Farmer Slain, Body Is Hidden

(Special to The Dallas News)
Colorado, Texas, April 15. - Earnest Hardin, 42, a farmer living near Inadale, twenty miles northeast of here, was found dead Sunday hidden under a bridge at the southeast edge of Colorado. The body was discovered by some small boys who were fishing. His skull was crushed, showing that he had been hit with some heavy object. His head and neck showed three deep knife wounds, with minor cuts in other parts of the body.

Indications were that the body had been thrown under the bridge from an automobile, blood stains showing that it had been dragged from the road to the edge of the embankment and thrown over.

Hardin, who lived on the Ohlenbush farm, rode to Inadale Saturday afternoon with neighbors leaving them there with the announced purpose of going to Roscoe, catching a ride on the highway.

The body was identified here Sunday by Mr. and Mrs. D. Land filling station owners as one of four men that were in their station at Loraine at 9:30 Saturday night. Land says the men were on foot. No clue as to the identity of the other three men has been discovered, although Land says their faces were familiar, and he thought they lived near Loraine. A brother, John Hardin, said the slain man had from \$15 to \$30 on his person, none of which was found.

Hardin is survived by his wife and six children.

The boys in Hermleigh are not like the boys were in our boyhood days. Either this is true or there are not nearly so many dogs as there were then. We can remember when it was a hard thing to find a tin can. They had all been tied to the tail of a dog and scattered to the four winds of the earth. If all the stray dogs in Texas were brought to Hermleigh and a tin can tied to the tail of each one of them there would still be cans left on our streets. Now we realize we are talking about "a big lot of cans", and we know we are not far from right in our statement, are we? What do you think, Sir, Man?

Since we have been here and

have been incessantly looking at tin cans, we have often wondered how they all came to be so nearly in the same state of decay and nearly all of them flat; they have the appearance of having been here for a long time and of having been run over with some kind of crusher. Had you noticed them? They are all just as flat! We venture the assertion that a good "stepper" could walk all over the town site without touching the ground, if he should take care to step on a tin can.

From a sanitary standpoint, tin cans should not be allowed to accumulate on your premises, back alleys, or elsewhere, as tin cans breed mosquitoes and these dangerous pests breed disease.

Say, folks, why not have a "Tin Can Day" rally and clean these things away? If these "little rusty flat things" are not offensive to the eye, it is only because the eye has been toughened to it. Every time a fellow steps out with the view of doing something worth while, he steps on the edge of a tin can and it flies up and hits him on the "shin" and his good motive is instantly turned to raging temper. No wonder there are "fighting within and fears without." Think this over.

We are not good Americans, much less Christians, if we can not bear with our neighbors in their peculiar views, yea, even in their short comings. We are not perfect individuals, but we are the best the country affords. Education offers no solution to our problems. Educated folk are 'cranky' too. Some times they are worse than anybody.

Tradition reports Hiram Abiff to have said to King Solomon on the evening before the work on the ancient Temple began: "Wise King Solomon, your plans can not be carried into effect. Nothing can be erected or instituted which can stand the storms of all ages. Men of strange ideas are being born into the world faster than they can be educated to any one idea." The above quotation is remarkable. The lack of ability to educate all our people to any one idea has caused the waste of literally thousands of dollars and many episodes of progress. To the one end, common education, the great Masonic Order was instituted.

But for lack of common edu-

cation (we do not mean by common education, a common school education) history should not be filled with reports of the rise and fall of great empires. Common education is ability to see all the common problems of life in the same way. The Bible expression "until we all come to a knowledge of the truth," is about the most appropriate one we are able to recall to mind at this time.

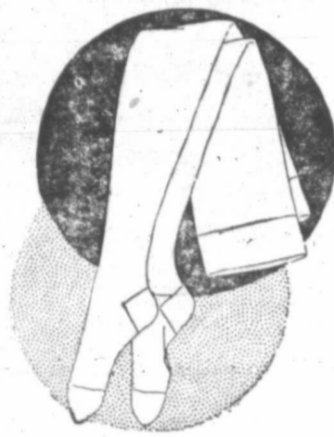

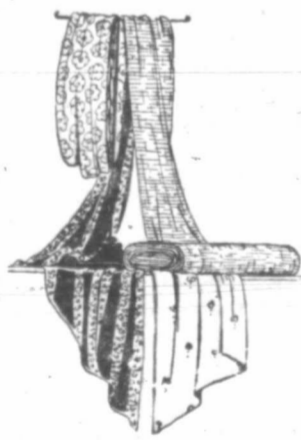
