Scurry County Institution Worth \$100,000 And Still Growing

Among the business institutions of the county which are growing with the county is the Strayhorn Motor company of Snyder. The progress of this great business is well space with the progress of Scurry county and West Texas at large. At the present it occupies a floor space of 130x160. This space is divided into five different apartments.

First among the apartments, of course, is the office room which occupies a large space in the southwest corner of the building which is to the front. Just behind this apartment and in the west section is the Parts Room. In this room is to be found any and all parts of a Ford car, truck or Fordson. The arrangement of this stock is the outgrowth of years of study on the part of expert parts men.

To the front on the east side is the big display room. This room is about 100x120 feet. To the back of this room on the north is the shop room. This apartment of itself is a big thing. To the rear of the main building is the paint shop. This shop is perfectly unique. There is no need to leave the county for any thing in the way of automobile repairing or repainting.

In all, this big concern covers nearly a half of a block. The capital stock is nearly \$100,000.

CLUB PRIZES WANTED

The boy raising the first prize registered or grade Jersey heifer—the best baby beef fed in the county.

What would be considered good prizes—

Pigs, Chickens, Lambs, Setting Eggs, Calves, Merchandise, chicks at the very reasonable rate of 10 cents for larger breeds and 8 cents for the Leghorns. This offer is made to the club boys and girls that are going to take and raise them themselves and not to the parents of club boys and girls who would take advantage of this rate through them. Also to boys and girls that will not have the money to buy chicks at this price, Mr. Green will make a special offer. Mr. Green by adopting this policy has made it possible for any club boy or girl in the county to win money, and Scholarships or trips to the A. & M. College, Dallas Fair, Fort Worth Stock Show. The boys have to be started some day, and isn't this the very best way to start them? Isn't this the side of a boys life that needs some encouragement?

The road surface needs attention at this time, and now is the time for us to get behind our commissioners' court and stimulate them in this needed effort. The road leading from the county seat to Roby is worthy of county wide consideration and which will no doubt be taken into consideration.

Scurry county is among the progressive counties of the state and we shall certainly want to

make ourselves equal to our reputation in attendance at this important meeting. This meeting is more important than one might think just casually. Hard surface roads are our greatest assets these days. With the completion of the plans now under consideration, Scurry county will open her gates wide to the inspection of the great touring public of the day. We have an agricultural advantage of which we are justly proud, and we want to invite the general public to see it. Open roads are the means of the county's gates to the traveling public.

Hermleigh, Pyron and Inadale are to be especially benefited by the short extension on this road and the re-surfacing of it north across the county. 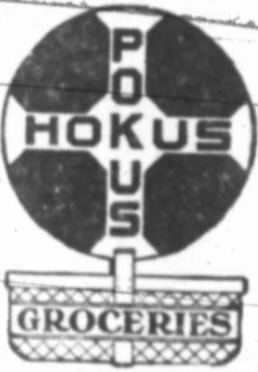

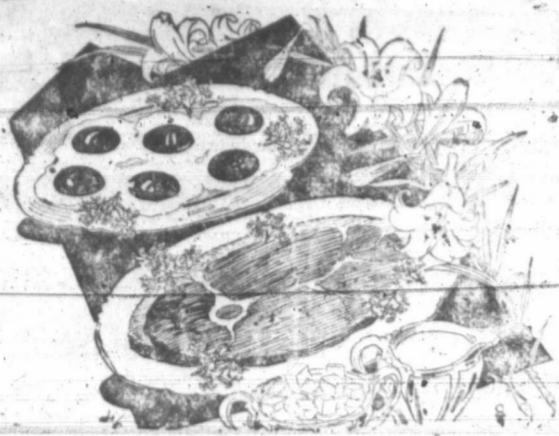
