Wind energy profitable for area

Could the future economic growth of Floyd County come from our abundance of wind instead of gas, oil, cows, or crops? There are many in the County, including Winfield Davenport, who are hoping this may be the case.

Davenport recently signed a land lease contract with Renewable Energy Systems (RES), out of Austin, to allow Wind Energy towers to be built on the family's land.

Other landowners, surrounding Davenport's land (which is 10 miles north of Dougherty), have also signed on.

Scott Caldwell, manager for RES, said 8,000 acres have been leased.

"The Wind Farm on the Davenport property (as well as the surrounding property) will contain 26 turbines. It is a 60 MW (megawatt) farm. Each turbine produces 2-3 MW.

"One MW will supply electricity for 600 to 1,000 homes."

According to Caldwell, Wind Turbines only take up 2-3% of the land leased.

A wind turbine, said Caldwell, could possibly last from 20-25 years. "The entire project could add over \$95 million to the county's tax base," said Caldwell.

Plus, according to Caldwell, if buyers are found for the electricity, if transmission lines can be laid, if land owners are cooperative, if tax abatements work out, and if the wind keeps blowing--then the project can expand.

"We have to have buyers for the electricity," said Caldwell. "We are now in discussion with companies to sell the electricity. We hope to build as early as 2007, but we have to have a buyer first."

Caldwell says RES is very interested in expansion but trans-

mission lines limit how far you can expand.

"We will connect to the Matador grid," said Caldwell.

According to a May 11 story in The Hesperian-Beacon, RES will need to lay about 17 miles of underground transmission lines to connect with the Matador facility.

"The companies are ultimately trying to service the I-35 corridor," said Davenport.

"This line will connect to Matador, which goes south to Spur, and then to the Sweetwater area."

Davenport, as well as other landowners, are excited about the economical boon the Wind Towers can bring.

"Sweetwater has changed its sign on the Interstate from 'Rattlesnake Capital' to 'Wind Energy Capital'," said Davenport.

"Merkel got a new gym from the tax revenues the wind machines generated."

"Incentives are now in place to make these wind machines profitable," said Davenport. "Tax incentives are driving the growth. Taxpayers are ultimately helping to pay for the machines--but it includes taxpayers in Dallas, and the rest of the State. Then the local economy benefits from the tax revenue."

Davenport explained his Wind Farm will be at the northern most point of the available transmission lines. "I believe that is why they have stopped leasing for now--but if they get the transmission capacity I think it will explode."

Davenport believes this is just Phase I of a future larger project. "No one will tell me that," said Davenport, "but that is what I think."

According to Caldwell, his company has recently been hired to build the 5th phase of the

project in Sweetwater.

According to the May, 2006 first quarter market report of the American Wind Energy Association (AWEA), construction is under way on a number of facilities scheduled for completion in 2006.

The U.S. wind energy industry is on track to installing a record-breaking 3,000 megawatts this year--generating enough electricity to power approx. 600,000 homes.

Overall, said the report, the industry is planning to invest over \$4 billion in new wind energy capacity this year. "America's wind farm fleet is currently saving an estimated half a billion cubic feet of natural gas per day, alleviating a portion of the tight supply pressure that is driving up prices and imports of fuel."

Davenport is also excited about the roads that will be built and maintained on his property to gain access to the wind turbines. There is a mile between each turbine.

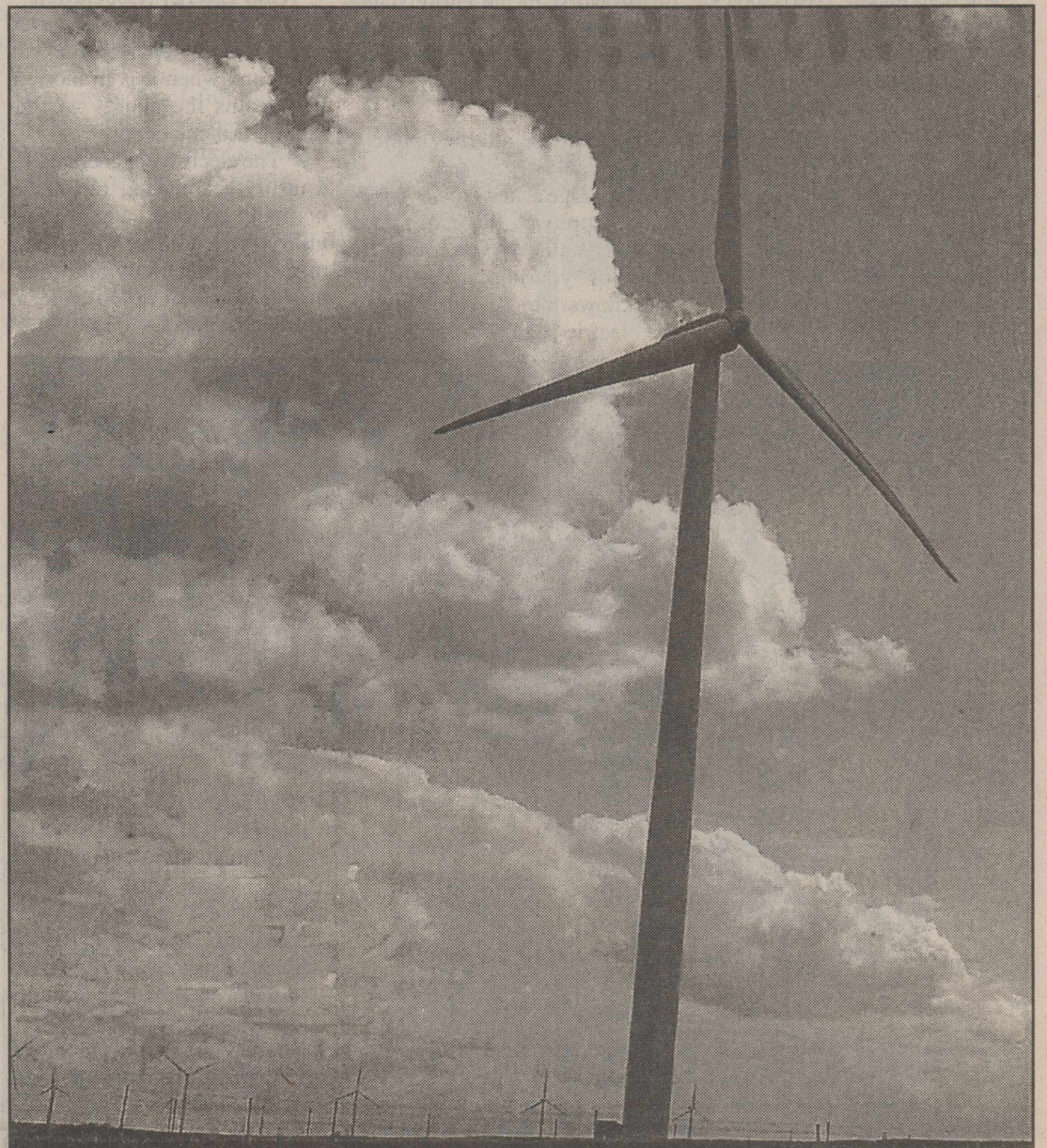
"This is great for everyone," said County Commissioner Lennie Gilroy. "It is a win-win situation. All the county has ever had to raise revenue was property taxes. Now we will have this. This could help keep landowners taxes down, as well as add more money to the County's bank account."

The County is having a public hearing on June 12, at 10:00 a.m. to consider designating certain property within Floyd County as a "reinvestment zone".

This is just one step in the process RES has asked the County to take before the work can begin.

Dale Cummings, of RES, also spoke to the Commissioner's Court, May 8, and asked for tax abatements over the next 10 years.

Wilma Edwards has never lost her "ear" or hands for music

A bright spot in Lockney, Wilma Edwards has been playing piano by ear ever since she can remember, and at 87 years of age she's still going strong.

Edwards was born March 3, 1919 in Fisher County to Seaborn and Lommie Hodo. She is the youngest of their ten children, (five boys and five girls).

"Momma and Poppa had nine children already," said Edwards. "Eight years later, they had me."

"All but two sisters played an instrument. Momma and Poppa both played the French harp, and the others played guitar, mandolin and violin. If I had not come along so late, they could have had their own family band," she said.

No one in this musical family played piano. However, her parents purchased a new Gulbranson upright piano before Edwards was born.

"I don't know why they bought it. I had that piano until about five years ago and it still had the \$125.00 price stuck on the back of it. I passed it along to my niece and she had it repaired inside and refinished. It is beautiful again and still has a wonderful sound. I understand she told the refinisher in no uncertain terms not to remove that price sticker from the back," laughed Edwards.

"I really don't remember exactly when I first attempted to play the piano," she said. "My earliest memory is of a teacher, who had come home with some of my brothers and sisters from the nearby schoolhouse, sitting me up on the piano stool and asking me to play something. I must have been around three years of age and probably just banged out something on the keyboard."

Shortly after, her family moved to Lynn County on the Texas plains where she went to a country school in Grassland.

"I have never had any piano training. All I know is my ability to play piano is a gift from God," she said. "I have played the piano at church all my life and for numerous other occasions and

have never taken a penny for it; nor would I. God gave this gift to me, and that's how I've shared it. The only time I refused an offer to play at church was for a while after my grandson Kelly's death. My heart just wasn't in it."

Edwards has a wonderful rag-time style of playing all her own. However, she remembers during her growing up years at home, "Poppa would not allow me to play anything but gospel music, and that at a respectful pace, none of that fast stuff."

She met her future husband, Joe Edwards, while still in high school and they were later married November 23, 1935 in Grassland. They farmed in Grassland and Meadow, then moved to Clovis and retired in Lubbock. Mr. Edwards preceded her in death in 1997. They have one son, Jerry Edwards, who is the Chief of Police in Lockney. She says of his wife, Linda, "She is a sweet daughter-in-law and is so good to help me."

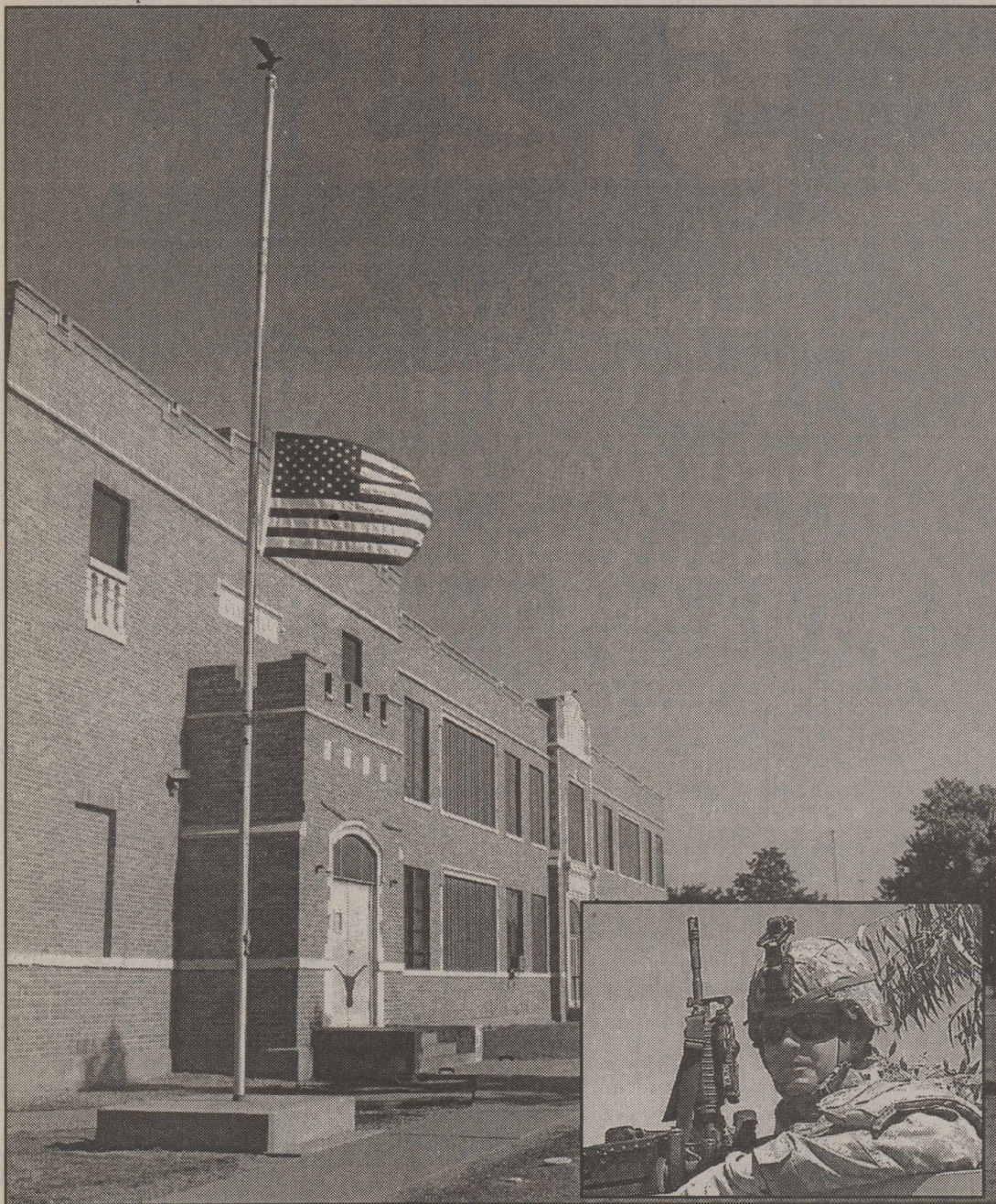
A very independent soul, she was determined to continue to

live in Lubbock by herself and did so for a time. On her son and daughter-in-law's insistence, she moved to Lockney about six years ago.

One of Edward's most fond memories is of the years she spent in Clovis playing in the Clovis Senior Citizen's Kitchen Band. "I was in that Kitchen Band for eleven years and we always had a good time," she said. "The group of eleven women had a ball playing on mostly makeshift instruments such as a kazoo attached to the spout of a coffee pot, a skillet and spoon, a washtub rigged to serve as a bass fiddle, rub board, triangle, spoons, drums, French harp, bicycle horn, tambourine and of course, a really rockin' piano."

"Our group played before the Governor of New Mexico, at different store openings, every year on a float in the parade, at parties, on TV and one whole year around 1947 at an Amarillo radio station. Once we were invited to play out on a sidewalk in

Cummings asked the court for a 100% tax abatement for the first year, 2008; 90% for 2009; 75% for 2010, 2011, and 2012; and 50% for the following five years.

Cummings also told the court the key to the project was transmission lines. But when the towers are up and running, "land owners will get good healthy royalty checks from the wind farm for a long time."

Wind Energy Facts Supplied by: American Wind Energy Association

* Wind Energy is a converted form of solar energy. Air has mass, and when it is in motion, it contains the energy of that motion (kinetic energy).

* The electricity generated by a utility-scale wind turbine is normally collected and fed into utility power lines, where it is mixed with electricity from other power plants and delivered to utility customers.

Courtroom Activities

In District Court June 1, 2005: Michael Gross, 25, of Lockney, pled guilty to the May 16, 1998 offense of Burglary of a Building (probation revoked). He was sentenced to one year in the state jail facility, \$250 fine, attorney's fees, court costs, and restitution.

Rolando Reyes, 29, of Floydada, pled guilty to the August 19, 2002 charge of Evading Arrest with a Vehicle. He was sentenced to (1) year in state jail facility, \$500 fine, attorney's fees and court costs to run concurrent with conviction in Hale County.

In County Court:

May 18, 2006, David Navarrette, 40, of Bowie, pled guilty to a February 21, 2006 charge of DWI. He was fined \$1,000 and court costs and sentenced to 180 days which was probated for 1 year.

Also on May 18, Miguel Vela Perez, 18, of Lubbock, pled guilty to a February 21, 2006 charge of Possession of Marijuana equal to or less than 2 ozs.

May 23, 2006, Jonathan Mark Martinez, 21, of Floydada, pled guilty to an April 25, 2006 charge

of DWI-2nd. He was sentenced to 9 months in jail which was probated for 2 years, fined \$750, his driver's license was suspended for 180 days and he must pay court costs.

May 25, 2005, David Zavala Jr., 29, of Plainview, was arraigned on two counts of Criminal Mischief. He was advised he is not to be seen on the east and south side of Hwy. 62 as it goes through Floydada. If he violates the warning of the court his bond will be forfeited.

May 30, James Delgado, 39, of Floydada, was charged with having a Fictitious Inspection Certificate.

If you plan to burn your pit or crop fields, please use caution and notify your fire department and let them know what you are doing.

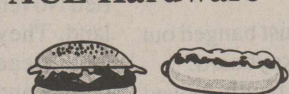

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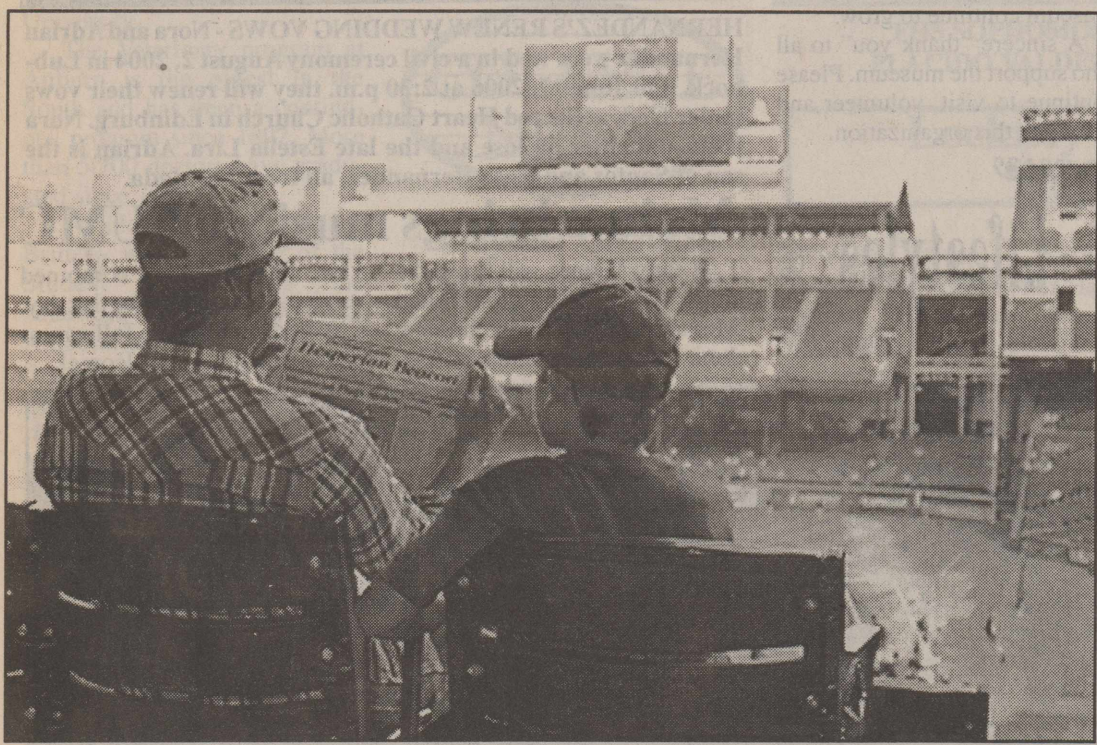

Tucumcari for a fund raiser. We were ready to wrap it up and go home but the people kept coming by and throwing money down to get us to continue to play so they could dance."

She smiled as she recalled another time, "The band had been playing outside by the pool at a Holiday Inn for a doctor's convention. We had planned our closing around a rousing medley of songs I would play and the others would march around the pool.

I played the medley but was aware the march was continuing around the pool. I looked up to see the other hotel guests had come out and joined in and didn't want to quit!"

"We had a lot of fun during those years and, as a group, were able to raise quite a bit of money for the Clovis Senior Citizens," she said.

Mrs. Edwards recalled playing for the opening of the Quail Ridge Alzheimer's Unit in Lubbock. One of her nieces was a resident

there. "A woman came up to me afterward and asked who had taught me to play like that. I told her I never had any formal training. "O, honey what a wonderful gift God gave you," she exclaimed."

Mrs. Edwards continues to keep close tabs on her family and friends. Encouraging them with an occasional meal, prayer and calls when they are sick or lonely or just need someone to talk to. She organized a weekly "Chat and Chew" group of women of varying ages (and even allows a token male to attend.) She sees about her neighbors, plans and organizes her family reunion each year, visits family out-of-town, keeps an immaculate home and plays her current piano every day.

This activity in itself is remarkable for a woman of her age. However, considering she has had thirteen surgeries, including joint replacements (one knee and both hips), arthritis, and is blind in one eye and has very limited vision in the other, with glasses, the woman is truly an inspiration.


Her orthopedic surgeon, Dr. Gill would refer other patients to her. "I'm practically a bionic woman, I have so much metal in me," she quipped. "When I moved to Lockney, I knew I could just sit here and dry up - but I chose to be active."

Those who are still enjoying her music and are amazed at her talent are very glad Mrs. Edwards has decided to stay active.

Wind Energy Facts Supplied by: American Wind Energy Association

* The ability to generate electricity is measured in watts. Watts are very small units, so the terms kilowatt (kW, 1000 watts), megawatt (MW, 1 million watts), and gigawatt (pronounced 'jig-a-watt--GW, is 1 billion watts) are used to describe the capacity of generating units.


* An average U.S. household uses about 10,655 kilowatt hours (kWh) of electricity each year. One megawatt of wind energy can generate from 2.4 to more than 3 million kWh annually. Therefore, a megawatt of wind generates about as much electricity as 225 to 300 households use. Since the wind does not blow all of the time, it cannot be the only power source for that many households.





ORDINANCE NO. 06-5

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS AMENDING CHAPTER 2, ANIMAL CONTROL OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES BEING AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS, WHEREAS THE CITY OF FLOYDADA DESIRES TO AMEND ANIMAL CONTROL RELATING TO THE TETHERING OF DOGS AND OTHER ANIMALS; AND PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF CONFLICTING PROVISIONS; PROVIDING A PENALTY OF NOT LESS THAN FIFTY (\$50.00) DOLLARS NOR MORE THAN TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,000.00) FOR VIOLATIONS; PROVIDING THAT EACH DAY VIOLATIONS ARE PERMITTED TO EXIST CONSTITUTES A SEPARATE OFFENSE; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE FOR THIS ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas maintains a substantial and legitimate interest in requiring stringent and safe standards with regard to animals and animal control within the City Limits of the City of Floydada, to promote the health, safety and welfare of its citizens;

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, finds that tethering a dog or other animal to a stationary object for a period of time is cruel and unusual punishment for the animal.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, finds and declares that it is necessary to restrict the tethering of dogs and animals.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS: THAT CHAPTER 2, ANIMAL CONTROL, CODE OF ORDINANCES IS AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

Part 1. Ordinance. That the City Code of the City of Floydada, Texas, is hereby amended by adding a section, to be numbered Section 2.600 which section reads as follows:

SECTION 2.600. Tethering Dogs and Other Animals.

A. Definition: *Tether* means to chain, tie, fasten or otherwise secure an animal to a fixed point so that it can move or range only within certain limits.

B. It shall be unlawful for any person to tie or tether a dog or other animal to a stationary object for a period of time to exceed more than 72 hours or in a location so as to create an unhealthy situation for the animal or a potentially dangerous situation for a pedestrian as determined by the City Animal Control Officer or law enforcement officer. The terms "unhealthy situation" and "potentially dangerous situation" shall include, but not be limited to the following:

- (1) To tether any animal in such a manner as to permit the animal access upon any public right-of-way;
- (2) To tether any animal in such a manner as to cause the animal injury or pain or not to permit the animal to reach shelter, food and/or water or otherwise create an unsafe or unhealthy situation; neither should the animal be muzzled so it cannot reach food and/or water.
- (3) To tether any animal in such a manner as to permit the animal to leave the owner's property;
- (4) To tether any animal in an area that is not properly fenced so as to prevent any person or child from entering the area occupied by said animal; this provision includes front, side and back yard areas of residences and all areas of businesses.
- (5) To tether any pet animal in a manner whereby the animal is subject to harassment, stings or bites from outdoor insects, or attacks by other animals;
- (6) To tether any pet animal with a tether that is less than ten (10) feet in length;
- (7) To tether any animal with a tether that is not equipped with swivel ends;
- (8) To tether any animal in such a manner that does not prevent the animal from becoming entangled with any obstruction, from partially or totally jumping any fence, or from leaving part of its owner's property.
- (9) To fail to remove waste from the tethered area on a daily basis;
- (10) To tether any animal without using a properly fitted collar or harness;
- (11) To use choke-type collars to tether any animal; or
- (12) To use a tether that weighs more than one fifth (1/5) of the animal's body weight.

This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage, and it is so ordained.

An analysis of a U.S. proposal designed to jump-start the stalled WTO Doha Round Agricultural negotiations shows that U.S. cotton producers would be net losers in the long run regardless of whether the rests of the world eventually chooses to get on board and make concessions of their own.

Economists at the TTU Cotton Economics Research Institute evaluated the current U.S. proposal, which would cut American domestic agriculture support programs by 60 percent in exchange for significant gains in market access for U.S. agricultural goods.

The TTU results show that, even if the rest of the world eventually accepted the provisions of the U.S. proposal "as-is", the ultimate effect is a 19 percent drop in the net farm income of U.S. cotton producers by the 2010-11 marketing year.

It would seem unthinkable that the U.S. Congress would unilaterally adopt the proposed cuts to U.S. domestic support programs with no requirement that the rest of the world provide commensurate changes in market access. However, if Congress chose to do the unthinkable the TTU study shows the effects would be even more severe, dropping net farm income by 2010-11 a devastating 26 percent.

For cotton growers, the study provides further evidence that the utopian dream of free-trade advocates fails to ultimately provide real world benefits to U.S. agriculture.

There is a growing feeling within U.S. agriculture groups and the U.S. Congress that assuring U.S. farmers ultimately accrue real benefits from these WTO negotiations must be the overriding goal of U.S. negotiators in the Doha trade talks.

In order to realize that goal, U.S. trade negotiators and Congress would do well to take into account the dismal prospects for U.S. cotton under the current proposal and rethink the current concept of giving up more than we gain.

That sentiment was communicated to President George Bush in a June 1 letter from major ag-

riculture groups, including the need for the negotiations to yield real benefits for American farmers.

In the letter, the groups noted that other countries have so far been unwilling to seriously consider the market access reforms suggested in the U.S. proposal and concluded, "If negotiators are forced to scale back the level of ambition from the U.S. proposal on agricultural market access in order to reach an agreement, the level of ambition in cutting trade-distorting domestic support must be commensurately reduced from the U.S. proposal."

2005-crop Upland Cotton average price received by growers through April 2006

According to information released May 31 by the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service Upland cotton marketed

during the month of April totaled 516,000 bales with an average price received by growers of 48.6 cents per pound.

April marketings were down considerably from the number of bales marketed during the month of March but did push the cumulative marketings for the year to 13,044 million bales. The preliminary mid-month price reported for May 2006 was 47.2 cents per pound.

Based on these numbers the 2005 Upland Cotton Weighted Average Price calculated through April 2006 stands at 47.82 cents per pound. Using this figure the 2005 Counter-cyclical payment rate should be the maximum 13.73-cent payment rate allowed by current program rules.

The calculated 2005 Weighted Average Price is 4.18 cents below the 52-cent threshold where Counter-cyclical payment rates begin to decline.

The 2005 Counter-cyclical payment rate authorized under the 2002 Farm Bill will be based on the 12-month Weighted Average Price Received by growers. For cotton the 12-month Weighted Average Price will reflect price and marketings for the 2005 marketing year. The 2005 cotton marketing year began on August 1, 2005 and ends July 31, 2006.

The following table shows the average price received each month by farmers and the calculated weighted average price based on estimated cumulative marketings and prices reported by the National Ag Statistics Service through April 2006.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS REPEALING ORDINANCE 05-18 PROHIBITING THE USE OF THE HERBICIDE 2, 4-DICHLOROPHENOXYACETIC ACID (COMMONLY KNOWN AS 2, 4-D) AND ITS DERIVATIVES, (INCLUDE PARENT ACID AS WELL AS SALT, AMINE AND ESTER DERIVATIVES) WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, BETWEEN THE MONTHS OF MARCH AND NOVEMBER, BEGINNING MARCH 1 OF EACH SPRING AND ENDING NOVEMBER 10 OF EACH YEAR;

WHEREAS, the City of Floydada City Council desires to repeal Ordinance No. 05-18.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Floydada as follows:
