 kind of cotion that is leing actualy produced This will be the first time this information has been available. The survey of A merican mill requirement is already completed. Already the latest releases give interesting and suggestive figures. For instance. American mills consumed during the year ending July 31st 1928, a total of $6,516,809$ bales of American cotton. Of this amount but 93,849 bales, were of a staple length of $13-16$ and under. This staple is untenderable on contracts, nevertheless there was ginned up to September 28 this year. 98,978 bales of 13-16 inch staple, or 5,000 bales mo:e than the total American mill re-956,181 bales of the date but 956,181 bales of the American less than 1-15 of the total 1928 crop. If the same ratio is main tained for the entire crop, there will be around $1.500,000$ bales of the $13-16$-inch staple or under produced this season. This will leave a surplus of around 1,400 , 000 bales of this inferior staple o disposed of elsewhere. Of he 7 -8-inch staple American of consumed only 28.81 per ct merican farmers so far have turned out 37.26 ner ct of their total ginnings of this staple. American mills require but 30.25 per ct of their total purchase to be 7-8-inch and under, while American farmers are producing 47.61 per ct of their crop of this inferior staple. The mills are demanding 42.21 per ct of their purchases shall be 1 -inch and up ward, while farmers are producing but 23.35 per ct of their crop of this length.-From Farm and Coker.
