## News of Baird PEOPLE & THINGS

GUESS MOST OF the town will be closed for the Labor Day holiday. The folks at the bank and the court house plan to take the day off, and this is one of those rare occasions when newspaper people can possibly take the day off. A good rain between now and the week end would give us all cause to celebrate.

THE EXTREMELY dry months of June, July and August have created quite a hazard in the rural areas. The grass is tinder dry and the least little spark can set a roaring blaze. Last Thursday (one of those few days when there were promising looking clouds) lightning struck in the canyons north and west of town and set fire to grass. Before the fighters got it under control it had burned off some 50 acres on Col. Dyer's place and approximately 100 acres on the McFarlane Ranch. There is rarely ever a shortage of fire fighters when a grass fire is discovered. City folks join rural folks in battling the blaze.

WITH DOVE SEASON due to start next week, we would like to caution hunters to respect their rural neighbors. Watch smoking and be sure that there is no fire smoldering when you leave a spot. Fishermen need to be careful and motorists should never throw lighted cigarettes or cigars from car windows. Fire not only damages pastures, but it destroys wildlife. In many instances it destroys buildings, fence and other improvements. Please be careful.

THE RAY BLACKS took a trip to Fort Worth a couple of days last week. They took their three daughters on a tour of Forest Park Zoo and then on to Six Flags—all in the same day. We can imagine how Mr. and Mrs. must have felt following three lively daughters through Forrest Park and Six Flags in the same day.

READ THE OTHER day in a neighboring newspaper that Callahan County Hospital lost slightly over \$12,000 during the first six months of operation in 1963. We started a little personal checking, and found that the figure was true, but that they need a little explanation. A look at the improved condition of the hospital will show that some of the \$12,000 went into permanent improvements. A look at the store room will show that there is a much larger stock of medicines, supplies and implements which account for more of the \$12,000 deficit. A look at the operating room and nurses stations will show a number of additions to the equipment designed to safeguard the lives of patients. This accounts for a portion of the \$12,000 loss. Another item which accounted for a great portion of the loss was the care of indigent patients—those in the county who are unable to pay their own hospital bills. That is always a major problem, and one that has confronted the hospital for many years.

THE CALLAHAN County hospital is an asset to the town and the county. More Callahan County residents should go by and look it over. If more Callahan County people went by and looked the place over, more Callahan County people would use its modern facilities, and if more Callahan County people would take advantage of the facilities, the deficit would be a great deal less. A recent audit of the hospital books showed things in pretty good shape. We believe that the board should consider publishing regular financial statements showing the people where the money goes. It would tend to build confidence. Callahan County is fortunate that there isn't a hospital tax. Most counties which operate a hospital have from 50 cents to \$1.00 per \$100 valuation assessed for hospital operation.

## United Fund Aids In Fight To Control Cancer At All Levels

From time to time until the beginning of the United Fund Campaign, and during the campaign, stories on the various agencies supported by the Baird United Fund will be released. The story in this issue concerns the Cancer fund, which is included in the campaign.

The Cancer fund is divided between local cases and the research center at M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute in Houston.

During the past year the local cancer organization, working through the Baird United Fund, spent \$227 on local cases. Two patients received the benefit of the fund.

The Baird United Fund sent \$200 to the Houston research center and received the following letter from Dr. R. Lee Clark, director:

"Your correspondence with Mr. Joe E. Boyd, Jr., our Administrator, and the check in the amount of \$200.00 which the Baird Cancer Fund has sent to

us have been brought to my attention, and I wish to express our deep appreciation to you and the other members of your Board. We are placing your donation in an account entitled "Baird United Fund for Cancer Research" and are advising the Board of Regents of The University of Texas of its receipt.

Through you, we wish to assure the Baird Cancer Fund that its gift will serve a most worthwhile purpose. We are confronted with almost daily urgent needs for items of equipment or supplies, to permit the initiation or continuation of important research projects. For such needs, immediately available funds, such as your gift, provide invaluable assistance.

We are deeply grateful for your gift and for the confidence which you and your Board have thus expressed in our efforts."

## Change In Grazing Laws Are Announced

Mr. Tommie Harris, Chairman of the Callahan County ASC Committee, announced today that farmers who signed up and diverted acreage under either the Wheat Stabilization Program or Feed Grain Program, may begin grazing the diverted acreage on October 1, 1963. This is thirty days earlier than the previously established date.

He also pointed out that this does not permit the grazing of acreage that is in the Conservation Reserve (Soil Bank) Program.

Mr. Harris further stated that before producers would be permitted to graze diverted acreage at an earlier date, the county would have to be declared a disaster area, and in this case, a reduction in payment must be made.

## Seminar To Be Held At Cisco Jr. College

Cisco Junior College is one of five schools throughout Texas that has been selected by the Texas Education Agency as a center for a state-wide Small School Seminar Project, according to announcement this week from Austin.

The seminar project calls for work with gifted students during 18 sessions in the coming school year, it reported by President Grady Hogue of CJC. Students who will participate in the program will be selected on the basis of their intelligence quotient. Only those who score 115 or better on special IQ tests will be considered for the seminar project, Hogue added.

R. B. Golemon, head of the music department at CJC, has been named the instructor-coordinator for the Cisco seminar series.

Schools that will send a maximum of five students each to the seminar sessions and superintendents are: Priddy, H. E. Culp; Huckaby, W. C. Nix; Moran, Robert Hunt; Putnam, R. W. Reynolds; and Zephyr, Richard Purvis.

The initial or organizational meeting will be a gathering of the five superintendents at the CJC library at 7 p.m. Tuesday, August 27, Hogue said. A schedule for the seminar sessions with the students will be worked out at that time, he added.

The objective of the seminar sessions, as outlined by Charles Bitters of the Texas Education Agency, director of the small school project, was given as "to provide intellectual stimulation and debate with intellectual peers." In addition, the students will be encouraged to take part in intellectual discussions.

Hogue further stated that participation would be limited to the top 10% of the Juniors and seniors of the participating schools.

"Participation in the program is an honor that we of Cisco Junior College sincerely appreciate," Hogue said. CJC was selected on the basis of its facilities, faculty and curriculum as well as its geographical location.

The Texas Education Agency regularly inspects the facilities and records of CJC as well as other schools receiving state aid, Hogue said.

CJC is a member of the Texas and Southern associations of colleges and schools, and is classified by the Texas Educational Agency as a college of first rating.

Students are now being pre-enrolled for the 1963-64 school year, which begins Sept. 9.

### Mercury Lights Added To Town

Baird is one of the best lighted towns in Texas for its size and part of this is caused by the efforts of organizations and citizens who have purchased lights and donated them to the city.

The Church of Christ and the Methodist Church were the first to improve the lighting conditions by contributing two Mercury Street Lights. Recently J. W. Loper and R. C. Wristen bought and paid for a Mercury Street Light for the J. T. Loper corner.

These lights have made considerable improvement in the lighting of the streets where they are located and others have indicated they are considering furnishing lights to improve their areas.

The Mercury Street Light is an improvement over the old type of Street Lights which are being replaced as rapidly as possible. The high cost of this type prevents the replacement of the old type except on a gradual basis.

Very few towns the size of Baird have as many street lights or are anyway near as well lighted as Baird and it is something to be proud of.

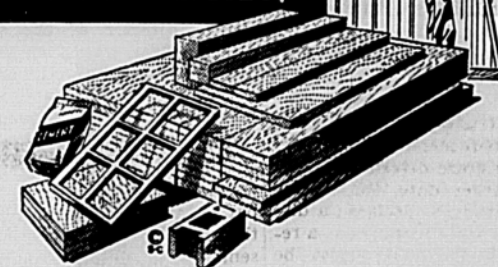

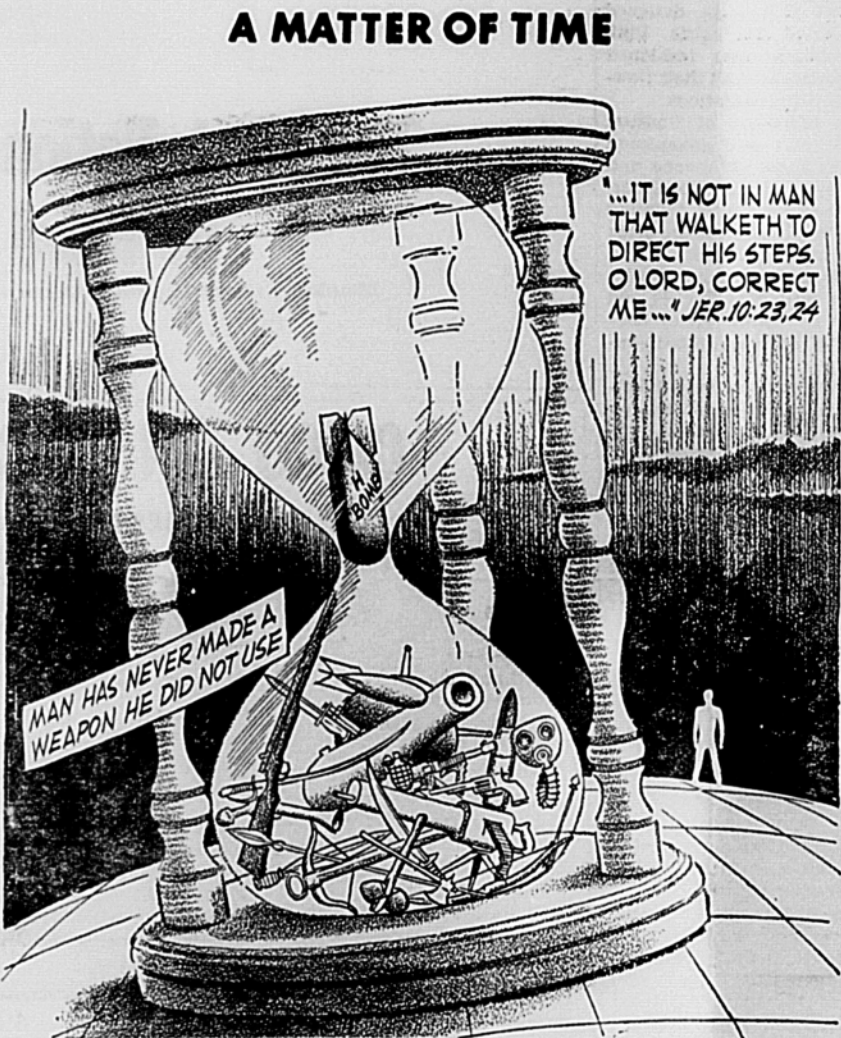
