Pentagon Requests \$32.6 Billion Budget Hike

retary Caspar Weinberger asked Wednesday for a \$32.6-billion surge in the Pentagon's budget as the down payment for a larger navy, a faster bomber and other new weaponry because "the United States cannot allow the military balance to swing further" in favor of Russia.

"I think we've fallen dangerously far behind in a number of vital areas, and I think it essential that we ... do something about this as quickly as we can," Wein-

"We are asking for things that we believe are absolutely essential," he de-At the same time, the defense secre-

tary warned that "this is not a one-year program for summer soldiers," signaling that the Reagan administration plans a long-term and costly buildup of the nation's conventional and strategic military

plans for deep cuts in domestic programs, Weinberger told a news conference that "some sacrifices are going to be required" to compensate for essential increases in U.S. military strength.

The administration called for a \$6.8 billion addition to the Carter administration's final proposals for this fiscal year, bringing the total to \$178 billion for fiscal

At the same time, it recommended a

for fiscal 1982, starting next Oct. 1. That would raise the level next year to \$222.2 billion, a total never before matched in

Only \$5.8 billion of the additional budget authority will actually be spent this year and next. Most of the additional authority, which would permit the Pentagon to make contract commitments, would be "spent out" in future years as new ships, planes and other equipment

manufactured.
The vast bulk of the additional funds asked for in fiscal 1981 and fiscal 1982 will be earmarked for improving the weaponry and readiness of the conventional sea, air and land forces. The only major strategic weapons initiative is a nearly \$2.5 billion request to push development next year of an advanced bomber called a "long-range combat aircraft." The Pentagon has not settled on any

of several different design possibilities, but the aim is to produce a faster and less vulnerable craft than the aging B-52.

Weinberger told the committee the Defense Department does not expect to come up with recommendations on the bomber question or on a basing system for the MX missile until midsummer, al-though the lawmakers plan to send the military budget to the floor before that.

City Official Fires Odessa **Police Chief**

ODESSA'S Police Chief, who described his working atmosphere as one of fear, hate and distrust, said Wednesday afternoon he "wanted to make it clear' he was fired, contradicting the city manager's announcement earlier in the day that the lawman had retired.

City Manager Kerry Sweatt later acknowledged he had requested 32-year department veteran Jack Tomlin's retirement in order to "change the tone and direction of the Odessa Police Department

Sweatt refused, however, to address speculations the request was linked to mounting troubles within the department which have spurred the resignations of an inordinate number of seasoned officers in the last 18 months. Among problems facing the department as revealed in a copyrighted story in The Avalanche-Journal Dec. 14, is an FBI investigation into a police officer's possible connection with an unsolved 1979 homi-

Desire For Change Cited

Instead, the city manager merely repeated his initial desire for change in the 140-officer department.

Nor would Sweatt comment on whether Tomlin's performance at the post he's held for 21 years was adequate. Tomlin was not so closed-mouthed

"I want to make it clear that I have been fired," Tomlin said. "I think the leadership of the city council in recent times has been inept, incompetent and for the most part, incoherent. The police department has been done a terrible injustice by the recent administration at the city hall.

"Personal Thing" Claimed
Those claims in that (AJ) story

(concerning the federal investigation) have never been proven," he added. "This is more a personal thing (on the part of Sweatt) than professional.

The Odessa Police Department in the last 18 months has experienced a higherthan-average attrition rate of experienced officers, some moving to private industry for higher salaries while complaining that overtime pay - \$8,000 worth in one case - has been withheld.

Some officers also resigned from the department following allegations by officers the department was sloppily run and that natrolmen were routinely encouraged "to beat up burglars to teach them

High Winds Stir Dust, **Upset Taxiing Plane**

BLOWING dust hampered the activities of South Plains residents Wednesday, but weather officials say winds should be calmer today.

A low pressure system over the Texas Panhandle created the gusts, which sometimes reached up to 45 mph and were blamed for flipping a small private plane readying for takeoff Wednesday afternoon at Lubbock International Air-

Frank Herrington of Sweetwater was taxiing the six-passenger craft along one of the runways at 4:58 p.m. Wednesday and awaiting takeoff clearance when a sudden blast of wind caught a wing of the plane and flipped it over on its nose, a spokesman for the airport's Air Traffic

Neither Herrington nor any of the several passengers in the craft were injured, the spokesman said, adding that the pilot did not make a second takeoff attempt Winds were gusting up to 35 mph at the time, the spokesman noted.

Today's calmer winds also should be accompanied by slightly warmer temperatures, forecasters say, with the high this afternoon expected to climb into the middle 60s. The low tonight should drop

into the lower 30s. Friday's outlook is much the same, with the high that day again predicted to be near 65. The extended outlook for West Texas calls for mostly cloudy skies throughout the weekend and weather officials say there is a chance showers and thunderstorms also may return to the region late this week.

Light rainshowers fell over portions of the Panhandle from Plainview to Amarillo late Wednesday afternoon, while thunderstorms produced locally heavy rains over Eastern Texas. One person reportedly was struck by lightening in Houston

Meanwhile, a Pacific front stretched from a surface low over northwestern Oklahoma and into northwestern Arkansas and Louisiana. Tornado warnings were issued for portions of Oklahoma late Wednesday afternoon and tornado watches remained in effect until early evening in parts of Louisiana.

Another storm which moved in from the Pacific Ocean brought rain to the northwestern part of the nation and lashed the central Pacific coast with

Sunny skies prevailed over much of the northern plains and parts of New ladelphian, Francis Santos, 26, who was with Coyle but apparently was not planning to join him on the flight to Acapul-

After picking up the money, the trio allegedly went to the home of a friend of Coyle's, where the money was counted and Coyle burned the bank bags and wrappers, the Philadelphia Bulletin re-

The cash was split up and Coyle allegedly left with about \$1 million in a suitcase, the Bulletin said

It was the first reported attack on the embassy since the Reagan administration announced a tripling of military aid to the military-civilian junta and the provision of 20 advisers to train Salvadoran security forces to deal with the guer-

Meanwhile, the leadership of the U.S. Catholic Church urged a halt to the escalation of military aid to El Salvador, warning that "it increases the risk of wider military intervention.

Serious Consequences Seen "It is counter to the policies we have

been implementing and pursuing in El Salvador," a coalition of church groups said in a statment."And such an outcome would have serious consequences on our ability to continue to pursue those poli-

In a joint statement, the three principal organizations representing Catholic bishops, priests and nuns called for ending all military aid to El Salvador's civilian-military junta and for new efforts to reach a negotiated settlement of the growing civil war.

Police said Wednesday, however, that Mrs. Brown, who was shown a photograph of the third suspect, said she did not recognize the woman and is unaware of how the suspect might have known of the expensive property at Mrs. Brown's

BUT DON'T BLAME DUST

Ill Wind Blowing No Good

By RUTHANNE BROCKWAY **Avalanche-Journal Staff**

IT BRINGS tears to your eyes. It causes your skin to itch. It collects on the

It's called blowing dust. And, it's that

Although blowing dust is an oftencursed phenomenon on the South Plains, it's usually not the grit but actually the pollen carried in those gusts that cause the swelling, redness and other aggravations of the nose.

"Elms, oaks, maple, mesquite and all the trees of West Texas are the ones that most commonly cause the trouble," says Dr. Robert Moore, an allergy specialist and clinical professor at Texas Tech School of Medicine.

is. Unfortunately, each season has its own special cast of characters. In winter, add cedar to the list of common allergy culprits. In the fall there's pigweed, ragweed and Russian thistle.

"Mold is all year around," Dr. Moore noted, adding though, "It's worse in the spring and fall.

Pollen plants produce chemicals that enter the body through the nose and attach themselves to mucous in the throat. he explained, adding that the body produces its own immunologic reaction the release of histamine - to fight those

chemicals causing the allergic reaction. But while the body is waging war on the pollen, the battle casualities include a swollen, red, sore nose.

Actually, if one were able to live in an environment of only plants pollinated by nsects the problems would be reduced. Dr. Moore noted that usually the pol-

is too big to be carried by the wind. But gusty winds in the area stir up elenty of pollen from plants pollinated by the wind. And that means trouble not only for the city-dweller but also for area

farmers who may suffer economic losses. Kenn Wigner, a full-time forecaster at the National Weather Service station in Lubbock and a part-time graduate student in atmospheric sciences at Texas Tech, has compiled a 32-year recorded the hours and days of blowing dust in

A year ago this month Lubbock had 51


hours of blowing dust, but that's by no means the highest tally. That distinction goes to the month of March in 1954 when Lubbock recorded 121 hours of the aggralen grain of a plant pollinated by insects vating blowing dust.

Wigner says February is a month which often has a few dusty days but that the months of March, April and May are the months of the most destructive blowing dust." He explained that few crops are in the

Depleted Ogallala Aquifer Predicted

BURLINGTON, Colo. (AP) — Eastern Colorado farmland will be dried up when portions of the Ogallala Aquifer a huge underground water supply — are depleted in 40 years, says a federal study.

And the costs of transferring water to eastern Colorado from other basins will be so high that farmers there will be forced to grow crops that do not require irrigation, the \$6 million study said.

Residents who depend on the aquifer have been tapping the supply faster than it can be replenished, and by the year 2020, they will find areas of the aquifer are nearly dry, researchers said Tuesday at a water conference here. Sponsored by the Colorado Department of Agriculture and the Colorado

High Plains Advisory Committee, the conference was conducted to review progress on the federal High Plains-Ogallala Aquifer Study. The study, scheduled for delivery to

Congress in 1982, is being conducted in conjunction with the eight states in the Ogallala Basin, including Colorado, Ne-braska, New Mexico, South Dakota, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas and Wyoming.
Only areas of the aquifer in Nebraska will not suffer from seriously depleted

water supplies by the year 2020, said Harvey Banks, of Camp, Dresser and McKee, a Texas firm hired to conduct the study.

The federal study will determine whether the government should inter-vene to maintain water for farmers in the Ogallala Basin, he said.

"Maybe the costs to the region are not so fantastic when you consider what the long-range impacts are," Banks said.





Armed Clandestine Organizations Going Public

(EDITOR'S NOTE — A few among the millions of Americans who traditionally keep guns around the house are taking to the hills to fend for themselves. Of greater cencers le law entercement authorities, however, are those on the milliant fringe of society who fry to achieve their aims with terrerism and armed political action. Special Correspondent Peter Arnett writes of these groups and the police response in this final installament of a four-part series.) By PETER ARNETT

TEXAS CANYON, Calif. (AP) -They have long inhabited the American fringe. But today, armed clandestine organizations are coming into the open to attract new members.

And along with the Klu Klux Klan, the American Nazi Party and the Jewish Defense League are terrorist groups seeking to advance their causes.

'Violence and conflict surround them." said Brian Jenkins, an expert on terrorism and paramilitary organizations for the Rand Corp. think tank at Santa Monica. Calif. "And with today's worldwide jet travel and international communications, the potential for their influence is high.

Police complain that their hands are tied more tightly than ever in investigating these organizations because of legislative prohibitions against group surveillance. "We can no longer keep much real intelligence on them," said Capt. Dan Cook of the Los Angeles Police Depart-

In addition to racial hate groups are those promoting special causes such as religious cultism and political freedom

Paranoia breeds some disturbing activities," Terry McGuiness, supervisor of the Threat Analysis Center of the California Department of Justice, said.

"To have them in our midst and not know if they will take up against the general population even though they say they won't is genuine danger," she add-

The most visible of these once clandestine groups are the KKK and the JDL, mutually opposing organizations that are drilling their followers in camps around the country.

About 30 JDL sympathizers and members gathered recently for their first publicly announced training session at California's Texas Canyon.

Driving up the narrow canyon north of Burbank was like visiting a war zone. Shooting is permitted in this part of the Angeles National Forest, and gunfire cracked and echoed between rock walls as hundreds of Californians fired pistols, rifles and shotguns from standing, crouching and sitting-in-parked-car positions. The smell and smoke of cordite drifted into the air as bottles, cans and other targets fell in a rain of bullets.

The JDL group was distinguished by the nature of their targets - cardboard cutouts of human figures with big black swastikas painted on their midriffs. Young girls, old men and married cou-

ples tried firing military-type weapons like the semi-automatic M-l5 and HK-9l. Or they played with the smaller Ingram Model 10, favored by African mercenar-

"Jews in World War II would have given their very lives to have the weapons you are now holding in your hands," said Irv Rubin, the bearded, loquacious national leader of the JDL, open shirted in the early winter sun.

He told a reporter, "We have never had any occasion to use guns. Ideology is more important to us. But then, part of our ideology is being ready.

The JDL was founded in 1968 by extremists who perceived increases in anti-Semitism and anti-Israeli sentiment as threats to Jews, especially at the hands of such groups as the KKK and the

Operating in its early years as a vigilante group, the JDL moved into international Jewish causes. Fifty bombings and other terrorist actions in the United States have been done in its name, or those of closely related groups.

One of those at the Texas Canyon session, 13-year-old Dina Mizrahi, dressed in red short-shorts and T-shirt, confidently fired a .38-caliber revolver. "I joined the JDL because I felt burt at the poor treatment of Jewish people," she said. Her parents are Egyptian Jews now living in Los Angeles

'It's kind of scary at first, but I tell you it's a lot scarier to be around a gun if a Klansman is pointing it at you," Dina

Barry Krugel, self-described chief of operations for the Los Angeles JDL, was carefully checking out the shooters.

When we get people who show acumen we take them into the mountains for advanced training techniques. We teach them combat training, shooting from behind barricades and stuff like that," Krugel said. "Our people more than meet Marine Corps standards."

Krugel later crawled over rocks on the canyon floor to show a photographer his technique.

Klan leaders are similarly outspoken. Louis Beam, grand dragon of the Texas-based Knights of the Klu Klux Klan, said last December that children as young as 8 were being trained to shoot

"Instead of playing baseball or kicking a football around, they are learning how to survive." he said.

ca's police forces are honing their skills. Police Sgt. Jack Shelton can burst through a locked door to gun down a killer or shoot out an eye from a window 300 yards away.

For years, along with others on the Kansas City police special weapons assault team, the nation's first SWAT group. Shelton confidently trained to handle major crime emergencies.

The five-man SWAT teams were first developed in the 1960s because of an increase in leftwing terrorist groups. But as civil protest diminished in the 1970s, the special teams found they were being called mainly to quell family disputes and to handle violent outbursts of the emotionally disturbed.

Now, the militancy of paramilitary groups and the intention of a growing body of survivalists to arm themselves has once again thrown focus on the SWAT teams.

Members of the armed Posse Comitatus organization faced down a SWAT unit trying to evict mobile home tenants in Wisconsin last year. The police departed to avoid bloodshed

"From what I hear we are three to five years behind the paramilitary groups as far as weapons are concerned," Capt. John Bartlett, commander of the Kansas City East Patrol Support Division, said. We don't even have automatic weapons. yet we know there are plenty out there in civilian hands."

Another Kansas City officer, Sgt. Robert Mathis, said there was also concern about the ease in which semi-automatic weapons commonly available in gun shops can be converted to fully automatic. "It takes metal parts costing one dollar and 35 cents, and you can order them through any number of gun magazines," Mathis said.

But the SWAT teams are the primary police assault force, and they regularly go through their paces in Kansas City. "Our officers are trained not to kill but to immobilize," Bartlett said. "We have shot only two persons in 14 years, yet we have been called in on more than 250 op-

The Kansas City SWAT squads showed their skills in a demonstration at an abandoned rural mansion near the city limits where hostages were theoretically being held. The blue-uniformed officers, carrying semi-automatic AR-i5s and sniper rifles, smartly double-timed through the woods, running from tree to tree as they approached the building.

A shot rang out. Was a hostage dead?





Hiring Freeze Is Overdue

OUR REACTION to the Reagan administration's decision to freeze the hiring this week of public service workers under the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act is this: Why did they wait so long?

Few programs in the federal stable of waste, fraud and extravagance can match the scandal-scarred CETA undertaking for failure and ineffectiveness.

Conceived as a way to lift the hardcore poor out of their cycle of joblessness and get them off welfare, CETA became a makework program on the one hand and a way on the other hand for local governments to switch some payroll expense to the federal taxpayer.

THE REAGAN administration, trying to whittle \$45 billion or so out of the federal budget, wants to phase out 340,000 federally subsidized jobs in state and local governments by Sept. 30, the end of this fiscal year.

In his budget message to Congress, Reagan estimated that \$635 million could be saved in this fiscal year by phasing out CETA jobs under the public service categories.

Further study indicated the savings could be increased to \$865 million-that's getting close to \$1 billion-by slapping on an immediate hiring freeze.

ON FOREIGN STUDENT FEES

Two Sides To Education Coin

WHILE SOME changes are in order on the handling of foreign students in state colleges and universities, including tuition, we hope the Legislature goes slowly in making them

Currently, there are three bills being considered by Texas solons which would make it more than twice as expensive and more difficult for foreign students to enroll in statesupported institutions of higher learning in

Part of the reason for the measures, legislators admit, is a sort of backlash to some Iranian students who have used their campus roles for protests against first the late Shah and later the U.S. while the hostages were being held.

HOWEVER, WHILE this was inexcusable for the students who are in the U.S. as guests, the legislation now under consideration should be studied for other reasons, as well.

Too the measures should not zero in on any one nation, but seek to treat all equally.

The major issue here is the soaring cost of educating a student in the state's colleges and universities. There are those who feel that in some respects, Texas taxpayers are subsidizing the education of foreign students while in effect penalizing state and out-ofstate American students. Currently, foreign students pay \$40 per semester hour to attend Texas schools, compared with the \$4 per semester hour tuition charged to residents of

Many foreign students work at part-time jobs in order to get an American education, some of them having saved for years abroad or having had their families borrow or save funds for a U.S. education. Others are helped by their governments, as was the case for many Iranian students, or by scholarships.

IT IS ALSO argued that U.S. students could be deprived of an opportunity to come in contact with other cultures, other ideas if foreign students are forced to forego study

Such an exchange of ideas, it is argued, serves to foster understanding and peace among different peoples and nations, a point with which we thoroughly agree.

A Global Strategy

WASHINGTON-A vast hodgepodge, a veritable Chinese menu of measures to "strengthen peace." was laid out by Leonid Brezhnev in his speech to the 26th Party Congress in Moscow last week.

His purpose, massive evidence suggests, was to slow down American preparedness, and split the U.S. from its allies.

Still, American opinion being what it is, and the allies being what they are, the Reagan administration has to make positive response to at least one of the Russian gambits.

The least noxious-especially from the viewpoint of the allies-centers around a French plan for a European Disarmament Conference.

The smorgasbord of proposals dished up by Brezhnev included practically every initiative ever put forward before by anybody

ANDREW TULLY: Delay...



WASHINGTON-Members of Congress, just plain Democrats, minorities, and confused newspaper pundits should take a long look at recent history before deciding that Ronald Reagan and his new economics won't do

The last time we had a Democratic President, he barely made it to the White House. Jimmy Carter beat Jerry Ford by a couple of votes here: a couple of votes there. He was not what you'd call a viable people's choice. Ronald Reagan, on the other hand, made it big

over Carter despite the "issue" of Reagan's age and the whimperings of the cheese-and-wine crowd that a vote for Reagan was a vote for bombing Moscow. The folks out in what Washington exquisites call the sticks really wanted Reagan.

SO? SO opponents of Reagan's plan for 'economic recovery' - especially those on Capital Hill-have a problem. Do they want to be put in the position of flouting Reagan's mandate?

Hell also runs second in fury to the outrage of plain voters frustrated by political efforts to pull

In that matter, consider the results of the frankly uncelebrated Tully Poll of readers. Thirty-one out of 31 polled supported what Reagan is trying to do. The consensus of those interviewed: Give the man a chance to see what he can do; nothing else has worked

That means two things-most voters still love Ronald Reagan, and Reagan would do well to work fast while he is still a kind of national Valen-

DEMOCRATS ON The Hill including both the principled and the blatantly political, understand this. That's why the word is out: Delay and delay, and again delay.

Time, they figure, will leave a spot of tarnish on the Reagan halo. They ought to know. Disenchantment with Jimmy Carter had begun to raise its cynical head during the first year of his adminis-

But that was Jimmy Carter, who was naked to both his enemies and his purported friends in the various Democratic seats of power. Reagan won because he got so many Democratic voters. His victory was as close to being unanimous as any Presidential candidate could hope for in these wild days.

Reagan's problem is homemade. He wants a reduction in federal spending and his 30 percent tax cut over three years wrapped in the same pack-

HE PROBABLY won't get it. Democrats in Congress at this writing are willing to go along with about \$30 billion in spending cuts, as against Reagan's demand for a \$41.4 billion cut.

Moreover, it's unlikely Reagan will get a package of budget cuts tomorrow or even as a Fourth of July present. The way House Speaker Tip O'Neill, that good Democrat, plans to move, there won't be any vote until August.

Still, the Democrats can't afford too much shillyshallying. Their boy got the country into the present mess, and Congress was not without collateral sin in that process.

Obstructionism for obstructionism's sake usually backfires out in the so-called "sticks."

The Soviet leader smiled on a scheme, once advanced by West Germany, for a freeze on medium-range nuclear weapons in Europe. He revived an idea of his own for neutralizing the Persian

He tied that to a notion, backed in various ways by Pakistan, Iran, France and Britain, for dealing with the Afghanistan problem. He indicated readiness to renegotiate the SALT Treaty with the U.S., and called for contacts-though not, as widely reported, a summit meeting—at all levels.

But the velvet glove ill concealed the iron fist. The bulk of the speech extolled a Five Year Plan, which continues inordinate emphasis on military spending, and perpetuates the preponderance of heavy industry off which the military feeds.

WITH RESPECT to Afghanistan, Brezhnev made it seem that all that had happened was 'limited' Soviet "assistance" called in by popular demand. Events in Poland were described as "a threat to the foundations of the Socialist state.

A call for "deeds not words" would ideally be the right American response. But a sense of guilt about Vietnam still haunts American opinion.

Many "enlightened" Americans share the view of the Carter administration that the interest in arms control transcends such mere bagatelles as Soviet aggression in Afghanistan, and repression in Eastern Europe, and adventurism in Africa.

The most prominent American allies, moreover, have interests rooted in domestic politics in doing certain kinds of business with Russia.

WEST GERMANY drives a brisk trade east of the Elbe, and there is broad public support for Chancellor Schmidt's efforts to foster more rapport with the kith and kin in East Germany.

French Gaullists and French Communistsboth critical to President Valery Giscard d'Estaing's hopes for re-election in May-like to see their country playing the role of middleman between the super powers.

The British, keen to make their way as Good Europeans, fancy a special role as broker between the U.S. and the Continent.

The Reagan administration cannot defy these feelings, however ill-founded. Going against public opinion in this country and the interests of the allies can only weaken the drive to stiffen American defenses and enhance U.S. influence.

To give a harsh answer to the Brezhnev speech would be to play Moscow's game.

BUT ONE proposal in the Brezhnev grab bag can, temporarily at least, be explored without great risk. The French plan for a European Disarmament Conference would not in any way compromise the projected American military buildup. In supporting it, the U.S. associates itself with the only ally which, for now anyway, shares this country's willingness to apply muscle against moves by Russia or its proxies in Africa and Asia.

Moreover, the Russians have already given ground on the proposal. Originally the French called for confidence-building measures, including advance notification of troop movements in Western Europe, Eastern Europe and European Russia from the Urals west.

The Russians refused to include their own territory. In his speech last week Brezhney said the proposal could apply to Russia west of the Urals. He hinted that some American territory should also be included.

BUT HAVING elicited one concession by standing firm, this country and its allies are in good posture to pocket the gain and hold tight to the original proposal.

Not forever, though. In time, pressures will build for matching concessions. Or for a U.S. move to the summit. Or for exploration of what can be made to look like a Soviet offer to leave Af-

ghanistan in return for a neutral Persian Gulf Eventually, furthermore, a France backed without limit by Washington will produce a Gaullist Europe dominated by national feelings. A nationalist West Germany, in those conditions, might

well elect to turn its back on the Atlantic, the better to cut a deal with Russia So East-West relations are now on a slippery

If the Reagan administration is to marshal American opinion and avoid a split with the allies. it has to get on with the business of building American defenses, and drawing West Germany, Britain and France into a joint global strategy for dealing with Russia.

JAY HARRIS: The Real Issue...



THE SHOWDOWN in El Salvador may not be just between the Marxist-oriented guerrillas and the ruling junta in that Central American hot

It also may mark a revival of the Vietnam era debate over just what role America should play in such conflicts, as well as again raising the issue of human rights, right wing friends of the U.S., the role of the church, U.S. aid, the whole bit.

Already involved up to their wringing hands and pious pronouncements are certain liberal politicians in Congress and certain church leaders. Before the dust has settled, a whole new ball

game in U.S. foreign policy may be hammered out, or blunted. In an ironic twist, this small nation has become a focal point for a U.S. "stand." It is not as unlikely as it seems, however ...

ALTHOUGH MUCH of the action has been in such faraway places as Angola, Ethiopia and Afghanistan, not to mention Iran and Poland, much has been happening on America's doorstep.

While the headlines have been on Cuban forces in Africa, hostages in Tehran and Soviet soldiers in Afghanistan, the drums of change, usually to the tune of Marxist "liberation" movements, have echoed in and around the Caribbean.

As a result, the U.S. faces a ring of Cuban-Soviet sponsored nations and real or potential Marxist bases in a region where America is seen much in the same vein the Ayatollah Khomeini sees us.

It is to reassert a policy almost as old as the nation itself, that there will be no foreign intrusion into the Western Hemisphere, that President Reagan has taken his blunt stance against further Communist inroads. The months ahead can be decisive for more than just El Salvador.

AS THINGS now stand, the U.S. is stepping up its military aid, along with American military advisers, to the hard-pressed junta headed by President Jose Napoleon Duarte.

The Reagan people laid the groundwork for this new show of force last week by issuing "facts and figures" designed to show just how deeply involved Cuba, Nicaragua and Moscow have been in supplying weapons to the Salvadoran guerrillas.

It was a damning indictment, which had repercussions abroad, but which generally won points for the U.S. position. But, not from everyone. No sooner had the U.S. aid plan been unveiled than various Congressmen and church leaders, along with the media, raised the spectre of Vietnam.

Joining in the hue and cry were spokesmen for the Catholic church, who make no bones of their sympathy with the guerrilla cause.

IN AN EFFORT to blunt just such criticism, the State Department invited several American religious figures, including those from the Catholic church, to a private briefing on El Salvador.

Two days later, the U.S. Catholic Conference, representing 350 Catholic bishops in the U.S., issued a statement saying that although it opposes Communism in El Salvador, it is misleading to fo-

cus on that threat exclusively. "Outside agitation, influence, even weapons, would not be sown in such fertile soil if rampant injustice and fundamental inequities did not exist today as they have for decades in El Salvador." said a statement read to a Congressional subcommittee by the Rev. J. Bryan Hehir. He said the Catholic conference "wishes to reaffirm its basic policy position against any U.S. military assistance

to El Salvador He warned that U.S. weapons could be used against "communities of Christians, and designated church personnel."

AT ISSUE here is just where does the U.S. draw the line on further Soviet-Cuban backed revolution in the area.

For more than two decades now, Premier Fidel Castro has alternately thumbed his nose at the U.S., sought to make deals, and finally dumped hordes of his people onto our shores, while at the same time he was sending his "hired guns" to fight Russia's proxy wars in Africa.

Because the U.S. rolled over and played dead, even when Soviet armored forces set up shop only 90 miles away, Castro and his Soviet masters felt free to operate with impunity.

Thus came Nicaragua's "liberation," with U.S. help, and then the spotlight was on El Salvador. The battle cry was "land reform" and repressive right wing rulers. It was an old song which found a sympathetic audience among some of the peasants, but not all...

AND SO THE stage was set as President Reagan took over the reins of U.S. government and a thoroughly discredited foreign policy.

At this point, we should make something clear. There is no question but major changes and reforms are long overdue in such nations as Nicara-gua and El Salvador. There is no more excuse for violation of human rights, for death or hunger or lack of liberty from the right than the left.

But the record of those nations which have heen "liberated" where Marxist forces have been involved, from Africa to Asia to Central America, shows that the people fare no better under new, despotic regimes. In fact, the record often is even worse, especially where religious zealots get involved as is the case in Iran.

So when church leaders, and especially the Catholic church which has a large following in Central America, argue the U.S. should not send military aid and that the guerrillas are engaged in some sort of human rights crusade, they beg the real issue

In brief, it is that when anyone gets in bed with Communism, even indirectly, they in effect embrace an atheistic concept and perpetrate a cruel hoax on the very people they seek to help. In refusing to speak out on realistic birth control methods, they ignore part of the problem itself, exploding populations. El Salvador may be the wrong place and the wrong time. But, where, when and how do we draw the line?

"It does not require the employer to restructure his employment practices to maximize the number of minorities and

women hired," Powell added.

The decision overturned a finding in favor of Joyce Ann Burdine, who had brought a sex discrimination suit against the Texas Department of Community Af-

Miss Burdine, a field services coordi-nator with the agency's Public Service Careers Division, applied for a supervi-

As for the hours - 12 and often more a day with weekends sometimes a part of the training package - McDonald said he "would work hard anyplace and try to accomplish things."

Among his Reese accomplishments was the 1980 open house that drew more than 70,000 visitors through base gates to enjoy the two-day event.

Coordinating all the open house events happened like a lot of McDonald's activities occur, in volunteer hours of extra work with base programs and the South Plains community, another plus in his recent selection as the best overall pilot at the base.

McDonald, who won his pilot's wings at Reese in 1978 — five years after don-ning navigator's wings, shares 1980 honors with 1st Lt. Silvanus T. Gilbert III who copped T-38 IP honors and 1st Lt. Francisco Pineiro who won the T-37 cat-

Both division winners also are Reese graduates, Pinerio in Class 79-01 and Gilbert in Class 79-06.

Cruz's arrest and the subsequent murder charge cames as the result of further evidence presented only recently. Investigators speculate the shooting may have occurred as the result of a possible "love


Ironically, had not 45-year-old Rose, of 339 Peach Ave., been felled by the single .22-caliber bullet which pierced his heart, he might have died from alcohol poisoning in a short time. An autopsy performed upon the dead man revealed that Rose's blood alcohol content was beyond that listed to be the fatal limit.



Daughters Die In Episodes Of Violence

PEORIA, III. (AP) - Donald Shreeves buried the last of his four daughters a week ago

It's one of those things you figure, God. it can't be," Shreeves, a retired Army Corps of Engineers worker, said Wednesday. "But it is.

All four of his daughters died violently at different times in different ways in less than a decade

"Don't do nothing now, not a thing, Don't want to," he said. "I haven't been to bed all night. You just wake up in the middle of the night and walk the floor.

His last surviving daughter. Candace Lang. 33, was buried last Thursday in a family plot in Iowa. Her husband has been charged with shooting her to death.

Shreeves found out about her death Feb 22 when he was listening to the car radio. He was driving from his new home in Princeton, Mo., to Peoria to do some work on the old family house he had put on the market.

A few months ago. Shreeves and his wife. Bea, had given up their house here. It held to many bad memories, he said.

The radio newscaster was saying something about a woman being shot to

death in Schaeferville I knew that's where my last living daughter, Candy, lived," he said. "But I quickly dismissed it as impossible. It couldn't be Candy. A man simply does

not lose all four of his daughters. Shreeves lost his first daughter, Debbie. "the saint of the family, in a fiery car wreck in 1972. She was 19.

Beverly died in Chicago, where she had moved in the summer of 1977. A man in an apartment next to hers was killed in what people believe was an underground war Beverly, then 27, opened the door of her apartment to see what the shooting was about. The killers saw Beverly pushed her back into the room and forced her onto a bed. They put a pillow against her head and fired two shots into ber skull

Denise was two years younger than Beverly and followed her older sister everywhere. She moved to Chicago and tried to find out who killed Beverly.

Soon after she wrote her father that she believed she had found Beverly's killer Denise was discovered dead in an elevator in Chicago. She had been injected with enough drugs to kill a horse, the medical examiner said.

But the father's tragedy did not end there. When Shreeves went to Chicago to try and find out what happened, he learned that his girls were not secretaries. They were prostitutes, he said.

I raised them since they were bahe said. "I held down two jobs, washed their diapers and ironed their dresses. I thought I knew them.

So he and his wife moved to Missouri

last October, to put it all behind them. A week after burying his last daughter. Shreeves stares at an old portrait and says he can't believe all his girls are

The choice between the company stock and the guaranteed fund has to be made by you.

If you're willing to take on a modest degree of risk, put your money into the stock. But, if you want to take no chances, go the guaranteed fund route.

I'd opt for the stock. Its current dividend is producing a good yield. And the chances are that the dividend will be increased in the years ahead.

A systematic investment program in a high-quality common stock is an excellent way to build a retirement nestegg.

Q. Two years ago, I read a report on a U.S. Labor Department survey of retired people. Although 60 percent of the retirees stated they had invested in the stock market at one time or another, the survey showed that only 5 percent of their retirement income was investment in-

In view of this, don't you feel kind of strange, giving advice about investing in

A. Not at all. This column has never recommended that everyone invest in stocks, bonds or anything else. It has ofstressed here that many people shouldn't invest - because they can't afford to take any risks

Even so, your reading of that Labor Department report is askew. At retirement time, most people should get out of the stock market and put their money into risk-free things such as savings certifi-

The major sources of income for most retirees are pensions. Any "extra" income from investments makes retirement more comfortable.

And, hasn't it occurred to you that people who invested wisely during their working years are better off, come retirement time?

Q. About one year ago, I purchased a municipal bond which pays tax-free interest twice a year. As of this date, I have not received the bond from my brokerage house.

After the first interest payment was due, I had to ask my broker for the interest. Just the other day, I finally received the second semi-annual interest payment more than five months late.

I am a good customer of the brokerage house and cannot understand why they are making me wait. What can I do about this?

A. You can march down to that brokerage office and tell your broker you want to take possession of your bond. Municipal bonds come in "bearer form." with interest coupons attached. After you get the bond, put it in your safe deposit box. Each time an interest payment is due, clip a coupon and cash it at your bank

Are you sure the brokerage firm wasn't crediting the interest payments to your account? I suspect that's what happened and the money just sat there, until you told your broker you wanted it.

Senate Committee Votes To Support Gasohol Regulation Bill

AUSTIN The Senate Natural Resources Committee Wednesday voted to recommend that the full Senate approve a bill by Hearten Sen. Bill Sarpalius that would consolidate regulation of gasohol production in the Texas Department of Agriculture

The committee voted without opposi-tion to recommend approval of Senate Bill 228 by Sarpalius.

The bill would authorize the Agriculture Department to regulate alcohol fuels and require registration alcohol producing equipment designed to manufacture less than one million gallons of

Sarpalius said passage of the bill would mean that farmers and others wishing to set up small-scale gasohol plants would have to deal with only one agency rather than the six state agencies currently involved in regulating alcohol

production. Ray Prewett, assistant agriculture commissioner, said the bill also would help prevent the marketing of equipment hol needed for gasohol.

"If the exemption of alcohol blended fuels from the state motor fuel excise tax passes this session of the Legislature, we will see rapid development of the fuel al-cohol manufacturing industry in Texas," Prewett said.

"The passage of Senate Bill 228 would not require registration of on-farm alco-

Senate Refuses Speed Limit Debate

AUSTIN (AP) - Senators refused Wednesday to reopen the old argument of how fast Texans should drive on open highways.

Sen. John Traeger, D-Seguin, failed by four votes to bring up a measure calling on Congress to repeal the national 55 mph speed limit and let the states set

"We got enough to do without trying to run Congress too," protested Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur.

The speed limit resolution was one of three measures knocked down Wednesday while Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and four prominent senators were in Washington talking with the Texas delegation about

Traeger said he would reintroduce his resolution later if he gets the necessary votes to suspend Senate rules for debate.

"All I want to do is let the state decide what is a safe speed on Texas highways," Traeger argued. "I think we can do a better job than some congressman from Oregon or Maryland."

"This is about as valuable as a party platform," said Parker. "Why do we want to burden Congress with all this

About \$20 billion of the \$32.6-billion increase would be applied to ordering a wide variety of weapons and equipment.

Large in the Reagan plan is a nearly doubling of the Carter administration's austere shipbuilding program, with an additional 15 Navy ships to be financed in 1982 as a start toward fleshing out the

to a goal of 600. That is in line with the administration's new naval strategy designed to counter the powerful Russian Navy in all key waters of the world.

A total of \$4.2 billion is provided for Navy shipbuilding this year and next, including \$658 million as the down payment on a giant new nuclear-powered aircraft carrier which ultimately may cost as much as \$3.5 billion.

The Reagan plan also proposes \$518 million to bring the aircraft carrier Oriskany out of mothballs and send it to sea within three years, plus \$242 million to reactivate the battleship New Jersey and to start work on bringing the battleship Iowa out of retirement.

The Reagan proposals would give the armed services more than 200 new planes and helicopters and would provide the Army with an additional \$1.4 billion worth of advanced M-1 Abrams tanks and armored vehicles to carry soldiers into battle, along with sophisticated air defense weapon systems, tactical missiles and other arms.

About \$11.5 billion would be devoted to overcoming readiness problems by stockpiling spare parts, supplies and ammunition, increasing training, catching up with backlogs in maintenance of present equipment and other measures.

Pentagon Comptroller Jack Borsting told a briefing that the Reagan budget plan would provide about \$2.5 billion this year and the next to advance preparations for the Rapid Deployment Force, designed to speed to remote trouble spots such as the Persian Gulf, as well as expanding general U.S. capability to operate in the Indian Ocean-Southwest Asian area

This added chunk of money, which would include cutting into shortages of airlift and sealift, would nearly double the \$3 billion which the Carter administration had proposed for these purposes in 1981 and 1982

The administration has deemed as a top priority the improvement of what it calls the "quality of life" of U.S. military personnel, and about \$3.5 billion is designated for that purpose, including a \$2.2 billion military pay increase.

Borsting said that a new pay raise of 5.3 percent, to start July 1, would come on top of an 11.7 percent raise put into effect by the Carter administration last October. Borsting said that still another 9 per cent raise recommended by the Carter administration for next Oct. I was factored into the Reagan administration plans and that, over-all, this will mean a 26.1 percent jump in military pay in just a year's time.

Because of a pay level cap kept in place by the Reagan administration, Borsting indicated that senior military officers are unlikely to benefit to any

Weinberger recommended an increase of about 35,900 in military manpower to "enhance readiness directly by increased combat unit manning and indirectly through increased manning and technical ... activities." This would bring the total uniformed force to 2,119,500 by

With the Defense Department exempted from a civilian personnel hiring freeze. Weinberger projected additions totaling 49.600 workers to his department's payroll by the end of fiscal 1982. bringing the total to 1.025,000. He said these increases reflect expanded use of civilians for tasks now handled by military personnel as well as higher depot maintenance levels for equipment and other functions

Weinberger's documents indicated that the \$32.6 billion increase in budget authority is a net figure after taking account of some claimed savings and a lower inflation projection than the Carter administration had used in preparing its

The Pentagon chief promised a comprehensive review of the whole process of developing and buying equipment "in order to realize major savings through efficiencies" in the future.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate Agriculture Committee handed President Reagan his first budget-cutting victory on Wednesday by endorsing his call for eliminating the scheduled April 1 increase in milk price supports.

Eliminating the semi-annual adjustment would save the government an estimated \$147 million this fiscal year. If the increase were implemented, consumers likely would have had to pay 71/2 cents more for a gallon of milk and a dime more for a pound of butter or cheese.

The committee's 14-2 vote sent the proposal to the full Senate for action. The measure has been introduced in the House but no hearings have yet been

After the vote, White House press secretary James S. Brady said the president

Automatic Increase Set

The support price is scheduled to automatically rise to \$13.68 per 100 pounds on April 1 for the class of milk used to make butter, cheese and non-fat dry milk. That would be an increase of 88 cents above the Oct. 1 level

To maintain the support prices, the government buys butter, cheese and powdered milk at rates which allow the processor enough profit to pay the farmer at least the support-level price for the raw product.

Raising the price supports would translate into an increase at the retail level of 71/2 cents for regular milk, about a dime more for a pound of butter and a pound of cheese, and an extra 51/2 cents for a pound of non-fat dry milk, said Indulis Kancitis, chief of the dairy branch of the Agriculture Department.

Although exact prediction of the blown dust isn't perfected. Wigner points to three factors involved in the gritty blasts: lack of mosture, turbulent wind and time of day

of soil moisture makes it easier for the wind to gather up soil particles, he noted. Straight winds, however, aren't able to pick up the soil. Turbulent winds can.

If it hasn't rained in a while, the lack

The third factor, which Wigner says influences the intensity and duration, is the time of day that the blowing dust begins. "Turbulence often comes from afternoon heating," he said, explaining that warm wind is more likely to pick up dust than cold winds.

Meanwhile, if you adhere to the misery-loves-company adage. Wigner notes, We're not the only ones with the problem of blowing dust.

On the other hand, many of the other areas with the problem are relatively desolate. Weeds in an isolated desert plagued with blowing dust don't flee teary-eyed to the local allergist. Humans

And Wigner notes, "We are one of the more populated areas with dust."

PEACE MISSION FAILS

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - An Islamic peace delegation ended a second attempt Wednesday to mediate the fivemonth-old Iran-Iraq war with no sign of compromise by either of the warring, oilrich nations. The delegation, headed by President Ahmed Sekou Toure of Guinea. returned to base at Jidda, Saudi Arabia, on Wednesday after a day of talks with leaders in Tehran and Baghdad and met in private with Crown Prince Fahd, Saudi Radio said. They previously had spent three days in the capitals of the two warring nations.

Ex-Kissinger Aide Receives New Job

WASHINGTON (AP) - Despite opposition by some conservatives. President Reagan said Wednesday he will nominate Lawrence S. Eagleburger, a former close aide to Henry Kissinger, to be assistant secretary of state for European Affairs.

Eagleburger, 50, has held several previous State Department positions, including deputy undersecretary for manage ment from 1975 to 1977 and executive assistant to the secretary from 1973 to 1975.

Reagan's national security adviser, Richard V. Allen, reportedly has campaigned actively against Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig's selection of Eagleburger.

Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., also is known to have expressed strong opposition to the nomination because he sees Eagleburger as one of several non-ideological foreign policy experts who are identified with the detente policies pursued by the Nixon and Ford administra-

Helms was known to believe that Haig betrayed a promise not to surround himself with Kissinger aides and to select conservatives for key policy spots.

However, Haig decided he wanted Eagleburger last December, and Eagleburger has been at work at the State Department. Recently, he traveled to Europe to explain to Allies the documentation of the alleged Soviet bloc interference in El Salvador

The official announcement of Eagleburger's selection was delayed while the administration sought the approval of Helms and other conservatives. The nomination will be sent to the Senate for

There was no immediate comment

ATHENS, Greece (AP) - The third strong earthquake in less than two weeks shook most of Greece just before midnight Wednesday, claiming at least one life and slightly injuring 30 people, according to first reports.

Residents of the capital, still fearful after the last big quakes and a pair of more moderate tremors Tuesday, rushed through the streets to public squares and other open spaces, many of the women carrying babies Police said many houses in rural areas

that were weakened by the previous temblors collapsed in Wednesday's quake They said a 52-year-old Athenian died of a heart attack, apparently because of fears caused by the tremor. The state-controlled radio and televi-

sion networks remained open beyond their normal closing times to update reports from around the country. They said the quake was felt in Athens, in central Greece and as far north as Salonica. Greek authorities said it measured 6.2

on the open-end Richter scale and was centered in the same area - about 44 miles west of Athens in the Gulf of Corinth - as the Feb. 24-25 quakes that killed 18 people, injured dozens and caused widespread damage.

The earlier quakes registered 6.6 and 6.3 on the Richter scale. Two more moderate tremors shook the area Tuesday.

The Richter scale is a measure of ground motion as recorded on seismographs. Every increase of one number means a tenfold increase in magnitude. Thus a reading of 7.5 reflects an earthquake 10 times stronger than one of 6.5.

An earthquake of 3.5 on the Richter scale can cause slight damage in the local area, 4 moderate damage, 5 considerable damage, 6 severe damage. A 7 reading is a "major" earthquake, capable of widespread heavy damage; 8 is a "great" quake, capable of tremendous damage.

The San Francisco earthquake of 1906, which occurred before the Richter scale was devised, has been estimated at 8.3 on the Richter scale.

KILLER CONVICTED

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) - Avowed racist Joseph Paul Franklin was convicted Wednesday on federal charges he violated the civil rights of two young black men by shooting them to death as they jogged with two white girls. The 10-woman, two-man jury had deliberated a total of 131/2 hours before reaching its decision. Franklin, 30, of Mobile, Ala., was charged with violating the civil rights of David Martin, 20, and Ted Fields, 18, by shooting them to death Aug. 20 as they left a city park where they had been jogging with two white girls.

Evolution Suit Settlement Efforts Fail

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Efforts to settle a suit over the teaching of evolution in California schools collapsed Wednesday, and the plaintiffs focused on an eighth-grade science text which they said unfairly presents evolution as fact, not

The Creation-Science Research Center, which espouses the biblical account of creation as scientific truth, says it doesn't object to the teaching of evolution as a theory, only to its presentation as fact.

The center contends that the way evolution is taught in California violates religious rights, although it has withdrawn its request for equal treatment of the bibli-

The state denies evolution is taught dogmatically, but Kelly Segraves, the Creation-Science group's director, said his son had to learn a chart that outlined the ages of geologic time as if they really happened.

The state maintains it has the right to decide if students should be taught a theory to which it says virtually all scientists subscribe.

A settlement seemed near Tuesday but an hour-long meeting Wednesday morn-

The textbook under study was "Principles of Science," which Segraves' 13-year-old son Kasey cited Tuesday as one used to teach evolution in his school. The youth said he still believes the biblical version

His father was quizzed Wednesday by Deputy Attorney General Robert Tyler about specific objections to the book.

The elder Segraves singled out a chart listing successive geologic time periods over the last 4.5 billion years, and placing the development of different life forms

"This chart is painted as the earth's history," Segraves said. He said his son must "learn all these periods as if they took place" - contradicting his religious belief in the literal truth of the Book of Genesis.

But Tyler noted various qualifying statements in the same section, including one at the start saying "most scientists believe" that the earth has existed for millions of years. A paragraph after the chart indicated it showed how geologists divided up time periods.

Segraves said that language wouldn't soften the impact of the chart on a child "It's presented to him as Earth history, not as possibilities," he said. "... What is presented is clearly in opposition to our Christian faith."

Mozambique Expels Four

U.S. Embassy Officials

The State Department did not say whether any of the expelled diplomats were CIA agents, but claimed several Americans who publish an anti-CIA pub-lication called Covert Action recently had visited Mozambique. It mentioned Louis Wolf, who previously has exposed the identities of American diplomats abroad he claimed were CIA operatives, as one

ANOP quoted a dispatch from Mozambique's news service AIM as saying the Marxist government gave the expuision order to the U.S. charge d'affairs in Maputo, capital of the former Portuguese colony. Diplomatic observers called the expulsions an unexpected setback to what had been seen as steadily improving relations between the United States and Mozambique.



Bank President Resigns In Gold Scam

AMARILLO (AP) — A counterfeiting operation involving fake gold Krugerrands led Wednesday to the resignation of an Amarillo bank president and could be linked to a quadruple killing in Houston 600 miles away.

Gold-plated lead coins with a counterfeit value of almost \$1.5 million have been confiscated in Amarillo, and about \$70,000 worth of the coins have turned up in Houston, Secret Service Agent David Freriks said Wednesday. His jurisdiction includes Amarillo.

Lending institutions in each of the two cities have been fooled by the coins, and agents say they also know of sales in Austin.

Some fake coins have turned up in the Dallas-Fort Worth area but may not have been from the Amarillo batch, Freriks said Wednesday. He said about 300 coins remain unaccounted for.

Federal authorities were tipped last fall by a suspicious jewelry manufacturer in Austin, who said he thought he was stamping out the lead coins as costume

Charlie Baylor of the Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms Bureau in Lubbock said Houston police are investigating the possibility the fake coins may have involved in the slayings of four persons. He said police believe the fake coins may have been used to buy drugs and could provide

a possible motive

Agents say the coins were shipped to Amarillo, where they were plated with .22-carat liquid gold, then put in cardboard and plastic coin protectors to prevent the gold from rubbing off. Freriks said those who were duped

Freriks said those who were duped should have known that Krugerrands do not come in protectors.

The fake South African coins are being sold for \$200 to \$350 each, agents say. The value of the genuine one-ounce, all gold coins fluctuates with the price of gold, but they now sell for about \$588 aniece



Ex-State Official Urges Action Against Increased Spending

Texas taxpayers must make their voices heard in Austin or face the prospect of a \$6 billion increase in state spending during the next two years, former attorney general Waggoner Carr warned in Lubbock Wednesday.

Carr, who heads up the statewide tax relief organization

known as Texas 13, visited the city for a noon speech to the Lubbock Rotary Club.

At a news conference prior to his talk, Carr claimed that current activities in the Texas Legislature could produce "a very dismal tax future" for Texans unless taxpayers do something about it

Carr noted that the state budget, which totals \$22 billion,

grew 158 percent in the past 10 years. During the same period, he said, the state experienced only a 26 percent increase in pop-

In addition, Carr said, the legislature has increased its own operating costs by 156 percent in the past decade.

The Senate increased the cost of running its own committees by 40 percent recently, Carr said. "Translated into dollars, that's \$800,000 of the taxpayers' money," he added.

Other bad signs in this legislative session, according to Carr, include a proposal to increase legislators' salaries and indications that the legislature plans to spend all of the estimated \$1 billion in surplus tax money.

Carr said that those who think that legislators have received the word from their constituents that reasonable limits are

needed in government are very wrong.

Texas 13 has two main objectives in the current legislative ession, Carr noted. The first of those, he said, is to seek a return to taxpayers of the \$1 billion surplus.

During the past two years, taxpayers have been overtaxed and legislators have stockpiled that money, Carr said. He said the money should be returned to taxpayers in the form of tax

The second objective, Carr said, is to obtain the rights of initiative and referendum for Texas voters. If Texans have that right they can vote tax relief for themselves, he said.

Carr expressed confidence that an I and R measure soon will be voted out of a House committee for debate. Although the measure is opposed by House Speaker Bill Clayton, Carr

said proponents are close to having enough votes to obtain its passage in the House.

"In the Senate, we face a much harder fight," Carr said. He indicated that the majority of senators do not want I and R. Carr appealed to taxpayers to write their legislators express-ing their support for the I and R measure. Public support of the

issue is the only way the legislature will be convinced, he said. According to Carr, a majority of legislators from the West Texas area are opposed to taxpayers having the I and R right.

At least 70 percent of the people in Texas want the right of initiative and referendum, Carr said. They must demand their representatives support the measure, or they will face "a mas-

permitted use in a manufacturing (M-1) district.

Rush had told the commission that the recreational park he intended to build at a location west of Loop 289 and south of 50th Street would contain a water slide and a go-kart track. Although a go-kart track has a permitted use in an M-2 district - more restrictive than M-1 - there was no designated district for

The property is presently zoned for an industrial park. Northcutt said the committee report

also would recommend that the commission not allow manufacturing districts to be established along major thouroughfares leading into the city.

The commission will also hear a request from local attorney Don R. Kidd, who is representing a pawn shop owner, to change the permitted use of pawn shops from a more restrictive "commercial" district to a less restrictive "local retail" district.

Presently, pawn shops can only operate in districts designated C-4 along with automobile servicing shops, restaurants, bars and game rooms. Kidd will request the use be permitted in C-2 districts, along with pet shops, laundromats and hardware stores.

Northcutt recommends the zoning requirements remain unchanged in a memo written to the commission.

Nothing has changed since the ordinance was written and, although some pawn shops may fit well into the less restrictive district, it would be hard to separate the two types of businesses.

"Because of the problems involved with the resale, storage and display of used merchandise, I feel it would be a mistake to have pawn shops in a less restricted zone," said Northcutt.

Among zoning request changes to be considered by the commission is one for a local retail district on 66th Street near Frankford Avenue. Bill Cox, representing Craft, Elliott

and Fields Developers, will present the commission with a plan to change a residential zone (single family units) to one for two family units, apartments and the local retail district.

Although Northcutt said he saw no problems with residence changes, he added that the area for proposed development may already have too much commercial property zoned for the commission to approve the last request.

In other business, the commission will consider requests to:

- Designate homes facing 19th Street from Gary to Boston avenues as a designed historical district.

- Change single family property to two family property at 84th Street and Slide Road

Anthropologist To Speak At Tech

One of the first anthropologists to work in a Latin American urban setting and a 30-year veteran in the study of Latin American cultures will lecture Tuesday at Texas Tech University.

Dr. Andrew H. Whiteford is also a specialist in North American Indian art and research curator for Indian art at the School of American Research in Santa Fe. N.M.

The address will be the fifth annual lecture in the Faye LaVerne Bumpass Lecture series, honoring Faye LaVerne Bumpass, who taught in the Department of Classical and Romance Languages from 1959 to 1978. Free to the public, the lecture will be at 8 p.m. in Room 104, Holden Hall.

Whiteford's topic will be "Life in Andean City: Popayan." His knowledge of Popayan, Colombia, comes from his 25year acquaintance with that city, which lies in the Andes mountain range and has been called one of the most beautiful ci-

ties of the Americas. Whiteford is best known for his comparative study of Popayan and Queretaro. Mexico. "Two Cities in Latin America: A Comparative Description of Social Classes," published in 1960.

He also did a descriptive study, "Popayan, an Andean City at Mid-Century: A Traditional Urban Society," in

Whiteford began his urban research in Latin America in the 1950s because of the almost complete absence of data on the urban aspects of this area which had been intensively studied for its aboriginal and folk cultures. He chose Popayan because its Latin

U.S. Experiences Severe Outbreak Of Influenza A

WASHINGTON (Special) - The U.S. is experiencing a particularly severe outbreak of influenza A this winter. According to the Center for Disease Control, this is still the beginning of the flu season in most parts of the country. So you need to be wary of flu through March.

Influenza A is caused by a virus which can be spread through the air. Just chatting with an infected person may be enough contact to make you a potential victim. The diease is commonly spread in areas where people congregate together. so sudden outbreaks with major absenteeism in an office, factory or school are not unusual. Once flu hits your area, it can spread like wild fire. During past major outbreaks in this country, as much as 25 percent of the population has fallen prev to the disease.

FIGNEWTONS

5 tbsp. unsalted butter, at room temperature

2 tbsp. sour cream 2/3 cup (packed) dark brown sugar, sifted through a coarse sieve 2 eggs, at room temperature

1 tsp. vanilla extract 2 cups all-purpose flour 2 tsp. baking powder 1/2 tsp. baking soda

1/4 tsp. ground cinnamon 1/2 tsp. salt

2 cups dried figs, preferably moistpack black figs

1-3/4 cups water 1/3 cup sugar 2 tsp. grated lemon rind 1/4 tsp. salt

(1) In a small bowl, beat the butter nd sour cream until light. Gradually add the brown sugar, beating until the mix-ture is very light and thick. Incorporate the eggs one at a time; beat in vanilla.

(2) Sift together the flour, baking powder, soda, cinnamon and salt. Add to creamed mixture, beating on low speed or by hand. Mix well and turn out on a sheet of floured plastic; wrap, then refrigerate for at least 2 hours.

(3) Cut the heavy stems off the figs. Combine the figs and water in a heavy saucepan and simmer, covered, for 30 minutes or until the fruit is soft. Add sugar. lemon rind and salt and simmer, covered, for 15 minutes longer. Press the mixture through the coarse disc of a food mill, then coo

(4) Preheat the oven to 350 degrees Cover with parchment or lightly grease a large baking sheet.

(5) Divide the chilled dough into thirds and refrigerate two parts. Roll the remaining piece on a well-floured board to form a rectangle about 5 x 11 inches.

(6) Spread 1/3 of the fig filling slightto one side of center, along the length of the dough, covering an area roughly 2 inches wide and 10 inches long and leaving a 1/2-inch pastry margin on the three sides of the filling away from the center. Mound the filling slightly in the center along its whole length; then moisten the

Very gently, lift the uncovered pastry with a spatula and fold it over the filling. Press the upper pastry against the lower to seal it. Trim the edges and shape the roll into a neat, half-cylinder form about 11 inches long and 2 to 2-1/2 inches wide. Place on the prepared baking

(7) Repeat the filling operation with the remaining 2/3 of the dough and filling: then bake the three rolls for 25 min-

utes or until they are slightly browned. (8) Cool the rolls somewhat on a rack; then trim off the ends and, with a sharp serrated knife, cut each one into slices about 1-1/2 inches wide. Replace the slices on the rack. When the fig rolls are completely cool, store them in an airtight

CREME DE MENTHE CAKE (Submitted by Pat Snider, Snyder)

1 box white cake mix Follow directions on box, substituting

1/2 cup creme de menthe for part of liq uid. Bake in two round layers and cool, very cool

6-7 cups flour Dissolve yeast in lukewarm water; set aside. Combine cereal, sugar, shortening, salt and bofling water in a large bowl; stir until shortening melts. Cool to lukewarm. Add beaten eggs and yeast mixture. Add flour, mixing thoroughly.

Cover and refrigerate overnight or several days until needed. Turn dough out onto a floured surface and let set about 15 minutes. Knead about five times. Roll to 1/2-inch thickness cut with a 2-inch cutter. Dip rolls in melted butter; fold in half. Place rolls in a wellgreased pan.





Low Blood Sugar Count Signals Problem

By PAUL DONOHUE, M.D. Dear Dr. Donohue: Is there a special diet I should follow? My blood sugar is

Are you positive your blood sugar is that low? That is very, very low! The normal range is 75 to 105.

When blood sugar is low, that is hypoglycemia. A variety of symptoms ensue, including hunger, sweating, anxiety, nausea, confusion. Everyone feels such symptoms at one time or another, and in some popular reports hypoglycemia is said to afflict as much as one-quarter to one-half the population. That is a great exaggeration. For practical purposes, the true incidence is only about one in a thousand people.

After a meal, blood sugar normally rises as it is absorbed. This tells the body to release its store of insulin, which tells the liver to remove sugar from the blood and store it for future use. In hypoglycemia, a person releases too much insulin after a meal, so his liver takes too much sugar from the blood

A remedy is to eat small meals high in protein, as many as six small meals daily. After a protein meal, blood sugar does not rise to the levels it does after a normal meal, so that less insulin is released and the liver does not remove so much sugar for storage.

There is another, uncommon cause of hypoglycemia. A tumor of the pancreas can produce insulin the way the pancreas itself does, causing a continuous production of it. The blood sugar level may drop quite low. This is the opposite of diabe-

For you, because of that very low blood sugar, you do have something definitely wrong. Whether it is hypoglycemia that would respond to the six-a-day highprotein feedings, or that due to pancreas turnor, I cannot safely say. Dear Dr. Donohue: Will you please discuss dropped foot? What causes it and what is the remedy for it? - M.A.F.

Muscles on the front and outside part of the shin lift the foot upward. Flex your foot upward and you can feel these muscles working. When they do not work, the foot drops. That is foot drop. You know that in order for muscles to work, nerves must plug into them, just as an electrical appliance has to have wires

plugged into its outlet.

With dropped foot, the nerve that is supposed to "plug" into these muscles is easily injured because it is very close to the skin. Simply crossing the legs over the opposite knee can injure the nerve. So can prolonged kneeling. The nerve may be affected in certain illnesses, like diabetes. If the injury is not severe function of the muscle will return. If the damage is permanent special braces to keep the foot from hanging limply may have to be used.

Dear Dr. Donohue: I am bothered with dry, cracking, and peeling lips. This does not just happen in winter, but all year long. I look awful and have problems applying lipstick. Can this be an allergy? I have no other explanation for it. Do you? - Mrs. O.O.

Yes, this does sound like an allergic reaction.



Block Boosts Free Enterprise System For Farms

By Reuters
ORLANDO, Fla. (Reuters) — Secretary of Agriculture John Block said he, as well as President Reagan, believes that free enterprise in the farming sector and a marketplace that sets its own price levels will bolster a stronger national econo-

Block, speaking at the annual conven-tion of the National Farmers Union here this week, said the forum for assessing budget cuts on agriculture will be the hearings, which began this week, on a new farm bill

He repeated his opposition to the target price concept for farmers, saying: 'Target prices are a direct outlay from the federal treasury, and I can neither

justify nor defend them publicly."

The secretary said he will support a "modest" increase in the wheat and feed grain price support loan rates. He said the administration believes the farmerowned grain reserve program well serves both farmers and consumers but added that some simplification of the program

Block said all aspects of the reserve program are under review, including a reserve entry price or special loan rate that would encourage farmers to place grain in the reserve.

"We're also looking at the trigger prices and how they should be adjusted

over time to give the market ample room to function," Block said.

He said he could not give specifics of proposed changes in commodity programs, as the programs still are under re-

Block said programs that expand commercial exports will receive relatively favorable treatment in the budget reiew but he gave no specific details.

With increasing farm exports, greater world demand, and a stronger national economy, U. S. farmers will need to expand production, he said.

Research, which costs money, will be needed to expand productivity but a reasonable investment in research dollars will pay off in increased output, greater domestic supplies and increased international sales, he said.

There should be a national policy for

protecting prime farm lands but state and local governments should take the lead, with technical support from federal agencies, Block said.

Block told a press conference at the convention he is "very pleased" by re-cent indications from the Soviet Union it would like to expand trading with the United States, including the resumption of grain purchases.

Asked about the partial grain embargo against the Soviets, Block said, "We hope their enthusiasm for trade might cause them to demonstrate some good deeds to enable this administration to consider lifting the embargo." Block said the signals coming from

Moscow were "an encouraging sign." Both Block and Rep. Kika de la Gar-

za, D-Tex., chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, said they see few

changes in the current farm bill when new legislation is negotiated this year. De la Garza told a press conference after addressing the convention that he foresees only minor adjustments but would like to get a four-year bill. He said he would like the legislation to include an accurate cost of production figure.

Asked about the farm bill at the same press conference, Block noted the remarks of de la Garza and said, "I concur." But Block said he would like to see call prices at a higher level to keep grain in the reserve and not put a lid on the

Unless the government raises commodity loan levels, more than 1 billion bushels of corn in the grain reserve will come out by mid-April or May, NFU president George Stone told the conven-

Calling for higher Commodity Credit Corp. loan levels to make the farmer-held grain reserve function effectively, Stone said, "We are right now in the ridiculous position where grain will be coming out of the reserve when it ought

Citing the tight world feed grain situa-tion, Stone added that "we ought to be adding to the reserve rather than reducing it because of the possible short situa-

If trigger levels are not raised, he warned, "the alternative is to let the billion bushels of corn come back on the market, weaken market prices severely, and then create a situation where prices go into the stratosphere next fall."

TWO SEPARATE ACTIONS THAT WOULD increase agricultural commodity loan rates to offset the impact of the partial embargo on sales to the Soviet Union have been recommended by Reps. Glenn English, D-Okla., and Dan

English has introduced a bill which would mandate higher loan rates if an embargo were enacted for foreign policy reasons or due to short supply in the United States, effective. Oct. 1.

Glickman, in a letter to be sent to Secretary of Agriculture John Block, urged the secretary to use his authority to raise loan rates immediately. He recommended wheat be raised to \$4 from \$3, corn to \$3 from \$2.25, and soybeans to \$6.69 from \$5.02.

The increases would not add to tax burdens or interfere with the drive to reduce the federal budget, Glickman said, since the money lent would be paid back with interest

Block has said there should be some adjustment in loan rates or price supports because of inflation but also has said loan rates should not be set so high as to interfere with orderly marketing.

THE ENGLISH BILL WOULD REQUIRE LOAN levels to be set at 90 percent of parity if an embargo is enacted due to short domestic supply. The parity price would be determined on the date the export suspension was initiated.

If an embargo were enacted for foreign policy reasons, the loan rate would be set at a level not less than the average market price for the commodity during the 15 marketing days prior to the suspension.

Current farm legislation calls for an immediate increase in loan rates to 90

percent of parity in the event of a short-supply embargo but does not address loan rate changes for embargoes implemented for national security reasons. Since the English bill would create new authority, it cannot be effective im-

mediately, an aide to the Oklahoma congressman pointed out. If the embargo still were in effect on the proposed effective date of Oct. 1, wheat loan rates would rise to \$3.90 a bushel and corn to \$2.39 a bushel. Interest

and storage costs normally associated with the loans would be waived. The English bill has 12 co-sponsors.

MEANWHILE, A BILL DESIGNED TO GIVE estate tax relief to family farms by basing estate taxes on farm income rather than on the current farm

market value was introduced this week by Sen. Rudy Boschwitz, R-Minn. The bill stipulates the tax relief would apply to farms which are cash-rented to family members. The Internal Revenue Service now says farms which are crop-share-rented to family members are eligible for the farm income valuation but cash-rented farms are not. Boschwitz said.

"The IRS has narrowly interpreted the farm use valuation provision of its code passed by Congress in 1976," the senator said. "My bill will ensure that these family farms are not lost forever."

Boschwitz introduced a similar measure last December as an amendment to an omnibus spending bill. It passed both houses but was dropped at the end of the 96th Congress because of a dispute over congressional pay raises.

SEVERAL SENATORS SAID AT THE OPENING session of Senate Agriculture Committee hearings on the 1981 farm bill this week that returning productivity to agriculture and maintaining the family farm in a market-oriented atmosphere should be the key goals of new basic farm legislation.

"Government must allow the marketplace to serve as the biggest influence over prices," said Sen. Charles Grassley, R-lowa, a former member of the House Agriculture Committee.

Senate committee chairman Jesse Helms, R-N. C., also called for legislation emphasizing the private sector. He told the committee that all goals of the 1981 bill should be "considered within the mandatory confines of fiscal responsibili-

The importance of fiscal restraint is paramount," the chairman add Grassley and Sen. Edward Zorinsky, D-Neb., both called for restraint in government regulation, especially in dealing with estate tax laws. They said costly inheritance taxes continue to make it difficult to carry on the family farm tradi-

A REVERSAL OF THE APPROACH of "over-zealous bureaucrats" who do not take cost-benefit aspects into sufficient consideration in the regulatory field also was urged by Grassley

urged lawmakers to act quickly on cutting federal spending, reducing tax rates and easing the costly regulatory burden on agriculture and business. The NCA said it believes its interests must be set aside to meet the bigger

goal of revitalizing the economy. We are one special interest group that believes the so-called special interests of individual segments of our society and economy must be set aside," said Bill Swan, NCA president.

THE SUPERMARKET SHOPPER

DEAR SUPERMARKET SHOPPER - I am a clerk for one of the large suermarket chains. I do the ordering of dairy and perishable foods.

Each week I ready your column right after checking the ads for my store. I

think you are doing a great job.

But you may be giving readers the impression that the occasional unavilability of advertised specials is some kind of supermarket-industry conspiracy. I would like to emphasize that just the opposite is true. Management is constantly reminding me to order heavily on advertised specials.

Before a recent full-page ad appeared in the newspaper, the district manager visited the store and personally encouraged each department head to order heavily to ensure that we would not run out of anything.

I think that your readers should know that we are constantly audited by people in our company who check the availability and price accuracy of advertised

In addition, I benefit from ordering a sufficient supply of advertised specials because my department is credited for the full retail price of these items. That make me look good on the monthly sales reports.

I realize that customers often make special trips to pick up advertised specials. I do my best to see that they get them. But shortages do occur - usually as a result of human error. This happened to me the day before Christmas. My department ran out of

eggnog, which had been advertised in the holiday section. I hope that you will print my letter so that smart shoppers will know that we are doing everything we can to help them fight inflation. - Paul C. from Dal-

DEAR PAUL - You and your supermarket chain appear to be doing a good job of seeing that shoppers have an opportunity to purchase your advertised

specials. Having a sufficient supply of these specials builds good customer relations. Thus, it's good business. Most supermarket chains and independent grocers re-

alize this and act accordingly. As your letter indicates, the occasional unavailability of an advertised special is not evidence of any intent to deceive shoppers. In most cases, it just shows that someone erred in estimating the amount to be ordered.

Unfortunately, a few store operators show little concern for stocking a sufficient supply of advertised specials. As a result, specials are often unavailable and shoppers are often inconvenienced.

These are the operators who I am trying to awaken to their ethical as well as legal responsibilities.

Lubbock Educators Studying Discipline System

By LISA PAIKOWSKI Avalanche-Journal Staff

San Francisco area teacher Harriett Burt claims her common-sense, assertive approach to classroom discipline literally saved her own school, threatened last year by a massive budget deficit and de-

She shared her strategy Tuesday with

a packed crowd of 400 Lubbock area educators hungry for a solution to a problem that consistently ranks as one of the most

pressing in schools today.

With the enthusiasm and command of a revival preacher, Miss Burt combined empathy, humor, logic and role-playing to describe "assertive discipline" to the teachers during a six-hour workshop at

Evans Junior High.

The educators, who paid \$28 each for the workshop and materials, appeared to have no trouble identifying with the discipline obstacles the workshop leader illustrated

Miss Burt, whose program was sponsored by the Texas Elementary Principals and Supervisors Association, travels

During an interview Tuesday, she said that the implementation of the discipline

method changed the attitudes of parents, teachers and students at the San Francisco Bay area junior high where she is on leave from her duties as vice principal. Despite low enrollment and a budget in the red, she said, the school board elected to keep the school open because of the attitude change and concern of those af-

sociates, a Los Angeles educational con-

Indeed, Lubbock schools Superintendent Ed Irons said he has read a number of articles praising the strategy.

Miss Burt explained that the discipline method combines a series of "competencies" - rules, negative consequences and positive reinforcement. The strategy is predicated on the assertion, she said, that, "No child will stop me from teaching for any reason and no child will stop another child from learning for any reason.

The 18-year veteran of education said she is presenting a "take-charge" approach to classroom management that combines the most effective techniques actually observed in classrooms packaged in a "systematic" way.

The method calls first, Miss Burt said. for teachers to "know what it is they want kids to do. And that means rules. She acknowledged that many educators do set forth rules, "but a lot of their rules are not clear; they're not announced in advance

The regulations should even be posted in the classroom, she said.

Next, Miss Burt continued, "teachers must know how to systematically set limits: they have to set up negative consequences." She said the severity of the consequences does not matter "if you do it consistently. Consistency is the key.

She said that she helps teachers set up "an efficient hierarchy of consequences" that will follow problem behavior, but added that the consequences must be strategies teachers feel comfortable us-

She cited examples of consequences at the workshop, urging teachers to set up a plan for students who do not respond to the negative consequences. For instance, she suggested formation of a "who squad," a group of "burly" staff members who will respond to a summons for help simply by asking "Who?" and escort the recalcitrant student to the

Students, according to Miss Burt, make the choice that will determine how teachers will deal with them. Bad behavior is the fault of the youngster, not the teacher, she told the assembled educa-

She said that the final strategy educa-

tors must learn is to "systematically reinforce positive behaviors. You're going to have to catch them (students) doing something right and let them know." She stressed the teamwork approach

to discipline, with teachers, principals and parents working together "for the She said the principals and other ad-

ministrators must be effective "backups." But she said no administrator can be expected to support a hostile teacher or "the long-suffering martyr."

She described three different types of teachers. Other than the assertive educator, there is the non-assertive teacher she said, who plays "classroom roulette with the kids." That educator, she said,

threatens but never follows through There also are hostile teachers. Miss Burt said, who are physically or verbally hostile. "They subjugate kids; they back them into a corner. That's ruling by reign of terror. We do not need hostile teach-

ers. They're not good for kids." She said that teachers these days have been forced to pick up discipline techniques "along the way." Colleges do not offer courses in discipline, she said. "Yet discipline is the number one problem in the schools today. People everywhere are concerned and teachers everywhere respond" to workshops like her own,

Parents also should be sent "an acknowledgment" to sign and send back to teachers after learning of the plan, she said.

"Parents love it (assertive proach)," Miss Burt said, adding that students also respond to it. "Kids want and need limits.

search has opened up a whole new career for Mrs. Edwards and another adoptee, The two San Angelo residents have opened a new agency known as Searches Unlimited, specializing in searches for

natural parents, siblings or other relatives of adopted children. According to Mrs. Edwards, the agen was licensed by the State Board of Private Investigators last December and the partners have been busy advertising their new business across West Texas

since that time.

"We've had a tremendous response," Mrs. Edwards said, noting that the agency already has assisted three adopted persons to locate their natural families.

Mrs. Edwards said her biggest success came in 1977, when a San Antonio woman requested a search for her natural mother. "She didn't even have a name (for her mother)," Mrs. Edwards

Scientists Explain 'Wake-Up' Effect In Coffee

a natural tranquilizer in the brain, say scientists whose research has for first time explained the stimulant action of

Caffeine, the wake-up drug in coffee, tea, chocolate and many colas, is "the most widely used psychoactive substance on earth," said Dr. Solomon H. Snyder, director of neuroscience at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine and leader of the research.

It's also a common ingredient in overthe-counter medicines ranging from stay-awake pills to cold remedies to pain kill-

"While we're fussing around looking for new drugs, we're still trying to under-stand how old drugs work," Snyder, a leading researcher in brain chemistry, told a seminar of the Society for Neuros-

cience on Tuesday. In addition, he said, the discovery

Snyder said the research, by himself. Jefferson Katims, Robert Bruns, Zoltan Annau and John Daly, will be published in May in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

Snyder became interested in caffeine because it was known to inhibit a compound called adenosine which his lab was already studying.

For two decades, scientists had theorized that caffeine worked by inhibiting the enzyme phosphodiesterase which is


needed for energy production in cells. But Snyder said he doubted that since there are other drugs which inhibit the enzyme and which are not stimulants.

The Johns Hopkins researchers had discovered that adenosine seemed to work in the brain as a "neuro-

modulator" which inhibited activity. A few micrograms of the substance could bring the activity of mice to a virtual halt, he said.

The player, Gary Bouck, told the court Wednesday both that he did see the alleged blow and that, during a conversation with Kush nearly a year later, he had denied having witnessing it because he 'feared repercussions" and "didn't want to call him a liar to his face."

Bouck also said he filed a statement in September 1979 saying he didn't see the alleged Kush-Rutledge altercation "because at the time, I didn't think it was any big deal. I didn't take it serious-
