Write-Ins Spark City Elections

Quite a bit of interest was shown in the City election Tuesday. Voting was brisk most of the day, which was caused by a write-in campaign for the mayor's post.

All incumbents were re-elected by wide margins. They include Gaspard Neal, mayor, and Claude Myatt Jr. and T. N. Wooldridge, aldermen.

Voting was as follows:

For Mayor: Neal 75 votes, M. J. Phillips, 14 and Lloyd Whiteley 19.

For Aldermen: Myatt 104, Wooldridge, 89, John Keels, Jr. 12, and Dick Allen, 1.

Wooldridge Rites Held In Newcastle

Clay Joe Wooldridge, 58, died Friday, April 1, and funeral services were held Sunday in the Newcastle Methodist Church at 3 p.m.

Wooldridge was a farmer in the Newcastle area for more than fifty years. He was born August 18, 1907 in Greenville, Tex., and was a member of the Methodist Church and the Masonic Lodge.

Rev. Jerden Davis, pastor of the Newcastle Methodist Church officiated at the rites, assisted by Rev. Hapr of the Baptist Church. Burial was in Proffitt Cemetery under the direction of Lunn Funeral Home, with Masonic rites at the graveside.

Survivors include: his wife, Treva; two sons, C. J. Wooldridge, Jr., of Olney and T. N. Wooldridge of Newcastle; five daughters, Mrs. Franklin Thompson, Newcastle, Mrs. Emma-dean Barns, Midland, Mrs. Tom McClintock, Wichita Falls, and Miss Christi Wooldridge of the home.

Other survivors include: five brothers, Benson Wooldridge, Poolville; Joe Henry Wooldridge and Everett Wooldridge both of Tyler; Quinton Wooldridge, Graham; Obed Wooldridge, Snyder; three sisters, Mrs. J. E. Terry, Newcastle; Mrs. J. B. Kee, Newcastle, and Mrs. W. L. Richardson, Graham; 12 grandchildren; and his mother, Mrs. Cora Wooldridge of Graham.

Newcastle Wreck Does Big Property Damage

A three-car accident about 10 a.m. Saturday at the east edge of Newcastle caused heavy property damage, but only minor injuries to the drivers.

According to Highway Patrolman Charles Gunn, who investigated the accident, a car driven by Thomas Barton of Olney collided with the rear end of a pickup driven by Obed Wooldridge of Snyder.

Gunn said Wooldridge was signalling a left turn off Highway 24 onto a city road as Barton was passing a car behind Wooldridge and then attempted to pass the pickup. The Barton vehicle struck the pickup in the left rear spinning it around and knocking it into a car, owned by

Frank Burkett of Hurst, that was parked off the roadway.

After the collision the Barton auto continued on down the road coming to rest in the west bound lane about 110 feet from the point of impact.

Wooldridge was brought to an Olney Hospital where he was treated for a scalp laceration. Barton suffered only bruises.

Damage was estimated at \$1900 total for the three vehicles.

It is with heavy hearts that we say goodbye to our many loyal friends — but we ask your prayers that we may have the opportunity of serving our community and the church in some capacity. Newcastle and the Register will always be a part of us.

Our word goodbye is a condensation of four words — "God be with ye". In the original import, they were words of final parting when friends did not expect to meet again. The French Au Revoir carries the implication of a temporary separation. It is in this spirit of looking to the future that we, our friends, one and all, "Au Revoir" as we leave the posts of editor, publisher and owner of The Newcastle Register, after a connection that spans our over the half century mark.

It is impossible for anyone except my wife and I to understand more than a small part of the problems, trials and difficulties through which we have passed in an earnest effort to be of real benefit and service to the community. Social Security Number Must Be Included In Return

Texas taxpayers were reminded today that the law requires them to list their Social Security number on their Federal income tax return.

Where a husband and wife file a joint return, they should list both numbers in the spaces provided on page 1 of the 1965 Federal income tax return.

Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for northern Texas, said that omission of the number delays the processing of the return, and inconveniences both the taxpayer and the government.

Boat Lights Are New State Law

Every water craft used after dark is required to have at least one light under the new safety code now being enforced by the

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and other agencies. Specific location of lights on all motorboats is provided in the ct that is patterned after the United States Coast Guard Inland Rules.

The new state law does NOT provide for lighting on rowboats or rafts or other crafts not classified as motorboats. But Coast Guard Inland Rules of the Road as adopted for Texas stipulates that all rowing boats, "Whether under oars or sail" and other water craft must have a light.

It is further state: "Rafts, or other water craft not herein provided for, navigating by hand power, horsepower or by the current of the river, shall carry one or more good white lights" visible up to two miles.

A parks and Wildlife Department spokesman said proper illumination of the slow moving craft is vital to safety, particularly in areas where fishermen

normally run their lines after dark.

Lighting motor boats will follow uniform Inland and International Rules of the Road, with white, red and green lights precisely located with red to port and green to starboard, and with a white light at the stern located higher than any part of the boat.

Born March 17, 1881, in Walnut Grove, Mo., Mrs. Meredith was a resident of Wichita Falls most of her life. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Kerr, came to Iowa Park in 1892, and moved to Wichita Falls in 1898.

She attended Kidd-Key College in Sherman and married Dr. Duane Meredith Dec. 7, 1905. She was a member of Fain Memorial Presbyterian Church, Eastern Star No. 237, and an honorary member of the Medical Society Auxiliary. Her husband died in 1948.

Easter Story Is True Today

"And while Jesus yet spake, lo Judas, one of the twelve, came, and with him a great multitude with swords and staves, from the chief priests and elders of the people. And Jesus said until him, Friend, wherefore art thou come? Then they came and laid hands on Jesus and took him."

"And they that had laid hold on Jesus led him away to Caiaphas the high priest, where the scribes and elders were assembled. When the morning was come, all the chief priests and elders of the people took counsel against Jesus to put him to death: And when they had bound him, they led him away, and delivered him to Pontius Pilate the governor."

"And when Jesus was accused of the chief priests and elders, he answered nothing — inasmuch that the governor marvelled greatly. Now at the feast the governor was wont to release unto the people a prisoner, whom they would. And they had a notable prisoner, called Barabbas. Therefore when they were gathered together, Pilate said unto them, 'Whom would ye that I release unto you? Barabbas, or Jesus which is called Christ.' For he knew that for envy they had delivered him. But the chief priests and elders persuaded the multitude that they should ask Barabbas, and destroy Jesus."

"When Pilate saw that he could prevail nothing, but that rather a tumult was made, he took water, and washed his hands before the multitude, saying, 'I am innocent of the blood of this just person: see ye to it.' Then he

delivered him to be crucified. And after that they mocked him and led him away to a place called Golgotha, that is to say, a place of a skull, and they crucified him."

Had the story of Easter ended here, there would be no Easter and no Christianity, for that matter.

But, are we, a supposed Christian nation, not guilty of crucifying Jesus even today? Are we not guilty, like Pilate, or washing our hands of his blood?

The Easter Story continues.

"In the end of the sabbath, as it began to dawn toward the first day of the week, came Mary Magdalene and the other Mary to see the sepulchre. And, behold, there was a great earthquake: for the angel of the Lord descended from heaven, and came and rolled back the stone from the door, and sat upon it. And the angel answered and said unto the women, Fear not ye: for I know that ye seek Jesus, which was crucified. He is not here: for he is risen, as he said. Come see the place where the Lord lay."

This Sunday is Easter Sunday. The churches will be filled to capacity as they were Christ-mas. But what about the other 50 Sundays of the year?

This Easter, when our world is in turmoil, wouldn't it be a wonderful thing if every member of every church promised to attend church every Sunday during the year that it is possible? Why don't you think about it? DHP

Bay Leaf, Ginger, Vanilla Add To Different Food Taste

Black pepper, cinnamon, nutmeg, and cloves are the "big four" in the world of spices. But there are many other spices that we use and encounter frequently that can add quite a bit to everyday eating.

Bay leaf, ginger and vanilla are found in many home spice cabinets and are essential to many different foods.

The bay is the "Laurus Nobilis" of the laural family in addition to its culinary flavors, it has inspired poets and historians for centuries.

When the lovely nymph, Daphne, was pursued by the love-struck god, Appollo, she fled to her father and begged to be delivered from the attentions of the god. He granted her wish and turned her into the lovely laurel tree.

Appollo, unable to win the maiden, made the tree his own, and throughout the Greek and Roman civilizations, victors of athletic events, warriors and great poets and dramatists, were crowned with a wreath of laurel.

The tree itself grows best in southern climates and will exceed thirty feet in height. It is an evergreen with leaves of dark, glossy green which are aromatic. The older trees, in the subtropics, will bear yellow flowers and cherry-shaped blackish red fruit.

The bay tree is common in the Far East, and in the Canary Islands, there are whole forests of them. It can be naturalized, however, as far north as southern England.

The aromatic oil of the leaves is used in medicine as well as in the kitchen. The leaves are available on the spice shelf of the grocery store in dried form.

Oil of bay is used in preparing Bay Rum, an after shave lotion and toilet water which many men and women find appealing.

Ginger is a rootstock which was native to India and China but which is now an important commercial crop in Jamaica West Africa, Central America and the West Indies. The plant is about two feet tall and the essence of the aroma is found in the root and the white flower.

Jamaica ginger, considered the most valuable, is obtained in several forms. Preserved ginger is called "green"; dried cured ginger comes in two forms.

If the skin is left on the root before it is ground, the ginger is "black" "White" ginger is ground with the skin removed from the root.

Ginger is considered valuable for many reasons: it tastes good, it is wonderful in beverages, and it was once chewed for indigestion and tooth ache. As late as the 1800's a pound of ginger cost as much as a whole sheep.

One old fisherman's tale claims that when ginger is chewed and the juice applied to the bait, fish practically leap upon the hook.

What would summer - time be without ice-cream? And what would ice-cream be without a yellow orchid grown in Madagascar? The shimmering yellow orchid, with as many as fifteen or twenty orchids in a cluster, develops seed pods five to ten inches long, from which growers obtain vanilla.

Vanilla orchids must be fer-

tilized by hand to force the production of seed pods, and it was not until the mid-1800's that growers learned to pollinate each flower.

In Madagascar, where a great deal of vanilla is grown, "seed rustling" became a problem, and owners were forced to mark each green bean pod with a distinctive brand, applied with a sharp pin in a cork.

The beans are tasteless and odorless until the aroma and flavor is brought out by fermentation. The beans are alternately warmed in the sun and placed in "sweat boxes," until fermentation causes the formation of a volatile oil, vanillin.

The vanillin is dissolved in alcohol to preserve its singular taste and aroma and it is used in candies, cookies, cakes, beverages, and foods, all over the world. Its sweet smell is even used in the making of fine perfumes.

Bay leaf, ginger and vanilla, as with all spices, should be bought in small lots and used frequently so they will not lose their bouquet. Look through your cook - books and find new ways to use spices, so that they will continually be exciting and different.

Here is a recipe to add to your collection:

- Ginger 'N' Honey Crumb Cakek
- 3 cups sifted cake flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. soda
- 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. ground cloves
- 1 tsp. ground ginger
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 cup strained honey

1/2 cup thin strips of candied or crystallized ginger.

Sift together the dry ingredients, and combine them with the sugar and the shortening Mix to a crumbly consistetney, and set aside 1/2 cup of crumbs for topping.

Combine boiling water and honey and add rest of flour mix beat until smooth. Bake in a loaf pan, with rest of crumbs sprinkled over surface. Bake at 375 degrees for 35-45 minutes. Decorate the top with strips of ginger while still warm. Serves 8.

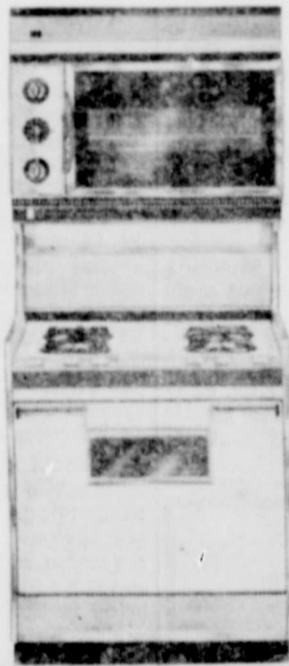

Hillcrest Haven Residents Enjoy Producing Own Gifts

The residents of Hillcrest Haven have a knack for producing lovely, decorative items for their own use and for gifts from the most prosaic of ingredients.

With talent, time and infinite patience, they turn things like egg shells, paper plates, macaroni and plastic alcohol bottles into three-dimensional pictures and bud vases.

The residents are guided in their crafts work by Mrs. Mattie Jackson, nurses' aide, who has studied arts and crafts work at the Wichita Falls State Hospital Crafts Department.

Mrs. Kate Frizzell, Mrs. Mattie Groves, Mrs. Ruth Brown, Mrs. Jeannie Greer, and Mrs. Clara Douglas, all enjoy an afternoon's session in the recreation room.

Alcohol bottles, made of plastic, are cut into two pieces and the top, with its cap, is attached to the bottom of the bottle to form a pedestal base. Rick-rack, sequins, plastic flowers and glue

complete the transformation into a striking bud vase.

The ladies also enjoy making pictures to hang on their walls. With oval paper platters and a great deal of work, many have made three-dimensional pictures to brighten their rooms.

The rim of the platter is first decorated with macaroni in shell or bead shapes. Crushed egg shell is glued to the bottom of the plate and the whole thing is sprayed with gold, silver or bronze paint. Then, contrasting plastic flowers are fastened to the middle of the platter. The effect is very fresh and unusual and is quite an attractive addition as a wall-hanging.

Bud vases are made of empty salad dressing bottles, and cookie and candy jars are made from one-pound coffee cans. The cans are decorated with various colors and textures of string, carefully glued on, and the plastic lids promise that the contents will stay fresh.

Matching sets of desks accessories may be made by the same technique, using different size cans.

Waste baskets, made from empty five-gallon ice cream containers are another attractive item the Hillcrest residents make. All colors are used, and many different techniques of decorating make the waste-baskets truly individual.

A new interest at Hillcrest Haven is making and decorating plaster casts. Many are plaques to be hung on the wall, and when sprayed gold or bronze, they make handsome sets.

Ordinary coat hangers, covered in multi-colored wool in a special plaited pattern, make unusual and handsome gifts. The thickness of the wool-covered wire makes the hangers ideal for hanging pants, since they don't make a crease. Low-necked dresses won't slip off the covered hangers, either.

Hillcrest Haven residents find their crafts work interesting and challenging. And the rewards are obvious, since many rooms are warm with hand-made items and since the residents take such pride in their crafts.

Mrs. Kate Frizzell explained, "I love making these pretty things, and they are so useful! This Christmas I gave a present to every member of my family and to most of the nurses out here, and I didn't have to buy a single gift."
