WOMEN OF COUNTY INTERESTED IN GOOD LIBRARY

The Ladies Clubs of Snyder reported by the Lion's Club working hard with the view of establishing a county library. The proposed plan is to have the body of the library at the court house and have smaller units at every other community center. The supply of books for each unit will be determined by the demand of place for books. Snyder will have the library proper. Hermleigh will have the next greatest unit and, etc.

An extra Tax of only 5 cts on the \$100.00 property valuation will be required to make this possible. The average citizen will not buy books for their homes at what this will cost them. An experienced Librarian will have to be employed, but this can possibly be handled in connection with the County Clerk's office, thus reducing the cost of operation.

A committee of representative citizens from over the county will be appointed to serve in connection with the selection of these books, according to the proposed plans. The women of the county, led by Mrs. James, earnestly pray that they may have the influence of the citizenship of the county brought to bear on the Commissioner's Court in connection with every thing which they can possibly do. A county library would be a wonderful asset to the people of the county.

According to the proposed plan in the tax (just a nickle on the \$100.00) the man who pays tax on a \$1,000.00 residence, would be getting the benefits of the whole library for little more than the cost of a good book. The suggestion to raise in tax, however little it may be, is a hard thing; but it has been carefully thought out and is submitted for consideration.

COMMON HONESTY CONSIDERED ASSET NO LONGER

It is a lamentable fact to-day that every man is judged by the amount of money he makes. He must be a good trader and make lots of money or he must be a 'skimping miser' and save it. By the latter process he starves society to death. Character, integrity, honesty, usefulness and ability have been buried beneath the rubbish of "How much money-do you have?" The dollar is king. Character and useful ability, as a possession, are no longer considered assets. The man of character, and of ability which is not used in the making of money (a man is not a smart man, the world thinks, if he can not make money), is placed in a chemical test with the man of means and is given a secondary place.

Greed and graft have totally ruined the moral of our people. The 'know all men by the presents' has developed a condition which has been considered business' safety, but of late "Major-Graft" and Late Invention" have proven themselves its master. Robert Babson said a few years ago, "The safety of our people depends more upon the teachings of common honesty than it does upon the building of steel vaults and boxes." A common thief to-day can take an acetylene torch and within a very few minutes burn his way into any steel vault or safe. Metal will yield to the influence of fire. Some of the best minds in America to-day are given wholly over to the study of schemes to make robbery and theft safe and successful. Accomplish this? yes, they will accomplish it. They are already doing it. The late robbery at Campbell, Texas is an example. Can this be stopped? no; it will grow worse and worse as the immediate days go by. No safety any more.

Let us suppose a case. Two men, brothers may we say, start out into life. The one chooses to accumulate wealth. The other chooses to build character and render his fellow men useful service. Three score and ten years pass by, and they must each occupy 'six feet of earth'. Who is the winner? Whose life has counted for the most? Read Dicken's Scrooge and Marley. There is a perfect picture of what we are talking about. The famous picture shown at the New Queen Theatre recently, is another perfect example.

What sensible man is there among us who has character which only years of careful living can build, and ability which only nature can bequeath, two things which no thief can rob us of, would dare exchange them for filthy lucre. When society is thrown into the hands of those whose whole attention is given to the making of money, the result will be just hordes of wealth and no character.

The men whose hands the safety of our society rests are largely men of limited means. The great masses of our people

HERMLEIGH MAN MAKING GOOD WITH HATCHERY

Mr. H. H. Clements, one and one half miles west of town is a poultry genius. He has designed, constructed, and set into operation all the necessary machinery for hatching and caring for chickens. His machines perform as perfectly as any high priced incubator on the market. Clements is a natural lover of chickens and his mechanical inclinations lie in the way of hatchery equipments.

In a cellar dug for that purpose he now operates two home made incubators each of which will hold about 1800 eggs. His tests have proven an 80 per cent efficient hatch, he says. His chicks are as stout and good as the best, according to reports of them. Last Friday one of the machines turned out near 1400 fine chicks.

Mr. Clements has been at work at this project for about three years. He plans by this fall, to perfect his hatchery on a 12,000 egg bases. He also plans to supply the demands of the community with the purest breed of chickens to be had.

The town ought to get behind this and encourage its development.

WISE AND UNWISE WEATHER PREDICTIONS

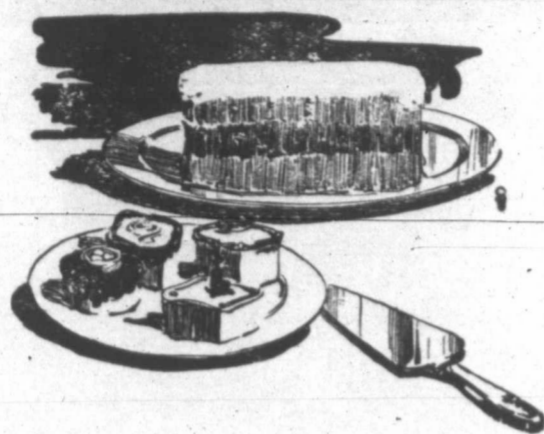

DUNN MAN NAMED IN CONSTRUCTION WORK

Commissioner Johnston and J. A. (Bay) Dunn of the Dunn Community were in Hermleigh a few minutes Monday. It was an interesting occasion when we met Mr. Dunn. His father settled in what is now known as the Dunn community in the early day of '89, when Bay was but a boy. The Community there grew up around him, his hands shaping the growth of everything. Johnston says that the name of A. T. Dunn is engraved in the foundation of everything in the Dunn community. All the land marks bear it; the creek banks are stamped with it; the road beds are underlaid with it; the head of what may some day become the city of Dunn is resting upon it, and the heart throbs of the people now living there resound the very music of his voice.

The Dunn post office, Masonic Lodge, the town and all the churches including the beautiful edifice now being erected there, are named for the great character of A. T. Dunn. Mr. Dunn died in 1905, being Commissioner in precinct 4 at the time of his death. His bachelor son, J. A., is a prominent citizen of the city at this time. I can not be in sympathy with any organization which condemns the foreign born young men of Seguin and New Braunfels, Tex., with whom I served in the late war. I do not believe there are any more patriotic people in the United States than these fine young men.

I believe it the duty of a peace officer to keep down disturbance if he can, if he can not I believe he should go forward in discharge of his duty even if it takes the hide, hurting like the dickens. I believe he should be loyal to his superiors--the people of this county and the oath of his office.

Now my dear people, do not rush out and pledge your support to the first man you see. It is your solemn duty to make investigations. If there is no close personal relationship to either candidate, the duty of electing the best man for the office rests entirely in your hands.

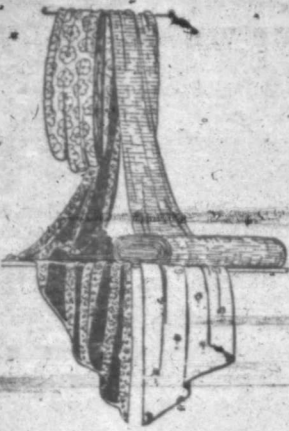

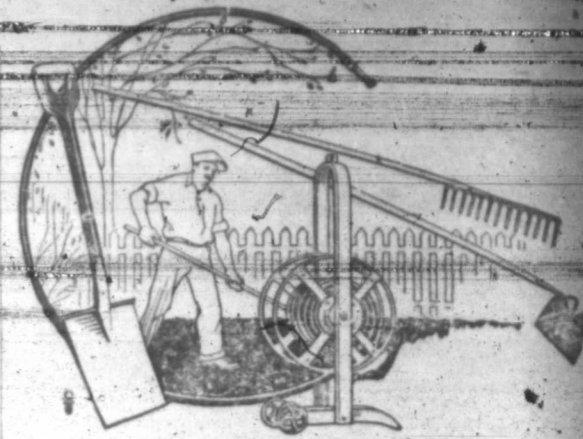
