## EFFORTS TO STANDARDIZE COTTON

A movement was started on Oct. the 4th. with a small group of men meeting at the First State Bank in Hermleigh, with the view of encouraging the standardization of cotton variety in the Hermleigh community. This will not mean that it will be necessary to get every one to do this. Some people want to be different, some people want to conduct themselves so others can work with them. It is hoped that enough men will see the advantage this movement, fall in line and help put it over. It certainly would be a credit to the community as well as a good business proposition for the individual farmer.

The plan by which this is hoped to be accomplished is simply this: A man will place an order for so many bushels of pedigreed cotton seed, designating the kind preferred, deposit \$.50 per bushel to bind the contract. Six bushels are to be counted a vote. The variety of cotton that gets the most votes will be the kind that will be ordered. This will enable a saving on the orders for the seed and will afford more protection in getting what is ordered. This order is to be placed by three in the commun-

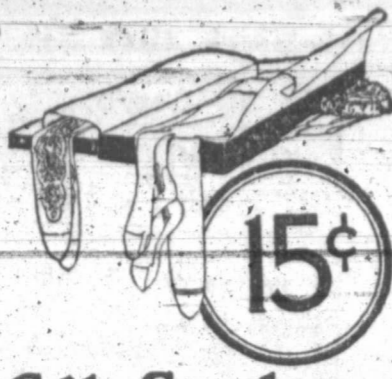

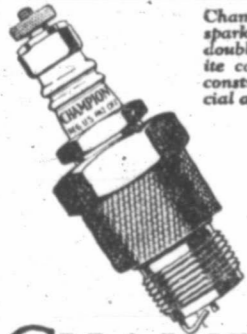

### Improved Uniform International Sunday School Lesson

(By REV. P. B. FITZWATER, D.D., Dean of the First Baptist Church, New York City. Copyright, 1927, by Western Newspaper Union.)

#### Lesson for October 16

##### ELIJAH IN NABOTH'S VINEYARD

LESSON TEXT—1 Kings 21. GOLDEN TEXT—Be sure your sin will find you out. PRIMARY TOPIC—Elijah's Message to a Wicked King.

##### I. Ahab Covets Naboth's Vineyard (v. 1-6).

1. Location of the vineyard (v. 1). It joined Ahab's summer home in Jezreel. He wanted to transform it into an herb garden and thus round out his property.

2. Ahab's proposal (v. 2). He offered to buy it outright for money, or give in exchange a better one.

3. Naboth's refusal (v. 3). He had a twofold reason: (1) regard for the paternal estate; (2) obedience to God's law (Lev. 25:23-28, cf. Num. 36:7-9). It doubtless would have been profitable to Naboth to have sold his vineyard, but loyalty to God was more important to him than money.

4. Ahab's behavior (v. 4). He came into his house, lay down upon his bed and refused to eat. The king was sulking like a spoiled child.

5. Jezebel's inquiry (vv. 5, 6). Apparently she came with the sympathy of a wife, inquiring as to the cause of his behavior. But when she knew of Naboth's refusal she was angry.

##### II. Ahab Taking Possession of Naboth's Vineyard (vv. 7-16).

1. Jezebel's treachery (vv. 7-15).

(1) Her contemptuous question (v. 7). She taunted him for his cowardice. The fear of being thought weak moves a weak man quickly. Scorn is a powerful weapon in the hands of unscrupulous persons.

(2) Her exhortation to Ahab (v. 7). "Arise and eat bread, and let thine heart be merry." A wife has great influence over her husband. Many a man has been saved from discouragement and therefore defeat through his wife's influence. Unfortunately in this case the influence of the wife was bad.

(3) Her promise to Ahab (v. 7). "I will give thee the vineyard of Naboth."

(4) Her wicked scheme (vv. 8-15). She wrote letters in Ahab's name, sealed them with his seal, and sent them to the elders and nobles who were dwelling in the city with Naboth, asking them to proclaim a fast, as though some great calamity had befallen the nation, and place Naboth before the public as the one who was the cause of it all. They were instructed to find two false witnesses who would testify against Naboth. The charge they brought was blasphemy against God and the king. Naboth's only offense was his refusal to sell his estate. When they had thus stoned Naboth and his sons to death (2 Kings 9:26), they came and told Jezebel, who in turn came to Ahab with the information and directed him to take possession of the vineyard. It was the custom for the property of those who were condemned to death for blasphemy to revert to the king.

2. Ahab goes to Jezreel to take possession of Naboth's vineyard (v. 16). Ahab had not killed Naboth, but he eagerly accepted the prize without inquiring as to how it was secured. Many today are like Ahab, too cowardly to commit wrong themselves but are willing to reap the benefits of the wrongdoing of others.

##### III. Elijah in Naboth's Vineyard. Announcing Doom Upon Ahab (vv. 17-20).

Elijah told him the dogs should lick his blood in the place where they licked the blood of Naboth. It would seem that Naboth's body was thrown out to be devoured by the dogs. Evil was to fall upon Ahab and his posterity, even to wipe out his seed and name. Ahab stood in that vineyard guilty of all the sins which Jezebel had committed, though he had been silent and inactive. God held him responsible for Jezebel's acts, for he was king and head of the nation. The day of reckoning did come to Ahab (1 Kings 22:38). Ahab's question to Elijah when confronted by him in the vineyard showed that his conscience was not wholly dead.

2. Doom upon Jezebel (vv. 23-26). She likewise should be eaten by the dogs by the wall of Jezreel. This was literally fulfilled (2 Kings 9:33-37). "Be sure your sin will find you out; whatever a man soweth, that shall he also reap."

IV. Ahab's Repentance (vv. 27-29). Because of this God promised to withhold judgment during his lifetime.

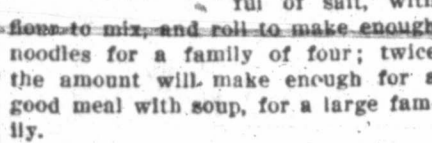

It takes but one egg, a tablespoonful of milk and one-half teaspoonful of salt, with flour to mix, and roll to make enough noodles for a family of four; two the amount will make enough for a good meal with soup, for a large family.



Roll out so thin that the dough is transparent, let dry for an hour or two in air, then roll up and cut into strips with a knife. Shake out the noodles and drop into boiling, salted water or soup and cook for several minutes. They will float on top when about done. To serve them in place of potatoes with chicken, drain them and put in a hot dish in which has browned a cupful of crumbs with a tablespoonful of butter. Stir until the noodles are well covered with the buttered crumbs, then serve. Noodles are good baked with cheese, egg or with a white sauce and a bit of green corn from the cob. One will find many ways of serving this good dish.

**Shrimp Gumbo.**—This is a popular New Orleans dish. Dice three slices of bacon and fry out in a stew pan. Add one small onion minced and cook five minutes, add two tablespoonfuls of flour and brown, stirring constantly. Blend two cupfuls of tomato with sixteen okra pods cut into small pieces; add two pounds of shrimps, uncooked and two cupfuls of water. Season with salt, pepper and a generous dash of cayenne; simmer one hour. Serve hot with rice. Canned okra may be used, in which case add fifteen minutes before serving.

A nice icing for a sponge cake is: **Orange Frosting.**—To one cupful of confectioner's sugar add the grated rind of an orange with its juice; yellow coloring may be added if desired. Beat until smooth, adding a little cream if needed, for richness.

**Everyday Good Things.**

For a good-sized family or any size for that matter, the following dish is a good one, for you have a whole meal, vegetables and all, in one dish ready to serve:  
**Cornish Pasty.**—Take a good round steak, the amount depending on the number to serve. Cut it into small cubes or half-inch pieces, mixing well with suet, or butter may be added if expense is not to be considered. Par-boil a turnip or rutabaga, cut into slices. Slice potatoes with an onion or two. Prepare a good biscuit dough, roll out, line an ordinary large pie plate—two of three may be needed if serving many. Lay in the beef, add the vegetables in layers and when well filled cover with a layer of the biscuit dough. Make small vents. Season well with salt and pepper. The amount of suet will add to the flavor and richness. Bake in a moderate oven for two hours. When the vegetables are well done, remove and wrap the pasty in a cloth; let stand to steam for at least ten minutes before serving. Cut in pie-shaped pieces to serve. This is a dish much used among the miners, where a hot dish is so needed. Its savory odor will appeal to most appetites.

**Dinner Cheese.**—Put through a meat chopper one-half cupful of stuffed olives, add two cupfuls of grated cheese and one cream cheese. Season well with salt, red pepper and roll into a long roll. Place on a dolly-covered glass plate and decorate with slices of stuffed olives. Serve with a cheese knife from the plate.

**Horseradish Sauce.**—To serve with steaks or fish, the following is especially good: Take a tablespoonful of fresh grated horseradish, add vinegar to moisten and a tablespoonful of finely-minced blanched almonds. Season with salt, a bit of sugar and a dash of red pepper; add a tablespoonful of thick sweet cream, mix well and serve in a glass cup.

Sandwiches are always in order at any supper meal or when tea is served. One may have them sweet, or with succulent vegetables like sliced cucumber or onion, or tomato, or with various meat combinations.

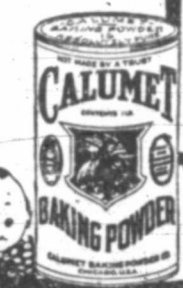
