

Mr. South Is Homecoming Speaker Old Records Interesting Reading

BAIRD — Olaf South of Sweetwater, former superintendent of Baird Schools, will be guest speaker for the 1972 Homecoming, which will start Friday night, Oct. 13th with the football game between the Baird Bears and Roscoe.

The records, in part, that concerns the years Mr. South was head man at the local school, have been made available to our office by Billy G. Hatchett, and we though perhaps you might enjoy remembering by-gone days. The records are not complete, however this article is compiled from those we do have.

1940 - Mr. South, Supt; Bill White, coach. Members of the football team, which were Bi-District Champs, were Arthur Burleson, George Warren, Aubrey Ground, Sterling Reynolds, R. J. Wylie, J. C. Cook, James Browning, L. W. McIntosh, Sam Henderson. Others were Bobby Owens, Ralph Wylie, Jack Ray, Ben Russell, Bill Yarbrough, Jerald Watts, Charles Coats, Gene Finley and Lewis Hill.

Forty-seven students made up the Senior class of 1940. Class officers were Gene Finley, Marion Dyer, Sterling Reynolds and Jack Ray. Cheerleaders were Betty McCoy, Marion Dyer and Patsy Mary Mitchell.

1940 Declamation County Champs were Carl Yarbrough and Betty Gay Lyda. Marion and Ruth Dyer were tennis champions in all classes. State quarter-finalists in 1940, Co. and District champions in tennis, George Warren, J. C. Cook, Bill Yarbrough, Roy White, Charles Coats, James Browning and Arthur Burleson.

Students receiving honors for the school year of 1940 were: Headlight Queen, Marian Dyer; Carnival Queen, Wanda Brame; Most Popular Girl, Betty McCoy; Most Popular Boy, Buck Cargal; Best All-Around girl and boy, Ruth Dyer and Bill Yarbrough; Drum Major, Johnny White; Majorettes, Jackie Rutherford; Band Sweetheart, Laura Mae Windham; Bear Facts Editor, Lewis Hill; Headlight Editor, Ben Russell.

In 1941-42, the Baird Bears became a Class A football team and was 2nd in District, playing teams like Stamford, Snyder and Hamlin. The game between the Bears and Stamford ended in a tie 19-19. Baird defeated Albany 54-13 and took the Snyder team 45-0. Bill Yarbrough scored a 99-yard TD in the Stamford game. J. C. Cook and Arthur Burleson were named All District.

1941-42 favorites were Headlight, Ellen Tankersley; Carnival, Ruth Dyer, Football Sweetheart Betty McCoy. Most valuable football player Arthur Burleson, Best All-Around Athlete J. C. Cook, Popular girl and boy Dorothy Chrisman and Bill Odom, Best All-Around girl and boy Tillye Settle, Jo Ester Jones and Bill Yarbrough, Headlight editor, Ellen Tankersley, Bear Facts Editor Tillye Settle, Drum Major Betty Lou Lewis, Band Sweetheart Mildred Coats.

In 1942, 42 were recorded on the Senior class roll. Bill Hatchett was president, Johnny White served as vice-president, Buddy Brumbaugh as secretary and Nola Van Gibson, class reporter.

The football team won bi-district and players making up the squad were J. C. Earp, Jim Denney, Frankie Crow, Ben Glover, Don Parker, James Earp, Bill Odom, Elwood Golin, Arnon Hatley, John Wheeler, Bill Hatchett, Raymond Cook, Buddy Brumbaugh and Junior Cutbirth.

1942-43 were the war years and the school annual, which had published almost every year

since 1929, had to be a memory yearbook because of paper shortage during the war. Eddie Bullock was the football coach, 32 senior were on the roll. Carl Yarbrough was president, Irma Young, vice-president, Janice Ivey, treasurer and ReNee Russell was reporter.

The remaining six years that Mr. South spent here are filled with many memories that will stay forever in the hearts of students and faculty members who taught classes, and graduated from Ole Baird High.

This newspaper will try to bring other memories of the years 1944-45-46-47 in the next edition, which will be homecoming weekend.

The Connie Green Fund has reached a total of \$795.17, deposited at the Baird bank.

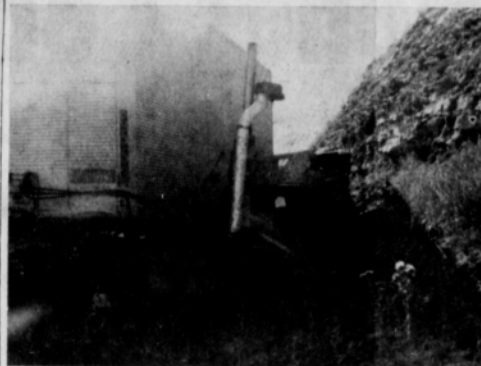

60 Residents Tour County Ranches Friday to Check New Grasses

BAIRD — Approximately 60 area residents toured Callahan County Ranches last Friday to see new grasses under field conditions and to observe brush control research plots. The tour, sponsored by the Callahan Co. Rural Development Committee, began at 9 a. m. Friday with a group leaving the Courthouse to see the James Snyder Ranch.

Chemical brush control test plots have been in effect on the Snyder Ranch since 1968. Pieloram and 245-T (Tordon) gathered particular attention as the group was amazed at the results achieved on prickly pear and mesquite Dicamba and 245-T (Banuel-D) was another chemical yielding good results. Bob Steger, Area Extension Special-

ist, assisted Greg Gerngross, County Agent, in explaining the results of the evaluations. Mr. Snyder discussed stocking rates and animal gains achieved since the spray program began.

After dinner, the group visited the rod-row grass plantings located at the old missile site between Baird and Clyde. These grasses were established in 1970 as a Cooperative agreement between the Soil Conservation and the Baird FFA Chapter. Doug Sellars, Area SCS Range Conservationist, and Les Ethetton, District Conservationist, discussed some of the more promising plants, such as the Old World Bluestem, Lovegrass PMT 729 & 718, and Switchgrass PMT-285.

The tour then proceeded to the Blain Odom Ranch to observe a fertilization study being conducted on Kleingrass. Here, Gerngross and Ethetton explained the results of the test. Eyes were opened as the productive potential of the grass was realized. The tour ended on the James Lawrence farm at Cross Plains. Area Extension Specialist, Willie Gass, and James Lawrence pointed out the merits and problems involved with TAM-Wintergreen Hardingrass. The tour was considered a success by all in attendance.

Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation from the list of recipients and add the Clyde Community Park.

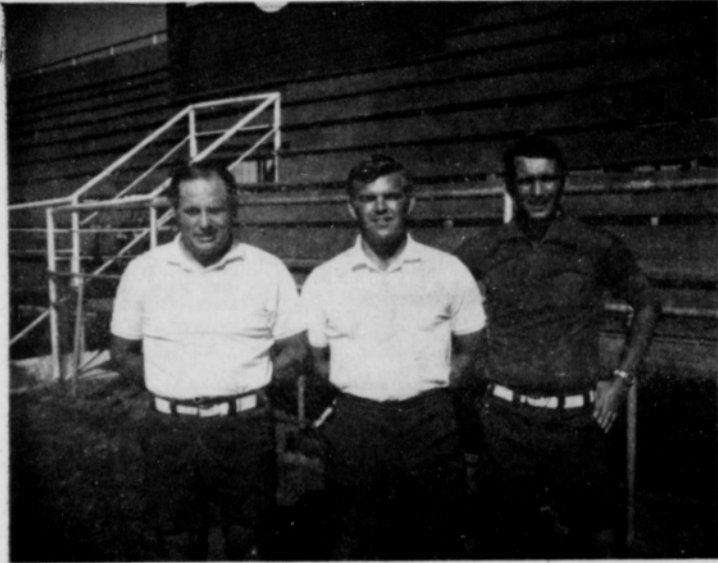

Savings Bonds Sales Total \$20,779 in Aug.

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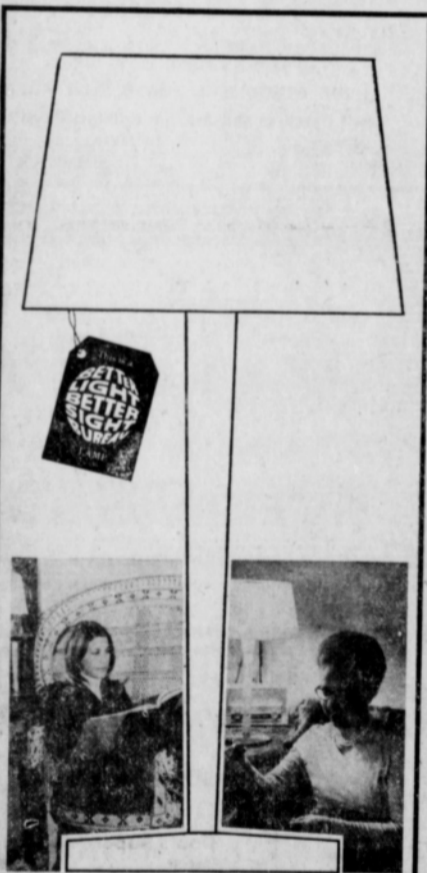

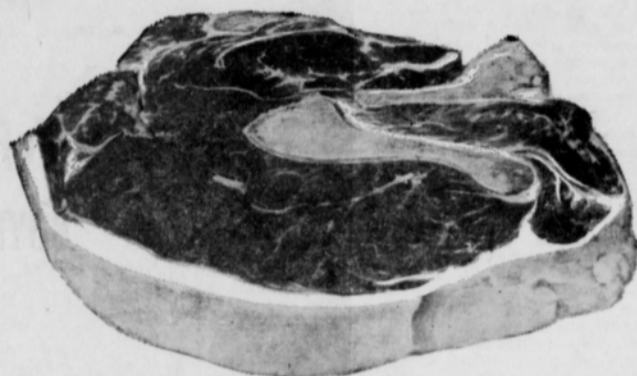

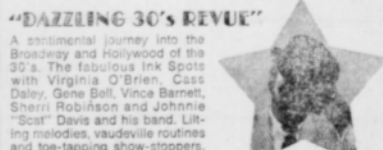
