

Reagan Fares Well During First Month

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (UPI) — President Reagan meticulously devoted his first month in office to holding onto the nation's good will and addressing the issue he believes elected him — the economy.

In two nationwide broadcast, comments to reporters, meetings with Cabinet secretaries and discussions with Congress and special interest groups, Reagan primed the public for his austere economic program.

By so carefully laying the groundwork for the plan, Reagan and his assistants did as much as possible to protect themselves politically and to preserve the good feelings that prevailed through his first four weeks in office.

It will be worthwhile, the next time Reagan speaks before Congress, to measure his reception against the standing, cheering welcome he enjoyed last Wednesday night.

For now, however, the president and his palace guards believe they are off to a fine start — thanks to some help, and some luck.

Farmers, who supported him because

he promised to lift the grain embargo against the Soviet Union, have muted their opposition to Reagan's apparent decision to keep the embargo in place.

Big city mayors have not been nearly as vocal as expected in their criticism of the administration's promised cuts in federal spending.

Democrats, like Sen. William Proxmire of Wisconsin, are saying the new president deserves a chance to try his programs.

And Reagan had the good fortune to be inaugurated on the day the American hostages were freed in Iran. The resulting surge of patriotism put the country in a mood of "we're all in this together" optimism.

These factors, together with the good humor he unfailingly displays in public, have pushed the president's approval rating as high or higher than any chief executive's during his "honeymoon" period, according to pollsters.

And they freed Reagan to trumpet without timidity the causes he championed for a decade along the campaign trail — the anti-big government "new

federalism" and attacks on what he calls the "godless Communists."

The difference now, of course, is that the candidate is president — a president elected by a huge margin that carried a public call for action.

Along with the focus on the economy, other developments, each carrying a clear message, have occurred.

Among them:

- Reagan has made it clear he will not tolerate Cuban mischief in the Caribbean or Central America.
- His remarks along those lines to Jamaican Prime Minister Edward Seaga and the decision to bolster the embattled government in El Salvador are also signals of general U.S. policy toward the Third World.
- Human rights as a paramount consideration of foreign policy is a notion that left Washington with Jimmy Carter.
- Reagan has appointed Ernest Lefever, an outspoken opponent of Carter's human rights advocacy, as the State Department's human rights overseer. Secretary of State Alexander Haig has declared fighting international terrorism

will be the nation's priority.

The warm welcome given South Korean strongman Chun Doo Han, who has imprisoned political foes, also underlined Reagan's pragmatic approach to foreign relations.

• The Soviet Union's tough rhetoric has been flung back in the Gremlin's face by Reagan. But his charge that the Communists will lie and cheat to reach their goals may also be a Reagan move to insulate his right flank for when he begins his planned arms control negotiations with the Soviets.

• Reagan has gone out of his way to build a partnership with Congress, especially the Democrats. But comments from people like House Speaker Thomas O'Neill and Senate Democratic leader Robert Byrd indicate the president must eventually give them more than his ear, funny stories and pats on the back.

• And finally, the extent of Reagan's involvement in policy questions is still unclear. The power of such top behind-the-scenes aide as Edwin Meese, James Baker and Michael Deaver will require more explanation as time goes by.

Legal Paradox Seen In Issue Of Sanity

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The case hinged on the issue of sanity.

One psychiatrist testified the defendant was "the most psychotic person" he'd ever seen. Another said the woman had thought she was strangling a rabbit instead of a little boy. A third said the defendant believed blacks were meant to be eaten like chickens.

But when it came time to decide, a jury in Oakland ruled Darlin June Cromer sane in the racial killing of 5-year-old Reginald Williams.

Sanity was also the issue two years ago, when "Vampire Killer" Richard Chase was convicted of killing six people and drinking the blood of some of them — and found sane.

Conversely, Dan White, who admitted shooting San Francisco Mayor George Moscone and Supervisor Harvey Milk, was judged to be mentally incompetent at the time of the killings.

All three cases point to some of the weaknesses of a system that allows people who appear insane to be judged sane and apparently sane people to be judged incapacitated.

Why would juries find Miss Cromer and Chase sane but side with White? Psychiatrist Donald Lunde of Stanford Law School, who testified in the Cromer and White trials, believes it may have something to do with the nature of the crimes.

"In cases where the crimes are terrible, the jury, acting on behalf of the community, decides in favor of revenge," Lunde said, noting that the theory applies in the Cromer and Chase cases.

"The more outrageous and bizarre the crime, the more likely the jury is to say they're sane."

Both Miss Cromer and Chase entered pleas of innocent by reason of insanity. Under state law, the trials were held in two phases, first to determine guilt and then sanity.

Had they been found guilty but insane, they would have been institutionalized.

White pleaded innocent but his attorney admitted his client committed the slayings and pleaded "diminished capacity," claiming White was not in control during the shootings.

During the Cromer and Chase trials, a parade of psychiatrists pronounced the defendants insane while prosecutors used their own psychiatrists to discredit the testimony.

Alameda County Deputy District Attorney Albert Melong urged the Cromer jurors to ignore psychiatric "hocus pocus" and find her guilty of first-degree murder.

"The mystic knights of psychiatry can tell you anything and everything," he said. "She's just a bad person. The prisons are full of them."

Prosecutor Ronald Tochtermann repeatedly attacked the concept of psychiatric defense during the Chase trial, saying, "The mere fact that there is a pat psychological explanation does not mean they were not crimes in law."

Dr. Thomas Szasz of Syracuse, N.Y., who testified for the prosecution at the Cromer trial, says the sanity issue has no place in criminal trials.

"The reason is that it usurps the job of the jury to determine the nature of the act," he said. "What is wrong with the insanity plea is that it creates an impression that it is not the person but the insanity that does something."

If an insanity plea is successful, usually the person is judged not guilty," he added. If the person has admitted his guilt, Szasz asked, "How can that be?"

Juries also take psychiatric testimony into account in weighing verdicts and recommending sentences. In the Cromer case, the jury foreman said the defendant was mentally ill when she kidnapped and strangled the boy, but not sick enough to be called insane. So they sentenced her to life in prison rather than death in the gas chamber.

Jurors in the Chase trial had no such qualms, and he got the death penalty. He committed suicide in his San Quentin cell last December.

In the White trial, which had only one phase because of the "diminished capacity" plea, the jury sympathized with the former supervisor and convicted him of manslaughter rather than murder.

The plate she sold is actually valued at more than \$1,800. Although MacArthur points out that this price is exceptionally high, he said, "I'm afraid others may be losing hundreds or thousands of dollars by not knowing what their plates are worth."

Atlanta Ministers Seek Prayers

ATLANTA, Ga. (Special) — Atlanta pastors — black and white — are urging their parishioners as well as the entire nation to fast and pray every Wednesday afternoon for an end to the murders of black children in the city.

In the past 19 months, 15 black children have been murdered and four more are missing and feared dead, including one black child who was reported missing since Thursday afternoon.

After the body of 14-year-old Lubie "Chuck" Geter was discovered on a wooded roadside Feb. 5, an interracial, interdenominational group of ministers met at First Baptist Church to determine what they could do to stop the murders and to bring the person, or persons, responsible to justice.

Geter frequently attended programs at Memorial Drive Baptist Center, a Christian social ministries operation of the Atlanta Baptist Association and the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board.

Between the time he was reported missing Jan. 3, and the discovery of the body, Geter's father suffered a heart attack, necessitating financial and other aid from Baptists and the center director, Freddie Mae Bason.

Charles Stanley, white pastor of First Baptist Church, helped form the Atlanta Interracial Prayer Committee, which in turn held a city-wide prayer meeting and encouraged Christians to adopt the weekly fast and prayer vigil.

"In the Bible," Stanley explained, "every time God's people came together fasting and praying out of a sense of desperation and dependence on God, He answered their prayers. We're expecting Him to do the same in this case."

At the prayer meeting, Stanley had the 200 participants divide into groups of five. They asked God to reveal the person responsible for the murders, to meet the needs of families who have lost children, to comfort surviving children who live in fear of being the next victim, and bring a sense of unity to the community.

In addition to interdenominational prayer efforts, the Atlanta Baptist Association Executive Committee offered support to city officials.

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Cuban Interference In El Salvador Hit

Meese said the United States would not be limited to using military force against Cuba, however, but could resort to "economic steps."

"There are intermediate actions that can be taken which have to do with informing the peoples of other countries about what's happening," he said. Later, speaking with reporters as he and Reagan prepared to board Air Force

One, Meese said the administration has developed contingency plans to deal with developments in El Salvador but "we're not going to say what they are, nor are we precluding anything."

Shortly before President Carter left office, the United States sent \$10 million in military aid to El Salvador. State Department spokeswoman Sondra McCarty said Sunday there presently are "less than 20" U.S. military advisers in the tiny Central American nation, mostly technicians to help with maintenance and training on six helicopters.

Cuban Influence Cited

Last week, a State Department memorandum charged that Salvadoran civil strife had become "a textbook case of indirect armed aggression by Communist powers."

The memo asserted that "the political direction, organization and arming of the Salvadoran insurgency is coordinated and heavily influenced by Cuba with the active support of the Soviet Union... and other Communist countries."

Meese denied the new Reagan administration is using a "confrontational attitude" in dealing with the Soviets, but said officials want to let the Soviets know "there are some things they cannot do with impunity."

Peace Goal Stressed

"They cannot continue to deal with the United States on a normal trade basis, for example, and at the same time expand their armed forces into other parts of the world," he said.

Meese said President Reagan and Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. have been sending signals to the Soviets warning them that the United States is beginning a "new era of foreign policy."

"We're not belligerent. We're not arrogant. All we're interested in is keeping the peace of the world along with our allies," he said.

Believe 'Signal' Received

Asked if there is evidence that the Soviets are getting that signal, Meese replied: "Well that's hard to say, but I would speculate that they probably are."

Commenting on Soviet Defense Minister Marshal Dmitri F. Ustinov's speech in Moscow Saturday accusing the United States of trying to reopen the Cold War, Meese said the Soviets were reacting to a "new (U.S.) administration that is taking necessary steps to preserve world peace."

"Frankly, I think it's a good thing to find the Russians reacting for a change instead of having it all their own way," he said.

Dissident's Wife Says Contact Lost With Husband

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — The wife of Jewish dissident Anatoly Shcharansky said Sunday that her husband has not been heard from since early December, when he spent two weeks in solitary confinement in a Soviet prison camp.

Shcharansky, 33, was sentenced to 13 years in prison in 1978 after he was convicted of espionage in a trial that was condemned by the West.

His wife, Avital Shcharansky said Yosef Mendeleovich, the Jewish dissident who arrived here last week after he was released from a Soviet prison camp, told her that Shcharansky had spent two weeks in solitary in December after he refused to perform hard labor in the Ural Mountains camp where he was confined.

According to Mrs. Shcharansky, the solitary confinement followed her husband's release from the hospital.

Mrs. Shcharansky said her mother-in-law had told her in a recent telephone call from Moscow that Soviet authorities were evading inquiries regarding Shcharansky's condition.

Mrs. Shcharansky said she had appealed to French Communist leader Georges Marchais and other European Communists participating in this week's Communist Party congress in Moscow to pressure the Soviets to release her husband.

Earlier this month, four "counter-revolutionaries" were sentenced to death and 27 others to prison for terrorist acts that AIM said were carried out from bases in neighboring, pro-West Malawi in alliance with the anti-Marxist Mozambican National Resistance.

It said the defendants were members of the "Free Africa Movement" which it accused of being allied with the anti-Marxist group and supported by white minority-ruled South Africa.

South African military officials dismissed the Soviet naval presence as a show of solidarity to the Mozambique government, which signed a friendship treaty with the Soviet Union in 1977.

The Mozambique president criticized the raids as "serious violations of our sovereignty and independence."

Mozambique has been troubled by domestic unrest as well as the South African raids against the alleged black guerrilla bases.

change workers' payroll deduction status back to zero. But the News reported that many workers repeated the process and changed their filing status again.

Dean Hazel, a GM employee from Pontiac who founded the tax protest group "We The People ACT," said an estimated 700 group members pay \$65 in monthly dues for such benefits as tax law workshops and cassette tapes explaining the rationale for avoiding taxes.

He said he did not pay income taxes last year partly because he believes labor is a person's property and that the individual trades it to an employer for wages, therefore making it ineligible to be taxed.

Defeats Claimed In W-4 Cases

"If Nawrocki wants to haul our guys into court, he'll get his ears pinned back," said Hazel. "The IRS has been losing on 'false and fraudulent' W-4 cases for years. So many people are doing it they'll never be able to keep up."

Nawrocki said the IRS had increased its audits of tax returns and had begun forwarding names of violators to its collection unit to obtain compensation for tax liabilities.

However, only five cases had been referred for possible prosecution and in only one case had the IRS recommended criminal prosecution, the News reported.

Russian Warships Guard Mozambique

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — The Soviet Union is sending an undisclosed number of warships to Mozambique, a Marxist country and strong Soviet ally, according to reports of a Soviet diplomat's news conference.

The action comes less than a month after commandos from neighboring white-minority-ruled South Africa raided a suburb of the Mozambican capital in an

Peru, Ecuador Seal Border After Clashes

LIMA, Peru (AP) — Peruvian and Ecuadorean troops sealed border crossings between their countries, including the Pan American Highway, Sunday, after renewed clashes over the unmarked frontier in the foothills of the Andes.

Neither side reported new fighting, Sunday, but earlier skirmishes raised fears that the territorial dispute could expand into a war. Peru warned it might carry the conflict into Ecuador and both sides reported that they were considering a break in diplomatic relations.

The office of Peruvian President Fernando Belaunde Terry said that, since Friday, Peruvian troops had seized three border posts from Ecuadorean soldiers in Peru's territory. The disputed area is not far from Peru's most productive oil fields.

10 Casualties

Ten soldiers, two of them Peruvians and the rest Ecuadoreans, have been killed since border skirmishes began on Jan. 28, according to official casualty counts.

The latest victim reported here was the co-pilot of a Peruvian helicopter shot down Friday morning. Peru said 13 other soldiers were injured in the crash.

On Sunday, both countries kept their armed forces on alert. All border crossings were closed and the Pan American Highway, which unites the nations along South America's Pacific Coast, was blocked on both sides by tanks and soldiers.

In Quito, Ecuador's capital, the government appealed to Argentina, Brazil, Chile and the United States — guarantors of a 1942 border treaty between the two South American nations — to prevent Peru from carrying out its threat to invade Ecuadorean soil.

Ambassadors of the four guarantor nations met late Saturday night in Brasilia, Brazil, and a diplomatic source said, Sunday, they were concerned about the mounting complaints of violations from both sides.

Military attaches from the four nations remained in the contested region but had limited access to the border, said the source close to the diplomatic effort.

Fuel Glut Causes Price Hike Halt

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The rate of wholesale gasoline price increases has started to level off because of a glut of gas on the market and competition among oil companies, the Lundberg Letter says.

Despite a rise in prices since President Reagan lifted oil controls, the oversupply has tempered the price climb, the weekly letter, which analyzes the oil market, said Friday.

Since Jan. 23, the largest average wholesale price increase among major brands was in Philadelphia, with an 8.15 cent jump, the letter said. The highest non-major brand increase occurred in Los Angeles, with an 8.48 cent increase.

The price slowdown "comes before all of the recently increased crude costs, foreign and domestic, have been passed through to the public," the letter said. "Evidently, competition is already slowing price escalations."

Top Poles, In Moscow, Warn Folks Back Home

WARSAW, Poland (UPI) Communist Party boss Stanislaw Kania, anticipating sharp criticism of Poland's labor and social crises, took his new soldier-prime minister to Moscow, Sunday, to the Soviet Communist Party congress, leaving behind a warning of dire economic trouble caused by strikes.

Following their departure, the official news agency released a communique on a meeting of local government chiefs chaired by new premier Wojciech Jaruzelski, saying "the situation of the economy is extremely difficult."

The statement said that because of production reduced to "dangerous limits," and led by a steep drop in Poland's biggest export — coal — the ability to buy necessary imports is now "painfully limited."

"Will Get Worse"

"If there is not a quick and effective adjustment of the economy, liquidation of the results of strikes and restoring of working discipline, the situation will get worse and deepen already painful results in the people's lives," the communique said.

Production of coal was down 3.8 million tons in January, about one-third of the shortfall for the whole of last year, when Poland was rocked by labor strife, the statement said.

It called on municipalities to take "maximum measures to limit forces still threatening depression" of the economy and said plans were under way to give local governments more authority "to assure necessary conditions of stabilizing order, calm and respect for the law."

In the Polish capital, the government reported some gains in negotiations with leaders of the independent Solidarity labor group on a new labor law to legalize workers' right to strike.

Solidarity leader Lech Walesa and his aides agreed to give parliament the right to declare a two-month strike-free period once each year if economic conditions are considered critical.

Criminal Penalties

It was also agreed that union leaders would face criminal penalties if they called strikes not covered by the new law. Other major issues, such as strike pay, still must be considered.

The official Polish news agency, PAP, said Kania was accompanied to Moscow by Wojciech Jaruzelski, who was elevated from the post of defense minister to prime minister by the party's central committee, Feb. 11.

The visit came at a time when there were no outstanding labor disputes in Poland, partly due to Jaruzelski's appeal for a 90-day strike-free period to get the sagging economy back on its feet.

Kania, who replaced ousted party boss Edward Gierek in September at the height of the labor unrest, will have to explain to the Soviet bloc nations why there have been widespread defections from party ranks to Solidarity, which is spearheading demands for changes in Poland's communist system.

There has been public criticism from the East since Poland's labor crisis erupted, last summer, resulting in the formation of the Solidarity labor union.

Reds Join Solidarity

About 900,000 of Poland's three million Communist Party members are reported to have joined the Solidarity movement, and party officials privately admit it will be hard to hold a Polish party congress later this spring.

Jaruzelski's presence at the Soviet congress, held every five years, was considered unusual, as in the past the position of prime minister has not been one of the most powerful in Poland.

But the general, who still holds his defense portfolio, is also a full member of the ruling Politburo, and his appearance — possibly in uniform — is seen as a boost to Kania's image of taking a non-nonsense approach. The Soviet Union and Poland's other communist neighbors have been highly critical of the unrest in the country, which they see as a threat to East bloc stability.

Kania also was accompanied to Moscow by the head of the local Communist Party in the heavily industrialized Katowice region — Poland's second most powerful party district after Warsaw.

Politburo members directly responsible for security and economic problems were not listed in the delegation to Moscow.

the congress, the Soviet Communist Party daily Pravda said Sunday there had been "major successes" in Soviet foreign policy since the 1976 congress. It mentioned no failures. It also said the country had moved forward economically, technically, spiritually and in its "defensive might."

Since 1976, the Soviet Union has gained strong allies in Ethiopia and South Yemen, strengthened ties with Syria and improved its positions in Indochina, while watching the United States lose ground in Iran, Nicaragua and other nations.

But the Soviet Union also faces a difficult guerrilla war in Afghanistan, sees NATO and the Common Market gaining new members, is beset by trouble in Poland and is confronted by U.S. plans for new military expenditures.

The United States also has strengthened its position in Somalia, possibly offsetting Soviet gains in Ethiopia, and masterminded the Camp David peace treaty between Egypt and Israel, essentially cutting the Soviet Union out of Middle East diplomacy.

"Preserving Peace"

Perhaps foreshadowing comments by Brezhnev at the congress, First Deputy Defense Minister Sergei Sokolov wrote Sunday in the military newspaper Red Star that Moscow will continue to pursue "a policy of preserving peace" despite what he called attempts by the United States and its allies to step up world tension.

The congress also will review the nation's economic situation. There is no indication whether Brezhnev will attempt to put the best possible light on Soviet economic progress, or will pointedly attack economic inefficiencies and planning failures, as he has in some previous speeches. He is also expected to stress the need to improve food supplies, a major national problem.



Levelland Man Killed; Policeman Hospitalized

sary to do that." Meese said the United States would not be limited to using military force against Cuba, however, but could resort to "economic steps."

"There are intermediate actions that can be taken which have to do with informing the peoples of other countries about what's happening," he said.

Later, speaking with reporters as he and Reagan prepared to board Air Force

One, Meese said the administration has developed contingency plans to deal with developments in El Salvador but "we're not going to say what they are, nor are we precluding anything."

Shortly before President Carter left office, the United States sent \$10 million in military aid to El Salvador. State Department spokeswoman Sondra McCarty said Sunday there presently are "less than 20" U.S. military advisers in the tiny Central American nation, mostly technicians to help with maintenance and training on six helicopters.

Cuban Influence Cited

Last week, a State Department memorandum charged that Salvadoran civil strife had become "a textbook case of indirect armed aggression by Communist powers."

The memo asserted that "the political direction, organization and arming of the Salvadoran insurgency is coordinated and heavily influenced by Cuba with the active support of the Soviet Union... and other Communist countries."

Meese denied the new Reagan administration is using a "confrontational attitude" in dealing with the Soviets, but said officials want to let the Soviets know "there are some things they cannot do with impunity."

Peace Goal Stressed

"They cannot continue to deal with the United States on a normal trade basis, for example, and at the same time expand their armed forces into other parts of the world," he said.

Meese said President Reagan and Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. have been sending signals to the Soviets warning them that the United States is beginning a "new era of foreign policy."

"We're not belligerent. We're not arrogant. All we're interested in is keeping the peace of the world along with our allies," he said.

Believe 'Signal' Received

Asked if there is evidence that the Soviets are getting that signal, Meese replied, "Well that's hard to say, but I would speculate that they probably are."

Commenting on Soviet Defense Minister Marshal Dmitri F. Ustinov's speech in Moscow Saturday accusing the United States of trying to reopen the Cold War, Meese said the Soviets were reacting to a "new U.S. administration that is taking necessary steps to preserve world peace."

"Frankly, I think it's a good thing to find the Russians reacting for a change instead of having it all their own way," he said.

Dissident's Wife Says Contact Lost With Husband

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — The wife of Jewish dissident Anatoly Shcharansky said Sunday that her husband has not been heard from since early December, when he spent two weeks in solitary confinement in a Soviet prison camp.

Shcharansky, 33, was sentenced to 13 years in prison in 1978 after he was convicted of espionage in a trial that was condemned by the West.

His wife, Avital Shcharansky said Yosef Mendelevich, the Jewish dissident who arrived here last week after he was released from a Soviet prison camp, told her that Shcharansky had spent two weeks in solitary in December after he refused to perform hard labor in the Ural Mountains camp where he was confined.

According to Mrs. Shcharansky, the solitary confinement followed her husband's release from the hospital.

Mrs. Shcharansky said her mother-in-law had told her in a recent telephone call from Moscow that Soviet authorities were evading inquiries regarding Shcharansky's condition.

Mrs. Shcharansky said she had appealed to French Communist leader Georges Marchais and other European Communists participating in this week's Communist Party congress in Moscow to pressure the Soviets to release her husband.

change workers' payroll deduction status back to zero. But the News reported that many workers repeated the process and changed their filing status again.

Dean Hazel, a GM employee from Pontiac who founded the tax protest group "We The People ACT," said an estimated 700 group members pay \$65 in monthly dues for such benefits as tax law workshops and cassette tapes explaining the rationale for avoiding taxes.

He said he did not pay income taxes last year partly because he believes labor is a person's property and that the individual trades it to an employer for wages, therefore making it ineligible to be taxed.

Defeats Claimed In W-4 Cases

"If Nawrocki wants to haul our guys into court, he'll get his ears pinned back," said Hazel. "The IRS has been losing on 'false and fraudulent' W-4 cases for years. So many people are doing it they'll never be able to keep up."

Nawrocki said the IRS had increased its audits of tax returns and had begun forwarding names of violators to its collection unit to obtain compensation for tax liabilities.

However, only five cases had been referred for possible prosecution and in only one case had the IRS recommended criminal prosecution, the News reported.

Russian Warships Guard Mozambique

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — The Soviet Union is sending an undisclosed number of warships to Mozambique, a Marxist country and strong Soviet ally, according to reports of a Soviet diplomat's news conference.

The action comes less than a month after commandos from neighboring white-minority-ruled South Africa raided a suburb of the Mozambican capital in an

attack on black guerrillas.

Soviet Ambassador to Mozambique Valentin Vdovin said at a news conference Saturday in Maputo, Mozambique's capital, that the 16,000-ton cruiser Aleksandr Suvorov and another Soviet ship from the Indian Ocean fleet docked last week at Maputo and the Mozambique port city of Beira. The ambassador's remarks were reported by the official Mozambican news agency AIM.

Other Ships Coming

He reportedly said an undisclosed number of other Soviet warships will arrive "in the next few days" but did not say how long they would remain.

AIM quoted Vdovin as saying, "We are not threatening anyone, but if anyone attacks our friends, we will give a suitable response."

The Soviet warship deployment coincides with a South Africa's announcement last month that it was transferring a squadron of fighter planes from Pretoria to a base closer to Mozambique.

The South African government believes Mozambique is becoming a staging ground for black guerrillas with the outlawed African National Congress, which is fighting white minority rule in South Africa, and the South-West Africa People's Organization, mostly based in Angola and waging a campaign for independence of South-West Africa, or Namibia.

South African officials have said they view the arrival of the Soviet ships as an expression of the solidarity between Mozambique and the Soviet Union, which signed a friendship treaty in 1977.

Guerrillas Killed

On Jan. 30, South African commandos stormed across the border into Mozambique and claimed killing 30 guerrillas of the ANC at Matola, a suburb of the Mozambican capital and 31 miles from the South African border. Mozambique said the raiders, who acknowledged two commando deaths, killed 13 black South African refugees and a white Portuguese passerby.

Later, Mozambican President Samora Machel called a mass rally and accused eight of his military officers of being traitors who assisted the South African commandos. AIM said the agency said the officers were accused of selling secrets to unidentified foreign agents and letting the commandos in without firing on them.

The Mozambican president criticized the raids as "serious violations of our sovereignty and independence."

Mozambique has been troubled by domestic unrest as well as the South African raids against the alleged black guerrilla bases.

Earlier this month, four "counter-revolutionaries" were sentenced to death and 27 others to prison for terrorist acts that AIM said were carried out from bases in neighboring, pro-West Malawi in alliance with the anti-Marxist Mozambican National Resistance.

It said the defendants were members of the "Free Africa Movement" which it accused of being allied with the anti-Marxist group and supported by white minority-ruled South Africa.

South African military officials dismissed the Soviet naval presence as a show of solidarity to the Mozambique government, which signed a friendship treaty with the Soviet Union in 1977.

Two Still Missing In Crash At Sea

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — A tourist helicopter carrying a newlywed couple and a family of five crashed, Sunday, off Santa Catalina Island and sank in the ocean. The pilot was seriously injured and two passengers were missing.

Sheriff's scuba divers were sent to the site of the crash, about 300 yards off the island's community of Avalon, to search for the missing pair, who were presumed to be trapped in the submerged Catalina Airlines helicopter.

"These people could have found an air pocket and still be alive," Coast Guard spokesman Garth Groff said.

Top Poles, In Moscow, Warn Folks Back Home

WARSAW, Poland (UPI) Communist Party boss Stanislaw Kania, anticipating sharp criticism of Poland's labor and social crises, took his new soldier-prime minister to Moscow, Sunday, to the Soviet Communist Party congress, leaving behind a warning of dire economic trouble caused by strikes.

Following their departure, the official news agency released a communique on a meeting of local government chiefs chaired by new premier Wojciech Jaruzelski, saying "the situation of the economy is extremely difficult."

The statement said that because of production reduced to "dangerous limits," and led by a steep drop in Poland's biggest export — coal — the ability to buy necessary imports is now "painfully limited."

"Will Get Worse"

"If there is not a quick and effective adjustment of the economy, liquidation of the results of strikes and restoring of working discipline, the situation will get worse and deepen already painful results in the people's lives," the communique said.

Production of coal was down 3.8 million tons in January, about one-third of the shortfall for the whole of last year, when Poland was rocked by labor strife, the statement said.

It called on municipalities to take "maximum measures to limit forces still threatening depression" of the economy and said plans were under way to give local governments more authority "to assure necessary conditions of stabilizing order, calm and respect for the law."

In the Polish capital, the government reported some gains in negotiations with leaders of the independent Solidarity labor group on a new labor law to legalize workers' right to strike.

Solidarity leader Lech Walesa and his aides agreed to give parliament the right to declare a two-month strike-free period once each year if economic conditions are considered critical.

Criminal Penalties

It was also agreed that union leaders would face criminal penalties if they called strikes not covered by the new law. Other major issues, such as strike pay, still must be considered.

The official Polish news agency, PAP, said Kania was accompanied to Moscow by Wojciech Jaruzelski, who was elevated from the post of defense minister to prime minister by the party's central committee, Feb. 11.

The visit came at a time when there were no outstanding labor disputes in Poland, partly due to Jaruzelski's appeal for a 90-day strike-free period to get the sagging economy back on its feet.

Kania, who replaced ousted party boss Edward Gierek in September at the height of the labor unrest, will have to

explain to the Soviet bloc nations why there have been widespread defections from party ranks to Solidarity, which is spearheading demands for changes in Poland's communist system.

There has been public criticism from the East since Poland's labor crisis erupted, last summer, resulting in the formation of the Solidarity labor union.

Reds Join Solidarity

About 900,000 of Poland's three million Communist Party members are reported to have joined the Solidarity movement, and party officials privately admit it will be hard to hold a Polish party congress later this spring.

Jaruzelski's presence at the Soviet congress, held every five years, was considered unusual, as in the past the position of prime minister has not been one

of the most powerful in Poland.

But the general, who still holds the defense portfolio, is also a full member of the ruling Politburo, and his appearance — possibly in uniform — is seen as a boost to Kania's image of taking a non-nonsense approach. The Soviet Union and Poland's other communist neighbors have been highly critical of the unrest in the country, which they see as a threat to East bloc stability.

Kania also was accompanied to Moscow by the head of the local Communist Party in the heavily industrialized Katowice region — Poland's second most powerful party district after Warsaw.

Politburo members directly responsible for security and economic problems were not listed in the delegation to Mos-

the congress, the Soviet Communist Party daily Pravda said Sunday there had been "major successes" in Soviet foreign policy since the 1976 congress. It mentioned no failures. It also said the country had moved forward economically, technically, spiritually and in its "defensive might."

Since 1976, the Soviet Union has gained strong allies in Ethiopia and South Yemen, strengthened ties with Syria and improved its positions in Indochina, while watching the United States lose ground in Iran, Nicaragua and other nations.

But the Soviet Union also faces a difficult guerrilla war in Afghanistan, sees NATO and the Common Market gaining new members, is beset by trouble in Poland and is confronted by U.S. plans for

new military expenditures

The United States also has strengthened its position in Somalia, possibly offsetting Soviet gains in Ethiopia, and masterminded the Camp David peace treaty between Egypt and Israel, essentially cutting the Soviet Union out of Middle East diplomacy.

"Preserving Peace"

Perhaps foreshadowing comments by Brezhnev at the congress, First Deputy Defense Minister Sergei Sokolov wrote Sunday in the military newspaper Red Star that Moscow will continue to pursue "a policy of preserving peace" despite what he called attempts by the United States and its allies to step up world tension.

The congress also will review the nation's economic situation. There is no indication whether Brezhnev will attempt to put the best possible light on Soviet economic progress, or will pointedly attack economic inefficiencies and planning failures, as he has in some previous speeches. He is also expected to stress the need to improve food supplies, a major national problem.

Tehran Frees Three Of Four Captive Britons

LONDON (AP) — Iran's revolutionary Islamic government has freed three British church workers held on espionage charges for seven months, and they are ready to return home, the archbishop of Canterbury's special envoy said, Sunday night, in a telephone call from Tehran.

The envoy, Terry Waite, said he believed a fourth Briton detained by Iran, businessman Andrew Pyke, 37, remained in custody.

Waite has been negotiating with the Iranians since last Christmas for the release of all four Britons.

Several Iranian officials, speaking with reporters in Tehran after the 52 American hostages were freed, Jan. 20, said the three Britons associated with the Church of England would not be placed on trial and would be released soon.

Waite reported they had been freed in a telephone call from his Tehran hotel to Press Association, the British domestic news agency.

The three are medical missionaries Dr. John Coleman and his wife Audrey, both 58, and Jean Waddell, also 58 and the Scottish secretary to the bishop of Iran, who is now in exile in England.

"I have been with them all day and they are in very good spirits," Press Association quoted Waite as saying.

Waite has made two visits to Tehran representing the archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Rev. Robert Runcie.

Runcie had said he believed his position as head of the worldwide Anglican communion might give his emissary more influence with Iran's Moslem leader, Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, than a diplomat would have.

WOMAN'S DEATH PROBED

LAREDO (AP) — Authorities are investigating the death of a 21-year-old Lafayette, La., woman who apparently fell or jumped from a seventh-story hotel window early Sunday. Three Lafayette men were being held on \$10,000 bond each, but authorities would not say what connection they believed the men had with the death.

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Nominee Criticizes Activist Catholics

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some activist priests and nuns have "overstepped their bounds" of religious freedom by becoming involved in political struggles in Latin America, says President Reagan's nominee to head the State Department's human rights office.
 Ernest W. Lefever, named last week to be assistant secretary of state for human rights, said that while he supports freedom of religious thought, he objects to religion being "used as a garb for cloaking political activity."
 The subject arose during a recent discussion of Lefever's contention that the United States must support friendly "authoritarian" regimes to prevent their overthrow by "totalitarian" forces.
 "Totalitarian" governments that control communist nations permit no freedoms, he said, while "authoritarian" governments allow many, such as freedom of religion and freedom of the press.

When asked if freedom of religion exists in countries where socially active priests and nuns are threatened with violence from right-wing and government security forces, Lefever made a distinction between freedom of religious thought and social activism.
 "There is a difference between religious leaders being involved in theological thought, and nuns and clergymen engaging in activities inimical to the interests of the government," Lefever said. "It's a question where religion is used as a garb for cloaking political activity. ... Some religious groups have overstepped their bounds."
 As an example of such political activity, he cited allegations of "nuns hiding machine guns for the insurgents."
 Lefever's remarks come amid growing social activism by representatives of the Roman Catholic Church in Latin America, where many priests and nuns have claimed that working towards "social justice" is a legitimate part of their ministry.
 That trend has been met in some countries with increased violence against church officials by right-wing forces, often alleged to be government-directed.
 In El Salvador, Archbishop Oscar Arnulfo Romero, an outspoken advocate of

social and economic reform to aid the rights but upgrading it... We're broadening the concept of human rights."
 That new approach, he said, requires recognition of the frequent necessity for U.S. officials, in setting foreign policy, to "choose between the lesser of two evils."
 Lefever added that "choosing the lesser of two evils is the essence of morality... Perfection is never a question."
 Accusing the Carter administration of "certain simplicisms" in its human-rights approach, Lefever argued that "both public scoldings and punitive measures against allies tend to be counterproductive."
 He urged instead the use of "quiet diplomacy" to encourage friendly governments to improve their human-rights records and the reservation of public condemnation for unfriendly governments.
 Lefever added that a proposal to terminate the annual State Department human-rights report was under review.
 "We'll examine the utility of this report," he said. "Some ambassadors have said it's counterproductive. It gets the back up of the criticized governments. Others say it's constructive."

 Committee members who worked on the report were appointed during the Ford and Carter administrations. President Reagan has opposed restrictions on handguns.

 "The presence of an officer familiar with the juveniles and aware of the problems of the neighborhood creates an atmosphere where positive interaction between juveniles and law enforcement personnel can occur," the report said.
 Other suggested standards cover arrest of juveniles, diet for delinquents in homes, security for and destruction of law enforcement records about juveniles, and other areas.
 Among the suggested standards were these:
 —That every state establish an executive office of youth advocate, with power to investigate and report on malfeasance in the juvenile justice system.
 —That all forms of plea-bargaining be abolished in juvenile cases.
 —That local and state governments establish co-educational training schools for delinquent juveniles with no more than 100 juveniles per school, and that the federal government turn over to state and local authorities any juveniles judged

Juvenile Justice Improvements Urged

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal advisory committee has issued a set of standards for improving juvenile justice, ranging from greater use of foot patrolmen by police to legislation restricting handguns.
 The 522-page report by the National Advisory Committee for Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention was completed last July and released Sunday by the Justice Department's Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, which coordinated the five-year research project.

The report contains 286 standards covering virtually every aspect of the juvenile justice system. The committee that adopted them is a 21-member panel whose members, appointed by the president to four-year terms, work in the juvenile justice system or for private groups in the field.
 The committee was authorized by the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974 to draft the standards, but the report notes that its recommendations do not necessarily represent official policies of the Justice Department.
 Among its more controversial recommendations is passage of federal and state legislation to prohibit the manufacture and sale of handguns for other than official purposes.
 "Noting that most Americans who keep handguns do so for self-defense, the report said, 'For every burglar stopped by a gun, four to six homeowners or family members are killed by a gun in accidents. When a homeowner keeps a handgun in the home, there is a great risk that children will discover it. When a hand-

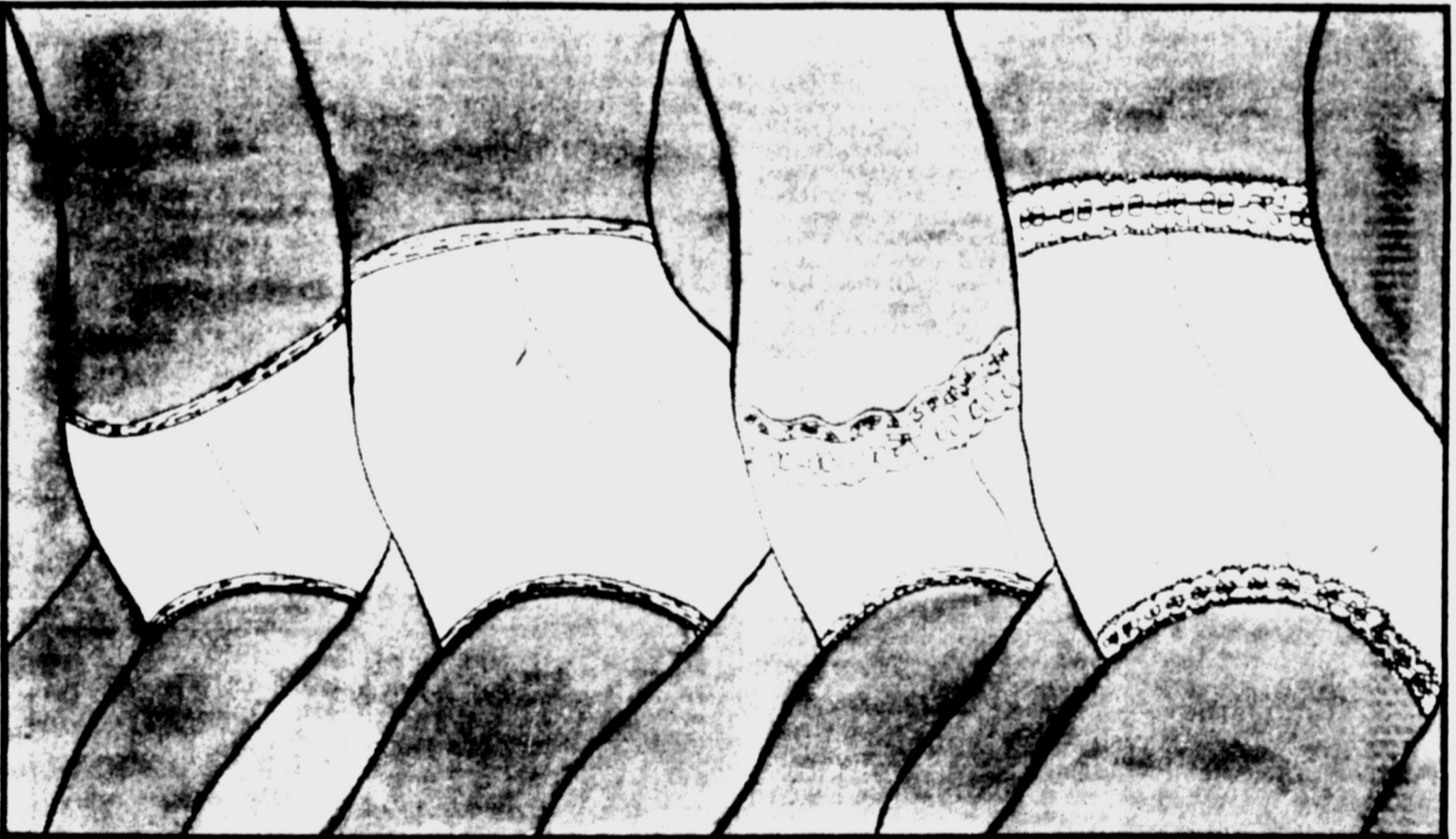

 Implementation of the standards is voluntary, and the committee said they were designed to provide direction for change and a benchmark for measuring progress in improving juvenile justice.

 The governor said Mrs. Roath had a point and he asked Public Safety Commissioner Larry Lunnan to investigate.
 The governor's office announced Friday a new patrol policy will allow troopers to wear mustaches as long as the bristles do not extend more than a quarter inch beyond the corner of the mouth or drop below the outline of the upper lip.
 The mustaches also have to be neatly groomed and can not be waxed.

Woman Wins Island Paradise

INVERNESS, Fla. (AP) — When the grandfather clock chimes the quarter-hour, Thelma Rawlings rushes to the door. "I'm about run to death trying to figure out which bell is which," she says.
 "I walk around mumbling to myself, says the Kansas farm wife goggling as she hunts belongings unpacked weeks ago and misplaced in her sprawling island home.
 Thelma and her husband, Raymond Rawlings, fled the snows of Eureka, Kan., and their century-old farmhouse last month for their new \$300,000 home on a lake island in central Florida.
 Mrs. Rawlings won the 2.5-acre home-stead with 1,000 feet of lakefront, its eight-room, custom-built, wood-frame home, two boats and a boathouse with electric doors in a Viceroy Sweepstakes.
 The perennial contest entrant was awarded the first-prize retreat last fall when her entry was picked from among 2 million contest entrants. She mailed a single coupon clipped from an outdoors magazine.

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Solar Explosion Peril To Power Systems Seen

COLLEGE STATION (AP) — An electrical engineering researcher says the nation's power distribution systems are becoming increasingly vulnerable to interruption from explosions taking place on the sun.

The charged particles and magnetic fields blasted off in sunspots have led to overloads on power lines that have exploded transformers and tripped safety relays and circuit breakers nationwide, he says.

"The whole power system is not going to just fall apart," said Dr. Don Russell, power protective systems specialist and director of the Electric Power Institute in Texas A&M University's Electrical Engineering Department and Texas Engineering Experiment Station.

"But power distribution systems in the United States are not meant to withstand widespread disturbances such as solar activity or, say, nuclear blasts, which are scaled-down versions of solar flares," Russell said.

Astronomers say the chance of solar flares affecting the earth is now at its highest probability because of an increase in sunspots.

The material is spewed out as huge clouds of charged particles and a magnetic field generated by the sun. If the earth is in the way, the atmosphere first gets flooded with x-rays that cause radio blackouts, make navigation satellite signals

unreliable and add ghosts to radar images, he said.

Within two hours after the x-rays, high-speed protons and electrons blown from the sun's corona arrive and are captured by the earth's magnetic field. Long-term communications blackouts and radiation hazards to air travelers crossing the poles follow, Russell said.

Then the main concentration of particles and the magnetic field roars past, rattling the earth's magnetic field with intense electrical currents.

The barrage produces aurorae — shimmering, flickering curtains of light usually seen over the earth's poles. At sunspot maximum, aurorae can be seen farther south, once within a degree of the equator. At the surface, the earth's magnetic

field fluctuates, confusing homing pigeons and inducing electrical surges in power and telephone lines and the ground itself.

The electromagnetic interference coincides with the sunspot cycle maximum that supposedly occurs at 11-year intervals. It actually varies from seven to 17 years from peak to peak, Russell said.

"The implication for power systems' sensitivity to sunspots is that as new control technology predominates our system, we can expect a greater sensitivity to these previously ignored phenomena," Russell said.

"Utility companies are spending research dollars now to learn how sensitive the systems are and how to devise protective measures," he added.

The Electric Power Institute has been working under a \$450,000 grant to identify and characterize the magnetic interference, he said. The interference under study can come from power equipment itself, sunspots and nuclear explosions.

"We use the same equipment employed by the Air Force at Kirtland Air Force Base for nuclear blast studies," Russell said. But where the military studies electromagnetic pulses around missiles and aircraft, the electrical engineers set up near power lines, transformers, substations and switching yards.

Progress Closes Vickery Feed Store

DALLAS (AP) — The Vickery Feed Store, an oasis of rural Texas in the heart of North Dallas' nightclub-and-apartment section, is being forced to close its doors in the name of progress.

After almost 40 years in business, regular customers still cluster around the giant gas heater on the cracked, hardwood floor to discuss feed and fertilizer with shopkeepers Mack Mosier and Russell Hopkins.

"It's almost like a community center for our regular customers," Mosier said. "I know every one of my customers. Everybody's real friendly. The community needs it. There are a lot of horse pastures around here. Besides, it's the last stand of Vickery."

During the late '40s and early '50s, hundreds of farmers who lived near the quiet, unincorporated farming community of Vickery, were served by the store.

Suicide Results In Deaths Of Children

MESQUITE (AP) — A tragic twist in the apparent suicide of a police officer's wife resulted in the deaths of her two sleeping children after carbon monoxide filled the family's home, authorities said.

Jackie Marie Heerd, 33, left a suicide note to her husband and children and was found lying on the kitchen floor of the family's home in this Dallas suburb Saturday, police said.

She apparently was returning to the house from the adjoining garage when she collapsed, leaving the door to the garage open and allowing the gas to enter the house, said Tony Badger, field investigator for the Dallas County Medical Examiner's office.

The woman's husband, Mesquite police Sgt. Richard Heerd, discovered the bodies of his estranged wife and children — 5-year-old Richard Lawrence and 10-year-old Sheryl Lynn — about 5 p.m.

"We think it happened sometime in the morning because the car had run out of gas, the kids were still in bed and it looked as if they had all been dead about six hours," Badger said.

The children were clad in pajamas in their beds, he added.

Badger issued a preliminary ruling of accidental asphyxiation by carbon monoxide in the children's deaths.

"It didn't look like she meant to kill the kids," he said. "She left a note to her children and husband."

Badger said it appeared Mrs. Heerd had attempted to go into the house after turning on the car.

"She may have changed her mind about committing suicide, she may have remembered one last thing to do. We don't know," he said.

Mrs. Heerd apparently had been trying to use a plastic bag to inhale fumes from the exhaust pipe of the car.

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Chavez Criticizes Budget Cuts

SAN JUAN (AP) — The Reagan administration will not be able to bridge inflation with tax cuts for the rich and fewer programs for the poor, United Farm Workers President Cesar Chavez said Sunday.

"We can see some real tough times beginning when the new budget takes effect in August," Chavez said at a news conference. "I doubt seriously whether that administration is going to be able to deal with it."

The labor leader was in Texas for the UFW's state convention, which went on record opposed to the administration's handling of bilingual education programs.

About 500 farmworkers, mostly from the Lower Rio Grande Valley, attended the one-day convention. It took place in a school gymnasium colorfully decorated with red and black banners and posters depicting farmworkers in the field, at the ballot box and on the picket line.

Almost all Texas farmworkers are Mexican-Americans who often speak only Spanish.

The Reagan administration has scrapped proposals left over from President Carter that would have made bilingual education mandatory in all 12 grades. Texas now requires the special instruction through the third grade.

"It is apparent that Ronald Reagan is no friend of the Mexican people or of the poor," the resolution said.

In another resolution, the group criti-

cized a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision upholding an employer's right to require employees to speak English on the job. The case originated in Brownsville.

Convention speakers did not mention a rival union, the Texas Farm Workers Union, by name but the UFW passed a resolution urging workers to support only one union "guided by our leader Cesar Chavez."

Antonio Orendain once was Chavez's director in Texas but the two split over organizational tactics. Orendain now heads the TFU, which is not affiliated with the AFL-CIO.

Chavez carefully avoided comment to reporters on Orendain and the TFU's call for a "general strike" against the Valley's citrus industry.

"I don't think so," he said when asked if the two groups will ever merge.

The citrus strike has not slowed the current harvest of oranges and grapefruit, growers report. At one point, Orendain's group picketed outside a unionized juice factory represented by the AFL-CIO.

"I know the AFL-CIO doesn't look upon that favorably," Chavez said.

Harry Hubbard, Texas AFL-CIO president, told the convention he supports legislation to extend workers' compensation coverage to agricultural workers injured on the job.

In other action, the convention endorsed a Democrat in a local state senate race that has drawn statewide interest

after Gov. Bill Clements campaigned for a Republican candidate.

Rep. Hector Uribe, D-Brownsville, received the UFW's support. He will face Republican attorney Ricardo Hinojosa of McAllen in a runoff Tuesday for an unexpired term. Raul Longoria vacated the

seat in January to become a state district judge.

Democratic legislators and state officials are pouring into the area in a last-ditch effort to keep the seat in the Democratic column. Hinojosa led a seven-man field in a Feb. 10 election.

Broken Rail Believed Possible Cause Of Dallas Train Wreck

DALLAS (AP) — A broken rail may have caused a Santa Fe freight train to derail and spark a fire that sent a huge cloud of black smoke over the city Friday, a federal investigator says.

Thurman Toal, a railroad accident investigator with the National Transportation Safety Board in Fort Worth, said a broken rail could have caused the train to leave the tracks.

"The rail along that section is fairly light," he said. "We found some broken rails." The track now is to decide whether they were broken before or after the accident.

Santa Fe spokesman Loren Simmons said officials had not determined what caused the derailment and fire which caused an estimated \$650,000 in damage. No one was injured.

"We know there was a derailment," he said. "The friction of the wheels may have caused a spark, and perhaps some trash between the rails on the bridge caught fire, but we're not sure."

Railroad crews worked through the weekend to clear the charred debris from the Trinity River bottom south of downtown, where three cars fell 50 feet from the blazing trestle Friday evening.

Santa Fe Railway officials, who estimated 300 feet of trestle and 360 feet of track would have to be replaced, said a new trestle would be ready in 10 days. A new ballast deck bridge on steel pilings

will replace the old wooden trestle, they said.

Officials said eight cars and two locomotives jumped the track just after the engineer applied the brakes on the 60-car train en route to Kansas City.

Toal and railroad officials differed on whether the derailment could have resulted in the explosion of a tank car carrying 3,000 gallons of fatty alcohol.

Toal said the tank car could have exploded into a huge fireball if the tank had ruptured. Simmons said the fatty alcohol was flammable, "but there was no danger of an explosion or of poisonous vapor."

Simmons said eight of the 11 cars on the trestle were empty and two contained non-hazardous plastic pellets.

The two cars full of plastic pellets and a car with sulphur residue were the ones that fell through the burning trestle, Simmons said.

Dallas environmental health investigators examined the site over the weekend, but a report on damage will not be issued until at least today.

Department director James Blankenship said preliminary findings showed environmental damage "was not of great consequence."

Officials said the rear wheels of the train's second locomotive went off the tracks about 4:45 p.m. The flames that quickly erupted burned for the next 4-1/2 hours, sending billowing clouds of boiling black smoke directly over downtown.

Iran Reportedly Sought To Subvert Sanctions

HOUSTON (AP) — Iran contacted Red Adair and a competing oil well firefighting company last fall in an effort to subvert U.S. sanctions against its government, The Dallas Morning News reported Sunday.

After receiving telex requests from Tehran, Adair and his competitor, Boots and Coots, forwarded the messages to Washington for guidance, the newspaper said.

The Carter administration, which had banned shipments of oil field equipment and technology to the Iranians in hopes the sanctions would help persuade the Iranians to release the 52 American hostages, "told us to sit back and see which way the wind blows," Adair said.

His company had completed a job in the Iranian oil fields just before the takeover of the U.S. embassy in November 1979.

When the telex messages were received from the National Iranian Oil Co. in Tehran, the United States was under a trade and travel embargo imposed by President Carter. The administration made it clear to the Iranians, however,

that they would deal with the two companies and other businesses after the hostages were freed, the News said.

The newspaper quoted oil industry sources in London as saying the Iranian oil company is anxious to start repairing oil field equipment damaged in the Iran-Iraq war.

But it is up to President Reagan's administration to decide whether high-level technological help should be given Iran.

"There's no easy answer, and I don't know what it will be once they evaluate the situation," said Pat Campbell, oil well firefighter and administrative coordinator for Boots and Coots. "But I know that we and Red have never turned anyone down out of hand."

The call from Tehran was the first communication sent by Iran to the Houston companies since the hostages were seized, the News said.

Estimates of damage to Iran's oil fields vary widely, but Adair said "everything over there is pretty much torn up. That's worse than starting from scratch."

The Iranian job "would be the biggest job we ever took on," Campbell said.

February's speakers will be Henry O.

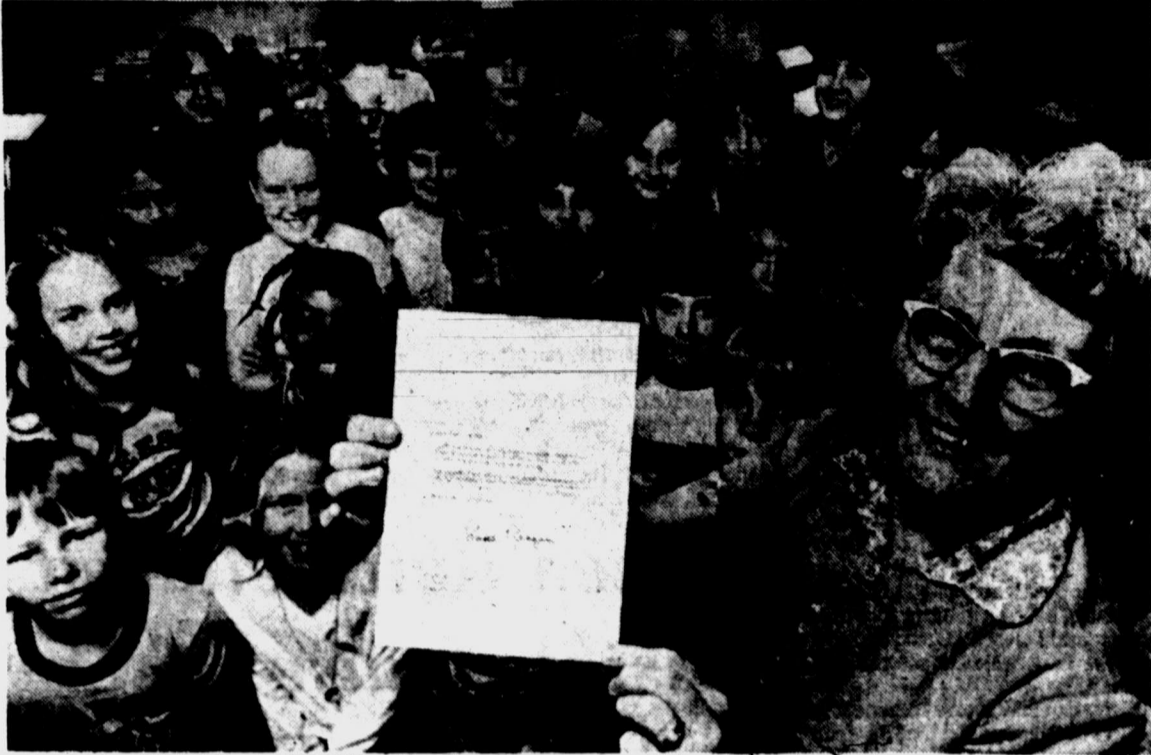
Kunkel, dean of the College of Agriculture at Texas A&M University, who will speak on "Ethics in Nutritional and Agricultural Research."

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TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH

Woman Believes Pain Attributed To 'Traveling Arthritis'

Dear Dr. Donohue: Please write about traveling arthritis. I have a cousin who is 77 and says this is what she has. She will not go to a doctor, so please tell me what you can. I have never heard of this before. — Mrs. C.M.O

Let's see if I understand what your cousin means: One joint swells and pains for awhile, then this goes away, only to be followed by the same symptoms in another joint, and so on.

In the truest sense, this is not "traveling arthritis" because there is no condition in which joint pain actually "travels." In the early stages of arthritis, symptoms often may jump from joint to joint. Eventually the discomfort settles more or less permanently in all the affected joints. I doubt that your cousin has at 77 been encountering early arthritis. It usually sets in at an earlier age.

There is another joint situation in which the term "traveling" might be used. In older people with arthritis, one joint may feel stiff for awhile, then lim-

ber up. The person forgets about that joint and shifts attention to a different joint, which is not limber. Again, there is no actual traveling involved.

Finally, there is a real condition called migratory polyarthritis, which can be a symptom of many diseases: rheumatic fever, primarily a disease of children, is a classic one. The knees of a child with rheumatic fever may suddenly swell and pain; when they return to normal, the elbows or the wrists may flare up the same way. In this sense the pain migrates. Of course, at 77, it is unlikely that our cousin has rheumatic fever.

Having said all the above, I still would try to get your cousin examined on the outside chance that some of the problems associated with migratory polyarthritis are involved here.

Dear Dr. Donohue: Will you please discuss peripheral neuropathy? My case has been diagnosed as idiopathic Charcot-Marie-Tooth syndrome. — N.J.H.

The peripheral nervous system is a widespread network of nerves that relay messages between the spinal cord-brain and muscles and bones. It's the same system that takes back the message of pain to your brain when you stub your toe, for example. A disturbance anywhere along this network outside of the brain and spinal cord is called peripheral neuropathy. The symptoms vary depending on the area of the network affected — loss of feeling from the foot, for example. The list of causes is wide: infections, diabetes, arteriosclerosis and certain vitamin deficiencies.

For many such nerve problems, no cause can be found. They are called "idiopathic," which means of unknown origin. CMT disease is known to be hereditary, however. The nerves to muscles and feet are affected. The lower leg muscles become thin and walking becomes difficult. The illness progresses very slowly, and while there is little to do to halt it, it has been known to arrest itself at any stage.

Charcot-Marie-Tooth disease (one of the idiopathic neuropathies) is named for

the doctors who first recognized the problem.

There is an excellent neurology department in the medical school in your city. Your case should be evaluated to find what services are available.

Dear Dr. Donohue: Please tell me what a pylorospasm is? It was on my medical record, and since I have never been able to find anything about it anywhere I would like to know what it means. I like the thorough and humorous way you explain things. I wish you were my doctor. If this word is misspelled, it is the doctor's error. I have spelled it exactly the way he had it written. — D.F.

Read it again. Doesn't it read "pylorospasm"? The pylorus is the very end of the lower stomach, where it joins the small intestine. It is given a special name because it is extra muscular and because it governs the flow of food from the stomach into the small intestine. It derives from the Latin word for "gate."

If the muscular pylorus clamps down too tightly, the stomach takes longer to empty. That may cause bloating, belching or no symptom at all. Often, there is no apparent cause for pylorospasm. Sometimes, medicines to help prevent the pylorus muscle from clamping down are used.

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HINTS FROM HELOISE:

Grease Stains On Uniform Removed With Mechanic's Hand Cleaner

DEAR HELOISE:

My son works at a gas station and his uniforms get greasy. I've tried everything from bleach to additives and pre-soaks, and nothing seems to help.

I didn't rub the cleaners directly on the spots. Could this have made the difference? I would appreciate it very

much if someone could tell me what to do. — Mrs. Antoinette Alfonso

Laundry can literally be a pain in the neck. All the different fabrics, all the different stain removers, not to mention all the stains that family members can come up with in a day's activities — it's mind-boggling!

None of us is an expert and has all the answers for each stain on each type of fabric. Common sense tells us we can't use one standard remedy for every garment we wear. Hot water sets some stains, cold water sets others. What do we do? I wish I could give you all the answers in a few easy steps, but that's impossible.

One thing I can tell you, though, is when you are in doubt, and you can't get an immediate answer from me or a knowledgeable friend, contact your local dry cleaning establishment, or even your extension agent. They'll be glad to share their expertise.

But, back to Mrs. Alfonso's problem: First, most stains do need direct treat-

ment. What I mean is this: apply your pre-wash spray, solvent, or whatever, directly to the stain. Of course, bleach and additives should be added to the wash water before the clothes are put in. Never pour bleach directly on the fabric — bleach must be diluted.

There are as many remedies for grease stains as there are types of grease. But in your case, car grease, motor oil, and such types familiar to mechanics can best be removed by using a pre-wash spray or a mechanic's hand cleaner (the kind that is a paste and comes in a can). Spray or apply directly on the grease spot and rub it in good.

Wash your clothes as usual, making sure you use enough soap and the correct water temperature for that particular type of fabric (your soap container should give you this type of information). Don't overload your washing machine — give the clothes room to agitate.

Another good thing to remember is to always tackle that stain as soon as you can. Don't let it set and, above all, be sure to catch it before you wash the gar-

ment. Sometimes washing without pre-treating will set the stain, then you've got more problems.

Hope this sheds a little light on the laundry blues. — Heloise

BLANKET STORAGE

DEAR HELOISE:

Since moving into a small house, I find it a problem storing extra blankets and quilts.

We do have a spare guest bedroom, so I put all my unused blankets on the bed, spreading them flat, then covering them with the bedspread.

No one's the wiser, and they're out of the way, yet handy. — Mrs. Lyle Miller

HINTS FROM HIM

DEAR HELOISE:

I have one of those rubber suction cup shower mats that had darkened and looked terrible.

I tried scouring powder, soap and straight chlorine bleach, but nothing

would touch it.

Then I saw you on television recommending use of a solution of 1 1/4 cup household bleach and 1 1/2 cup automatic dishwasher detergent to one gallon of hot water to whiten cottons.

I tried this as a last resort before throwing away the mat, and it worked! It restored the mat to its original white.

For this I thank you very much. — W. E. Crayne

And for showing me one more way of using this formula, I thank you!

Did you know, though, that you can wash a bathmat along with a load of towels in your washing machine, adding a safe amount of bleach, and getting a beautifully clean mat?

GOOD EXERCISE

Many physicians and health counselors recommend walking as the best form of exercise. Individuals can keep up a steady pace for a period of time and increase their heart rate and blood flow. Keep in mind that each 20 minutes of walking uses up 100 calories.

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Former Hostage Producing Animated Iran Story

DALLAS (AP) — Although they may lack the polished style of a Patrick O'Leary or the biting wit of a Herbert Block, the political cartoons of James Lopez, copper miner's son, hometown hero and U.S. Marine, may be destined to be seen by more Americans than those of either of his more illustrious fellow journalists.

That's because Jimmy Lopez, 22, knows how the soul sings with humor — even the gallows variety — when there are no songs of freedom to sing.

Lopez knows the stiff gait of an Iranian revolutionary, the naive of the Ayatollah's advisors and the satirical side of hope. This, and a rough-hewn talent for caricature, helped him to buoy the spirits of his fellow American hostages during their interminable stay in Tehran.

When Lopez overheard a birthday celebration being held for a fellow hostage being held elsewhere in the American embassy compound, he penned a birthday card and asked one of his captors to pass it along to the American.

The card depicted an aged, wheelchair-bound man, staring blankly at a birthday cake festooned with hundreds of small candles. An Iranian guard stood nearby, a fire extinguisher in his hand.

"Happy birthday to a fellow American political prisoner," the card read. "You haven't been forgotten." The card opened to display a small piece of yellow

ribbon and the punch line: "Just written off."

There there was the "Hostage Lottery." Later in their captivity, Lopez and his cellmates at an Iranian prison offered to place wagers for their fellow hostages on when they might be released from Iran.

"Pick a month and a day," Lopez instructed them. "Leave the year blank."

For Lopez, the hostage crisis has brought a small personal dream to fruition. Now that life for the former hostages has returned to a near-normal pace, Lopez is using his drawing talents to resurrect the kind of black hostage humor that helped him get through it all in one piece.

Lopez and Phoenix media consultant Ben Goddard are compiling a one-hour animated documentary they hope to market next spring for airing on network or PBS television. The project is still in its production stages in a Dallas animation studio, but Goddard says it will be a mix of animated cartoon footage and excerpts from a "straight-talking" interview with the young Marine Corps sergeant from Globe, Ariz.

"I've been drawing pictures and cartoons as long as I can remember," says the tattooed former hostage. "This is really like a dream come true. I don't care if I make any money on it. I'm just having fun."

A recurring symbol in the production is the Iranian prison where Lopez and several other hostages were interred during the latter months of their 444-day captivity. The hostages nicknamed the facility "Hotel California" after a popular soft-rock recording by The Eagles.

"The last line in the song is, 'You can check out anytime but you can never leave.' That's how we felt in the place," said Lopez.

In the animated footage, a portion of which Lopez allowed a reporter to view, the hostages' Iranian captors are depicted as bumbling and naive, incapable of determining in advance the consequences of their actions.

In one scene, two young militants decide to burn the bridges that long bound their nation to the industrialized countries of the west, including the United States. The militants set fire to opposite ends of a large wooden bridge, leaving themselves and their fanatical religious leader, the Ayatollah Khomeini, in the middle.

"These people were never able to see beyond today, the present," said Lopez. "They wanted everything now."

One of the leaders of the Iranian guard cadre was nicknamed "Father Goose" because of his penchant for assuring the hostages that the negotiations for their release were going well. Lopez parodied the guard constantly while in

Iran. Other guards became known generally as "rags" — short for "ragheads" — a term of derision that referred to the cloth turbans many of the Iranians wore on their heads.

In another cartoon scene, a parody on Father Goose's constant assurances that the hostages would be released as soon as the former Iranian Shah was returned to his native country from the United States, the guard leader is shown congratulating a group of emaciated hostages on their impending return home.

The hostages have gray hair, sunken cheeks and are invalids.

Still another scene planned for production will show a favorite game of the Americans who were held in the prison.

The Iranian guards who handcuffed them frequently forgot to double-lock the handcuffs, making it possible for a hostage to pick the lock with a secreted fork or other narrow object. A guard would return to a cell, see that the hostage had removed the cuffs and demand to know what had happened.

"Your friend, Achmed, unlocked them," was the stock response. The first guard usually stomped out of the room, prepared to berate an unknowing fellow revolutionary for lax security measures.

Lopez and Goddard say they hope to have the cartoon project completed by late March.

Dog Sled Racer, Animals Boast Common Trait In Desire To Win

LAKE CLEAR JUNCTION, N.Y. (AP) — A good sled dog, Peter Norberg was explaining the other day, between races, is usually a mix of several proud Far North breeds, a creature born for one purpose.

"He is lean, tough. He has a big heart, a good mind, an eager attitude. He is honest. He will never cheat you. He won't quit on you. He will give you all he has, and then give a little more. That describes a good sled dog."

It also describes Peter Norberg. Peter, his black-eyed wife, Susan, and their blue-eyed baby son, Miles, along with about 100 other sled dog drivers and their families and their dogs — more than 1,000 vapping dogs — made their way to this crossroads in the Adirondacks last week for one purpose.

They came to give it all they had, and then a little more, at the International Sled Dog Championships.

They came for \$20,000 in prize money, but also to follow an even more seductive lure: a chance to visit with friends, rivals to laugh and talk dog talk and race through the wintry countryside in one of the most exhilarating sports there could be for man or beast.

"It's what we wait for and train for all year," Norberg said. "Put a bunch of mushers together and it's the best company there is. Sled dog people have so much in common."

Just so, but few have as much in common with the whole romantic heritage of dog sledding as Peter Norberg.

Peter, one of the best, is a lean, tough 30-year-old with a big heart and a bloodline that is a fine mix of three proud Far North strains.

His grandfather, a Swede, came to the Arctic searching for Yukon gold, married an Athapaskan Indian and begat Peter's father, who married an Eskimo and begat Peter in a trapping community of 20 people on Victoria Island in the Canadian Arctic.

When Peter was six, school age, the family moved by dog sled to the Eskimo village of Tuktoyaktuk at the mouth of the McKenzie River on the Arctic Ocean about 150 miles from the Alaska border.

In the winter, my father ran a 250-mile trapline. I went with him. When I was old enough I ran my own traps. For months on end, dogs were my only companions. I've trained and driven and bred and fed dogs for as long as I can remember.

Six years ago, he chanced to attend the dog sled races in Winnipeg. He had run his dogs in Tuktoyaktuk village races, for fun, but this was different. These were the fastest dogs and best drivers around.

"I figured I could drive dogs as well as anybody. I had a team. I thought I'd give it a try."

Now Peter Norberg is one of the most

successful drivers on the racing circuit, certainly one of the most colorful.

On the trail, as many as 15 dogs stretch out two by two behind their leader in front of Peter's sled, ears flat, outthrust muzzles crusted with frost, legs driving, tug lines taut, coursing in silence through mountain spruce clad in clean snow.

"Hike! Hike! Go! Go! Go!" One foot pumps on a runner, the other pumps, pumps, pumps.

Peter is dressed in an Eskimo parka and soft brown Eskimo boots made of caribou. The sled is made of bent white oak lashed with sinew. Peter's mother made the boots and parka. He made the sled.

A sealskin pouch hangs from the handlebar to carry spare mittens and other necessities. Some of these races cover 50 miles. This one was 15 miles a day for three days.

Peter finished second, moments behind the winner.

After a hug for each dog he repaired to Charlie's Inn, the only permanent structure at Lake Clear Junction and handily, right at the finish line. He ordered a beer and talked of the race.

"I couldn't catch him — but he knew I was there," he said. His voice held the edge of excitement.

"What a race. The dogs were beautiful. Everything was beautiful. What a hell of a race. Next time."

Boston Man, Wife Reviving Woodwork Craft Designing Hardwood Furniture

BOSTON (AP) — He certainly has the right name for his craft, Michael Woodworth figures it was fate.

"I always had an interest in wood and I always was good with my hands," says the 35-year-old Bostonian who plans to spend "the rest of my life" designing his own line of sturdy hardwood tables and chairs.

Woodworth and his wife, Frances, think they're leading a revival of the woodworking craft in New England.

Boston once was the center of furniture-making in America. But gradually, the business faded. The handsome hand-turned tables, chairs and desks simply became too expensive for middle-class customers.

"A rolloff desk you buy for \$400 or \$500 at an antique store," says Woodworth, "would cost several thousand dollars to reproduce today."

Irving & Casson, the Cambridge-based firm that created a desk for John F. Kennedy and furniture for the United Nations, went out of business seven years ago. It marked the end of an era.

Soft pine and plastic laminated tables and chairs had become the affordable alternative.

But now, "people are starting to appreciate hardwood again," says Woodworth.

The Woodworths want to speed that development. They use Massachusetts maple — "the clearest in America" — Vermont cherry, Connecticut oak, and walnut from Appalachia.

Woodworth, who made only a brief stop at junior college, always dreamed of having his own business. First, he worked in retail sales. He and his wife opened shop three years ago with \$15,000 in savings.

"We were told two years too late that what we're trying to do was ridiculous," says Mrs. Woodworth.

Since 1977, the couple has grossed about \$800,000 and may soon make a profit.

At first, Mrs. Woodworth, who has a college degree in art history, supported

the family by running a day care center and later working as a planner at Boston City Hall.

Meantime, Woodworth haunted flea markets, buying up dozens of battered chairs — looking for ideas — and trying to make enough furniture to keep the business alive.

One problem now is lack of crafts-

Charter Bus Wreck Kills Men, Baby

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — A charter bus returning from an Oklahoma City Stars hockey game overturned early Sunday during a heavy rain and wind storm, killing two men and a baby, police said.

The highway patrol identified the victims as 3 1/2-month-old Shelly Dixon and Hal Eugene Longman, 23, both of Oklahoma City, and Carl Edward Miller, 33, of Moore.

The patrol said 25 of the 40 people on the bus were hospitalized after the vehicle ran off Turner Turnpike six miles east of the Oklahoma City.

The bus driver, Leroy Tucker, 33, of Oklahoma City, was listed in critical condition, the highway patrol said. Six others were in critical or serious condition at various area hospitals.

The accident occurred about 12:20 a.m. CST on the rain-slick highway, when the bus crossed the median strip, overturned three times and fell into a ravine, the patrol said.

Trooper David McWhorter said several of the passengers were thrown out the bus when it overturned.

Ex-New York Fashion Photographer Spends Life With Bird Population

MAGNOLIA SPRINGS, Ala. (AP) — Two thick books sit side by side on Fairly Chandler's coffee table.

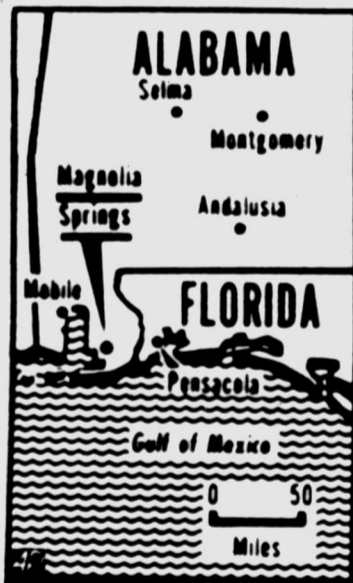
One is the Audubon Society's Encyclopedia of North American Birds. The other is the Bible. In Chandler's view, the books have much in common: their mysteries and lessons equally profound.

The Lord said not a sparrow falls without his awareness. I believe that. The Lord had a beautiful plan.

For instance, Chandler said, "I've never wintered white-throated sparrows arrive here by the thousands. They nest in Canada. I caught and banded 400 of them over three winters, in my backyard, hoping to learn from someone in Canada just where they nested."

Year after year the birds came back. Not just the same species, but the same individual birds, and to the exact same place. Why? We can't understand why. We can only marvel at the Lord's plan.

Chandler is not only a bird observer, but a bird photographer. His pictures are something to marvel at, too. "Most of us," a fellow birder said, "aim our cameras hurriedly and hope. Fairly sets up his camera and calls the birds in to pose."



Well, yes, I do that," he confirmed, modestly. "For many years I didn't get around well. It was the only way to get a good shot."

Fairly Chandler was a high-priced New York fashion photographer until a tumor laid him low in 1952. He was at his prime, age 38. He packed up and went home to Alabama — to await death.

A new drug finally restored his health, eight years later, but birds had long since restored his daily life.

"I came home in the winter," he said. "One afternoon the following fall I looked outside. The trees were alive with birds, and I didn't recognize a one of them. I became curious. This was a birdwatcher born. The fall migration hooked me."

In the nearly three decades since, he has identified all 85 of the resident bird species and 333 of the approximately 350 transients who regularly pass through Alabama. Or not so regularly.

The latest on my list was a Harris sparrow, a western species. What he was doing here I do not know. I saw another western bird, a painted redstart, mixed in with our American redstarts. A Bullock oriole, also a western bird, spent a week in my hedge.

What were they doing here? These are the mysteries that make birds fascinating. We probably never will know all the answers.

Perhaps it is just as well, Chandler concedes. At a time when even the surface of the moon has lost its mystery, man can still feel humility in the presence of birds.

Chandler's goal, along with a half dozen other members of the Alabama Ornithological Society, is to photograph all 350 Alabama birds. He already has photographed more than 200.

He never goes anywhere without his binoculars and camera. Those who go with him say that not a stripe or feather eludes his practiced eye.

Once, driving in his car, he glimpsed a flash of white at roadside. Puzzled, he pulled over. A rare albino cardinal was roared on film.

One of the most spectacular sights I ever saw was out on the Fort Morgan peninsula, on the Gulf coast.

Inmates Say Strip Search Held Before Females

TILLAMOOK, Ore. (AP) — Thirteen Tillamook County jail inmates say they were stripped naked and searched during a "shakedown" in view of a female jailer and female cook.

Steve Remington, executive director of the American Civil Liberties Union of Oregon, said Saturday she has received a petition from the inmates to investigate the alleged incident and will discuss possible

legal action with a lawyers committee this week.

The Tillamook County sheriff's office denies the allegation, saying it was impossible for the women to see the men. The search was conducted last November, Miss Remington said.

Tillamook County Sheriff David Wilson, unavailable for comment Saturday, earlier told Miss Remington that inter-

views with the two women and an inmate revealed the women did not see the men, she said.

"Inmates were taken from the visitor area one at a time and completely 'skin searched' in plain view of a female detention officer and salaried female cook," 13 of the 18 searched inmates wrote in a petition to the ACLU, mailed several weeks ago.

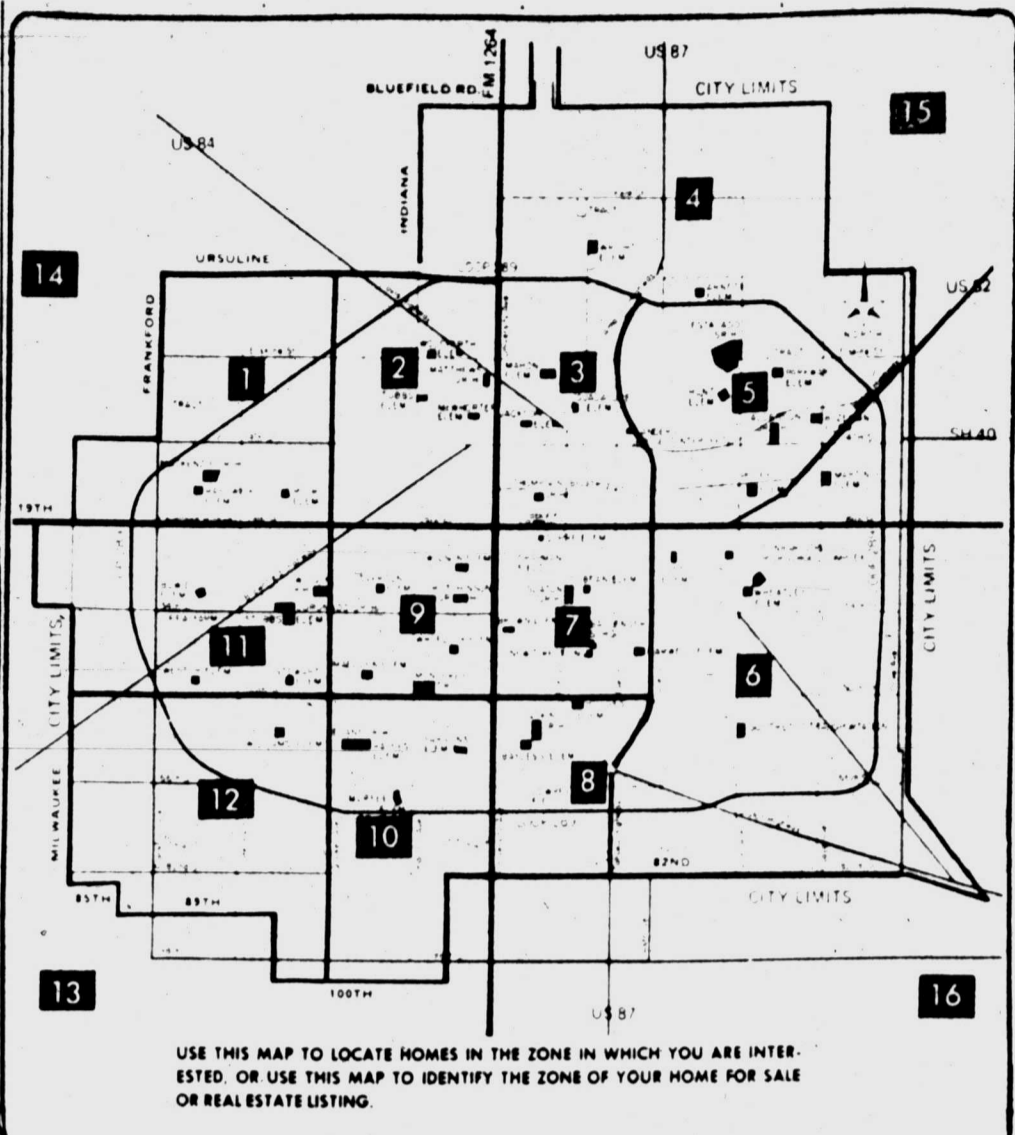

Aloe Vera Growers Buck Government

LA VILLA (AP) — For centuries, gel from the leaves of the aloe vera plant has been applied to burns, cuts, rheumatism, ulcers and acne. The government scoffs at claims of curative powers, but aloe vera farming is booming in Texas' Rio Grande Valley.

R.C. Benson bought an aloe vera farm five years ago when he didn't know an aloe vera from a cactus. Now he grows more than 200,000 of the plants and owns a business that makes creams and lotions from the succulent's inner gel.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration prohibits companies from claiming aloe vera products cure specific ailments, but Benson and others report rising sales as the public looks for "natural" organic medications.

"We really have to rely on our customers to do our advertising," Benson said. Commercial production started here after World War II.

"It's not a textbook business," Benson said. "It's farming, marketing and

manufacturing." He and his wife, Joyce, a professional golfer, operate the Hilltop Gardens nursery about 10 miles northeast of Harlingen in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. They raise the plants on 65 acres and have a processing plant on the grounds.

Aloe vera, also a popular ornamental house plant, is grown in rows. Plants send out thick, long leaves. The juicy gel within the leaves feels cool on the skin.

The bottom leaves are cut by hand to get at the gel, which then is peeled in strips and separated from plant fibers in a centrifuge-like machine. The resulting liquid is pumped into cold storage tanks and used to make creams, sun-tan ointments, shampoo, soaps and cosmetics.

The Bensons bought an existing business from Lee Ewald, known locally as the "mother of aloe vera" because she started the local industry in the 1940s. Now in her 80s, she lives in an Illinois nursing home.

"We were living in Houston but didn't like the climate," Benson said. "This just happened to be advertised in the Wall Street Journal. I didn't even know what an aloe vera plant was."

Bill Coats said he became interested in aloe vera as a pharmacy student.

Coats now heads a 13-year-old company that cultivates plants on 75 acres near Mission. The gel is processed at the farm and shipped to Garland to be made into various products. Coats said his company chalked up over \$100 million in retail sales in 1980.

After four years of experimentation, Coats said he developed a patented process to turn the raw gel into useful products. As the aloe vera business has grown, Coats has sold off his five drugstores in the Dallas area.

"Other people in the industry are riding our shittails because we're the only ones doing testing to get it approved by the FDA," he said.

Coats says athletic injuries and burns respond well to aloe vera application, but the FDA — which puts the burden on manufacturers to prove claims of its curative value — disagrees.

"It is considered to be of unproved value in burns and other uses it's been proposed for," said FDA spokesman William Grigg in Washington, D.C.

But Coats says he is optimistic the FDA will one day recognize his claims. His products are sold throughout the United States, Australia, Thailand, Korea and New Zealand, Coats said.

Proxmire's 'Golden Fleece' Award Goes To Inaugural Panel

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan's Inaugural Committee has been awarded Sen. William Proxmire's "Golden Fleece" for insisting that government money would not be spent on the inauguration but using military personnel to squire visiting dignitaries around Washington.

The committee was "taking the taxpayers for a ride," the Wisconsin Democrat said.

"While proclaiming that no public money was spent on the inauguration, the Inaugural Committee commandeered 1,120 Marines, soldiers, sailors and other service personnel to act as chauffeurs and aides to 274 inaugural VIPs as well as several hundred inaugural celebrants," said Proxmire in a written statement.

He said the estimated cost to the taxpayers was \$1.8 million.

Proxmire said 616 of the military personnel served as drivers, 175 were escorts for dignitaries and 329 were used as social aides on call at the various festivities.

"These military personnel spent the equivalent of 105.4 man-years chauffeuring and escorting inaugural bigwigs around town," said the senator. "While the new administration has proclaimed there is a serious shortage of ships, the man-years used for this purpose could crew an attack submarine at sea for a year."

The military drivers logged an incredible 250,000 miles ferrying members of the Presidential Inaugural Committee and VIPs around Washington. That's the equivalent of driving from Washington, D.C., to Pacific Palisades, Calif. (where Reagan maintains a residence), and back 47 times," he said.

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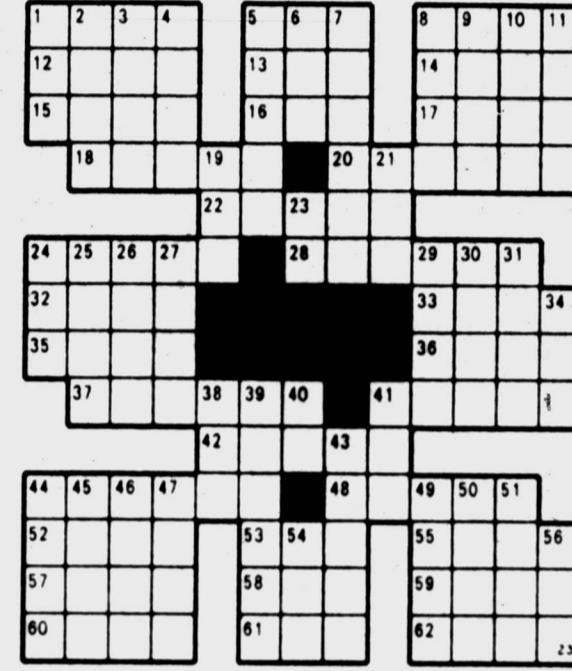


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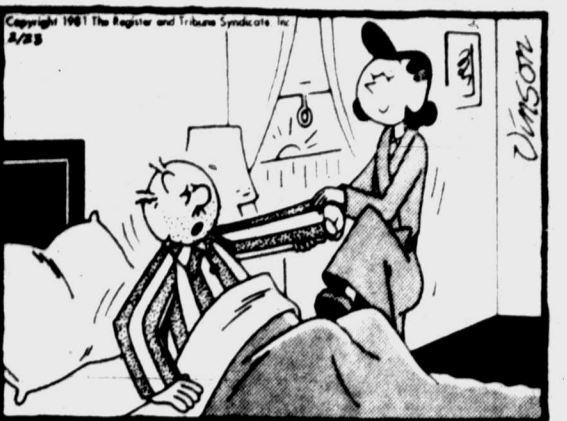
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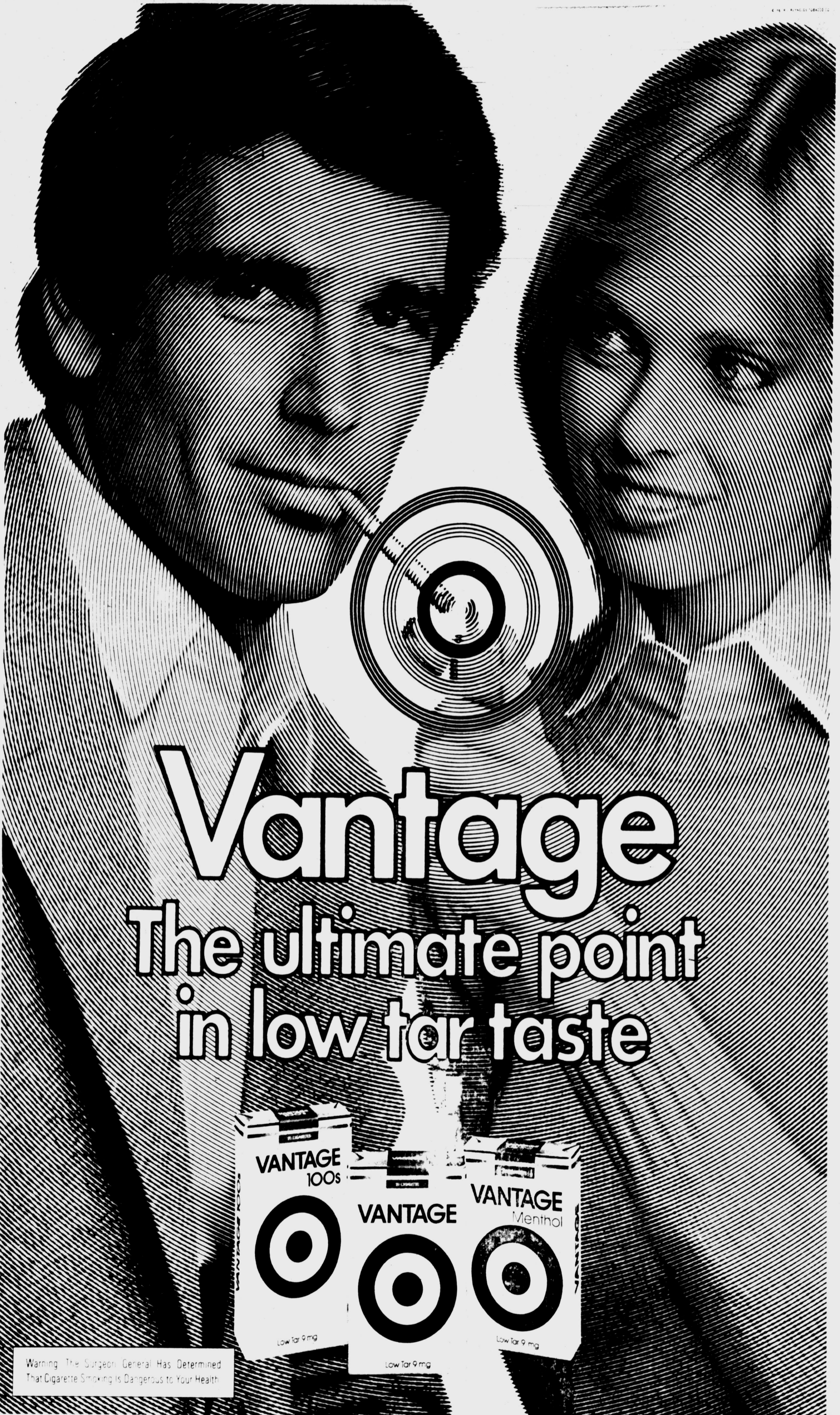

Little Big Man

SHORT PEOPLE, SAYS SONGWRITER RANDY Newman, got no reason to live. They drive tiny little cars that go beep, beep, beep; got tiny little voices that go peep, peep, peep.

Texas Tech's Gerald Myers, being a rather diminutive 5-10 himself, pays no attention to such talk. And Saturday night in Dallas' spacious and sparkling Reunion Arena, the Raiders were saved by the play of one of those short people. The Tech basketball media guide lists El Paso senior Dwight Williams — the man of the hour — at 5-10, 140 pounds.

I wouldn't take a lie detector test on those figures. That may mean with elevator sneakers and lead weights around the ankles. But when the Raiders had slipped out of the megan plex (and what a plex it is) with a 51-48 victory over the SMU Mustangs, Williams stood 10-feet tall.

He, along with 6-2 sophomore Steve Smith, had come off the bench and turned a nine-point Mustang advantage into a three-point Raider win. The victory, only Tech's second Southwest Conference road triumph of the season, lifted Tech to 8-6 in league play and into fourth place.

Big deal, you say. So Tech beat the SWC's last-place team. For the Raiders, it was a huge win indeed.

From every standpoint, explained assistant coach Rob Evans, "it was big from the standpoint that we came from behind on the road. It was big in that we got a couple of guys to come off the bench and win it for us, and it was important because it should insure us of a home-court advantage in the first-round (of the SWC post-season tournament)."

WILLIAMS' HEROICS ARE HARD to see, just looking at the box score. It was the intangible elements he gave the Raiders on the floor that turned this game around. When he came in, early in the second half, the Raiders were nine points down, they were stagnating on offense and SMU guard David Gadis had 14 points and had yet to miss a shot.

Williams, one of the Raider captains, did something no one else on the club had done. He began to talk it up. He peep-peep-peeped out instructions — on both ends of the floor. He told people where to go, who to cover and what to do.

For a guy who walked on and earned a scholarship two summers ago — after two stellar years at Western Texas Junior College in Snyder — and had played only sparingly in nearly two seasons at Tech, Williams wasn't afraid to run the show.

"All we needed was a little communication," said Williams, called "Bird," probably because of his sparrow-like build. "When you start talking on defense that's half the battle."

Williams shouldn't have any problem talking. After all, he's a Mass Communications major and even has his own radio show on Tech's student-operated station.

"Dwight talks to those guys all the time, even when he's on the bench," said Myers. "You can hear him down there, always telling 'em what to do."

But talking from the bench and the court are two different things. Didn't Williams feel any pressure entering the game, after playing very, very little in the Raiders' first 23 contests?

"Not really," said the communications major. "The game was going well and we really weren't out of it when I went in."

The fitting climax to this soap opera story game when it was Williams who swished an 18-footer that finally gave Tech a 45-44 lead — the Raiders first since SMU took control early in the contest.

ANY DOUBTS ABOUT THAT shot, short person? "I just jumped up and shot it," said Williams. "I didn't even know that was the basket that put us ahead. I just jumped up and shot it."

It was quite a night for a player that hasn't seen much action since coming to Tech.

"I can't say enough about Dwight," said Myers, although he tried. "He's been so super for our team even though he hasn't got to play much. He's kept a great attitude all along. It just makes you so happy to see him come in and do well like this."

He went in there and just took over. Almost overlooked, but not by Myers, in all of the hula-hoos over Williams was the play of Steve Smith.

Remember Smith is the guy who started the Raiders' first 18 games until Myers elected to go with a taller lineup — replacing the 6-2 Smith with 6-8 Ralph Brewster. With Jeff Taylor drawing five personals in only 15 minutes, Smith got the call and saw 30 minutes of action.

When he entered the game, with plenty of time still left in the first half, SMU's other guard Dave Pehier had already scored 14 points. Smith let himself get beat for one layup, but then completely shut down Pehier — the key to SMU's offense.

Pehier finished with 16 points, hit one of five efforts against Smith, and rarely got his hands on his ball.

STEVE SMITH DID A great job on Pehier, said Myers. "Our starters were flat and our bench came in and picked them up. Our defense was real good in the second half and it was because of them, Williams and Smith."

Real good indeed. The Mustangs, operating out of a four-corners attack, scored only 12 second-half points and didn't score a field goal in the game's final 10 minutes. Down 36-27 at the break, Tech outscored the Ponies 24-12 in the final half.

They'll have little time to bask in that glory though. Tuesday night Tech will be at Austin for another important road game with the Texas Longhorns. The Raiders, at this point, still have a shot at second or third — although they'll have to win both remaining games (the last being against Arkansas in the Municipal Coliseum) to do so.

But back to that come-back. "We thought we could do it," said Tech center Clarence Swannegan who led the Raiders with 16 points. "Bird really helped us when he came in the game."

He gave us leadership and he got us tired up. He turned the game around. Ya hear, Randy Newman.

Put that in your beep, beep, beep and smoke it.

MHS Girls Take On Amarillo

Midway through the regular season last year, Amarillo High bumped off Monterey 57-55. The Sandies may have lived to regret that mistake.

In the bi-district championship game last season, Monterey's buzz-saw full court press harried Amarillo High into 41 turnovers and the Plainsmen took a 102-77 victory en route to their state finals appearance.

And then this season Monterey pined at its point once more, chopping down the then state-ranked Sandies by a 77-63 score.

"I don't really think the last two games will have that much impact," said Monterey coach Tim Tasker. "It might help us a little but not much. Our kids have been around long enough to know that this is a playoff and in a playoff, Amarillo High is going to be high as a kite."

But there's no disguising the fact that the last two contests have had some impact. For one thing, Amarillo High refused to play in Plainview — the site of last year's bi-district debacle — even though it is the only available neutral court.

Instead, the Sandies pushed for a home-and-home arrangement. Tasker lost both coin tosses and, as a result, tonight's game will be played in Canyon — 10 miles south of Amarillo.

The other thing that tips off how the Plainsmen feel about the Sandies is a lit-

tle more subtle, but listen to what Tasker has to say about that first loss and make up your own mind.

"Last year they beat us," he said. "It was just like we lost to Tascosa this year. We lost to Amarillo High last year and we just played awful, there's no other way to describe it. We were awful."

"If you detect a note of 'Boy-I-Sure-Would-Like-To-Have-That-One-To-Do-Ov-er-Again,' you ain't alone."

And the fact is, that the Golden Sandstorm feels much the same way. Coach Rosemary Jackson sounds like she'd almost rather face a pool of hungry sharks than that Monterey press, an interesting analogy.

"It's important for us to learn from last time," she said. "I think we just didn't play well against them the last time early in the game. I feel like we'll play a better game this time. But they sure hurt us with their press early last time."

"They have a fabulous ball club. A lot of it is because of the Ethridges and that press, we just can't give them any turnovers."

"We have got to be able to handle the Ethridges, but they're quick, they handle the ballhandler. If we're going to beat them, then we're going to have to get our full court press going."

Like Old Times For Miller

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Johnny Miller, who won 19 professional events and then virtually disappeared from the winner's stand for four years, captured the \$300,000 Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open Sunday by two strokes with a record 270.

Miller shot a 68 in the final round to edge Tom Weiskopf for the championship and break the old tournament record of 272 set by Hale Irwin over the par-71, 7,029-yard Riviera Country Club

course. Miller, who broke his drought last year with a victory in the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic and won again at Tuc-

son, Ariz., to start the 1981 tour, sank a 40-foot putt on the 14th hole to ensure his victory and the \$54,000 first prize purse.

Miller Barber, who will be 50 March

31 and looks forward to the seniors competition, hung in with Weiskopf until the final hole when Miller chopped off all hopes of a playoff.

Second prize was worth \$32,400 and Miller boosted his earnings for the year to \$121,548 for the winter tour in California and Hawaii. The Professional Golfers' Association tour now moves to Florida.

Miller started the round 11 strokes under par. He cut 2 strokes off par on the first nine, on the 14th hole, sank a 60-foot putt for a birdie that put him 14 strokes under par and two ahead of Weiskopf.

On the 15th, he pushed his drive into a fairway bunker. Coming out of the sand, he hit the grass and went only 75 yards. His third shot was short, 25 feet from the pin, but he putted off the fringe and went just past the pin, then made the bogey putt from three feet to put him 13 strokes under par and one stroke better than Barber and Weiskopf going to the final hole.

Weiskopf parred the 18th hole to win the \$32,400 second prize at 68-272. Barber bogeyed and tied for third with Gil Morgan at 273. Barber had a final-round 69 and Morgan a 70, both at 273.

Miller was off the green but pin high on the final hole and 18 feet from the cup when he topped in his putt for the two-stroke victory.

Winner of the 1973 U.S. Open, Miller won eight tournaments and a record \$353,021 in 1974. The winnings mark has been broken frequently since then.

The last time Miller won two United States tournaments in the same year was in 1976, when he captured the Tucson Open and the Bob Hope Desert Classic. He also won the British Open that year.

"I told those who supported me that I thought this would be a good year for me," said Miller, who earned \$54,000. "There were those who dropped me."

To me, winning here is as close to a major tournament as you can get," said Miller, who won the British Open in 1976.

And for my friends, they can now answer the question, "What is wrong with your pal?"

Lakers 96, Knicks 93
NEW YORK — Kareem Abdul-Jabbar scored 32 points, including a layup

off an alley-oop pass from Michael Cooper with 58 seconds to play, to lead the Los Angeles Lakers to a 96-93 National Basketball Association victory over the New York Knicks Sunday.

The Lakers, defending NBA champions, scored just 14 points in the final period of the nationally televised game. But Abdul-Jabbar's basket, which came after Cooper had made two steals and one blocked shot in the previous minute, put Los Angeles in front 94-93, the seventh lead change of the quarter.

Hawks 121, Bulls 116
CHICAGO — Dan Roundfield scored a season-high 29 points and Atlanta's guard tandem of Wes Matthews and Eddie Johnson combined for 37 Sunday to lead the Hawks to a 121-116 NBA victory over the slumping Chicago Bulls.

The Hawks, winning their third game in a row and only their sixth in their last 24 contests since Jan. 1, dealt the Bulls their fourth loss in their last five games.

Atlanta, 24-39, held a seemingly comfortable 97-82 bulge after three quarters. But the Bulls, behind the scoring of Artis Gilmore and Reggie Theus, began to whittle away Atlanta's lead, and with 4:28 remaining Chicago had cut the deficit to 109-103.

Rockets 111, SuperSonics 96
SEATTLE — Calvin Murphy scored 13 of his game-high 27 points in the fourth quarter when the Houston Rockets opened up a 22-point lead on the way to a 111-96 National Basketball Association victory over the Seattle SuperSonics Sunday.

Down by eight points early in the third quarter, the Rockets took control by outscoring Seattle 27-10 over the next 10 minutes to take an 80-71 lead into the final period.

Houston, which scored only 17 points in the second quarter, held Seattle to 16 points in the third quarter, and forced numerous Sonic turnovers to capitalize on easy transition baskets. In the second half, Seattle committed 15 turnovers.

Warriors 104, Kings 96

Borger, Canyon Tied In 1-4A

The District 1-4A boys' basketball race was narrowed to a pair of contenders — Borger and Canyon — but not without a storm of controversy Friday night in Levelland.

The Eagles ran their league record to 3-0 in the second round of competition and moved into a tie for the top spot with the idle Bulldogs with a 73-61 victory over the Lobos.

In the process, Canyon virtually eliminated Levelland from the title hunt while one of the South Plains' best college prospects — the Lobos' 6-foot-8 senior post Dwight Phillips — probably played the final game of his prep career.

While the loss was the second of the district's second half for Levelland, putting them in the same position as Estacado, Brownfield and Dumas, the loss of Phillips midway through the second period angered the partisan crowd.

Phillips, the area's leading rebounder and one of the leading scorers in either 1-4A or 2-4A, crashed to the floor on his left shoulder and arm after a slam dunk with three minutes to play before halftime.

He suffered a fractured left forearm, an injury likely to keep him from playing in the Lobos' final two games of the season.

Levelland fans claimed that Canyon's

Kendall Walling intentionally fouled Phillips on the play, knocking the bigger man's legs out from under him during the slam.

Canyon coach Judy Richardson defended Walling after viewing video tapes of the game in slow motion Saturday.

"Kendall fouled him. Dwight intercepted a pass and took off down court and Kendall was chasing him. Two steps before Dwight went up, Kendall hit him on the arm and fouled him," Richardson said.

"But with his momentum, Dwight kept on going, went up and stuffed the ball. But his wrist caught on the rim and he had so much momentum going his feet came out from under him. Kendall was a good step behind him," he said.

Only moments earlier, Walling was given a technical for mouthing off and eventually fouled out of the game. "I hate it (the accident) because Dwight is an awful good player," Richardson said. "I'm sure Kendall is going to be blamed for it because of his reputation. All this is going to do is hinder him. Walling."

Phillips, who is being highly recruited by Texas Tech and Baylor, had 420 points and 408 rebounds in 24 games entering the Canyon game. He scored seven points and yanked down five rebounds before being hurt and may play this week.

There is a possibility he could play. We'll have to wait until Monday (today)

and see if the swelling goes down," Levelland coach Don Abbott said Saturday.

"Having him play in the last two games is not worth the risk to his college career unless the doctor says it's 100 percent safe," Abbott said. "Right now it's between Dwight, his mother and the doctor."

"The injury itself shouldn't affect his career. There's not enough damage to the arm to matter unless he hurts it before it is healed. It should be all right in three or four weeks."

"I don't think (the foul) was one of those intentional things," Abbott said. Levelland, Estacado, Brownfield and Dumas all have two district losses and would need Canyon, which won the first-half title, to lose all three of its remaining games and Borger to lose two of its three to have a chance at the league title.

Dunbar, 0-4, and Dumas get first crack at the two leaders Tuesday when the Panthers play host to Borger while the Demons travel to Canyon.

The district title could well be decided Friday when the Bulldogs travel to Canyon for a showdown. The Eagles won the first game between the two, 57-43, at the beginning of February.

Dunbar could have the most to say the final district champion. After the Bulldogs visit the Panthers' court Tuesday, Canyon rolls in a week from Tuesday for the final game of the season.

Estacado, which has flurried all season with the 500 mark, is idle Tuesday before entertaining Levelland Friday.

Waltrip Wins Richmond 400

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — Darrell Waltrip held off a challenge from Richard Petty and survived a fender-bender among 15 laps from the end to win the Richmond 400 Grand National stock car race Sunday.

Waltrip, driving a Buick Regal prepared by Junior Johnson, took the lead for good on lap 355 of the 400-lap event at Richmond Fairgrounds Raceway.

The 34-year-old driver from Franklin, Tenn., finished about 10 car lengths ahead of second-place Ricky Rudd, driving an Oldsmobile Cutlass.

Petty's Buick Regal was third, a lap down, followed by rookie Morgan Shepherd's Pontiac Grand Prix and Benny Parsons' Ford Thunderbird.

The winner averaged 76.570 mph in picking up the winner's share of \$18,800.

Waltrip first grabbed the lead just before the halfway point in the 217-mile race over Richmond's 542-mile oval. But Petty was right on his heels until a transmission problem — which meant he had to be pushed-started by his crew every time he pitted — and a one-lap penalty for passing the pace car under the caution

flag ended the duel by lap 355.

Petty, who won last week's Daytona 500, tried desperately to get back on the same lap with Waltrip, but failed to pass the leader in a nose-to-bumper battle 20 laps from the finish.

The seventh yellow flag of the race came out on lap 385 when Cecil Gordon spun into the infield on turn three. Gordon, running near the back of the field, kept the car running and pulled back on to the track, moving right in front of Waltrip.

The two cars bumped, but both managed to continue and Waltrip, slowed momentarily, was allowed to move back on top under the yellow flag.

The green flag fell again 10 laps from the end and Waltrip, the defending champion in this race and winner of three previous races here, easily stayed on top.

Miss Alcott Takes LPGA Title

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP) — Amy Alcott hit six birdies and a bogey Sunday for a 5-under-par 67 and a one-stroke victory over defending champion JoAnne Carner in the \$150,000 Bent Tree Ladies Golf Classic.

Alcott, trailing by one stroke after the third round, started her final four of the par-72, 6,088-yard Bent Tree Golf and Racquet Club course by hitting two trees and missing a 12-foot putt to bogey the 534-yard, par-5 first hole.

But she came back with birdies on the fifth, eighth, ninth, 12th, 14th and 16th to edge out Carner, who shot four bogeys and seven birdies for a 3-under-par 69.

Carner missed short putts to bogey 17 and par 18 and stay behind Alcott, who finished at 12-under-par 276 to take home the \$22,500 first prize. Carner shot 277 and won \$14,700.

Sandra Post hit 72 Sunday for a 5-under-par 283 total, while Beth Solomon shot 70 to wind up at 284. Dot Germain and Beth Daniel both carded 69s in the final round to wind up at 285, while Jo Ann Washam and Mary Dwyer were at

286.

Carner missed a 12-foot putt to bogey the 347-yard, par-4 second hole and followed with a birdie on the third and a bogey on the fourth. She birdied No. 7 and sank a 25-foot putt for another birdie on the 468-yard, par-5 11th.

Carner's tee shot landed two feet from the pin on the 166-yard, par-3 12th hole and she sank the putt for birdie. But Alcott matched her, sinking a 25-foot putt.

The runner-up bogeyed 13 and birdied the next three holes, but she lost the tournament on the 143-yard, par-3 17th hole when she hit her tee shot long and then three-putted, missing a 3-footer, for a bogey.

On the 471-yard, par-5 18th hole, Carner's second shot landed in a sand trap about 50 yards from the hole. She hit a wedge straight up, over a tree, and the ball landed four feet from the pin. But she missed the putt and had to settle for par, losing her bid for a tie and sudden death playoff.

Alcott parred the final two holes.

'Altered States' Controversial Hit Movie

NEW YORK (AP) — Rarely has a film director provoked as many people as Ken Russell has with his controversial hit, "Altered States," a film about how altered states of consciousness become altered states of being.

When it first was shown in preview, some people complained about the intensity of the hallucinations experienced by the film's leading character. Others walked out of the theaters. There were charges that Russell used "subliminal cuts," one-frame inserts that the mind receives but appear for such a short time on screen they may not register consciously.

Despite the objections, "Altered States" has been playing to sell-out audiences since it opened here and in Los Angeles on Christmas Day. This month, it went nationwide, and the response has been as enthusiastic.

"It's the sort of film people expected to see in the 1960s and never did," Russell said. "Suddenly, it's here. This film could not have been made in the '60s because some of the special effects would have been technically impossible. We used computers to get the right image during several special effects sequences. In the past it would have looked fake."

To answer charges that he used subliminal cuts, the British director conceded that he included some scenes that were only two frames long — 1/12th of a second on screen.

"The main character is supposed to be hallucinating and his mind is like a machine gun," said Russell. "I wanted to get his experience across and obviously you do that by quick cutting. Some of those shots that only last for one-third of a second on screen took three days to shoot."

Actually, the "Altered States" controversy began long before the movie opened when Paddy Chayefsky, who wrote the screenplay based on his own novel, demanded that his name be removed from the credits.

When asked why Chayefsky reacted so strongly, Russell replied, "He didn't like the color of the paint on the sensory deprivation tank. Then, he didn't like the lighting. But in essence, it was the color of the paint he was upset about."

Chayefsky has refused to discuss the film or tell his side of the story. Meanwhile, Russell insisted that he kept as close to the script as possible.

"I shot every word he wrote," said the 53-year-old director. "It didn't all end up in the film, but we didn't change anything either, except for some location shots where things characters were talking about just weren't there."

The main character in the film is a scientist fascinated by hallucinations and how altered states of consciousness may lead him to the ultimate truth and to the source of life itself. To intensify his altered states of consciousness, he enters a sensory deprivation tank after taking hallucinogenic mushrooms.

"I tried mushrooms once," said Russell. "But I'd never take anything else. I'm afraid of getting hooked."

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NBC Ahead Of Other Networks In Use Of Satellite System

WASHINGTON (AP) — The NBC television network has had troubles in recent years keeping up with ABC and CBS in the prime-time ratings race. But when it comes to satellites, NBC has just taken the lead over its competitors.

After years of debate and analysis, NBC has become the first to move toward the use of satellites to distribute regular network programming to its affiliates around the country.

All three networks, of course, have long relied on satellites for their news operations and other selected shows — particularly to bring a program or report to their New York headquarters. For more than 30 years, however, the networks have relied on an extensive microwave radio system to distribute their nightly program package to affiliates.

That system, owned and operated by the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. (AT&T), is expensive and getting more so every year. AT&T currently is realizing annual revenues of \$62 million through its video transmission service, and has just asked federal approval for a \$16.7 million rate hike.

Despite such financial pressure, the networks have been leery about turning to satellite distribution even though it could reduce their transmission bills by 25 percent or more. The microwave system has proven itself effective and generally reliable.

"It's tough for the networks to talk about scrapping a system that allows them to reach just about every household in America," observes one official at the Federal Communications Commission.

That, however, is exactly what NBC is doing. At the request of the network, AT&T asked the FCC last month for permission to conduct a satellite test linking three NBC stations in Chicago, Houston and Los Angeles.

If approved by the commission, NBC will begin an experiment that it expects to last at least a year.

Europe Gets Country Music Via Radio

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — An estimated 5 million listeners in Europe heard two hours of foot-stomping, hand-clapping country music from the country music capital of the world via a special live broadcast over 1.3 million watt-Radio Luxembourg.

Crystal Gayle, Porter Wagoner, Johnny Paycheck and Ronnie Prophet performed Saturday at the new Tennessee Performing Arts Center and their shows were beamed to Europe via satellite.

The style ranged from hard-core country music by Paycheck to the light country and blues sounds of Miss Gayle — the younger sister of country music superstar Loretta Lynn.

The radio broadcast was the second of

a series originating in Nashville over Radio Luxembourg.

Wagoner, dressed in his trademark lavender rhinestone suit, sang several bluegrass songs, including "Rollin' in My Sweet Baby's Arms" and "Blue Moon of Kentucky." Bluegrass is a style of country music, usually played on fiddles and banjos and characterized by tight vocal harmony.

Wagoner, who performs regularly on Nashville's Grand Ole Opry, is the former singing partner of country music superstar Dolly Parton.

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Lubbock Policeman Recalls 'Fort Apache' Stint

For Lubbock patrolman Morris Thomas, Fort Apache, The Bronx, is more than the title of a controversial movie. From May 1975 to September 1976 it was a place he could smell, see, hear, work, and in one case, come close to dying in.

The 28-year-old native of Lubbock was an Army military policeman from 1975 until March 1980, when he left the military to become a policeman in Lubbock. His first assignment in the military police was at Fort Hamilton in Brooklyn, N.Y.

Frequently his assignment of tracking down deserters and AWOL military personnel took him to the 41st Precinct of the South Bronx — the area portrayed in the movie "Fort Apache, The Bronx." The movie, which has drawn the scorn of some residents living in the South Bronx, draws a picture of an area frequented by pimps, prostitutes and drug dealers who prey on the remainder of the poverty-ridden residents.

Thomas saw the film recently, and said of it: "As far as the scenery of the Bronx, it's accurate. The description of the peo-

ple, fairly accurate. They (moviemakers) didn't show a lot of the street gangs... They showed a lot cleaner part of the Bronx than can really be portrayed... it's got slums that Lubbock has no comparison to, or anywhere in West Texas I've seen." The movie was shot on location in the South Bronx, with Paul Newman as the protagonist.

Thomas admits to some "culture shock" when he first worked in the area of the 41st Precinct. "The first time I went in I couldn't believe that humans could survive under such conditions as this... I guess that was the most surprising thing of all to find — a decent person, who could survive through all the corruption, the gangs, the killings, the murders, and come out of there with an attitude that he wanted to win, he wanted to survive."

The officer said people who were rearred in the South Bronx could rise above it. One he knew was a doctor who returned to the community to help it. But, "he's one of the few. The majority never have a chance to make it," he said.

In the opening scenes of the movie, two rookie policemen

are shot and killed by a prostitute, and a few youths steal items from the patrolmen's bodies.

Thomas said rookie patrolmen would never work alone without a senior officer, and the killing of an officer in New York would bring about vigorous efforts by police to catch the killer.

But he said the lack of witnesses to come forward about such an incident would not be rare in the South Bronx. "Yes, that would be accurate. Somebody gets murdered in the Bronx and nobody sees anything. They'll steal what they can off the body and run."

The hatred of police, made most graphic in the movie with a riot in front of the 41st Precinct, Thomas sometimes saw during his tour of the South Bronx. Police cars occasionally were overturned and burned. While he experienced no riot situations, he said policemen in the 41st Precinct told him of Molotov cocktails being thrown at the precinct house during the late 1960s and early 1970s.

As for his duties chasing down AWOLs and deserters, he said, "We've had knives pulled on us. We've had AWOLs run from us... I took one AWOL and got knocked off a three-story building with him, and I landed in a dumpster filled with human waste." The AWOL landed on concrete and fractured some ribs.

Thomas's closest brush with death may have come not in the Bronx, or other slums like Harlem or Bedford-Stuyvesant, but right at Fort Hamilton. He responded to a domestic disturbance call at on-post housing and was shot in the leg with a .25 caliber automatic by the wife of a man he was arresting. The wife had been assaulted by the husband.

The movie focused much of its attention on illegal drugs. Thomas said this rang true to life. "Drug dealing was very heavy in the South Bronx. It was nothing unusual to go up on the roofs and find junkies shooting up," he said. He and his military police partners were especially cautious about entering abandoned buildings to search for AWOLs and deserters. "These were junkie havens" and often a place for street gangs in the South Bronx.

Stealing was a way of life for the gangs. "Most of the gang

members are anywhere from 12 to 14 years old. I've seen kids as young as 3 or 4 running with gangs. It's because the kids don't have anyone else to take care of them. On the street the gangs will take and clothe them (young children), feed them and take care of them and give them the only love they've ever known," Thomas said.

Thomas said the movie essentially portrays the street police of the 41st Precinct accurately. He said he frequently used city police to assist in apprehending AWOLs and deserters and rode with them from time to time.

Thomas said most of the Bronx officers cared about the people of the area. The Police Athletic League was one means of trying to reach the young potential criminal.

But the Bronx police had different standards of conduct from police in this area. "What we term corruption in West Texas is a normal every day occurrence up there (in the South Bronx). It's nothing to them (police). You stop a traffic violator and the old boy hands you his drivers license and there's a 20 or 50 dollar bill under it. The officer just palms it" and lets the motorist go without a ticket. But Thomas said he knew of no major corruption by Bronx police, such as covering up a homicide, as is shown in the movie.

Although much of what Thomas saw was a life of despair for South Bronx residents, efforts were made to improve the environment. "There were several groups, large groups made up of just average everyday people. They tried to help us, but were trying primarily to help the people themselves... A lot of them were trying to rebuild the buildings that they were living in, trying to make them suitable," he said.

Efforts also included escort services to protect the elderly and day care centers for the elderly. Did these self-help efforts work when he was there? "A limited amount, yes; there were some improvements," Thomas replied.

But overall, the area of the 41st Precinct was and still is a tough place to live. "Lubbock's so-called slum or poverty areas would be considered upper class in New York in the Bronx, in Harlem, in Brownsville (Bedford-Stuyvesant), a lot of places. If they came here they would think they were living in high country," Thomas said.

It's a small tavern-type place, real blue-collar oriented. What I like about it is it's a people-oriented type of thing," said Beard, who started the Blue Collar Caucus in the House for congressmen who shared his working man background.

Beard said he won't change the name of the bar, but might change the decor.

"I plan to decorate it with some of my congressional memorabilia, you know, paintings and pictures. Central Falls is going to think they have a second congressman," said Beard.

IRS Sells Singer's House

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — The Germantown, Tenn., home of singer Jerry Lee Lewis' estranged wife has been sold at auction by the Internal Revenue Service for \$102,000.

A spokesman for McNeill Mortgage & Investment Co., Inc., said Thursday the \$42,000 balance on a first mortgage held on the home, in the Greentrees subdivision, has been paid and the IRS retained the rest of the money to pay against taxes owed by the couple.

The IRS previously has auctioned jewelry, automobiles and household furnishings of Lewis to satisfy part of a \$274,732 tax lien against the singer.

Jaren Lewis, estranged wife of the entertainer who filed for divorce in June 1979 in DeSoto County, Miss., said Thursday night the sale of the house is the last of her property the IRS can sell.

"They've sold it all," she said. "There's nothing else they can take."

Mrs. Lewis said she is destitute and has been living on food stamps for five months.

Publisher Escapes Injury

SIMI VALLEY, Calif. (AP) — Publisher Malcolm Forbes and two other people escaped injury when the hot air blimp in which they were traveling was forced down by strong winds and crashed into a high-voltage power line.

Forbes, chairman and editor in chief of Forbes magazine and an amateur balloonist, jumped to safety along with the pilot Roy Belotti, and fellow passenger Joe Lewis, police here said.

The Southern California Edison Co. shut off power and sent work crews to remove the craft from the downed line.

The three were on a round-trip cruise Friday from Valencia, 35 miles northwest of Los Angeles, when the vehicle began losing altitude. The craft was spotted by a traffic helicopter.

The pilot set the blimp down in an open field, but the strong gusts dragged the craft across the 220,000-volt power line.

Royal Wedding Held

LUXEMBOURG (AP) — The bluest of Europe's blue bloods turned out Saturday for the wedding of Henri, son of Grand Duke Jean of Luxembourg, and a Cuban-born Swiss commoner, Maria Teresa Mestre, at Notre-Dame Cathedral.

Among the royal representatives were Britain's Prince Philip, Prince Rainier and Princess Grace of Monaco, King Baudouin and Queen Fabiola of Belgium, King Olaf V of Norway, Queen Margrethe II and Prince Henrik of Denmark and former Queen Marie Jose of Italy.

The 24-year-old bride wore an ermine-trimmed silk gown designed by French couturier Pierre Balmain. The family diamond diadem topped her coiled hairdo powdered with orange blossom.

The 25-year-old groom met his wife at Geneva University in Switzerland when they studied political science.

Jenrette Sells Story

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — John Jenrette, the former congressman who was convicted of bribery in the FBI's Abscam investigation, has sold his story of his life in politics to the silver screen. The Columbia State said Saturday.

The South Carolina newspaper said Hollywood producer Michael Viner bought the movie rights to Jenrette's story for an undisclosed amount. No production date has been set.

Viner told the newspaper's Washington bureau in a telephone interview Friday that a deal was reached when Jenrette, a Democrat, was in Los Angeles last week.

Jenrette was convicted in October of accepting a \$50,000 bribe from FBI agents posing as representatives of fictitious Arab sheiks in search of political favors.

Viner said the film would not concentrate on the relationship between Jenrette and his wife, Rita, who is seeking a divorce.

Mother Teresa To Get Award

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Mother Teresa, winner of the 1979 Nobel Peace Prize for her worldwide missionary work, will receive Marquette University's Pere Marquette Discovery Award Medal.

The Rev. John P. Raynor, president of Marquette, said Mother Teresa will receive the annual award — named for Jesuit explorer Pere Jacques Marquette — in ceremonies June 13. University officials said that to receive the award, an individual must have accomplished an "extraordinary breakthrough" in humanitarian service.

Fame Threatens Star's Marriage

CHICAGO (AP) — Ed Asner, the actor who plays the title role of the newspaper editor in the television series "Lou Grant," has been married to his wife, Nancy, for 22 years.

But he says in an interview in the upcoming edition of Playboy magazine, his fidelity was tested when his fame made beautiful women available to him.

"At first, I was always receptive," he said. "But I got into trouble a few times... I've cut back on that sort of activity. I realize how much I love my wife and how important it is for me not to endanger our relationship."

Asner, whose character sympathized with his reporters when they went on strike against the TV series' newspaper in last Monday's episode, noted that he was active in last summer's actors strike and said, "I wish to be identified with the labor movement to my dying breath."

That sentiment probably explains his off-hours activities while filming "Fort Apache, The Bronx," the current movie in which he and Paul Newman star as policemen. "Maybe that's why I hung around with the cops in New York instead of Paul Newman."

Police To Reopen Murder Case

BOSTON (AP) — Boston police reportedly will reopen the Blackfriars mass murder case, hoping for a break that could net a conviction in the 1978 slaying of a prominent publisher, a well-known broadcaster and three other men.

Two men have already been tried and acquitted in the sensational case stemming from the slayings in the basement of the Blackfriars pub.

The victims, apparently executed in a botched robbery, included the publisher, Vincent Solmonte, 35, of Quincy, and former radio and television reporter Jack Kelly, 35, of Framingham.

Nearly three years after the killings, police sources have told the Boston Herald American that investigators stumbled during initial probe, hoping for a quick conviction.

Police now say some prospective sources of information were not interviewed in the original investigation.

Sources told the newspaper that the initial probe was hampered by bitterness between the Boston police and the office of then-District Attorney Garrett Byrne, who took over the case in the midst of a re-election campaign.

Nixon Big Bread-Winner

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Richard Nixon is a better draw than Gerald Ford and Bob Hope combined, say Ohio Republicans who have invited the former president to be the main speaker at their Senate Republican Campaign Committee fund-raiser.

A spokesman for the committee, Senate President Pro Tem Thomas A. Van Meter, said \$70,000 was raised in 1979 when Ford and Hope were the top attractions. Van Meter expects twice that amount to be raised by the Wednesday reception and dinner.

Republican officials said they had sold more than 300 tickets by Friday and expected to sell more than 500 to the reception and banquet at which Nixon will deliver a speech on "U.S. Foreign Policy in the 1980s."

Prices are \$500 a couple and \$300 for individuals for both events. For the banquet only, it is \$200 for couples and \$150 for individuals.

Digitalis Influence On Van Gogh Seen

CHICAGO (AP) — Vincent Van Gogh, the Dutch painter, may have been intoxicated by digitalis during the last few years of his life and the drug's effects could have altered his painting style, a report in a medical journal says.

Dr. Thomas Lee, a professor of surgery at Georgetown University's School of Medicine, said there is "circumstantial evidence" in some of Van Gogh's self-portraits and other paintings that he was suffering from some of the symptoms of digitalis intoxication.

Digitalis is a powerful drug made from the dried leaves of the purple foxglove, a common garden flower. During the latter half of the 19th century, digitalis was used to treat epilepsy and many authorities believe Van Gogh suffered from the disorder.

Lee says in the current issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association that the dominance of yellow and the recurrence of halos in Van Gogh's later paintings could be symptoms of the effects of digitalis.

He said that in some of his paintings wheat fields and the sky were green.

"This all suggests he was looking through yellow eyes," Lee said in a telephone interview.

Medical authorities, he said, have cited the yellow vision as a possible effect of the use of the drug.

Van Gogh's earlier paintings favored dark browns and olives.

Lee also said Van Gogh painted his doctor twice with the foxglove plant and two of the artist's self-portraits depicted him with unequal pupils, a possible symptom of digitalis intoxication.

In addition, Van Gogh, who suffered from depression and insanity, showed symptoms of restlessness and disorientation, which also come from repeated use of the drug, Lee said.

In the medical journal article, Lee said Van Gogh may have been treated with digitalis for his epilepsy or manic periods. "I noticed the golden and coronal toxic symptoms, was impressed with them, and when these side effects disappeared, purposefully continued to paint with a yellow dominance."

But Lee said it shouldn't be assumed Van Gogh was continually under the effects of digitalis during the later years of his life.

The adverse effects of digitalis, Lee said, could come with one dose.

"It may be delayed for a couple of days and some people may persist with it," he said. "It usually disappears when the drug is stopped."

Dear Joyce: How long would it take me to become an occupational therapist?

— S.B., Houston, Texas
The norm is four and one-half years — four years for a bachelor's degree in occupational therapy plus a six-month internship. If you've already got a baccalaureate, you may be able to qualify in about two years through a master's degree.

Many people think an occupational therapist deals only with work-related matters. Not so. In this use, occupation means being occupied in meaningful day-to-day living activities including work, leisure and play.

An infant has muscular, perceptual and motor skills to develop, a child is occupied building physical and mental skills, an adult works to maintain a satisfying life, and elderly person is concerned with continuing fitness, strength and independence. When performance is impaired or independence threatened, the occupational therapist can perform valuable service, helping the patient recover from a physical injury or accident, birth defect or other difficulty.

The therapist may work with an individual or group, often doing so at a hospital. Other therapists are found in community mental health centers, nursing homes, clinics, day care centers, private and public school systems and home health agencies.

Sometimes the work is simple: A child with impaired visual-special perceptions might work with the therapist to match wooden shapes to corresponding ones on a card. Sometimes it's complex.

An amputee might be taught to use an artificial hand.

For this work, the new therapist is paid annually between \$13,500 and \$16,500, and after several years' experience may command \$16,000 to \$20,000. An administrative therapist can earn up to \$30,000. On a daily rate, therapists who contract for direct service can receive \$120 and consultants may be paid \$175. Pay varies geographically and by employer and is highest on the East and West Coasts and North Central states.

Nationwide the job market's great, reflecting a shortage of occupational therapists. Spot surpluses exist in some places, such as areas of Colorado, New Mexico, Oregon, Washington, upstate New York and the District of Columbia.

This is the only occupation the U.S. Department of Labor expects to increase by 100 percent in this decade.
