Sandra Lass. Lou Burleson began her program by playing an imaginary piano (in synch with a recording of old timey saloon music.) She was dressed in a riding habit, with a six-shooter belted around her waist and wearing a Stetson hat with a large feather stuck in the brim. Then Lou stood beside a side-saddle with a rifle propped against the seat and introduced herself as the notorious outlaw -Belle Starr. She said she was born in 1848 in Carthage, Missouri and named Myra Belle Shirley. She said she was born into a wealthy family. Her father, John, was an Innkeeper. Her mother, Elizabeth Hatfield Shirley, was descended from the Hatfield family involved in the Hatfield-McCoy feud. Belle attended an expensive academy for girls and obtained the finest education a girl could get in those days. Belle could play classical piano music and could "even speak a little French." But Belle was "feisty" and liked to fight. One of her childhood friends was Cole Younger and

the other Younger brothers as well as with Jesse and Frank James.

Belle and her family moved to Sycene, Texas shortly before Carthage was burned down by Confederate guerillas during the Civil War. After the Civil War, when Belle was 18 years old she married Jim Reed, a former guerilla who fought for the south with Quantrille. The couple was married on horseback, "dressed and armed to the teeth." Their daughter, Rosie Lee "Pearl" and son, James Edwin "Ed" were born in 1868 and 1871, respectively. At this point, Belle really began to lead a wild life. She loved playing the piano in saloons, riding her horse (but always sidesaddle) and shooting her six-shooter up and down the street. She and Jim became friends with the Starr family, a Cherokee Indian family known for stealing and selling whiskey and cattle in the Indian Territory (Oklahoma). Later, when Jim killed a man, they took their children and moved to California. But Jim had to leave California for passing counterfeit money and murdering another man and the family fled back to Texas. It wasn't long before, once again, Jim got into trouble. This time, Jim robbed a Creek Indian farmer and later held up a stagecoach in Texas and robbed the passengers. A bounty was placed on his head, but when the law finally caught up with him, Jim was shot to death in 1874 while trying to escape. After Jim's death, Belle left her children with relatives

in Texas and took up with the Starr family in Indian Territory. Using money she obtained while married to Jim Reed she harbored other outlaws, participated in other illegal schemes and aided and abetted other outlaws in organizing and planning robberies as well as bribing lawmen to free her outlaw friends.

In 1880, Belle married

Sam Starr and continued

participating in outlaw activities. While she had caught the attention of "Hanging Judge," Isaac C. Parker of Fort Smith, Arkansas, she was able to elude capture and prosecution until 1882, when a jury found Belle and Sam guilty of horse theft. Judge Parker sentenced each to a year in prison. Belle proved to be a model prisoner and even "taught the warden's children how to play the piano." However both were released after nine months, even though Sam was no model prisoner. After prison, Belle and Sam returned to Indian Territory and to thieving, carousing in saloons and general mischief making. Over the next few years, Belle was arrested several times and charged with robbery, but never convicted. After Sam's death in a shootout with a man named Frank West (who Belle had told Sam to kill), the Indian nation threatened to take her land away from her if she didn't stop robbing and thieving .She started renting to sharecroppers, perhaps to establish some semblance to legitimac. Nevertheless, Belle was left again without a husband. She still continued to play

the piano in saloons. Belle married another Indian, Jim July (a man 15 years younger) in order to keep her land in Indian Territory. In 1889, shortly before her 41st birthday, Belle was ambushed and shot in the back. Pearl, her daughter, found Belle shortly before she died. True to character, Belle was dressed to the nines in one of her fancy riding habits. Lou concluded by saying that when researching Belle's life history that it was difficult to separate "fact from fancy." For example, it is rumored that Pearl's father was Cole Younger, not Jim Reed, and that Belle once lived with Blue Duck, the same Blue Duck as described in Larry McMurtry's book Lonesome Dove. The identity of Belle's murderer was never determined although various sources speculate that that it was her son, Ed, with whom she had a strained relationship or an angry

sharecropper she had evicted or even her husband Jim July, with whom she had recently quarreled and perhaps had never really married. Over the years since Belle's death she has been popularized by pulp fiction and the movie industry. Historians still puzzle over many of the details of her short but tumultuous life. The group thanked Lou for her delightful performance of

Belle Starr - Bandit Queen. Helen Teeple, reported that SIFE (Students in Free Enterprise) at Wayland Baptist University will safely dispose of any expired or unused medication or injectables. LETTER OF 1912 EXTOLLS GREAT PLAIN COUNTRY

(Ed. Note: The following is an article that was printed in the "Southern Advocate," in Ashland, Mississippi. The year was 1912 and R. L. Ormon has been on the plains of Texas for approximately six years.)

From Lockney, Texas Mr. G. P. Harrison, Editor of Southern Advocate.

Dear Sir -- Through the kindness of four of my nephews, I am getting the Southern Advocate every week, and I assure those boys that they could not have sent me anything that I would have appreciated half as much for the reason that I can read in it the news of my native home.

I was born and reared and married my wife in old Benton county, and at the time I had left there I knew almost every man in the county. But how would it be if I was there today, after being gone for twenty years? I would be almost a stranger, and yet I would feel just like I had got back home, as there are lots of people there that I knew in my childhood.

I have known you, Mr. Editor from my early boyhood, and I am more than glad to know that you are still the editor of the Ashland paper. You were the editor of the Ashland Register when I left there twenty years ago. I don't know whether you will remember me or not, but I would be very glad to see you again.

I was born and reared just south of old Liberty church, and that old Liberty hill is a sacred place to me. My old father and mother and a brother that I loved better than

I did myself are all buried at Liberty. I have two brothers and two sisters still living there in the neighborhood, whom I haven't seen since There are many people there that I would love to see, while many of away and some have crossed over the River of Death. Still some of the boys are there yet-J. M. Reid, R. L. Roberts, Dave Hicks, Dave Roberts and others that I grew up with—and they are dear to me yet. Then others are J. R. Roberts and J. B. Hicks-God bless these old men; they seem more like fathers to me than friends.

He Drifted West

Well, it seems that I was the prodigal boy of the Ormon family. All of the rest stayed at home while I drifted west. I first stopped at Oglesby, Texas, where I stayed fourteen years, rented land thirteen years from the same man and paid his \$7,000rent while there enough to have paid for a good home. I moved from there to this county (Floyd) in the fall of 1906, and have been here ever since.

Now I will try to give you some idea of this country. Floyd county is situated right in the heart of what is know (sic) as the staked plains of Texas, said to be the biggest body of level land in the union, and to a man that has

ever seen it, it is perfectly reasonable to believe that the statement is true. It is just immense to get out here and look at the county. It is a solid prairie, something near two hundred miles square, with not a single tree or bush to be my schoolmates have moved seen. Except fruit and shade trees round the homes. This country is just in its infancy. It has always been a stock country but the cow is fast giving away to the farmer. To give you some idea of how fast it is settling up, I will tell you what it has done in six years. When I came here six years ago, there was only about 350 legal voters in the county, and now there are 1.100. Land has advanced from \$5 and \$10 per acre to all the way from \$15 to \$40 and still advancing. At least 95 per cent of this country is good, tillable land not over 5 per cent of it in cultivation.

Young Orchard Doing Well

As to our farm crops, we raise corn, cotton, wheat, oats, Kafir corn and maze (sic), and garden vegetables and fruit grows to perfection here. I have a nice orchard, just now old enough to bear. We canned 400 cans of peaches, apples and plums last season. Now that sounds like a heap of fruit,

\$420 million estimated for 2009 crop Average Crop Revenue Election

(Floydada, November Stephanie Bradley, Executive Bradley said. Director of USDA's Farm Agency (FSA) in Floyd County today announced that USDA has started issuing an estimated \$420 million in 2009 crop Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) payments to producers enrolled in the ACRE program for wheat, corn, barley, dry peas, grain sorghum, lentils, oats, peanuts, soybeans, and upland cotton.

Congress established ACRE as part of the 2008 Farm Bill to protect producers from farm market revenue declines. A list of state payment rates for the 2009 crops of barley, corn, dry peas, lentils, oats, peanuts, grain sorghum, soybeans, upland cotton and wheat is available at http:// go.usa.gov/CCS.

"These payments are an important part of the farm safety net because they help protect the farmers who provide America and the world with a reliable source of food and commodities

Texas), by buffering them from the 17, 2010 - effects of revenue declines,"

In order for producers to receive ACRE payments, revenue triggers for a commodity must be met on both a state and farm basis. The Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 (2008 Farm Bill) requires 2009 ACRE payments to be made following the end of the marketing year, but no earlier than Oct. 1, 2010. Of the \$420 million in payments, about 70 percent are expected to be issued to wheat producers and 23 percent to corn producers. Nearly 80 percent of the payments are expected to be issued to producers in Oklahoma, Washington, Illinois, South Dakota, Idaho

and North Dakota. According to Bradley, as of Nov. 17, Texas FSA has processed more than 99 percent of ACRE payments million. totaling \$4.6 Producers enrolled in ACRE can expect to receive a payment soon.



USDA ACRE program issuing payments

(Floydada, Texas), November 17, 2010 -Stephanie Bradley, Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Floyd County today announced that USDA has started issuing an estimated \$420 million in 2009 crop Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) payments to producers enrolled in the ACRE program for wheat, corn, barley, dry peas, grain sorghum, lentils, oats, peanuts, soybeans, and upland

Congress ACRE as part of the 2008. Farm Bill to protect producers from farm market revenue declines. A list of state payment rates for the 2009 crops of barley, corn, dry peas, lentils, oats, peanuts, grain sorghum, soybeans, upland cotton and wheat is available at http://go.usa.gov/CCS.

"These payments are an important part of the farm safety net because they help protect the farmers who provide America and the world with a reliable source of food

and commodities by buffering them from the effects of revenue declines," Bradley

In order for producers to receive ACRE payments, revenue triggers for a commodity must be met on both a state and farm basis. The Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 (2008 Farm Bill) requires 2009 ACRE payments to be made following the end of the marketing year, but no earlier than Oct. 1, 2010. Of the \$420 million in payments, established about 70 percent are expected to be issued to wheat producers and 23 percent to corn producers. Nearly 80 percent of the payments are expected to be issued to producers in Oklahoma, Washington, Illinois, South Dakota, Idaho and North Dakota.

> According to Bradley, as of Nov. 17, Texas FSA has processed more than 99 percent of ACRE payments totaling \$4.6 million. Producers enrolled in ACRE can expect to receive a pay-

Cotton Market Weekly

Cotton futures on the Intercontinental Exchange closed lower six consecutive sessions in what some analysts called a market correction before reversing course on Nov. 18 and closing significantly higher as the December, March and May contracts were up the 500-point daily limit. A weaker dollar, strength among other commodities, and a strong export report were recognized for adding

support to cotton prices. The rebound suggested there was more at work in the cotton market than simple commodity fundamentals, according to one market analyst. Another analyst said, "If the dollar continues to give back some of its gains of the past two weeks, it would certainly suggest a renewed

appetite for commodities." Just ahead of the reversal, trading conditions were mostly quiet as it appeared Chinese cotton buyers had moved to the sidelines following the previous week's Sourcing USA Cotton Summit. It was widely believed considerable sales of U.S. cotton were made during the summit and that the volume would show up in nearby export reports.

In fact, another solid week of U.S. export sales were reported by the U.S. Department of Agriculture for the week ended Nov. 11. Net sales of U.S. cotton that week totaled 491,400 bales, according to USDA, up 14 percent from the previous

week and 12 percent from the prior four-week average. Purchases by China accounted for almost half of the total sales volume followed closely by Turkey. Peru, Vietnam and Indonesia rounded out the list of major buyers. Net sales of 43,800 bales for the 2011-12 marketing year were mainly for Turkey, Malaysia and Japan.

Export shipments for the most recent reporting period totaled 142,000 bales, down 2 percent from the previous week but up 29 percent from the prior four-week average. The primary destinations were China, Turkey and Mexico. Total U.S. export commitments now stand at 12.73 million bales or 81 percent of USDA's projection of 15.75 million bales.

Market observers continue to focus on demand from China, the world's largest consumer of cotton, which needs to import 20 million bales this year to meet demand from its domestic textile industry, according to one report that quoted a major world cotton merchant. China's cotton production is expected to fall short of domestic demand for the 12th consecutive year.

Meanwhile, sales volume in the spot cotton market continues to surge as producers in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas take advantage of current high prices. In the week ended Nov. 18, producers sold 42,566 bales online compared to 28,997 bales the previous week. Average prices received by producers ranged from \$1.14 to \$1.31 per pound.

A late October rain and hail storm on the Texas High Plains apparently had little, if any, effect on cotton quality, according to the USDA Agricultural Marketing Service report for the week, ended Nov. 11. There had been concerns about color grades, however, the report showed no significant decline in the number of bales in the top two color grades.

Warmer-than-normal temperatures returned to West Texas this past week following a few days of cooler weather. Along with mostly clear skies, producers were able to make excellent harvest progress in both the South and Rolling Plains regions. No rain was expected through the weekend. On the other hand, growers in California's San Joaquin Valley were racing to harvest fields before rain was expected to return by the weekend. Forecasters were calling for a 50 percent chance of rain in the southern part of the val-

Scattered rains also were reported in much of the North Delta on Thursday following several days of significant precipitation in northern Mississippi, eastern Arkansas, and western Tennessee. However, harvest in those regions was virtually complete, and most ginning operations were winding down for the season.

ACORN Affiliate Listed as "Not in Good Standing" But Still "Active"

Apparently there is at least one ACORN affiliate that has declined to drop the organization's tainted name. The ACORN Community Labor Organizing Center (ACLOC), which is registered in Louisiana and also maintains a strong presence in Texas, has served as a major conduit for political operations and could play a prominent role in the 2012 elections.

The affiliate was prominently mentioned in a House Oversight Committee report that probed into ACORN's financial transactions and political activities.

"According to a document provided by former ACORN employees, the ACORN Community Labor Organizing Center ("ACLOC") led important campaigns including the Texas for Obama Campaign," the report said. "According to the document, ACLOC raised 1.3

million dollars from political campaigns and delivered the funds directly to ACORN offices.

The document noted, `[d]oes the ACORN association board want Wade [Rathke] to be this intimately involved in coordinating campaigns this close to ACORN?'ACORN readily acknowledged its partisan behavior."

ACLOS is categorized as an "active" organization on the Louisiana Secretary of State's web site, but it is also listed as being "Not in Good Standing for Failure to File Annual Report."

Jacques Berry, the press secretary for Louisiana Secretary of State Jay Dardenne, said in an interview that ACLOS and other ACORN affiliates that have declined to submit their report could potentially lose their legal status.

"We are not an enforcement agency," he explained. "We just change their designation

of an organization if they miss their annual report anniversary and if they miss it three years in a row then we revoke their legal ability to do business in Louisiana. The annual report is not a financial document. It just includes basic information like name, address and if there's any changes to any changes to pertinent information such as the makeup officers. Even if no changes are made, they need to file every year. We don't get into financials at all, that's for the state department of revenue."

ACLOC was founded in 2005 for purpose of building and fostering partnerships between community activists and organized labor, according to the group's now defunct web site. In Canada, ACLOC provided "basic training" for recruits with Service Employee International Union (SEIU) who then moved into "Organizer Apprentice" positions. ACLOC has also partnered with the SEIU in

Houston and Boston.

The ACORN labor group has also allied with the United Federation of Teachers (UFT) to provide "community support" for daycare providers. It also joined with the United Food and Commercial Workers (UFCW) "to put pressure" on a grocery store chain in Arizona to allow for unionization.

All told, organized labor has contributed over \$10 million to ACORN since 2005, with the Service Employees International Union (SEIU) contributing about \$8.7 million of this sum, according to Labor Department records.

Other ACORN affiliates that are listed as being "Not in Good Standing" for their failure to file annual report include: ACORN International, ACORN Fair Housing and ACORN Television in Action for Communities and the ACORN Fund.

Krugman's Conspiracy Theory

The world is plotting against Paul Krugman's economic central planning scheme. At least, that's what we're supposed to believe, based on his recent contribution to the national political dialogue, "Axis of Depression."

In this piece, Krugman has a theory about recent Republican criticism of the Federal Reserve's planned purchase of \$600 billion of U.S. treasuries: Republicans know Fed Chair Ben Bernanke's policies will work to improve the economy, and so they oppose them because if they are not implemented they will win elections.

Krugman quotes Stan Collender, who says, "with Republican policy makers seeing economic hardship as the path to election glory... [they will be] opposed to any actions taken by the Federal Reserve that would make the economy better."

Krugman writes, "Republicans want the economy to stay weak as long as there's a Democrat in the White House", adding, "In short, their real fear is not that Fed actions will be harmful, it is that they might succeed."

Although Krugman acknowledges that "some of Mr. Bernanke's critics are motivated by sincere intellectual conviction," they only operate on the periphery in his fantasyland. The real motive is "self-interest" in the case of Republicans, who want a weak economy to bolster electoral returns. And also in the cases of Germany and China, both Fed critics who, Krugman maintains, want to keep running trade surpluses.

There's a few problems with this line of analysis. Namely, all of Krugman's boogeymen have perfectly valid reasons to oppose the Fed's monetary expansions.

Take China. Because it keeps the yuan on a fixed exchange rate to the dollar, the Fed's dollar depreciation merely has the effect of simultaneously devaluing the yuan. If cheap currencies are the route to cheap exports, then the U.S. action might actually help boost Chinese exports. So, it's not the balance of trade that might motivate a Chinese protest of the Fed's money-printing.

Perhaps China is being sincere about its objections to the Fed's purchases of U.S. national debt. Its credit rating agency, Dagong, recently downgraded U.S. debt, writing that the \$600 billion of Fed treasuries purchases "entirely encroaches on the interests of the creditors, indicating the decline of the U.S. government's intention of debt repayment." So, they're actually worried about all the cash they have lent us being

repaid with monopoly money.

For Germany's part, its Finance Minister Wolfgang Schaeuble actually said, "With all due respect, U.S. policy is clueless... [The problem] is not a shortage of liquidity. It's not that the Americans haven't pumped enough liquidity into the market and now to say let's pump more into the market is not going to solve their problems." Okay, so they think more paper and ink simply won't work to create "a stronger pace of economic recovery," as the Fed claims.

Then there's the Republicans. In order for Krugman to be correct, conservatives would have to have a secret conspiracy to wreck the U.S. economy all to undermine Barack Obama, and land whoever the GOP nominee is in 2012 into the White House. The means? Stop the Federal Reserve from implementing its money-printing "stimulus".

Only, Republicans are in no position to stop the Fed or Bernanke from doing anything. Nor have they prevented the Fed from taking a single action since the central bank began blowing up the housing bubble in 1990's and 2000's. Back then, the king could do no wrong. Alan Greenspan was a monetary wizard, an alchemist who could sprinkle his magical fairy dollar dust into the economy, and poof! Prosperity would ensue.

At least, inflation ensued.

According to the True Money Supply index from the Ludwig Von Mises Institute, the money supply, which the Fed controls, rose from about \$1.787 trillion at the end of 1990 to about \$5.268 trillion by the end of 2007, representing a 195 percent increase. For comparative purposes, in that same period, gold rose from \$386.20 an ounce to \$695.39, a 80 percent increase, oil rose from \$23.19 a barrel to \$64.20, a 177 percent increase, and the national debt rose from \$3.23 trillion to \$9 trillion, a 178 percent increase.

As for mortgage debt, its growth dwarfed even that of the actual money supply. In 1990, outstanding mortgage debt held was \$3.805 trillion. Suffice to say, by the end of 2007, total mortgage holdings rose to \$14.568 trillion, a staggering 283 percent jump. Those jumps were all accommodated by the Fed's pump priming. Combined with weak lending practices, low down payments, lower-than-justified interest rates, and shoddy underwriting standards, the rapid government-induced expansion of mortgage markets was followed by an awful wreck.

In that sense, the Fed had an awful lot to do with the financial crisis. Afterward, its prescription was to print more

money to paper over the bad debts of others, like Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, whom they purchased some \$1.25 trillion of mortgage-backed securities from and \$150 billion of agency debt, all to prop up a housing market they helped to ruin.

Perhaps that's why Republicans and others are skeptical of the Fed's new actions to now paper over the national debt with \$600 billion of new treasuries purchases. It's not as if the Fed has had a stellar record prior to and after the financial crisis began. The central bank is not beyond reproach.

So, what to make of Krugman's conspiracy theory? Perhaps his motives are the ones that are "highly suspect". He partially reveals his motive when he writes, "the main concern reasonable people have about the Fed's plans — a concern that I share — is that they are likely to prove too weak, too ineffective."

Krugman is worried that the "stimulus" will not work because it actually is not big enough. Except that's what he's been saying all along. In 2009, he was claiming that Obama's \$787 billion "stimulus" was too small to fill a \$2.1 trillion hole. The fact is, the total money put into the economy is at over \$3 trillion from fiscal and monetary authorities since the crisis began: \$300 billion of treasuries purchases by the Fed in 2009, the \$787 billion fiscal "stimulus", \$1.25 trillion of Fed purchases of MBS plus another \$150 billion of GSE debt, and now \$600 billion more for treasuries.

So, even if the total spending and money printing is more than he ever prescribed, perhaps Krugman is worried that his Keynesian ideology is running the risk of being completely discredited. Maybe he wants to keep his esteemed position as an economic guru.

By Krugman's own admission, the "stimulus" has not worked yet. And so he is neatly constructing a narrative whereby the reason the government action fails is because his boogeymen "bull[ied] the Federal Reserve into calling off its efforts to create jobs." Or, if the Fed goes ahead with its plans, and it still doesn't work, his excuse for failure will become because the bullies scared the central bankers into scaling back their efforts into mere half measures.

You can almost hear Krugman now at the end of a Scooby Doo episode saying, "And the 'stimulus' would have worked, too, if it wasn't for those meddling kids." Right, tell us another one.

"Whether it's a dedication to the gift-giving tradition, a sense of obligation, or a feeling that the holidays entitle us to have a little more fun than usual, too many of us seem to turn a blind eye to the budget-busting reality of all that spending over just a couple of months," says Tyson. "Don't let excessive holiday spending cause any unnecessary financial stress for you and your family."

What if you could have a wonderful, memorable holiday and avoid the financial hangover afterwards? Tyson provides great tips on how to keep your holiday spending in check.

Find an alternative to gift-giving during the holidays.
Many people feel they have to give gifts during the holidays, either because it's a family tradition or because they know their friends and relatives have gotten gifts for them. There are plenty of great ways to trade in this tradition for another one that is even more meaningful, and chances are your family

and friends will be happy to spending, you may be shocked save gift-buying dough as at what all those expenses from

"Instead of exchanging gifts, your family members might want to pool their money and spend it on a holiday outing," says Tyson. "If you have kids, you'll probably want to get them a little something, but set strict spending limits. Instead of piling up the toys, let each child choose an outing or event that he or she gets to spend with you one-on-one. Kids will look back on the valuable time you've spent together a lot more fondly than they will any toy or video game they use a couple of times and then

If you must buy gifts, cut your expenses elsewhere as necessary. Perhaps you'd rather dine out or go to the movies less, or maybe you can forego that new pair of shoes you've been wanting for yourself in order to afford gifts for the grandparents. "It doesn't matter where you make cuts, just that you make them," says Tyson. "Keeping your other spending under control while you're out there doing your shopping can be a challenge, but just keep repeating to yourself the importance of not over-spending. That way when it comes time to actually pass out those presents you've purchased, you can do it without grimacing as you think about the damage they did to your bank account."

Set a budget and keep tabs on what you are spending. While you're doing your holiday shopping, your new best friends should be your checkbook register, credit card statements, and all of your receipts. It's easy to get into a spending rhythm when shopping for yourself or others, and that's why you need to physically write down every purchase you make and make sure you don't go over your budget. "When you start to add up everything you're

at what all those expenses from this store and that store add up to be," says Tyson. "And don't forget about all those 'necessary' holiday extras. Most people don't budget their shopping and don't realize that by the time you buy all the presents, plus wrapping paper, cards, decorations, etc., it's added up to a ridiculous amount. Having a budget that you know you must stick to will help keep your impulse spending from getting out of hand and will help you hone in on the most reasonably priced holiday items."

Plan what you are going to buy, and don't get any extras! Particularly during the holidays, companies pull out their most appealing packaging in hopes of snagging the eyes of shoppers. That's why along with your budget, you're going to want to take an exact list of what you want to buy for your gift recipients. Don't go shopping for someone's gift until you know exactly what you are going to buy.

"It's very easy to go in with no plan, see something you like, and get it simply because you have no idea what else to get for a hard-to-buy-for relative despite the gift's significant price tag," says Tyson. "Another temptation that the list will help you squelch is the desire to buy those little knickknacks here and there that you think will make nice small additions to the gifts you've purchased. Very rarely are things like this necessary, and if you've got your list in hand, it will be easier for you to pass them by without hesitation."

Use the season to set a good example for your kids. Your kids learn about money from you. And if they see you spending left and right during the holiday season, the lesson they come away with isn't going to be a good one. During the holidays, it's very

easy for the "gimmee gimmee gimmee" materialistic attitude to get out of control. After all, kids are bombarded with constant advertisements for toys, clothes, and the latest gadgets you can be guaranteed they'll want (or at least think they do!).

"There's plenty you can do to help kids appreciate the true meaning of the holidays," says Tyson. "Have them give some of their money to a local charity, participate in a program in which they buy and wrap gifts for underprivileged kids, or volunteer at a soup kitchen. It can be an eye-opening experience for kids to see that not everyone has enough money to have an enjoyable holiday."

Watch out for deals that seem too good to be true. Retailers run all sorts of specials to induce consumers to buy now, and the holidays offer these companies easy prey in the form of deal-seeking, cash-strapped consumers. For example, furniture stores frequently offer that if you buy now, you don't have to pay a thing for a year, and you might even get free delivery. This sort of "push" marketing can make it harder for you to

"This is just one example of how stores coax in shoppers," "Always Tyson. remember that free financing for, say, a year is not a huge cost to the dealer, but it is a cost, and if you forgo it, you should be able to negotiate a lower purchase price. Retailers find that buyers are less likely to negotiate the price if they are getting a short-term financing break. Read the fine print on any deal you are considering taking before you go to the store to make the purchase. It can be even harder to say no once you get to the store, so you'll want to know what you are in for before you get there."

Leave the plastic at home.

Many of us can explain away spending so much on gifts because we simply charge everything and reason that we can pay it off gradually after the holidays. This is a great way to create a neverending cycle of consumer debt for yourself. It only creates unnecessary financial stress for you after the holidays.

"Use your budget to figure out how you can purchase the gifts you want to purchase without putting them on your credit card," says Tyson. "If you are so cash-strapped that you think it will be difficult to avoid charging gifts, then you may want to sit down with other friends and family and propose a limit on how much gifts can cost this year-or propose no adult gift exchanges at all. Far from being disappointed, it's likely they'll view this reprieve from gift-buying as a gift in its own right."

Invest in your kids' financial futures. It may not seem as exciting to your kids as a new iPod, but a contribution to their financial well-being will be appreciated long after such expensive "toys" are obsolete. "Have the grandparents contribute to a college tuition fund or savings account rather than buy them more stuff they don't need," suggests Tyson. "Or make one of your gifts to your kids a stock fund portfolio that can start accruing now. Also, make them aware of the budgets and tools you are using to keep your spending in check. The holidays are a great time for them to truly learn that money doesn't grow on trees."

Give the gift of time to your kids. Often, parents buy gifts for their kids with the best of intentions. Either you don't want to deprive them of the toys and gadgets all of their friends have, or you want to give them the things you didn't have as a kid.

"Both of these tendencies

are perfectly understandable, but I've found that parents who buy too much for their kids often have difficulty changing the habit," says Tyson. "The holiday season offers great opportunities for you to show your kids how much you love and care for them. For example, you can make time with them each week to watch a holiday film or TV show, go on a walk to see your neighbors' holiday lights and decorations, or emphasize that giving back message again and take them caroling at a local retirement home. All of these activities cost next to nothing, and they will be fun for the kids and for you!"

Remember that meaningful gifts don't necessarily have a big price tag. "Sure, it might be nice to give your mom a brand new TV, but there are other things out there that will be even more meaningful and enjoyable for her-like a photo album with candid shots of the grandkids or something they've made for her themselves," says Tyson. "If you are looking to give a gift that truly means something and that will keep its value for years to come, you are better off looking for nonmaterial gifts to give than for something your gift recipients could get themselves at the local big box



In Northeastern Canada, cranberries are often called "moss berries," yet the traditional English name for the tangy fruit is "fen berry," due to the berries growth in the "fen," or marshes. Native Americans first consumed cranberries, or as they dubbed them, Sassamanash, as food, medicine, and colorant. They may have given them to starving European settlers, who then incorporated them their Thanksgiving feasts. It wasn't until the 1820s that cranberries were exported to Europe, where they became popular in the Nordic countries, Russia, and Scotland.

are cranberries grown? Well, Ocean Spray commercials pretty much have it right. The men in those goofy rubber overalls, surrounded by a veritable sea of berries are quite representative of what one might see in a cranberry bog. In the US, cranberries are cultivated in Maine, Wisconsin, Massachusetts, Washington, Michigan, Oregon, Minnesota, and New Jersey; Wisconsin leads production with over 50% of the market share, followed by Wisconsin with 28%. Traditionally, cranberries were grown in wetlands, yet today they are constructed in beds in uplands with a shallow water table

There is no topsoil, which is scraped off and replaced with clean sand, brought in at four to eight inches, and then leveled off. The beds can be drained by socked tile or the perimeter ditch, dug around the bed. Cranberries grown by moving established vines from one bed to a new one. The vines are pushed into the sand and then watered until roots form. They are showered with nitrogen fertilizer until they are a year old. They are harvested in the fall, when the berries are finally deep

High tech genetic sequencing enables screening for hereditary hearing loss

combination of special techniques capture to specific DNA sequences and high-throughput technology to sequence them, scientists from the Baylor College of Medicine Human Genome Sequencing Center (www. hgsc.bcm.tmc.edu/) and the University of Iowa (www. uiowa.edu/) developed a test to simultaneously screen more than 50 genes known to cause hearing loss and deafness - a time- and costsaving analysis that will provide important answers to parents and deaf children in the future.

"This use of massively sequencing parallel demonstrates the value of this kind of technology in identifying and diagnosing the source of disease," said Dr. Richard Gibbs (www. hgsc.bcm.tmc.edu/contenthome-HGSC_director-x. hgsc), director of the Human Genome Sequencing Center, where the sequencing took

"The really exciting aspect of this news is the fact that we're now bringing the technology that the Genome Center has worked so hard to develop directly to the clinic and to the direct benefit of patients," said Dr. Steve Scherer, associate professor in the BCM Human Genome Sequencing Center and an author of the report that appears online today in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences (www. pnas.org).

The technology, which Iowa researchers dubbed OtoSCOPE (otologic capture sequence pathogenic exons), may soon become a test offered through the Molecular Otolaryngology and Renal Research Laboratory at the University of Iowa.

In the past, researchers looked for the genetic causes of hearing loss one gene at a time. It was a slow and expensive process, said Eliot Shearer, a University of Iowa M.D./Ph.D. student and another co-author. Knowing which gene mutation causes the hearing loss can give families information on how severe the deafness will be and the chance of having another child with the disorder. It can also help doctors find the best treatment - such as hearing aids or cochlear implants.

In some cases, deafness is part of a syndrome that can include other problems. Usher Syndrome, for example, is the most common cause of deaf-blindness in the United States. While children lose hearing early, blindness develops at around age 10.

Early intervention can help slow vision loss, said Dr. Michael Hildebrand, a postdoctoral fellow at the University of Iowa and a coauthor of the report.

In the study, researchers tested 10 patients. In three, the gene mutation was already known. One sample was known to have no deafness mutations. The remaining six had unknown gene mutations. The genetic screen was able to identify the gene mutation in five of the six unknowns.

Others who took part in this work include Donna Muzny, Dr. Yi Han, Dr. Min Wang and Fiona Ongeri of the BCM Human Genome Sequencing Center as well as Adam P. DeLuca Kyle R. Taylor, Jose Gurrola II, Todd Scheetz and Richard J.H. Smith, at the University

It was my first mugging.

Having worked in a mental hospital and also having spent some time in the presence of the intoxicated, I drew on past experiences to try to persuade erratic, evasive James to accompany me to the office to complete our transaction, such as it was. Did I mention he wanted a ride to Whattaburger?

I wonder if he would have picked on me if he'd known I once clobbered a gypsy pickpocket and chased down a pursesnatcher? Maybe.

When we neared the office, the clerk heard

our voices and came out to join the fray. She accused James of panhandling. He didn't take to the scolding. I thought she knew him. She didn't.

Ah, the beleaguered James. He talked even more nonsense, got in her face, kept the money and walked off. We called the police.

An officer came, heard our story and promptly apprehended a suspicious-looking pedestrian nearby.

In the darkness, I viewed him in a one-man curbside lineup. I asked him to smile. He did so brilliantly. It wasn't James. Different teeth. I notice teeth.

Moreover he didn't have any money. That made two of us.

Nor was he as impertinent as James, maybe because of the police presence, or maybe he was on a different drug.

After the police left, I drove to Whattaburger to talk to the night crew. We pooled our information. They told me about a guy who hangs out at a cheap nearby nonfranchise motel and routinely cons people out of money with a broken-down vehicle sob story. With more than 142 million acres of private farms, ranches and forestlands, Texas has more land in agricultural production than any other state. However, Texas, the nation's secondlargest agriculture producer, is losing more than 360 acres of farmland daily - land that is critical for the production of those items we've come to depend on, such as food and clothing.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Resources Inventory survey shows every state losing farmland from 1982-2007. But in no state is farmland combined with population disappearing as fast as it

is in Texas. A recent study shows more than 2.1 million acres of farms, ranches and forestlands in Texas were converted for other uses, such as housing, businesses and highways, from 1997 to 2007. This represents a total net loss of more than 1.52 million acres of agricultural land in the Lone Star State.

The situation hasn't yet reached the crisis point, but that may very well change in the future, as the state's population is expected to almost double to 46 million by 2060. Fewer acres in agricultural production growth means it's only a

matter of time before Texas becomes at risk of losing its standing as a leading food and fiber producer, and becoming foreign dependent on

Texas agriculture producers can look to local, state and federal agencies, and private organizations for assistance in the form of conservation mentoring planning, programs, workshops and specialists. With the right tools and preparation, Texas agriculture producers will lead the way by preserving their operations and ensuring Texas continues to produce the food on our tables and clothes on

Teaching Cattle Producers About the Retail Side of Their Industry

It's no secret Texas is the No.1 producer of beef in the nation, in part because our cattle ranchers offer a variety of products to meet the tastes and nutritional needs of consumers. Through Beef 706 - a hands-on, quality assurance program funded by the Beef Checkoff Program and sponsored by the AgriLife Extension Service and the Texas Beef Council many ranchers are learning they actually can have a significant impact on the retail side of their industry

Beef producers rarely see the process that takes their animals from the pasture to retail. The free, two-day Beef 706 training course at Texas A&M University in College Station allows producers to follow their animals through the marketplace after they sell them, learning how meat is graded, priced and sold before being distributed to grocery retail outlets. Program directors say the ability to evaluate this process is key to understanding how herd management affects the expectations and buying

criteria of consumers. If producers understand that how they raise their animals determines how high the quality of beef will be for the consumer, that knowledge will ultimately improve their product. Learning differences in beef quality grades, such as Prime, Choice and Select, can also help producers better understand consumer preferences.

Pecans - In High Demand at Home and Overseas

The pecans Texans use to make pies and other treats during the holiday season are currently in abundant supply, but with an increasing export demand, pecan growers will soon be challenged to meet consumer demand domestically and internationally.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture expects Texas pecan production to total 70 million pounds in 2010, up 10 million pounds from 2009. Last year, according to USDA, approximately 75 million normally cyclical, where a

pounds of pecans from the U.S. were shipped to China, Hong Kong, Singapore, Taiwan and Vietnam - more than the entire Texas pecan production and about 26 percent of the U.S. total production. China, the world's most populous country with just over 1.3 billion people, has major festivals during which many pecans are consumed. That, along with increased purchases from China's emerging middle class, is driving up demand.

Pecan production is

good production year like 2009 is normally followed by a lower production year. However, Texas pecan growers bucked that trend this year thanks to good rains and cooler temperatures that boosted production.

Even with alternating high-yield production seasons and unpredictable weather, a growing demand for pecans will keep Texas and U.S. growers at the forefront of supplying this key ingredient for cultural celebrations



Toy-related injuries rise per report Avoid home damage from frozen pipes

the holidays are still a few weeks away, shopping already season has begun. With stores and online retailers already offering sales and discounts to consumers, it is important that children's safety be at the top of the shopping list.

In the most recent report from the U.S. Consumer **Product Safety Commission** (CPSC), injuries related to toys actually increased from the previous year. In fact, there were close to 186,000 that required emergency room treatment for those ages 15 and younger in 2009, compared with approximately 173,000 in 2008. And, 90,600 of those injuries were to those less than 5 years of age.

The majority of injuries were to the head and face area, including the eyes. Lacerations, abrasions and contusions made up most of these injuries.

Blindness Prevent America, the nation's oldest eye health and safety organization, has declared December as Safe Toys and Gifts Month. The group everyone, encourages whether they are buying gifts for their own family or friends or for charitable make donations, decisions conscientious based on what is best for the child.

"The holidays should be spent with friends and

family, not in the emergency room," said Hugh R. Parry, president and CEO of Prevent Blindness America. "By taking a few, easy safety precautions, we can keep the festivities merry and bright!"

Prevent Blindness America suggests following tips:

· Inspect all toys before purchasing. Monitor toys that your child has received as gifts to make sure they are appropriate for your child's age and developmental level.

Gifts of sports equipment should always be accompanied by protective gear (such as a basketball along with eye goggles or a face guard with a new batting helmet for baseball or softball).

 Make recommendations to family members and friends about gifts that you feel are appropriate for your child. Be diligent about inspecting these gifts before allowing your child to play with them.

 Any toy that is labeled "supervision required" must always be used in the presence of an adult. Keep toys meant for older children away from younger

Always save the warranties and directions for every toy. If possible, include a gift receipt. Repair or throw away damaged toys.

 Avoid toys that shoot or include parts that fly off.

•Inspect toys sturdiness. Your child's toys should be durable, with no sharp edges or points. The toys should also withstand impact. Dispose of plastic wrapping material immediately on toys as they may have sharp edges.

· Don't give toys with small parts to young children. Young tend to put things in their mouths, increasing the risk of choking. If the part of a toy can fit in a toilet paper roll, the toy is not appropriate for children under the age of 3.

 The CPSC recommends that children younger than eight years old be kept away from deflated balloons. Discard broken balloons at once as these represent a serious choking hazard.

· For younger children, avoid play sets with small magnets and make sure batteries are secured within the toy. If magnets or batteries are ingested, serious injuries and/or death can occur.

AUSTIN - With the approach of colder weather, Texas residents are reminded that a fast-moving cold front can cause temperatures to drop below freezing within hours. Outdoor pipes, pipes in unheated areas, and pipes that run along uninsulated exterior walls can burst if the water in them freezes and expands. This can shatter pipe seals or the pipes themselves, sending water pouring through your house. You can avoid thousands of dollars of damage to your walls, ceilings, carpets, and furniture by taking a few simple measures to protect your home.

Before the Freeze

•Protect faucets, outdoor pipes, and exposed pipes in unheated areas by wrapping them with rags, newspaper, trash bags, or plastic foam.

•Insulate your outdoor water meter box and be sure its lid is on tight.

·Cover any vents around your home's foundation.

•Drain and store water hoses indoors.

Protect outdoor electrical

 Drain swimming pool circulation systems or keep the pump motor running. (Run the pump motor only in a short freeze. Running the motor for long periods could damage it.)

•Drain water sprinkler supply lines.

•Open the cabinets under sinks in your kitchen and bathrooms to allow heated indoor air to circulate around the water

·Set your thermostat at minimum temperature of 55 degrees, especially when you're gone for the day or away for an extended period.

•Let indoor faucets drip; it isn't necessary to run a stream of water.

·Make sure you know where your home's shutoff valve is and how to turn it on and off.

•If you leave town, consider turning off your water at the shut-off valve while faucets are running to drain your pipes. Make sure you turn the faucets off before you turn the shut-off valve back on.

•If you drain your pipes, contact your electric or gas utility company for instructions on protecting your water heater.

If Your Pipes Freeze

•If a pipe bursts and floods your home, turn the water off at the shut-off valve. Call a plumber for help if you can't find the broken pipe or if it's inaccessible. Don't turn the water back on until the pipe has been repaired.

•If the pipe hasn't burst, thaw it out with an electric heating pad, hair dryer, portable space heater, or towel soaked with hot water. Apply heat by slowly moving the heat source toward the coldest spot on the pipe. Never concentrate heat in one spot because cracking ice can shatter a pipe. Turn the faucet on and let it run until the pipe is thawed and water pressure returns to normal.

•Don't use a blowtorch or other open-flame device. They are fire risks and carbon monoxide exposure risks.

Many homeowners and renters policies pay for property repair, and may also pay for debris removal and for additional living expenses if you have to move temporarily because of damage to your home. If you can't find your policy, ask your agent or company for a copy.

policies •Homeowners may require you to make temporary repairs to protect your property from further damage. Your policy covers the cost of these repairs. Keep all receipts and damaged property for the adjuster to inspect. If possible, take photos or videos of the damage before making repairs. Don't make permanent repairs. An insurance company may deny a claim if you make permanent repairs before an adjuster inspects the damage.

 Most homeowners policies do not cover loss caused by freezing pipes while your house is unoccupied unless you used reasonable care to maintain heat in the building; shut off the water supply; and drain water from plumbing, heating, and air conditioning systems.

Not all holiday dishes are difficult

Everybody loves to eat all those home cooked holiday dishes and treats, but most of us don't have time to spend days toiling over a hot stove.

Rest assured, you don't need to make everything from scratch to create a great holiday meal. Guests won't notice if you use some offthe-shelf ingredients (and if they did, they won't hold it against you). For example, instead of dinner rolls from scratch, buy ones that you just heat in the oven.

You can also use packaged items like soups, stocks and even pre-made stuffing, and simply add your own personal touches to make your dishes distinctive. Add some dried cranberries here or some chestnuts there and it becomes your homemade specialty.

Here are two easy holiday recipes that incorporate store-bought ingredients to help lighten your holiday load:

Moist & Savory Stuffing 1 package (14 ounces) Pepperidge Farm Herb Seasoned Stuffing

2 1/2 cups Swanson Chicken Broth

Generous dash ground black pepper

2 stalks celery, coarsely chopped (about 1 cup)

1 large onion, coarsely

chopped (about 1 cup)

Heat the broth, black pepper, celery and onion in a 3-quart saucepan over medium-high heat to a boil. Reduce the heat to low. Cover and cook for 5 minutes or until the vegetables are tender. Remove the saucepan from the heat. Add the stuffing and mix lightly.

Spoon the stuffing mixture into a greased 3-quart shallow baking dish. Cover the baking dish and bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until the stuffing mixture is hot. Makes 10 servings (about 3/4 cup each).

Holiday Brie en Croute

1 egg

1 tablespoon water

1/2 of a 17.3-ounce package Pepperidge Farm Puff Pastry Sheets (1 sheet), thawed

1/2 cup apricot preserves or seedless raspberry jam

1/3 cup dried cranberries 1/4 cup toasted sliced al-

1 (13- to 16-ounce) Brie or other soft cheese round

1 package (13 ounces) crackers

Heat the oven to 400 degrees. Beat the egg and water in a small bowl with a fork.

Unfold the pastry sheet on a lightly floured surface. Roll the pastry sheet into a 14-inch square. Spread the preserves on the pastry to within two inches of the edge. Sprinkle with the cranberries and almonds. Place the cheese in the center of the pastry. Fold the pastry up over the cheese to cover. Trim the excess pastry and press to seal. Brush the seam with the egg mixture. Place seam-side down onto a baking sheet. Decorate with the pastry scraps, if desired. Brush with the egg mixture.

Bake for 20 minutes or until the pastry is golden brown. Let stand for 45 minutes. Serves 12.
