Mrs. Coop died in a Graham Rest Home Tuesday, June 7, at 10 a. m. She was 92 years old.

Born Dollie Daniels in Peytonsburg, Ky., on February 22, 1874, Mrs. Daniels had lived in Newcastle for 52 years.

She married the late Dr. H. T. Coop in Kentucky in 1889. He died in 1938. She was a member of the Church of Christ.

Mrs. Coop is survived by: four sons, Eula, Ray and Roscoe of Newcastle, and Otis of Nocona; one daughter, Mrs. Elnora Braddon of Newcastle; eight grandchildren; 10 great-grandchildren; and one great-great-grandchild.

Charles Finnell Wins County District For Representative

Charles Finnell of Holliday swamped his opponent Ken Andrews of Graham in their bid for the Democratic nomination for State Representative from the 86th District. Finnell won the race by more than two - to - one as he took every county in

the district. Unofficially, Finnell received 6,967 votes to 2,644 for Andrews. In Young County Finnell polled 11333 votes to 848 for Andrews. In the first primary Finnell carried Archer and Clay Counties while Andrews won Young,

Jack and Throckmorton and a third candidate Tony Fenoglio carried Montague.

In winning Young County, Finnell carried all the precincts except three, West Graham, Proffitt and Southeast Graham.

In a statement to the press, Finnell stated:

"My sincere thanks go to the people of the 86th Legislative District. I am both humbled and challenged by the overwhelming vote given me. It will be my highest endeavor to be worthy of the trust placed in me.

"I express deep appreciation to my friends and supporters who worked so long and faithfully in my behalf. And I renew my pledge to work hard, representing all of the district."

Finnell is engaged in drilling and ranching in Archer County with his brother, Leslie Finnell. He is a graduate of the University of Texas, majoring in government, and worked in the 58th and 59th Legislatures. He is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Leslie B. Finnell of Holliday.

Andrews issued a statement to the press Monday which stated:

"During the recent campaign, I enjoyed very much the opportunity of meeting many of the people of the 86th District for the first time and renewing many old friendships in the districts.

"It is a privilege to be able to run for a public office in our democratic society.

"I sincerely thank my supporters for their work, aid, and efforts in my behalf."

Crawford Martin, seeking the Texas Attorney General office, overwhelmed his opponent, Franklin Spears both in the county voting and throughout the state. He won the state-wide contest by some 75,000 votes and in Young county received 1216 votes to 735 for Spears.

Hobbs Recommended For Flying Cross

Danny Hobbs, son of Mrs. Kartrice Singleton, has been recommended for a Distinguished Flying Cross for his more than a year's service in Vietnam. He has already received the Air Medal for his flying and his

close escapes from death.

On November 14, 1965 his aircraft lost an engine and was going in for a landing when it was hit by eight rounds of enemy fire. The plane managed to land safely.

On January 10, 1966 the landing gear on his plane wouldn't come down until the plane was put through severe maneuvers to jar the gear loose. After an hour and 45 minutes of circling the air field the gear came down and the plane again landed safely.

On February 4, 1966 the landing gear collapsed on landing and the aircraft suffered heavy damage.

Finally, three weeks ago a bullet fired from the ground missed Hobbs by a scant two inches.

The recommendation for the DFC was made for bravery in making an air drop at Ashau where several Americans were surrounded by the Viet Cong. Hobbs will leave Vietnam for home on June 11 or 12.

Explosion Kills One, Injures One Saturday

Freddie V. Millican was killed and Frank Gray was seriously injured late Saturday afternoon when gas apparently accumulated at the base of an oil well and exploded.

Gray was rushed to Hamilton Hospital where he was listed in critical condition. Wednesday morning his condition was described as good and he was reported responding to treatment.

Gray suffered lacerations, a broken jaw and possibly other injuries. Surgery was performed Saturday night.

The men, who owned the well, were apparently repairing a leak in a water line at the well site. From all indications the welder made only one contact with the pipe to be repaired when the explosion occurred.

Authorities said that Millican was blown about 45 feet by the blast and the welding cable was wrapped about his body. The tail section of one of the two pickup trucks parked by the

well was heavily damaged. The pickup was blown 15 feet from where it was parked.

Archer City peace justice Joe Fields pronounced Millican dead at the scene.

The Young County Community Service, Inc., met Monday, June 6, in the offices of Thornton, Thornton and Fisher in Olney, to discuss improvement of Community services in Young County and to expand the Board of Directors.

E. Bruce Street, Chairman, presided at the meeting. C. V. Morgan, A. R. Pearcy, James Houston, Clarence Daniels, Wayne Hales, C. D. Williams, R. E. Thornton, and Louis Pitcock, Jr., were present.

During the meeting, it was voted to increase the Board from fifteen to twenty - one, and Thornton and Street were appointed as a nominating committee to nominate the six additional members.

Lots were drawn for length of service in one year, two year and three year terms.

In an election of officers the following were named: First Vice - Chairman, Wayne Hales; second vice - chairman, R. E. Thornton; third vice - chairman, Louis Pitcock, Jr., secretary - treasurer, Ronald Stephens.

The group voted to set up an advisory executive committee consisting of the County Judge, the mayors of the various towns, and the superintendents of the three independent school districts, to keep the YCCS apprised of the needs of the communities.

Pre - school training for young County five year - olds under Project Head Start was discussed and it was agreed to have an estimated budget and a recommended staff director presented at a later meeting.

Contract for construction of the new offices of Community Public Service Company were signed Friday between the company and Averett and Wingham Lumber Company of Olney.

The Olney construction firm was the low bidder for building the new offices. Skeet Fambro, area manager of CPS, signed the contracts with Billy Averett representing the lumber company.

The building will contain 3025 square feet of heated area and will be located on the corner just north of the Post Office. Construction is expected to take 180 working days. Estimated time of completion is the first of November.

"We are pleased that it worked out for an Olney firm to construct the offices," Fambro stated.

The building was to have been built about a year and a half ago but several reasons caused the delay in construction. The offices of CPS were destroyed by fire last December and temporary offices were set up in the old Hays Grocery building on east Main.

Ming Bend Named For Early Settler

Ming Bend is located near the bend of the Brazos in the southeast and oldest settled part of Young county. There is no way of knowing exactly how many bends are in the 840 mile long Brazos river but one can count on the occurrence of a name for every bend along her banks; either officially or legendary.

These bends sometime carry the name of some geological or geographical phenomenon but in most instances the bend carries the name of a first family living on the land or a first survey name.

Cemeteries are sometimes all that is left of a community where once stood schools and churches, businesses and homes. There is no structure standing in the Ming Bend community but a cemetery is there. West of the cemetery can be seen foundations of what those now living in the area say was a school house.

ORIGIN OF NAME

So far, no document has turned up to show where Ming Bend got its most unusual name. Queries always get the negative shake of the head or a comment: "I have wondered about that myself." This compiler thinks that it got its name from CHARLES J. MUNG (MING), a settler who came to Young county between 1856 and 1860. This settler's name is not found anywhere except in commissioner's court minutes of Young county. He shows up on no census record but he does appear as a juror from time to time in the courts of Young county. A parcel of land in the present Ming Bend area once showed land owned by this man.

Pronunciation changes from generation and good - and - bad handwriting by early day clerks make it almost impossible to know if it was originally called "Mung" or "Ming." The name Mung is of Scotland and Northern England origin and literally means "to grumble, to groan." It is interesting to guess that Englishman Mung found his name pronounced with an unfamiliar sound when he settled on the Texas frontier. Anyway, we now have Ming Bend.

MING BEND CEMETERY

The cemetery is well kept and is located on the Mac Williams, estate. There are more unmark-

ed graves than one. There are graves of: James, Lasiter, Pickard, Morris, Ramseyer, Kelly, Buter, and Ainsworth.

Among them is the grave of a soldier who fought in the war of the rebellion. He is William Morris (1829-1908).

County Agent's Corner

L. M. McCARROLL

The combines continue to roll, and bring an end, to the 1966 harvest of Young County wheat, oats and barley. Yields vary considerably depending on fertilizers applied, moisture received and other factors. The 45,000 acres of wheat allotted the county should mean something near \$1,000,000 in agricultural revenue for the county this year. Samples were taken from the Small Grain Variety Demonstration plot on the Woodrow Taack farm, near Newcastle, last week. Mr. David Tolleson, our new assistant County Agricultural Agent, has some good sized blisters to prove he had a part in the hand-clipping. These will be thrashed at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Chillicothe later in the month.

Mention was made of bag worm infestations likely to occur. Well they are here in large numbers on many cedar like trees and shrubs throughout the Young County area. Uncontrolled they can be very destructive. Check your cedars now and if spraying is needed, follow instructions in "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamentals." This is a valuable publication, concerning most of the more common insects on all types of trees, shrubs, flowers and lawns. Also the recommended insecticide for a particular insect is given. You may obtain your free copy by writing, calling, or visiting the County Agents office in the Courthouse.

Are you interested in Beekeeping? A new bulletin - 153, has just been printed and is yours for the asking. The title "An Introduction to Beekeeping." Items discussed include 1. How to become a beekeeper 2. Equipment needed 3. How to obtain bees and equipment. 4. Catching the swarm 5. How to install package bees 6. How to feed bees 7. Selection of Apiary 8. Honey plants 9. the colony 10. development stages of the honey bee 11. examining a hive of bees 12. Management Practices 13. How to render beeswax 14. The wax moth 15. Bee Diseases and 16. Laws affecting honeybees. Most of the subjects contain many illustrated drawing and pictures, to make for more interesting reading.

Take a milk often, especially during this month. June is Dairy Month.

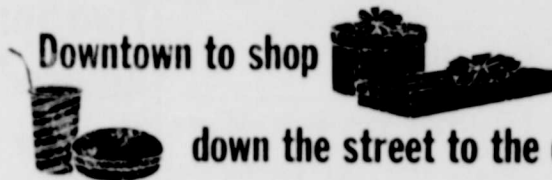

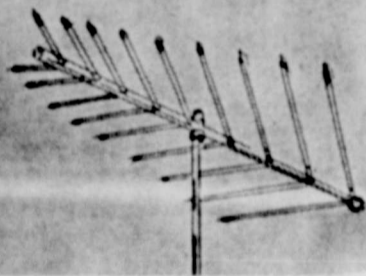

Weedy Grasses Invade Lawns

Nutgrass, or nutsedge, is a worrisome problem in many home lawns, says County Agent, L. M. McCarroll.

Nutgrass and other weedy grasses which invade lawns, such as dallisgrass, crabgrass, sandbars are not controlled by 2, 4 - D and other herbicides for broad leaf plants.

These weedy grasses can be controlled, however, by proper application of methylarsonates. The most common forms are disodium methylarsonate (DSMA) and amine methylarsonate (AMA).

These should be applied as a broadcast treatment to Bermudagrass and gluegrass lawns only. Caution: DSMA and AMA will kill St. Augustine grass if applied broadcast.

To kill weedy grasses in St.

Augustine, the DSMA or AMA should be applied as a spot treatment to the weeds only. When the herbicides are broadcast Bermudagrass, the leaf tips of the grass may turn brown for a few days, but will rapidly recover and not be damaged if the chemical is applied according to directions.

The methylarsonates, DSMA and AMA, will control most weedy grasses, with the exception of nutgrass, in just one application. Since nutgrass has such an extensive root system, it takes several treatments to control

nutgrass - - even then, total eradication is almost impossible. Observe label precautions when using DSMA or AMA, as they can be dangerous. For additional information on turf weed control, contact the county agent and ask for L-245 or B-1029.

A final note: the best defence against weeds in your lawn is good management. This includes proper fertilization, watering, mowing and disease and insect control. A vigorous, healthy lawn will crowd out most weeds, concludes McCarroll.

Two Spray Rigs Advised By County Agent

It's a good idea to have two spraying rigs, says County Agent L. M. McCarroll. One should be used for applying herbicides and the other for insecticides. To be extra safe, mark the herbicide sprayer in some way so you'll be able to tell it at a glance.

Without careful decontamination, there will always be herbicide traces left in the sprayer which can retard or kill your crops. If you must use the same sprayer for both herbicides and insecticides, the following steps will usually rid your sprayer of herbicide.

Rinse sprayer system with either 2 or 4 pounds of washing soda or 2 quarts of household ammonia in 30 gallons of water. Circulate mixture through sprayer and allow to stand several minutes before draining.

Repeat above step. Remove all rubber hose connections.

Repeat step one, and allow mixture to remain in sprayer for several hours. Drain and rinse with clean water.

Use another tank full of strong ammonia water, circulate in tank and allow to stand overnight. Recirculate, then drain.

Fill tank with clear water and spray on tomato plant. If the tomato plant does not wilt, you can be relatively sure the herbicide effect is gone from the sprayer - - for the present at least. If the sprayer tank is rusted, the herbicide will show up each time rust is flaked off the sprayer tank.

It's a lot of work to clean the sprayer after a herbicide - - but it can be well worth the time, concludes McCarroll.

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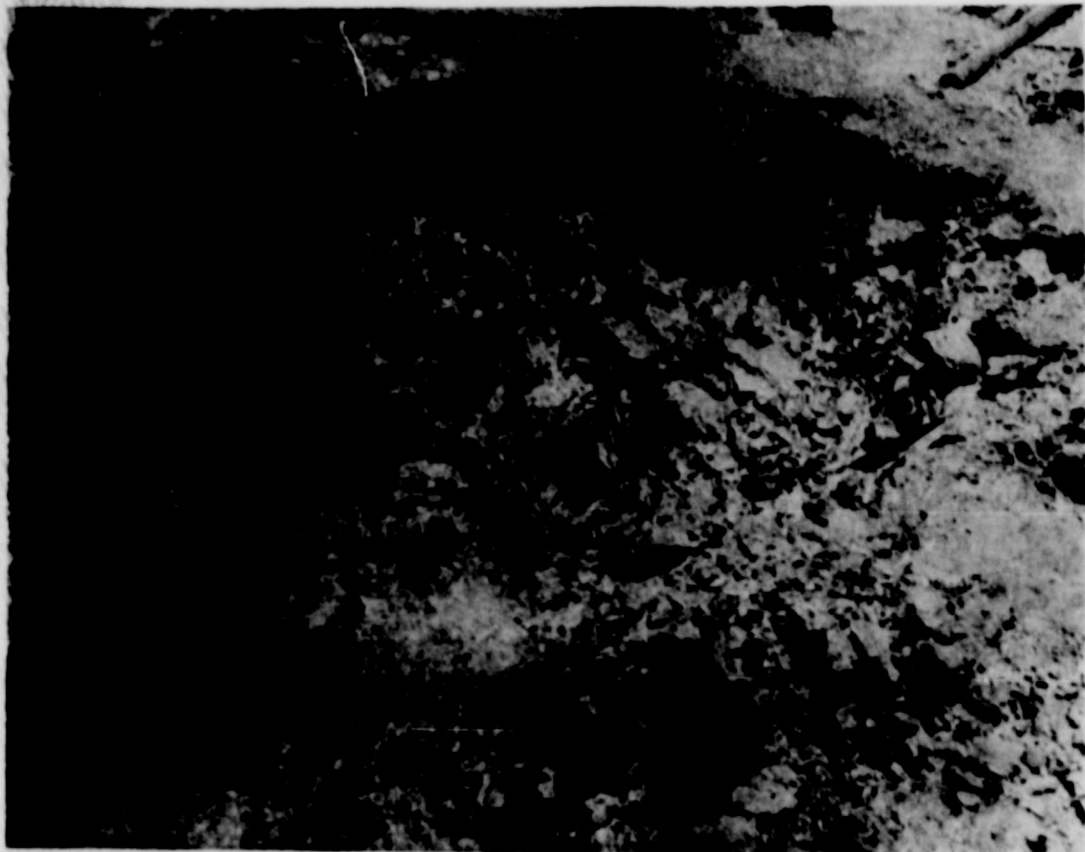

about 7:10 when he passed the scene four miles northwest of Olney. He noticed that neither man was around and stopped to investigate. Upon finding the men he returned to his father's home about a mile from the scene and called the ambulance.

Lloyd Keeter, Leon's father, passed the scene about 5 p.m. and saw Millican alone at the scene preparing to work on the well. The elder Keeter came back by the scene about 5:30 and noticed oil and mud on the road but wasn't paying close attention as a large grain truck was following him.

Authorities did not place exact time on the accident but it was determined to have happened between 5 and 5:30. The police log at city hall received the report of the accident at 7:20, just shortly after the ambulance was called.

Highway Patrolman Charles Gunn and Archer County Sher-

iff Floyd Hoggins investigated the accident.

Pieces of the well were found as much as 100 feet from the site. A swedge was blown about 75 feet before striking a tank battery. At the well site only a large gaping hole was left as explosion.

Funeral services for Freddie V. Millican were held Monday, June 6, at 2:30 p.m. in the First Christian Church of Olney. Rev. Don Campbell officiated at the services.

Millican was born September 9, 1930 in Throckmorton. He married the former Willie O'Dell, in 1949 in Graham.

The Millicans moved to Olney from Throckmorton about eight years ago. He was engaged in farming and oil field work. A veteran of the Korean War, he was a member of the First Christian Church here.
