# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

**AUSTIN** — Gov. Price Daniel's long fight over reporting unclaimed property to the state for escheat has ended at last.

So has the argument over rural roads policy.

But the scrap over the question of what to do about regulating loans, interest rates and lenders is not yet settled. And it may not be for a long, long time.

The Legislature has settled the escheat and road policy questions. Also it has partially solved the advertising program for tourists, juvenile parole and repair of the San Jacinto Monument.

Money problems were eased when Comptroller Bob Calvert estimated that the escheat reporting law passed last week will yield at least \$300,000 during the next 20 months. He put no estimate on the bank reporting law just laid on Governor Daniel's desk for certain signature into law.

When the Legislature meets, growing Texas brings a pack of problems to Austin for it to solve.

High Plains irrigation farmers are quarreling with their gas company. They want its rates regulated. Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress and Rep. H. G. Wells of Tulla tussled a bill through both houses to let the farmers appeal to the Railroad Commission, just as cities can do, if the gas company increases its rates.

San Angelo and Edinburg got favorable reports from the Commission on Higher Education on making San Angelo College and Pan American College, now locally supported, part of the state system of colleges in 1965.

They came to Austin to get the Legislature to pass the necessary laws, and make the state take over support of the colleges. House of Representatives

went along with both proposals.

But Sen. W. T. Moore of Bryan down in A&M country, thinks Texas has enough state colleges already. So, he used the filibuster to fight the two new college bills to a standstill.

**WAY TO ROADS PAVED** — State Highway Commissioner Herb Petry Jr., complimented the Legislature on passage of the Farm to Market road bill. He announced new projects as soon as Governor Daniel's signature was on the bill.

The Commission approved \$13,000 worth of surfacing work on highways in Cameron and Hidalgo counties and a \$82,000 highway contract in Cameron County. Within the next 60 days they will try to schedule more than \$1,000,000 of work on US 83 in the Valley and \$500,000 for road work in the Valley.

Senators Bob Baker of Houston and Nevelle Colson of Navasota appeared before the Highway Commission to urge approval of a four-lane highway between Hempstead and Houston. The Senators reminded the Commission that they had helped pass the road bill which frees funds for primary roads.

**NO RELIEF IN SIGHT** — Many legislators were hoping to go home at the end of the week, but as soon as they processed pending bills, other bills were submitted.

At the end of the week, Governor Daniel submitted additional subjects: Authority for the Texas Employment Commission to enter into a compact with other states; financing of the Texas Securities Commission; an appropriation to the Department of Banking; and amendments to the Penal Code.

House members held a Friday session for the first time this month, and resigned themselves to working right through the

last of the 30 days of the called session.

**INEQUITIES STUDY PROPOSED** — Rep. W. S. Healy of Paducah introduced a resolution that the House Committee on Privileges, Suffrage and Elections study election "inequities" in the Constitution and report its findings to the next legislature.

Healy said he didn't think it fair that while the law requires district and county officials to resign upon announcement of their candidacy for another office, it does not require this same action by all state officials.

**COBB JOINS INDUSTRIAL GROUP** — Bill B. Cobb of Austin, who has been serving as chief examiner of the Legislative Budget Board, will leave that post on February 1.

Harry W. Clark, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission, has picked Cobb as his assistant.

In keeping with recommendations made by the Texas Research League, Cobb's prime duty will be to organize and design research projects, supervise community development efforts and direct the advertising program of the industrial commission.

**A ROSE BY ANY NAME** — Don Yarborough, Houstonian, who is supposed to have liberal backing in Harris County and labor support on a statewide basis, told Capitol newsmen he will run for governor. U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, who was supported by liberals in two gubernatorial campaigns, decided not to enter this race.

Candidates already in the race include Democrats Will Wilson, Marshall Formby and John Connally and Republican Jack Cox.

District Judge Otis T. Dumanagan of Tyler paid the State Democratic Executive Committee the \$1,000 filing fee and became a candidate for Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals. Judge W. A. Morrison of Austin now serving on the high court, is his only opponent so far.

The committee received \$800 filing fees from: L. B. Hightower of Beaumont, running for reelection as Chief Justice of the 9th Court of Civil Appeals; Spurgeon E. Bell of Houston, for reelection as Chief Justice of the First Court of Civil Appeals; and Tom F. Coleman of Houston, candidate for the unexpired term of First Court of Civil Appeals Associate Justice Phil D. Woodruff.

## Linda Discards Braces, Crutches; Mother Praises March of Dimes

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Dorothy E. Breese, young Columbus, Ohio, mother, tells of the remarkable progress made by her daughter in overcoming the disability caused by a severe birth defect.)

My little Linda has done far more things in her five years than most people even dream of being able to do in an entire lifetime.

As the March of Dimes 1961 National Poster Child, she met President Kennedy in person and rode on a float in his inauguration parade. She starred in an hour-long television program with some of the country's most popular television and movie stars.

Linda has traveled from coast to coast and seen her picture in nearly every newspaper printed. She has autograph books filled with the signatures of celebrities and famous people she has visited.

These are just some of the things Linda has done that are beyond the reach of most of us. But the one thing we wanted most for her was something the average person takes for granted—the ability to walk alone and unaided.

There were many times during the years that my husband, Dean, and I thought that Linda would never be able to throw away her braces and crutches. And to be truthful, there were terrifying moments when we feared we might even lose her.

Linda was born with an opening in her spinal column, a condition known medically as spina bifida. As a result, her body was seriously affected from the waist down.

When she was only a few months old, Linda underwent a delicate operation that partially corrected the condition. The surgery was performed at Children's Hospital in Columbus where subsequently The National Foundation with March of Dimes funds established the first of its Birth Defects Clinical Study Centers in 1959.

When she was nine months old, it was found that Linda had water on the brain, which has the medical name of hydrocephalus. This condition was

treated by the insertion of a "shunt" tube which drains the excess fluid from the head into the blood stream.

You can imagine how much we worried about our little girl in those early days, because we knew she was never far from death. It could have come at any time. After all, 250,000 infants are born in this country each year with a significant birth defect and 21,000 of them die.

But Linda continued to improve. She received specialized treatment at the March of Dimes-supported center. She got her leg braces and crutches. Linda hated them, but she learned to use them.

When, though—if ever—would she be able to run and play with her sister and two older brothers and the other neighborhood children?

The answer to that question depended on Linda, her doctors, the rehabilitation therapists, and us. We all worked together. We worked long, and we worked hard, but it was worth it.

Only the other day, Linda took her first halting steps across our living room without her crutches or leg braces. It was an unforgettable experience. In my excitement, I telephoned the good news to everyone I knew—and probably quite a few I didn't know. It was a real shout-from-the-house-tops event.

Linda has won through. She improves every day. Now her trips to the birth defects center have been cut to just one every three months. Best of all—we have been able to enroll her in kindergarten.

Dean and I and the children remember the gloomy days. We know that many other parents of afflicted children are going through similar days of anxiety and heartbreak right now. But we also know that The National Foundation-March of Dimes is looking for the cause and cure of birth defects.

March of Dimes contributions led to the triumph over polio, and I'm a firm believer in the slogan that "Your Dimes Will Do It Again."

### Rep. Scott Bailey To Announce Plans Soor

State Representative Scott J. Bailey, Democrat of the 76th District, in response to inquiries of both friends and his opposition, stated that he will make known his political plans in the very near future.

"I am a member of the U. S. Army Reserve and subject to call until January 14," Representative Bailey said. He is a veteran of overseas action during the Korean conflict. "If a national emergency should call me to active military duty, I would want to be free to do my patriotic duty without causing unnecessary expense to and confusion in the new 35th District."

Representative Bailey explained that other than his status as a Reservist, he is also a member of two very critical Committees at the third special session of the State Legislature, summoned by Gov. Price Daniel to dispose of emergency legislation. There are the House Committee on Agriculture and the Committee for Banks and Banking.

Rep. Bailey was on the subcommittee of the House Agriculture Committee, which considered the pressing needs of Texas Farm to Market road for sufficient maintenance funds.

"Our Farm to Market roads are important to the entire state, and the people of Callahan, Eastland, Shackelford, Palo Pinto and Stephen counties understand that it was my duty to work for them on this issue," Representative Bailey stated.

"The Farm to Market system is critical to all Texas citizens, whether urban or rural, and it would have been politically immoral for me to spend my time campaigning during this special session."

Representative Bailey, a veteran Democrat, is also a member of the Important House Committee on Banks and Banking, which considered legislation to curb the loan shark abuses which plague Texas. This legislation was passed by the House of Representatives and sent to the Senate on January 11, 1962.

"This is another reason for my lack of announcement for re-election. We have worked hard to accomplish what our people wanted, and we have made good progress.

"Gov. Daniel summoned this session of the legislature to deal with urgent legislation. Until we have more nearly solved these problems, I can only promise my District, the new 63rd, that I am working hard to fulfill the reasons they originally sent me to the House of Representatives.

"I want everyone in the new 63rd District to feel free to contact me on any legislation. My friends and supporters, I am sure, will understand the necessity for the delay in my announcement. The immediate need is to work for our Farm to Market roads as hard as we have endeavored to protect our citizens against the abuses of the loan sharks. This, I will do."

### About Your Health . . .

Sooner or later, everyone needs a family health record. Dr. J. E. Peavy, state health commissioner, suggests you start yours now if you aren't already keeping one. Kept accurate and current, it can be of permanent value for the children's school records, for insurance data, and for your family doctor's use, the health official says.

A school note pad makes a good record book, but don't use it for anything else. And remember it has to be carefully kept if it is to be of full value.

You can start by jotting down the basic information you already have at hand concerning the injury and illness history of each member of your family.

Start it off with a brief listing of family history. Enter the date and place of birth of each person, and the place and date and cause of death of any deceased. Also enter pertinent information and the medical facts about each family member, such as the presence of chronic illness or physical handicap.

Next, start a section for dates of immunizations, being sure to provide space for each member of the family. Allow room for entering dates of immunizations against whooping cough, smallpox, diphtheria, tetanus and typhoid fever. Don't forget to include the dates of booster shots.

In a section of general information, list such things as the type of blood each member of the family has, and the drug sensitivities or special allergies of each. If the RH blood factor is known to be present in anyone, be sure to record it prominently.

The health record ought to include a check list of who in the family has had the more common diseases of childhood—chicken pox, measles, mumps, whooping cough, scarlet fever, diphtheria. Most of these are diseases of childhood, but sometimes an adult is exposed. German measles is a serious threat to expectant mothers, and mumps is a dangerous disease in any adult.

Dates of physical examinations, with a line or two for notes of special advice or instructions that followed the check-up should be noted in the health record. So also should illnesses requiring hospitalization, the nature of illness or injury, name of physician and hospital, dates of entry and discharge, length of illness, and type of surgery, if any.

Finally, list the family's health and accident insurance information for quick and easy reference when needed.

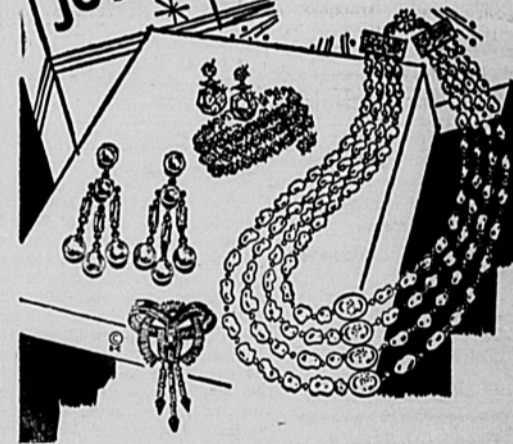

Callahan County Screwworm Fund is growing, due to a lot of hard work on the part of the community committees, which have put a lot of effort into getting this program in operation. On Tuesday, there was ap- proximately \$500 on deposit in sent to the Southwest Animal Health Foundation on the 1st of February. However, they are extending the time for a few days.

The severe cold which covered Texas earlier made this an ideal year to put the screwworm program into Texas, as it killed the flies in the over-wintering areas and if the buffer zone along the

border can be established with- in the next two or three weeks, there is a good chance that Tex- as can be free of screwworms this next year. Due to this ideal situation made possible by cold weather, everyone is asked to redouble their efforts to collect enough money to put the pro- gram into effect now. It can mean a saving of millions of dollars from screwworm cases this year, plus being cheaper and easier to put the program over.

Callahan County 4-H'ers have been doing good at the major shows this year. At Abilene, By- ron Snyder, Tom Windham, Dyer Windham, Murray Edwards, Ed- die Johnson and Vicki Finley all exhibited calves and Jimmy

Harris exhibited lambs. Steve Belcher of the Eula community exhibited broilers. Vicki had the highest placing calf, winning 9th in the light-heavy class. The calves all made the premium sale, other than three, which only lacked a few places. This was felt to be real good, due to the number and quality of calves entered in Abilene.

Other major shows which the 4-H'ers have entries are Fort Worth, El Paso, San Antonio and Houston. The calves have already shown in Ft. Worth, with Vicki Finley winning 13th with her Angus calf. Jimmy Harris will exhibit lambs in Ft. Worth this week end.

### SENATE APPROVES

The resolution was sponsored in the Senate by Harris County Senator Robert W. Baker, active candidate for the office of Lieu- tenant Governor.

The resolution calls for a study committee composed of ten members of the legislature, five from each house, to be appoint- ed respectively by the Speaker and the acting Lieutenant Gov- ernor. Senator Baker said the interim legislative commit- tee will be urged to work closely with the Southwest Animal Re- search Foundation and the Tex- as Animal Health Commission both of which organizations have assured their assistance in research of all areas of animal disease.

Charles Scruggs, editor of the Progressive Farmer, who is pres- ident of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, said that the screwworm plague alone cost Texas livestock own- ers more than \$100,000,000 per year.

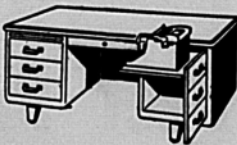

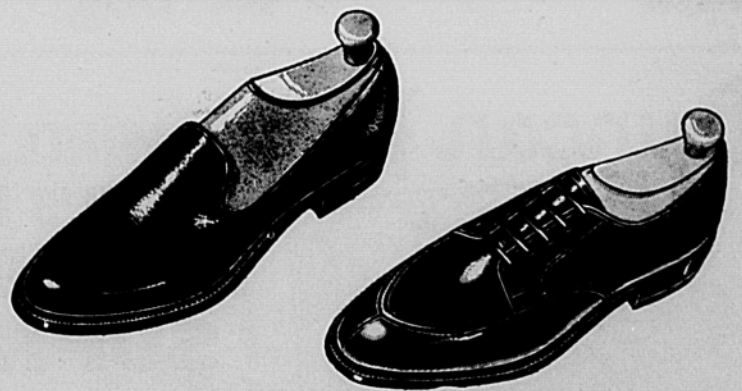
