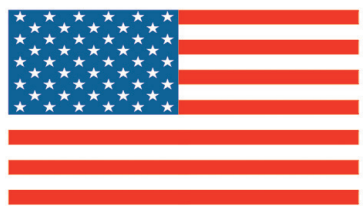

Following the call to order, the council will hear public comments, both in person and by telephone at 432-264-2411, before moving on to New Business.

The council will hear a presentation presented by Bob Bass of Allison, Bass and Magee LLP, the district's legal firm, regarding legal guidance on the process of redistricting of political boundaries.

Following the presentation, the council will hear an emergency reading of a resolution ordering the redistricting of political boundaries for

the City of Big Spring. According to the resolution, redistricting is required when the difference in population between the city's districts – known as the "Total Maximum Deviation – exceeds 10 percent; Big Spring's current total maximum deviation is 25.12 percent, according to the resolution.
The council will discuss alternative boundaries to reduce the imbalance be-

tween the districts to a suitable level, and hear an emergency reading of a resolution establishing criteria for redistricting.
The council will also consider dates for a future public hearing on the redistricting process and to hear public comment or alternative redistricting plans.
The council will adjourn following a time for individual council members to offer input.
The meeting may be attended in person, and may also be watched on Local Channel 17 through Suddenlink, or on the city website at mybigspring.com/224/Channel-17-Live.

Tuesday's game against the Coahoma Bulldogs it showed - as the game wore on, Forsan gradually begin to improve. It all amounted to a 55-36 win over Coahoma Tuesday night at Dorothy Garrett Coliseum.

The Buffaloes looked rusty early, having a miserable time making shots. What kept them in contention was its pressure defense. Coahoma led by as much as seven in the first half and never trailed until Forsan's Thomas Gabehart sunk a three-pointer just before the buzzer, giving Forsan a 23-20 lead at halftime.

In the second half, Forsan's defensive pressure took over; the smaller and more physical Buffaloes forced 21 Coahoma turnovers which turned the game

into a rout. Forsan outscored Coahoma 8-4 the first six minutes of the third period; after that it was a parade of Coahoma turnovers. and that was it. "We couldn't break them down in the first half, they almost broke us down," said Forsan coach Cory Richardson. "Then we got our second wind and started to smell blood. We put our bigs on the trap and made them throw over us. It allowed our little guys to shoot the gaps to get us some steals and turnovers."

The Forsan trap definitely frustrated the Bulldogs. One time a Coahoma player got called for a technical foul for hanging on to the rim trying to dunk the basketball. It was that kind of night for Coahoma.

Forsan employed a balanced attack, led by ball hawks Morgan, Sawyer Stallings and Jace . Richardson. Forsan put three and Richardson added 10. The Buffaloes out worked the Bulldogs on the boards, holding a 41-28 rebounding average.

Coahoma's only answer was Ryan Shifflett who tried his best to keep his team in the game. The sophomore forward was the only one the could contend with the Forsan press. Shifflett played a well rounded game, making six 10 shots from the floor, finishing with 17 points and six rebounds.

Coahoma coach Brandon Lucas says his ways to go. "It's going through pains," said Lucas. "We're still struggling with pressure and learning how to attack it. We've got four freshmen and a few sophomores. We've got to get into some kind of continuity and make it flow."

Forsan improves to 4-2 for the season while Coahoma falls to 2-3. Coahoma will compete in the Borden County tournament starting Thursday. Forsan will be at home Friday against Grape Creek.

Jason Brown and Ronald McDonald House Charities bring smiles

Figure skaters are trained to wear smiles while on the ice competing or performing. When it comes to Jason Brown, the smile is authentic, and it rarely leaves his face.

Among the times Brown beams most are when he's interacting with children and families from Ronald McDonald House Charities. Indeed, those are gold medal times for the one-time Olympian who has a strong shot at making the U.S. team for February's Winter Games.

"It is truly incredible," Brown says. "To be honest, I got involved with this organization to give back to the communities in which I skated. Family is such an important value, and kids, of course, and I really wanted to do something and give back to a charity that fulfilled those two things. And at the same time, it could be a charity that I could get whatever fans in that city or country and get them involved and have them feel they are making a contribution in their community."

"I fell in love with this organization and it made me see the world in a different way and made me appreciate health in a different way than I had before. And they are so inspiring; everyone I have met throughout the

organization is so inspiring."

Brown has traveled the globe as a skater, and at nearly every stop he has appeared at events for RMHC. A nonprofit corporation that creates, finds, and supports programs that directly improve the health and well-being of children and their families, RMHC has an international network of more than 260 chapters in 62 countries and centered care through its three core programs: the Ronald McDonald House, the Ronald McDonald Family Room and the Ronald McDonald Care Mobile. RMHC programs help families with ill or injured children stay together and near leading hospitals and health care services worldwide.

Since 2014, when he made the Olympic squad, Brown has partnered with RMHC. Back then, at a Skate America competition in Illinois, he announced that all the stuffed animals thrown onto the ice after he performed — a tradition in the sport — would be given to a local chapter. Brown even personally delivered the gifts and spent time with RMHC children and families in Chicago.

That has continued

around the world.

"One of the coolest things is that those communities each have a specific house, while under the big tent (of the organization)," Brown explains. "Each individual house is its own entity and it is really incredible to visit houses from all over the world and take part in or help raise money for, or donate very specific things to what that house and people need."

"Each experience is so special and unique and rewarding. I think what makes it so special, I do travel a lot and when my family is able to come with me on a trip and I have that piece of home traveling with me, well, that is something so important to the healing process. These kids are going through situations no kids should have to go through, and then imagine having to go through it alone. Or the parent struggling to get from a sibling to their kid in the hospital. Whatever it is, it is a weight off for them to have (RMHC facilities)."

Should I Evict My Son?

Dear Annie: I have a 47-year-old son who lives with me. He pays no rent, and he does not help with the bills. He does help with some of the yard work and housecleaning, but he ignores it if I ask him to help with something that I would like. For instance, he failed to install a Dish network while I was away.

He lies in bed for weeks and months at a time. He returns home from work at around 4 p.m., and he stays in bed until it's time to go to work the next day. He misses work an average of one day per week. Same for weekends; he frequently

stays in bed the entire time. He even eats while lying in bed. I asked him to move out, but he won't. Is eviction my only resource? I just want him out of the room -- and out of the bed. Do you have any suggestions? -- Fed Up Mother

Dear Fed Up: The first rule is that he can't eat in bed. That is unsanitary and does nothing for his self-esteem. Since your adult child is not paying rent, you could have him served with a 30-day notice to quit, which means he would be ordered to evacuate the premises.

As a mother, you want to help your son help himself. But he is being impossible. Staying in bed, missing work once a week and ignoring your wishes are all signs that something very serious could be going on with your son. Yes, he does need to know that he can't continue mooching off you, but instead of running to legal action, why not run to a therapist's office or speak with him yourself?

Dear Annie: This is in response to "Tired of Waiting," whose husband will not stop procrastinating. One of the hallmark symptoms of ADHD is procrastina-

tion. Many people with ADHD struggle with planning and carrying things out (known as executive function), which forces them to make a decision at the very last minute when there is no other choice. It may be worth it for the husband who is a chronic procrastinator to consult with a clinician skilled in the diagnosis of ADHD. I hope her husband is able to get help, as it will benefit both of them. -- A Reader From Ohio

Dear Reader From Ohio: Thank you for this helpful suggestion. Chronic procrastination can indeed be a sign of something more serious.

If "Tired of Waiting" does in fact suffer from ADHD, consulting a clinician is a crucial first step. Your message is a good reminder for all readers that what appears to be laziness or insecurity can often be the sign of a deeper issue.

Contract Bridge

In-depth analysis

West dealer. Both sides vulnerable. NORTH ♠ 6 4 3 ♥ A 7 2 ♦ Q 5 ♣ A K 8 7 4 WEST ♠ 8 7 2 ♥ J 10 6 4 ♦ 10 9 6 2 ♣ J 10 EAST ♠ K J 10 9 5 ♥ Q 8 ♦ A 8 3 ♣ Q 9 5 SOUTH ♠ A Q ♥ K 9 5 3 ♦ K J 7 4 ♣ 6 3 2

The bidding: West North East South Pass 1 ♠ 1 ♠ 2 NT Pass 3 NT

Opening lead — eight of spades. Most deals require no more than simple, orderly thinking for declarer to achieve the best result possible. A tendency to focus on how to play a specific suit rather than on how to play the hand as a whole is a fairly common failing that causes many contracts to be lost. Take this case where many declarers would go wrong. West leads a spade, and South wins East's nine with the queen. How should declarer play the hand? He is gazing at six

ready-made tricks — two spades, two hearts and two clubs — and needs three more for the contract. Declarer can lead a diamond to the queen and lose to the ace — which East, on the bidding, is likely to have — but this will give South only two additional tricks and leave him one trick shy of his goal. Or declarer can play the A-K and another club, hoping the opposing clubs are divided 3-2, but this will also bring him to only eight tricks. Since both methods of play lead to a dead end, South should start looking elsewhere for a way to develop his three additional tricks. And if he studies the situation carefully enough, he should spot an approach that will give him an excellent shot at the contract. At trick two, he leads a club to the king and returns a low diamond from dummy. East can't afford to rise with the ace, which would hand declarer three immediate diamond tricks, so let's say East ducks and allows South to win with the king. Having "stolen" this trick, declarer now abandons diamonds and plays the ace and another club. When the suit breaks normally, he has nine solid tricks. A little in-depth analysis at the start pays off in the end.

Patriots throw fewest passes in a game since 1974

Mac Jones and the New England Patriots played a style of game more reminiscent of a triple-option service academy than the modern NFL.

Jones threw just three passes on a windy Monday night in Buffalo for the fewest pass attempts in an NFL game in nearly a half-century as the Patriots beat the Bills 14-10.

With 40 mph wind gusts placing an emphasis on running the ball, the Patriots relied on the ground game with 46 runs compared to just the three passes. The last time a team threw that little in a game came Sept. 29, 1974, on another windy day in Buffalo.

Joe Ferguson threw only two passes — both incomplete — that day for the Bills in a 16-12 win over the New York Jets. O.J. Simpson ran the ball 31 times for 117 yards and Joe Namath went 2 for 18 with three interceptions for the Jets.

There was only one other game in the last 70 years when a team threw three or fewer passes, with Kansas City having three in a 24-10 win over the Oakland Raiders in 1968.

This was the eighth time in the Super Bowl era that a team threw five or fewer passes in a game, according to Sportradar, with those teams going 7-0-1. The last team to do it was also the Patriots, in the infamous 3-0 Snowplow Game win over Miami in 1982.

TOP OF THE MOUNTAIN

If the season ended now, the top seeds for the playoffs would be Arizona (10-2) in the NFC and New England (9-4) in the AFC.

Both the Cardinals and Patriots missed the playoffs last season, with Arizona finishing 8-8 and New England at 7-9. The last time both top seeds were coming off non-playoff seasons was in 1992, when San Francisco (14-2) took the spot in the NFC and Pittsburgh (11-5) in the AFC.

Neither the 49ers nor Steelers made the Super Bowl that season with San Francisco losing to Dallas in the NFC title game and Pittsburgh to Buffalo in the divisional round.

ROAD WARRIORS

The Cardinals have gotten into this position by being the NFL's best road team.

Arizona's 33-22 win at Chicago last week improved the Cardinals to 7-0 on the road with all the victories coming by at least 10 points. The last team to win its first seven road games by double digits was the 1968 Cowboys, who went 7-0 on the road that season. The road success ended in the

playoffs when Dallas lost its first game 31-20 at Cleveland when the sites were predetermined by division.

The only other team to win seven straight road games by double digits in the same season was the 1984 Super Bowl champion 49ers, who went undefeated on the road but won the opener at Detroit by just three points.

TURNAROUND TEAM

The Miami Dolphins have been on a quite a roller coaster this season.

After winning the season opener at New England, the Dolphins lost their next seven games. Since then, Miami is 5-0 to become the third team in NFL history to have a five-game winning streak and seven-game losing streak in the same season, according to Sportradar.

The others are the 2017 49ers, who lost their first nine games and won their final five, and the 1994 Giants, who started 3-0, lost seven straight and then won six in a row.

With a win next week against the Jets following a bye, the Dolphins will join the 1974 Jets as the only teams to go from 1-7 to 7-7 in a season.

TOM TERRIFIC

Tom Brady is doing things at age 44 that he has never done before.

Brady had his sixth game this season with at least four TD passes, surpassing the five he had in 2007 for the most in a season in his career.

This is the sixth time in NFL history a QB has thrown for at least four TD passes six times in a season with the other five all winning the MVP: Aaron Rodgers (seven in 2020), Patrick Mahomes (seven in 2018), Peyton Manning (nine in 2013), Manning (six in 2004) and Dan Marino (six in 1984).

Two of Brady's TDs last week went to Rob Gronkowski, giving the pair 90 in the regular season in their careers. That surpassed Philip Rivers and Antonio Gates (89 TDs) for second-most in NFL history. Only Manning and Marvin Harrison (112) have more.

TOUCHDOWN TAYLOR

Indianapolis' Jonathan Taylor scored on a TD run for the 10th straight game last week against Houston.

Taylor is the fifth player ever to run for a TD in 10 straight games in the season and the first to do it since LaDainian Tomlinson did it in 12 straight games in 2004. The others are Priest Holmes (11 games in 2002), Emmitt Smith (11 in 1995) and John Riggins (12 in 1983).
