

"I have in my department some 1100 miles of lines to give attention in connection with taxation and land questions. In this whole area I have found only one or two counties in which the general tax rate is as low as in Floyd County, and when I speak of this, I do not mean the total tax including tax for road bonds and things of that kind that a Commissioners' Court has no power over. What I mean is the tax levied for general current expenses of the county. The constitutional limit for expenses of operating a county is 95 cents on the \$100 valuation, as is generally known. In a large per cent of the counties in which we operate this rate is effective, while in many others the rate runs

> "Taxes have become a real burden in the past few years, and when a county is found where the court is making every effort to hold the tax bill down, the people ought to give their court credit for doing a good job. Floyd County, for instance, is surrounded by counties that have rates of from 80 cents to 95 cents not counting special taxes voted by the people, and this kind of thing ought to be noticed and commended by the taxpayers. 
