## Farm Industry As Seen On A Real Farm

Mr. H. M. Murphy whose farm home is about seven miles southwest of Hermleigh is, from what is seen on his farm and about his place, a farmer after whom many should pattern. He practices diversification on the farm, both saving the soil and making him money. His barn is filled with feed prepared most scientifically. He has a feed grinder and this year has ground peanut hay and has produced one of the best cow feeds which could be had. Other feeds have in like manner been prepared.  
Mrs. Murphy has her large poultry out-let covered with chickens, guineas and turkeys. Their dairy lots are filled with splendid dairy cows and they have one of the finest blooded Jersey males in the country. Their horse lots are filled with good horses and mules, and they have one 'blue ribbon' colt. They have lots and patches for hogs and have them well stocked with good hogs.  
The Murphy's have everything around them except a lot of worn-out automobiles. The reporter while out on this farm was especially impressed with this observation. High priced automobiles are ruining the country, and against this Mr. Murphy seems to have guarded himself, from what is seen about his farm home.

## County Graders to Start Terracing Dec. the 1st.

Last season the County Commissioners Court cooperating with the County Agent conducted several experiments constructing terraces with the large caterpillar tractors and graders which are generally used on the road. The work that was done proved very satisfactory and economical. The machines were capable of building four to five miles of terraces per day at cost per acre 25 to 60 cts. The machines construct a good type of terrace, do it quickly, and efficiently. Terraces ordinarily cost \$.25 per acre to construct and they have always paid a high rate of interest on the money invested in them. At the Government Experiment Station at Spur terraced land paid \$8.00 more per acre than land with very little drain on the first picking of cotton. There are many examples in the county where terraces paid an almost unreasonable dividend on the investment. There are examples of this kind in almost every community and if a man is dubious of the value of terraces he should carefully investigate the results; he will be well repaid for the time he spends in this manner. Communities that have done the most in this line are: Pleasant Hill, Canyon and Camps Springs.

The Commissioners Court has agreed to turn the tractors over to the people for this work on December the first and they will begin at this time if enough work can be secured to keep them busy.

At the present time all of the county grading machines are at Snyder excepting the machinery for the Northwest precinct which is at Fluvanna, and it is definitely decided to start work in this precinct in the Fluvanna community. The grader for the Northeast precinct will start on the O. P. Thrane farm at the outskirts of Snyder. No plans have been made for the other graders as starters, excepting that it is planned to start at town and work toward the community requesting the greatest amount of this work.

Due to the amount of interest that is bound to develop when this work begins it will be necessary to follow certain rules, also this is necessary because the expense of moving this machinery is so great that this work will not be considered on widely separated farms.

It will be necessary for a community to block as much as one section for terracing with this machinery in order to be considered, excepting certain farms that should be in the direct path of the machine in moving from one community to another.

The minimum construction on terraces will be left to the judgment of the county agent, and in no case will this machinery be used were this is not agreed to.

In every case the grader crews will handle the machinery and do

**Which is the Best Way Out?**

The commercial safty of our people at large lies in our ability to properly educate them. The rural and small town schools where the largest percent of our people live are inadequate, they are not furnishing the educational advantages needed for the protection of our children at large. Our inability to support our local schools is not due to any shortage of money on the part of our people at large, for our government is worth approximately \$320,000,000,000. But where then does the trouble lie? It lies in the fact that our money is pulled too largely toward the larger centers. When we do all our trading in some large city what can we expect but to enrich them and improvish ourselves?

Too us this condition is absolutely haunting. The uneducated are a prey to the greed and graft of the bigger business interests of the country. We are slaves and peons when the actual conditions are know. And who is to blame? Let us see. If the retail profit on every article of merchandise bought by the people with in reach of the Hermleigh high school were put into taxable form so as to be within the reach of our school, what would be the result in favor of educational adavantages for our children? Reader, think this over. We do not claim to be experts in this line, but the principle of this we submit to you for your consideration.

While we are talking about the consequences of commercialism we may say: so long as corn whiskey can be sold at \$12.00 per gallon and made for less than \$2.00 per gallon, the prohibition law will be hard to inforce. We presume only the wealthy drink it, a poor man could not afford it at this price. So long as it comes that high, the editor will live a sober life.

Now there is another side of this thing. If some out of town man is coming into our town and robbing our people by selling them this high priced stuff and carrying the money out of town, this townsman is going to get him if he can, in protection of the commercial interests of his people, if for no other reason.

Messrs Tom Cryer and F. O. Tefertiller of Blackwell, Texas were in Hermleigh Tuesday. These men are interested in locating a business here if things look favorable to them.

**Standardized Cotton Works In Limestone Co.**

Mexia, Texas, Nov. 26 Improvement of the staple of Limestone County cotton was worth \$100,000 in two years to the farmer in better prices, according to E. L. Crow, Mexia, and Reuben Schaff, Groesbeck, cotton buyers who have issued statement praising the campaign started by P. G. Haines county agent.

Because of short staple local markets were forced to take from 100 to 150 points off the market as a basis, while now often the basis is from 25 to 50 points on the market. Improvement of

the average length of cotton from the old average of 8-1 to 15-16 of an inch to one inch and better has been accomplished.

Mr. Hains, through the Chamber of Commerce and other organizations, started a campaign for staple cotton. Many farmers joined the movement and their number was increased this year. Mr. Haines is now urging the intire county to plant staple cotton of a standard variety, declaring the movement a profitable one for the farmer. Small markets which sell short staple cotton on the average length penalize the farmer growing longer staple. If all farmers plant staple cotton it would be worth hundreds of thousands of dollars to them every year. Mr. Haines said.

**A Short Sermon.**

Text: "It is written, Man should not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God." That man is a moral being could not be stated in fewer words. These words were uttered by our Lord while He was in

the wilderness of temptation. His animal nature had been appealed to strongly, but there was another side to His nature—He was moral.

In addition to being animals made of dust, we are moral-made in God's emage. Religion is the law of the moral life just like self preservation is the law of the physical life. And if the

church fails to perform its duty down comes the standard of our American ideals. The care of the moral side of our nature and the protection of our society is the church's task, if she fails to perform this duty it will be a sad day for our society. Among our Lord's last words are these: "If the light that is in thee be darkness, how great is that darkness!"

Once a woman was carried to our Lord accused of adultery by those of another social group. He was willing that she be tried on the charge and punished for the offense, but suggested that the jury be composed of those who themselves were without faults. "Let him who is without sin among you cast the first stone."

This incident involves a principle. The principle is this: men who realize their own imperfections can not press charges against others. A man is not fitted as a bill collector who owes every body himself; the extortioner has no moral right to condemn the thief; the man who hates another has no moral right to condemn the murderer; the moderate 'dram-drinker' has no moral right to condemn the drunkard, and men who drink 'bee-gum-booze' have no moral right to condemn the 'boot-legger.'

The only salvation for American society is for church and fraternal folk to straiten their own lives out and then enforce the law on others. We are expending all our energies in search of money and a good time and are neglecting the most essential thing—good morals. "This we should do, and not leave the other undone."

**Lesson for December 4.**

**ISAIAH TEACHES RIGHT LIVING**

LESSON TEXT—Isa 6:1-22. GOLDEN TEXT—Pure religion and undefiled before God, and the Father is this, to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction and to keep himself unspotted from the world. PRIMARY TOPIC—How to Please God. JUNIOR TOPIC—A Life That Pleases God. INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—A Life That Pleases God. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Elements of Right Living.

I. Israel, the Favored Nation (vv. 1-7). Their unique relation to God is presented under the figure of a vineyard. Observe:

1. God's peculiar favor (vv. 1, 2). God did for this nation what He did for no other nation in the history of the world. He evidenced it when He assigned the boundaries of Israel's inheritance (see Num. 34:1-13).

He gathered out the stones when the Canaanites were exterminated. The choicest vine which was planted therein was the Israelitish nation which had gone through the disciplinary process in Egyptian bondage. He built a tower in it when under David Jerusalem was made its capital city.

2. The obligation of the nation (v. 2).

The purpose of a vineyard is to bear fruit. The object of the husbandman in planting a vineyard and nurturing it is that it might bear fruit. The purpose of God in the selection and the blessing of the Israelitish nation was that it might bring forth fruit to His glory.

3. It bore only wild grapes (v. 4).

4. The de-olation of the vineyard (vv. 5-7).

Since all efforts had been wasted, the owner of the vineyard now resolves to abandon it to the wild beasts of the forest.

II. The Sins Which Brought Ruin to the Nation (vv. 8-23).

The causes of this destruction are presented under six woes, each woe pronounced against a particular sin.

1. Monopoly and oppression of the poor (vv. 8-10).

The crime against which the first woe was denounced is that of the avaricious grasping after property which leads to the accumulation of wealth in the hands of the few. "Joining house to house" and "laying field to field" means the sin of the greedy monopolist who in the agricultural districts takes the form of the land grabber, in the commercial centers, the form of the big men crushing out the small ones.

2. Dissipation (vv. 11-17).

The sin here denounced is drunkenness. Several features are connected with this one sin.

(1) Drinking made the life business of some (v. 11). They get up early and continue until late at night, until their whole being is inflamed.

(2) The effort to give their hellish business a show of refinement (v. 12). This is why pleasing music is heard pouring forth from the dens of infamy over our land.

(3) Blindness to God's warnings and judgments (v. 12). Their drinking and dissipation rendered them insensible to the dealings of Providence.

(4) God's judgments for such sins (vv. 13-17). They went into captivity. The immediate cause assigned is ignorance, but it is a willful ignorance for which they are held responsible. They not only go into captivity, but there is great mortality among those who drink (v. 14). The records everywhere show a much higher death rate among drinking men. Drinking degrades all classes (v. 15). The country itself was made a waste (vv. 13, 19). So daring do they become that they defy the judgments of the Almighty (v. 19).

3. Moral confusion (v. 20).

This woe is pronounced against those who try to adjust moral conditions to suit their sensual appetites.

4. Conceit (v. 21).

The fifth woe is pronounced against the sin of self-conceit. Many today have become so affected by sin that they are unable to make moral discriminations. Having a false estimate of their own wisdom they plan and act without reference to God.

5. Perversion of justice (vv. 22, 23).

The sixth woe is denounced against those who are in places of justice as judges. Because of their lack of moral discrimination, and because of desire for temporal gain they cause justice to miscarry.
