Hermleigh Leading Cotton Producer

HERMLEIGH COMMUNITY HAS BEST '29 CROP

While the cotton prospect here is nothing to be elated over, it is perhaps the best anywhere in this country. The county is rather fortunate so far as the cotton crop is concerned, and its best prospects center around this place. The black land is leading in crop production this year.

Surveys have been made out of here reaching far across the country east, west, north, and south and discloses the fact that Hermleigh is well at home, as compared with the rest of the country around. Our crop is short, and the area of it seems to narrow as the weather continues dry. Rain this late in the season might change things greatly, but farmers are no longer depending on this prospect.

The feed crop is short at the very best, and our farmers facing a challenge to make the best of their opportunity. The cotton crop will probably be less than 75 per cent of normal.

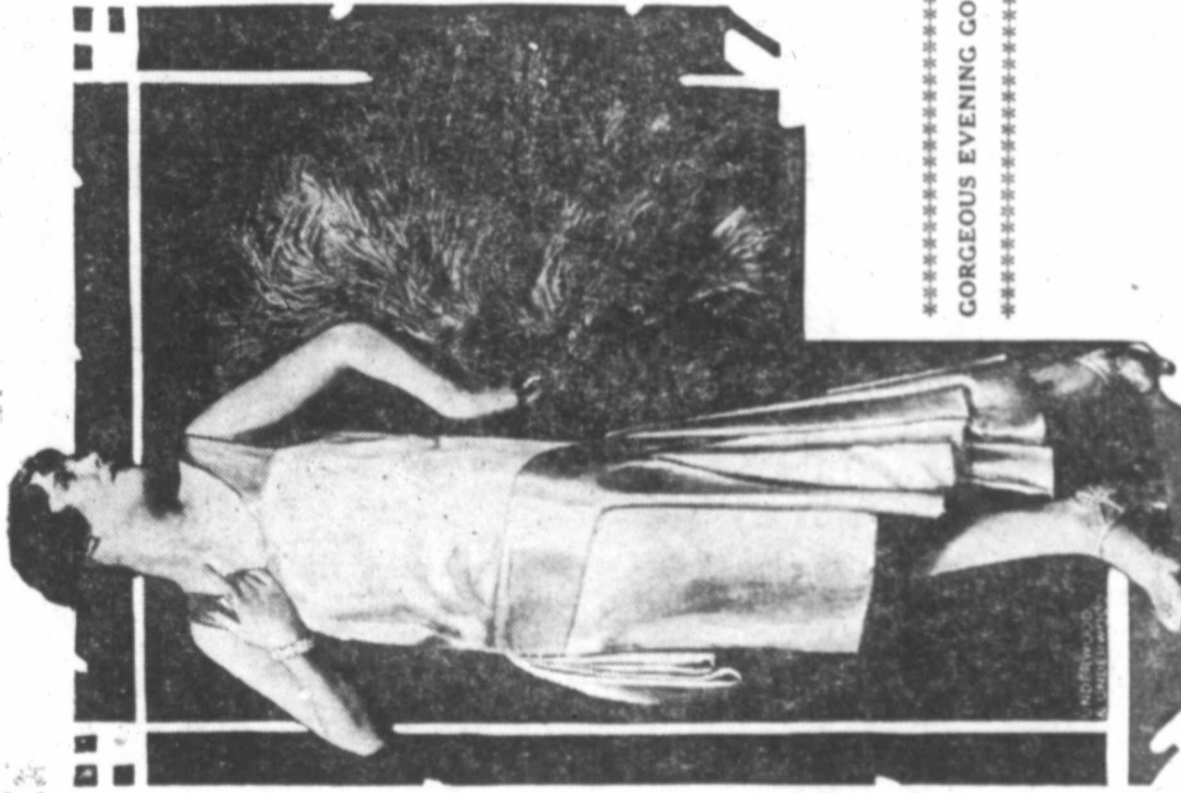

REBUILDING THE TEMPLE

After becoming settled in the towns surrounding Jerusalem, the people were called together for the purpose of establishing the worship of the Lord God. The leaders in this movement were Joshua and the priests, and Zerubbabel, the governor. In view of the fact that the clearing away of the debris of the old city and temple and the erection of the new temple would take a long time, an altar was erected where sacrifices might be offered at once unto God. From this newly erected altar were offered the regular sacrifices commanded by Moses including those of the Feast of Tabernacles (Lev. 23:1-7).

1. The Foundation of the Temple Laid (Ez. 3:8-13)

This was an auspicious occasion and was celebrated with most impressive ceremonies.

E. The priests appeared (v. 10). These garments symbolized their consecration to the Lord's service.

2. The priests with trumpets (v. 10). The trumpets were used in calling together the people.

3. The Levites with cymbals (v. 10). This was according to the arrangement made by David (1 Chron. 15:16-21).

4. They sang together by course (v. 11). This means that they sang to one another responsively. The one company sang, "The Lord is good," the other responded, "For His mercy endureth forever."

5. Mingled weeping and sighing (v. 12, 13). Some of the older men who had seen the magnificent temple of Solomon, which had been destroyed, wept much when they saw how far

**BIG SPRINGS OPENS
NEW AIR PORT**

On September 11-12, the city of Big Spring will dedicate its 230 acre airport which is equipped with two steel hangers, 80 x 100 feet, 60 x 80 feet, machine shop 40 x 60 feet, five room administration building built of tile and stucco, telephone, telegraph and restaurant accommodations and is lighted with border, flood and beacon lights. A program that will be an aid in furthering aviation in Texas has been planned by the general arrangement committee representing the American Legion, Chamber of Commerce, City Commission, County Commissioners, Kiwanis Club, Business Men's Club, Rotary Club, Lions Club and Retail Merchants' Association represented by E. E. Fahrenkamp, R. V. Middleton, C. S. Blomshield, H. O. Timmons, F. R. King, McCall Gary, and Joye Fisher. One of the unique features of entertainment will be a parade to be staged on the morning of the second day illustrating the evolution of transportation showing the primitive modes of travel to the present day, the parade to be ended with decorated floats and automobiles of practically every business firm of the city. The Pathe News service has signified its desire to be here and produce a movietone production of the event. Approximately \$2,000 will be given in premiums for aeronautical maneuverings such as stunt flying, balloon bursting, wing walking, parachute jumping, dummy bomb dropping, spot landing, dead stick landing, and races, the races to include provisions for ships of ninety horse power or less and free for all. Among the invitations issued to air celebrities and people of national reputation to be present

and participate in the program are Col. Lindbergh, Miss Amelia Earhart, Miss Ruth Elder, Capt. Ira Eaker, Gov. Moody, Senator Tom Connolly, Representative Penrose Metcalf, Mayor Thomason, Mayor Flores of Juarez and others. The U. S. Army will have planes here to participate in the program of the air according to statements issued from Washington. Free entertainment features are being planned for the occasion such as receptions, teas, dances, barbecues, etc. by Shine Phillips, Chairman, of Entertainment Committee.

II. The Building of the Temple Hindered (ch. 4).

The leading adversaries were the Samaritans, a mongrel people—the offspring of the poor Jews who were left in Palestine and the foreign people who were sent into Palestine after the Jews were taken captive. The three perils which delayed the building of the temple for about fourteen years revealed the persistent methods which the enemy uses to hinder the program of God's people in every age.

1. An unintelligent pessimism (3:12).

Under the circumstances, a glorious beginning had been made. Many today, because things are not quite what they should be, do not go forward with a constructive program, but even hinder those who have the hopeful outlook. In spite of all the evil forces at work to thwart the purpose of God, the Christian church should push forward its program of evangelization.

2. Wordly compromise (4:2, 3)

"Let us build with you, for we seek your God." This is Satan's most common and effective method. God's children should not seek the world's patronage in building churches and carrying on His work. The leaders should declare with Zerubbabel, "Ye have nothing to do with us to build an house unto our God."

3. Opposition by word (4:4-24).

When refused a part in the work intimidation and political scheming were used by the enemies to defeat the building plan of God's people.

III. The Temple Finished (5:1-6).

Through the ministry of the prophets Haggai and Zechariah, people were encouraged to resume enthusiastically the work of building the temple. When the temple was finished, it was dedicated to God.

IV. The Blessedness of Dwelling in God's House (Ps. 84:1-4).

1. The longing of the soul for God's house (vv. 1, 2).

It is refreshing when people long to meet God in His house.

2. The sparrow and swallow find protection in the sacred precincts of God's house (v. 3).

3. Dwelling in God's house (v. 4).
Those who have a heart for God find their chief delight in dwelling in His house.

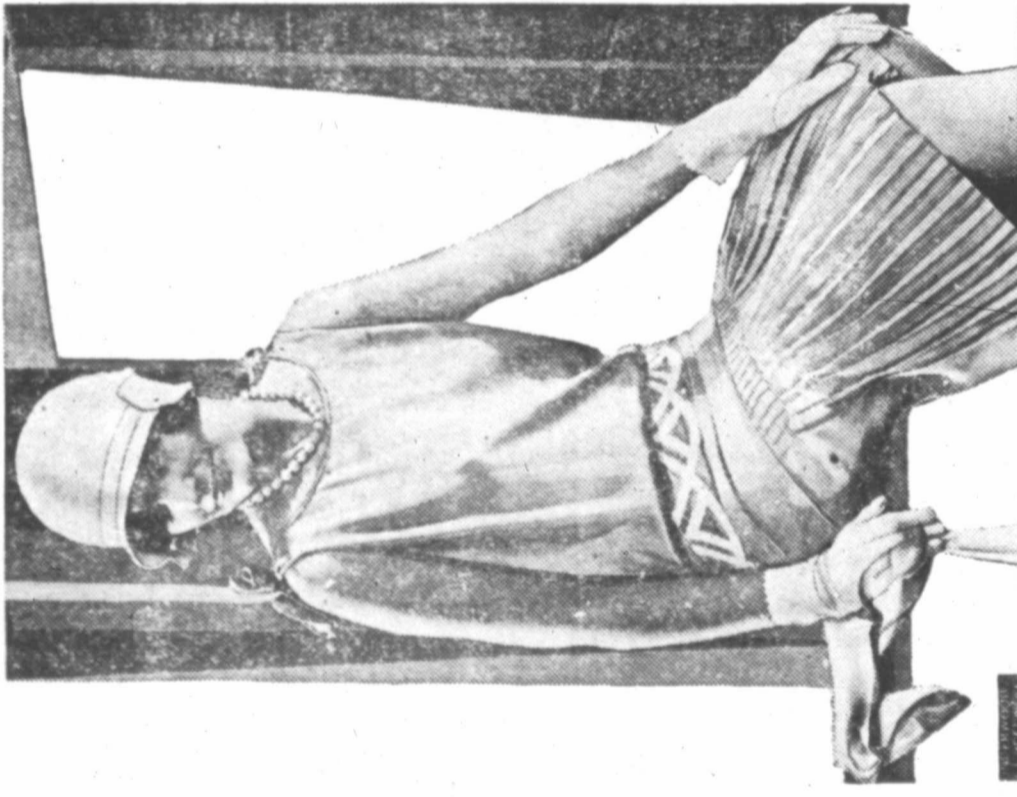

Messrs. Herbert and D. Brock, accompanied by the Mobley family, motored to Big Springs Sunday afternoon.

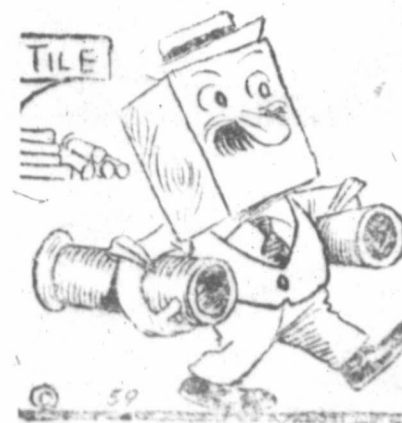
