BB Guns Cause **Much Damage**

have been beseiged with complaints about youngsters and the damage caused by BB and pellet guns.

Here are a few of the complaints received:

Two dogs shot with pellet guns, both dogs in the yards of he owners. One necassitated a trip to a Vet in Abilene

Five window lights broken in nomes in which people live. Bulbs shot out and damage

at the Rodeo arena. out at the Little League and Teenage League baseball fields. These bulbs cost \$4.93 each, so someone will be out nearly \$250 y Trans-Continental Telephone before the youngsters can play baseball this season..

This is only a part of the damage reported to City officials caused by youngsters with their guns.

There is a City Ordinance against the use of guns in the City of Baird, and violators can be fined. There are State and Federal laws protecting doves, could be a serious offense, and fee. complaints have been received against the killing of all these birds.

We believe that the parents of most of the youngsters have not explained to the kids the dangers and damage that the modern BB or pellet gun can do. Parents are responsible for any damage and vandalism of their childran, and are liable for damages. Of course, if someone loses an eye, or is severly damaged (as is entirely possible with a BB or pellet gun), monetary

damages could be rather high. The Council does not want to order the Chief of Police to arrest these youngsters, and City Judge to assess fines forced into this action unless the parents do the job they are supposed to do, and control their kids.
