Jarrett plans on attending Texas Tech University and majoring in Chemistry Research.

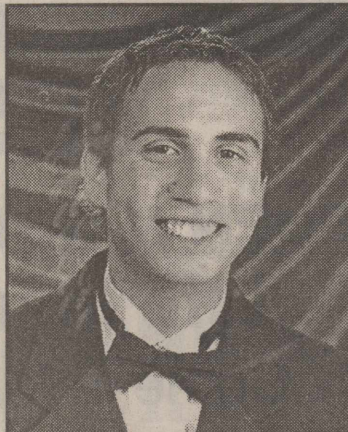
He has excelled in Science, placing 3rd Overall in State Science UIL competition, and 1st at State in Chemistry.

Jeffri plans on attending Texas Tech and majoring in business

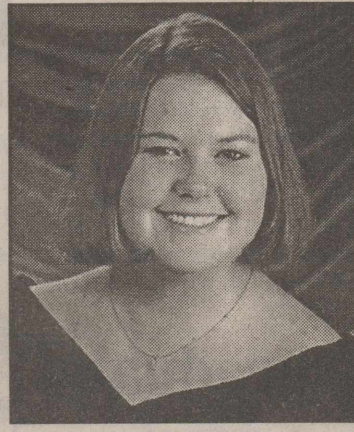

Valedictorian honors went to Rebekah Leigh Thornton, daughter of Travis and Amy Thornton, of Plainview.

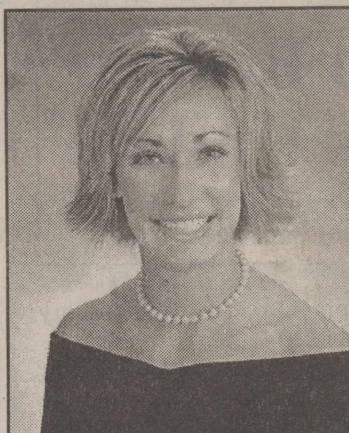
Salutatorian honors went to Emily Lamar Mercado, daughter of Hector and Marta Mercado.

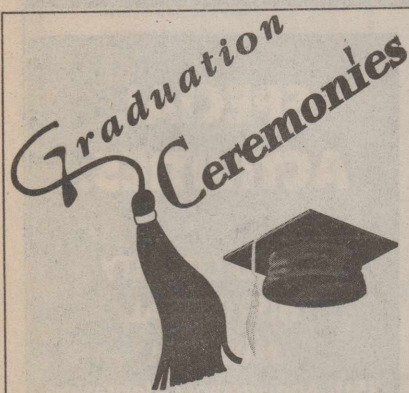

FISD buys buildings, uniforms, and computers

The Floydada ISD Board met Tuesday, May 16, and canvassed the election votes, swore in three board members, voted to purchase a portable building for FJHS, bought new band uniforms for the high school and new laptop computers for the teachers at both elementary schools.

Following the vote canvassing, Central Office Secretary Laveta Morren swore in newly elected board member Marty Lucke, along with board members Kerry Pratt and Bill Dean. The board reelected Bill Dean as board president, Rachael Castillo as vice-president and Amado Morales as secretary.

The board unanimously approved the purchase of a four room portable science building to be installed just south of the Junior High building that will be

connected to the existing building by a covered walkway. It will cost the school district \$231,523.00. The purchase price will be taken out of the \$2.8 million reserve fund already set aside and designated for facility construction, according to Superintendent Jerry Vaughn.

Following questions from board members Greer and Castillo, Vaughn explained, "The 76' X 64' 4,864 square foot portable building will house two science classrooms and two science labs. This puts the cost at about \$47.60 per square foot. The exterior walls will be made of hardy masonry type panels, while the roof will be dark green."

Vaughn explained, "We need these labs and classrooms because the students from 5th grade through 8th grade will now be required to have four years of

Math and Science. They will spend 40 percent of their time in labs."

FHS Band Director John Odom and student, Nick Espinoza, displayed and explained the versatility of the new band uniforms to be purchased. Odom told the board, "We run between 70 to 80 students in our band class. However, we need 120 band uniforms in order to fit the sizes of all our band students. These uniforms are top-of-the-line and they will last over ten years. The cost will be \$50,686.80."

Superintendent Vaughn noted, "We have been designating money for this purchase for the past three years. We have \$87,000 designated for this purchase." The board unanimously approved the purchase.

Floydada students win at State

Five Floydada High School students attended the UIL State Meet in Austin May 5-6. The UIL Science team advanced to the State Meet for the second year in a row.

Team members included Jarrett Kirk, senior; Reagan Heflin, senior; Abel Cortinas, junior; and Sean Miller, freshman. The team placed second,

and individual honors went to Kirk for third place in individual competition and Cortinas winning the Top Biology award.

Over 200,000 students are enrolled in 2A schools in the state of Texas. Over 1,000 students began the journey to state at the district level in UIL Science, with only 28 students competing at the state level. The Science team is coached by Mr. Mac Willson.

Britnee Brotherton, junior,

also attended the UIL State Meet competing in Informative Speaking. Britnee tied for 2nd in her round, but after the second tie-breaker ended the round in fourth, not advancing to finals.

Only twelve students competed at the state level for medals in Informative Speaking. Britnee is coached by Mrs. Dana Herrington and Mrs. Kensey Thompson.

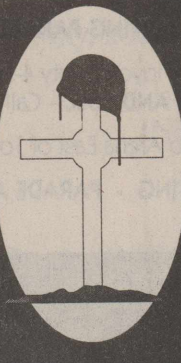

We've just finished reading one of Robert Caro's books on the life and times of Lyndon Johnson. It's not easy reading, especially when you've got only one reasonably good eye and it's covered with a cataract that doctors think ought to come off. And it would, except that there's a risk involved, and that fact doesn't sit too well when you only have one eye left.

Oh well. Everyone has problems.

Anyway, we knew Lyndon Johnson, and we knew lots of people who knew him much better than we did. We've had our differences with Lyndon, going back to long before he became President of these United States. As far as we were concerned, Lyndon was a liar, a thief, a vain, conceited, greedy individual who was able to surround himself with power brokers and become exceedingly rich in the process.

Still, the thing that has always puzzled us is the reason certain otherwise good people will subject themselves to complete and utter humiliation in order that they may be counted as one of those who is "close to the throne." The city of Austin is (or was) literally full of Johnson sycophants. Among those were the partner-owners (Charles Marsh and E.S. Fentress) of newspapers (The Austin American-Statesman, for one) where I used to work as a reporter until it became apparent that not one word would ever be allowed in print that could be construed as derogatory to Lyndon Banes Johnson.

Those of us who had to tolerate the Johnson family for years will be forever indebted to Robert Caro for writing things that should have been written years ago, by others, particularly those of us who worked for that news-

paper. It is apparent, upon reading the first book, that Caro is a liberal. But he seems to be an honest liberal. Without that combination, his book would have been largely a screed, praising Lyndon for his civil rights stance and condemning him for his association with George Brown. The picture painted of Lyndon, by Caro, is, as far as I can tell, accurate and truthful. Lyndon Johnson was, going back to the days when we first knew him, and knew of him first by reputation, as all the things we have said earlier about his character. Jack Howerton, the then Publisher of the Cuero Daily Record, and the man who first hired me in the early 50's, told me then that "Lyndon Johnson is a crook, and some day you will find that out."

Most of what Texans now know about Lyndon Johnson can be summed up in a single phrase: "Box 13." Those of us who went through all that will remember it as the episode in which Lyndon simply stole the United States Senate election of 1948 from a former Governor Coke Stevenson. Many of us regarded it as simply a fight between two Democrats, Coke Stevenson and Lyndon Johnson. Lyndon relied on a lack of morals by George Parr and other South Texas "jeffes" (as well as his own lack of morals) to wrack up huge one-sided vote totals that the State Democratic Executive Committee, stacked in Johnson's favor,

narrowly approved, and for which various lawyers, including Abe Fortas and Ed Clark benefited. Fortas was later rewarded by Lyndon with a Supreme Court nomination, (for which I am happy to have had a hand in blocking) and Ed Clark, (a friend of mine despite his subservience to Lyndon), Ed, whose law firm

later represented the shysters in what became known as the Veterans Land Scandals, was rewarded with the all-powerful title of Ambassador Plenipotentiary after he had served as Ambassador to Australia. Ed served as a loyal foot soldier for Lyndon from day one, and he once told me, in a fit of exasperation, that John Connally was completely ignorant of all that had been done to assist Lyndon. ("He was running around... a little shirt tail lawyer... not knowing what was going on... acting like he knew"...) while the people who really did know, people like George Brown and Alvin Wirtz and Ed Clark, and Lyndon Johnson were busy passing out money and buying the votes that would make Lyndon a United States Senator, and ultimately a President of the United States.

Apropos Ed Clark: Once, when I worked for the University of Texas as a fund-raiser and he was a Regent for the same university, we found ourselves on the same small private plane returning from Houston's M.D. Anderson medical complex, where we had gone to accept a rather large gift to the hospital. The plane was bouncing around a lot, and we both were trying to find a little more courage, when the subject turned to Lyndon and South Texas. I told him then that some day I would like to write about the whole thing, and particularly the "men behind the

throne." I had always been more fascinated by the people behind the people in power, I told him, than I was by the people in office. He smiled, sort of, and said, "Well, Ken, we will have to wait for a few more people to die." At that time nearly everyone involved in Lyndon's theft was already dead...except Lady Bird Johnson, whose friendship he treasured. One of the problems is that he died before all the others. A few lived to talk to Caro, fortunately, and help paint a vivid picture of a grasping, cowardly politician who had neither morals nor principles, but did have plenty of people around who wanted him in office.

It is those people, the Wirtz, the Ed Clarks, and a host of others who have always puzzled me. George Brown, I can understand. With him it was merely a matter of money. He needed federal money, and Lyndon was always eager to help, for a price. Clark and Wirtz, I can also understand. They were, after all, lawyers who were paid to do certain jobs. I did not know Wirtz. I knew Ed Clark for many years, as I did Lyndon. But many of the others, I just flat cannot comprehend.

Anyhow, some day when the crops are laid by and time hangs heavy on your hands, go down to the local library and check out the Caro books on the life and times of Lyndon Johnson. You will be doing yourself a favor.

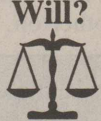

Floydada Council revises dog ordinance

The Floydada City Council met Tuesday, May 16, and swore in two council members, approved a late fee for 'sanitation only' customers, passed a variance to the ordinance relating to keeping large dogs and passed another ordinance relating to tethering dogs within the City limits.

City Secretary Karen Lawson swore into office Council Members Monte Williams and Clar Schacht for another two year term on the City council and Council Member Sheldon Sue was reelected as Mayor Pro Tem for another year.

City Manager Gary Brown told the council, "We do not have in place a policy to add a late fee to the 63 customers who have only trash pickup service and who do not pay their bill by the 20th. This is not on the same playing field with the customers who have our other utilities or services. I think you should consider establishing a late fee for these customers also."

The council approved a late fee of \$15.00 for customers that are under 7 days late paying their bill, and a \$30.00 late fee for those who are over 7 days late paying their bill.

Concerning dogs over 35 pounds, the council approved a variance to the original ordinance already in place, which states a large (non-aggressive) dog is to be in complete control by its owner at all times, while a large 'aggressive' dog must be in control by its owner and muzzled.

Another ordinance was passed by the council stating that no dog shall ever be tethered for any reason for more than 72 hours at any location.

In other matters, the council approved a Multiyear Public Small Games Hunting Lands License Agreement between the City of Floydada and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for the purpose of the possibility of drilling gas wells in the City limits.

The council discussed, but took no action on, a \$1,729,581.00 Farm Labor rehabilitation grant, which would

give the City a \$192,176.00 loan debt.

The council did approve a FEMA required regional hazard mitigation action plan for the City and the South Plains region, in case there was an emergency or a disaster.

City Manager Brown explained, "This is a plan developed by SPAG that established how our area will respond to a disaster. The plan is required if federal grants are going to be received."

The 2006-2007 budget of \$241,660.00 for the Floyd County Appraisal District was approved by the council. This year's budget showed to be \$5,000 more than last year's budget.

The council approved a request by Brown to use all proceeds from the demolition of the old power plant for the purchase of any other needed equipment, such as a new forklift.

Brown explained, "The demolition of the interior part of the power plant is being worked at by our employees. They have hauled off one small load of scrap material and brought back over \$1,500."

The council also discussed a sick leave policy and travel expense guidelines for City employees

Financial reports were given to the council members concerning the Floydada Economic Development Corporation (FEDC)

and the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority (MMWA).

The February 28, 2006 FEDC's financial report showed Receipts of \$5,837.32, Disbursements of \$4,479.11, leaving an Ending Balance On Hand of \$42,225.09.

Executive Director of FEDC, Dora Ross, stated that enough funds were raised to purchase 120 planters. 7 planters went to businesses on the highway and 113 were delivered downtown.

The March 31, 2006 MMWA financial report for Cash Balances showed Total Cash of Transmission at \$466,920.44; Total Cash of General Obligation at \$614,373.29; Total Cash of Trans. Reserve at \$591,700.30; and Total Cash of Mackenzie Bail & Tackle at \$5,598.44.

An MMWA chart showed Floydada water usage peaked in February, 2006 at 7,349,000 gallons, while water usage came down in March, 2006 at 6,097,000 gallons.

CITY COUNCIL, SPECIAL MEETING, May 22, 2006:

The council met in special session, Monday, May 22; and canvassed the election returns and passed an ordinance prohibiting the use of herbicide, 2-4-D.

The council discussed a hiring proposal from the Floydada Police Department about salaries. The council took no action on the proposal

William Jarrett ancestors travel by wagon to Floyd County

Descendants of William Burdett Jarrett hosted the Jarrett Family Reunion in Raton, NM, April 28-30, 2006. Family members attended from Maryland, Florida, Indiana, Michigan, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Montana, California, and New Mexico.

William Burdett Jarrett came from Sheridan, Indiana to Floyd County, Texas in October 1908 with five of his children. The other seven children stayed in Indiana. They traveled by train to Amarillo where they bought wagons, horses, and supplies for the long trip to Floyd county. After several days of travel, they camped on land just north and west of the South Plains Post Office. When Burdett went the next day to file his claim for land, he discovered that the family had camped on their own land.

Four of the Jarrett children remained in Floyd County, and Charlie and Lena both raised families in the South Plains Community. Frank ran a small grocery store in South Plains for many years, and Carrie Jarrett Bostick was a cook at the Lockney hospital. Several of the family homesteaded in the Farley/Gladstone, NM area from 1918-1919. William Burdett died in 1923 and is buried in the Gladstone Cemetery. Helen Burdett's youngest child, married Dan Jamison form Farley, and remained in New Mexico. The others returned to Floyd County in 1923, shortly after Burdett's death.

At the reunion Saturday evening, Lonnie Jarrett read letters that his grandfather wrote in 1909 to his oldest daughter, Kate, who remained in Indiana. Lonnie is Charlie Jarrett's youngest son and grew up in the South Plains Community. The letters were discovered last year in the attic of Kate's home, which the family still owns. Excerpts from the letters follow. (The Curlew, TX post office was two miles east of present-day South Plains.)

Curlew, TX, June 26, 1910. "Kate, tell Howard if he wants to stop work to come to Texas, for the cows chop the wood and the

wind pumps the water."

Burdett's children who came to Texas with their dad in 1908 also wrote letters back to Indiana: November 13, 1909, Lena's letter to her sister Kate: "Charlie says to tell you that he killed a wolf this morning. Every day he can't work he goes wolf hunting. Sunday, he killed two...I forgot to tell you that Jedson (an older brother who came out later) gives us a cent a pound for picking cotton, so we can get us several things now. We make about \$2.00 a week and I guess we will get to pick til Christmas."

Curlew, Texas, October 6, 1909. Frank's letter to his sister Kate: "I saw my first cotton gin at work last Saturday at Lockney. They made about eight or ten bales of cotton that day and a bale will weigh from 475 to 550 pounds. It takes about 1500

pounds like you pick it to make one bale. If nothing happens, we will get a bale ready for the gin next week...The Cattlemen had a roundup in about half a mile of our house last Friday and we all went down to see the circus. They had between three thousand and four thousand head of cattle in one bunch...It has been one year ago today since I left your house and Sheridan (Indiana), and I would like to be back long enough to go around again and take a good long stay with you. We are all well as common at this time and hope you are the same. As ever, your Brother, Frank J."

About fifty of Burdett's descendants attended the 2006 reunion, including four of his grandchildren: Barbara Price, Raton, NM; Dannelle Monnet, Miami, NM; Helen O'Neill, Palmetto, FL; and Lonnie Jarrett Alamogordo, NM.

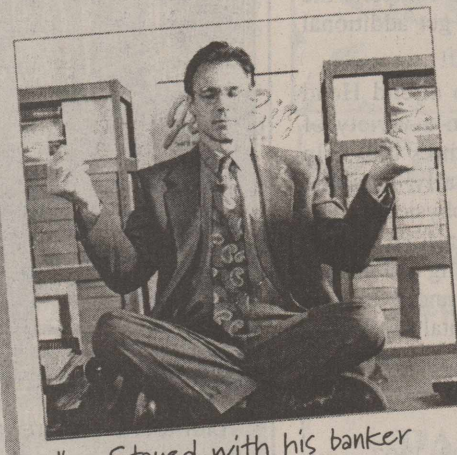

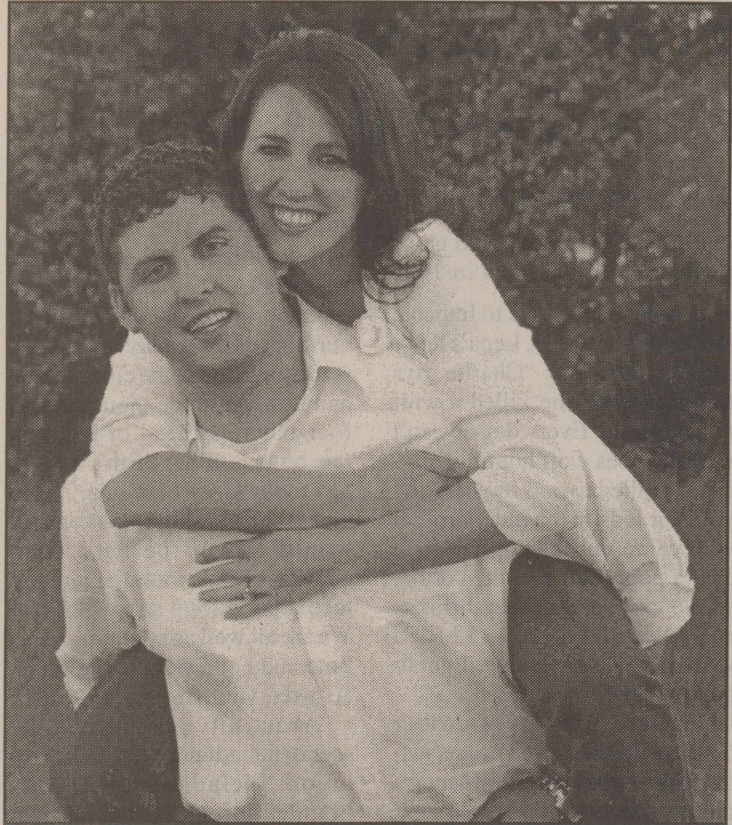

Tanaya doesn't look a thing like her mother. But so few Indian girls resemble Texas raised redheads.

Kristi and David Lunday brought Tanaya from Poona, India, to Decatur in February, but they'd been filing adoption paperwork since before she was born. The road, ending three months ago in an Indian orphanage, began at a Fort Worth adoption agency in 2002.

Their son, Ben, 8, is also adopted, but he came through an area agency when he was a few weeks old. When Ben turned 5, the Lunday's began talking about adopting a girl, this time from another country. They wanted to give a child a chance at a better life, they said, but they didn't know how complicated an international adoption could be.

They've known Tanaya would be a Lunday since she was 3 months old, but the long government procedures kept her from going home for nearly two years. The Lunday's spent two birthdays and Christmases across the world from the girl who would be their daughter.

"It was awful," Kristi said. "We didn't even see a picture of her until she was 18 months old, and she looked so sad in every picture. It killed us."

The agency told the Lunday's the pictures were taken on a bad day, but the family began to worry about Tanaya's safety and health in an orphanage they'd never seen, in a country they'd never visited.

"We kept saying, 'We've just got to get her out of there,'" Kristi said, still visibly upset by the memory.

Some of their fears for Tanaya's health were confirmed after they brought her home. No matter what she ate, she looked underweight and hungry. Doctors discovered she was infected with an intestinal parasite.

Even in a country with overcrowded, under-funded orphanages, international adoption is not simple. The U.S. and Indian governments required the Lunday's to fill out extensive paperwork on their backgrounds and finances and take physical exams.

Each time the adoption was delayed for more than a year, the form and physical results expired and had to be resubmitted. And the Lunday's said the Indian government's foreign adoption policies delayed the adoption further.

As an American family, the Lunday's said, they were constantly moved to the bottom of the adoption list. In order for an American family to adopt an Indian child, Kristi said, the child must be rejected by three Indian families.

Kristi said the orphanage Tanaya lived in was constantly expanding to hold more children. India is full of people and constantly growing, and many people who can't afford to reproduce do anyway. The streets are so congested, she said, drivers must fold their side-view mirrors against the doors for the extra bit of room. The children the Lunday's saw outside of the orphanage often looked malnourished and alone. Kristi got a shock riding to the orphanage when she saw two small girls playing alone on the median strip of a highway.

She was also surprised when the family went sight-seeing and she was separated from her husband and son. In India, she found

out, women and men wait in separate, but not equal, lines.

"The guards didn't talk to us," she said. "They just moved us along like cattle."

Ben originally wanted a baby brother, but after watching his mother separated from the family, Kristi said he seemed glad they were taking Tanaya out of a country where women and men are treated so differently.

"He looked up at me and said, 'Tanaya's going to get to do boy stuff if she wants now, isn't she?'" Kristi said. Tanaya is becoming an American Girl. The orphanage kept her hair buzzed short, but now it's growing long enough to hold barrettes.

"She reached her hand up there and grabbed some of her hair the other day," Kristi said. "I think it was the first time she

realized she had it."

Ben keeps his hair clipped close like David's, and watching the two build a sandbox dam together could make you forget he's adopted. Auburn haired Kristi, on the other hand, will probably never be mistaken as Tanaya's birth mother. But when the dark skinned, darker eyed toddler reaches for her mother, that doesn't seem to matter.

"If we'd known when we started adopting her that it was going to take three years, we probably wouldn't have done it," Kristi said. "But looking at her now, there's no way I could say I wouldn't do it again."

Kristi Lunday is the daughter of Kenneth and Barbara Willis, of Floydada, and a 1980 graduate of FHS.

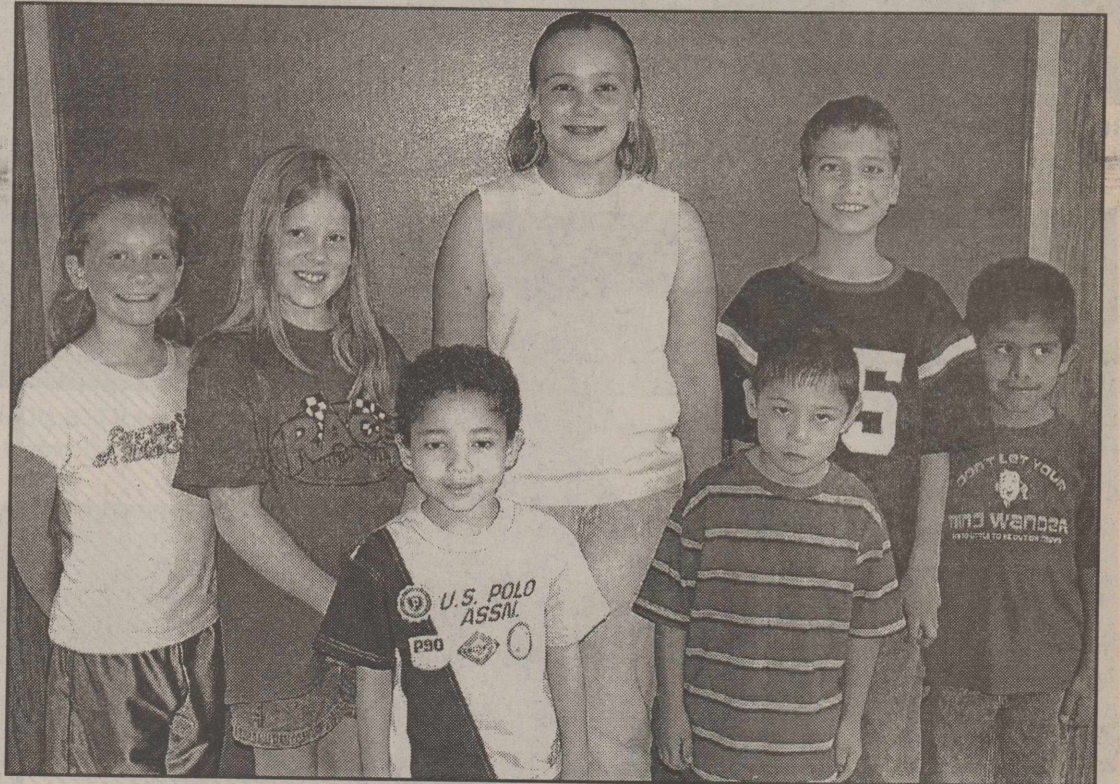

It's five months into the year, and many of us made a resolution in January to increase our physical activity. How's that working for you? If you're not as physically active as you want, I encourage you to look at one of Texas Cooperative Extension's programs called Walk Across Texas. Walk Across Texas is a fun and flexible way to exercise. You can participate in a group, by yourself, or your school can even participate.

You might be wondering, "why do I need to be physically active?" According to *Physical Activity and Health: A Report of the Surgeon General*:

- Regular physical activity can substantially reduce your risk of developing or dying from heart disease, diabetes, colon cancer, and high blood pressure.

- Regular physical activity can reduce the symptoms of depression and anxiety, improve your mood, and enhance your ability to perform daily tasks. You might also be wondering, how much physical activity you need each day. You should get at least 30 minutes of moderate-level physical activity a day at least five days a week. It's okay if you

can't exercise for a full 30-minutes at a time. Many people will have to work up to being active for 30 minutes a day. Starting slowly (like walking 10 minutes a day) will improve your chances of success.

Physical activity doesn't have to be strenuous to produce health benefits. Walking the dog, gardening, taking walking breaks during the day, or taking the stairs instead of the elevator are all good ways to work walking into your daily schedule.

Another tip to help make exercise more fun is to do it with friends or family. It can improve

your health and enhance your relationships! It also helps to plan the exercise with your friends or family in advance. Make a regular appointment to walk with a friend, which can help both of you keep exercising.

FISD purchases laptops for professionals at Duncan and Andrews

Upon the recommendation of Superintendent Vaughn, the board approved, by a split vote of 5-2, the \$47,734.01 purchase of 42 laptop computers for the teachers, counselors and principals at A.B. Duncan Elementary and R.C. Andrews Elementary.

Vaughn told the board, "I recommend this purchase. These professional employees need this mobility and instructional capabilities these laptops will give them. They can use them at different locations and at home to prepare lessons for the next day.

According to Business Manager Sharon Rainwater, "There is money in other areas of our budget that we must use or we will lose it. By using this money, it will only cost the district \$4,054.00."

Board Members Dean, Morales, Lyle Miller, Bart Greer and Lucke voted for the purchase, while Board Members Castillo and Pratt voted against it.

In a related matter and upon the recommendation of Superintendent Vaughn, the board unanimously approved a resolution between FISD and Reese Technology Center for the purpose of selling and installing a City-wide wireless internet access (WIFI) system in Floydada.

At last month's board meeting, Eric Williams, Executive Director of RTC at Lubbock, presented the offer, to FISD and the City of Floydada, of free wire-

less installation of internet equipment throughout the city to accommodate the school's laptop computers.

The offer was contingent upon signing up a minimum of 350 to 400 students with laptop computers, and including any others within the city and the surrounding area. The cost per laptop for the students will be \$14.99 per month, while the cost to the citizens will be \$25 per month.

In other matters, the board discussed and approved a \$75,000 retainer fee to Moak, Casey & Associates as consultants regarding the Property Tax Code application for Appraised Value Limitations on qualified property. This is in connection with the Renewable Energy Systems (RES) wind farm to be erected in the eastern part of Floyd County.

According to Superintendent Vaughn, this \$75,000 fee will be reimbursed to the district by RES. "There will be no cost to the district. There will also be two later fees amounting to \$25,000 each. This study is mandated by the state and it must be approved by the State Comptroller's office. Everything looks good. They are trying to finalize applications now and it should be done within the next ten days," said Vaughn.

The board voted 4-3 against the bid of \$500 by John Suniga to purchase Lots 11 and 12 at 416 W. Lee Street. Those voting for

the bid were Morales, Castillo and Miller. Those voting against the bid were Dean, Pratt, Greer and Lucke.

In another split vote, 5-2, the board approved the 2006-2007 school calendar. Vaughn told the board, "This calendar meets all our requirements and the teachers were almost 100 percent for it."

The calendar shows school starting on August 16, 2006 and the first semester ending on December 20, 2006. Second semester will begin on January 4, 2007 with Spring Break on March 12-16, 2007, and the second semester ending on May 23, 2007. Board Members voting against the calendar were Pratt and Greer.

Business Manager Rainwater presented the April Tax Statement and Cash Flow Report. The Tax Statement showed \$2,079,031.73 collected, or 95.58 percent. The April Cash Flow Report showed a Current Cash Balance of \$5,814,732.92, with an average monthly expense at \$595,000.00.

The board approved the Floyd County Central Appraisal District Budget of \$241,660.00 for 2006-2007 school year. "This is very close to last year's budget," said Vaughn.

Superintendent Vaughn presented the board a copy of the preliminary TAKS test results for the 2005-2006 school year. The report showed a growth rate in

most all grades, except 3rd and 4th grades, where reading and writing were slightly down. 7th grade Reading and Math also showed to be down some.

"These are not the final results and we are not where we want to be, but we are proud for the improvements. Our teachers have done a good job," said Vaughn.

Board Member Greer added, "As a whole, I also think our teachers have done a good job."

Board President Bill Dean said, "At the Academic UIL (contest), we (FISD) were above all others in our district."

The board accepted the resignations of Larry Beam, Angela Oaks, Ofelia Arenas, Angie Watson, Hannah Morris, Mari Evans, Kathy Ross and Joely Beam.

The board employed Kathy Mulder, Sammy Bradley and Terry Day at A.B. Duncan Elementary, Kristina Tilson at R.C. Andrews Elementary, Bianey Saucedo at FHS and Brian Place as assistant band director.

In the Superintendent's report, concerning the recent passing of the \$5.5 million Bond Election, Vaughn told the board, "We are getting in line for State funding (EDA). We will know by May, 2007, if we are getting the funding. We will get the money in September, 2009. If we do not get (State) funding, then we will have decide to issue the bonds at a higher rate, or not."

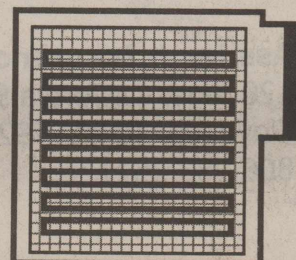

Thanks to the House Committee on Agriculture making sure Legislator tasked with writing the 2007 Farm Bill have a clear understanding of producer support for extending provisions of the 2002 Farm Bill is as easy as filling in the blanks.

Last week's announcement that the House Agriculture Committee has created a web page to obtain individual feedback from producers regarding future farm policy provides growers the opportunity to add their voices to the debate and magnify the number of supportive voices legislators hear.

Growers wishing to submit comments about the 2007 Farm Bill directly to the House Agriculture Committee can do so through the House Committee on Agriculture's web page located at: <http://agriculture.house.gov/inside/feedbackform.html>

Submitting comments is as easy as sending an email and PCG encourages growers to voice their support of current farm bill provisions and to encourage their neighbors to also take advantage of the opportunity to make their opinions known.

PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett notes that individual producer comments are especially important. "In politics numbers are important," says Verett. "When it comes to influencing the direction of the next Farm Bill it is critical that Congress understands how strongly producers support the program that we have today."

Taking advantage of every opportunity to let Congress know firsthand what producers need will amplify the messages that are being sent through their representative organizations.

"The 2007 Farm Bill will be developed in an entirely different environment than what existed when the current farm program was put together," concludes Verett. "In order to maintain the effective farm safety net that we have today, it is critical that producers let their voices be heard."

In the end every comment High Plains cotton producers put in will reinforce the messages delivered to the Agriculture Committee by PCG and other industry organizations.

The cotton industry continues to support the Senate disaster provisions and their emergency spending designation that does not require budgetary offsets.

In 2006 P.I.E. tours will send cotton producers from the Southeast to visit Arizona and California July 9-14; Mid-South producers will travel to Texas July 16-21; Southwest producers will tour Arkansas, Mississippi and Tennessee August 6-11; and Far West producers will visit North Carolina and Virginia August 13-18.

Participants in the 18 year old P.I.E. program gain new perspectives in land preparation, planting, fertilization, pest control, irrigation and harvesting with the overall goal of helping them improve their yields and fiber quality.

The NCC's Member Services staff, in conjunction with local producer associations, conducts the P.I.E. program, including participant selection. The P.I.E. also receives support from the Foundation via a grant from the program's new sponsor, Bayer CropScience.

"We are really excited to support this unique educational opportunity for America's cotton producers," said Monty Christian, marketing director, FiberMax Cotton Seed, Bayer CropScience. "Being able to ask questions face to face with your peers about innovative farming techniques is an invaluable experience."

Lasseter encourages eligible growers who haven't already done so to sign up for the 2006 DCP by June 1 by visiting a USDA Farm Service Agency office or by using FSA's convenient online DCP service. Producers may sign up online for DCP at http://www.fsa.usda.gov/egov/edcp_default.htm

Producers must have an active USDA eAuthentication Level 2 account to use the online service. Getting an account requires filling out the online USDA eAuthentication registration form at: <http://www.eauth.egov.usda.gov> and then visiting their local Farm Service Agency (FSA) office for identify verification.

The online service allows producers to choose 2006 DCP payment options, assign crop shares, as well as sign and submit their contracts over the Internet.

There is no fee to attend the program and questions about the program, location or other details can be directed to the Hale County Extension office at (806) 291-5274.

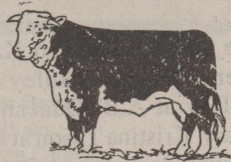
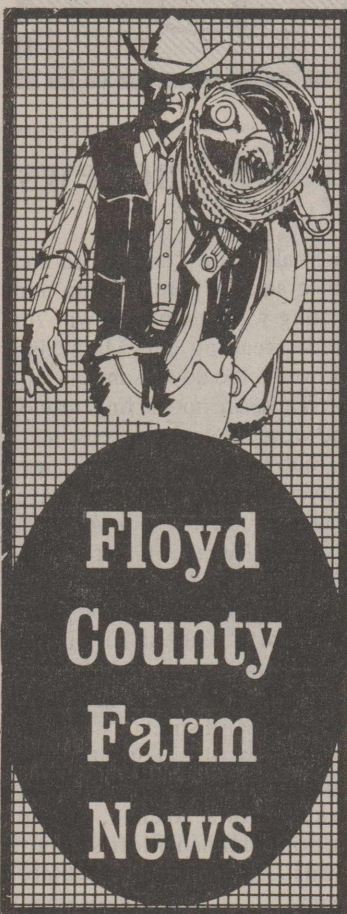

FSA news release

Producers have until June 1 to sign up for direct and counter-cyclical payment program

Agricultural producers have until June 1, 2006 to sign up for the 2006-crop Direct and Counter-cyclical Payment Program (DCP).

USDA will accept late-filed DCP applications through Sept. 30, 2006, if accompanied by a \$100 late fee. Producers will be unable to apply for 2006 DCP payments after Sept. 30, 2006. Sign-up for the 2006 DCP began October 1, 2005.

I encourage farmers and growers to sign up for DCP by June 1 by visiting the USDA FSA office or by using the convenient online DCP service. This program plays an important role in providing producers income support.

The program provides payments to eligible owners, operators, landlords, tenants, or sharecroppers on farms enrolled for the 2002 through 2007 crop years. There are two types of DCP payments - direct payments and counter-cyclical payments. Direct payments are tied to acreage bases and yields. Because direct payments provide no incentive to increase production of any certain crop, the payments support farm income without distorting producers' current production decisions.

Counter-cyclical payments provide support counter to the cycle of market prices as part of a federal farm program "safety net" in the event of low crop prices. Counter-cyclical payments for a commodity are only issued if the effective price for a commodity is below the target price for that commodity.

The 2002 Farm Bill requires producers sign annual contracts through 2007 to participate in DCP. Producers may choose not to participate in DCP in any year. USDA has issued more than \$28 billion in DCP payments to producers since the program began in October 2002.

Online DCP sign-up

Producers may also sign up for DCP online at http://www.fsa.usda.gov/egov/edco_default.htm. Applicants

must have an active USDA eAuthentication Level 2 account to use the service. This requires filling out an online registration form at <http://www.eauth.egov.usda.gov> and visiting the local FSA office for identity verification.

The online service allows producers to choose 2006 DCP payment options, assign crop shares, as well as sign and submit their contracts over the Internet. The service was designed to reduce paperwork and speed up contract processing at FSA offices.

The DCP was authorized by the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (2002 Farm Bill) and is administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency.

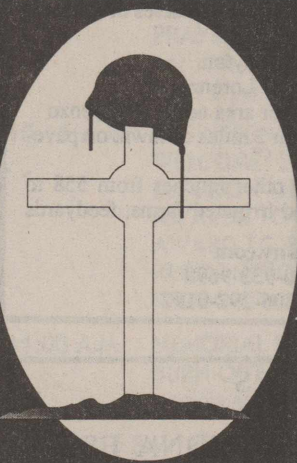
The business meeting followed with the officers reports.
