Jane M. Byrne said Sunday she plans to move from her ritzy Gold Coast apartment into a crime-infested tenement where 11 people have been killed in the last two months and live there "for as long as it takes to clean it up."

"I refuse to give up another generation to gangs," Mrs. Byrne, criticized for failing to carry out her 1979 campaign promise to reporters at her present home, 10 blocks from the Cabrini-Green housing project where she plans to

The project's 23 high-rise buildings and 55 row houses, are home to about 14,000 residents - virtually all of them black and poor. It has been the site of open turf warfare between gangs in the last two months.

The mayor, who will be joined at Cabrini by her husband and political adviser, Jay McMullen, said they will stay "for as long as it takes to clean it up, and to prove to the community there ... they are going to live without fear (and) raise their children without intimi-

"I'm not afraid over there at all and I think what you have to prove is that you don't have to be

afraid," said Mrs. Bryne, who will receive extensive police protec-

"If people want to say it's vote getting or anything like that I would suggest that whoever says it take the next apartment."

Mrs. Byrne, talking to reporters in her elegant apartment overlooking the Loop, Lake Michigan and Cabrini-Green, said she will begin looking for her new apartment

Tuesday. She said she and McMullen, however, will not give up their present dwelling.

Poland's Leaders **Attack Solidarity**

Nation 'Facing Serious Threat'

WARSAW, Poland (AP) - The Communist Party's ruling Politburo on Sunday lashed out at what it called political activities of the independent union Solidarity and said they were "creating a state of anarchy." It warned that Poland is "facing a serious threat."

Shortly after the Politburo statement was carried by the official Polish news agency PAP, the Warsaw Solidarity branch announced that it had canceled a two-hour warning strike threatened for Monday. The strike had been planned to protest the beatings by police, last week, of Solidarity members in the industrial city of Bydgoszcz, 170 miles northwest of here. Three of the unionists were hospitalized for treatment of their injuries.

Monday Meeting The national Solidarity union issued a communique, late Sunday night, saying its leaders would meet Monday in Bydgoszcz and calling on all chapters to re-frain from strike actions until it decided on what steps to take.

Warsaw radio reported that Premier Wojciech Jaruzelski met Sunday in Sile-sia, south-central Poland, with Warsaw Pact commanders who are leading Soviet-bloc military exercises in and around Poland. The radio said Jaruzelski, who is also a general and the defense minister, conferred with fellow defense ministers Martin Dzur of Czechoslovakia and Heinz Hoffmann of East Germany.

In Moscow, a commentary carried by the English-language service of Radio Moscow renewed the Soviet charge that the independent trade union is trying to cast itself in the role of a political opposition to Poland's communist regime.

The United States and its allies have warned the Soviet Union not to use the labor unrest in Poland as a pretext for military intervention. Reports, earlier that the Warray would be holding exercises in Poland and neighboring countries prompted expressions of concern in Washington. But the U.S. officials noted that the current exer-

cises are normal for this time of year. The Warsaw branch, Solidarity's larg-

est, said it would remain on strike alert and act according to the decisions of the national union leaders. A two-hour warning strike in Warsaw would have dealt another blow to the 90-day labor truce sought by Premier Jaruzelski following his appointment in February.

National leaders of Solidarity had re-

sponded to the beating incident in Byd-goszcz, a city of 350,000, with a national strike alert, declared Friday for its esti-mated 10 million members. The incident was the first major violent clash between police and the independent union since it was formed during last summer's natio-

The Politburo statement came talks in Warsaw between union and government leaders over last Thurs beatings ended inconclusively, and the union called its leaders for Monday's

KKK To Ask Probe Of Violence mittee Against Racism converged on city

MERIDEN, Conn. (AP) - The Ku Klux Klan will seek a federal investigation of the weekend violence that erupted at a Klan rally and left at least 25 people injured, a national KKK leader said, Sunday

Bill Wilkinson, Imperial Wizard of the Invisibile Empire, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, also said the Klan would sue the International Committee Against Racism and the Communist Workers Party in connection with Saturday's bloody

The rally in support of police in this blue-collar city turned violent as anti-Klan protesters hurled rocks and bottles at white-robed demonstrators, pursued the Klansmen as they fled, and then turned on police.

Wilkinson, of Denham Springs, La., blamed the melee on "cowardly communists hiding behind innocent bystand-

As Wilkinson made his statement, 80 policemen from six communities surrounded Wilkinson, eight-robed Klansmen and Connecticut Klan leader Bill Bohndorf. The Klansmen staged the news conference at the busy intersection of East Main and Broad streets in the

heart of this central Connecticut city. At least 19 policemen were hurt. Saturday, as they tried to protect Klansmen fleeing toward their cars from the rally at

An unknown number of counter-demonstrators were injured, and six Klan members, pelted with debris by rockand-bottle throwing crowds, were treat-

One Klanswoman was in guarded condition, Sunday morning, at Yale-New Haven Hospital. A hospital spokesman said she had undergone surgery after being hit on the head by an unidentified object.

The Klan rally began, shortly after noon, with some 20 robed and hooded Klansmen marching down Meriden's main street to city hall in support of local police, according to Wilkinson, Police have been criticized for not suspending a white patrolman who shot and killed a black shoplifting suspect while the patrolman was off-duty.

But the rally was cut short when demonstrators from the International Comhall and scuffles broke out. The Klansmen retreated inside the

Import Restrictions May Hike Price Of All Cars

WASHINGTON (AP) - If Japan cuts auto exports to the United States, Americans likely will pay hundreds of dollars more for their Datsuns or Toyotas, and perhaps Pontiacs and Fords as well, some economists and auto dealers say.

"Unquestionably people will be paying more money not only for Japanese cars but for all cars," says Robert M. McElwaine, president of the American International Automobile Dealers Asso-

And many economists believe a rollback in Japanese imports, as is being considered by President Reagan, also will add to inflation in other ways — for example, prompting higher wage demands by auto workers.

McElwaine, whose association of 4,500 dealers selling imports is strongly opposed to any trade restraints, claims that

while import curbs will mean jobs for auto workers they will cause layoffs in the selling and importing end of the industry.

U.S. car manufacturers acknowledge that the price of Japanese cars probably will be increased - if not by the manufacturers, then by the dealers - if imports are reduced by 200,000 or 300,000 cars as has been recommended by some members of the Reagan Cabinet. Japan sent 1.9 million cars and trucks to the United States last year, compared to 900,000 in 1976.

The promise of more jobs for auto workers has helped put the United Auto Workers union on the side of the industry is seeking the restraints. "I think the Japanese have taken unfair advantage of this market," UAW President Douglas Fraser said Sunday. "The auto industry is an industry in trouble and what we

need is time, time to turn this industry

David N. McCammon, vice president of Ford Motor Co., says the overall inflationary impact of the increase will be offset elsewhere, such as savings on unemployment costs. And he argues that U.S. manufacturers will not boost prices to match the Japanese because they want to sell cars and reduce their overstocked in-

"The American market right now is terribly competitive," says Roger B. Smith, chairman of General Motors

Another GM official added: "We'd like to sell another 10,000 cars this month and if we could do that by not raising prices, we sure wouldn't raise prices. Our biggest problem is volume.

But others, including members of Reagan's Cabinet-level auto task force, car dealers, consumer groups, economists and industry analysts are not as certain about the industry's intention to hold

Perhaps dealers will not raise prices immediately, "but you're not going to see any of those rebates anymore," said one critic of import restrictions.

The Reagan task force, headed by Transportation Secretary Drew Lewis, has generally agreed that a reduction of Japanese imports would add to inflation an increase in the Consumer Price Index of slightly less than one half of 1 percent - and probably raise the price of Japanese cars by \$300 to \$460, an administration source said.

'We don't know what effect that will

have on American cars," the source, asking to remain anonymous, said in an in-

Industry officials say the manufacturers' price of Japanese cars is generally \$100 to \$200 less than the comparable model of American cars similarly equipped.

The difference, says John J. Koons Jr., whose family owns 10 Washington-area dealerships that sell both domestic and foreign cars, is as much as \$400 to \$600 when dealer profit margins are con-

Koons says it's too early to determine the price impact of cutting the imports. However, he said, "If the supply (of imports) is reduced by 10 percent across the board, your income has been reduced' and dealers will increase prices to make

Both conservative and liberal economists believe the inflationary impact of import curbs would go beyond the price of automobiles.

Recently, Charles L. Schultze, an economist at the liberal Brookings Institution, and Eugene J. McAllister of the conservative Heritage Foundation, agreed on one thing: import reductions will lessen the incentive for auto workers to agree to wage concessions.

Restraining imports would "validate the auto industry's current wage and price structure" and jeopardize chances to "force some wage concessions" in auto negotiations next year, wrote Schultze, who was chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers in the Carter administra-

Atlanta Patrol Tension Eases

ATLANTA (AP) - Police arrested a fourth supporter of armed patrols at an Atlanta housing project Sunday as only 50 people showed up for a community rally called to solidify backing for the "self-defense" effort against the killer or killers of 20 black children.

The situation was tense at Techwood Homes, where three men have been charged with illegally carrying weapons and a fourth was arrested Sunday in connection with an angry confrontation with police the day before. At issue was the bearing of arms by what organizers say are self-defense patrols.

But police, who call the patrols a vigilante effort, kept their distance Sunday, and only about 50 people came to a rally designed to drum up support for armed patrols at the 5,500-resident project.

Meanwhile, black ministers from across the state participated in a 50-car procession through the city. The procession, which included 15 hearses, was followed by a memorial service for the slain children at the Salem Baptist Church, with 1,000 people attending.

Israel Green, head of the Techwood Homes tenants association and organizer of the patrols, barred reporters from the meetting, which took place indoors.

Afterward, all 50 people leaving the meeting refused comment. The group milled around, then some 25 people began marching in the street, demanding to know the whereabouts of the man arrested Sunday.

Police in squad cars kept watch from a distance, and other patrol cars crisscrossed the project grounds.

Although Green had said earlier that another gun would be carried Sunday during patrols, "by a woman this time," no one was seen displaying a weapon.

Police said they arrested Edward Cooper, 38, in connection with a confrontation at the project Saturday in which a police car was taken "hostage" protesters for one hour.

Cooper, also known as Modibo Kadalie, was charged with obstruction of officers in the performance of their duties, according to police spokesman Ben Sims.

"He was one of the people sitting around the car," said Sims, adding no other warrants were issued.

Most patrol members carry wood or metal baseball bats, but some have carried guns. The patrols, with members carrying only bats, continued throughout Saturday night.

Similiar patrols are to begin this week at Capitol Homes project, and police disclosed that a youngster reported missing from that project had returned home.

Missing children are of prime concern in Atlanta, where a special police task force is investigating the unsolved slay-ings of 20 black children and the disappearances of two black children since Ju-

When the Techwood patrols began Friday, activists Gene Ferguson and Chi-murenga Jenga, neither of whom live at Techwood, were arrested on charges of possession of deadly weapons at a public gathering.

Jenga, who carried an M-1 carbine, alwas charged with obstruction of an officer. Police have characterized Jenga and Ferguson as "rabble-rousers."

Jerome Gibbs, a Techwood resident, was charged Saturday with possession of a pistol without a license. The arrested men are due in court today.

Many Techwood residents have expressed displeasure with the patrols, with some suggesting the publicity might entice the killer or killers to Techwood. None of the 20 slain or two missing black children was from Techwood, although one victim lived eight blocks away.

Green was undaunted. "We're going to have 22 arrests, one for each kid that's

been murdered or missing," he said. While Friday's incident was quelled swiftly, on Saturday an angry crowd surrounded the car in which Gibbs was

placed, refusing for several minutes to al-

Later, when Deputy Chief Eldrin Bell

arrived, the jeering crowd, which had swelled to more than 50, surrounded his car, with some in the group sticking their legs beneath the car's wheels. When Bell walked out of the area, the crowd, then numbering about 100, fol-

lowed and an officer drove the deputy chief's car away. Within minutes, the lone remaining police car was taken "hostage," with demonstrators positioning themselves on folding chairs around the empty vehicle.

That car was released about an hour later when Gibbs was freed.



for five years to bring the Enquirer to trial for a March 2, 1976 article that made it appear she had been drunk at the Rive Gauche restaurant in Washington, D.C. Although the Enquirer printed a retraction, she sued the magazine because of the distress she experienced from the

story, which she called "a pack of lies." Miss Burnett testified it upset her because both her parents died of alcholism at age 46, and she has long campaigned against alcohol abuse. She admitted under cross-examination that her career had not suffered

Budget Director Says Cuts Will Aid Poor

WASHINGTON (AP) — Budget director David Stockman said Sunday that by creating jobs and reducing inflation and interest rates, the Reagan administra-tion's economic proposals "will do more good for the working poor than any of the categorical programs on the federal

Stockman denied that the incentive to get jobs would be reduced for the poor because cuts in food stamp, Medicaid and other benefits the working poor can get would lessen the income difference between those people and those on wel-

"I think the best incentive is the availability of a job, and that's what the program is designed to provide," Stockman said on the ABC television program "Issues and Answers."

"Financial incentives will do precious little good in an economy that's stagnant

like ours. He said the administration's plan would create two million jobs next year

Concerning the proposal for a tax cut of 10 percent a year for three years, Stockman said that for the first time in 20 years Congress would pass a tax package based on providing incentives to produce rather than simply shifting the tax

"I just don't accept the assumption

that the federal government has the responsibility to supplement the income of the working poor through a whole series

of transfer payments," he said.
"We believe that the guy who takes two jobs and makes \$26,000 a year shouldn't be obligated to transfer part of his income in taxes to the guy who's making \$10,000

Stockman didn't dispute that many of the "safety net" programs designed to protect the poor from budget cuts in fact help many people who work rather than those who are chronically unemployed. But he said "a preponderent share of the retired population of this country would be poor" if not for cost-of-living increasfor those "safety net" programs, which include Social Security, veterans benefits and Medicare.

Asked why the administration didn't reduce or eliminate tax expenditures, such as income deductions, that favor the middle and upper income people rather than cut programs that serve the poor,

Stockman said that would have been essentially raising taxes.

"You can't balance the budget by raising taxes. If you do you're simply going to further undermine the ability of our economy to save, to invest, to grow,

Stockman said he would personally favor looking into the possibility of tax code changes such as reducing tax ex-penditures and closing loopholes later in President Reagan's term, but said the primary focus of the initial economic package was to cut spending and taxes

He said direct expenditures benefitting the middle-and upper-income people

were not spared from the budget ax. 'We have made higher income people no longer eligible for zero interest loans under the student loan program," he said, adding that the administration also proposed cutting off school-lunch subsidies to families with annual incomes of \$16,000 or more.

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) - Denise Lucy Thrane can name the baby that is due any day now, but she may not be able to keep it because of a unique paternity-custody case filed when the surrogate mother reneged on her promise to give up the child.

Mrs. Thrane, a divorced mother of three from Arcadia, Calif., agreed last year to conceive and bear a baby for a childless couple from New York. But after she was artificially inseminated in June with sperm from James Noyes, she

decided she wanted to keep the infant. Noyes and his wife sued for custody of the baby. And the suit, which could affect the future of baby-by-contract agencies and surrogate-mother arrangements,

opened in Superior Court Friday. But the object of the dispute has yet to arrive, and Mrs. Thrane's lawyer said



'NO MORAL MANDATE'

Lefever Fits Bill On Policy

ERNEST W. LEFEVER seems an excellent choice by President Reagan to be assistant secretary of state for human rights and humanitarian affairs given the foreign policy objectives of the new administration.

'We have no moral mandate to remake the world in our own image," said Lefever in a New York Times interview. "It is arrogant for us to attempt to reform the domestic behavior of our allies and even of our adver-

President Reagan and Sec. Of State Haig indicated at the very outset that international terrorism would replace human rights as the primary concern of U.S. foreign policy.

Jimmy Carter did not invent the concern for human rights, of course. The current concern dates back to World War II, the massacre of the Jews and the subsequent Declaration of Human Rights of 1948.

MOREOVER, TWO concepts have traditionally vied for primacy in \cup .5. foreign poil cy: the first stresses the morality of power, and the second the power of morality.

Given the pendulum swings in the official foreign-policy mindset, it was not surprising that in 1976, Candidate Carter pledged to release moralistic instincts which previous denigrated—supposedly—thereby creating in his words, "a foreign policy as good as the American people.'

Even foreign-policy amateurs, however, should have realized that basic changes in regirnes, not all of which could be instituted by the U.S., must precede any broad-scale improvement in the status of human rights in many countries.

They were slow to learn that unilateral condemnation is extremely difficult to sustain or institutionalize.

Unsuccessful attempts to impose this conception of human rights on other countries made it a confusing foreign policy goal, at

THE REAGAN administration has made it clear it will not pursue arms control negotiations with the Soviets without considering their conduct and activities outside the sphere of arms control.

Sec. Haig prefers trying to combat terrorism, over trying to promote esoteric human rights, arguing, correctly, that terrorism is the ultimate abuse of human rights.'

Mr. Carter tried to give us a foreign policy as "good" as the American people. The new administration is attempting to give us one as "intelligent" as the American people.

JOSEPH KRAFT:

Afghans Never Say Die In Fight For Freedom

PESHAWAR-Six different organizations claiming to represent Afghan freedom fighters make their headquarters here. Thousands of Afghan refugees cram the camps set up on the fringes of

No day goes by without some new arrivals, fresh from the struggle against the Russian occupation of Afghanistan.

So Peshawar-the capital of the Northwest Frontier Province of Pakistan and only 30 miles from the Khyber Pass on the border-offers perhaps the best outside vantage point for assessing what is happening inside Afghanistan.

Many signs indicate that the struggle is intrinsi-

Sazli Huq, the governor of the province and a professional soldier who rose to the rank of lieutenant general in the Pakistani army, likens the present conflict to the indecisive border wars the British fought against Afghan tribes in the last

HE SAYS the Afghans are natural fighters, used

to guns-"crazy Pathans like me. As for the Russians, he believes they have conceded the countryside, and are mainly concerned to hold bases and towns and roads.

They have lost some tanks and a few helicopters, and the toll would be much more severe if ground-to-air missiles were made available to the

Gulbuddin Hekmatyar presents a very different picture. He is the leader of the largest and best known of the outside resistance organizationsthe Herzb-i-Islam or Islamic party. He is a Moslem fundamentalist who has been fighting the central authorities in Kabul since his student days under the Afghan monarchy

Ever since, he has been holding himself out here in Peshawar as the leader of a co-ordinated resistance movement

ACCORDING TO Hekmatyar, about 70 percent of the freedom fighters inside Afghanistan work in co-operation with his organization. He claims that they don't need any help in weapons, particularly from the U.S. During an interview in his heavily guarded headquarters, he said:

We are winning because our cause is just. We can beat one of the super powers. But if we associate with the other super power, we lose our cause. We lose the support of the Third World. We

lose the support of Islam." Another viewpoint emerges from an Afghan who calls himself Dr. Rassoul and claims to have been a member of a former government in Kabul. Dr Rassoul runs a hospitality center, and receives new batches of refugees from Afghanistan all the

According to him most of the fighting is done by smaller tribes in more remote parts of Afghani-

HE SAYS the tribesmen could use ground-to-air missiles against Russian helicopters. He says the helicopters—and the helicopters only—frighten and demoralize the tribesmen.

In his view, the tribesmen are mainly fighting for tribal independence. They are suspicious of the organizations that seek to manage the war from Peshawar

In particular, he says, they do not want to have anything to do with political leaders. They will work with Peshawar only on the understanding that there be no political arrangements regarding

What all this says to me is that the Afghan resistance serves chiefly to bloody the Russian military, and to give Moscow a diplomatic black eye. Better supplies to the tribesmen could probably take an

BUT THERE is almost no probability the resistance effort can be co-ordinated to the point of military victory. The anti-Russian forces have almost no chance to take Kabul.

Even if they did, they would probably prove un-

able to form an effective government. So while maintaining the military effort, it makes sense to hold the door open for negotiation. There is an off chance that the Russians might eventually grow tired of fighting, and elect to withdraw their troops in return for an Afghan regime that is technically nonaligned but heavily tilted to Moscow

WASHINGTON-High-level conflict over the routine administration decision to postpone or attend a March 25 SALT session in Geneva with the Soviet Union reveals a troubling weakness in President Reagan's national security apparatus, threatening more serious problems in the future.

The issue seemed simple enough when on Feb. 20 Richard V. Allen wrote a brief "Dear Cap" note to Sec. of Defense Caspar Weinberger.

Reagan's national security assistant instructed Weinberger to set up a meeting with the State Department, the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) and the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency (ACDA). Subject: the March 25 Geneva compli-

ROBERT WALTERS: Techs In Spotlight

WASHINGTON-In a dramatic departure from tradition, the nation's governors have taken an important first step toward assessing and resolving rucial long-rang fronting the United States today

A day-long conference held here in conjunction with the meeting of the National Governors' Association examined the prospects for the country's survival and success in the rapidly emerging postindustrial era.

The conference, devoted to a serious review of complex issues, provided vindication for those governors who don't deserve to be stereotyped as short-sighted politicians unable or unwilling to look beyond the current session of the state legislature or the probable results of the next election.

ALTHOUGH THE conference, organized by California Gov. Edmund G. "Jerry" Brown Jr., was a success, the nation's prospects are considerably more clouded as its economy shifts away from heavy industry toward a high-technology future dominated by the information, knowledge and communication industries.

That profound change already is well under way. Since 1950, that portion of the country's work force employed in the industrial sector has plummeted from 65 percent to less than 35 percent, while the portion working in the information

sector has soared from 17 percent to 55 percent. In the semiconductor industry alone, the annual value of production now stands at \$8 billion but is expected to climb to \$55 billion by 1990 and to exceed \$100 billion by the end of the century.

OTHER HIGH-technology industries expected to grow very rapidly in the coming decades include genetic engineering, production of industrial robots and development of innovative forms of

energy efficiency But this country is ill prepared to take advantage of those economic opportunities, especially in comparison with the other nations-notably Japan-that are seeking to capture global leader-

ship in the advanced technology field. The demand for technically trained people far exceeds the supply," says Dr. Robert N. Noyce, vice chairman of the Intel Corp. He notes that only about 5 percent of this country's college students are majoring in technical subjects compared with 15 percent in Japan and Europe and 30 percent in the Soviet Union.

ANOTHER PERSPECTIVE on the same problem: Among every 10,000 Japanese citizens, only one is a lawyer, but 400 are engineers and scientists. Among every 10,000 Americans, 20 are lawyers, and only 70 are engineers and scientists.

Finally, workers often oppose technological innovation because they view it as a threat to their job security, a situation that rarely exists in large, sophisticated Japanese corporations that retrain and reassign employes whose tasks are assumed by computers, robots or other machines.

Despite those problems, the U.S. can enjoy a bright future in the technological era, Brown emphasizes, "if we forge a new partnership of the big governing elements of our society- particularly business, government and workers- to focus on what innovation can do for us."

Clark, and Weinberger's deputy, Frank Carlucci, sent word back to Allen that a "joint position" was being developed and that if this matter requires the President's attention, the President (not Allen) would be informed.

HAVING EFFECTIVELY rejected Allen's instruction to Weinberger, the anti-NSC bureaucracy then called a meeting on its own on March 4, chaired not by defense, as Allen wanted, but by the State Department.

The department is in the forefront of those anting to postpone the March

This high-level meeting was convened by Rick Burt, director of the department's political-military bureau. Clearly under instructions, Burt blithely revealed that Haig and Weinberger at breakfast that morning had agreed to postpone the March 25 Geneva session for two months to give the U.S. time to get its nuclear policy in shape.

Among those gathered around the table in Burt's State Department conference room was Maj. Gen. Robert L. Schweitzer, the NSC director of defense policy and Allen's agent.

HE REFUSED to accept the Haig-Weinberger verdict; just as top officials at ACDA had refused to accept a proposed State Department cable to the U.S. Embassy in Moscow on Feb. 27 announcing postponement of the Geneva meeting.

In vetoing the postponement notice, acting AC-DA Director Michael Pillsbury insisted the decision could not be made by Haig and Weinberger alone but required "government-wide" participation-meaning Allen and the NSC.

The Joint Chiefs of Staff also opposed postponement of the Geneva session and refused to go along with the State Department's Feb. 27 cable, despite Weinberger's consent. The chiefs want to hear what the Russians have to say about their

"compliance" with provisions of the treaties. In addition to this tactical reason the uninformed Pentagon leaders give for opposing any postponement, some high officials-particularly in that one-time nest of dovishness at ACDAwant to use the March 25 meeting to unveil nearly 40 alleged Soviet violatons of the pacts.

THESE ARE contained in a 167-page super-secret document ("the hottest document in town, one official told us) that has been painfully and scrupulously assembled by ACDA. It could put Moscow on the defensive on the compliance issue. Halg. Weinberger and their aides privately agree

that this compilation of alleged violations could become a highly-useful U.S. tool in the future. To table it at the March 25 meeting, however,

would be premature, they say; charging Soviet violations of SALT I (expired) and SALT II (never ratified) might tend to reduce U.S. flexibility if President Reagan decides not to abide by the unenforceable treaties in the future (as Haig has announced the U.S. will do for the present).

SOME HARD-liners, said by aides to include NSC assistant Dick Allen, believe postponement of the March 25 meeting will cost the U.S. a choice time to play this trump card.

Other hard-liners disagree; the alleged violations should not be thrown at the Russians before Reagan knows exactly how he wants to play the

Accordingly, conflict over postponing the Geneva meeting cannot be blamed on ideology.

It is the result of a national security process without form or substance, so vulnerable that it makes for more baleful jokes than it produces tough decisions.

Since India gained its independence from Britain Aug. 15, 1947, from its guidance under its first Prime Minister, Jawaharial Nehru, to its present Prime Minister, Indira Gandhi, the nation's goal has been to increase its agricultural and industrial production.

The aim of this planned economic development has been to more equitably distribute its benefits to as large a cross-section of society in India as possible. And while much remains to be done, India can draw satisfaction from the great strides it has made the past 30 years.

IN VIEW of the more or less bondage in which the nation was held by feudal lords, trading com panies and later the British, India indeed has

made progress In the short span of three decades, India has emerged as one of the top ten industrialized na-

tions of the world This has been accomplished largely as a result of a sustained emphasis to build industries of a strategic importance and basic nature, including steel, shipbuilding, railroads, heavy electrical facilities,

petrochemicals and machine manufacturing. As both Mr. Sandanam and India's leaders note. this program includes "concrete measures to improve the living standards of the poor by provision of low cost housing and housing sites, reviewing mininum wages of farm workers and improving irrigation and farm production

The "green revolution" is a case in point. Under this program, grain yields have been boosted to the point grain can be stockpiled for drouth years to fight famine, with a surplus left for export.

INDIA HAS A government patterned both on the British Parliamentary system and the U.S. sys-

There is a President, more or less a figurehead such as the monarchy in England but without the pomp, and there is a Prime Minister, who exerts

There is the Rajya Sabha, Council of States, made up of not more than 250 members, both appointed and elected. And there is the Lok Sabha, House of the People, made up of 544 persons, most directly elected. There is a strong judiciary and a system of 22 states and nine centrally run union territories.

Today, India is a nation of major cities, jammed with millions of persons, such as Calcutta, Bornbay, Old and New Delhi. However, a majority of the citizens still live in the villages. It is a nation with excellent rail facilities, good domestic and international airlines and a growing school system at all levels. It also is a nation which has joined

the atomic age with nuclear power. It also is a fascinating place to visit. Because it is all these things, it is worth knowing more about.

Newspapers, AT&T Battle Over Information

WASHINGTON (AP) — The American newspaper industry, anticipating the dawn of an electronic "information age," is casting a wary eye on the world's largest telephone company as it develops ambitious plans to provide advertising and information directly to the public.

Spurred by rising printing and distribution costs and new forms of competition, many newspaper publishers are exploring the possibility of electronic de-livery — providing access to their product over small home computer termin-

The American Telephone & Telegraph Co. — the Bell System — is also expe rimenting, eager not only to serve customers like newspapers but also to distribute its own information services as well.

AT&T says it doesn't want to gather and edit the news itself. But in turning electronic delivery for its phone directories, it is not ruling out the possibility of offering more information than just the time and weather.

The newspaper publishers say the issue is thus whether a company that controls key "information highways" should also be allowed to compete with its customers in providing information. AT&T responds that the publishers are simply afraid of losing some advertising to an "electronic Yellow Pages."

Both sides have pleaded their case to the courts, the Federal Communications Commission, Congress — even the National Association of Broadcasters. Both sides agree, however, that Congress is likely to become the final referee. "As much as everybody talks about deregulation, Congress will not be able

to ignore this fight," says one FCC official who prefers not to be named. Adds Jerry W. Friedheim, executive vice president of the American Newspaper Publishers Association (ANPA): "The decisions, when they come, will control the structure of American communications — maybe even of American society - for decades to come.

Newspaper publishers don't expect to see the demise of ink-on-paper distribution anytime soon; it's still much cheaper than electronic delivery. But computer and communication companies - particularly cable TV firms - are actively experimenting with a technology that bypasses newsprint.

Consumers are being offered the chance to use their TV set or a small computer terminal to shop at home, bank at home and gain access to all types of information, including news.

"All of these new services are coming," declares Thomas E. Wheeler, the president of the National Cable Television Association. "The only question is

how they'll get into the home — via cable or via the telephone line."

Newspaper publishers say they don't have any problem with the telephone route, so long as the phone company serves only as a vehicle for distribution. That's the way AT&T currently operates. Under the terms of a 1956 consent decree with the Justice Department, the company cannot enter any unregulated

AT&T is pressing, however, for the right to offer services beyond the basic voice communication regulated by the FCC. The agency has supported the company' position, as long as it establishes a fully separated subsidiary to enter

Newspaper publishers, along with equipment and telephone service competitors of the Bell System, scoff at the idea that a new subsidiary will prevent AT &T from monopolizing the electronic marketplace. AT&T directly serves more than 80 percent of the nation's telephones, they note, and could place such tremendous resources at the disposal of the subsidiary that no one could compete

The issue is whether a regulated, government-granted monopoly should be . in a position of going beyond its traditional role of providing an information highway to anyone who wants to use it, blind to the content of the messages, says K. Prescott Low, who publishes the Quincy, Mass., Patriot Ledger and has helped the ANPA study the issue.

The problem is that allowing a telephone company to generate its own information service where it has a monopoly on facilities might lead to that company taking a proprietary interest in the content of other messages," Low adds.

"That's a red herring and really absurd," responds Dennis J. Sullivan, AT& T's vice president for market and product management.

Sullivan notes the new subsidiary would have to purchase transmission service just like any other customer, and that the telephone company must provide transmission service to any paying customer.

"But there's no such thing as a fully separated subsidiary," says Friedheim. "That would be something like having one monopoly utility owning 80 percent of American highways; turning them into toll roads, and also running its own freight-company delivery trucks on the highways to compete with our trucks and others

AT&T responds its real interest is not generating news, but adapting the new technology to its telephone directories and protecting the \$2.7 billion in annual revenue those directories generate.

While there will be "some overlap" between newspaper advertising and Yellow Page advertising if the latter can be easily updated electronically, the overlap will be so small "that the threat doesn't justify their response," asserts

"This is not a newspaper-only issue from my standpoint, with a bunch of Neanderthal publishers trying to protect advertising," says Low. Whether AT&T wants to acknowledge it or not, he continues, the resources

now at the disposal of the Bell System were developed through the grant of a government monopoly. "And the phone company is talking about using (those resources) for a full-fledged information service that goes way beyond classified

As proof of that, Low points to the New England Telephone Co. in his state of Massachusetts — which is seeking permission to offer "Dial-It" services fea-turing sports scores, stock quotations and Boston news — and AT&T's plans to test an electronic system in Austin that would include information from outside sources such as Consumer Reports.

Such telephone company proposals do not worry all publishers, however. Allen H. Neuharth, chairman and president of the Gannett Co., the nation's largest newspaper group, told financial analysts recently his company would not participate in the battle against AT&T.

Neuharth, a member of the ANPA board, did vote to support the associa-tion's position in the dispute. But he also told the analysts he did not believe

"the sky will fall if AT&T is allowed to put its Yellow Pages on TV. Grattan Gray, the president and general manager of the Monroe, Mich.,

Evening News, is even more outspoken. 'The primary thing we do is gather and process information, edit it and put it in a form that is peculiar to the needs of our local customers," he says. "I'm sure the nature of the delivery system will change. It does not seem likely to me, however, that the telephone company to going to duplicate the kind of staff and editing responsibility that we accept in producing the newspaper."

'hree Mile Island

MIDDLETOWN, Pa. (AP) - Two years after its spectacular leap to nuclear notoriety, the Three Mile Island reactor complex is a hot potato no one wants to

The operator of the nuclear plant is on the verge of bankruptcy, cleanup insurance funds are running out and the small island in the Susquehanna River is turning into a high-level radioactive nuclear waste dump.

But no one is rushing in to save the

"It's a pass-the-buck kind of thing, and nothing is getting done," said John Minnich, chairman of the Dauphin County Commission. "God help us if we have another accident somewhere. Who is going to clean up the problem?"

The Three Mile Island Unit 2 reactor was disabled on March 28, 1979, in what is considered the nation's worst commercial nuclear accident.

During the two-week emergency, the plant overheated, the radioactive reactor core started to melt and 600,000 gallons of contaminated water flooded the basement of the concrete reactor contain-

Last summer, amid much controversy, some 43,000 curies of radioactive krypton gas were vented from the containment building. Today the plant owners have almost finished an elaborate \$9 million system to filter radioactive cesium and strontium from the water. Using a simpler system, they have removed the radioactive isotopes from less contaminated water that flooded an auxiliary

But canisters containing the filtered particles are still on the island, and local citizens, both pro-and anti-nuclear, are

growing increasingly anxious about the situation.

"If they don't clean it up soon, we are going to have more problems than we had during the crisis," said Anne Trunk, a member of a TMI citizens advisory pan-

She added, "It's starting to bother a lot of people. A lot of my neighbors are worried that it is going to become a

The consensus appears to be that the projected seven-year, \$1 billion cleanup is moving too slowly. The reasons for the snail's pace include intense public scrutiny and opposition, lumbering regulatory procedures and, above all else, tight cash

'The whole thing revolves around money. There's really no money moving. and that's the real crisis," said Rep. Allen Ertel, D-Pa., whose congressional district includes TMI

Cleanup director Bob Arnold says he needs \$100 million to \$125 million a year to decontaminate the plant as quickly as possible. But General Public Utilities Corp., the TMI owner, cut back spending from \$100 million to \$50 million last Sep-

GPU has also used up two-thirds of a \$300 million cleanup insurance policy, and Arnold says GPU cannot possibly come up with the remaining \$700 million of the projected \$1 billion cost because regulatory commissions in New Jersey and Pennsylvania have said customer revenues may not be used for the clean-

Earlier this month. Ertel introduced a bill that would create a \$750 million insurance fund to help clean up TMI and other nuclear accident sites. The fund would be built with contributions from

nuclear utilities across the country. The bill comes at a time when there appear to be some breaks in the logjam. The Nuclear Regulatory Commission

is close to approving a final environmental impact statement on the cleanup. NRC chairman Joseph Hendrie said that would wrap up the study phase and pave the way for action.

President Reagan has recommended a \$75 million federal investment in cleanup research and aid over the next two years. But Ertel said one subcommittee has already shaved \$12 million from the allocation, and part of the rest won't be available until 1983 — "so far off that it's

Arnold said GPU has deliberately refrained from leading its own survival fight because "there are so many subjective reactions to the company that anything we suggest might inspire resist-

The company has developed some cleanup technology, but it has been hampered by severe cash flow constraints that show no sign of easing. According to GPU vice president Verner Condon, GPU has not issued dividends for five quarters and the prospect of payments for this quarter is "nil.

He estimated stockholders have lost \$170 million in dividends since the accident, and the value of their stock has declined \$840 million

Metropolitan Edison, the GPU subsidiary that operates and owns 50 percent of the plant, has added \$165 million to customer bills, entirely to pay for replacement power. It remains marginally solvent and faces another crisis in April.

A consortium of banks has said it will not let Met Ed borrow money to pay its taxes unless the state Public Utility Commission grants most or all of a \$76.5 million rate increase by April 15.

Condon said he is encouraged by the Ertel bill, the Reagan administration's attitude and a General Accounting Office study due in May.

But, he said, "Within the immediate future we cannot rely on any of these things. So the Pennsylvania PUC is going to have to provide for Met Ed's survival until these longer-term things develop. There is just nowhere else to go.'



Fiscal Crisis Threatens Haitian Government

Three months after the International Monetary Fund replenished Haiti's foreign exchange reserves with about \$20 million in support, that money is almost gone and Haiti is again deep in a fiscal crisis, diplomats and businessmen here

The diplomats maintain that the financial problem could jeopardize future access to foreign aid for the government of President-for-Life Jean-Claude Duvalier, 29. He took over 10 years ago at the death of his father, François "Papa Doc" Duvalier, also president for life.

Foreign exchange reserves are the stocks of foreign currency on which businessmen draw when they convert local money - in this case Haitian gourdes worth five to the dollar - into foreign currencies to pay bills abroad.

Many countries impose tight controls on such conversions, but until the current crisis Haiti had virtually none.

In addition to handing Duvalier possibly severe financial problems, the evaporation of foreign exchange reserves also could result in deep political repercussions, particularly because the reasons for the shortage are unclear.

Haiti's already-weak economy was battered last year when Hurricane Allen devastated the 1980 coffee crop. The same deepening rural poverty that has prompted tens of thousands of Haitian peasants to sail for the United States also has sent hundreds of thousands into this already teeming city to compete for meager amounts of food and work.

The foreign exchange crisis developed

The International Monetary Fund, a major world lending agency, says that a year ago Haiti had a reserve of \$45 million in foreign currency. But foreign diplomats here say that fell to about \$4 million by last autumn.

The Haitian government blamed the drop on the hurricane damage to the coffee crop, the principal earner of foreign exchange, and decreases in the world price for coffee. Altogether, an estimated 35 million in expected receipts from cof-

In December, the IMF came to the rescue. It made available about \$20 million in fresh support and softened the terms of repayment on continuing loan rograms. The funds were deposited in Haiti's national bank.

But by early February, Haitian officials and pro-government businessmen agree, the country was again deep in a foreign exchange crisis. One foreign economist says less than \$2 million was

Today, many people in this capital question the official explanation - that the decline in foreign exchange resulted from the hurricane's continuing effects.

Some diplomats and businessmen claim the crisis was seriously compounded by the government's continuing and long-criticized - practice of using money in national accounts for purposes not set out in the national budget.

One important diplomat in the capital said he knew substantial unbudgeted withdrawals had been made from the nation's foreign exchange between late November and late January. A foreign economist estimated the total at around \$14 million to \$16 million.

All of these sources, who asked not to be identified, said they did not know how

the money was spent.

A Haitian familiar with the banking system claimed only Duvalier himself has the power to initiate such off-thebudget withdrawals.

This could not be officially confirmed. Repeated efforts by The Associated Press since early February to reach government officials for comment on the reports have been fruitless.

rent crisis, the practice of spending money outside the national budget has long been a sore point with the international aid agencies that together spend or lend \$100 million a year in Haiti - often by passing the Haitian government to work directly with independent agencies such as CARE, out of fear government offi-

cials will misuse the money.

In January 1980, an internal report of the U.S. Agency for International Development noted the Haitian government had decided to undertake development projects not included in the budget. It did not name the projects, but in the past several months the Duvalier government has been criticized for investing in an inefficient sugar plant and fishing fleet.

"Expenditures were not reported in the budget, and there was no control over many expenditures," the AID report said. It added that no public accounting is made of substantial amounts of revenues.

One foreign economist here estimates \$25 million was spent outside the budget in 1980. He and others note there were such factors as food imports - which drained off \$8 million in 1980. But they say this does not fully explain why less than \$2 million remained of the IMF support funds just two months after they were deposited.

"This is probably the straw that broke the camel's back. It puts the IMF in the position of saying either you shape up or we leave," says one foreign economist.

Last Dec. 11, a joint commission of foreign aid donors issued a draft report that bluntly recommended to Haiti that it take measures: "1. Effective control of the use of public funds. 2. Suppression or reduction of extra-budgetary expendi-

Pakistan Asks Syria To Return Hijackers, Prisoners For Trial

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) - Pakistani President Mohammed Zia ul-Haq said Sunday he has asked Syria to extradite the three hijackers who surrendered in Damascus nine days ago and released more than 100 hostages from a commandeered Pakistani jetliner.

The hostages were traded for 54 Pakistani prisoners whose release the hijackers had demanded. Pakistani officials said earlier they expected the Syrians would arrest and return the 54 as well, on the basis of information about charges against them. Zia did not say whether he has asked Syria to extradite them.

There was no immediate response from the Syrian government.
Shortly after the 13-day ordeal was

ended, Syria said it would allow the released prisoners to stay in Syria if they wished but that the three hijackers would have to leave as soon as they found another country to take them.

Syria agreed to accept the hijackers and the released prisoners after Libyan leader Moammar Khadafy backed out of an agreement to allow the plane carrying the Pakistani prisoners to land on Libyan soil Libyan officials said the decision was made to help change Libya's image as a country that harbors terrorists.

Zia told reporters Sunday that Pakistan wanted to try the three for hijacking and murder - both capital crimes. A Pakistani diplomat, Tariq Rahim.

The previous and present contracts required the 130 coal companies who belong to the BCOA to pay into the union's health and pension funds a royalty of \$1.90 a ton for all the non-union coal they purchase.

To meet customer demands, for example, some coal operators have purchased from non-union companies lowsulfur grade coal needed by electric utilities facing tightened clean air regula-

Church reported Friday that the industry had been willing to retreat from its demand that the multi-employer pension pooling arrangement be replaced by one in which coal companies could carry individual pension plans handled by private insurance companies. The industry had been reported ready to consign that question to a study committee when the talks collapsed Tuesday.

"Political Character" Strike threats resulting from the Bydgoszcz incident have "a clearly political character," the Politburo statement said.

"A tendency to develop activities of a political character has gained the upper hand in Solidarity as has a tendency illegally to usurp the functions of the duly constituted representative and executive

bodies. This creates a state of anarchy. Solidarity has said it does not want to become a political party or share power with the party.

The Radio Moscow commentary said the "escalation (of work stoppages), especially in January" could be tied to the Solidarity leadership, "which seems to think it does not have to take responsibil-

It said the Polish government was doing its utmost to carry out agreements that ended last summer's strikes. "What is necessary is reciprocal action on the part of the other sides of the agreement the trade unions.

Pastoral Letter

Cardinal Stefan Wyszynski, Roman Catholic primate of Poland, issued a call Sunday for "calm, self-control and responsibility." A pastoral letter from the cardinal was read at Mass in the Church of the Holy Cross and broadcast by Warsaw Radio Ninety percent of Poland's 36 million people are Catholics.

EDISON, N.J. (AP) - Princess Ashraf Pahlavi, twin sister of the late Shah of Iran, says communists will take over Iran unless the monarchy is returned to

Princess Ashraf spoke Friday during a rare public appearance at the Pines Manor before 225 members of the North Jersey chapter of the Association of the United States Army. A few hours before, her nephew, Prince Reza Kurush Pahlavi, heir to the Peacock Throne of Iran, speaking from his home in Cairo, Egypt, called on the 2 million exiled Iranians to unite.



"In today's Iran, according to all observers, the Marxists are the only well-PRINCESS ASHRAF organized disciplined force," the princess said. "Once in power, they will call for the Soviet Union to come to their rescue, just as they did in Afghanistan.

"Already the red flag flies over some of the northern provinces," she said.

Princess Ashraf was accompanied by an entourage of security personnel from two private firms - and a dog trained to sniff out explosives.

Sen. Charles McC. Mathias, R-Md., new chairman of the Congressional Joint Committee on Printing, also is looking for ways to save money but cutting the printing budget. He has pledged sharp cuts throughout the government publishnearly \$2 billion a year although no one is really sure how big it is.

In the year ended last Sept. 30, government publishing costs for Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) -Rep. Glenn M. alone included \$26 million to print the transcript of congressional hearings, \$13 million to publish the daily Congressional Record (and an additional \$7.2 million on bound copies), \$8.2 million on legislative bills, resolutions and amendments, \$7.9 million on miscellaneous printing and binding, and \$4.8 million to print committee reports.

Glickman's proposals include elimination of the luxury of printing a new menu for the congressional dining rooms each day at a cost of \$100,000 a year; he suggests putting the chef's special of the day on a mimeographed insert. He also recommends publishing just one congressional telephone book a year, instead of the three House directories that came out last year.

The three-term congressman would also like to stop the printing and distribution of volumes containing tributes to deceased congressional members even though the tributes have already appeared in the Record. That service costs

Mathias said he expects to raise the price of the Congressional Record to try to wipe out a \$300,000 subsidy. It now costs \$135 to each of the 4,000 subscri-

Also, he has cut out a second printing of the Congressonal Directory during each session, and has reduced by 15 percent the number of Congressional Pictorial Directories, cutting the number back to 15,000 with only one printing a

He has pledged to look throughout government and stop "the continued unnecessary printing of documents which are not wanted or needed by government officials, scholars or the public

Mathias said he wanted the Government Printing Office, one of the largest organizations of the U.S. government, to be "the best service organization and a model of an efficient, effective governmental organization that is the envy of all other government offices for the productivity and resourcefulness it demonstrates daily.

Texas Beer Wholesalers Influential, Persuasive

AUSTIN (AP) - Texans don't just like beer, they love it, spend millions of dollars on it and drink millions of gallons of it.

Slaking the thirst for beer is very big business, and it's big politics, too. That combination makes for interesting times when Texas legislators get together:

The Alcoholic Beverage Commission reports that last year, Texans consumed some 406.5 million gallons of suds, enough to pour every man, woman and child in the state 28.9 gallons of the stuff. That would fill a 5-foot-long bath-

Other alcoholic beverages don't even come close. Texans bought only 22 million gallons of distilled spirits in 1980, 13.2 million gallons of ales and malt liquors, and 12.1 million gallons of wine.

Taxes collected from beer sales alone are more than the other three categories of booze combined

The ABC says that last year it took in more than \$65 million from its tax of \$5 per 31-gallon beer barrel. Taxes on sales of all other booze generated about

All of this from one of the most highly regulated industries in the state and one of the most competitive.

necine wars among brewers, wholesalers and retailers. But the businessmen care intensely, and do what they can to make sure lawmakers understand their

That is, the beer wholesalers do. They have statewide and local lobbies to push their legislation, and use a political action committee - WBPACT - and local PACs to make political contributions.

In the past, the wholesalers lobby has been able to persuade legislators to pass some fairly controversial laws, much to the envy and annoyance of tavern

Last session, for example, wholesalers pushed for an act that instituted a "three-tier" beer distribution system in Texas. The law effectively assures middlemen - wholesalers - a-lock on beer sales. Retailers can't buy from each other and brewers can't sell to retailers or the public.

What is the public interest in guaranteeing a cut to the middleman on 100 percent of the total market in this state?" asked Rep. Wayne Peveto when the measure passed the House two years ago. "Let's don't heap more scorn on this legislature by passing this bill."

It passed 97-29, and Rep. Buck Florence, D-Hugh Springs, said it was obvious the "beer lobby had the House wired" and the bill "greased" for passage.

Now, tavern owners say the law keeps prices artificially high. "I can find beer advertised in the newspaper cheaper than I can buy from the distributor, but I can't buy from the retailer because of the three-tier law, said Pat Conway, owner of Don Politico's, an Austin bar that serves only beer

"I wish we (retailers) had a lobby," he said. "I'd be willing to pay for one. But you can't get the retailers together.

John Muir, owner of another Austin watering hole, The Raw Deal, complains that distributors are "always forever following each other's lead in rais-

ing prices," but that he can't buy from anyone else.

He professed a kind of admiration for the middlemen.

"Talk about having your industry organized! They're way above and beyond the normal wholesale merchant," he said. "They use the legislature to organize the industry to maximize profit and minimize competition. That's what any business tries to do, but they get it done.

Rising Fuel Prices Causing Rapid Drop In Big Bend Tourists

PANTHER JUNCTION (AP) -Rangers insist Big Bend National Park is not on the brink of becoming a "ghost park," but they concede the number of people visiting the rugged canyons, mountains and deserts has plunged almost as fast as the price of gasoline has soared in the past five years.

Fewer than half the number of people visited the park last year than in 1976. Park officials say the decline has been steady and it's still going on.

"Big Bend's drop is among the worst in the country," said Al Galipeau, a statistician with the National Park Service's planning office in Denver.

Rangers say the answer is obvious to them - the cost of gasoline has put this remote park in far Southwest Texas out of range of many vacationers. In 1976, when a gallon of gasoline cost about 55 cents, a motorist could drive his family here and back from Houston for about

Today, gasoline for that same trip would cost about \$110.

"People are visiting parks closer to home, and there's nobody close to home around Big Bend," said Ben Moffett of Santa Fe. N.M., a spokesman for the National Park Service's Southwest region, which includes six states. "Big Bend has gone down more than any park in the southwest because of its isolation.

But the remote location is one of the advantages of this 1,100-square mile wildlife refuge that got its name from the 107mile bend in the Rio Grande in which it is nestled, says acting Park Superintend-

We're 130 miles south of I-10, so you've got a 260-mile round trip if you want to come off the Interstate - and that's before you drive to the crossroads," he said

"It's not our job to go out and recruit visitors." Berry said, but he confessed that since federal funds for parks are based in part on visitation statistics, he would like to see more people.

In the meantime, he said, fewer people cause less harm to the delicate flora and fauna that flourish here including some species unique to the park's diverse forests, springs, basins and deserts. In as the number of visitors grew rules evolved which Berry said are intended to promote, not restrict, enjoy ment of the park by preserving the natural resources.

The rules are very specific in some cases. For instance, if you are camping out on the Rio Grande floodplain while on a raft trip, you may build a small fire as long as it is contained in a metal firepan, charcoal or dead wood is used, and

In fact, it is specifically against the law to "kill, wound, frighten, capture, touch or molest" the snakes or any other wild creatures.

"What you have here is an open air museum and zoo, where the rattlesnake was here first," said Berry. "They won't bite you unless you stick your hand into a hole or under a rock, anyway.

He said there have been three recorded snakebite cases in the park's 37-year history. There are no recorded cases of any humans ever being attacked by the many panthers that live in the park, but

Dear Hung: Those phone calls provide you with a sense of security. You need to find out why you are so unsure of yourself. You also need to find out if your mother has unwittingly fostered this dependency.

I urge you to get with a therapist. It need not be a psychiatrist who charges \$90 an hour. Call your community health service and explore the alternatives. You will be surprised at how many there are.

Series To Explain Toxic Shock Syndrome

By PAUL DONOHUE, M.D.
Dear Dr. Donohue: I have always been fascinated with how diseases like the toxic shock syndrome are brought to light. I am sure another article (I read the column recently with the question about TSS) would be enlightening to your readers. - Mrs. R.R.

Your question is complex. Putting to-gether the pieces of a new illness takes patience, alert observation and thousands of hours of plain drudgery. That is the story of toxic shock syndrome - patience, observation and drudgery. Most of the drudges are unheralded heroes in medicine's front lines. To understand how such puzzles are solved demands an understanding of organisms, bacteria in this instance

There are thousands of bacteria in the world. Of those thousands, a hundred or so cause illnesses, and then usually only when a person has been weakened for some reason, as from a severe burn. Many potentially troublesome bacteria live in and on our bodies, causing no

For example, the very common bacterium E. coli lives in our intestines. helping to digest food. However, if that bacterium gets into the urinary tract (kidneys on down) it causes an infection. It is in a place it shouldn't be, where tissue cannot cope with this alien. This is but one example.

The second part of the story is that some bacteria make poisons, which we call toxins. The streptococcus causes a sore throat. Some strep germs make a toxin called erythrogenic to jin, and that turns the skin red. Thus, when you have a strep throat from one of these bacteria. the illness is called scarlet fever. It is a

caused by the toxin made by those special strep germs.

Staph is a germ familiar to most. It can be found on the skin, sometimes in the mouth and the vagina. It usually does no harm there. But if it gets into a hair follicle, it produces a boil. Staph, like the strep germ, can make toxins. This is the background setting necessary for understanding toxic shock syndrome.

Dear Dr. Donohue: Two years ago when I had my second child I quit having my period. Here's my question. I want to know if not having a period will hurt me in any way. I am told not to worry. -

Not having a period will not hurt you Not knowing why bothers me. If you nursed or are nursing your baby, that could be a harmless factor involved here.

You can use this as a general guide: Non-nursing mothers begin to menstruate anywhere from six weeks to 24 weeks after delivery. After six months, some reason other than the pregnancy should be investigated.

In nursing women, the time frame can be much longer. Women often do not menstruate while nursing. They resume menstruation anywhere from six weeks to 12 weeks after discontinuing nursing. After that time, it is well to be checked to learn why menstruation has not re-

I do not mean to say that any woman

the time frames I give above have something seriously wrong with them. But causes other than pregnancy or nursing should be checked out. You should return to your doctor for a re-evaluation.

Dear Dr. Donohue: I am a 27-year-old woman who has been plagued with migraine headache for the past few years. When I got pregnant recently I asked my doctor how this problem might affect my pregnancy or the child. He said there should be no complications. In fact, he told me that I might even see an end to the attacks because of the pregnancy. Is

It is nice to have friends in places of authority, especially friends who look out for our well being and safety.

The Association of Home Appliance Manufacturers (AHAM) and the Gas Appliance Manufacturers Association (GA-MA) inform us that we could be asking for trouble when we leave our homes shut up for any length of time while taking a much-needed vacation.

It's rare but it's been known to happen: If your house is closed up for two weeks or more and the hot water heater is operating, an explosion could occur.

Now, here's how that might happen. In case you didn't know it, the hot water system in our homes normally and regularly produces small amounts of hydrogen gas as a result of the chemical reaction of water with the corrosive protection device inside the water heater. Sounds technical, right?

Well, this gas escapes continually and safely each time you turn hot water faucets on in your home

Here's the catch, though: If the hot water heater is not hydrogen gas can build up. If it is allowed to build up long enough, the gas can be sufficient to possibly cause an explosion when exposed to a spark from the electric components of dishwashers or clothes washers.

But, to be on the safe side, it's a good idea to use a little precaution, even if the house is to be losed up for only a short time. When returning to your home after a few days of non-use, before washing that



> MACARONI CARBONARA (Makes 4 servings)

2 cups elbow macaroni (8 oz.) 1 tbsp. salt

3 qts. boiling water

1/2 lb. ham, cut into chunks 1/4 cup parsley sprigs

2 ribs celery, cut up 1 small onion, quartered 1 small green pepper

2 tbsps. butter or margarine

Dash pepper Gradually add macaroni and salt to rapidly boiling water so that water continues to boil. Cook uncovered, stirring occasionally, until tender. Drain in colan-

While macaroni is cooking, process, until finely chopped, ham and parsley with cutting blade in food processor. Turn ham mixture into 2-quart microwave-proof casserole. Remove cutting blade from food processor. Attach shredding disc. Shred celery, onion and green pepper into food processor; add to casserole with butter. Cover and microwave 3 minutes, stirring after 2 minutes. Lightly beat egg with pepper; mix into ham mixture with macaroni. Microwave 1

Conventional method: Finely chop ham, parsley, celery, onion and green pepper. Saute in butter in large skillet 5-10 minutes, stirring often. Mix in macroni. Beat together egg and pepper. Mix into macaroni until well blended.

LINGUINE WITH TOMATO SAUCE (Makes about 4 servings)

8 oz. linguine or spaghetti

3 qts. boiling water 1 can (16 oz.) stewed tomatoes

Geopressured Energy Proves Unusable

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - A just-completed economic study throws cold water on previously optimistic forecasts that extremely deep geopressured zones along the Gulf Coast could be an important alternate energy source.

"It's one of these things that's there, like gold in sea water," said engineer Robert K. Swanson, "but it's going to be hell to get it out.'

Swanson headed a team of researchers from Southwest Research Institute that completed a study of 20 of the most producible geopressured zones along the coast from the Rio Grande to the Mississippi River for the Electric Power Research Institute

Swanson said that, unfortunately, his team had to report to the electric utilities that the geopressured zones along Texas and Louisiana offer no value as an alternative fuel source in the near future.

The study was the object of an article entitled "No Great Energy Force," that appeared in SWRI's latest edition of Technology Today." It discounts previous estimates that "there were hundreds and even thousands of trillion cubic feet of natural gas dissolved in the water in these abnormally pressured for-

First, the study concluded that instead of "hundreds and thousands of trillion cubic feet" of natural gas, that only 7 trillion cubic feet of recoverable natural gas lies in the geopressured reservoirs stretching from deep South Texas to New

Secondly, Swanson's team estimated based on one test well drilled in Texas that that it would cost \$7.50 to \$14 per geopressured gas. This compares to a maximum \$5 per mcf for gas being purchased on a premium basis by some utilities today, and the average Texas natural

'All we said was that for the utilities as a major short-term source of energy, it's hopeless," Swanson said.

Another disappointment of the study, Swanson said, was that the water containing the natural gas sediments isn't hot enough to be of much value as geothermal energy.

He said there were predictions that from the experimental well, drilled in Brazoria County under a Department of Energy Grant, would flow water of 325 degrees Fahrenheit, but instead the water tested only 265 degrees.

"About the minimum temperature you can use in the geogthermal business for actually producing power is about 350 degrees. But none of this stuff — the producible stuff - is over 300 degrees. So you can see it's very marginal," he

Swanson said an example of the disappointing findings was in the McAllen area of the Texas Lower Rio Grande Valley, originally thought to offer the best hope of producible natural gas because it was one of the shallowest zones.

What you have to do to get this gas is produce a tremendous amount of water," he said. "So it really is a gas dripper

"The wells will flow under this tremendous pressure so you won't have to pump them. This water comes rushing out of there and you separate the gas and

'In order to make it pay, we know you have to produce at the rate of, say, 40,000 barrels of water a day. But these wells at McAllen would be lucky to produce at 10,000 barrels a day and not for tween 10 and 50 cubic feet per barrel of water. So when you produce it, it comes out like gas out of a Coca-Cola when you

'They're soft sellers, good ole boys," said a legislative aide who asked not to be identified. "Mike Hopkins (head of WBDT) will come around and try to explain his point of view, but if you vote no, he's not less friendly. There's no overt retaliation. He'll still arrange for you to get the free beer for your fundraiser, or

Hopkins denied that WBDT itself provided politicians with beer, adding that "if somebody at home does something with his distributor, I wouldn't know

He said that WBDT did, however, give in-kind donations to charities of various kinds. Among the "charities" that got free bubbly last year was a news reporters' party.

The brew was supplied as a "goodwill gesture," Hopkins said.

"Most of the time I make (political) contributions in check," he said. The money flows fairly freely.

WBPACT's records of campaign donations filed in the secretary of state's office are incomplete. Missing are accounts for the month from Oct. 26 to Nov. 25, 1980 - the height of the cam-

Hopkins said he had turned in all the

required reports. He said he did not know why the secretary of state's office

did not have them. The documents on file show WBPACT gave \$76,700 to legislative and statewide candidates. WBPAC of Harris County added another \$30,500 in contributions, and BCPAC, the San Antonio wholesalers, tossed in \$4,269.25 to bring beer money to a total of at least \$110,

WBPACT gives, it seems, to hundreds of hopefuls. Some 70 legislative candi-dates received over \$21,000 dollars in only one month — Sept. 26 to Oct. 25 — during the 1960 campaign. Most donations ran about \$200.

"We don't give much money to anybody. Quite frankly, we support candidates who are good people, someone who represents his district, and is honest, fair, and open," Hopkins said. "If you'll look at some of the PACs, they go in and support only Republicans or only conservatives. We don't."

But some candidates get more than

Gov. Bill Clements led the list with \$4,000 from WBPACT. Sens. Ike Harris. R-Dallas; Kent Caperton, D-Bryan; and Glenn Kothmann, D-San Antonio, received \$1,000 apiece. They are members of the Senate State Affairs Committee.

which passes on liquor bills.

Another member, Sen. Jack Ogg, D-Houston, received only \$500 in the Sept.-Oct. round, but later got \$1,000 more from the statewide PAC, and \$3,300 from the local wholesalers' group. Ogg is carrying a wholesalers' bill this session.

Residents Of Hawaii Angered By Crimes

HONOLULU (AP) - The acquittals of four teen-agers who confessed to gang raping a Finnish tourist have heightened residents' growing outrage about violent crimes and further tarnished Honolulu's

image as a vacation paradise. The acquittals came just one week after Randall Saito — an admitted necrophiliac, a person with sexual attraction to corpses - was found innocent by reason of insanity in the stabbing death of 29year-old Sandra Yamashiro. The July 1979 attack occurred in the parking lot of Ala Moana Center, one of Honolulu's most popular shopping areas for residents and tourists.

Newspapers have been swamped with letters from angry citizens, protesters have demonstrated in the streets and tourism officials have set up programs aimed at combating crime.

March started off with the hijacking of a busload of Japanese tourists at Honolulu Airport. The 35 visitors, many of them honeymoon couples, were robbed of more than \$11,000 in cash and other valuables as a teen-ager held a gun to the bus driver's head.

Two teen-agers were arrested a few days later, and the stolen loot was returned to the victims, who in turn gave back \$17,600 they had been presented by local businesses and individuals. The Hawaii Visitors Bureau is using the money to reimburse other tourists who become victims of crime.

The carefree conditions in this highly touted vacation state took a pounding on Canadian television last fall when "The Fifth Estate," Canada's equivalent of CBS-TV's "60 Minutes," did a segment on Roger Clapham, a beekeeper from British Columbia who was beaten while

vacationing on the island of Kauai. Of the 10 men involved in the beating, only one defendant was charged, and he

was found innocent by a jury. Mounting pressure at home led to a visit from Harry Horne, Canada's consul general in San Francisco. Horne arrived to confer with Gov. George Ariyoshi in early November, just days after David Milne, 50, also of British Columbia, was a burglar in a rented apartment in Waikiki. There have been no arrests.

Last month, Honolulu's strained relations with the Canadian tourist market suffered another blow when the father of murder victim Colin Evans vowed "to do everything in my power" to keep fellow Canadians from visiting Hawaii.

Evans' beaten body was found last month at the base of a waterfall near downtown Honolulu. No arrests have

The gang-rape acquittals sent 1,500 people into the streets to demonstrate their outrage and anger with what they said was the failure of the criminal justice system. Some wore black clothing or black armbands.

One female protester said she would shoot and kill any man intent on rape "and then plead insanity," an apparent reference to Circuit Court Judge Harold Shintaku's decision to acquit Saito, who had admitted killing Miss Yamashiro.

The gang-rape case involved 10 youths who were arrested after a dental student from Finland, then 24, reported she was held down in a beachside tent 35 miles from Honolulu and repeatedly assaulted for hours on July 8, 1979.

Five of the accused were tried as juveniles and committed to the Hawaii Youth Correctional Facility. Charges against one youth were dropped when the woman could not identify him.

In statements entered as evidence during the trial, the four remaining defendants admitted forcing sex with the woman while she was being held down. Some members of the jury later complained they were never presented with the full text of the confessions

Other jurors defended their vote to acquit by saying they felt the prosecution failed to prove the woman had resisted sufficiently

After the verdict, the victim summed up her feelings by saying, "Your whole legal system is a big gamble. What's right and what's wrong really have nothing to do with it at all

INVESTORS' GUIDE

Q. I retired recently and expected to 'roll over' the money in my pension and profit-sharing plan into a special individual retirement account (IRA) so that income tax would be deferred until I start

withdrawing that money. I planned to do this through the bank which is trustee for my former employ-er's retirement fund. The bank's only suggestion was an IRA account paying 8 percent interest. That wouldn't even keep up with inflation.

Can you direct this eager and naive retiree toward IRAs with higher returns - no-load mutual funds, money market mutual funds, savings certificates etc.?

A. That bank's suggestion, no doubt; involved savings certificates. Almost all banks and savings and loan associations (S&Ls) offer IRA accounts with 8 percent certificates.

A fair number of banks and S&Ls. however, will put IRA ecounts into 30month and-or 182-day certificates. As I write this, 30-month certificates are paying 12 percent and 182-day certificates 13.8 percent. Some banks and S&Ls put IRAs into the higher-yielding certificates only when the customer asks. So, it pays to ask. And, if that one bank sticks to the 8 percent line, it certainly pays to shop around at other banks and S&Ls. For a higher, immediate yield, you should look at money market mutual funds. Just remember that money fund yields are not guaranteed for specific periods of time, as certificate yields are. The yields on money funds can rise or fall, from day to day, spending upon interest rates in the marketplace. Almost all money market funds are "no-load" - meaning you pay

Q. In July, 1977, a stock broker, who was a casual friend, induced me to buy stock at 14 5/8 - \$14.62 1/2 a share. He called me at home and at work two or three times a week and also wrote me letters, urging me to buy before the stock took off. He said he had positive inside

no commission charge.

information that I would make money The stock never rose above the price I paid. It went down. Now the company is in bankruptcy. The broker has never called me since the day he sold me that dog. Do I have any recourse against the

A. Your lament is typical of all too many people who bought stock, only to see its price go in the wrong direction. In most cases the answer is you're stuck and can't do a thing.

But yours may be an exception - if you saved the letters you say the broker wrote and if those letters state the broker was feeding you "inside information."

Trading on inside information fractures all the rules of full and prompt public disclosure. Lately, the Securities and Exchange Commission has hit a number of brokerage firms and individual brokers with charges of dealing in inside information.

If you turn over written evidence that the broker claimed to give you inside information, the SEC should nail that broker's hide to the wall.

It's more than unlikely that you will recover any of your loss. But you might get some mental satisfaction.

Q. Mexican banks offer very high rates of interest on one, two and threeyear deposits. If I put money into a Mexican bank, is it kept in U.S. dollars or is it converted into Mexican pesos? Is there any risk involved?

A. Of course the money would be converted into Mexican currency. If you send money to a Mexican bank, you will have on deposit there as many pesos as

your dollars buy. The inflation rate in Mexico is much worse than in the U.S. So, when you take money out of a Mexican bank, you can expect the pesos you withdraw to buy fewer dollars. Even after interest is add-

ed, you could end up a loser. That's the risk - a mighty big risk.

The fourth quarter opened with Marshall picking up several steals off its sniping defense. With 6:04 to go, Marshall tied it at 68 when Reggie Simmons hit a layup after a George Rodriguez blocked shot. The Rams kept going and, led by the Vittatoes, took a 84-79 with 1:27 to

Then Allen went to work, tapping in a missed free throw, hitting a soft turnaround jumper and adding six straight free throws for his 10 points in the final 55 seconds. He finished with 26 points

and 15 rebounds. On the defensive end of the court he picked up a blocked shot and an interception in the last 12 seconds to seal the





Tulsa's Quick Success Surprises Coach

Nolan Richardson, who won the 1980 junior college basketball crown at Western Texas College in Snyder, brought four of his stars with him to Tulsa and now has his sights set on the 1981 National Invitation Tournament title.

Tulsa, 24-7, takes on West Virginia, 23-8, in the opening semifinal of the 44th annual NIT tonight. In the second game, Syracuse, 21-22, will face Purdue, 20-10. The winners will meet for the title Wednesday night.

Richardson compiled a 37-0 record in winning the JUCO crown last year, then brought center Greg Stewart, guards Paul Pressey and Phil Spradling and forward David Brown with him. The result was an instant turnaround, from 8-19 a year ago to the best record in the school's history.

'We really had three teams," said Richardson. "We had the players who had been at Tulsa previously, the players who came over with me from Western Texas and the players I was able to recruit after getting the Tulsa job.'

That the Golden Hurricane came on as strong as it did surprised even Richardson.

"I knew that we had some talented players but I thought it might take awhile to get everything together," the 38-yearold coach reflected. "The key came when we beat Louis-

ville, the defending national champs.

"I've always thought that winning is a habit and losing is a habit. I felt that if I could get the four guys I brought with me to instill that winning spirit, it would catch on. When we beat Louisville (68-60 on Dec. 4 in the third game of the season) it brought everything together.'

The 6-9 Stewart leads Tulsa with 15.2 points and 6.6 re-bounds per game. Pressey, Brown, Spradling and Mike An-derson also have scoring averages in double figures. "We're not married to any system," said Richardson,

when asked about his team's style of play. "We've played slow and got beat, we've played fast and got beat. We'll try to speed it up, press, double-team, do whatever we can to take the other team out of its game.

Reaching the NIT's Final Four is a big boost for the Tulsa program, said senior forward Bob Stevenson.

'This is the second layer of icing on the cake for me," said Stevenson. "The first layer was doing so well in the Valley (tied for second in the Missouri Valley Conference) and getting into the tournament to start with. I hope we finished it off with some whipped cream and a cherry.

ATLANTA (AP) - Coach Terry Holland had some doubts that his fifthranked Virginia Cavaliers would reach the NCAA's Final Four after a devastating loss to Maryland in the Atlantic Coast Conference basketball tournament.

But three consecutive come-from-behind second-half rallies in the East Regional, including Saturday's 74-60 trouncing of No. 16 Brigham Young have projected the Ralph Sampson-led Cavaliers to a meeting with ACC rival North Carolina Saturday in Philadelphia in one of two semifinal round games for the national title.

Frankly, I was very concerned that the Maryland game might ruin us," Holland said Saturday after Virginia overcame a 31-28 halftime deficit to overpower BYU. "But we've got class players, and they mde a great comeback. They've sacrificed to get this far, but the next two

games are what really count." Virginia, 28-3, the ACC regular season on, received an 82-65 drubbing at the hands of Maryland in the league tournament but came back to edge Villanova 54-50 in the first round of the East Regional, then downed Tennessee 62-48 be-

fore the triumph over BYU, 25-7. The meeting with sixth-ranked North Carolina should be a classic between the two ACC powers despite Virginia taking both regular season meetings, a 63-57 decision at home and an 80-79 overtime victory at Chanel Hill

Would Holland had preferred meeting another team in the semifinal round?

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Some of the people on his Chaparral team spent a sleepless night of pseparation, but Johnny Rutherford kept them awake with a solid victory Sunday in the \$160,000 Kraco Jimmy Bryan 150 at Phoenix International Raceway.

Rutherford, who crashed spectacularly in the season finale here last November, didn't let the memory of that scary moment deter him from racing home more than a lap ahead of second-place Bobby Unser.

Team owner Jim Hall, the man who designed and built the "Yellow Submarine," the car in which Rutherford won last year's Indianapolis 500 and the national championship, didn't like the way the car ran when Rutherford qualified third on Saturday.

So, Hall, team engine-builder Mike Fanning and mechanic John Tuoanakis flew a private jet back to their shop in Midland, Texas, and worked through the night on engine parts.

"There's an object lesson there," Rutherford said with a smile, "Always have an owner with a private plane.

RCA Launches Newest Entry In Videodisc Battle

waiting, the battle for control of the home videodisc market is under way

RCA Corp. is the new entrant, throw ing itself into the fight with an opening barrage of network television ads Sunday to back its bet that videodiscs - records that provide pictures as well as sound will spread to most homes in America.

The RCA system, designed and made in America, will run head-on into one developed in Europe by the Dutch giant Philips. Waiting in the wings and slated to hit the market next year is a Japanese system developed by JVC Corp.

RCA has spent \$150 million developing the discs and players, and it will sink an additional \$20 million into what RCA Chairman Edgar Griffiths calls "the most extensive advertising and promotional effort in the company's history.' In addition to its TV ads, the company plans a big newspaper and magazine advertising campaign.

RCA is confidently predicting it will

the first year, figures that Philips officials find astonishing. Griffiths estimates that in the 1990s, the videodisc market will total \$7.5 billion a year.

To do that, it will have to spread to most homes, and become as prevalent as color television sets are now. "We have focused our product on the average television buyer," says Jack Sauter, the group vice president of RCA in charge of consumer electronics.

The initial RCA machine reflects that plan. It is priced at \$499.95, keeping a promise the player will cost under \$500. Originally, a price of under \$400 was promised, but rising costs made that ob-

By contrast, the Philips machine, sold in this country by Magnavox, a Philips subsidiary, and Pioneer, a Japanese firm, has a list price of \$700 to \$750. It has more features - such as freeze frame and slow motion - and is aimed at a different audience. It was introduced

tional distribution only last November. Through the end of 1980 only 25,000 machines had been sold

Both systems provide sharp, clear pictures, better than most regular television and all videotapes. The player is connected to a television set to play the discs.

Videodiscs are not cheap. The player is useless without discs, which cost \$15 to \$25 each for both systems. Movies, concerts, sports highlights and instruction in such fields as tennis are provided. And discs can be recorded only at the factory, unlike videotape, which can be used to tape programs off the air at home.

'Let's face it. This is a product you do not sell to a person barely scraping by making \$20,000 a year," says John Messerschmitt, a vice president of North American Philips who sees the total market as a limited one.

If Messerschmitt is right, RCA may be badly miscalculating. To keep the price down, it decided to sell the first

players with monaural sound, while Philips machines all have stereo that can be hooked into a component stereo system.

RCA plans to introduce stereo as an option sometime next year, but officials say they are convinced buyers will not care. "This is being aimed at the demographics of the consumer that buys a color TV set," says Roy Pollack, executive vice president of RCA. "It's not the same as an audiophile

Since TV sets do not have stereo, adds Herbert Schlosser, the former president of NBC who is in charge of programs for the RCA videodisc system, be saying to the consumer, 'Move your TV set next to your stereo.

RCA thinks a lot of videodisc buyers will have never considered videotape recorders, which typically cost \$700 and up and use blank tapes priced at \$15 and more and pre-recorded tapes costing far more than videodiscs. Philips, on the other hand, says 95 percent of its videodisc customers also have videotape recor-

The RCA and Philips technologies are based on totally different technologies, and discs playable on one are useless on the other. The JVC system uses technology similar to RCA's, but it is also incom-

As a result, some would-be buyers may prefer to wait a few years, on the assumption that one or two of the systems will be withdrawn and owners will be left out in the cold, with no new discs availa-

Each system is therefore trumpeting its allies. RCA boasts that it has signed up companies that control 60 percent of the color TV market, including Zenith, Sears, Montgomery Ward, Sanyo, Hitachi and Radio Shack, and notes that CBS will make discs for the RCA system.

JVC has signed up General Electric. Philips has signed deals with MCA, the owner of Universal Pictures and a key participant in development of its system, Pioneer and International Business Machines. IBM was attracted by the fact the Philips system can easily be used to store printed information.

One thing RCA has going for it is marketing muscle that has gained new respect since the company took over the No. 1 position in videotape recorders, surpassing Sony, the inventor of the recorders. The VHS format sold by RCA and others now commands about 60 percent of the total market, compared to 40 percent for the Beta system Sony and its a little tarnished. It pioneered both black-and-white and color television, only to lose advantages in those markets. But it has taken back the lead in blackand-white sets, and is running neck-andneck with Zenith in the color market

RCA says about 5,000 of its best television dealers will be selling the videodisc players and discs.

Messerschmidt says RCA's marketing blitz does not bother him. "We have the feeling that once RCA spends the money to introduce the videodisc, people will do the comparison shopping and make the proper conclusion." he says.

That comment illustrates one major difference in marketing. Philips generally advertises the features of its players, while RCA concentrates on the programs available, known as "software" in the in-The Philips system, known as Laser-

vision, uses lasers to read information from silvery discs. Because the laser goes through the protective coating, the discs are relatively immune to damage and retailers take delight in dropping them on the floor and stepping on them. The RCA discs, by contrast, are black

and play with a needle. Because they are vulnerable to dust and dirt, they come in protective "caddies" that insert the disc into the player and retrieve it in a way to keep people from touching it. 'They're dealing with a stylus," sniffs



The three singers, all in jolly spirit after an Avery Fisher Hall orchestra rehearsal conducted by Richard Bonynge, Miss Sutherland's husband, have been warm friends and colleagues for some

Miss Sutherland, a star in Europe, and Miss Horne, an unknown, made their highly acclaimed New York debuts together, at Town Hall, in a concert performance of "Beatrice di Tenda" in 1961.

Pavarotti, singing bel canto and hitting eight high Cs, became the overnight toast of the town and the nation opposite Miss Sutherland in "The Daughter of the Regiment" at the Metropolian Opera in

But all three have been too acclaimed and in too much demand worldwide for any two of them to have run their careers as a team. "Our lives have crisscrossed," Miss Sutherland said.

Pavarotti recalled celebrating "beau-

tifully" his 30th birthday in Brisbane on the 14-week tour of Australia he made with the Bonynges in 1965. "It was 45 nights of pleasure for me.

"In the same day, Joan sang - full voice - the final dress rehearsal of 'La Sonnambula' and 'La Traviata.' I thought, 'Let me try to see if I can do it.' I think I was strangled in the middle of the second thing. She went over the two things like drinking a glass of water."

Miss Sutherland reminded Miss Horne of a "Semiramide," an opera they often sang together, in Boston, when Miss Horne sang the warrior, in beard and mustache, six months pregnant. Miss Horne, who used a copy of Pavarotti's autobiography as a back cushion during the interview, replied, "I can't write a book. I'm too nice to say all the things I want to say." She laughed at her own remark and Miss Sutherland's, and added, 'Honey, if you can't laugh at yourself in this business, you're dead.'

Miss Sutherland and Miss Horne will sing in "Norma" — as they did at Miss Horne's Met debut in 1969 — at the San Francisco Opera in 1982. It will be their

first "Norma" together in 12 years. Miss Horne said, "I'm opening San Francisco's season next fall in 'Semiram-ide,' with Richard conducting. Joan has deserted us. We found a young kid we think is going to make it named Ca-

Dear Joyce: I saw your column on dentistry. What options are there in the dental field for people who don't want the grind and expense of dental school? - B. F., Phoenix, Ariz.

Dental assistants perform a range of duties that include clerical tasks, patient counseling and assisting during surgery. Though it's still possible to enter the field simply with on-job training, dentists increasingly prefer to hire certified graduates of one or two-year programs.

Average starting salary nationwide is about \$8,000; salaries for experienced assistants range between \$12,000 and \$15.-000. Most moving-up options require additional schooling.

To locate jobs. Bobbie de Laviada of the American Dental Assistants' Association suggests contacting local dental supply houses. Because their representatives



The Enquirer printed a story in its April 8, 1980, issue that called Feller "a shameless moocher" who is "living on Also named as an unidentified "John

Doe" in the suit is a Cleveland sports writer who Feller says furnished "false and defamatory information" to the Enquirer. Feller works in the Indians front office making personal appearances and

presently is an instructor at the team's spring training camp in Tucson, Ariz. Feller asked for a jury trial when he filed the suit in Cuyahoga County Com-

mon Pleas Court, where it was assigned to Judge Robert M. Lawther. He said in the suit that at the time of the article's publication, he had been employed by the Hilton Hotels Corp. as director of sports sales at a salary of \$15,-

000 per year. His suit also said that the defendants knew or could have determined when the story was written that their statements

were untrue. "It was a story concerning a lot of things, including that I was padding my expense account, bumming meals in restaurants and living on handouts, and they

are going to have to prove it.
