Work on Water System Nearing Completion

The work on the City Water Works is almost completed, and it will not be long, so we are informed, until the people of Hermleigh will be using water from a system of which any town of this size, or indeed much larger than this, could well be proud. Practically all of the machinery for the pumping system has arrived and will soon be installed, except the well pump, which was delayed on the way here, but which is expected to arrive in the near future.

The mains have been laid into the greater part of the town, and will soon be in readiness for the water to be turned into them. The tank, too, is all completed, with the exceptions mentioned.

Proposed Extension to Hard Surfaced Road

Judge Ely, of the State Highway Commission, will be in Snyder and Hermleigh some time this week in the interest of good roads in Scurry county. Already our county has a hard surfaced road across the county with the exception of the distance from Hermleigh to the Nolan county line. This county has agreed to hard surface that part of the road that is in their limits if we do our part and meet them at the line.

This road is a very important one, being not only a state Highway, but also a connecting link between the Dal-Paso highway on the north and the Broadway of America on the South, and should get much of the traffic from each. Hermleigh is fortunately located in a position to benefit from this double traffic.

The approximate cost of this road is \$45,000. This will complete the road, and of this the state pays two dollars to each one dollar the county spends. In other words the road will cost Scurry county \$15,000 and the state \$30,000.

County Agent Willis Organizes Boys' Club

County Agent C. C. Willis, of Snyder, was in Hermleigh Tuesday afternoon and met with the boys of the school here to organize a 4-H club. Some thirty or thirty-five of the school boys joined the club, and the interest that is already manifest prophesies a club that will be very beneficial to the members.

At this, the initial meeting for this year, officers were elected to serve for the year. Buster Gardner was chosen president; Ira Sturdivant, vice-president; Terrel Bowlin, secretary; Horace Crumley, sergeant-at-arms; and Luke Barbour, guide. Some of these boys were in the club that was formed here last year, and have the advantage of the knowledge thus gained to aid them in the fulfillment of their duties.

The purpose of this club is generally known. It is a school of scientifically practical farming and stock raising, etc., and teaches its members "to do" by doing all the different items that come under the head of diversified farming. The fundamentals taught are those that have been tried and found to be the most efficient means to glean the greatest amount of profit from poultry, hogs, cattle and farming, and this with the greatest economy at all times.

In other places there has already been shown the value of these boys clubs. Boys have made money in very surprising amounts even while learning the principles taught; have earned free trips to the Texas A. & M., Dallas and other points that have been invaluable to the ones who were skilled enough to win them. Hermleigh boys have the opportunity that other boys have, and in that group of thirty-five members, there may be material for some of these trips. Parents are urged to co-operate with their boys in this club work and do what they can to help this great work.

Now the city election has passed and things are beginning to simmer back to their normal state, there is but one thing on which the common mind should be bent. That is not the strife that has gone nor the strife that might come in the days that are ahead, but it is the growth and upbuilding of Hermleigh. Regardless of whether one won or lost, and regardless of one's feeling of the matter, the welfare of our town demands that all prejudice be cast aside and that the citizenship work with but one thought—to make Hermleigh the best town possible.

A person of some official authority has told us that he believed Hermleigh to have the possibilities to enable it to build to a town of twenty-five hundred people, and that in a very short time. Others have made similar prophecies. But, whether or not one soul is added to the population of Hermleigh within the next five years, there is no reason why our little city cannot enjoy the same conveniences and advantages that other towns of not much greater size than Hermleigh, enjoy. We have the country, both in size of territory and in fertility of farm land; we have the farmers in that territory as progressive as is found in our state; we have the opportunities, and, yes, we have the progressive citizenship, which, combined in the common interest, are the essential forces necessary to build a good town. Hermleigh is a town of the future—a good town today, but a better town tomorrow.

**C. F. Sentell in
Race For County Judge**

Snyder, Texas,

To the people of Scurry County:
I hereby announce as a candidate for County Judge of Scurry County subject to the action of the Democratic Primary.

I appreciate the interest of the many friends who have asked me to run and I thank them and all whose good will I have to this end.

The office of county judge is important in the county, and a county judge should have definite ideas as to his duties and policies in the office.

The office belongs to the people, and as county judge, if elected, I shall always render the best service possible. The law requires many duties of the county judge, and I desire to mention some of the most important, to-wit: as to county finances, as to roads, as to judge in the trial of cases, as to probate proceedings, as to taxation. These are all important.

If elected, it shall be my policy to put the county on a cash basis as far as possible. About the only way for the county judge to do this without raising the taxes is not to spend the people's money when not absolutely necessary, and I am opposed to the policy of higher taxes every year. We need economy in public office, and I propose to practice it. As a policy I am opposed to the county going into what should be private business. I believe in economical, sound progress.

As to roads, I was raised working roads where they had to be worked much, both by hand and machinery, and I think I realize the need and value of it. I shall do my best to provide equally good roads to all alike. This is fair and right, and I shall cooperate with the commissioners court in every way possible that this may be done. We should have more money from the state on our county roads and highways, and that I shall try to get.

The trial of cases in court is very important. Delays and inefficiency are very expensive, both to the litigants and to the county. Our courts were established for the fair and speedy adjudication of the rights of the people, and they have the right to have them settled according to law, fairly and quickly. Much of the lack of respect for law and our courts, we all know, is caused by the inefficiency of the courts of the country. It shall be my aim to conduct the county court with economy, dispatch and fairness, and for the practical benefit of the people and not for the convenience of the lawyers. This can and should be done.

There is no duty more important, probably, than that of probate proceedings. It has so much to do with legal proceedings in settling estates of heirs and usually of minor children. This is a technical branch of the law, and I believe that I can be counted upon to do my duty in this important phase of the county judge's work.

As to taxation, I shall use my influence to keep taxes down, and to keep them as low as is consistent with the actual and necessary requirements for the best interests of all the people of the county. Wherever progress can be made in any line for the good of the county, I am for it, but we should always count the cost and know where the people's money is going and what it is going for. The dewalk builder said: that he was fond of little children, but he liked them in the abstract and

not in the concrete. I believe in progress, but when the people are asked to pay the bill by voting bonds or otherwise, I want the proposition given to them in the concrete, so to speak, and not in the abstract. The people have a right to know definitely what their money is to be spent for.

Another important duty of the county judge should be to have published, as provided by law, itemized financial statements of the county expenditures, so that the people may know what their money is spent for. I think that the people want it. They are entitled to it, and I believe it will arouse interest in county affairs and in efficiency and qualifications in the election of officers generally. It will do good.

I was raised on a farm and worked my way even in high school and in college, and I am naturally for the working man, and I suppose that includes all of Scurry County. We are all alike here, and no group is better than another. When I was a country boy and went to the town school, it was the rule to have to fight the town boy, but I am glad that day is gone. There is not any line of difference now and never should have been. I shall always help to promote good will and co-operation among our people, for that is the foundation stone of our governmental, social, educational, commercial and religious advancement—it is progress itself.

With fairness to all and special favors to none, if elected I shall bend every effort to these ends, and I earnestly solicit the support of every citizen of Scurry county. It is my intention to see every voter during the campaign.

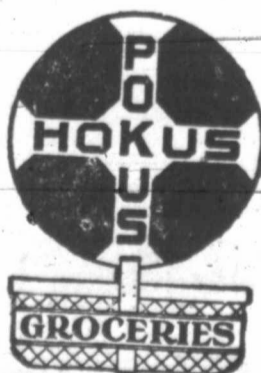
