Being old cotton growers ourselves, we have become interested in the efforts of our farmers to standardize the variety of cotton. We are not sure that we know the value of the plan, but its working forward to the community's best agricultural interest. The variety of every seed planted is considered important, why should not the variety of cotton be more important? The suggestion is worthy of consideration.

If pedigreed cotton had not already proven its value it should not be recommended to us. If it has made one man money it will make another man money. If it aids production and quality of staple for one man it will do it for a whole community, supposing the soil is the same the community over. The better the variety of seed sown the better the staple will be. There is so much bad cotton coming on the market these days that it is beginning to look like standardization would be a safe risk if it is practical. If our soil is uniform as it appears to be, the Herald sees nothing in the way of the movement.

Scholarship, oratorical power, eloquence, brilliance and mannerism, are much to be desired, but these alone are very poor substitutes for religion.

Fletcher Watson Killed by Over-Turned Wagon.

The gay team which he was driving ran away with Mr. Fletcher Watson last Saturday evening, and ended in the loss of his life. He had been to the cotton gin with cotton and was returning with his wagon loaded with cottonseed hulls when he lost control of the excited team and the wagon turned into the ditch. The fall from the wagon, evidently, knocked the breath out of him, and the hulls falling on him prevented his regaining it, and he died of suffocation. Dr. Ward rached him immediately but breath could not be regained for him.

Mrs. Watson, who is nursing a two weeks old baby, was watching the runnig team when the wagon turned into the ditch within a short distance of the house. She, despite her weakened condition of health, was the first one to him and of course despaired of relieving him.

About four years ago Mrs. Watson had to endure the loss of four of maiden family, including her father and mother, when they were struck by a Santa Fe train near here. About one year ago she lost a baby and now she is called upon to make the supreme sacrifice of losing her husband.

Funeral services were held at the residence Sunday afternoon and enternment made in the Snyder cemetery immediately. The Rev. Hudson, assisted by Rev. Leslie, conducted the service.

Notes From The Hermleigh High School

Most of the students have been busy picking cotton. Institute week came at a time when the need of help was not so great as it was a few weeks ago.

The joint institute at Snyder this year is made up of teachers from Borden, Kent,

Nolan, Mitchel and Scurry counties. Among the speakers, and those conducting the institute, are R. D. Green, President of the State Teachers Association, Dr. P. W. Horn, of West Texas Tech., Mr. Clough of S. M. U., and Mr. Hughes of Texas A. & M. College.

More than one speaker has stated that the institute is "on trial" this year. There has been a great deal of opposition to it, and it will not be long before the question will be definitely settled.

An effort has been made to increase the membership of teachers in the State Teachers Association this year. Scurry County went practically one hundred per cent for it. Many of the teachers are members, and have been for some time, but many new members have been gained. Of the thirty five thousand Texas teachers last year, only eighteen thousand were members of the Association.

Several new students are expected to enter school next Monday. Also many who have been out for some time, will re-enter then. We hope the attendance will be much better than heretofore.

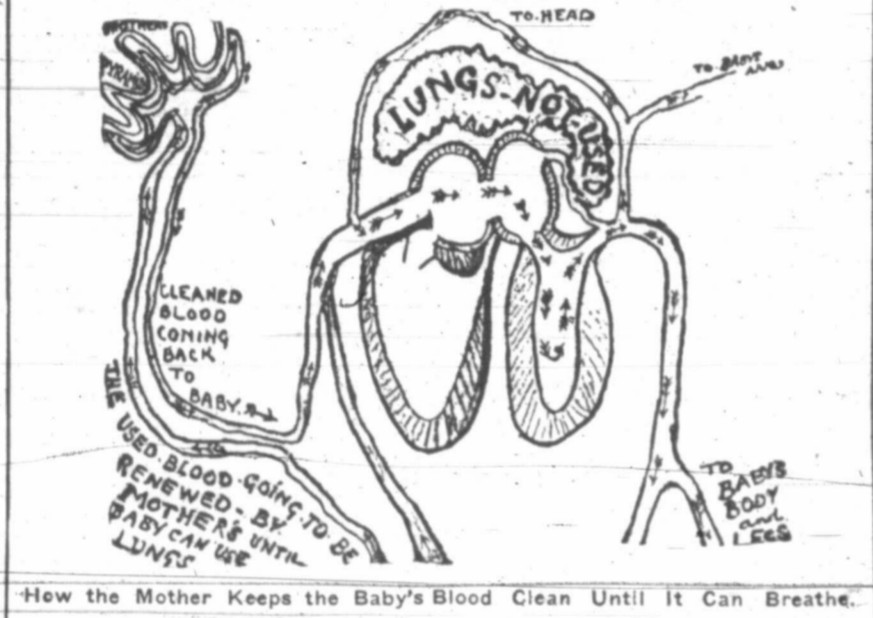
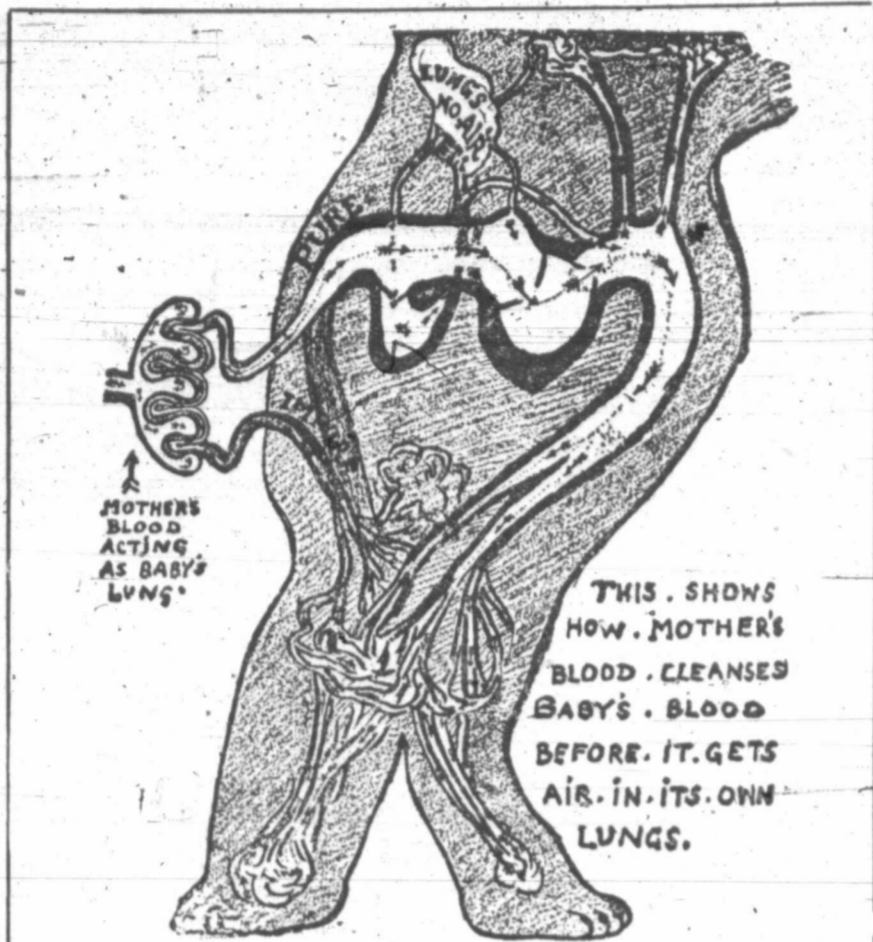

YOURSELF and YOUR BODY

"THIS is a world in which everything keeps moving until it dies and moves off altogether, as I told you. Therefore, unless it is to become a desert waste and disappear, the most important of all arrangements must be that new things should all the time continue to be made, or born into the world. Otherwise there would soon be no world at all.

"You see, your father and mother each had fathers and mothers, and their fathers and mothers had the same, and so on, for nobody knows how many ages back. In the making of new bodies we have a great part and the greatest of all responsibilities.

"We who dwell in these bodies are also entrusted with the even higher honor, that of helping to build a better world. Now if you take a bit of iron, or hydrogen, or even gold, all you can make out of it is iron or hydrogen or gold. However, if you have two different things, you can, in time, make many things—just as hydrogen and oxygen combined make a new substance altogether, called water—or carbon and hydrogen make paraffin—or yellow and blue make green. So carbon, hydrogen, and oxygen make starch, or sugar, or vinegar, or a thousand other things. Take a cell and divide it equally and it will become two cells exactly like the first; but take a cell and add something to it, and it may become your body or mine.

"The most beautiful example in the world of this is when you study what all matter is made of. It is always made of two things. A center like our sun, called a proton, or first thing, and a planet circling around it, called an electron, or second thing.

"One funny thing is that these sun and planets are held together by attraction, and nothing else, and yet seem to be, as it were, exactly pulling or working in opposite ways. These are called positive and negative, just as we speak of male and female, which is practically the same thing. It is a splendid arrangement, for many reasons, that two are required; for two heads are always better than one, more capable, more strong, more useful, more happy, more self-reliant. Suppose that every weed made a weed only. The world would be choked with weeds, and no one could live in it. But something comes, and it alters the weed a little, and a bit more the next time, and so on until that poor weed may become a nice flower or a fruit, just as a thorny cactus has. Suppose that every egg made a chicken. The world would be stuffed with chickens, and there would be no nightingales and no other birds, no fishes, (for they, too, come from eggs.) Birds and fishes, mostly lay their eggs as they are, because birds' and fishes' bodies are not nearly such delicate machinery as those of the higher animals, like dogs, or like ourselves.

"Plants, also, can spread their eggs (or seeds) all around as soon as they are made, just as the dandelion seeds can be blown about in the air and tumble about anywhere without being hurt. They may get eaten alive by birds or animals, but they are so wonderful they can live all through the 'long red lane' of a bird while they are carried to some new place, and then come out alive and grow better than if nothing had happened. But we cannot do that. We must be taken care of much longer by our mothers.

"It is a very long while before we are old enough to breathe for ourselves, or swallow for ourselves, or see for ourselves.

"When at last we come into the world mother has to feed us, and wash us, and take care of us, and then teach us, and clothe us, and, in fact, keep us alive until we are old enough to look after our own bodies. Then, begins the hard job of looking after ourselves.

"Now this most marvelous of all things on earth, this cell that will become a full-grown man or woman, a king perhaps, a George Washington maybe, a wizard like Edison, or a heroine like Florence Nightingale, is at first so small that it takes 3 hundred and twenty of them in a row to make a single inch. Think of it, your body was once only one one-hundred-twentieth of an inch in size; till like the lily, or the Sleeping Beauty, it was awakened. Then a marvelous thing occurred. It started suddenly to grow large. One cell became two, two became four, till thousands of cells had been formed. Then the outside cells gradually built a covering which became the skin, and the middle cells set to work and became bones and muscles and machines of all kinds such as we have been talking about.

"You are now at the age to look well to the bodies that mother and father gave you. Thank God, they are strong and perfect.

"—Naturally all that cannot be done in a day. It takes nine months to make a baby's body ready to be born. A puppy dog's body can be made in six weeks. During all that time the growing body is floated in a special jewel-casket, so marvelous that it grows larger exactly as the contents grow bigger. Of course there is no air in the casket, so the baby body cannot breathe yet. Still, of course, it is a living body, and is growing, and must therefore get food and throw away waste and ashes, or else it would starve or be poisoned.

"The cells take care of all that. They rig up a wonderful arrangement so that the mother's heart shall drive the food around thousands of hollow pyramids in which the baby's blood is circulating, and so bring both oxygen and food, and carry away waste exactly as you saw it in the lymph follicles, and in the hair tubes or capillaries. Mother's life is the baby's life for all those long months. Think of what we all owe our mothers—debts that we can never repay. These look like this." (See picture.)

Lesson for November 6

AMOS PLEADS FOR JUSTICE

LESSON TEXT—Amos 5:1-27.
GOLDEN TEXT—Let judgment run down as waters and righteousness as a mighty stream.
PRIMARY TOPIC—Treating Everybody Right.
JUNIOR TOPIC—The Kind of Man God Hears.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—A Squaring for God Against the Crowd.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Conditions of Divine Approval.

I. Israel's Desolation Predicted (vv. 1-3).
Amos lamented over the doom which was to overtake the nation. Israel is called a virgin because she had never been subdued by any foreign nation (see Isa. 23:12). Her fall is to rise no more sets forth the utter desolation and helplessness to which the Assyrians subjected the nation. From this captivity Israel never returned. Those who came back from the Babylonian captivity were largely from Egypt.

II. The Call to Return to God.
God through the prophet says, "seek ye me and ye shall live." The implication is that while the divine judgments are not executed, an opportunity is offered for them to turn to God. In their turning to God they were to renounce:
1. Idolatry (vv. 5, 6).
They were to turn away from the places of idolatry—Bethel, Gilgal and Beersheba. God's judgment was to strike these places.

If they would not come to Him for life He would be their destroyer. "Our God is a consuming fire." The only one who can give life to those who seek Him is the one who shall destroy.
2. Cease to pervert judgment (v. 7).
"Turn judgment to wormwood" implies the bitterness of the perversion of justice to the injured.
3. Cease to de throne righteousness. "Leaving off righteousness" is thought to mean that unrighteousness was allowed to take its place. In this third exhortation the Lord's name is given with the following statement of some of His works:
Y. "Maketh the seven stars and Orion," 2. "Turneth the shadow of death into morning," 3. "Maketh the day dark with night," 4. "Callieth for the waters of the sea and poureth them out upon the earth," both in rain and deluge; 5. "Strengtheneth the spoil against the strong."

III. The Sins Committed by the Wicked Nation (vv. 10-13).
1. They hated the Judge who condemned their wicked practices (v. 10).
2. They abhorred him that spoke uprightly (v. 10).
This most likely referred to the prophets themselves who told them of their sins and urged uprightness of life.

3. They trampled upon the poor (v. 11).
The rich built magnificent houses out of the proceeds extorted from the poor.
4. They afflicted the just (v. 12).
This they did by taking a bribe.
5. They turned aside the poor in the gate (v. 12).
Because they had no money the poor were turned aside.
It was most difficult for the poor to get justice. The times were so evil that the prudent would best keep silence.

IV. The Conduct of the Righteous (vv. 14, 15).
No condition in the world, religious, social or political can become so difficult that the righteous are shut off from help. The righteous can:
1. Seek God (v. 14).
Those who seek good shall have with them the Lord God of Hosts.
2. Hate the evil (v. 15).
Evil must be hated. The sin question must be settled before God can bestow His blessings.

3. Establish judgment in the gate.
It was the custom in that day for the courts of justice to sit in the gate of the city. The prophet urges upon them the responsibility to place honorable men in charge of public affairs.
V. The Judgment to Fall (vv. 16-20)
There is coming a day of retribution. Justice and right shall be vindicated. This will be realized in the day of the Lord (II Thess. 1:7-10; James 5:7). All wrong shall be righted at that time. May we earnestly pray, "thy kingdom come."

VI. Worship Without Holiness of Life an Abomination to God (vv. 21-27).
Sacrifices, observance of feast days and singing, when the heart is out of fellowship with God, is most displeasing to Him.

Two Different Things
The love of God and the world are two different things. If the love of this world dwell in thee, the love of God forsakes thee; renounce that, and receive this; it is fit that the nobler love should have the best place and acceptance.

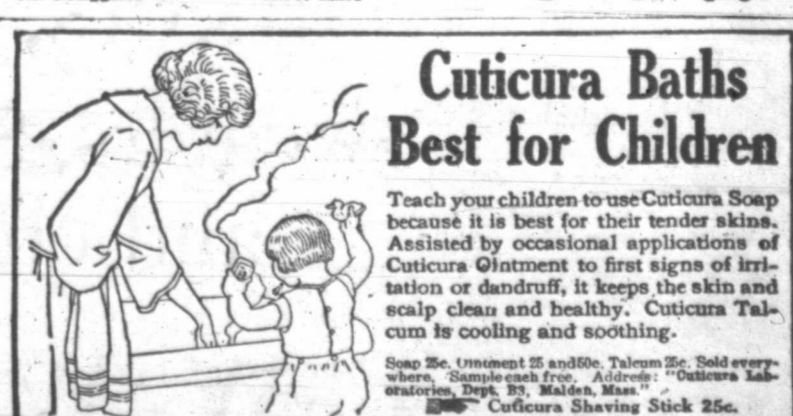

Listen, business man who is interested in out witting these "super-intelligent" fellows, Psychology is as much yours as it is theirs. You can use it just as effectively as the other fellow can. And you are making a serious mistake when you blame folks when they patronize the catalogue, the street salesman and the "popcorn man". They are not to be blamed. Give a few minutes to the study of the psychology of the thing. You, too, are as much governed by these effects as any one else. Organize yourselves into a merchants association increasing your purchasing power so as to sell to the consumer at a better retail price, and get your business and merchandise right before the eyes of the folks like the mail order house does; mix a little of the street salesman's audacity with your honesty; some of the "popcorn" man's energy with your hard work and long hours, and see the difference.

The Herald is a strong believer in pavement, but we should like to have some of it on our own streets.
