

## New Petition For Alcohol Election

A petition calling for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages, off premises only for the city of Baird was issued Tuesday by Callahan County Clerk, Mrs. C. L. Robinson after an application bearing the required number of signatures was filed in her office.

The petition was being distributed in Baird Wednesday, it was reported. A ruling Monday by the Callahan County commissioners Court set the required number of signatures on the election petition at approximately 150 names. The petition bearing the required number of signatures of qualified voters must be returned to the clerk's office for filing by Tuesday, November 8, in order for an election to be ordered by the Commissioners Court. The new petition is said to replace one issued earlier calling for the sale of all alcoholic beverages in Baird with no reference to off premises consumption.

Signers of the new application for petition were Alvis Dill, Atrelle Dill, C. K. Meadows, Frank Mendez, J. C. Collins, Ernest Bransford, C. D. Strange, Myrtle Strange, Archie Nobles and Joe Tollett.

Spokesmen for those signing the application said that their names on the application did not necessarily mean that they were for the proposition, but they were seeking to allow everyone a right to vote on the issue.

It was nine minutes deep in the second quarter before the Bears were able to make a score stand up. They had two touchdowns called back in the first quarter, both of them by Cotton Barnes. The first touchdown was nullified by a 15 yard penalty, and the second was erased when the referee lost the ball and whistled it dead before the play ended. Barnes had faked well to Higgins who was stopped at the line of scrimmage by a hard hitting Badger defender, while Barnes went on into the end zone. The referee was confused on the handoff, as were many of the fans and blew his whistle on Higgins. The Badgers took over to end the first quarter threat.

In the second period Barnes scored from the five yard line to end a drive which started on the Baird 37. Barnes sparked the scoring drive with a 33 yard scamper. He passed to End Jud Gilliland for the two extra points. The half ended with Baird in the lead 8-0.

## Bids On Turkey Creek Projects Opened

DePauw is an experienced contractor, having built floodwater retarding structures on Brady Creek and the Washita in Oklahoma.

It is expected that the contract will be officially awarded within the next few days. Work will begin within 20 days of awarding and is scheduled for completion within 247 calendar days.

The contract will provide for two earthen floodwater retarding structures that will involve approximately 260,000 cubic yards of earth fill material. Ralph W. White, Project Construction Engineer with the Soil Conservation Service at Brownwood, will supervise the construction according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist.

The substance that makes cotton squares appetizing to boll weevils has been found for the first time in a water extract of

the cotton plant, and Dr. Fowler G. Maxwell, a graduate of Clyde High School, was one of two Department of Agriculture entomologists who were successful in extracting the substance from the cotton plant.

#### WINTER COVER CROP

This is a good time for farmers to think about improving their cropland and protecting it from wind and water erosion. Through the Agricultural Conservation Program a producer may secure Federal cost-share assistance, up to 50 per cent, for helping him establish a winter cover crop practice on his farm. Pasturing consistent with good management is permitted, but none of the growth may be harvested for seed, hay, silage or cut for green grass forage.

Winter cover crop practices available under the ACP this year are, seeding rye alone to protect cropland susceptible to wind erosion and seeding vetch and winter peas, with or without a nurse crop, with fertilizer being used with the latter practice.

Protect and build your land for the future by contacting the ASCS office for additional information on cover crops.

### GRAZING DIVERTED ACRES

Farmers and ranchers are advised that restrictions on grazing designated diverted acreage under the 1963 Feed Grain or Wheat Stabilization Programs are removed effective November 1, 1962, except that this action shall not be applicable to acreage on which a grain crop has matured in 1962. To our knowledge no grain matured on designated acreage in this county this year, therefore the acreage may be grazed as of November 1, 1962.

### IT'S THE LAW In Texas . . .

#### WAGE EARNER'S PLAN

There is an alternative to bankruptcy. Relief from constant harassment by creditors and threats of suits and garnishment of bank accounts can be found by the filing of a Wage Earner's Plan in the federal district court under Chapter XIII of the Bankruptcy Act.

A debtor can request the court to stop all suits and garnishments during a three-year period while he pays into the court each month sufficient money to satisfy all of his debts over this extended period of time.

A Wage Earner's Plan has certain advantages over bankruptcy:

There is no stigma of having avoided one's debts. Every creditor is paid in full.

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR . . .

Dear Sir:

We wish to state our position in regards to the liquor traffic problem. From our first general assembly in 1905 to our 58th assembly in 1960, the church has taken a stand against liquors and strong drinks and believe in total abstinence.

The requirement for members and ministers is that they do not buy or sell, and that they oppose all who do.

When a person becomes a member of the Church of God, he accepts our teaching and discipline, and is automatically against the traffic of liquor and strong drink.

A debtor is taught, under court supervision, to reserve a certain amount each day to go to his creditors; and he is not allowed to purchase anything on credit during the time the plan is in effect.

A debtor is allowed to keep his mortgaged property unless the court decides it is too expensive for his income.

A person who has filed bankruptcy within six years and is again being pressed by his creditors, may file a Wage Earner's

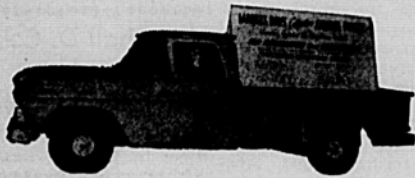
Plan. The law does not permit him to go into bankruptcy within this six year period.

It is also possible to pay less than the full amount of one's debts. If a debtor simply does not have enough money to live on and still pay his obligation in full, it is possible to pay 50 per cent or 60 per cent of the amount he owes to each creditor and then receive a discharge of the balance by the court after the Wage Earner's Plan is completed.
