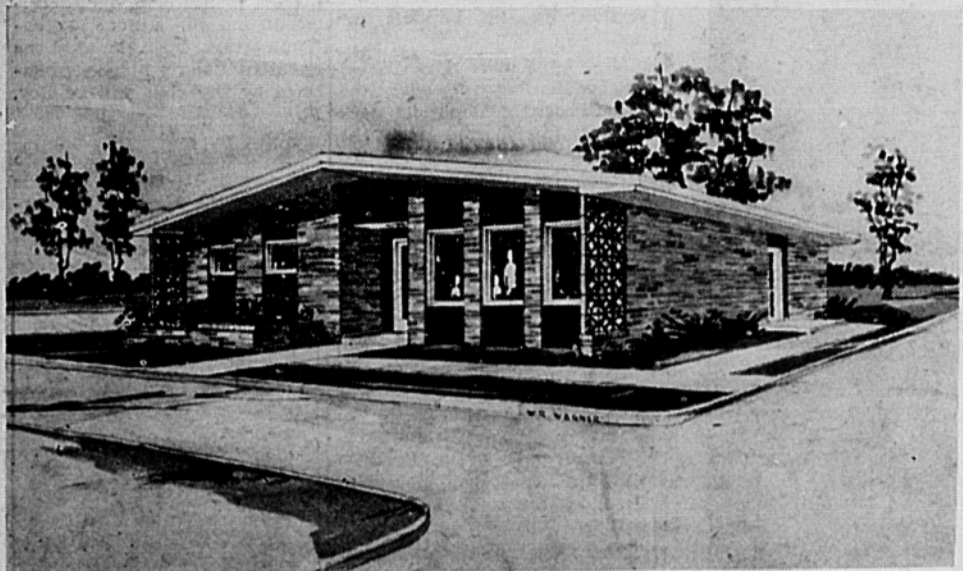

James M. Eager Dies Sunday

Funeral for James M. Eager, 77, of Abilene was held at 10 a. m. Tuesday in Kiker-Warren Funeral Chapel, with the Rev. Parry King, retired Baptist minister, officiating. Burial was in Tye Cemetery.

Mr. Eager died at noon Sunday in Hendrick Memorial Hospital after a short illness.

Born Feb. 10, 1888 in Navarro County, Mr. Eager moved to Taylor County from Stephens County in 1907. A resident of the Abilene area since 1920, he was a World War I veteran and a retired painter.

Survivors are three brothers, Emmett of Clyde, Glenn of Abilene and Cecil of Stamford; four sisters, Mrs. G. P. Rainbolt of Cisco, Mrs. Gertie Knight of Merkel, Miss Letha Eager of Abilene and Mrs. Elizabeth Knappe of Austin; and several nieces and nephews.

Baird Youth Receives Top Abilene Optimist Award

Maxie Don Gordon of Baird, a freshman in Abilene Christian College, has been nominated by Abilene Optimist Club as Young Texan for the month of September, club officials have announced.

Each month participating Texas Optimist Clubs make their nominations and a panel of judges select one nominee for the state honor. He receives a wrist watch, a wall plaque and key chain with the Optimist International emblem, each engraved.

Annually the 12 month winners are honored and three of them chosen for additional recognition. The Young Texan of the Year receives a \$2,000 college scholarship, a trophy and an expenses-paid tour of the state. The other two each receive a \$1,000 scholarship and a trophy.

The state competition is a non-profit recognition program sponsored by the Troy Post

Foundations and the Optimist Clubs of Texas to reward young men who have shown outstanding qualities of leadership, citizenship, scholarship and service to home, school, church and community. It is intended to

bring favorable public attention to outstanding boys, to encourage them toward their goals, to set them as examples for others and to counteract the "small minority of juvenile delinquents who generate such bad publicity."

Any Texas boy between 13 and 18 are eligible. It is preferred the nominee be a high school student at the time of nomination.

Maxie is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Gordon of Baird. He is a 1955 Baird High School graduate, had a 92.4 average, lettered in basketball, football and track, was an all-district football tackle and captain of that team, was on the mile relay team which which broke the state record this year, was a Little League All-Star when he was 12 and also earned a spot on the state Teenage Summer Baseball team this year.

He was chosen Baird High's outstanding student last spring, was president of his sophomore class, the Beta Club, and won the science award in 1964. He is a member of the Church of Christ at Baird where he is a Sunday School teacher, a song co-leader, and has addressed the Clyde congregation and his own on occasions.

Gordon worked for a milk distributor two years, spent one summer full time on road construction and earlier cleaned offices and mowed lawns during summers.

He was school yearbook business manager and helped in United Fund Campaigning also.

Texas Democratic Committee To Support Amendment No. 4

The Texas State Democratic Executive Committee will actively support the passage of proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 4 which would extend the terms of state wide elected officials to four years.

Chairman Will D. Davis of Austin, Vice Chairman Mrs. Alfred Negley of San Antonio, and Secretary Ray Peason of El Paso of the State Democratic Executive Committee, announced a statewide campaign to alert the voters to the benefits of the proposed amendment No. 4 and to urge them to vote on November 2.

"Texas state government has

become increasingly more complex, and efficient and effective government can best be served by a four-year term of office for the elected state officials now elected for two-year terms," Davis declared. He said that under a four-year term officials could devote more time to running state affairs than running campaigns for re-election.

"Texas is one of only two highly populated states -- Wisconsin is the other -- which does not have four-year terms for their chief executives. If the amendment is adopted, Texas would become the 40th state to have long terms," Davis said.

Davis urged all Democrats with an interest in the future of Texas to support and vote for the amendment. He pointed out that Wednesday, Oct. 13, was the first day for absentee voting and those who plan to be out of town should vote beforehand.

BENEFITS OF AMENDMENT 7 LAUDED

Poor people who are sick or injured will benefit if voters approve Proposition No. 7 on the ballot of the November 2 election.

Amendment No. 7 is worded so that it will affect only the Hermann Hospital Estate in Houston. Hermann Hospital Estate is one of the major charitable organizations in Houston giving free hospital and medical care to the poor.

Approval of the amendment would not cost the State of Texas anything. It merely exempts the estate from paying local taxes on its properties within Harris County. The major part of the local taxes are paid to the county, the City of Houston and the Houston Independent School District.

The estate paid \$332,463 in taxes in 1964 to local government units, which would have been exempt if the proposed amendment were in effect then. This money could have been used to provide free hospital and medical care to poor people if it had not been paid out in taxes.

None of the governmental units which received these taxes opposed the approval of this amendment by the Legislature.

The Hermann Estate was founded as a charitable trust by George H. Hermann, a rich Houston land developer, who died in 1914. After a modest beginning in 1924, Hermann Hospital Estate has grown to where it provided \$2,029,882 in free

hospital and medical care for the indigent in 1964.

The Hermann Hospital Estate operate a pay hospital in addition to its charitable facility, because it has been proven that a combination free and pay hospital can render better medical care to the indigent than one which is for free patients alone.

In the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1964, Hermann Hospital gave medical care to 28,000 free and pay patients in the hospital and to 13,833 in the outpatient clinic. Of the 5,260 births in Hermann during that period, 40 per cent were free or at low charitable rates.

There is no known organized opposition to amendment No. 7 in Houston or elsewhere in the state.

Callahan County Farm Bureau Joins TASCOS In Tire Sale to Members

Callahan County Farm Bureau has entered into an agreement with the Texas Agricultural Service Co. of Waco, a recently incorporated, wholly-subsidary of the Texas Farm Bureau, to set up a retail tire sales program for its members, according to Hadden Payne, local FB president.

One of the world's largest tire manufacturers, General Tire and Rubber Co. of Akron, Ohio, is manufacturing tires for TASCOS under the exclusive brand named "Safemark." Several other state Farm Bureaus are already marketing "Safemark" tires which is produced at the GT&R Waco plant.

All standard sizes in the premium deluxe grade of passenger car tires and first-line premium truck and tractor tires will be offered Callahan County Farm Bureau members, said Payne. The cost will be the factory price plus a very nominal distribution charge which will make them available to members "at a very substantial saving" the county FB president declared.

Sutphen & Wristen at Baird and Dillard & Faulkner at Cross Plains have been named the authorized Farm Bureau Tire Servicing Agent for the county. Tires can be purchased directly from him by any Farm Bureau member by presenting his current membership card. Members actively engaged in farming or ranching may buy any tires they need for personal vehicles. All other members will be limited to passenger car tires.

"This is strictly a service-to-member program instituted to help cut costs of production and thereby increase net income of our members," Payne said "Sales will be restricted in order to prevent buying through the program for commercial use by anyone other than farmers or ranchers."

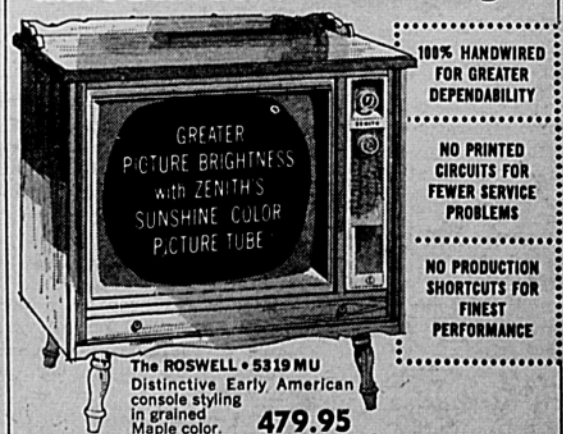

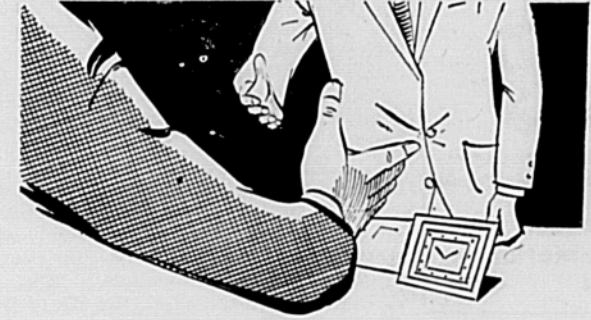

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — Gov. John Connally's sudden cancellation of plans to go to Japan and Viet Nam this week added a note of tension to the Austin scene.

Connally's statement indicates that he sees the possibility of a special session of the Legislature on congressional legislative redistricting or voter registration.

"We are awaiting federal court decisions on the poll tax, congressional redistricting and House redistricting, any one of which could cause action on my part within the next few weeks," Connally stated.

I federal judges throw out either congressional or house reapportionment acts of the 59th Legislature -- without specifically allowing additional time for redrawing lines in regular session -- Connally may have to call a hurry-up session before the early 1966 filing deadline.

Should the federal courts invalidate the poll tax as a voting requirement, Texas could be left without a voter registration procedure. This, too, could make a special session necessary on short notice.

Hearing on the attorney general's suit attacking the poll tax is not until mid-November. Judges already have heard arguments on redistricting challenges, however, and rulings could come at any time.

Connally also made clear he fears defeat of key constitutional amendment proposals in the November 2 election and plans an all-out personal campaign in behalf of four-year terms for statewide officials.

ENROLLMENTS UP — More students than ever before have enrolled in Texas colleges -- and most institutions are bulging at the seams.

Average enrollment increase among the 22 state-supported colleges and universities in the state is 13.8 per cent. Stephen F. Austin College in Nacogdoches had the largest increase at 34.9 per cent. Arlington State

College's 2.9 per cent was the smallest.

University of Texas' population increased 2,229 this year, representing a percentage increase of only 9.3. This is 4.3 per cent below the state average.

Average increase among the 32 public junior colleges reached 26.9 per cent. Cisco Junior College's 59.8 per cent increase leads all others. Smallest increase was the 2.1 per cent recorded by Laredo Junior College.

Largest recorded increase among independent senior colleges and universities was the 30.9 per cent at Bishop College, Dallas. Sherman's Austin College enrollment fell off 2.5 per cent.

AG OPINIONS — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has ruled the Civil Rights Act of 1964 isn't applicable to rules and regulations of Texas A&M University regarding discrimination by sex. Also, Carr said the Board of Directors of the school has the right to issue rules and regulations making the University either an all male school or co-educational.

Carr said the present policy of the Board to exclude women because the applicants aren't wives or daughters of staff members or students, or widows or daughters of deceased staff members, is discriminatory and constitutes unreasonable class distinction.

Rulings were in response to a request by H. C. Heldenfels, president of the Board of the Texas A&M University system.

In another opinion, Carr ruled that the issuance of a state warrant for the payment of an honorarium to a United States employee delivering a commencement address at the University of Houston would violate the state constitution.

OIL PRODUCTION INCREASED — Texas Railroad Commission has cranked the November oil production allowable up to 30 per cent of potential. It's a

high mark for the year.

Commission, recognizing recommendations of 10 out of 13 oil purchasers, set production for next month at 2,976,361 barrels daily. This compares with 2,944,109 barrels for October under 28.8 per cent formula and 2,834,856 for November, 1964, under 28.4 per cent factor.

COURT SPEAKS — State Supreme Court heard rival arguments as to whether Rice University alumni have a right to appeal the lower court's decision that permitted Rice to admit Negro students and charge tuition.

Rice trustees filed action to allow integration and eliminate tuition restrictions. This despite trust fund restrictions imposed by founder William Marsh Rice in 1891. Trustees now maintain at Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr is the only one who could have appealed the decision favoring their action. Carr left the appeal up to the alumni group.

High court held in a Waco case that cities are liable for damages where property owners are denied reasonable access to their property by highway construction.

In a companion case, however, court denied damages to another firm because it had access to its property by another street.

HOUSE COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS — House Speaker Ben Barnes has appointed Rep. Vernon J. Stewart of Wichita Falls chairman of the House Interim Committee on Juvenile Crime.

Named to serve with him are representatives W. T. Dungan of McKinney, John Hay Harrison of Pasadena, Alonzo W. Jamison Jr. of Denton and George H. Richards of Huntsville.

Committee is charged with the responsibility of studying the growing juvenile crime problem in the state with particular emphasis on developing a program for its prevention.

Group will make recommendations to the next Legislature on legislation needed to combat the problem and implement the program.

NURSING COMMITTEE AT WORK — A five-member Senate Committee has held the first in a series of hearings to determine why Texas faces an acute shortage of nurses and what can be done about it.

Committee heard witnesses testify that Texas ranks 46th among the 50 states in the number of nurses per 100,000 population. Also, that enrollment in Texas nursing schools has declined drastically, and that at least 10,000 professional nurses aren't working at their profession.

Second session is scheduled for October 29 in Lufkin and a third in Houston on Dec. 3-4.

TIRE TESTING BIG BUSINESS — More than 1,000 persons are employed in a growing tire-testing industry which

contributes \$5,000,000 a year to the economics of Texas communities.
