The Main Street Beautification project has begun. In just a couple of months, those who visit Downtown Big Spring on Main Street, will be greeted

by a new fresh look. A group of business owners have joined together to complete the project, in an effort to help beautify Downtown and help draw attention to the retail district of Big Spring.

“We, as shop owners, wanted to do something that would make Main Street look more aesthetically pleasing by cleaning it up and making it more inviting,” Lori Henry, co-chair of the Main

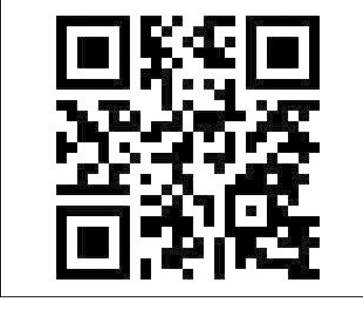

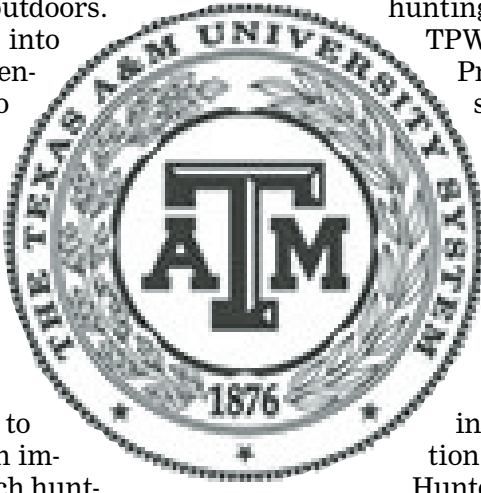

Texas A&M Forest Service urges Texans to help prevent wildfires during hunting season

COLLEGE STATION, Texas — With hunting season underway, many hunters and campers across the state are headed to the wild outdoors. This greater movement of people into wildland areas increases the potential for human-caused wildfires to start.

People and their activities cause more than 90 percent of wildfires in Texas, increasing the need for hunters and other outdoor enthusiasts to use caution outdoors and be mindful of activities that may cause a wildfire.

Winter weather is beginning to creep in across the state having an impact on wildfire conditions of which hunters should be aware. Freezing temperatures in the west will begin to cure grasses — making wildfires easier to start. And although currently there is no elevated wildfire weather forecasted, the possibility of wildfire is always a concern. It only takes one spark to start a wildfire.



“The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department wants Texas hunters to have a safe and successful hunting season,” said Chris Schenck, TPWD Wildlife Division State Fire Program Leader. “One part of that safe season is to practice good campfire safety. Smokey Bear’s message is still very important to Texas hunters.”

Texas A&M Forest Service and the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department encourage hunters to be cautious with campfires, as well as all activities that could spark a wildfire, including using certain ammunition.

Hunters should know their ammo. Jacketed bullets and high velocity ammunition should be avoided when fire danger is high, and target practice should occur over dirt or gravel. Other tips to help avoid accidentally starting a wildfire while hunting and camping include:

- Avoid driving over and parking on dry grass because the heat from your vehicle can easily ignite it. Always be ready to put out a fire should one start. Have a shovel and water with you in camp and have a fire extinguisher with you at all times.

- Always check with local officials for burn bans or other outdoor burning restrictions. Each county in Texas sets and lifts their own burn bans. Make sure you know your county’s burn ban status and if it restricts open flames and other heat-causing activities such as using charcoal.

- When using a cooking fire or campfire, never leave it unattended, and always make sure it is completely out by drowning it, stirring it and feeling to ensure that it is out cold before you leave.

- If you are taking a trailer out on your adventures, make sure that the tires are properly inflated, chains will not contact the road and that any loose metal will not continually hit anything else, all which can cause sparks.

Street Beautification Project, said.

The project is expected to be completed in time for the holiday shopping events in November. The first part of the project included clearing out the Rosemary that had been planted along the sidewalks and was completed on October 19. Next, artificial turf will be placed in each of the planters to keep trash from accumulating in the area. According to Henry, some planters will have trees planted, replicating the medians from 4th to 10th. In addition, lights will be placed in trees at the corners of 3rd and 2nd, as well as trees along Main Street.

“The best way I can think to describe it, we are trying to make Main Street from 1st through 3rd Street like a little Fredricksburg,” she said. “We want to have an area where those visiting the shops located in the area can walk along clean sidewalks and enjoy the atmosphere.”

The first phase of the project is estimated at around \$16,000 which was made possible through private donations from individuals, business owners and area organizations. There is still around \$5,000 needed, by Nov. 9, to be able to complete the first phase in time for holiday shopping season. The

second phase of the beautification project, which would include more signage, additional trash receptacles, benches and expansion of the project to Runnels and Scurry streets, is projected at around \$25,000.

“This project is something that will benefit the community of Big Spring and hopefully serve as one more way to attract visitors not only to Downtown Big Spring, but to Big Spring as a whole,” Michelle Hamlin, co-chair, said. “Once the project has been completed, the business owners will continue maintaining the area in front of their respective buildings.”

Newgarden wins IndyCar finale but can't deny Dixon 6th title

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) — Scott Dixon controlled his own fate and simply needed a smooth Sunday drive to win a sixth IndyCar championship.

He was a tactician as he followed Josef Newgarden around the streets of downtown St. Petersburg. So long as he kept Newgarden in his sight, Dixon would yank the crown away from the American and add another milestone to his illustrious career.

Newgarden won the season finale, using a spectacular two-car pass for the lead in a valiant effort to win a second consecutive title. Winning was not enough, though, to deny Dixon his coronation.

Dixon stealthily finished third in an easy drive to another title.

"They just shadowed us all day, it was the smart play," said Newgarden, who admitted his shot at the title was so slim it spoiled his mood the entire weekend.

Dixon was already looking forward to the next goal: A.J. Foyt's record seven titles.

"Six is good. Seven sounds better," Dixon said. "That's obviously going to be the goal. But it's tough, as you can see from the competition, even if you mess up just a little bit.

"Just have a smooth race, and that's what we did. Credit to Josef, he drove a hell of a race there and put us under a lot of pressure."

The 40-year-old New Zealander has won all six titles with Chip Ganassi Racing. Dixon has won two of the last three championships, a run interrupted last year when Newgarden won his second title.

Newgarden tied Dixon with his series-best fourth win of the season but Newgarden was in too large of a hole to catch his rival. Although Dixon at one time led the standings by 117 points, the final margin was a mere 16 points over Newgarden.

Dixon built his lead with three consecutive races to open the abbreviated and pandemic disrupted schedule.

Newgarden, winner of two straight at St. Pete, went to victory lane to congratulate his rival.

"I really don't know what I'd do different this year and I don't know what I'd ask my guys to do different. They were flawless," Newgarden said. "We just weren't able to get it done but we'll reset and we'll hit 'em harder next year. I promise you we'll be in the fight."

The season was supposed to begin seven months ago on these same streets before it was abruptly canceled 48 hours before the green flag. It came to a close in front of a sold-out 20,000 spectators, the largest crowd of the season for IndyCar.

Although IndyCar lost races in seven cities and had just one street course, Sunday's finale, still managed to complete a 14-race season. IndyCar became the first major motorsports series to make it to the checkered flag, relatively unscathed, and as stable as possible during a pandemic.

Stewardship from first-year series owner Roger Penske got IndyCar to the finish and Penske brought his awful inaugural season full circle with Sunday's finale. The last hurrah of a decent season was a dramatic error-prone ender in which three Andretti Autosport drivers ruined race-winning runs and Newgarden went down swinging.

The race was an Alexander Rossi runaway for the first 37 laps and then pole-

sitter Will Power crashed for the first caution. Power, who was in a tight race for third in the final standings, threw his gloves in anger and admitted to driver error.

"I just lost it. Had a moment," he said. "I was definitely frustrated there, making a mistake and hitting the wall. It's my bad. It put us out of the race and that's a bad situation.

The Power crash triggered a span of three cautions over the next 10 laps, the third on a restart on lap 47 when brand new teammate Scott McLaughlin spun in his IndyCar debut. The New Zealander won his third consecutive Australian Supercars championship one week ago then journeyed to the United States to launch a new career at Team Penske.

McLaughlin's wreck also collected Rinus VeeKay, who still clinched rookie of the year on the day he was renewed for a second season with Ed Carpenter Racing.

McLaughlin finished 22nd, just two spots ahead of Power in last, but was thrilled with his 47-lap experience.

"Awesome. Far out. The best day of my life, besides my wedding," enthused the 27-year-old newlywed.

Rossi then triggered a tailspin for the Andretti organization when he spun on lap 70 spun in marbles while racing for the win. Rossi had been determined to extend a streak of at least one win a season that dates to 2006 when was Skip Barber's youngest champion at 14-year-old.

One of the first tactical plays a beginner learns is to hold up a winner, especially at notrump. For example, if declarer has only the A-x-x in a suit that has been led by the opponents and dummy has three or fewer small cards in the suit, it is standard procedure in most cases to refuse to take the ace until the third round. By doing so, declarer can sever enemy communications in the suit, which may prove decisive later in the play.

So sometimes is the holdup play that it can sometimes prove advantageous even when declarer has two stoppers in the suit. An unusual application of

this can be seen in today's hand. **West led a heart**, dummy played low and when East produced the 10, South allowed him to win the trick! This odd-looking play had the desired effect, as the contract could no longer be defeated.

In practice, East returned a heart, covered by the Q-K-A. Diamonds were then led until East took the ace, but since he did not have a heart to return, he shifted to a spade. Declarer won and conceded a trick to the ace of clubs to set up his ninth trick.

Observe what would have happened had South won the first trick. His normal play at this stage would be to attack diamonds to develop three tricks in that suit. After taking the ace, East would return his remaining heart, and regardless of whether declarer won that trick or the next one, West's remaining hearts would become established. When South later tried for his ninth trick by leading a club, West would take the ace and cash his hearts for down one.

Thus, by treating the Q-J of hearts as the equivalent of a king, South's first-round holdup play worked to perfection, effectively neutralizing the threat of the opponents' heart suit. Note that the play would have worked equally well if the minor-suit aces were switched, failing only in the unlikely event that West held both missing aces as well as five hearts.

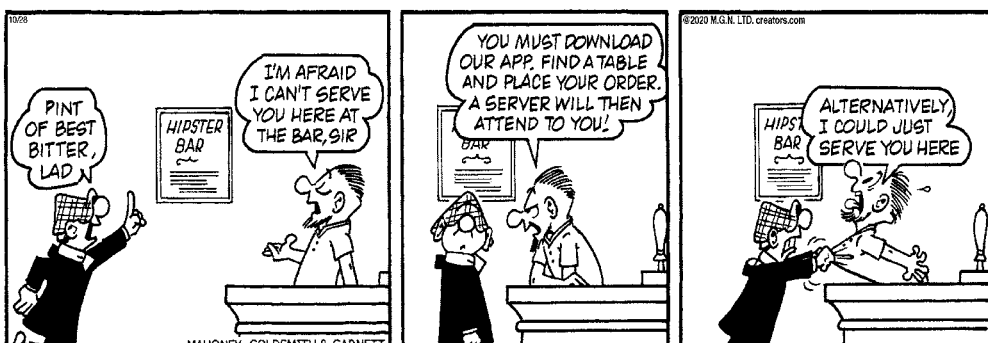

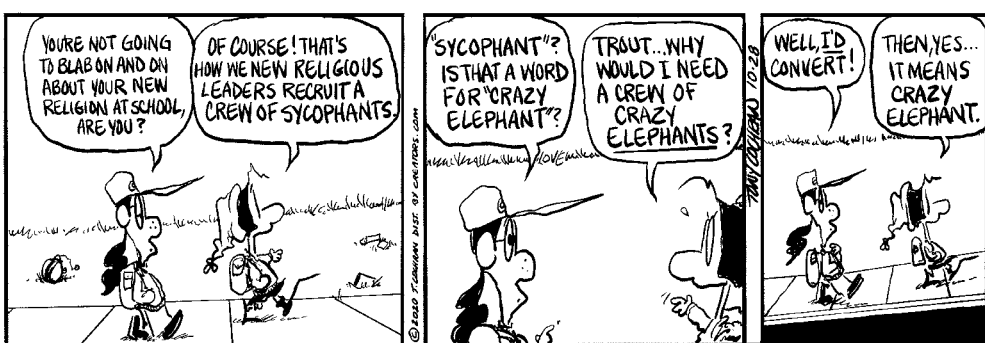

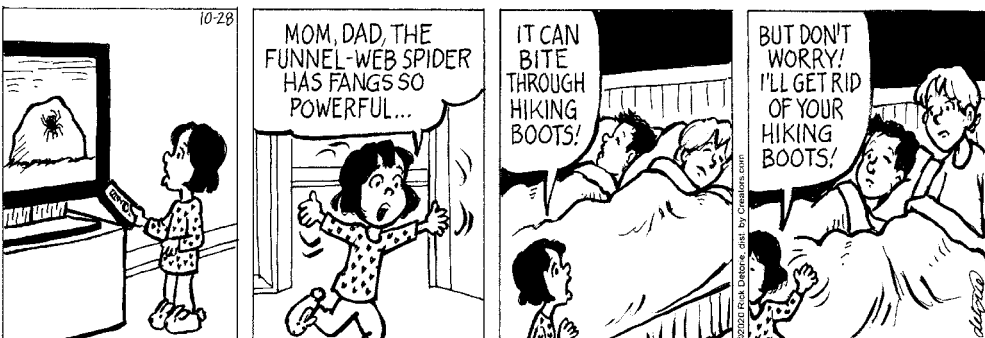

This Date In History

Today in History
Today is Wednesday, Oct. 28, the 302nd day of 2020. There are 64 days left in the year.
Today's Highlight in History:
On Oct. 28, 1962, Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev informed the United States that he had ordered the dismantling of missile bases in Cuba; in return, the U.S. secretly agreed to remove nuclear missiles from U.S. installations in Turkey.
On this date:
In 1858, Rowland Hussey Macy opened his first New York store at Sixth Avenue and 14th Street in Manhattan.
In 1886, the Statue of Liberty, a gift from the people of France, was dedicated in New York Harbor by President Grover Cleveland.
In 1922, fascism came to Italy as Benito Mussolini took control of the government.
In 1940, Italy invaded Greece during World War II.
In 1976, former Nixon aide John D. Ehrlichman entered a federal prison camp in Safford, Arizona, to begin serving his sentence for Watergate-related convictions (he was released in April 1978).
In 1980, President Jimmy Carter and Republican presidential nominee Ronald Reagan faced off in a nationally broadcast, 90-minute debate in Cleveland.
In 1996, Richard Jewell, cleared of committing the Olympic park bombing, held a news conference in Atlanta in which he thanked his mother for standing by him and lashed out at reporters and investigators who'd depicted him as the bomber, who turned out to be Eric Rudolph.
In 2001, the families of people killed in the September 11 terrorist attack gathered in New York for a memorial service filled with prayer and song.
In 2002, American diplomat Laurence Foley was assassinated in front of his house in Amman, Jordan, in the first such attack on a U.S. diplomat in decades. A student flunking out of the University of Arizona nursing school shot three of his professors to death, then killed himself.
In 2012, airlines canceled more than 7,000 flights in advance of Hurricane Sandy, transit systems in New York, Philadelphia and Washington were shut down, and forecasters warned the New York area could see an 11-foot wall of water.
In 2013, Penn State said it would pay \$59.7 million to 26 young men over claims of child sexual abuse at the hands of former assistant football coach Jerry Sandusky.
In 2016, the FBI dropped what

amounted to a political bomb on the Clinton campaign when it announced it was investigating whether emails on a device belonging to disgraced ex-congressman Anthony Weiner, the estranged husband of one of Clinton's closest aides, Huma Abedin, might contain classified information.
Ten years ago: Investigators with the president's oil spill commission said tests performed before the deadly blow-out of BP's oil well in the Gulf of Mexico should have raised doubts about the cement used to seal the well, but that the company and its cementing contractor used it anyway. (The cement mix's failure to prevent oil and gas from entering the well was cited by BP and others as one of the causes of the accident.) Caroline Wozniacki wrapped up the year-end No. 1 ranking after rallying to beat Francesca Schiavone 3-6, 6-1, 6-1 at the WTA Championships in Doha, Qatar. Stage and screen actor James MacArthur, who played "Danno" in the original version of television's "Hawaii Five-O," died in Jacksonville, Florida, at age 72.
Five years ago: Dennis Hastert pleaded guilty before a federal judge in Chicago to evading banking laws in a hush-money scheme. (A court filing later revealed allegations of sexual abuse against Hastert by at least four former students from his days as a high school wrestling coach; Hastert ended up being sentenced to 15 months in prison.) An unmanned Army surveillance blimp broke loose from its mooring in Maryland and floated over Pennsylvania for hours with two fighter jets on its tail, triggering blackouts across the countryside as it dragged its tether across power lines.

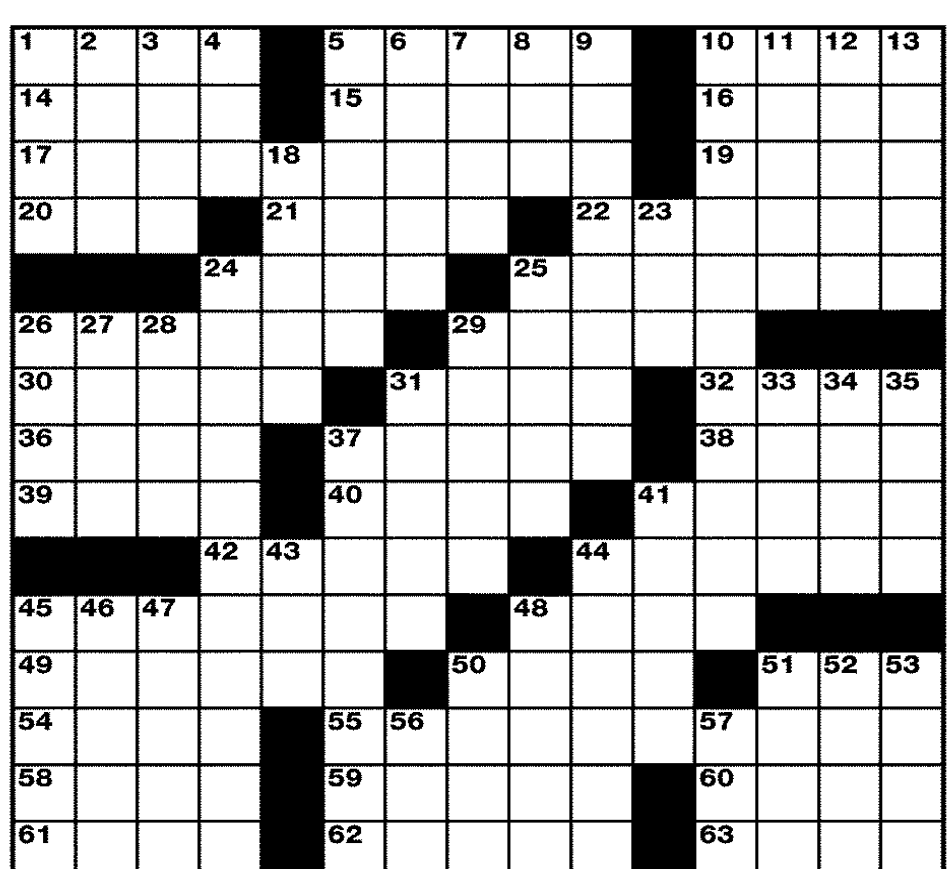

Rays, Dodgers grateful to have fans at neutral-site Series

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Individual whistles echo during quieter moments, and a single fan with enough persistence can leave an impression with a chant during World Series games with the smallest crowds in more than 100 years.

Because of the coronavirus, this year's Fall Classic is being held at a neutral site. A team from each coast is playing in Texas, drawing fans from Los Angeles and Tampa, Florida — along with curious Rangers supporters seeing the home squad's new retractable-roof stadium for the first time.

The roughly 11,000 mask-wearing fans each night — well, they're supposed to be wearing face coverings — are roughly 11,000 more than players saw in the stands during the regular season and all of the American League playoffs. So 40,518-seat Globe Life Field might as well be full as far as the Tampa Bay Rays are concerned.

"It certainly sounds like there's 40,000 people in there," manager Kevin Cash said. "Now, they might be 35,000 Dodger fans, which is OK. Any type of loudness and energy, that creates a lot in the dugout. That creates intensity. It's loud and it's been really refreshing to get to play with fans."

To Cash's point, there has been plenty of Dodger blue visible for each of the 12 games with limited crowds since the start of the National League Championship Series two weeks ago. The 13th will be Game 6 of the World Series on Tuesday night, with Los Angeles in position to win its first title in 32 years.

That also means plenty of masks with the iconic interlocking LA logo since face coverings are required except when fans are "actively eating or drinking" — an activity apparently more loosely defined by some.

There's plenty of elbow room on the concourses, and fans in clusters of four are separated by at least one row above and below them. Mask compliance on the concourses is close to 100%, while in the seats about one in four can be seen either without a mask on, or with the covering pulled down around the neck.

Many of these fans, though, are used to being crammed into the corridors of, say, Dodger Stadium, in the postseason.

"It's great that it's empty and it's clean and it was easy to get in," said Ana Chacon, born, raised and still living in Los Angeles County. "But it sucks that not everyone got to come. And it sucks that it's not in Los Angeles."

Game 1's restricted total of 11,388 was the smallest Series crowd since 10,535 attended Game 6 in 1909 between the Tigers and Pittsburgh at Detroit's Bennett Park, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.

It's the first World Series played entirely at one ballpark since 1944 between the Cardinals and Browns at Sportsman's Park in St. Louis — and the fourth

overall. The Yankees and Giants shared New York's Polo Grounds in 1921 and 1922.

Jacob Ornelas grew up in the Dallas area before returning to his native El Paso. He still makes it back for Texas Rangers games and would have been at Globe Life Field's first opening day had fans been allowed.

Ornelas went to games at the original homes of the Rangers, since-demolished Arlington Stadium, and watched them in the World Series a decade ago at Globe Life Park. The open-air facility is still standing across the street from the new place.

He was standing in a concession line, trying to keep his social distance, on a concourse with large dots everywhere reminding people to stay 6 feet (1.8 meters) apart. Just like with the masks, some lines were compliant, others not so much.

"It takes away from the experience overall, but not my experience as far as being here the first time, being in a World Series," Ornelas said. "It's a World Series, not the regular season. The crowd, the noise."

Los Angeles pitcher Tony Gonsolin said he noticed a stronger presence of Dodgers fans in the World Series compared with the NLCS, which might have to do with the Atlanta Braves having a strong national following themselves. LA beat Atlanta in Game 7 to advance.

"Overall, it's a little bit louder," Gonsolin said. "Those exciting moments are a little more exciting. It's just a fun atmosphere."

The retractable roof has served a purpose as well. It was open for the first two games, when the temperature at first pitch was in the low 80s Fahrenheit (high 20s Celsius) during a usually mild time of year in Texas.

It was about 30 degrees cooler for Game 3, so the roof was closed, then reopened with a game-time temperature of 57 degrees Fahrenheit (13.9 degrees Celsius) for Game 4. A cold and rainy Sunday closed the roof again for Game 5.40

It's almost certain to remain closed for Game 6, and, if necessary, Game 7. The final two nights in Texas will be classic fall weather straight out of New York, Boston or Philadelphia — temperatures in the 40s, with possible drizzle or light rain.

"Regardless of the limited amount (of fans), I think the stadium does still get loud, especially with the roof closed," Tampa Bay outfielder Austin Meadows said. "It is nice to have that and kind of earn that, especially with this year going through so much and not having anybody in the stands. Getting to experience that here in the World Series is special."

Cowboys question their own fight in rapidly spiraling season

Dallas receiver Amari Cooper had no answer for why the Cowboys didn't respond when Andy Dalton ended up with a concussion after the quarterback was hit while sliding on a play that led to the ejection of Washington's Jon Bostic.

Coach Mike McCarthy didn't hide his disappointment in the rest of the players on offense. Defensive end DeMarcus Lawrence fit the theme perfectly when answering an unrelated question about whether Dallas (2-5) could turn its season around after a demoralizing 25-3 loss to Washington.

"We need more belief and more high spirits around this team, and really more fight," Lawrence said. "That's really, I feel like, one of our weaknesses. We need to build a stronger backbone, fight and also make sure that we brought everything possible to come out with a victory."

It's difficult to judge McCarthy's first season in Dallas because the Cowboys could be on their third starting quarterback Sunday in Philadelphia. Dalton was making his second start in place of Dak Prescott, out for the year with a broken ankle.

The offensive line is in shambles, and the pandemic ruined the offseason for a defense making a significant scheme change. But the defense has been so bad, questions about defensive coordinator Mike Nolan's future won't go away.

McCarthy again dismissed the suggestion of dumping Nolan in the final answer with reporters after the Washington loss. Still, this is the first time for McCarthy and Nolan to coach together since 2005 in San Francisco.

Those 49ers, with Nolan as head coach and McCarthy running the offense, had one of the worst defenses in the NFL for a team that went 4-12. These Cowboys are headed that direction fast, and there were never questions about the team's resolve in nine-plus seasons under Jason Garrett.

"We knew there would be adjustments throughout as a football team," McCarthy said. "We've been hit with a number of challenges that we are just not pushing through right now. So, we need to continue to work and I believe we'll push through the other end."

WHAT'S WORKING

The only sliver of hope, and it's fading fast, is the Cowboys haven't been buried in the woeful NFC East. Dallas is still only a half-game behind division-leading Philadelphia, with a chance to leap-

frog the Eagles this weekend. It just doesn't seem very likely based on the injuries and apparent lack of confidence.

WHAT NEEDS HELP

Ben DiNucci figures to get his first NFL start if Dalton's concussion keeps him out against the Eagles. The Cowboys added Garrett Gilbert from Cleveland's practice squad after Prescott's injury.

This is the former Texas and SMU quarterback's seventh NFL season, but Garrett has only thrown three more passes than the DiNucci, a rookie from James Madison. If Dalton's condition doesn't improve significantly soon, the Cowboys might be looking for a veteran quarterback again.

STOCK UP

Defensive end Randy Gregory played for the first time since 2018 against Washington in the first game he was eligible coming off his fourth substance-abuse suspension. He played just six snaps and didn't make a tackle. But Gregory's presence could help with the high-priced Lawrence having just two sacks and Aldon Smith stuck on four over the past month.

STOCK DOWN

The Dallas run defense has become a big problem. Washington went into the game with the NFL's worst rushing offense and finished with 208 yards on the ground. The Cowboys have allowed at least 200 yards in three of the past four games. They didn't allow even one such game each of the past two years, and haven't given up as many as three in the same season since 2013.

INJURIES

The Cowboys will have a significant concussion question for the second week in a row with Dalton. Executive vice president of personnel Stephen Jones said on his radio show Monday that All-Pro right guard Zack Martin could return after missing a game with a concussion.

Jones said CB Chidobe Awuzie (groin) and OL Joe Looney (knee) also could return. Looney began the season as the starting center, but could end up at guard with rookie Tyler Biadacz off to a solid start.

In that scenario, Martin could slide out to right tackle with both starting tackles, Tyron Smith and La'el Collins, out for the season.

KEY NUMBER

142 — Total yards for the Cowboys against Washington, their lowest total since getting 127 in a 10-6 loss to Tampa Bay in 2001. That was the middle of three straight 5-11 seasons under former coach Dave Campo. McCarthy might have trouble reaching that many wins.
