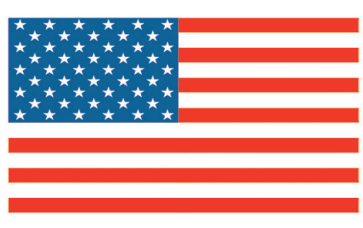

Forsan ISD kicks off Pre-K and Kinder registration for the 2021-2022 school year

As Spring Break draws near, area schools are beginning to think of the 2021-2022 school year.

Forsan Elementary is preparing to open their Pre-K and Kindergarten registration. This year, according to Mandy Buske, Forsan Elementary Registrar, registration will begin March 29 and run through April 1. Registration can be completed between 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. Evening registration will take place until 7 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday.

A packet can be requested for Pre-K and Kindergarten students, as well as new transfer students that will be in Kindergarten through Fifth Grade next year, by e-mail at abuske@forsan.esc18. When returning the packet, parents need to also include the following: certified birth certificate, social security card, immunization record, proof of residency for district students, parent's drivers license and proof of income for those apply for Pre-K.

"We want to remind parents to include contact information so we can follow up if necessary. Please do not hesitate



to call or e-mail with any questions," Mandy Buske, Forsan Elementary Registrar, said.

The age requirement for those applying for Pre-K is the student must be 4 years old on or before Sept. 1, 2021 and those applying for Kindergarten must be 5 years old, on or before Sept. 1, 2021. Those students who are currently enrolled in Forsan Elementary do not need to pre-register.

Pre-registration does not need to be completed for current students – district and transfer – more information will be released regarding registration at a later day, as well as transfer packets mailed out.

Stand Up Howard County returning to Scenic Mountain Medical Center on April 15

Standing together, speaking up and extending a helping hand are some of the basic fundamentals in eliminating issues and meeting needs which exist right here in the local community. Big Spring and Howard County, countless times over, have showed what can happen when like minds come together and strive to make a difference. Scenic Mountain Medical Center is calling on the community to join in an effort to raise awareness for National Child Abuse Awareness Month, which is fast approaching. The annual Stand Up Howard County event is set for April 15 from 5:30 p.m. until 7:30 p.m. on the front lawn of SMMC, located at 1601 W. Eleventh Place.

"Last year SMMC postponed the annual Child Abuse Awareness event due to the onset of the pandemic and the rapid increase of COVID-19 cases," April Arms, SMMC Executive Assistant said. "This year, we are confident that we can safely bring this event back to the community and are asking local businesses, individuals and other organizations to join us as

we do our part to raise awareness and tackle the issue of child abuse."

For the past eight years, Scenic Mountain Medical Center has partnered with area agencies and local business to help keep child abuse awareness top of mind. According to the CDC, 1 in 7 children have experienced child abuse and/or neglect in the past year, and that is only the reported instances. Accord-

ing to statistics, more than 1,800 children succumbed to injuries which resulted from child abuse in 2019, in the United States.

"This event allowed us the opportunity to create a unified front as a community, against an issue many would hope does not exist in our own backyard, but the sad reality is that it does," Arms said. "The more we educate the community about available resources and shine a light on it, the more power we give to the victims and show the offenders that we won't sit by quietly."

According to Children's Advocacy Centers of Texas – one of which is based in Howard County now, directly behind the hospital in the Specialty Clinic – 175 children will fall victim to child abuse per day. The amount of families and number of children affected by child abuse in our county is rather high compared to larger communities, according to representatives from Victim Services and

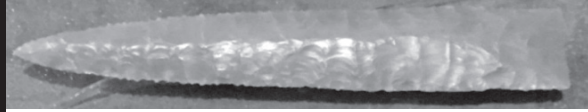

CASA of West Texas. One victim is too many and the only way we can get the number down is to have more people stand up and help provide a voice. Over the years, the event has gained traction and grown in participation from local businesses and agencies and this year, the trend can once again continue.

"Scenic Mountain Medical Center hopes to combat these troubling statistics by generating more awareness of child abuse in our community by bringing local agencies together dedicated to child services," Madison Tate, director of marketing & community relations, said. "Our goal is to create a safe and fun event that families can enjoy together, all while educating them on the severity of this issue."

Additionally, Scenic Mountain Medical Center and Victim Services will plant blue pinwheels on the lawn and teal ribbons on the trees as a tribute to child abuse victims, and to spread awareness of the alarming statistics our youth are currently facing.

"The more awareness we can raise through our community

members, local businesses and organizations shows the investment we are willing to make. Similar to the pandemic, we stand together and we get through this together. More people means a louder voice for the victims who too often are silent because of fear," Arms said. "We cannot stress enough that only through grassroots efforts such as standing together that we will one day be able to say this problem doesn't exist in our community, but for now it does and it will take all of us to make a difference."

She continued, "It's important that anyone – no matter how young or old – can feel empowered to speak up against child abuse and sexual assault. By raising our voices, we can stand united, and give power back to those who feel powerless."

Reflections: Lessons from Buddy

God Is No Respector of Persons

We adopted Buddy, our tri-color corgi, 11 years ago. He spent time wandering the streets as a stray and endured the indignities of animal control before he found us. They called him "Tex." But he soon made it clear that his name was "Buddy." You can read his story in the children's book, Buddy the Floppy Ear Corgi.

When I go for a walk without Buddy, I am invisible. Few people notice me or speak. But when Buddy takes me for a walk, we are celebrities. Children stop what they are doing and run to us, asking if they can pet him. Some adults do the same. We have gone for walks on beaches in Texas, in neighborhoods and parks in Minnesota, Montana and Colorado.

Buddy never seems to meet a stranger.

He doesn't care what people look like, what color their skin, what kind of tattoos they might have. They can be gay, straight, male, female, old or young, rich or poor, educated or disabled, Asian, Black, Hispanic, White or Native American. He loves them all and they all seem to love him.

A few years ago Buddy helped us "adopted" a group of international students at Baylor who met in our home for Bible studies. They were from Indonesia, South Africa, Zambia, China and the Czech Republic.

They loved Buddy, took him for walks and kept him when we were away. Buddy loved them. They became our "children" and, although they have

earned graduate degrees and scattered to ends of the earth, we remain in touch. Our world that is beset by prejudice, suspicion, hatred and violence needs to learn the lessons Buddy has been teaching

It's a lesson I am still working on, a lesson Buddy is still trying to teach me. It is a lesson Jesus taught and one that Peter struggled to learn. Jesus intentionally led his followers through Samaria, a region Jews refused to visit, and introduced them to a woman who had five husbands and was living with a man who was not her husband.

He incensed his hometown authorities when he pointed out that God used Elisha to heal a Syrian rather than a Jew. He embraced lepers who were outcast from their families. He healed the sick, the blind and the lame. He dined with despised tax collectors.

This was not the journey Peter and his companions expected.

It was only later when the Holy Spirit led him to enter the home of a Roman Centurion that Peter seemed to understand.

Upon entering the home, Peter said, "You

yourself know how unlawful it is for a man who is a Jew to associate with a foreigner or to visit him; and yet God has shown me that I should not call any man unholy or unclean." (Acts 10).

Every person we meet, however they look, wherever they are from, is special in the eyes of God, made in His image, a person for whom God has declared and demonstrated His love. (John 3:16).

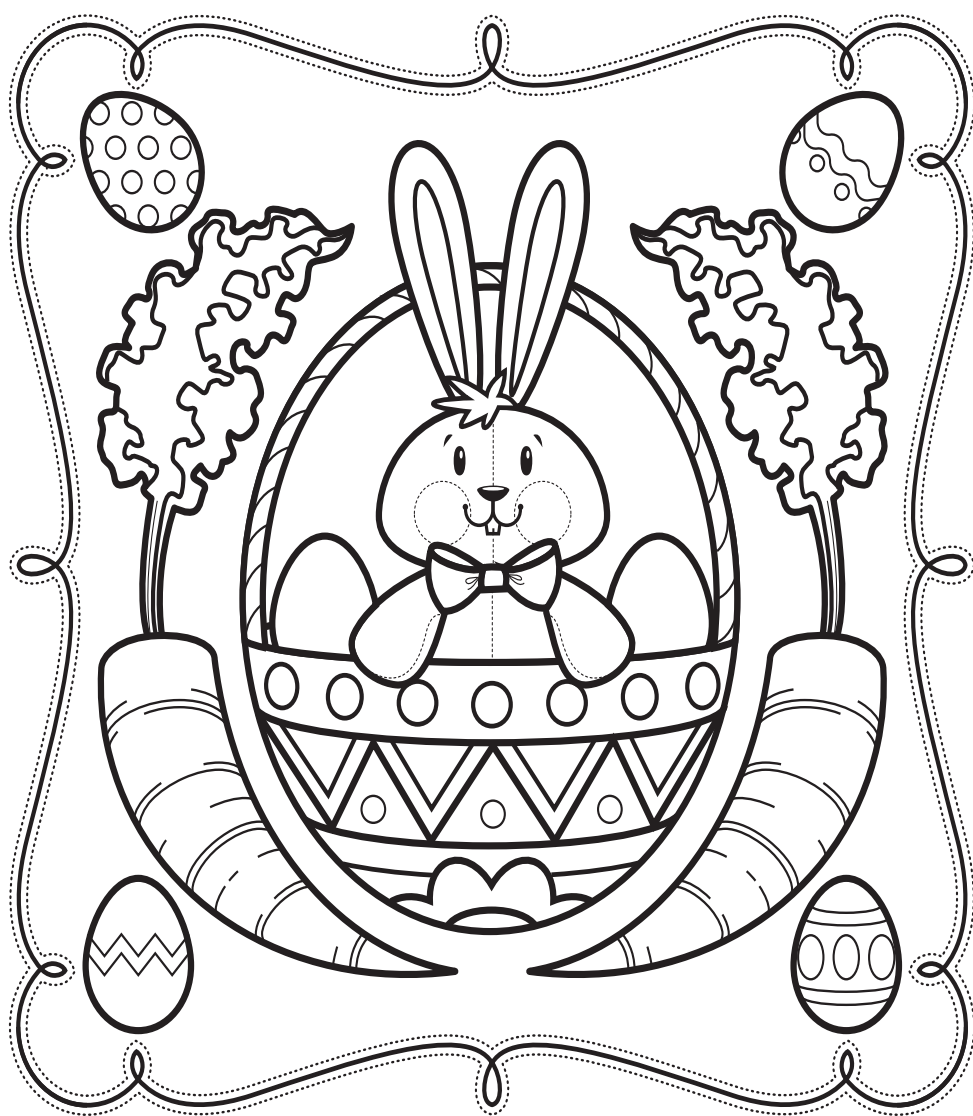

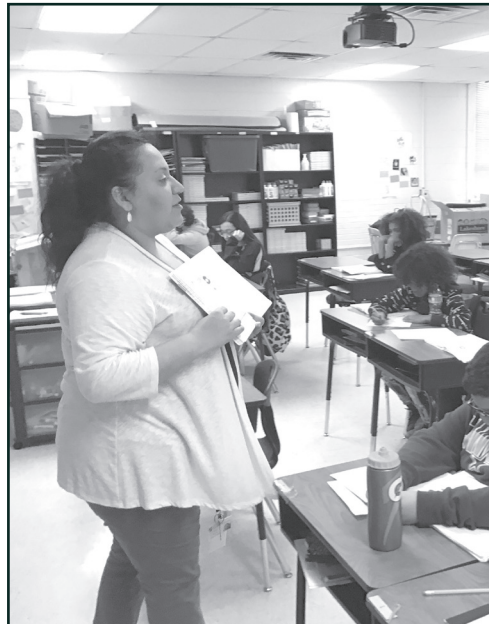

Whitehead started her third and last inning of work, and she needed just like she began with utter dominance. The lady Steer never let Estacado get comfortable at the plate. She hit her spots and pitched effectively, easily overpowering the Matadors. Whitehead finished her game on the mound with three innings pitched, two hits, zero runs, and three Strikeouts.

Cantlay and Carlos Ortiz of Mexico both played so well Thursday that they halved 15 of the 18 holes. Cantlay took the lead with a 6-foot birdie putt on the 14th hole. They matched 6-footers for par and 5-footers for birdie, and then Cantlay won the match when Ortiz missed a 15-foot birdie putt on the final hole.

Cantlay now is 2-0 in group play and faces one more match against Hideki

Matsuyama to advance to the knockout stage on the weekend. He doesn't expect it to be easy.

9:15 a.m.

The second round of group play at the Dell Technologies Match Play could be the end of the line for some of the top stars if they lose another match Thursday. That includes Justin Thomas, Bryson DeChambeau and Rory McIlroy.

All three lost their opening matches. One more loss and they will be mathematically eliminated from being able to win their groups to advance to the weekend knockout stage.

Thomas is the No. 2 seed. He was trounced by Matt Kuchar, and now faces defending champion Kevin Kisner. McIlroy, who lost in 13 holes

to Ian Poulter, faces Lanto Griffin.

DeChambeau was beaten by France's Antoine Rozner and now plays Si Woo Kim.

DeChambeau has yet to win a match as a professional. He won the U.S. Amateur in 2015. Since then, he lost his singles match at the 2018 Ryder Cup to Alex Noren. He lost all three of his matches at the Dell Match Play in 2019, and he halved with Adam Hadwin at the Presidents Cup.

Friend Won't Stop Trying to Set Me Up

Dear Annie: When I was in my early 50s, I became very ill and eventually found out I had severe rheumatoid arthritis. During that time I was in and out of hospitals. The last time I was hospitalized, my husband was too busy to come visit me. On arriving home, I discovered he had changed the locks and moved his girlfriend in. Needless to say, this was quite a shock. His defense was that he was still young and wanted to have fun and didn't want to be around a sick person. So after 20 years of marriage, we divorced.

That was 10 years ago. I'm now 64. I've been able to manage the symptoms of my illness much better. I fish, ride bikes with my granddaughter and volunteer at my church. I'm very content. My problem now is that a good friend keeps trying to convince me to let her set me up with men.

I have no interest in dating. I finally told her I think men are untrustworthy and to please just let it go. How do I convince her to let it lay? Her husband passed away last August from Lewy body dementia, and she started pestering me about dating after that. Why is she like a dog with a bone about my dating life (or lack thereof) all of a sudden? -- Let Me Be Single

Dear LMBS:

For what it's worth, your ex sounds like a once-in-a-generation scumbag. I can understand why that experience would lead a person to swear off dating for life, but not all men are untrustworthy. There are some faithful fish out in the sea. That being said, it's perfectly fine to swim solo.

Your friend's fixation on setting you up isn't about you. It's probably not a coincidence that she started up with the matchmaking mania after her husband died. Perhaps she's using it as a distraction from her grief. Maybe she's lonely herself and desires companionship but is not ready to face the prospect of dating, so she's projecting it onto you. I suggest gently asking her why she keeps bringing up the subject and lovingly asking her to please drop it.

Dear Concerned: I appreciate your raising this important subject. By some estimates, there are roughly 10 million Americans who struggle with this. I encourage anyone who finds themselves gambling more often than they'd like to -- or anyone concerned about another person's gambling -- to reach out to the National Council on Problem Gambling at 1-800-522-4700. (You can call or text that number.) Another resource is SMART Recovery (<https://www.smartrecovery.org>), which offers support in recovery from many forms of addiction, including gambling.

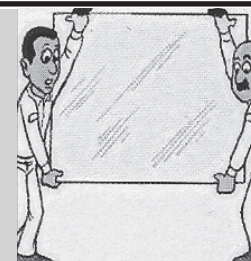

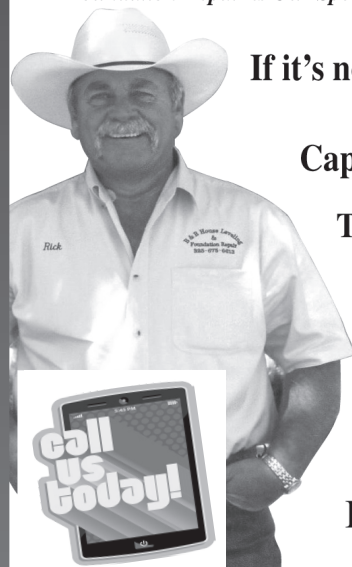

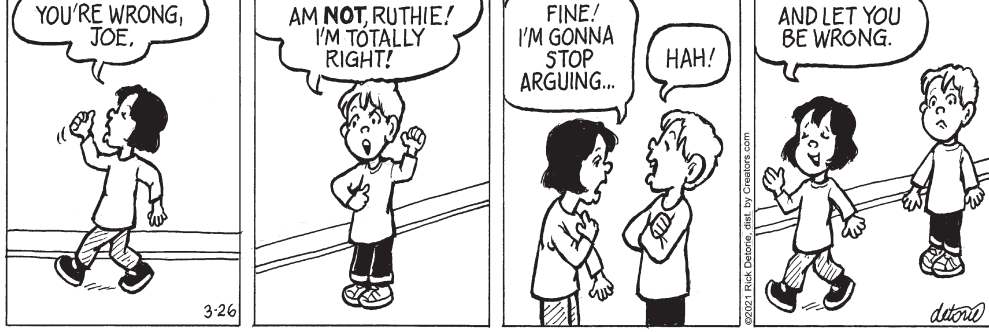

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Friday, March 26, the 85th day of 2021. There are 280 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On March 26, 1982, groundbreaking ceremonies took place in Washington, D.C., for the Vietnam Veterans Memorial.

On this date:

In 1812, an earthquake devastated Caracas, Venezuela, causing an estimated 26,000 deaths, according to the U.S. Geological Survey.

In 1827, composer Ludwig van Beethoven died in Vienna.

In 1874, poet Robert Frost was born in San Francisco.

In 1892, poet Walt Whitman died in Camden, New Jersey.

In 1917, the Seattle Metropolitans became the first U.S. team to win the Stanley Cup as they defeated the Montreal Canadiens in Game 4 of the finals by a score of 9-1.

In 1945, during World War II, Iwo Jima was fully secured by U.S. forces following a final, desperate attack by Japanese soldiers.

In 1962, the U.S. Supreme Court, in Baker v. Carr, gave federal courts the power to order reapportionment of states' legislative districts.

In 1964, the musical play "Funny Girl," starring Barbra Streisand as Fanny Brice, opened on Broadway.

In 1979, a peace treaty was signed by Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin (men-AH'-kem BAY'-gihn) and Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and witnessed by President Jimmy Carter at the White House.

In 1992, a judge in Indianapolis sentenced former heavyweight boxing champion Mike Tyson to six years in prison for raping a Miss Black America contestant. (Tyson ended up serving three years.)

In 1997, the bodies of 39 members of the Heaven's Gate technoreligious cult who committed suicide were found inside a rented mansion in Rancho Santa Fe, California.

In 2010, the U.S. and Russia sealed the first major nuclear weapons treaty in nearly two decades, agreeing to slash the former Cold War rivals' warhead arsenals by nearly one-third.

Ten years ago: Former Democratic vice presidential candidate Geraldine Ferraro, the first female major party nominee for the office, died in Boston at 75.

Five years ago: Bernie Sanders scored wins over Hillary Clinton in the Washington state, Alaska and Hawaii Democratic caucuses. Author Jim Harrison ("Legends of the Fall") died in Patagonia, Arizona, at age 78.

One year ago: Federal officials said two men who had been on a coronavirus-stricken cruise ship stalled for days off the California coast had died; officials confirmed that fewer than half the ship's 2,400 passengers were tested for the virus. (More than 100 people who were on the Grand Princess were found to be infected with the coronavirus; at least eight died.) The government reported a record-high number of new unemployment claims - nearly 3.3 million - amid an economic shutdown caused by the coronavirus. The U.S. surpassed official Chinese government numbers to become the country with the most reported coronavirus infections, more than 85,000. The U.S. Justice Department indicted Venezuela's socialist leader Nicolás Maduro and several aides on charges of narcoterrorism. Fred "Curly" Neal, the dribbling wizard who starred with the Harlem Globetrotters for parts of three decades, died at the age of 77.

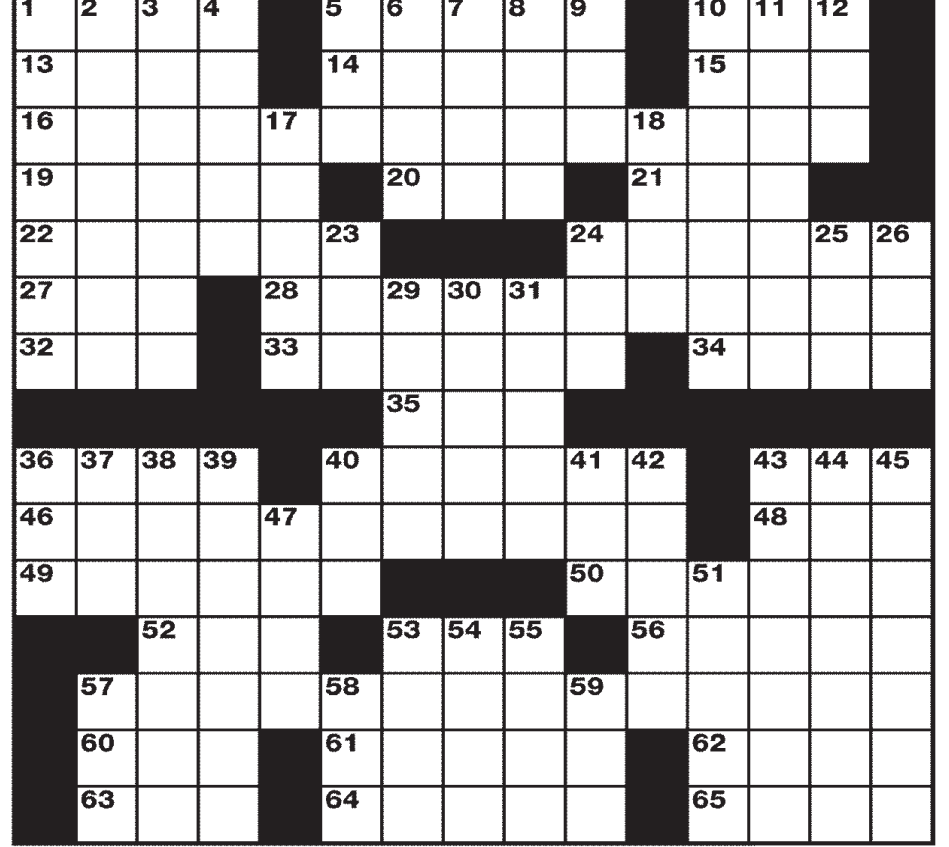

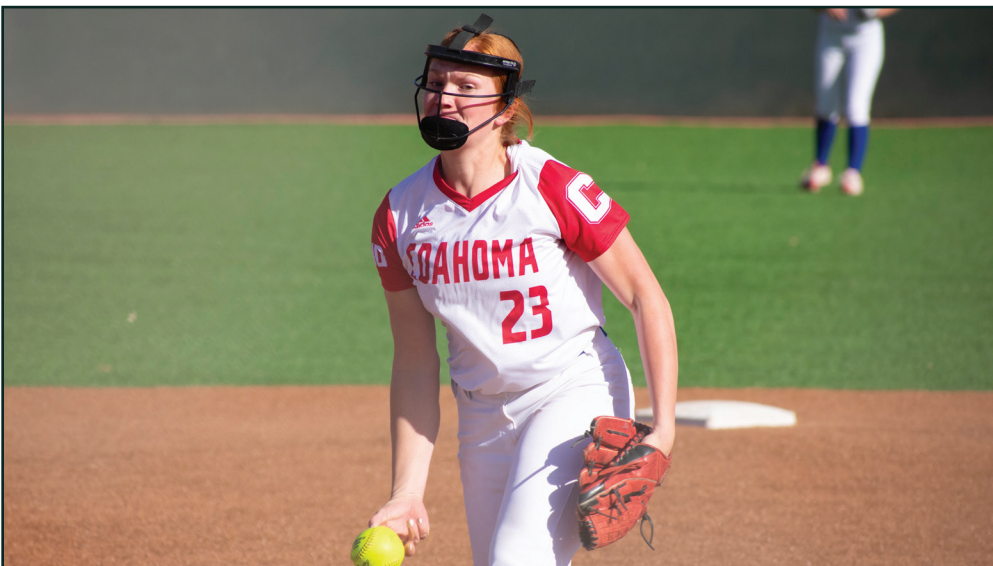

Cowboys, safety Neal agree on \$5M, 1-year deal

The Cowboys and free agent safety Keanu Neal agreed on a \$5 million, one-year deal that will reunite the former Atlanta player with new Dallas defensive coordinator Dan Quinn, two people with knowledge of the deal told The Associated Press on Saturday.

Neal spent his first five seasons with the Falcons after getting drafted in the first round in 2016 when Quinn was coach. Quinn was fired last season and joined the Cowboys this offseason.

The person spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity because the deal, first reported by NFL Network, hasn't been announced by the team.

Neal missed most of 2018 with a torn ACL in his left knee and then was out almost all of 2019 after tearing his left Achilles

tendon. The 25-year-old played 15 games last season.

The best season for Neal was 2017, when he made the Pro Bowl after 83 solo tackles and four tackles for loss, along with the first of his two career interceptions.

It's the third straight year the Cowboys have tried to get lower-cost help at safety in free agency. The past two — George Iloka in

2019 and Ha Ha Clinton-Dix last year — were released before the start of the season.

The addition of Neal comes after Dallas added three veteran defensive linemen earlier in the week. Two of them are former fourth-round picks in Carlos Watkins, who was with Houston, and Brent Urban, most recently with Chicago.
