Mr. Driskill retired from the grocery business, and Mrs. Driskill remained as manager of the store until she retired in 1954. Mr. Driskill is deceased.

She has been active in many organizations throughout the years, and is still active in the Delphian Club, B&PW Club, a member of the United Methodist Church, Shady Oaks Recreation A.S.N. Inc., Callahan Co. Historical Society, past Director of the Baird Chamber of Commerce, and sponsor of the Beta Sigma Phi Sorority.

Mrs. Driskill remains busy in school activities since her nephew, Mike Simons, who makes his home with her, is an eighth grade student at Baird Junior High and participates in various school activities.

## Rudy Palmer To Speak at Clyde Chamber of Commerce Banquet

CLYDE — Rudy Palmer, Regional Manager of CIC Cosmetics International Corporation in Abilene, will speak at the Clyde Chamber of Commerce first annual banquet, Saturday at 7:30 p. m. in the Clyde School Cafeteria.

Mr. Palmer is a native of Arkansas, where he attended school. He was named to the Arkansas All-State baseball team while in high school. ## Cong. Omar Burleson Favors Brazos River Protection Agency

WASHINGTON — Congressman Omar Burleson announces approval of a \$75,000.00 Environmental Protection Agency grant to the Brazos River Authority for Water Quality Management Planning.

The purpose of the study is to develop a basin-wide water quality management plan for the Brazos Basin and adjoining coastal areas, comprising about one-sixth of the area of Texas. Callahan County is one of 68 in the Basin. The study is to be financed half by State and local funds and half by this Federal grant, under the Federal Water Pollution Control Act.

The desirability of having an effective plan throughout the basin is fully realized by all concerned. The urgency of developing such a plan has been emphasized by Federal regulations requiring that sewage systems built with Federal assistance

in the future must be consistent with basin-wide water quality management plans; if such basin-wide plans are not in existence, the proposed sewage treatment facilities will not be eligible for Federal grants to assist in paying construction costs.

Congressman Burleson expressed gratification at the approval of the grant, having made personal contacts with the EPA Administrator in behalf of the Brazos River Authority request.

## Clyde Bulldogs Upset High Ranked Haskell Indians Friday, 29-12

CLYDE — The Clyde Bulldogs rallied from a 3-8 halftime deficit to blast the state ranked Haskell Indians 29-12, in one of the bigger upsets in the state. Tommy Bailey kicked a 28-yard fieldgoal in the first quarter for Clyde, but the Indians came back in the second behind the running of Jackie Young, areas leading scorer.

The Bulldogs exploded on offense immediately after the half, as quarterback Ruben Ramos went 70 yards on a keeper for the first touchdown. Bailey kicked the point after. Gary Barr hit right guard for the 2nd TD, capping a 46-yard drive. Ricky Loper went over right guard for the 3rd score, which topped off a 33-yard drive, set in motion by a 27-yard punt return by John Bonine. Bailey kicked the point after.

In the 4th quarter, Haskell launched a 55-yard drive with Young scoring from the 1-foot line. Haskell's run for 2 points was stopped short. The defensive team closed out the scoring for Clyde when linebacker Barr picked off a stray Haskell pass and returned it 55 yards for the last Bulldog tally. The

extra point was wide. Bulldog defense kept Haskell on their end of the field most of the night, as Alan Holcomb punted only once for 32 yards from Haskell's 41-yard line. The Indians punted 5 times, 3 of which were from out of their own end zone. The defense held the touted Jackie Young to only 27 yards, and the entire Indian offense to 10 first downs and 168 yards. Clyde amassed 14 1st downs and 263 yards.

Blocking awards went to Iky Akers, Robbie Tucker, David Dunn and Kinny Mitchell. The tackling award winners were Johnny York, Barr and Tucker. Selan Canada and Barr intercepted passes and Timmy Payne gathered in a fumble.

Excellent play was also turned in by Jackie Fleming, Montia Setzler, Jon Stacy and David Edwards.

Clyde travels to Comanche this Friday to battle more Indians in a District 9AA opener at 7:30 p. m. Comanche was open last week after scoring AAA Lampasas 14-21 the week before. Another tough ballgame is in store for the Bulldogs this week.

## Bears Tune Out Plowboys, 40-0 In Homecoming Game Friday Night

BAIRD — The Baird Bears welcomed the Ex-Students and fans to the Bears Den Friday night, and began Homecoming activities with a victory over the Roscoe Ployboys by a score of 40-0.

The first quarter ended with no score on the board, but the powerful Bears came on with strength and spirit in the 2nd quarter, with a 70-yard run by Danny Vestal to put the first 6 points on the board. Jay Reeves added the extra point.

The remainder of the game belonged to the Bears as Reeves scored from one yard out, and Bill Hatchett on a beautiful 55-yard pass from Reeves.

Jimmy Meador, a strong standout for the Bears, put three touchdowns up in lights by going over twice from one yard, and a 45 yard run. Reeves extra points ran up except for one blocked by an alert Roscoe Plowboy.


