## Forsan ISD kicks off Pre-K and Kinder registration for the 2021-2022 school year

Managing Editor As Spring Break draws near, area schools are beginning to think of the 2021-2022 school year.

Forsan Elementary is preparing to open their Pre-K and Kindergarten registration. This year, according to Mandy Buske, Forsan Elementary Registrar, registration will begin March 29 and run through April 1. Registration can be completed between 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. Evening registration will take place until 7 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday.

A packet can be requested for Pre-K and Kindergarten students, as well as new transfer students that will be in Kindergarten through Fifth Grade next year, by e-mail at <u>abuske@forsan.esc18</u>. When returning the packet, parents need to also include the following: certified birth certificate, social security card, immunization record, proof of residency for district students, parent's drivers license and proof of income for those apply for Pre-K.

"We want to remind parents to include contact information so we can follow up if necessary. Please do not hesitate to call or e-mail with any questions," Mandy Buske, Forsan Elementary Registrar, said.

The age requirement for those applying for Pre-K is the student must be 4 years old on or before Sept. 1, 2021 and those applying for Kindergarten must be 5 years old, on or before Sept. 1,

2021. Those students who are currently enrolled in Forsan Elementary do not need to pre-register.

Pre-registration does not need to be completed for current students district and transfer - more information will be released regarding registration at a later day, as well as transfer packets mailed out.

She continued, "It's important that anyone – no matter how young or old – can feel empowered to speak up against child abuse and sexual assault. By raising our voices, we can stand united, and give power back to those who feel powerless.



## Why a Colt of a Donkey?

When I was a child, we color Easter eggs, buy new clothes for Sunday, hide eggs and have an Easter egg hunt after church, and eat corn beef and cabbage. All were traditions in my family. We really

But why eggs, and bunnies? Why new clothes for Easter Sunday? And why corn beef and cabbage?

I really don't know. The clothes were nice. It was funny to color, hide, and hunt the Easter eggs. But BOHANNAN why corn beef and cabbage? Well, I

think that may have been mixed up with St. Patrick's day, in March close

to Easter. I never thought to ask my mother. Now we study the real reason for Easter. Only we call it Resurrection Sonday. Cantlay now is 2-0 in group play and faces one more match against Hideki



You are declarer with the West hand at Six Spades, and North leads the four of clubs. How would you play the hand?

This is strictly a percentage problem. There is no way to guarantee the slam, but there is one approach that gives you the best chance for the contract. Three different lines of play stand out, and they all start the same way. You win the club lead with the ace, draw trump, cash the king of clubs and ruff a club.

Line No. 1: You take a heart finesse. If the queen loses to the king and a heart is returned, you next lead a diamond to the ace and a diamond back, finessing the jack.

This approach wins if North has either the king of hearts or queen of diamonds. It offers about a 75% chance of success.

Line No. 2: You cash the A-K of diamonds. Assuming the queen does not fall, you then continue with the jack of diamonds.

If South has the queen, school is out because he must return a heart or yield a ruff-and-discard. But if North has the queen of diamonds, he wins and returns a heart. You take the finesse, and the outcome depends on who has the heart king.

This line of play succeeds if either opponent has the singleton or doubleton queen of diamonds, if South has the queen of diamonds, or if North has the king of hearts. The overall chance of success is about 78%.

Line No. 3: You play the ace of hearts followed by the queen. If South has the king, it's all over, because he must lead a diamond or yield a ruff-and-discard.

If North has the king of hearts, he is forced to return a diamond. If he has either the queen or ten, or both, you make the contract by following low from dummy. Thus, if North has 10-x-x and leads a low diamond, South's queen is trapped. If North returns the ten instead, you cover with dummy's jack to make the contract

If North has the queen of diamonds, the outcome is the same. You follow low from dummy, take South's ten with the ace and then finesse the jack.

This method of play succeeds if South has the king of hearts or if North has either the ten or queen of diamonds, or both. It offers about an 87% chance of success, failing only when North has the heart king and South the queen and ten of diamonds.





One year ago: Federal officials said two men who had been on a coronavirus-stricken cruise ship stalled for days off the California coast had died; officials confirmed that fewer than half the ship's 2,400 passengers were tested for the virus. (More than 100 people who were on the Grand Princess were found to be infected with the coronavirus; at least eight died.) The government reported a record-high number of new unemployment claims - nearly 3.3 million - amid an economic shutdown caused by the coronavirus. The U.S. surpassed official Chinese government numbers to become the country with the most reported coronavirus infections, more than 85,000. The U.S. Justice Department indicted Venezuela's socialist leader Nicolás Maduro and several aides on charges of narcoterrorism. Fred "Curly" Neal, the dribbling wizard who starred with the Harlem Globetrotters for parts of three decades, died at the age of 77.



### Cowboys, safety Neal agree on \$5M, 1-year deal

The Cowboys and free agent safety Keanu Neal agreed on a \$5 million, one-year deal that will reunite the former Atlanta player with new Dallas defensive coordinator Dan Quinn, two people with knowledge of the deal told The Associated Press on Saturdav.

Neal spent his first five seasons with the Falcons after getting drafted in the first round in 2016 when Quinn was coach. Quinn was fired last season and joined the Cowboys this offseason.

The person spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity because the deal, first reported by NFL Network, hasn't been announced by the team Neal missed most of 2018 with a torn ACL in his left knee and then was out almost all of 2019 after tearing his left Achilles

**Bv SCHUYLER DIXON AP** tendon. The 25-year-old played 15 games last season.

> The best season for Neal was 2017, when he made the Pro Bowl after 83 solo tackles and four tackles for loss, along with the first of his two career interceptions.

> It's the third straight year the Cowboys have tried to get lowercost help at safety in free agency. The past two — George Iloka in

2019 and Ha Ha Clinton-Dix last year — were released before the start of the season.

The addition of Neal comes after Dallas added three veteran defensive linemen earlier in the week. Two of them are former fourth-round picks in Carlos Watkins, who was with Houston, and Brent Urban, most recently with Chicago.
