BSPD investigated alleged kidnapping, and a reported shooting Thursday

Editor's Note:

The Big Spring Police Department issued a series of press releases Thursday afternoon. All of the press release are printed below. It is important to note the suspected kidnapping investigation resulted in the missing party being located and was found not to be a kidnapping. The BSPD issued the release announcing Abilene Mojica has been found and not kidnapped around 3 p.m. Thursday. You can read the press releases below:

On Jan. 21 2021 at approximately 7 a.m., Big Spring Police Department officers were dispatched to the 1400 block of Mesa in reference to a domestic disturbance.

Upon arrival, officers were advised that Abilene Mojica Hispanic Female 38 years of age, had been forcefully kidnapped by Angel Hinojosa Hispanic male 23 years of age. Witnesses stated that Mojica

was forced into a black in color. Cadillac dan with the first three letters of the license plate possiblv "KNP". If anyone observes this vehicle, we are asking them to not approach the vehicle or anyone around it, but to immediately call the Big Spring Police Department at 432-264-2550 or their nearest law en-

forcement agency. A CLEAR alert is currently being sought through Department of Public Safety.

Abilene Mojica is described

as a Hispanic female 38 years of age ,5'4" 130 pounds, last seen wearing black sweat pants and a white sweat shirt with black sleeves.

The Big Spring Police Department Criminal Investigations Division is seeking an arrest warrant for

> Angel Hinojosa for kidnapping.

This incident is still being investigated by the Big Spring Police Department Criminal Investigations Division and no further information is available at this time.

At around 3 p.m. Thursday, the BSPD issued a follow up to the original press release stating the alleged kidnap victim had been found. The press release read as followed:

Abilene Mojica has been located. Detectives met with Mojica and she has assured she was not kidnapped. The missing/endangered status on Mojica is being removed. The Big Spring Police Department thanks our citizens for their assistance.

In addition, the Big Spring Police Department issued a press release regarding a shooting at Barcelona Apartments on Thursday. The press release reads as follows:

On Jan. 21, 2021, at approximately 9:30 a.m., Big Spring Police Department officers and Big Spring Fire/EMS were dispatched to Barcelona Apartments (538 Westover) in reference to a gunshot victim.

Upon arrival officers were able to secure the scene finding Terrance Ali Young, a black male, 32 years of age, with a gunshot wound to the abdomen. Big Spring Fire/

Free Residential Electronic Recycling scheduled for Saturday

An E-waste recycling program is coming back to Big Spring this Saturday. The Big Spring Free Residential Electronic Recycling will be held at the Big Spring Landfill, located at 4100 E. FM 700, on Saturday, Jan. 23 from 8 a.m. until 1 p.m. or until the truck fills up.

"It has been a few years since we have been able to have an E-waste program for our citizens. Over the years, the cost of holding one of these recycling events has increased making it harder to bring one to the community; Big Spring is lucky to have one of these programs to help residents get rid of their electronic waste," Tammy DePauw with Keep Big Spring Beautiful, said.

Residents will be able to take and dispose of the following items, for free: computer and electronic waste, CPU, computers, laptops, power supplies, external and hard drives, chargers, cords and cabling, mouse other misc., computer accessories, keyboards, web cams, televisions, CRT monitors, flat screen monitors; printers, copiers, fax machines – stand alone large floor model copy machines, printers, and scanners; networking and computer data center equipment including servers and cabling, racks, trays and cages, UPS systems, cabling; Electronics and Gaming and Entertainment including cell phones and PDAs, TVs, VCRs,

DVDs, stereos, PlayStation, XBOX, Nintendo, Sega, cameras and digital cameras, chargers, cords and accessories, memory and gaming boards, game boys and electronic games, sound systems, radios.

While electronics will be accepted until the trailer is full, there will not be any paint, light bulbs, alkaline batteries, gasoline, oils or freon items accepted during this collection.



District wide crack seal maintenance set to begin late January

ABILENE- On Monday, Jan. 25, 2021, contractors for the Texas Department of Transportation will begin a district-wide crack seal project that spans the entire 13 county district.

D&M Contractors of Van, TX, which was awarded the project for \$ 544,430, will clean and fill cracks along major corridors throughout the district. The entire project is expected to be completed in late February. The traveling public can expect various lane closures while the work is completed. 

I found these statements in a book of sermons my wife brought home from one of her excursions to garage sales. The book was published in 1923. The youth about whom he spoke



"The Silent Generation" (1925-1945) left their mark with Martin Luther King, Jr., Malcolm X, Che Guevara, Robert Kennedy, Elvis Presley, Clint Eastwood and Bernie Sanders.

"Baby Boomers" (1946-1964) got their name from the "boom" that followed WW II.

They were the Hippy generation who later developed PCs that connected the world. Bill Clinton, George W. Bush and Donald Trump were all born in 1946. Steve Jobs and Bill Gates are also members of this generation.

"Generation X" (1965-1980), often dismissed in their youth, earned a reputation for entrepreneurship. In 2002 three out of four companies were started by Gen Xers. Elon Musk, CEO of SpaceX and Tesla and the founders of Google are Gen Xers.

"Millennials" (1981-1996) are the first to grow up with computers and cell phones. Mark Zuckerberg is a Millennial. "Generation Z" (1997-2012) is the first generation to have no experience of life before the internet.

They are the youngest, largest and most ethnically diverse population in history. It is too early to characterize the "Alpha Generation, (2013-2021), the first to be born entirely in the 21st century.

In the next few years, we will witness a generational transfer of power. Joe Biden is 78. Mitch McConnel is 79. Nancy Pelosi is 80. Ev ery generation must pass the baton. Every new generation must run their race. Years ago, I adopted a life goal: "to encourage the younger generation to do greater things than I ever dreamed or imagined." Many are already doing that. One of the most important things we can do is encourage those who are younger. When Moses knew he was dying and would never enter the promised land, the Lord said to him, "Charge Joshua and encourage him and strengthen him, for he shall go across at the head of this people" (Deuteronomy 3:28). The Apostle Paul wrote to young Timothy, "Let no one look down on your youthfulness, but rather in speech, conduct, love, faith and purity show yourself an example of those who believe" (1 Timothy 4:12).

Howard College Basketball Ready to Soar into 2021 **By SAM YOUNG**

Unprecedented. Chaotic. Unpredictable. All of those words have become descriptors for a "new normal" since last March. As sports has paused, stopped, resumed and sputtered through the pandemic, coaches and players have dealt with those some uncertainties. Howard College basketball specifically, and the WJCAC conference generally, are no expectations.

The upcoming 2021 season will be unlike anything that the Hawks, the conference, and the NJCAA as a whole have seen before. The NJCAA, junior college athletic's governing body, only recently lifted a moratorium on the stoppage of all JuCo sports. That moratorium lasted nearly eight months, from April of last year to New Year's Day of 2021. In a normal season, Howard's basketball teams would be well into conference play, and over way through their seasons.

Instead, in 2021, everything will happen in much more condensed time frame. Rather than an early December start to conference basketball games. WJCAC play with begin the first week of February in this for shortened season. That leaves both the Lady Hawks and Hawks only a couple of weeks, and a handful of non-conference games, to polish their product. No small task when you've gone just over ten months without competitive games.

In some ways though, that is only the tip of the iceberg. Both Howard hoops teams, per NJCAA regulations, will be limited to 22-games this season. Filling those slots is easier said than done, however. The conference will be going through numerous adjustments from last season. For example, with New Mexico's governmental stipulations, New Mexico Junior College will not be playing pretty much across any sport across the board. The women's basketball team is still trying to figure out a way to play, but that remains uncertain. New Mexico Military, which only competes in men's basketball, will circumvent the state's regulations by playing all of its games outside of New Mexico. That alone creates a tough atmosphere, on top of an already difficult season.

Then there is the case of Odessa College women's basketball — which falls into a pair of categories. The Lady Wranglers lost long-time head coach Ara Baten to rival South Plains last off-season after he moved over to replace the Lady Texans outgoing Cayla Petree. Unable to find a quick solution to the vacancy, and already facing a tough recruiting during the height of the pandemic, Odessa College announced it was canceling its 2021 season. That means the women's conference, which usually has eight-members, is planning to only have six for the upcoming season. To adjust, each women's team will play the other five conference foes three times, instead of the usual two. Welcome to that "new nor-



mal", right?

The coaching change at Odessa highlights another crucial ripple for the conference for the upcoming season — coaching changes. The biggest one, locally, was the announcement over the summer of long-time Howard women's head coach Earl Diddle. Coach Diddle decided to blow the final whistle on his legendary career after nearly 20 seasons at the helm of the Lady Hawks, and four-and-a-half decades in all. Assistant coach Meesha Wade will remain with the program, and Howard swiftly moved to hire John Ishee III. Ishee comes to Howard from Pratt CC in Kansas, with over 30-years of coaching experience on his resume. He was also a finalist for the 2020 Women's Basketball Coaches Association 2-year college Coach of the Year.

Beyond Howard, and the coaching change at Odessa, New Mexico women's basketball is also undergoing a change. Drew Sanders brought an end to his Hall of Fame caliber coaching career over the summer, only adding to a topsy-turvy list of changes for the Lady Thunderbirds. Clarendon, the surprising conference champions of last season, have also seen their head coach, Isaac Fontenot-Amedee, move to an assistant's role at UL-Monroe. Under normal circumstances you expect coaching changes, but with the challenging and unknown nature of the last nine months, even routine changes have become noteworthy shifts. The good news for Howard? Long time head coach Scott Raines, and his assistant Junsie Cotton, will continue to guide Howard's men's program.

Finally, there's the teams themselves. JuCo basketball already produces a high level of turnover due to its two-year nature. However, with waivers given to players for an extra year of eligibility, and the struggles of recruiting during a pandemic, that too has been far from "normal". Both Howard teams will have two returners from last season. The men see the return of Darrell Green and Mo Musa, while the women have standout freshman Tatym Barnes back along with Anais Bonnemaison. In all, that's 23 new Lady Hawks and Hawks who will be debuting in February.

While there have been months of practices, relationships being built and rotations formed, there's no denying the first games of the season will provide both coaching staffs with valuable information on how best to approach this most unusual season ahead. If there's one thing we can count on though, it's that the basketball we see from the beginning of February to the end of March will be what the WJCAC always produces: uniquely unprecedented, enjoyingly chaotic, and always unpredictable.

Gilgeous-Alexander helping young Thunder defy odds again

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - Some Thunder fans believe tanking to get higher draft picks is the way back to contention.

Apparently, the team disagrees.

Oklahoma City was expected by experts to be one of the NBA's worst teams this season -- just like last season, when they shocked the league and made the playoffs.

Once again, the Thunder are defying the odds. Oklahoma City is off to a 6-7 start, despite five of its top seven scorers having been in the league three years or fewer and 35-year-old Mark Daigneault taking on his first NBA head coaching assignment.

Last year, the Thunder had veterans Chris Paul, Dennis Schroder, Steven Adams and Danilo Gallinari to help them through the tough times. This year, young holdovers Shai Gilgeous-Alexander, Lu Dort, Darius Bazley and Hamidou Diallo carry more of the load.

And they clearly are out to win, even with losses offering a potentially greater return on the slew of draft picks general manager Sam Presti has collected through trades in recent years.

"We're not trying to build a resilient culture, we're trying to continue a resilient culture," Daigneault said. "Resilient culture has existed here for a long period of time, ever since the team came here."

Gilgeous-Alexander is the budding star who leads the way. He averages 21.0 points, 6.2 assists and 5.3 rebounds per game. He hit a game-winner in the season opener against Charlotte.

"He's taking on a different level of responsibility," Daigneault said. "He's playing a different role on this team than he has so far in his career, and he's not shying away from that."

That approach was clear after he had four turnovers in a loss to Denver on January 19.

"For me, personally, I got a little careless with the ball at times," Gilgeous-Alexander said. "They are a really good, active defensive team. They are always in the gaps, playing with length to get deflections and stuff like that. I just think I have to clean that up a little bit."

Even with that rough outing, there have been plenty of reasons for hope. The Thunder already have wins over Brooklyn and New Orleans and are 5-2 on the road. They rallied from 22 down to beat former coach Billy Donovan and the Chicago Bulls in overtime.

The Thunder have some rough losses, including a 29-point home loss to the defending champion Los Angeles Lakers. But the young core appears ready to dig in and compete.

Dort went undrafted in 2019, but his defense got him into the starting lineup by the end of the season. This year, the guard ranks second on the team with 13.4 points per game and he's shooting 43.7% from 3-point range. Diallo, the main man off the bench, averages 11.1 points per contest. Bazley, an explosive second-year forward, averages 10.5 points and a team-leading 7.2 rebounds.

Other young players have stepped up, too. Isaiah Roby, a second-year center out of Nebraska, has been an adequate fill-in for Al Horford when needed. He averages 9 points and 5 rebounds in 19 minutes per game. First-round pick Aleksej Pokusevski, a 7-footer from Serbia, is playing 17 minutes per game. Second-rounder Theo Maledon, a 19-year-old guard from France, is playing 20.

Even the youngest players already have taken on the Thunder mentality -the one Daigneault picked up in his days as a Thunder assistant last season and as coach of the Thunder's G-League affiliate before that.

"When I look at our logo, that's kind of what I think about is that spirit," he said. "The relentless competitive spirit of the teams were really good teams here. We've got a lot of new players and a lot of young players, and that's the type of mentality that we try and nurture."



You are declarer with the West hand at Six Spades, and North leads the jack of clubs, which you ruff. How would you play the hand?

First, you should conclude that the slam cannot be made if the trumps are divided 4-1. This is because if either defender had four trumps and you drew them, you'd have no more trumps and would automatically go down two. You therefore start by assuming a 3-2 trump division.

You next consider how the missing five hearts might be divided. Again you make an assumption before proceeding. Oddly enough, this time you assume that the hearts are not divided 3-2 because, if they are, you are sure to succeed with any reasonable line of play.

It's not that you don't want the hearts to be divided 3-2 — you'd be delighted if they were — but that you would like to arrange your play so as to guard against a 4-1 division, if possible (you have no chance against a 5-0 break).

Once you assume the 4-1 heart division, you have to decide how to

hearts, and then the case where South has them. One approach to dealing with the problem is to imagine that North has a hand such as \clubsuit 62 ♥ QJ73 ♦ 842 ♣ J1085 and proceed from there.

In 1901, Britain's Queen Victoria died at age 81 after a reign of 63 years; she was suc-ceeded by her eldest son, Edward VII.

In 1907, the Richard Strauss opera "Salome" made its American debut at the Metropolitan Opera in New York; its racy content sparked outrage and forced cancella-tion of additional performances.

In 1944, during World War II, Allied forces began landing at Anzio, Italy.

In 1970, the first regularly scheduled commercial flight of the Boeing 747 began in New York and ended in London some 6 1/2 hours later.

In 1973, George Foreman upset reigning heavyweight champion Joe Frazier with a second round TKO in their match in Kingston, Jamaica.

In 1987, Pennsylvania treasurer R. Budd Dwyer, convicted of defrauding the state, proclaimed his innocence at a news conference before pulling out a gun, placing the barrel in his mouth and shooting him-self to death in front of horrified onlookers.

In 1995, Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy died at the Kennedy compound at Hyannis Port, Mass., at age 104.

In 1997, the Senate confirmed Madeleine Albright as the nation's first female secretary of state.

In 1998, Theodore Kaczynski (kah-ZIHN'-skee) pleaded guilty in Sacramento, California, to being the Unabomber responsible for three deaths and 29 injuries in return for a sentence of life in prison without parole.

In 2006, Kobe Bryant scored 81 points, the second-highest

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

Zebra Mussels Eradicated from Lake Waco in Central Texas

AUSTIN— The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) has determined that invasive zebra mussels have been successfully eradicated from Lake Waco in Central Texas, preventing property damage, protecting water supply infrastructure and avoiding harm to the aquatic ecosystem. The department emphasized the vital importance of continued help from boaters, marina operators and others to Clean, Drain and Dry boats before moving them and remain vigilant to stop the spread.

Fisheries biologists cautioned that eradication of the invasive mussels is extremely rare and was made possible only by very early detection and a multi-agency rapid response effort. Zebra mussels were discovered at Lake Waco in late 2014, but quick action at the time killed many of the mussels and helped prevent further spread, which eventually led to the eradication.

In September 2014, City of Waco employees found zebra mussels at a single boat ramp on Lake Waco, which were later confirmed by TPWD. Additional surveys in the area found approximately 75 more adult mussels as well as a few zebra mussel larvae, but all were in a localized area around the ramp and adjacent marina.

Additionally, an infested barge believed to be the source of the invasive mussels was identified in the adjacent marina and removed from the lake two days after the mussels were detected. The owner was cited for illegally introducing prohibited zebra mussels. At that time, the lake was designated as 'positive' for zebra mussels, but the invasion had not reached fully established, 'infested' levels.

The introduction of zebra mussels into Lake Waco presented a unique opportunity for action due to the highly localized nature of the introduction and how quickly the mussels were detected. In October 2014, partner agencies worked together on a rapid response effort to install nearly an acre of plastic sheeting over the shoreline and lake bottom in the affected area and weighted it down with sandbags. This method was used in an attempt to kill the mussels by blocking oxygen, impede their reproduction, and prevent them from becoming established in the lake.

"This was a very substantial undertaking that took a lot of creative thinking and required many staff from the City of Waco, US Army Corps of Engineers and Texas Parks and Wildlife to accomplish, not to mention the heavy equipment, boats and commercial divers," said Brian Van Zee, TPWD Inland Fisheries Regional Director. "However, it was the late Tom Conry with the City of Waco who deserves credit for being the driving force behind the project. Our goal was simple—smother as many zebra mussels as possible in an effort to prevent them from being able to reproduce and get a foothold in the lake."

The plastic was removed in March 2015 after nearly five months of being in place. While one potentially live mussel was found and eliminated after the plastic was removed, evidence indicated the effort was successful in creating extremely low oxygen conditions not conducive to zebra mussel survival over much of the area.

Since 2015, TPWD and the City of Waco have continued to monitor the lake intensively, and no zebra mussel larvae, settled adults, or their DNA have been detected in the lake since. The results confirm that the eradication effort was an unprecedented success and Lake Waco will now be downgraded to 'undetected/negative' status.

"The Lake Waco eradication is a unique success story for Texas – this is one of very few invasive mussel eradications in the U.S. and, to our knowledge, the first successful use of this method," said Monica McGarrity, TPWD Senior Scientist for Aquatic Invasive Species Management. "However, it is now more important than ever for boaters to take action to protect the lake, as it could only take one boat or barge to reintroduce these mussels. TPWD will continue to carefully monitor the lake for early detection."

"Boaters can take three simple steps and help stop the spread of zebra mussels," said Van Zee. "Clean, drain and dry your boat when leaving any body of water. Zebra mussels can hide in crevices or residual water and so, even if you don't see them, you could accidentally take them to a new lake. If a boat is stored in the water on a lake with zebra mussels and then taken off the water to be transported to another lake, it will need to be carefully inspected, decontaminated to remove and kill mussels, and then allowed to dry completely. We recommend that the vessel be cleaned by someone who is familiar with all the components of the boat, as all

Cowboys add 2 defensive assistants, promote strength coach

FRISCO, Texas (AP) — The Dallas Cowboys have named Joe Whitt Jr. secondary and passing game coordinator and Aden Durde defensive line coach while promoting Harold Nash Jr. to strength and conditioning coordinator.

The moves announced Thursday help round out the staff under Mike McCarthy, who is going into his second season after a 6-10 debut with the Cowboys.

Whitt and Durde come with new defensive coordinator Dan Quinn from Atlanta. Quinn was fired as coach of the Falcons after starting 0-5. Quinn replaced Mike Nolan, who was fired after one season.

Whitt had the same role in the defensive passing game on Quinn's staff, and served under McCarthy in Green Bay. Durde filled multiple roles on Atlanta's defensive staff the past three seasons. He was outside linebackers coach in 2020.

Nash is stepping into the lead role on the strength staff after the sudden death of Markus Paul during the season. Nash just finished his first season with the Cowboys after four years in Detroit. livewells, bilges, motors and any other receptacles or water-intake systems coming into contact with public waters must be cleaned and TPWD will provide specifications for proper decontamination."

If you have stored your boat in the water at a lake with zebra mussels, it is likely infested with zebra mussels and poses an extremely high risk for moving this invasive species to a new lake. Before moving your boat to another lake, call TPWD at (512) 389-4848 for guidance on decontamination. The transport of aquatic invasive species can result in legal trouble for boaters or transporters. Transporting prohibited invasive species in Texas is illegal and punishable with a fine of up to \$500 per violation. Boaters are also required to drain all water from their boat and onboard receptacles, including bait buckets, before leaving or approaching a body of fresh water.

A status map showing all lakes where zebra mussels have been found in Texas is online at tpwd.texas.gov/zebramussels. For more information on how to properly clean, drain and dry boats and equipment, visit the TPWD YouTube channel for a short instructional video. TPWD and partners monitor for zebra mussels in Texas lakes, but anyone who finds them in lakes where they haven't been found before should report them by emailing photos and location information to aquaticinvasives@tpwd. texas.gov to help identify new introductions. Anyone who spots them on boats, trailers or equipment that is being moved should immediately report the sighting to TPWD at (512) 389-4848.
