Annual Ft. Belknap meeting Saturday October 19

Annual meeting of the Fort Belknap Society will be held Oct. 19 at the restored old fort which last year received one of the area's first historical medals from the Texas State Historical Committee.

The program which will begin with a military drill by a Midwestern University ROTC unit at 9:45 a. m. will feature "a day with the authors of old Fort Belknap," recounting history of the fort's role in development of the Northwest Texas Frontier. A barbecue dinner will also be staged.

Dr. Kenneth Neighbours of Midwestern University will review a book by Dr. Rubert Richardson, chairman of the Texas Historical Survey Committee and president emeritus of Hardin Simmons University at Abilene.

Dr. Richardson, considered a leading authority on Texas history, has been at work for several years gathering material for his book, "The Northwest Texas Frontier." The work covers the period from 1846 to 1876.

Mrs. Barbara Allen Ledbetter's recently released book, "The Fort Belknap of Yesterday and Today" also will be cited.

Mrs. E. E. Clark of the Writer's Department of the Woman's Forum in Wichita Falls will present a play of her writing called "Eliza's Journal," depicting a memorable visit of Mrs. Albert Sidney Johnson to Fort Belknap in 1855.

The Belknap Junior Historical Youth Panel presented in August at the Texas Attorney General's Youth Conference in Austin will be repeated for the historical society. Five teen-age historians headed by Mack Cook of Breckenridge and John Tarleton College will make up the panel.

Dr. John Stephens of Texas Wesleyan College in Fort Worth will recognize recent gifts of the college to the old fort.

State Senator George (Cotton) Moffett of the 23rd District also will be heard.

Presiding over sessions will be Mrs. Ben G. Oneal of Wichita Falls, president of the society and member of Tarrant County historical directors. Clarence Daniels of Newcastle will take reservations for the barbecue.

D. Hoyt Davis, representing American Fire Apparatus and American Fire Pump Co. from Olney, was awarded the contract for building the fire fighting equipment to be placed on the new truck.

Contracts call for all equipment to be placed in the community house in about 45 to 60 days.

President Jeffery expressed his appreciation to the landowners of Young County in making this another successful fund drive which allowed for the purchase of the new equipment. He also expressed his appreciation to both the Eliasville and the Murray communities for the interest that they displayed in wanting to accept the responsibility of housing and manning fire fighting unit No. 3. He asked that both communities work together in taking care of fire emergency calls.

Floyd Owens, County Civil Defense Director, promised his help in placing radio units in both the fire truck and in the Murray store.

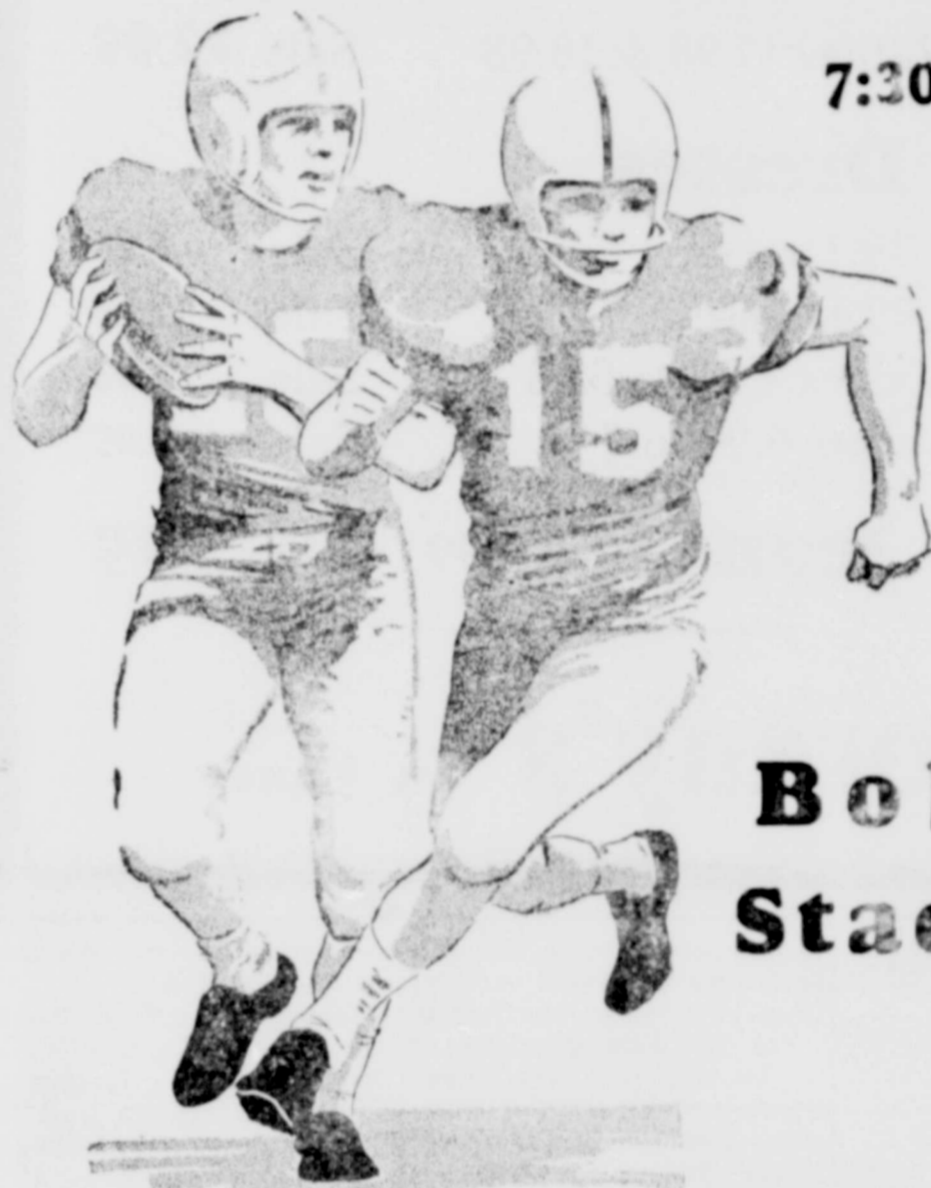

Water pollution in Young County being studied

The Farm Bureau is cooperating with the agricultural Subcommittee of the Young County program Building committee of

the extension service. Salt water pollution was listed as one of the major problems to be studied.

The Salt Water Committee of the Young County Farm Bureau has requested a study of water pollution from oil field sources in Young County. The depreciation in land value and water supplies, both surface and subsurface, as well as the pollution
