Tuesday afternoon was the occasion of much rejoicing on the part of inthusiastic citizens of Hermleigh when the new fire truck for the city drove into town. Like the proud young parents rejoice when the first baby is born into the home, so did our forward looking townsmen rejoice when the new truck drove into town. Chief among these were Councilor Joe Roemisch and Mayor Terry.

A large bonfire of pastboard boxes were piled up on a vacant lot and ignited just as the new fire truck drove into town. The alarm was turned in and the volunteer fire boys rushed to the scene reaching the place just as the fire truck arrived. A casual observer couldn't tell but what these volunteer boys were experienced at the job from the rapid progress they made with water hose and fire distinguisher. The fire was extinguished almost at once. After the flame were washed out the hose was turned on the crowd of spectators.

Mayor Terry was the first to get a "wetting". He is well introduced to our new water hose. Banker Rea and the editor were about the next to get an introducor to the new water system.

IF YOU ARE A SOUTHERNER VOTE THE PRINCIPLES OF THE SOUTH

I am an old confederate veteran of 84 years. Ever since the war between the states I have stood squarely for the principle of the South. These principles are bound up in what we call Democracy. The sad scenes and memories of the old "Mason Dixon Line" are thrown on the scene before my eyes every time I think of a Southern man's bolting his political party.

I accord the negro his rights. I would fight for him if need be to defend his right, but I deeply and endelibly distinguish between the negro and my own race. The white man has always been supreme. My old blood boils in me when I think of social equality. I can't bear it.

The prominent government position of Costom Clerly at the New Orleans port is held by a negro and has been all through the Republican administration.

Not only is this true but many other prominent positions are given to the colored man.

Recently two negroes in Harris county decided to demand a right to vote in the Democrat primary. They were refused and carried the matter to the courts of Houston. The case was decided against them there, and it has been appealed to the federal court. A negro attorney is defending them. Now listen, friends, a Republican (all negroes are Republicans) has the same right to become a Democrat and vote that ticket as a Democrat has to become a Republican or vote that ticket. Where is the difference?

How can a Southern man who belongs to a church which is divided over the incidents of the history of the "Mason Dixon Line" violate those principles by voting the policy of the North? "Consistency, thou art a Jewell." The North and the South are divided, divided in principle, and I shall not allow myself dragged into violating those principles of Southern government which I love so much. Be men, strong men. Get above hurtful influence of the demagogue. — J. G. JENKINS.

After this meeting the boys and girls were divided into groups and each group with a leader attended some lecture especially prepared for their use. But lectures did not take up all the day as there was a certain amount of time each day given for rest and amusement and a particular feature was the nearing picture show at night. Interesting lessons, problems solved and comedys were flashed upon the screen for our use and amusement.

presented? Yes, representatives from both the Boys and Girls Clubs were sent.

Terrel Bowlin and Farris Stevenson each won a County Scholarship while Ben Stevenson, Mary Nachlinger and Algee Stevenson won scholarships given by their clubs. Mrs. W. T. Stevenson, local leader for the girls also attended the Short Course. She paid her own way and went with the boys and girls because she said she was interested in knowing what we did while there and what she might do after returned to keep us interested and to help others become interested.

We have a beautiful place for a town site. It is a central location. There are sufficient miles of distance on every side to justify an effort to establish a good town in Hermleigh. There is no question with reference to the agricultural value of the district. The black land divide extends from near Snyder on the north, to Roscoe on the south, leaving Hermleigh but little from the very center of this fine strip of farming country. At this time there is some prospects of oil near us. It is not known just what this will amount to, but a real good agricultural country, supported but little by some other commercial interest, makes a very substantial town and community.

Hermleigh needs better cooperation on the part of our townspeople. We have the cooperation of the rural people. It was said recently by a business man who has recently come here that he has never seen better cooperation on the part of any community of people toward a town than what is seen here on the part of our people. 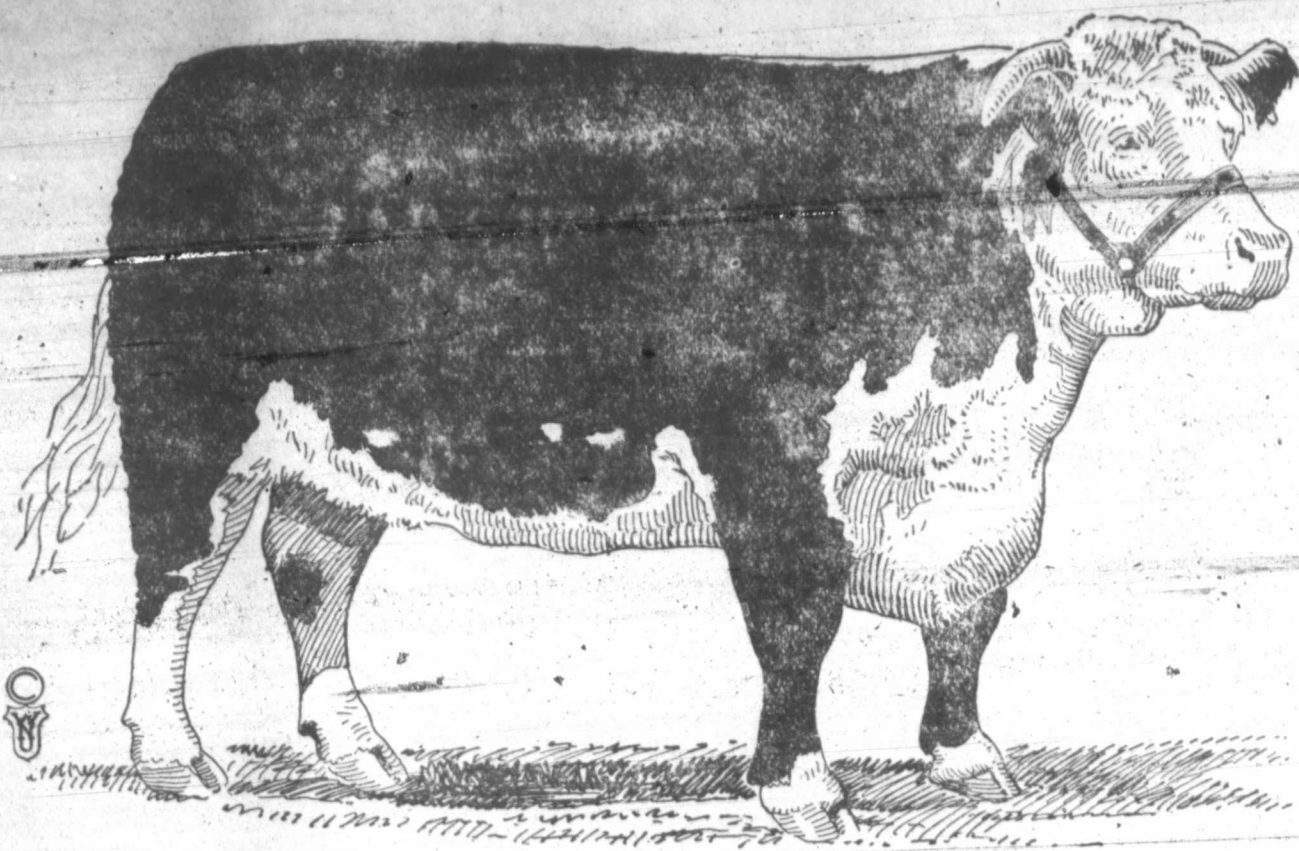

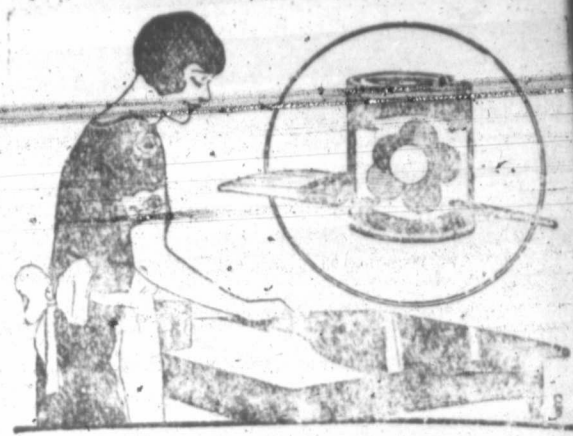
