The touchdown drive began on the Bobcat 29. Two plays later Pitts had moved the ball down to the 7. He carried for five yards and Bullock went for a touchdown which was called back and Newcastle penalized for off-sides. Two plays later the Bobcats scored.

Matador scored in the second quarter on an eleven yard run through right guard Joey Meador burst through the line and went the distance with 5:57 left in the half. Luis Moore went around right end for the two extra points and going into the half the score was knotted 8-8. Matador was knocking on the goal line just as the half ended. They moved the ball down to the three.

Newcastle took the second half kickoff but couldn't move and on fourth down punted, but Max Barton of the Matadors blocked the kick giving the visitors the ball on the 17 yard line of Newcastle.

Matador scored three plays later as Meador went off right tackle for 12 yards with 8:51 left in the quarter. Moore passed to Dick Moss for the two points and Matador led 16-8.

Easley was born in Navarro County, Dawson, Texas, on June 14, 1919. He was 47.

In December of 1941, he married the former Evelyn Jones. They had two sons.

Easley was a veteran of World War II, having been a photographer in the Army Air Force. His plane was shot down over Germany and he was a prisoner of war for 20 months.

Services were held at the Pentecostal Church in Corsicana, with Pastor Johnson, and his son, Gary Johnson, officiating. Burial was in the Hamilton Cemetery near Corsicana.

Easley is survived by: his wife; his father, W. A. Easley, of Archer City; two sons, Winford Lee and Cecil Dean, of Corsicana; by one grandchild; two brothers, W. P. Easley of Olney and Woodrow Easley of Corsicana.

Tips For Outdoorsmen

USING SOFT BAIT — Surf, salt water, and even fresh water fishermen often find it difficult to keep soft bait such as shrimp, crab, etc., from coming off the hook.

Get rid of this worry by tying such bait to the hook with thread.

Carry a spool of strong thread in your pocket, then, if rushing water tends to wash away your offering, you have the remedy at hand.

CLEANING SURFACES — Sometimes flat surfaces which to clean fish are hard to come by. Cutting boards do fine, but in lieu of such a convenience, go out and find a downed log, or stump.

Then a little work with a hand axe will prepare an excellent fish cleaning surface.

Just cut two notches about two inches deep and 18 inches apart, in the side of the log, or the top of the stump. Chop out the wood between the notches, the same depth, then level off, and you have a table that's renewable.

Then when the day's job is done, whittle away the stained, bloody surface, and you'll have a new surface for next day's cleaning.

FISH CLEANER THAT CLEANS Sneak away your wife's nylon hairbrush. If she acts suspicious, go out and buy one at any department store.

Such brushes, if stiff, make excellent tools to clean out the abdominal cavities of fish after the entrails are removed. They do a far better job than most other methods.

PREVENT CHOPPING — To keep your boat from pounding in rough water (which makes for

mighty rough riding), change the tilt of your outboard.

Bring the motor shaft closer to the stern.

This keep the boat bow low in the water, no matter what the speed, and cuts out the wham-bang of high waves.

County Agent's Corner

Di-syston has been approved for use on pecans. The maximum dosage approved was 3 pounds of actual Di-syston per acre. This comes to about 17 pounds active ingredient per mature tree. The materials should be applied as a 4 foot band on two or four sides of the tree. With single trees around the home the materials can either be applied in a band or placed in the drip line in holes (3-4 inches deep) as is done with chelated materials. If applied in a band, the material should be worked into the soil to a depth of 2 to 3 inches. The soil should be watered well, if at all possible, after the application. This is important from the standpoint of getting the material taken up by the tree as well as avoiding toxicity problems with pets and children around the home. The material should be applied only once per season and preferably early in the spring. Applications should not be made closer than 80 days before harvest.

Di-syston is a systemic, taken up by the roots and transferred to the branches, stems and leaves throughout the tree. Certain insects, such as plant lice (honey dew secretion), are killed as they feed.

This new insecticide should greatly aid pecan producers with next years pecan crop. Next spring is the time to apply this material.

The time is near at hand for putting Paradichlorobenzene crystals (moth ball crystals) around your fruit trees for control of the peach tree borer.

Recommendations are for treating between October 20 and November 15. The soil should be dry and the temperature 55 degrees F. or above. First remove weeds and grass and loosen and level the soil for about 1 foot from the tree trunk. Place crystals in a narrow circular band.

placed several shovels of clean soil over the crystals and mound the earth into a cone shaped pile about 8 inches high around the base of the tree. In placing the first few shovels of soil, avoid pushing any of the materials against the tree since crystals in contact with the tree may cause injury. Compact the soil with the back of the shovel. Be sure and remove the earth mounds in the early spring. For 2 or 3 year old trees 3-4 oz. mature trees, 1 oz. of crystals.
