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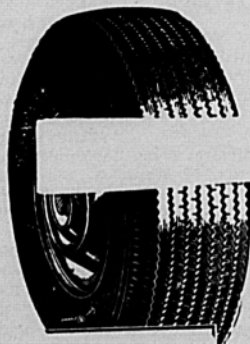

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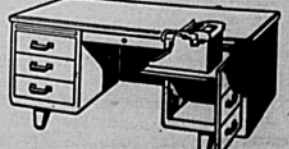

Education Needed To Control Hepatitis

Each year, the number of cases of viral hepatitis, a contagious disease of the liver, increases. Cases reported to the Texas State Department of Health during the first eight months of this year were averaging 97 cases more per month than during the same period last year.

Symptoms of hepatitis are, in general, an extreme tiredness or weakness, loss of appetite, abdominal pains, nausea, diarrhea, fever ranging from 101 to 104 degrees, and weight loss of 10 to 20 pounds.

Writing for her fellow Texas physicians in an article in the November issue of Texas State Journal of Medicine, Dr. Francine Jensen, assistant director of the Harris County Health Unit, reports evidence that the disease is spread through person-to-person contact and transmission via the fecal-oral route.

With no known vaccine for viral hepatitis, the control of the disease centers primarily around intensive education efforts to improve personal and community hygiene. Epidemics have been related to contaminated food and water. Dr. Jensen states. Recently an outbreak of 77 cases was reported, and the source of infection was found to be raw oysters which had been obtained from the mouth of a contaminated river.

It is important that infectious hepatitis be detected not only to allow prompt treatment, but also to prevent further spread of disease. Evidence exists to prove that "carriers, both sick and healthy, are important in the maintenance of virus in nature and the spread of disease."

An educational program has been offered recently for public health workers. Health department personnel can identify the source of infection (usually a school age child), can detect other possible cases of the disease within the family, and can emphasize measures the family

needs to take to prevent spread of the disease within the household or community. Health departments also distribute gamma globulin to physicians who request it for contacts of patients with viral hepatitis. This treatment effectively controls the disease and prevents its occurrence in other members of the patients' household.

Private physicians have been encouraged to report cases of viral hepatitis promptly and to use the health department's resources to aid in controlling the disease.

ENDORSE THIS CHECK, PLEASE

Most people today have checking accounts. As negotiable instruments, checks allow you to transfer money easily.

Two main ways to negotiate checks: by delivery or by endorsement and, now and then, by assigning them.

For checks made out to "cash" or "bearer," delivery alone negotiates them. It's not a good idea to make out checks this way. Any holder can cash the check without endorsement -- a thief, a finder or some other unauthorized person. A merchant cashing it may still have you sign the check for identification.

You negotiate checks made out to named payees by endorsement. There are several kinds:

1. A blank endorsement: The endorser just signs his name, usually a poor idea. Anyone getting hold of it can negotiate it by delivery. As an endorser, you may have to pay if it bounces.

2. Special endorsements say who gets the money. On the check's back, you may write "pay to the order of John Jones," followed by your name. If Jones cashes it, he must sign it, a way to show that he got the check.

3. Some endorsements cut off further negotiations: You sign a check, "for deposit only," "for collection only," "pay to Joe White only." This means no further negotiations.

4. Qualified endorsements remove endorser's liability if the check bounces. Here you write "without recourse" on the check back and sign your name.

When would you use such a check? Suppose you are collecting funds for your club, a debt for a friend, or a business associate. The debtor makes out the check to you. You have no stake in the check; you just want to pass it on to its rightful owner. But you may have to endorse it, though you don't want to guarantee it. Should the check bounce after negotiation to other people you don't want to hold the bag as an endorser. The

qualified endorsement solves this problem.

5. A conditional endorsement limits the rights of the person getting the check. "Pay to the order of John Jones, upon completion of my home." It calls upon John Jones to honor this condition. But such an endorsement does not always work. Jones can still negotiate it or cash it at a store or bank. Only he is subject to the condition, not the store or bank. Such an endorsement may at least fix your rights between you and Jones.

When you endorse a check (except "without recourse"), you guarantee that it is good, even though the first maker may stop payment or deny that the reasons for making the check exists

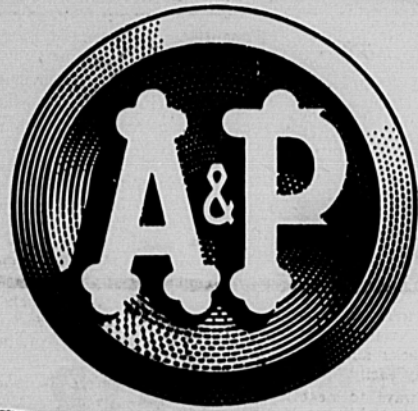

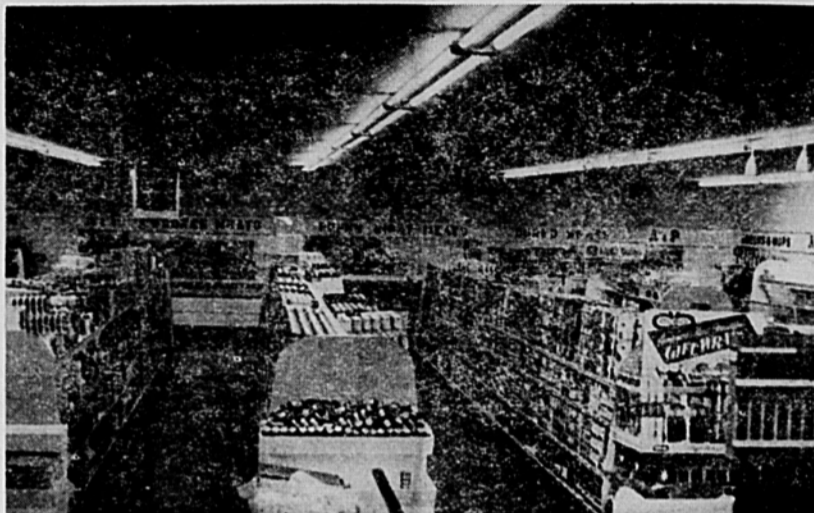

About Your Health .

Quail season opened in Texas December 1, sending even more hunters into fields to join those still stalking deer and turkey or hunting rabbits. It's anyone's guess as to how many hunters will fall victim to another hunter's gun.

Statisticians contend 95 percent of hunting accident involving guns could be avoided by sensible handling of firearms. Last year 194 Texas died in accidents involving firearms.

Expert hunters realize guns are instruments of violence, not toys to be handled frivolously. One of the most deadly hunting situations is created when hunting is combined with drinking.

In the best hunting circles top ranking is accorded the safe thoughtful gunhandler. He earns highest respect and is a welcome companion among the elite in the field.

A smart hunter keeps his gun empty of ammunition, except when actually on the prowl for game. He never carries a loaded gun in an automobile, into home surroundings or into a camp

even when only hunters are present.

Pointing a gun at a companion, even when unloaded, is an inexcusable violation of safety, sportsmanship, hunting ethics and common sense, and is instantly recognized as the act of a juvenile. It is the quickest way to lose the respect and friendship of a competent gunhandler.

Climbing fences is another test of hunting sense. Either pass the gun to a companion -- muzzle pointed safely -- for him to hold while you climb through or over, or lay the gun on the ground while you cross over.

Another frequent cause of hunting mishaps is an exploding gun, the barrel of which has been clogged with mud or snow. Basic intelligence dictates that when a gun muzzle touches the ground it should be unloaded and checked for obstructions.

When two or more people are hunting together, walking abreast has proved to be the safest formation. Members of the party should keep each other in sight, yet stay far enough

apart to give each plenty of room. Guns, of course, should be pointed groundward or straight ahead.

Bright colors, preferably yellow or red, should be worn by all hunters.

Never shoot unless you're certain it is at game. Nothing so identifies the rank amateur as taking a shot merely at sound or movement.
