1/2 cup packed brown sugar  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1 teaspoon clove

6 teaspoons butter, softened

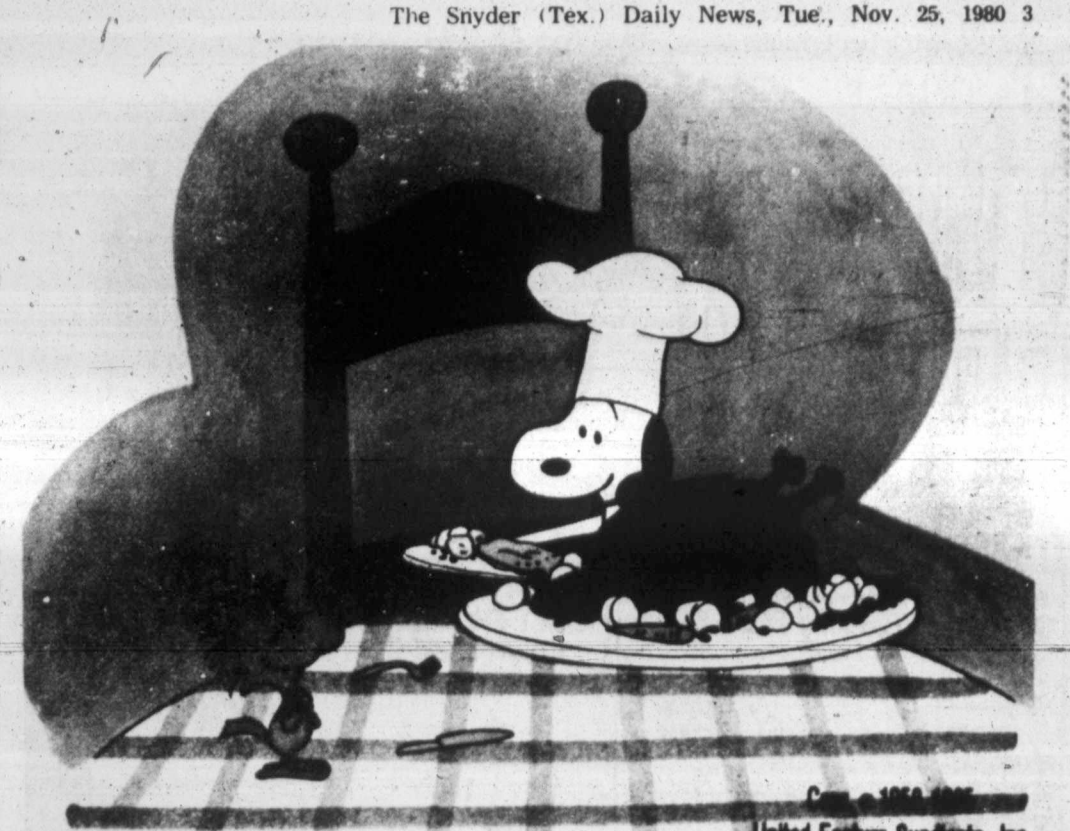

Three Ingredient Macaroons  
A favorite cookie for most of us, this is so easy to make, you can have them often.  
2 1/2 cup coconut  
2/2 cup sweetened condensed milk  
1 tsp. vanilla  
Mix together the coconut, milk and vanilla. Drop by teaspoon, 1 inch apart on greased cookie sheets. Bake at 350 degrees for 8 to 10 minutes, till lightly browned. Remove from pan immediately. Makes 30.

## Man-made Suede Fabric "Amara" Is Easy For Home Sewing Use

NEW YORK (NEA)—Can the home sewer work with a man-made suede fabric of the kind that top designers use? Don Sayres, who often creates styles for Vogue Patterns' American Designer Collection, says the answer is yes. And, he's recently been using a new suede-like fabric to demonstrate how easy it is.  
The fabric is "Amara," a blend of poly fibers with all the suppleness of fine fabric and the plush surface of suede. Pellon, the makers of many interlinings, has brought it from Japan, home of the first man-made suedes. In 15 subtly lovely colors, it's washable and usually doesn't need ironing.  
As a separates designer, Don Sayres likes Amara for his easy with silhouettes. Typical is his wide-shouldered cropped jacket gathered on shoulder yoking, to wear open or buttoned. He suggests weighting the edges for good tailoring, and pairs the jacket with equally soft pants, pleated at the waistband. He likes the jacket in a deep color, such as garnet Amara, the pants lighter, in camel.  
The outfit is a Don Sayres Vogue Pattern duo, numbers 2613 and 1963, wherever patterns and fabrics are sold. When seeking the man-made suede for his styles, ask for "Amara."

players. Five diamonds will make.  
Nevertheless, you are in three notrump. Your jack of spades wins the first trick over East's eight, and you start to look for nine tricks.  
A successful diamond finesse will put you in clover, but if East has the king he will return his partner's suit and the hand will collapse.  
Can you get to game with the diamond finesse a loser? You are sure of one spade, four hearts and two aces. Can you find two more tricks outside the diamond suit?  
Look at the clubs. Go to dummy. Lead a club. Finesse your nine. It loses to the jack. Maybe West leads a diamond. Rise with dummy's ace and lead the 10 of clubs. Now you have your eighth and ninth tricks.  
Suppose West held both king and jack of clubs? You would be sunk without a trace, but you had 3-1 odds in your favor. The diamond finesse was only even money.

# Texas Schools Enroll Aliens

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) — Celia and Javier Padilla squirmed in their chairs waiting for a school official to fill out their enrollment cards in a language they didn't understand.

The youngsters were among the 13 illegal aliens who enrolled Monday in local schools after a federal judge lifted a 30-day freeze on their admittance.

"We've got some that came in who had to go across (the river) to Matamoros (Mexico) to get birth certificates. They'll be back," said Alonzo Perez, attendance officer for the Brownsville Independent School District.

The poor, border school system tried unsuccessfully to be excused from a statewide order to admit illegal aliens to public schools. Other schools watched the case, thinking Brownsville had the best chance to win an exemption from the order.

Last summer, U.S. District Judge Woodrow Seals of Houston struck down a state law prohibiting use of state funds to educate illegal aliens.

Brownsville officials asked U.S. District Judge Filemon Vela here for an exemption from Seals' order. The district said U.S. Supreme Court Justice Lewis Powell had ruled such exemptions were possible in extreme cases.

Vela stopped the enrollment of undocumented children Oct. 11 and conducted a hearing Oct. 22.

School officials said their poor tax base, teacher shortage and overcrowded classrooms would make it difficult to educate the illegal aliens.

However, Vela said the district could not blame all its problems on illegal aliens and he ordered their admittance be resumed after 30 days.

The judge said he was disturbed by testimony which showed the district had enrolled only 170 illegal aliens under Seals' order instead of the 557 officials had reported.

Perez opened his office at 8 a.m. Monday and found about a dozen parents waiting. The official began filling out slips and signing papers a few hours before Vela held an unannounced, brief court session to lift the freeze formally.

By 11 a.m., the parents of 13 children had enrolled their youngsters. Perez sent them to district nurse Molly Teran, who checked their immunization records.

Perez could not be reached for a final enrollment count Monday evening.

"The majority don't have any immunization records and they have to start from scratch again," Mrs. Teran said. "A lot of them say they've had the shots but state law says we have to see something from a doctor or health clinic."

The children must be vaccinated before attending class.

Paulina Rangel was one of the parents in Perez's office Monday morning.

Although she has a permanent resident alien card, her four children attend school in Matamoros. The two older are Mexican citizens and the two younger were born in the United States and are American citizens.

"They want to learn English," she said through an interpreter. "They're even trying to teach themselves because they're anxious to learn."

Teachers in schools with illegal aliens enrolled before Oct. 17 have had difficulty instructing some who had never been to school.

Superintendent Raul Besteiro has said that 75 of those children will be taught separately on a temporary basis until they adjust to the structured environment.

Besteiro said the district is ready for the children, although no one knows how many will enroll in the district, which has a total enrollment of about 27,000.

Two temporary classrooms have been built for the expected overload and two more will be constructed after crews have finished repairing damage from Hurricane Allen, which hit this city of 80,000 in August.

The superintendent had mentioned holding half-day classes if overcrowding grew unmanageable. However, no such plan will be implemented in the near future.

## Copper Workers

### Back On Jobs

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Copper workers who struck the Asarco smelter here were back on the job Monday for the first time in nearly five months.

About 800 workers at the firm's El Paso smelter settled their labor disputes last week, but refused to return to their jobs until fellow United Steelworkers of America members reached agreements at smelters in Amarillo, Texas, and Hayden, Ariz.

Settlements at those two plants were announced Sunday afternoon, and picket lines went down here about 30 minutes later.

Officials of Asarco, which mainly produces copper and zinc, said it would take about 10 days to get the plant producing at full capacity. The smelter has been shut down since the strike began July 1.

The agreement gives workers an average pay increase of 87 cents an hour over three years plus cost-of-living adjustments.

### Snacks' psychological effect

DEAR DR. LAMB — What can I eat for quick energy? Are proteins the best food source for quick energy? Some of the girls at the office have a piece of cheese for a quick energy lift. Others have a donut or roll in the middle of the morning. If your nutrition is good otherwise would a candy bar be a good choice for a quick energy boost? Some football players eat steak and eggs before a game. Is that to give them more energy?

DEAR READER — It's true that the energy you get will come from your food or from the breakdown of fat stores developed from food you have eaten before. There is some "animal starch" in the liver, called glycogen, made from glucose molecules.

The mistake most people make about food and instant energy is forgetting about digestion. Food must be digested before it can enter your bloodstream or provide any energy.

Most of the digestion and absorption takes place in the small intestine, none in the stomach with the exception of alcohol. Since solid food remains in the stomach until it is liquefied, you can't get any energy from solid food immediately.

Moreover, fats may stay in the stomach for hours. Proteins empty slower than carbohydrates so they are not a good choice for "instant energy." Since a slice of cheese is fat — lots of it — and protein, it follows that it does not provide any instant energy.

Liquid carbohydrates are emptied more rapidly from your stomach than other foods. That is why sugar water, as in a glucose tolerance test, raises the blood glucose within 30 minutes. Solid

carbohydrates as you get in a raw apple are emptied slowly from the stomach after they are liquefied and do not raise your blood glucose. Those steak and egg pregame meals are still in the stomach at the end of the game and don't help at all.

It is important to understand digestion, so I am sending you The Health Letter number 12-4, Your Digestion: Processing Your Food. Most quick energy comes from releasing glycogen from the liver as glucose. Otherwise the snack-break effects are mostly psychological.

DEAR DR. LAMB — Can you please tell me what causes warts? My husband has them on his hands. Is it true they come because of a lack of iron as my mother-in-law says? How do you get rid of them?

DEAR READER — They are caused by a virus. And that has a lot to do with why they can spread and are mildly contagious. They are not caused by an iron deficiency. I almost wish they were as it would make treating them much easier.

Some warts disappear on their own. Often a wart or crops of warts may last seven years. Most treatment today still depends upon destroying the wart in some manner, usually with a chemical agent, depending on the location. Your doctor may choose to eliminate a wart on the hand with liquid nitrogen or some other wart-destruction technique. Sometimes treatment is difficult as the wart tends to recur.

The Sept. 22 order also referred the matter to the state attorney general's office if Lone Star failed to comply. On Oct. 7 the attorney general was asked to take appropriate action.

The commission sought the financial information in connection with an appeal by Lone Star, which wanted to raise gas rates in the cities of Moody and McGregor.

# Course Restores Fire In Burned Out Teachers

BUTLER, Pa. (AP) — Teachers in northwestern Pennsylvania have been jumping off roofs, huffing through a Marine-style obstacle course and dangling from parachute sails — all with hopes of polishing their performance in the classroom.

Fleet feet and strong grips won't necessarily make Shakespeare or logarithms more palatable to 17-year-olds, but such game playing

can help refresh a teacher's appetite for the job, says Ken Musko, originator of the Teacher Enthusiasm Renewal course.

"Teachers are in the same position as a lot of students," Musko said recently over the clamor at the Butler High School cafeteria, his beefy hands cradling a cup of coffee.

"You destroy their spirit by constant ridicule and persecution from the public, administrators and parents. And when their spirit is broken, self-image and morale goes down."

He was talking about teacher burnout, a recently recognized but largely unmeasurable phenomenon.

"I have no doubt it exists," said Virginia Koehler, assistant director of the teaching and instruction division at the National Institute of Education in Washington. "But there are no national figures."

The National Education Association says the average length of teacher service has dropped from 20 years to 14 years in the past two decades, an indication that more

teachers are getting fed up.

Lack of discipline seems to be the main reason. "One in 20 teachers has been attacked in the United States," Musko said, referring to NEA statistics from 1979.

Other factors in teacher stress include overcrowded classrooms, reams of paperwork and expectations that teachers assume cultural training abandoned by parents.

"The spark just goes out. Teaching becomes a routine," Ms. Koehler said.

Enter Ken Musko and his unconventional course. In the three years he has been teaching the program for the Midwestern Intermediate Unit, which provides various services for schools in Butler, Lawrence and Mercer counties, the course has gotten rave reviews from 150 participants.

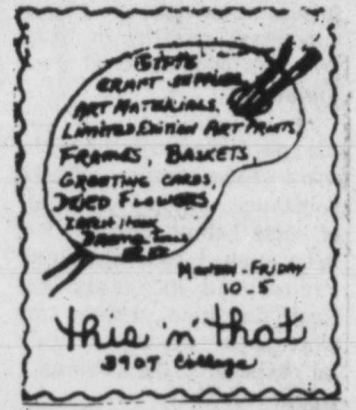
"Self-image is the key," he said. "This program tries to help people find out that they're better than they think they are."

To do that, Musko believes individuals must be challenged — maybe even a

little bit frightened. That's what Libby Zambelli was when she climbed a ladder to the roof of Laurel High School and came down on a rope by bouncing her feet off the building's walls.

"I didn't know if I could do the rappelling. I'm not too thrilled about heights," the sixth grade teacher in the Mohawk district later admitted. When it was over, she said she "felt good inside."

Not every instruction period involves derring-do. Time is also spent in group dynamics, trust activities and problem solving. At the end of each class the "point of the day" is discussed.

# Westerners Carrying On Tradition

WHEN THE SEASON first began with a new group of basketball players and an old 37-0 record, most Westerner basketball fans believed the two could not mix. Scarcely anyone expected Western Texas College's men to be 8-0 at this point, joining up with last year's National Championship team for a record-setting 45 consecutive wins.

Whether or not that will continue is of no debate here. What's been done has been done, and it is the future of Westerner basketball that should be of upmost concern to followers of the 1980-81 squad. No one has a right to compare this year's Westerner squad, nor Duster squad, nor Tiger squad to the past.

WHAT'S IMPORTANT ABOUT the 11 men who make up the current WTC men's team is their attitude in facing the situation and the pressure that the past has automatically thrust on their shoulders.

The Westerners' latest achievement was to win the Crippled Children's Tournament in Oklahoma City. A trio of sophomores, Chuck North, Keith Denis and Donald Warren, were all selected to the All-Tournament Team. They revealed some of their feelings about the current Westerners squad early

this week.

"WHEN WE FIRST started out this year and were just beginning workouts and all, I didn't really think we'd be 8-0," said Warren, a 6-4 talent from Oneonta, Ala. "But we've really come together as a team now and I think we can do whatever we believe we can."

"We're 8-0 because we're playing as a team," agreed North, 6-5 from West Covina, Calif. "I think the pressure (of keeping up a 45-game winning streak) is put on us by ourselves more than anything else. I believe it is more positive than negative, though. This is the best junior college in the nation and we're trying to uphold that tradition."

And if that winning string gets broken?

"IF WE DO lose, we're just going to have to come out and be moe determined the next time," added 6-5 Denis, from Gardena, Calif. "Basically I don't think we have to lose. Everybody on the team wants to win. It's just up to all of us to keep playing hard every game."

"Yeah," agreed North, "If we do lose, I'd say it would just make us more determined. We've got a lot to prove to a lot of people. I know our community is behind us and the school is behind us. We're going to have to give 150 percent or whatever

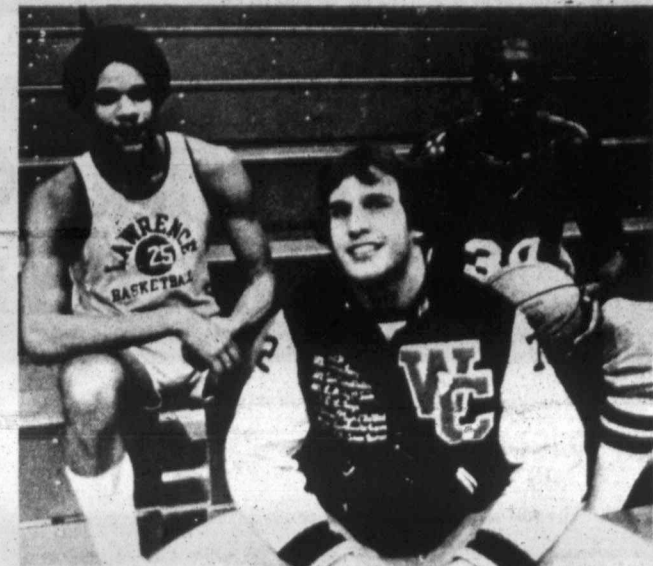
it takes each time out to win."

THIS YOUNG TEAM - though they could resent my saying so - may not have the overall talent of some of the colleges they will face this year. They may not have the experience, the height or the raw skills. Obviously, they don't have the numbers, a sometimes-crucial factor should injuries mount up.

But these young men have something else that should be recognized, and it actually means as much to Western Texas College's program as any undefeated record ever will. And that is belief in self, a deep sense of will, of never-say-quit competitiveness that makes them want to carry on the Western Texas College tradition each time they go out on the floor.

AND THAT IS certainly reason enough to support them to the utmost.

## Duran Set For Leonard

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Roberto Duran, a brawler who learned his craft in the streets of Panama City, defends his World Boxing Council welterweight championship tonight against Sugar Ray Leonard, the gym-trained boxing tactician he beat to claim the crown five months ago.

The bout in the Louisiana Superdome headlines a worldwide closed-circuit telecast which includes two other championship fights. After Leonard-Duran, the Superdome crowd will watch Marvin Camel defend his WBC cruiserweight crown against Carlos "Sugar" DeLeon. The closed-circuit opener, beamed from London, will show Maurice Hope defending the WBC super welterweight title against Carlos Herrera.

But the match which holds center stage is Duran-Leonard, a fight of contrasting styles matching the champion, a crowd-pleasing, swarming, slugger against the challenger, a classic fighter who depends on speed and guile.

Just four points separated these two boxers on the three official cards in their first match June 20 in Montreal when Duran wrested the title from Leonard by a unanimous decision in a close, fiercely fought battle.

The fiercely proud Panamanian has vowed to knock Leonard out this time.

## Tigers Win Big One

Maybe it was playing at home for the first time or maybe it was just being fed up with three straight losses, but for whatever reason Snyder's Tigers won their first game of the season in style here last night, thrashing Abilene Cooper 62-51 at Scurry County Coliseum.

Snyder's sophomore, JV and varsity games with Odessa Permian here tonight have been called off due to snows throughout the area. No official word had been received this morning as to possible makeup dates, if any.

"I think we were just glad to be playing at home for a change," said Coach George Byerly, whose Tigers had lost their first three games of the season - all on the road. "And we knew we were capable of playing better than we had been playing. The kids were fired up. They wanted to win this one bad."

Fired up is putting it mildly. Snyder ripped out to a 7-0 lead as Kris Seale slipped in a rebound, Barry Blackmon hit from outside and Eric Arnold scored on a three-point play to open the contest.

Abilene's Fortener then scored for Snyder as a high pass under the Tiger press somehow arced into the home team goal. The Cougars came back with a point of their own, but Seale and Keith Wallace added another field goal apiece to make it 13-1 midway through the period. Snyder went on to post a 19-5 first-

period lead. The Tigers slipped into the dozdums early in the second period, but good defense kept Abilene from taking advantage. Neither team scored for the first 3:38 of the quarter, until Cooper bagged two freethrows and Snyder's John Wilson countered with a three-point play.

Snyder's lead stretched to 24-9 with 3:56 to go until the Cougars began to creep back into the game. Barry McLeod and Calvin Thompson led the comeback, combining for 12 of Abilene's 16 second-period points as Cooper trimmed the

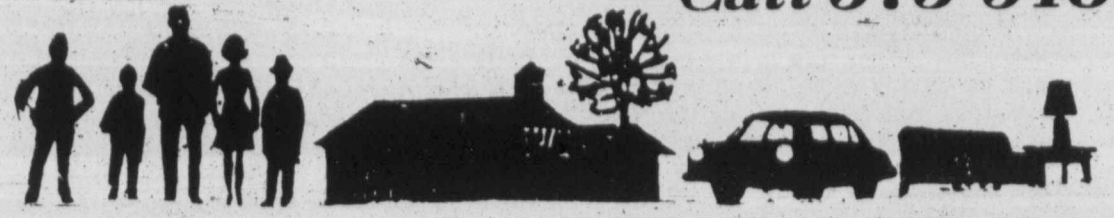

## U.S. Holding And Circling In Give And Take Hostage Crisis

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Carter administration, "holding and circling" in the give-and-take over release of the 52 American hostages, expects more questions than answers in the message arriving from Tehran today.

At best, officials here said, Iran's response to the U.S. response to its demands is no more than a maybe.

The reply is being delivered by a three-member Algerian delegation, which returned from Iran on Sunday and was due in Washington late today. State Department spokesman John Trattner said the group will meet with U.S. officials Wednesday.

The official Algerian news service said the Iranians are asking for a further explanation of the U.S. position. "We know they want some information external to the (U.S.) proposal itself," Secretary of State Edmund S. Muskie said Monday. "We know there are some five lists of information in their request."

The Washington Post quoted unidentified officials today as saying the Iranian prime minister's office is seeking details of benefits that would flow to Iran after the hostages are released.

That all means, Muskie said, no immediate breakthrough is likely in the diplomatic effort to end the standoff now 387 days old.

"Our posture now is that we are holding and circling...We are going to be holding for a while," he said.

"Each day's wait is a disappointment," Muskie added. "I think it would be very nice to expedite it, but I don't see any way of doing so beyond what we are now doing. We don't waste time. We have to wait for responses. This indirect method of communications is, of course, time-consuming."

The negotiations over conditions set by the Iranian Parliament on Nov. 2 are being conducted through the Algerians because diplomatic relations between Tehran and Washington were broken last spring.

The terms included a U.S. pledge not to interfere in Iranian affairs, cancellation of all American claims against Iran, release of more than \$8 billion in frozen Iranian assets and return of the property of the late Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi.

Muskie said the U.S. response, delivered through the Algerians two weeks ago, was "yes or no to a number of conditions and some maybes."

While he refused to elaborate, sources reported previously that the administration agreed to a non-intervention pledge but said the president had no authority to abrogate suits by American businesses, some claiming part of the frozen Iranian assets. The United States also claimed that most of the shah's wealth was in other countries, the sources said.

Muskie said last week the United States had agreed in principle to the conditions, but Iranian officials Sunday called that unsatisfactory.

## 4 Mishaps Reported

From yesterday, police are investigating the theft of two auto batteries, valued at \$100, and 25 gallons of gas, valued at \$30, that were stolen from Concrete, Inc. From a private vehicle was stolen another 15 gallons of gasoline. Receiving that complaint was Buddy Kinney.

Kinney also worked a hit and run at Kiddie Park in Towle Park. Reports show that two vehicles struck a fence, then left. Kinney worked the accident shortly after 9 a.m.

## Teamsters Reject Braniff Cuts

DALLAS (AP)—Teamster employees of Braniff International have refused a 10 percent pay cut the airline asked its employees to accept to help make the company profitable.

The 2,095-to-1,453 vote, tabulated Monday in Washington, D.C., apparently dooms Braniff's "Operation Turnaround," a plan to put the financially troubled airline in the black as quickly as possible.

A key feature of "Operation Turnaround" had been a system-wide payout, which the airline's pilots and mechanics had agreed to last month.

However, the two unions' acceptance of the reduction hinged on the Teamsters' agreement.

The 5,100 Teamster employees are mainly ticket agents and baggage handlers.

Marvin Schlinke, president of Teamster Local 19 in Dallas, told the Dallas Times Herald that the resignation of Braniff vice president Tom Matthews—who had worked to persuade union members to take the cut—impulsed the negative vote.

Schlinke also said that the October issue of the airline's in-house newsletter, which claimed the airline was financially sound, also discouraged workers from accepting a payout.
