Christmas joy branching out in Midland's Centennial Park

In Cloudercroft, N.M., they make their Christmas trees the old-fashioned way — they grow them.

But here in tree-less West Texas, that option isn't available, so the Parks and Recreation Department makes its tree the new-fashioned way — it builds one.

"We've been doing it since 1968," said Recreation Supervisor Ronee Robinett of the 70-foot Christmas tree under construc-

tion in Centennial Park.

With the help of the Midland Jaycees, the Parks and Recreation Department obtains 320 genuine Douglas fir limbs from Cloudercroft, attaches them to a 70-foot oil pipe which has been planted upright in Centennial Plaza, and throws on 2,500 sparkling lights. And if the resulting Christmas tree isn't quite what nature intended, it will do until the real thing comes along.

"It's something we like to do for the community, and it's not commercialized," said Ms. Robinett. "We hope everyone comes to the official lighting."

That annual event will be held Friday at 6 p.m. when Mayor G. Thane Akins will throw the switch and light up the tree. Parks and Recreation Commissioner Karl Regan will act as master of ceremonies for the entertainment, which will include performances by the Sashaway Square Dance Club and the Greenwood High School Band.

Santa Claus will be on hand to visit with the children, and the Midland Jaycees will be serving free hot chocolate. There will be free pony rides and a drawing for two bicycles for children under 12.

Fatal accident

Salvadoran officials, guerrillas fail to agree on holiday truce

AVAGUAILO, El Salvador — AP Government and left-wing guerrilla negotiators met for 12 hours Friday in a second round of peace talks that could not agree on a Christmas truce or other concrete measures, a war communiqué indicated.

The brief communiqué, read by Monsignor Arturo Rivera Damas, the Roman Catholic archbishop of San Salvador, said, however, that both sides had agreed to the free movement of traffic in El Salvador from Dec. 22 to Jan. 3. It also said the government and rebel representatives agreed to meet again on the date of cessation was given.

Julio Adolfo Rey, President of the head of the government team, said his group had proposed a Christmas truce, but the rebels rejected it. He was asked about a third meeting and said the government would propose a date. No details were given about the agreement on the free flow of traffic during the holiday period.

Three overcome by tanker's fumes

A man who climbed into a tanker Friday afternoon to change a valve and was overcome by poisonous fumes and two other roustabouts who tried to rescue him and also passed out were listed in critical condition Friday night at Midland Memorial Hospital.

Jack Burkes, 43, owner of Permian Petroleum, and employees, Floyd Lindsey, 38, and John Walker, 40, age available, remained in the criti-

cal condition at Midland Memorial Hospital.

The three apparently were passing out in the tanker for 20 to 40 minutes before being rescued, according to a Midland County Sheriff's office spokesman.

"I really can't say enough about these firemen who got these men out," said Eddie Klatt, Midland Central Fire Department battalion chief. "They had a lot of help. There were a lot of people out there, including a

drilling crew, and we appreciate their help in saving them."

According to reports made by Dean Cook, investigating officer from the sheriff's office, one man climbed into the tank on the crude oil transport which the group was emptying at about 1 p.m. at a well site two miles north of the intersection of County Road 1065 and County Road 180. The man was trying to tighten or replace a valve, reports indicated.

Synfuels program fizzles out after blazing start

WASHINGTON — The nation's synthetic fuels program, launched four years ago with the bright hope of freeing the United States from dependence on foreign oil, has all but fizzled out.

The Reagan administration and some members of Congress this year tried to kill the Synthetic Fuels Corporation, the quasi-government agency created to spur synfuels development, but it won a new lease on life at a sharply-reduced funding level.

Congress became disenchanted with the synfuels program as the oil shortage of 1979 turned into a glut,

planned projects were abandoned and scandal plagued SFC's management.

For much of this year, SFC's depleted board was unable to obligate funds or conduct other business because it could not summon a quorum.

Victor M. Thompson Jr., a Tulsa banker, in April became the second president to depart amid charges of ethics violations. Victor A. Schroeder, a Georgia developer, resigned the presidency in August, 1983, but remains on the board. Both men are former associates of Edward Noble, the Tulsa oil man and developer who is chairman of SFC.

President Reagan last Wednesday made three "recess appointments"

to the board, bringing the number of members to five, enough to constitute a quorum of the seven-member body. But it appears the bickering, charges and counter-charges will continue.

NOBLE ACTED Thursday to again take control of the agency, asking the board to name Norman Callner, a vice president of Houston Natural Gas Co.'s synthetic fuels subsidiary, the agency's new president.

Rep. Tom Corcoran, R-Ill., one of the president's new appointees, immediately advised the board to go slow. Corcoran's designation as a "part-time" board member would permit him also to become a full-time administrator at a six-figure salary instead of the five-digit salary a board member receives. He has

indicated he will seek such a position.

Appointed with Corcoran, who gave up his House seat this year to run unsuccessfully for the Senate, were Paul W. MacAvoy, dean of the Graduate School of Management at the University of Rochester and a member of President Ford's Council of Economic Advisers, and Eric Reichl, an engineer who has a reputation as a strong supporter of an aggressive synthetic fuels program.

As recess appointees the three will be allowed to serve through December, 1985, without Senate confirmation.

Corcoran introduced a bill to kill the Synfuels Corporation but later he said he saw the bill as only "a device to generate a review and

some oversight.

NOBLE ALSO has had to fight charges that he is trying to kill the agency. As a Senate candidate from Oklahoma and in 1980 and as a member of the Reagan transition team that year, he urged that the corporation be disbanded.

"He claims to have been converted," said a House leadership aide who asked not to be identified. "They go into this tent and come out faith healed, but I remain skeptical."

Some in Congress believe Noble has dug in to fight for the agency because of a reluctance to walk away from a perceived failure. "It's going to get bloodier," predicted an aide to an Oklahoma congressman.

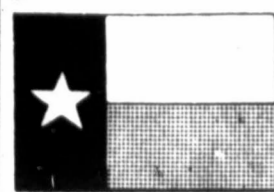

Austin sends companies slow-growth message

AUSTIN (AP) — The Austin City Council has authorized preparation of a plan for slower, more controlled growth in this booming Central Texas city.

Major companies throughout the nation will be informed that the city may not be able to provide utility services unless the firms contact the city before choosing a relocation or expansion site in Austin.

The plan prepared by the city staff will be brought back to the council for final action.

A slow-growth proposal by councilman Roger Duncan was endorsed by fellow council members Thursday.

"I'm very pleased that it was a unanimous vote," Duncan said. "In my opinion it is a message for slow growth. It should slow down the rate of growth in some sections of the city."

The plan was endorsed previously by some neighborhood and environmental groups.

Duncan's motion told the staff to determine how much city utility service and road capacity are available each year through 2010 under cur-

rent funding and construction schedules.

The plan would limit the sale of city services to what is available.

"This will keep us out of the Williamson Creek situation," Duncan said, referring to the overloaded sewage treatment plant in southeast Austin where the city allocated more service from the plant than was available. The plant overflowed and the city had to pay a \$100,000 fine for polluting Williamson Creek and the Colorado River.

In another instance, Duncan said, the city council was surprised when 3M Co. bought land northwest of Austin, miles away from available city sewer service. The city is now developing a plan to provide sewer service to the major industrial site, although voters voted down construction of a new sewage treatment plant on Lake Travis.

Duncan said the point of the letter to the 500 largest manufacturers in the nation was "to say you need to contact the city before you choose a site in Austin or we cannot guarantee utility service in a timely manner."

FBI: Abortion clinics targeted by group

EL PASO (AP) — Texas abortion clinics and family planning agencies have been warned by the FBI that they may be targeted for attack, following threatening phone calls from someone claiming to represent the Army of God, a shadowy group of anti-abortion terrorists.

The caller said the group, which has claimed responsibility for several abortion and family planning clinic bombings in the East and Midwest, planned to expand its activities to four unidentified Texas cities, said Ron Hoverson, agent-in-charge of the El Paso FBI office.

"They have made threats that they will target four Texas cities," Hoverson said Thursday of the calls received by out-of-state FBI offices last week. "We want to be sure everyone is aware of this potential."

He said FBI agents were taking the precaution of warning abortion and family planning clinics statewide to report any threats or suspicious activity at their offices.

"The Army of God is an anti-abortion group that has claimed credit for past bombings, but not in this part of the country," Hoverson said. "To our knowledge, they have not taken any violent action in the Southwest."

In addition to claiming responsibility for the bombings of abortion clinics and family planning agencies, the Army of God was involved two years ago in the abduction of an Illinois doctor who performed abortions, Hoverson said. The physician later was released.

Ray Silva, director of the Planned Parenthood El Paso chapter, said that the organization's national office also has issued warnings about possible terrorist action.

Included in a recent warning from the national Planned Parenthood office was a list of 18 family planning clinics that either were bombed, burned or vandalized between January and September of this year, Silva said.

The list did not include recent bombings, such as one that leveled a Washington family planning clinic this month, Silva said.

"We're not paranoid or anything, just cautious," he said. "There's no telling what deranged people will do."

Silva said he hoped publicity about bomb threats would not deter people from seeking family planning services.

Closing of clinic leaves 70 addicts on the street

HOUSTON (AP) — As many as 70 people trying to kick heroin addiction were left on their own Friday when a public clinic closed because its state funding was canceled, a physician said.

"There's a possibility that some of them will go back to heroin now and, with that, to some kind of illegal activity to support it. That's the tragic part," said Dr. Jack Gordon. He is head of clinical research for the Texas Research Institute of Mental Sciences, which operated the clinic.

The clinic, which has been providing methadone treatment and counseling to heroin victims for

the past 12 years, was told by the Texas Department of Community Affairs two months ago its state funding would be cancelled.

"We were planning to continue our program but there's been a tightening of money all the way around," Gordon said.

Most of the 324 patients treated by the clinic have been placed in other treatment programs in the Houston area, but about 70 will have no place to go because they can't afford private clinics, Gordon said.

The clinic was the only public facility of its kind in Houston.

Man 'in no hurry' to sell one of hottest properties near Dallas

BUCKINGHAM (AP) — John Pappas paid about \$12,000 for his home in this Dallas suburb 16 years ago. Today, he's got one of the hottest pieces of land in fast-growing Dallas.

Pappas watched as almost all of his neighbors agreed to sell their homes to two developers trying to buy the whole town for a massive project.

Now he's holding out to get as much as he can.

"I knew someday this would be one hot piece of land," Pappas said. "I'm in no hurry. I'll just wait awhile and let them have it at the square inch."

Pappas is one of three homeowners who have yet to sell their land to the Buckingham Development Venture, the company that plans to

replace the community's 155 acres with a offices, restaurants, shops and town homes.

Last week, 12 families agreed to sell their property and received between \$500,000 to \$600,000 each. One resident, who requested anonymity, said that price was double what 49 other families had received.

Buckingham Development Venture, a partnership between Block Shim Development Co. and Wen-Clay International, had planned to start work this fall on developing the land.

But spokesman Steve Torrance said the company now expects to complete the final planning for the project by January.

The project now hinges on the holdouts and on acquiring water and sewer services for Buckingham,

which is surrounded by Richardson, another suburb.

Richardson officials, angry that Buckingham voted wet in a liquor referendum, has declined to provide city services after 1987 and has opposed Garland's offer to do so.

Others who have yet to sell include town alderman Clardy Hamilton and Charles Easley, who leases his property.

Hamilton said he too, will sell his 2-acre lot, but he prefers to trade for other land. After living in the same house for 22 years, he said, it will not be easy finding one he likes.

Easley, who lives in Atlanta, Ga., has leased his house for 15 years, neighbors said.

The 49 other families who have sold their homes already have moved out.

Court asks for more data in carrier case

HOUSTON (AP) — A state appeals court says it needs more information before deciding whether to order the release of a Houston woman jailed for 2½ months for refusing to testify against her stepson before a grand jury investigating the slaying of a female postal worker.

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals in Austin said State District Judge I.D. McMaster failed to fully comply with an earlier request for a transcript of a Nov. 9 hearing during which the judge refused to release Odette Port from the Harris County jail.

"We are informed that because a court reporter was not then available there is no record of that proceeding," the appeals court said.

The court on Thursday ordered

McMaster to send a certified copy of the order refusing to free Mrs. Port and a letter outlining explaining his reasons by Dec. 10.

Mrs. Port is being held on a contempt citation for refusing to answer six of some 200 questions concerning the shooting death of postal worker Deborah Sue Schatz, who disappeared June 7 while delivering mail in the affluent westside neighborhood where the Ports live. Her body was found two days later in a remote, wooded area north of Houston.

David Port, 17, is charged with murder in the death of Miss Schatz, 23. The teen-ager remains free on \$20,000 bond.

McMaster will decide Monday whether the youth's trial should be

moved to another city because of extensive news coverage about the case.

Mrs. Port and her husband, Bernard, were jailed Sept. 12 for refusing to answer questions about their son and the events surrounding Miss Schatz's death.

They argued they should not be forced to testify in the investigation, citing a parent-child privilege similar to a state law that allows spouses not to testify against each other.

Earlier in November, the couple went before the panel again. Afterward, McMaster allowed Port to be released after he answered the grand jury's questions but ordered Mrs. Port to remain behind bars.

NRC finds hazards at Comanche Peak

DALLAS (AP) — Nuclear Regulatory Commission investigators have found seven possible safety hazards at the Comanche Peak nuclear power plant — the second time the federal agency has detailed possible problems at the plant under construction near Glen Rose.

The NRC report questioned the integrity of thousands of metal supports designed to prevent pipe breaks from crippling the plant.

Texas Utilities Co., the plant's owner, was cited for five violations of NRC regulations in the 12-page report that was released Thursday in Bethesda, Md.

Most of the violations involved inadequate documentation of welds and other construction work at the plant, which is being built near Glen Rose about 75 miles southwest of Dallas.

Texas Utilities spokesman Dick Ramsey said the company had not received its copy of the NRC report and could not comment.

Woman again charged with aiding Salvadorans

BROWNSVILLE (AP) — The U.S. Border Patrol has filed charges against sanctuary movement member Stacey Lynn Merkt, accusing her of transporting two Salvadoran illegal aliens six months after she was convicted on an identical charge and placed on probation.

Also charged was Jack Elder, 40, director of the Catholic Church-sponsored Casa Oscar Romero refugee halfway house in San Benito, about 15 miles north of the Texas-Mexico border. Elder was arrested last April and is currently awaiting trial on charges of transporting three Salvadoran aliens.

The complaint, filed Nov. 21 before U.S. Magistrate Susan Williams of McAllen, charges Elder and Ms. Merkt, 29, with trans-

porting two Salvadoran men from the border to a Rio Grande Valley bus station.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Robert Guerra, who prosecuted Ms. Merkt, said evidence would be presented to a federal grand jury in December.

Ms. Merkt was sentenced last May to 90 days in prison and placed on two years probation by U.S. District Judge Filemon Vela. In sentencing the California native, Vela warned Ms. Merkt that she would be put behind bars if she continued to violate the law by illegally aiding Central Americans.

While her conviction is on appeal, Ms. Merkt has continued working at the refugee house.

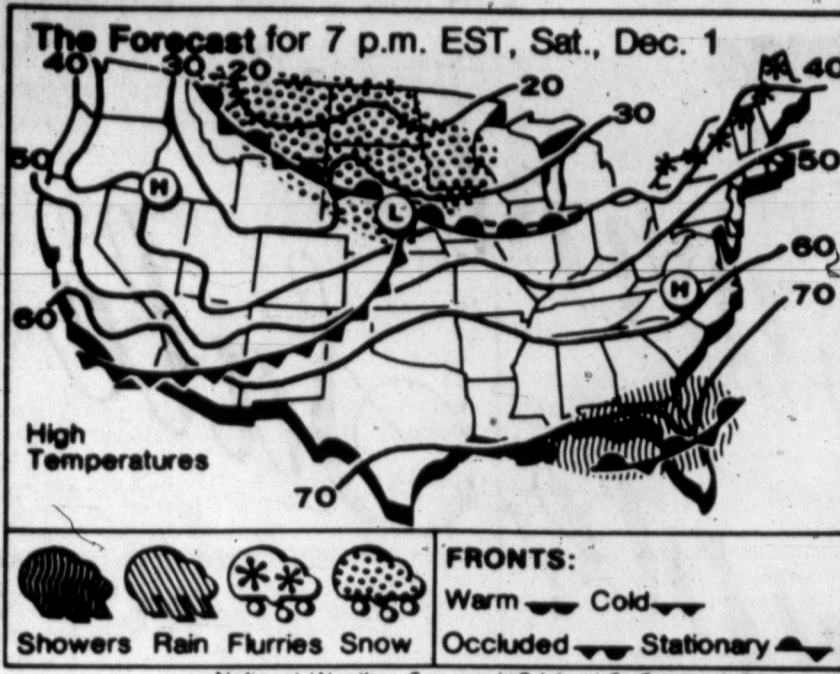

Man travels dirt roads in search of wire

DENTON (AP) — J.C. Payne has traveled almost every "little dirt road all over the country" searching for antique barbed wire, and now has a collection that includes samples of more than 600 different types of wire.

He has bails of wire from Kansas, World War I wire from Germany and England, Nicaraguan wire and thick wire designed to keep buffalo off railroad tracks. There are strips of Australian wire, Canadian wire, military wire and decorative wire.

And, of course, there are thousands of pieces of barbed wire from every part of the United States. The 63-year-old Denton resident likes to have "hundreds" of pieces of wire on hand, and he cuts many of them in 18-inch strips, the length preferred by collectors.

"I just like it in quantities," Payne said. "I've hunted wire...from the Pacific to the Atlantic and from Old

Mexico to Canada. I go down country roads looking and if I find wire on a fence I go ask the owner (if I can have some). A lot of this wire you see on these old fences is old."

Many times, he said, the owners "will invite you in for a cup of coffee and go help you hunt (for wire). We've got friends all over the country. Collecting friends is the main thing."

When Payne and his wife, Elsie Ruth Payne, visit the state of New York they often try to find relatives of the man who originally designed the different types of barbed wire.

"It's amazing and real interesting to run into the sons and grandsons of the people who patented the

wire," he said.

There are about 1,000 different types of barbed wire, he said.

Payne, who knows the history and name of each kind of wire he owns, doesn't display his collection in cases, but instead has organized it in his garage, yard and barn. "I can look at it out here. I mess with it every day."

He does take some pieces to barbed wire shows in Texas and Oklahoma.

Most of the wire in Payne's garage has been cut into 18-inch lengths and is organized according to Jack Glover's "Bobbed Wire Bible."

He has more than 380 types of wire laid out in his garage and has

dozens of barbed wire rolls lined up in his back yard. There are "stacks and boxes" of wire and many old tools for handling barbed wire in his barn, he said.

Payne, who has collected wire 17 years and also collects bricks and old bottles, said he began gathering barbed wire because it was "something different. I never collected anything before I started. I just like old stuff. I remember the time when I could have cared less about any of this."

"If I sell my wire, I use the money to go hunt some more. I haven't been hunting lately because I haven't been selling lately. I don't have as much as I used to."

More prominent people arrested at South African Embassy protests

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two Democratic congressmen and a labor official were arrested Friday at the South African Embassy, swelling to 16 the number of prominent people detained since Nov. 21 in demonstrations to protest that country's racial policies.

Reps. Don Edwards, D-Calif., George Crockett Jr., D-Mich., and Leonard Ball of the Coalition of Black Trade Unionists deliberately courted arrest by entering a restricted area near the embassy and walking up to the door of the imposing stone building.

Specifically, they were charged with violating a District of Columbia code that makes it illegal to protest within 500 feet of an embassy. They planned to spend the night in jail.

The arrests came the day after

Martin Luther King Jr.'s daughter, Yolanda, 29, was jailed and she declared her first experience in the lockup had given her new respect for her father's sacrifices as he led the 1960s civil rights movement.

Before their arrest, Edwards and Crockett participated in a march that attracted more than 200 people on Massachusetts Avenue, the capital's "Embassy Row."

The crowd, chanting slogans like "Freedom Yes! Apartheid No.," was the largest since organizers of the "Free South Africa Movement" turned to the 1960s-style tactics of civil disobedience in their attempt to change South Africa's racial separatism.

The goals of the protests, organized by the TransAfrica lobbying group, are to pressure the Reagan administration to revamp its diplo-

matic policy toward South Africa, win the release of more than a dozen black labor unionists detained in that country and persuade Congress to pass tough sanctions against South Africa.

Edwards, the second white to be arrested, said South Africa's apartheid policy is "very serious business," and "it's worse than it's ever been."

Edwards dismissed the administration's policy of seeking change in South Africa through negotiations and diplomacy. "You have to play hard ball...you have to fight," he said.

Clad in a stylish jacket and slacks, Edwards, who lives at Washington's fancy Watergate apartment complex, said he did not mind the prospect of a night in jail.

Crockett, 75, brought a coat to keep warm overnight.

Dean of Senate loses left leg in three-hour cancer operation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. John C. Stennis, D-Miss., lost his left leg in a three-hour cancer operation Friday, but doctors said they expect him to return to the Senate.

The 83-year-old dean of the Senate underwent surgery at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, the same hospital where he was taken after he was critically wounded in 1973 in a robbery in front of his Washington home.

His assailants in that incident pumped three bullets into Stennis.

Seventeen months later, he was back on the Senate floor leading a grueling seven-day debate on a military procurement bill as chairman of the Armed Services Committee.

A hospital statement Friday said Stennis' doctors "expect the senator to resume his duties in the Senate after a normal period of convalescence."

Rex Buffington, the senator's press secretary, said Stennis entered the hospital late Wednesday. Buffington said he did not know when the malignancy was discovered, but that the leg had been bothering Stennis for some time.

Buffington said there was no connection between the gunshot wounds and the tumor.

Stennis has served in the Senate

since 1947. In his last campaign in 1982, he carried 80 of Mississippi's 82 counties in defeating Republican Haley Barbour.

Stennis was president pro tem and chairman of the Armed Services Committee before the Republicans won control of the Senate in 1980.

Walter Reed said the operation was "a relatively uncomplicated medical procedure" and was "necessary because the tumor was affecting the femur, the bone in the thigh."

After he recovered from his 1973 gunshot wounds, Stennis told a reporter, "I deliberately considered the matter of living or dying, and I made up my mind that if I could be useful, I wanted to make the fight to survive, to overcome this thing."

State Department protests reporter's expulsion

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department said Friday it strongly objects to the Chilean government's decision to expel the Santiago bureau chief of United Press International.

Chilean authorities expelled Anthony Boudle, 31, saying it was to ensure that foreign correspondents in Chile "conform to the truth." State Department deputy spokesman Alan Romberg said U.S. govern-

ment support for freedom of the press includes freedom of foreign correspondents to cover developments in any country and to send their dispatches out of the country without censorship.

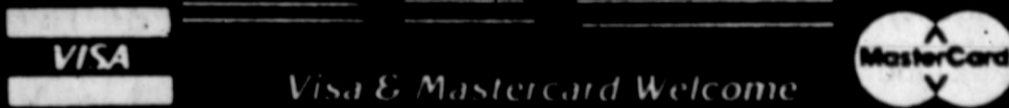

Jury convicts ringleader of Boston arson ring

BOSTON (AP) — A federal jury Friday convicted the ringleader of a gang of fire buffs accused of setting more than 200 blazes around Boston and then cheering as the buildings burned in what the government called the largest arson conspiracy in U.S. history.

Donald F. Stackpole, 28, of Scituate, a "sparkie" or fire gazer who often arrived at blazes in a red station wagon and dressed as a fire chief, was found guilty on all five arson counts against him and 12 of 14 related charges stemming from the 14-month spree.

Stackpole showed no emotion when the verdict was announced by the federal court jury, which deliberated seven hours over two days.

He faces a maximum sentence of 180 years in prison on the 17 counts. Sentencing was set for Jan. 3.

"Justice was done — positively," said Ed Fowler, an arson investigator from Cambridge who testified against Stackpole in the case.

"I'm thrilled. That guy got what was coming to him," said Raymond F. Martin, 46, a Boston firefighter

who was out of work for 17 months after he was hurt in an arson fire. "Why? Because that guy screwed up my whole life, that's why."

The fires injured 282 people, including 65 firefighters, and destroyed \$22 million in property.

Stackpole, the owner of a Boston security company, was among seven men indicted in the case by a federal grand jury this summer. Four defendants have pleaded guilty and two still face trial.

In closing arguments, Assistant U.S. Attorney Mark E. Robinson called the case "a monstrous conspiracy to burn down the city of Boston."

"You can't hardly go anywhere in the city of Boston without seeing the lingering and devastating effects of these fires," he said. "He thought firefighters were underworked and overpaid and he liked to see them work needlessly."

The case was cracked this January, authorities say, when former Boston police officer Robert F. Groblewski of Weymouth, questioned about stolen car parts, broke down and confessed to plotting with others to set the fires.

U.S. Navy-charted vessel breaks down near Cuba

WASHINGTON (AP) — A U.S. Navy-chartered ship broke down and drifted into Cuban waters early Friday, causing the Navy to scramble the aircraft carrier Nimitz to the area so quickly that 1,000 crewmen were left behind, Pentagon officials said.

The ship, the Seaward Explorer, was finally rescued by a U.S. Coast Guard cutter after a Cuban navy patrol boat tried to take the Seaward Explorer under tow about noon.

At the time the nuclear-powered Nimitz was on a port call at Charlotte Amalie, St. Thomas, in the U.S. Virgin Islands with many of its 5,200 crew members ashore on liberty.

The Nimitz, one of the Navy's largest and most powerful warships, was ordered on an emergency basis to the scene off Cuba's northeast coast, said the Pentagon officials,

speaking only on condition they not be named. It left so quickly that 1,000 crew members who couldn't make it back to the ship were left behind.

The Coast Guard cutter Reliance received a distress call from the Seaward Explorer at 7:40 p.m. Thursday, said Coast Guard Petty Officer Bob Baeten in Miami. The Reliance arrived in daylight hours Friday and found a small Cuban boat assisting the Seaward Explorer, said Baeten, who added that the crew of the coast guard cutter spotted a fire aboard the merchant vessel, put it out and began towing operations.

The Nimitz was the closest Navy vessel to the scene and was ordered to the Cuban coast as a precaution, the officials said. Sending the closest ship is standard Navy practice in such cases, they said.

NATION IN BRIEF

Consumer agency's head announces resignation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nancy Harvey Steorts, who took over the Consumer Product Safety Commission advocating cooperation with industry but wound up battling business, consumer groups and some of her fellow commissioners, announced Friday that she is resigning effective Jan. 5.

Mrs. Steorts had struggled to establish a dialogue between consumers and industry, and despite clashes with both sides she has succeeded in promoting cooperative efforts in some areas.

Getting groups to work together, instead of merely imposing rules and regulations, was her goal and that has been accomplished, Mrs. Steorts said.

She said she plans to return to private business, but declined to give details.

Veep rivals to have lunch

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President George Bush invited his vanquished Democratic challenger, Rep. Geraldine Ferraro, to come over for lunch one day, and she's bringing along a couple of actors.

Bush's spokesman, Peter Teeley, said Friday that the lunch will take

place next Thursday in Bush's spacious office in the Executive Office Building next door to the White House.

Teeley said the lunch grew out of a casual suggestion Bush made when Ms. Ferraro telephoned him election night to congratulate him on his victory. During the brief conversation, he said, the vice president told Ms. Ferraro that after she had had some time to rest and recuperate from the rigors of campaigning she ought to come to Washington and have lunch.

On Monday, Teeley said, Bush called to follow up on the invitation, and Ms. Ferraro suggested they invite the two people who impersonated them during the candidates' preparations for the vice presidential debate.

Woman awarded refund

BROCKTON, Mass. (AP) — A jury has ordered a dating service to refund part of the fee paid by a woman who claimed she was matched with incompatible partners, ranging from a scuba-diving vegetarian to an ex-boyfriend.

The Plymouth County Superior Court jury Wednesday upheld a lower court judge's ruling that the Together dating firm must reimburse Janet Carlino \$400 of the \$495 fee she paid.

Bolivian police scatter protesters with tear gas

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) — Police used tear gas to scatter bands of student demonstrators Friday as the government opened new talks with labor leaders on the general strike that has virtually paralyzed Bolivia for nearly two weeks.

In another development, the government agreed to discuss "immediately" economic demands by the Peasants' Federation, which then postponed a threatened blockade of key highways for 72 hours.

No arrests were reported as riot police cleared streets around San Andres University that had been blocked for the second straight day with student-erected barricades of cobblestones.

Police fired tear gas grenades as they moved forward and the students at the barricades retreated into the campus.

It was the only violent incident reported Friday.

The general strike began Nov. 14, was suspended nine days later, and then resumed Wednesday as union leaders in the Bolivian Workers Central Organization voted to strengthen their protest against the government's economic policies.

Information Minister Mario Rueda was optimistic as four Cabinet ministers, led by Planning Minister Rene

Fernandez, and some 25 union leaders opened new talks at the Presidential Palace.

"Prospects are good" of reaching an agreement, Rueda told The Associated Press. "This is not a clash. We are all interested in preserving the democratic process." He referred to fears expressed by government, opposition and labor leaders that continued social unrest might lead to military intervention.

But labor leaders and some government officials were not as optimistic as Rueda.

Juan Lechin, the head of the labor federation, criticized the planning minister for telling reporters the strike was weakening the labor unions.

"We may harden our strike to show him that we are not weak," Lechin said.

Fernandez said he came to the meeting "ready to listen" to the union demands, but added, "The government's measures have already been taken."

He referred to economic reforms ordered by the government last week, including steep price increases that led in part to the resumption of the strike.

Taxi driver murdered taking miner to work

LONDON (AP) — A 3-foot concrete post hurled from a bridge killed a taxi driver taking a miner to work Friday. It was the third death stemming from the eight-month-old coal strike, and authorities charged two miners with murder.

Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, in Paris to meet with French President Francois Mitterrand, called the attack an "utterly despicable deed" of "calculated malice."

"No decent, thinking person can

support a strike sustained by this violence and thuggery," the prime minister said. "This is not in the British character; it is not the British way."

She challenged Neil Kinnock, leader of the opposition Labor Party, which backs the miners' protest, to repudiate strike violence "totally and utterly, unequivocally, clearly and no fudging."

Kinnock, who previously blamed picket-line violence on police, said at a rally Friday night in Stoke-on-

Trent, 135 miles northwest of London:

"The violence has got to stop — and the violence has got to stop now."

Though he was given warm applause, hecklers repeatedly interrupted Kinnock's speech with shouts of "traitor." A number of protesters were forcibly ejected from the hall.

National Union of Mineworkers president Arthur Scargill, who shared the platform with Kinnock, was given a thunderous ovation

when he said the union "disassociates itself from any acts of this kind which occur anywhere else away from the picket lines."

Scargill said the union leadership was "deeply shocked" by the death of the taxi driver.

Police said David Wilkie, 35, died when the concrete post smashed through the windshield of his cab as he drove miner David Williams, 35, to the Merthyr Vale Colliery in southern Wales.

Labor Party seems headed for big victory in Australia

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Prime Minister Bob Hawke and his Australian Labor Party appeared headed for a major re-election victory Saturday. But a tiny nuclear disarmament party threatened to spoil Labor's bid to take control of the Senate.

And Andrew Peacock, leader of the conservative Liberal Party, insisted Friday night that his party and the allied National Party would pull off a stunning upset.

All opinion polls showed Labor headed for victory with a lead over the Liberals ranging from 10 to 16 percentage points. Pollsters predicted the government would probably double its 25-seat majority in the 148-seat House of Representatives. The house now has 125 seats, 75 held by Labor, but is being expanded to reflect growth in Australia's population, now estimated at 15.5 million.

"We have turned the economy around from the worst recession in 50 years to one of the top-running economies in the world," Hawke

said in wrapping up the seven-week election campaign.

Every major newspaper, including conservative publications, endorsed Labor for a second term.

Hawke's anticipated success in the election was threatened by the rise of the Nuclear Disarmament Party with its call for ending the world arms race, closing U.S. intelligence-gathering bases in Australia, and severing the military alliance with Washington.

Polls indicate the Nuclear Disarmament Party, formed in June, could win one or more seats in the Senate and drain enough votes from Labor to deny Hawke's party a majority. Labor now holds 30 seats in the upper house to 28 for the Liberal-National coalition, five by the Australian Democrats and one independent. But the senate is being expanded from 64 to 76 seats, with 46 up for election.

Analysis of old air shows methane has increased

Centuries-old air, previously locked away in frozen glaciers, is offering clues that the world's reservoir of atmospheric methane has doubled over the past 500 years, according to recent studies.

The findings of scientists at the University of California at San Diego's Scripps Institution of Oceanography suggest that methane could add to the already increasing burden of pollutants in the air, which studies say could cause a significant global warming in the next century.

Carbon dioxide, an odorless, tasteless gas released into the atmosphere from the burning of fossil

fuels such as natural gas, oil and coal, has been considered the principal culprit in this warming trend, known as the greenhouse effect.

"Methane will probably be as important as carbon dioxide if it keeps increasing at this rate," said Dr. Harmon Craig, who along with Scripps colleague C.C. Chou, prepared the new methane studies.

Craig and Chou estimate that methane increases have already warmed the planet by almost a half-degree Fahrenheit over the past 400 years. Most of that increase has come during the past 200 years.

At current rates, "the warming due to methane is about 38 percent of the carbon dioxide warming effect," the Scripps scientists stated in a paper.

Craig said that no one knows the source of the excess methane, although there are many theories, all related to fermentation. These range from increases in the termite population resulting from forest clearing, to increased rice production to feed larger human populations. Cattle also are being viewed as a potential culprit.

Termites and cattle produce methane as a byproduct of their food fermentation and digestive processes. Rice also produces methane as it ferments.

"Cattle certainly have increased rapidly for beefsteak," Craig said. "There are a lot more cattle than there used to be."

More likely, the increases may be

coming from a combination of events, all triggered by human interference with the environment.

The Scripps findings come from studies of old air trapped inside glaciers. Fallen snow in the frozen regions of the planet eventually compresses under its own weight, forming huge blocks of ice. Air bubbles from the snowflakes are literally frozen in time, with older air blanketed under layers of newer air.

Two summers ago, researchers from Craig's lab traveled to Greenland and retrieved several ice cores 500 to 27,000 years old from a depth of about one-quarter mile. Some of the frozen cores, roughly 130 meters in length and four inches in diameter, were taken to the "cold room," a

300 square-foot freezer at Scripps with temperatures maintained at minus 20 degrees Centigrade.

Larger cores are being stored in another cold room in New York.

Using sensitive instruments, the scientists analyzed samples from both the Scripps and the New York facilities. They found that the amount of methane in the older air was roughly 7 parts per million, about half the present amount. The youngest air trapped by the ice, believed to be about 30 years old, showed methane readings of 1.25 parts per million, .15 parts per million less than today's air.

The scientists checked to make sure that no methane was lost during the original ice formation. One

possibility was that some of the methane may have somehow diffused to other layers of ice during the freezing process. The scientists ruled out this possibility after they determined that helium, a much lighter gas that should move far more readily through ice than methane, was not lost in the freezing process.

Another explanation for the low methane values could be biological. Some microbes exist by converting methane into carbon dioxide. If any of these organisms survived the freezing process, they would have had enough time to consume half the methane. Scientists believe this possibility to be remote, since it's doubtful any of these bacteria could survive conditions in the ice.

School offers training for animal handlers

You drive up a twisty two-laner, deep in California's Santa Cruz Mountains. When you hear wolves howling and macaws crying out, you are near.

You turn onto a dirt road, climb one last ridge and behold a magical menagerie of exotic animals whose grunts and squeals sound vaguely familiar, as they should. Emanating from the woods are the voices of two of the biggest cinema stars in history — the adorable alien from the movie "E.T.," and Chewbacca, Harrison Ford's simian sidekick in the "Star Wars" series — just two of the residents of School Safari.

Chewbacca's voice belongs to Sara, a 4-year-old bear. E.T.'s adorable squeal was obtained from Lord Buffington III, a 9-year-old otter. Neither consented to be interviewed, but School Safari's manager, Bill Harvey, was effusive in praising them.

Movie stardom is common enough here to merit no special attention. Buffy and Sara share living space here with Harvey, assistant manager Mark Voza, and a motley assemblage of creatures from all over the world.

"WE'VE got five cougars, three leopards, two tigers, three wolves, two chimpanzees, one American black bear, a badger, an otter, a raccoon, a llama, a Sicilian donkey, four cockatoos and four macaws," said Harvey.

The most recent movie gig was arranged for the wolves, who appeared in the close-up shots of Walt Disney Productions' "Never Cry Wolf." Their sniffling, howling and barking were dubbed in throughout the film. The raccoon was used for some of the sounds made by the Ewoks — a furry tribe of people on another planet — in "Return of the Jedi." At about the same time, Hollywood technicians made the twisty journey to School Safari to portray the roaring dragon in "Dragonslayer."

At School Safari, movie careers take a back seat to the real business of the compound — education. Through the summer, School Safari is primarily a training school for exotic animal handlers, who learn all they need to work in zoos or parks. In the winter, Harvey and his assistant pack up animals every morning and drive off to some elementary school or another to teach kids about the creatures.

ABOUT THE only casual visitors to Safari are hikers who wander up from Portola State Park, whose gates are two miles away. According to Harvey, the park rangers regularly sooth campers shocked by the wolves' howling at daybreak and dusk.

"That howling carries about six miles," said Harvey, "and most people don't know they're in cages."

Most of the animals were born in captivity and are friendly.

"Most of them are just big muffs and you have nothing to worry about," said Glenn Crowls, who purchased the compound a month ago.

Sara, the bear, was born wild. When just a cub, her mother was killed illegally by hunters and she was seriously wounded by hunting dogs.

"She came around and is now a real sweetheart," said Harvey, who takes the 400-pound bear for daily walks on a leash through the woods.

The 1.5-acre compound is surrounded by a fence — not to keep the animals in but to keep hikers from inadvertently confronting Sara and the tigers, who take turns sunning themselves while on a 30-foot chain. The fence also encloses a flock of chickens that waddle around nervously and lay eggs for the animals to eat. Sometimes they themselves turn into lunch.

"EVERY ONCE in a while we lose a chicken," said Harvey. "All the dumb ones are gone."

Sara indulged her appetite a bit greedily one night when a chicken crawled in her cage through the food hole.

"I didn't see it happen, but I can only assume that Sara was asleep when the chicken went in there, quietly laid an egg and then started clucking. In the morning, there was just an egg and a pile of feathers left."

Until this fall, the compound had been idle for about a year, since the old owners moved to Arizona. Now, with the enthusiasm of Crowls and his wife, Nancy, School Safari is rebounding, with new animal quarters, constant training and companionship and more active classes.

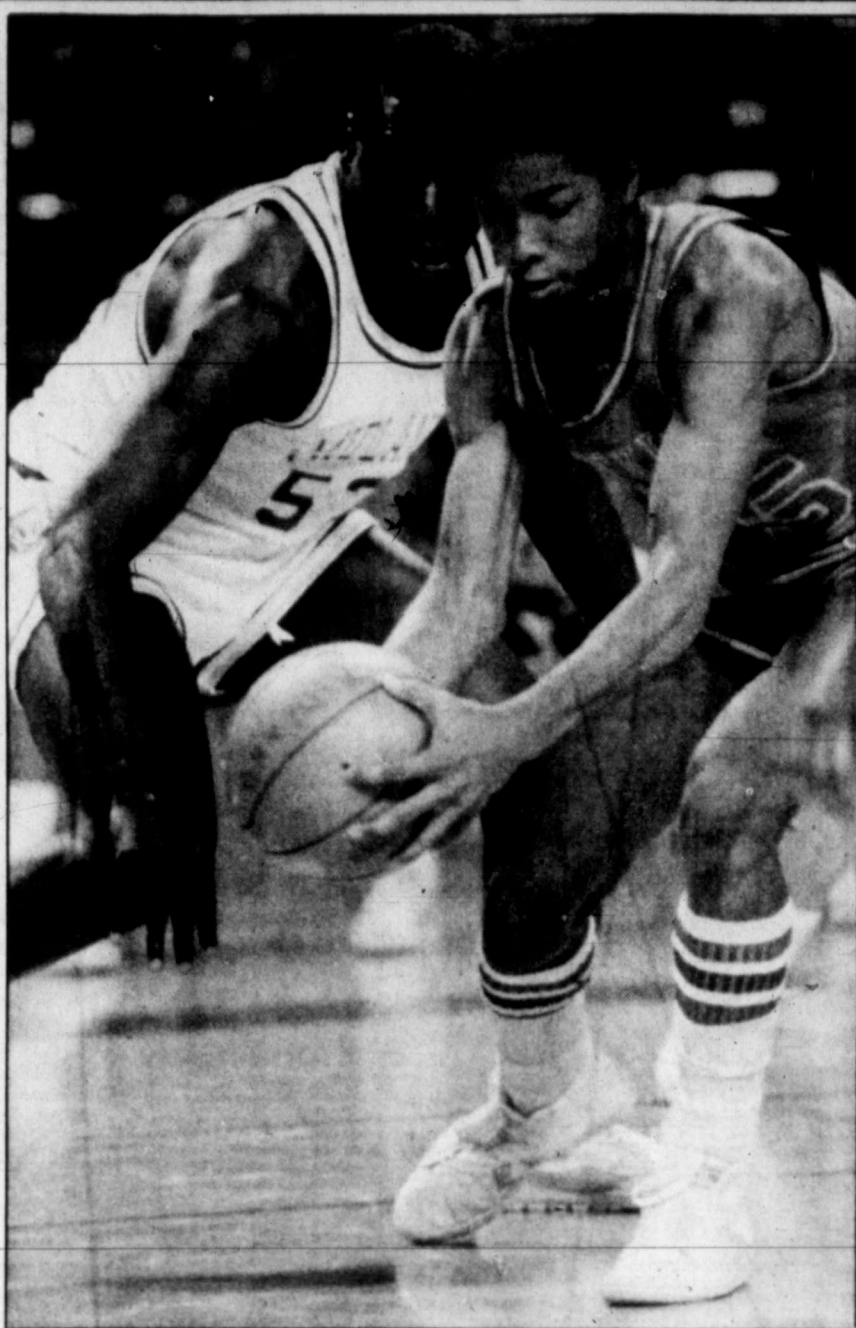

"I came here to put a blemish on this D.W. de Wit, whatever his name is, that will haunt him forever," Morgan boasted in typical pre-fight hype.

At 5 feet 11 inches, 235 pounds, Morgan, who brags of an 8-1 professional record although the Edmonton Boxing and Wrestling Commission could confirm only one bout, a loss, has the right attitude to present problems for de Wit.

"I just love to fight," he said, waving his huge fists. "When they say fight, I don't care who it's against or where it is, I'm ready. I didn't know who I would be fighting here until I was ready to board the plane."

"It doesn't matter to me. I don't even call it boxing, it's fighting. Every time he throws one I throw two."

Morgan is basically a sparring partner who faces perhaps his first chance to make a name for himself. A mechanic by trade, he fights whenever the opportunity arises, no matter the location or how short the notice.

He's nervous being interviewed and evasive about his boxing credentials.

"He's not that tall but he's big and strong," said de Wit's trainer Mark Tessman. "And it's likely he's going to come out in the first round and move right in. He's the kind of fighter who could give Willie a lot of trouble."

de Wit, the 23-year-old from Grande Prairie, Alberta, expects the first round to be slow, as he and Morgan feel each other out. Morgan expects to go out and start throwing punches.





Zany college grid season closes out with 10 games

In what has been one of college football's zaniest years, three teams are still in line for the Cotton Bowl and two for the Sugar Bowl as the regular season concludes Saturday with 10 games.

In addition, three of the top four contenders for the national championship — No. 1 Brigham Young, runner-up Oklahoma and fourth-ranked Washington — have completed their regular seasons and are waiting for the bowls to decide their fate.

The fourth member of that quartet is No. 3 Florida. The Gators won the Southeastern Conference championship, but the SEC banned them from a bowl game because of a pending NCAA probation.

Florida winds up its season Saturday at No. 12 Florida State, which has a date with Georgia in the Florida Citrus Bowl, and there is increasing speculation that the Gators could be the best team around. Florida

State Coach Bobby Bowden is no exception.

"Boy, am I glad they won the SEC championship," says Bowden. "They been coming in here and taking everything out on us. Florida is a great football team. In fact, I think they are about as good as anybody in the country. From what I've seen, they do just about everything well."

"I think finding that quarterback (redshirt freshman Kerwin Bell) is just the thing they needed to bring everything together. I think that was their only real question mark, and that kid has just come in there and gotten the job done."

The Sugar Bowl's host team will be decided when No. 11 Auburn meets Alabama in Birmingham. If Auburn

wins, it will take Florida's place in New Orleans. An Auburn loss and LSU goes. A tie means the Sugar Bowl gets to pick between Auburn and LSU. Whichever team doesn't get to New Orleans will face Arkansas in the Liberty Bowl.

The Cotton Bowl picture is even more confusing. Houston will go if it beats Rice in the AstroDome Saturday night — and the Cougars are 21-point favorites to do just that. But if Houston stumbles, No. 13 Texas can go by beating Texas A&M in Austin.

And what if both Houston and Texas lose? Tenth-ranked Southern Methodist would then have to change its travel plans from the Aloha Bowl in Hawaii to the Cotton Bowl, just a few miles from its Dallas campus. The Mustangs wind up Saturday night with a nonconference game at Nevada-Las Vegas.

Rice would love to have only three losses. The Owls are 1-9 and have nothing to lose except a 10th game.

"We are supposed to get beat by three or four touch-

downs anyway, so what the heck," says Coach Watson Brown. "The other team has all the pressure on them. They HAVE to win. If they lose to us, that's going to be tough."

"I've been on that side at Vanderbilt (in 1962) in a game of this magnitude when we HAD to win to go to the Hall of Fame Bowl, and it was one of our poorest games of the year. It's hard to play with that kind of pressure."

If Houston beats Rice as expected, Texas will go to the inaugural Freedom Bowl to play Iowa.

"I think it's an honor to go to any bowl game," says Coach Fred Akers. "Our first choice is our championship bowl (Cotton). We still have a chance, although it's just a glimmer of hope for that."

The rest of the schedule finds eighth-ranked Boston College at Holy Cross, Georgia Tech at No. 18 Georgia, Iowa at Hawaii under the lights, Army-Navy in Philadelphia and Tennessee at Vanderbilt.

Dallas, Giants take turn

The Washington Redskins will be in the best of all possible places Sunday — home — while the Dallas Cowboys and New York Giants struggle in separate games to regain a share of first place in the National Football League's convoluted National Conference East.

The Redskins, with precious extra days of rest and practice before their next game, in Dallas Dec. 9, took a one-half game lead in the division Thursday night with a 31-17 victory over the Minnesota Vikings.

"We're probably in as good shape as we can be. We're 9-5 and they have to catch us," Joe Theismann, the Redskins' quarterback, said. The Giants, who play a "road" game in their own stadium against the host New York Jets, and the Cowboys, who play in Philadelphia, each are 8-5 in the NFC East.

In another key Sunday game, the San Francisco 49ers, already the champions of the NFC West, can guarantee themselves home games throughout their playoff tenure by beating the Falcons in Atlanta. It would give the 49ers a 13-1 record with two games to go. No other NFC team could do as well.

Miami, too, has clinched its division title. Like the 49ers, the Dolphins are pursuing a home-field edge for the playoffs, but they need more than just a victory Sunday against the defending Super Bowl

champion Los Angeles Raiders. Miami is 12-1, but that leaves them only one game better in the overall conference standings than Denver and Seattle, tied atop the AFC West at 11-2.

Whichever team fails to win the Western Division is almost certain to be in the playoffs, anyway, with a wild card. In fact, Denver, playing Sunday in Kansas City, already is assured of a playoff berth. Seattle, which hosts Detroit, is not.

The Raiders, meanwhile, are 9-4 and in danger of missing the playoffs entirely. They're only one game ahead of New England in the conference standings for the AFC's other wild card. And LA plays what appears to be a slightly tougher schedule — Detroit and Philadelphia along with the Dolphins while the 8-5 Patriots face St. Louis Sunday, followed by Philadelphia and Indianapolis.

Also on Sunday it's Pittsburgh at Houston with the Steelers 7-6 holding a two-game lead over Cincinnati in the AFC Central Division; the Los Angeles Rams, 8-5 and in pursuit of an NFC wild card, hosting New Orleans; Cincinnati at Cleveland; Indianapolis at Buffalo and Tampa Bay at Green Bay. On Monday night it's the Chicago Bears, champions of the NFC Central Division, at San Diego.

For years, the Jets-Giants meetings — exhibitions and regular-season games — were routinely pro-

moted as being for New York's "bragging rights," primarily because they didn't count for much else.

Now, though, it counts a lot for the Giants.

"I don't ever think there's the same kind of rivalry that there is within your own division," their coach, Bill Parcells, said. "I think that when you play a team twice a year and you are constantly fighting them for division places that they become your fiercest rivals, just by osmosis. This is an important game to us, but I don't think being New York City has anything to do with it being important. There are other reasons."

As far as the Jets are concerned, "The next three games will determine how we'll be in the future," Coach Joe Walton said. "The Giants' game is a big game because we need to get back to winning again. We have a lot of young people who have to keep improving."

The 49ers, who would rather not have to try and win a playoff game on the road this year, also like the idea of not losing a game on the road during the entire season. They're a victory in Atlanta away from that goal.

"We have made it something of a crusade to win on the road," Coach Bill Walsh said. "To me, the true test of a good team is to win on the road."

ACU picks Payne as head football coach

ABILENE, Texas (AP) — John D. Payne, assistant head coach for the Arizona Wranglers in the United States Football League, has been named new head football coach at Abilene Christian University, officials announced Friday.

Payne replaces Ted Sitton, who recently requested that his contract not be renewed for the 1985 season. Payne's appointment, which takes effect Saturday, was announced Friday morning by ACU Athletic Director Wally Bullington.

Payne, 51, was an assistant coach under George Allen in the USFL in 1983 with the Chicago Blitz and in 1984 with the Arizona Wranglers.

He was an all-conference football player at Oklahoma State University and played in the 1954 Blue-Gray All-Star Game.

Payne also has coached in the National Football League and the Canadian Football League and has been offensive coordinator at Texas Christian and Brigham Young.

He was head coach at Saskatch-

wan and Hamilton in the CFL and was an assistant coach with the Detroit Lions in the NFL.

"I'm pleased and honored to be selected as head coach at Abilene Christian University. It's a job I've wanted ever since I've been in coaching. I'm committed to a winning program and bringing a national championship in our division (NCAA Division II)," he said.

Sitton had been head coach since 1979 after first joining the ACU staff in 1967. His six-year record as head coach was 33-28-1. His best season was 1981 when ACU finished 8-2 and he was named Lone Star Conference Coach of the Year.

Mazda to build car plant near Detroit

DETROIT (AP) — Japan's Mazda Motor Corp. announced plans Friday to build a highly automated and computerized automobile assembly plant in an area of high unemployment south of Detroit, which will make it the fourth Japanese automaker manufacturing cars in this country. Mazda, Japan's third-largest carmaker, said it plans to break ground in Flat Rock, Mich., this spring and begin turning out cars in the fall of 1987, gradually building to a top output of 240,000 cars a year by 3,500 employees. The company said it was negotiating the sale of some of the cars to Ford Motor Co., which would market them under the Ford name as 1988 models. Ford owns more than 24 percent of Mazda's stock and the plant site is adjacent to an abandoned Ford casting plant, part of which will be razed to make room for the new operation, Mazda said. Mazda said it will spend about \$450 million, but wouldn't say how much would go to Ford for the site. Unlike the three other Japanese companies with U.S. car and truck plants, Mazda included the United Auto Workers union when it set up discussions eight months ago with local and state political leaders and auto supply companies. The company and the UAW said they had reached "an understanding" about labor force representation at the plant. Neither side gave details. But Mazda issued UAW President Owen Bebejer next to the highest-ranking member of its delegation, Managing Director Hirokazu Iida, during the company's Detroit news conference. Saying he was satisfied with the agreement, Bebejer said later, "I wouldn't be here if we didn't have the basics put together." The plant will be about 150 miles north of Marysville, Ohio, where Honda Motor Co. Ltd. of Japan builds cars and motorcycles. Honda has resisted UAW organizing attempts, as has Nissan Motor Co. Ltd., which builds trucks and plans to build cars at Smyrna, Tenn. Union officials said the Mazda agreement may end up resembling the UAW pact that will be negotiated next year at the joint venture company set up by Toyota Motor Corp. and General Motors Corp. to build the subcompact Chevrolet Nova in Fremont, Calif., beginning next week. That contract may produce some form of Japanese-style management and relaxed work rules. Losing out in bids for the Mazda plant were Greenville, S.C., and Kearney, Neb. Iida, speaking through an interpreter, said the Detroit area was picked because of concessions by state and local governments, "a talented workforce (and) the ready availability of local sourcing of parts and components." Despite economic and image problems, Detroit has retained much of the basic industry, like steel and foundry work, that automakers need. The city also continues to attract investments by companies offering the latest technology in robots and computer-aided designing and computer-aided manufacturing.

Utah names Fassel

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)— Promising a "wide open" offense, Jim Fassel was named Friday as the University of Utah's new head football coach, replacing Chuck Stobart.

"I believe in a wide-open attack," said Fassel.

Gilliam, John Ellis, Will Willmon and Darryl Stratton. Roger Smith and Lynn Merrill saw some varsity action a year ago. Tony McCollum and Brian Underwood played junior varsity ball a season ago, but are ready for the move to the big.

One thing that should make the transition easier is the fact that Goldsmith's crew has some experience. "It's helped a bunch. Last year we never had a set lineup. This year it's pretty well established.

Wallace, Willmon, Gilliam and Ellis all played regular roles a year ago, and thus the coach hasn't had to worry as much about working on the offense and plays. "I feel really confident with this group of guys. The first two weeks of workouts were really good. They were as good

as any two weeks we had all of last year. The seniors came in ready to work. The first day we could have practiced for thirty minutes and played a game the first night."

As for the classification jump, Goldsmith explains that since his team is used to taking on the big boys, it won't be as much a problem as might be expected. "We split two games with Big Lake last year, and we beat McCamey. I've seen Stanton and Wall," Goldsmith says of four of District 8-AA's five Ranger opponents. Eldorado is the other district school.

"We've always thought the move would be easier in basketball because of the schedule we've played. Last year, we didn't play any class A schools in non-district games.

It's just the type of program we've had here."

Thus, the Rangers won't be in shock from the level of competition. And there is a good chance the Rangers could take the district title, although an unbeaten record would be difficult to duplicate. Goldsmith thinks Big Lake's Owls have the inside track on paper.

"I would pick Big Lake and after that I don't know," said the coach. "McCamey ought to be tough, and I expect us to be in there. Wall won it last year."

The Rangers will be fundamentally solid and Goldsmith lists as two major pluses "Shooting and balance. Gilliam will get his points - he had 18 the other night. But the next night some other guy can get 20."

Gilliam is most likely to be the money man. The stocky 5-10 senior is the cornerstone player in Goldsmith's scheme. "He's so big you can't get around him or reach around him and pick his pocket. And when he starts hitting from the outside it's unfair. He can make the inside game look good."

Inside, the Rangers could either be very tough or they could fold, but the material for success is there. Wallace could be the answer.

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)— Promising a "wide open" offense, Jim Fassel was named Friday as the University of Utah's new head football coach, replacing Chuck Stobart. "I believe in a wide-open attack," said Fassel.

About 7,000 Filipinos demonstrate peacefully outside U.S. Embassy

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — About 7,000 Filipinos demonstrated peacefully outside the U.S. Embassy on Friday, demanding an end to American military aid to President Ferdinand E. Marcos's government and the removal of U.S. bases from the country.

The 90-minute rally, the largest in front of the American mission in years, coincided with a second demonstration by about 1,200 people who shouted "Yankee Go Home!" outside the gates of Clark U.S. Air Force Base, 50 miles north of the capital.

Marcos, meanwhile, appeared on national television but did not speak, fueling continued speculation about his health.

"You and I have only one enemy, and that is the one (before) you," economist Alejandro Lichauco

shouted to a cheering crowd, made up mostly of factory workers and students, which stretched for two blocks along a broad boulevard fronting the seaside embassy.

The embassy was closed in observance of a Philippine national holiday.

More than 800 riot police backed by four firetrucks and four armed jeeps met the noisy protesters, who waved red flags as they arrived from an earlier rally at a downtown Manila plaza.

There was some tension when police began unreeling firehoses, but they allowed the demonstrators to first occupy three-fourths of Roxas Boulevard and eventually the whole street. Most previous demonstrations near the embassy by smaller groups were either blocked or violently dispersed.

Speakers at the rally attacked alleged domination of the Philippine economy by what one of them called "foreign devils like the American imperialists."

Demonstrators marched up and down the street carrying effigies of Marcos and President Reagan astride a papier mache bulldog painted to look rabid and marked with the initials of the armed forces of the Philippines.

After dark, they exploded firecrackers and marched off chanting "Marcos: Hitler, Dictator, Puppet." The demonstrators went to nearby Rizal Park for a cultural program and to burn the effigies.

Up north, about 1,200 protesters, mostly workers, some students and a few Roman Catholic nuns, marched through Angeles City to the main gate of the nearby American air base.

Tamil guerrillas attack two prison farms

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka (AP) — Heavily armed Tamil guerrillas attacked two prison farms in northern Sri Lanka on Friday, and at least 42 people were killed, the government said.

The attacks came before dawn at the Dollar Farm and the Kent Farm, both rehabilitation settlements where convicts live with their families before being set free.

Officials said about 200 guerrillas scrambled from two buses, spraying submachine gun and rifle fire and throwing grenades as they herded prisoners into buildings and then blew the buildings up. About 450 people, including guards, prisoners

and their families, lived at the two settlements.

After the attacks in Mullaitivu district, the government declared a national alert and imposed a 10 p.m. to 4 a.m. curfew on the entire island as a precaution against retaliatory violence against Tamils.

A senior government official who refused to be identified by name said the confirmed death toll was 42, but noted that local police had said the number of deaths may climb as high as 80.

The senior official said most of the dead were Sinhalese, the majority in Sri Lanka. Tamils make up about 16 percent of the population but are a

majority in the north, where extremists are leading the guerrilla campaign for a separate Tamil nation.

The United News of India, in a dispatch from Colombo that was monitored in New Delhi, said 62 people — 42 settlers and 20 Tamil militants — were killed in Friday's attacks. That report said army troops in helicopters and on the ground were searching for rebels in the area.

The attacks came a day after the government of President Junius Jayewardene, claiming India-based Tamils separatists planned to invade northern Sri Lanka by next January, announced a series of wide-ranging emergency measures.

Chinese archaeologists

unearth homo erectus

PEKING (AP) — The discovery in northeast China of an almost complete skeleton of an "ape man" of about 1 million to 200,000 B.C. provides new clues as to how modern man's direct predecessor looked and moved, an archaeologist says.

Peking University archaeologist Lu Zun'er's team found the homo erectus fossils Sept. 27 in a cave at the foot of Gold Ox Hill in Yinkou County, Liaoning Province.

The official English-language China Daily quoted Lu today as saying the "unprecedented" find enables scientists to reassess "a crucial step in human evolution."

Speculation about the upright posture and walking gait of homo erectus — which preceded homo sapiens or modern man and advanced evolution by developing the use of fire and stone tools — now can be tested scientifically, he said.

Accountant testifies

BONN, West Germany (AP) — An accountant for the Flick industrial holding company said Friday that informants in the Finance Ministry advised him of progress on the company's application for tax breaks.

The accountant, Heribert Blaschke, was testifying before a parliamentary committee investigating political payoffs by Flick.

He said his informants were in the ministry's tax division, but denied that they had violated any laws by talking to him.

Blaschke worked at the ministry in the early 1970s, then became a tax adviser for the Christian Democratic Union's parliamentary faction before joining Flick.

Party fends off challenge

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — The governing National Party retained three Parliament seats in special elections, fending off challenges by candidates who claimed the white-minority government favors sharing power with

blacks.

At stake in Thursday's elections were seats in George, President P.W. Botha's constituency east of Cape Town; Primrose, the seat of a former minister of cooperation and development, Piet Koornhof; and Parow, seat of a former minister of community development, Pen Kotze.

People who are interested can register with the Mormon genealogical library in Salt Lake City, which will put their names on microfiche and

send them to about 450 branch genealogical libraries of the church throughout the world, said Grant Anderson, manager of the San Diego Mormon Regional Genealogical Library.

"These people can read down that

list and see who's searching in the area they're interested in, correspond with them and exchange information," Anderson said.

"One of the purposes of the registry is to avoid a lot of duplication and get people together on the same

lines that they're searching." Anderson said the new service is not for beginners.

"Not everyone should sign up for this registry unless you have something to contribute to it," he said. "It isn't just a source of information for people who want to trace their ancestors. It's for people who have information to give as well."

The Mormon interest in genealogy stems from the belief that no one can reach heaven without being baptized.

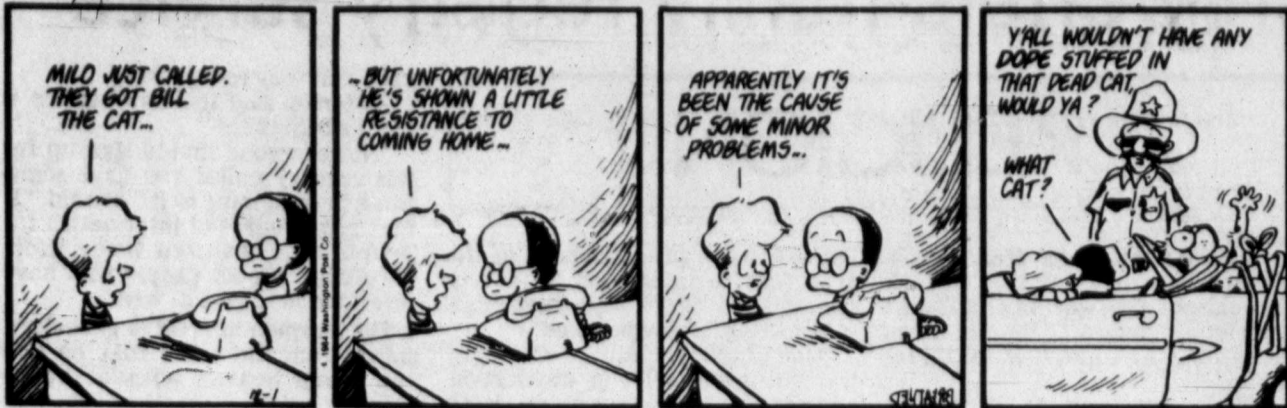

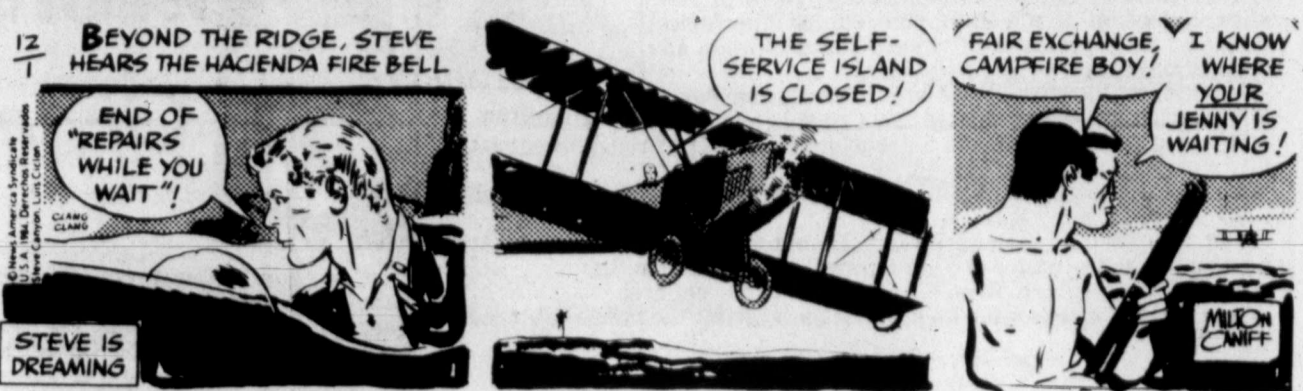

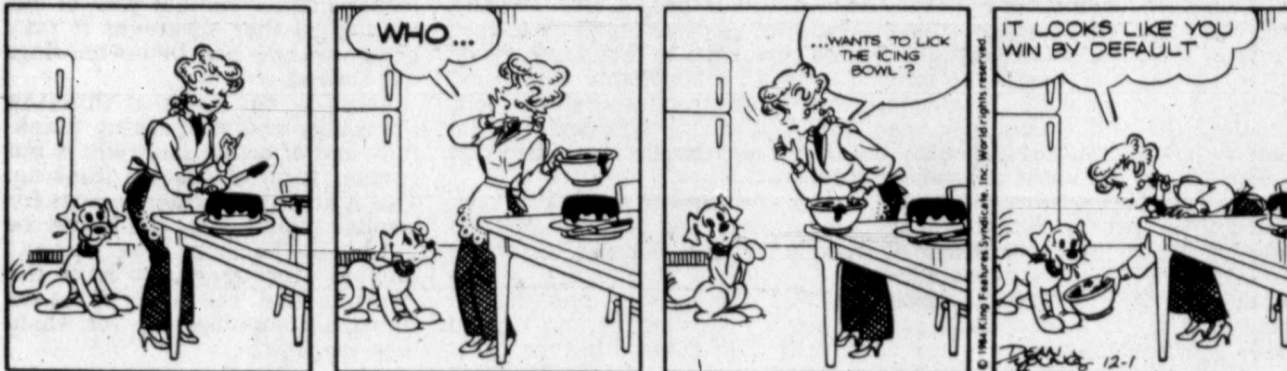

Singer says 'great songs few, far between'

Singer Judy Collins has certain songwriters she keeps her eye on. Her 20th record album, "Home Again," is out and already she's thinking about songs for the next one. "I'm about to go down my A list and ask, 'Anybody got anything for me?'" she says.

"I ask if they have any great songs. Great songs are few and far between, really.

"Then I say, 'Is there anything you've written you like but think it wouldn't be good for me? Send me that.' People think that they know. They think something wouldn't be for me. But it might be just perfect."

On "Home Again," she says, "I'm crazy about 'Everybody Works in China.' It's not a song Henry Gross would ever have sent to me. He might send it to America or Patti LaBelle but not to me.

"And 'Only You' is a song my manager, Freddy DeMann, heard the Yaz sing. People would say I'd never sing an electronic-based song like that. I thought it was a natural.

Miss Collins also has her first recorded duet, with T.G. Sheppard, in the new album. Michael Masser, who wrote "Angel of the Morning," wrote "Home Again." Bruce Lundvall, then of Elektra Records, suggested that Masser take "Home Again" to her. He did, around Christmas last year, after she thought she'd finished recording the album.

SHE SAYS, "Michael and Freddy and I thought it would be very nice as a duet. The next question was whose voice. A number of different people were talked about. They weren't all country singers; it was voice quality we were thinking of. It came into the problem of who's available and interested."

They approached Sheppard, who liked the song. Then they waited several months until Masser had time to produce the cut. They put it on the album and made it the title song.

"I think country is a funny category," Miss Collins says. "It's one of the few areas now where you can actually put a good song and understand the words and not be bowled over by loud rock."

Miss Collins has had a couple of country hits in the past. "Amazing Grace," which actually is a hymn, and "Someday Soon."

About the latter she says, "I was making the 'Who Knows Where the Time Goes' album in 1969. Stephen Stills played on it. We had finished a session and were driving someplace, just talking of material. We needed a couple of songs to finish the album. Stephen asked if I remembered Ian and Sylvia's 'Someday Soon.' It was a big hit, at least in our circles. We went in the next day and recorded it.

"It was the combination of instruments that made it country, pedal steel guitar instead of keyboard and strings. The album we were making had a flavor of country which carried over to 'Someday Soon.'"

MISS COLLINS' first record, "Maid of Constant Sorrow," came out in 1962. All 20 records have been on Elektra. "Send in the Clowns" is her biggest-selling single. Through

folk, protest, romantic and art song, she never has faded away. "Folk is part of the fabric of what I do," she says. "Popular song is part of it. My classical training is part of it. It all comes together, hopefully."

Two songs on the new album, "Shoot First" and "Only You," are done with electronic keyboards, which Miss Collins calls "an interesting adventure for me."

She started touring when she was 19 and has toured most of every year since then except for 1978. "Next year's concerts are already coming in. I'll sing with the Chicago Symphony in August. I guess what you have to do, and I hope to do it next year, is put a hold on six months. I'm going to do nothing but write music. My writing, I think, needs a big block of time now."

Miss Collins wrote two of the songs on "Home Again," "Dream On" and "Shoot First."

She and producer David Grusin are giving part of the proceeds from "Shoot First" to the National Alliance Against Violence. She says, "It'll go for gun control lobbying and legislation."

She sings every year at the National Dance Institute's show by children who've been taught dancing one hour a week at their schools. She's on the board of Artists Against Apartheid in South Africa and on the board of the Wonder Woman Foundation, which tries to improve opportunities for women over 40.

"I ALWAYS felt blessed I was able to do things which involved physical presence. You can't always say yes to everything but I try to do the best I can. I need to help somebody who has less than I do. We have to give back, otherwise what is the point? What is it all for?"

On Dec. 7, Miss Collins does her 18th annual Carnegie Hall concert. Last year, she brought a guitar on stage with her for the first time in five years. "I'm finding it lots and lots of fun," she says.

So why, after years of accompanying herself on guitar, did she stop? "It is possible to hide behind a guitar, in front of thousands of people," Miss Collins says. "I sang with my eyes shut for many, many years. It was zero contact."

"Part of my growth in the last few years has been to learn to relate to an audience. I'm a lot more comfortable on stage."

"Now, I have flexibility. I have a section where I pick up the guitar and do a lot of singing and talking. There's a long segment where I go to the piano and play and sing. I've

always written music on the piano. The guitar was never a natural instrument to me. There are certain songs I think it's right for."

MISS COLLINS' son is 25, living and working in Minnesota.

For the last seven years, she and Louis Nelson have been a couple.

She says, "It's the longest relationship I've ever had with anyone and it is getting better. He is an industrial designer. He has designed a number of my album covers, including the new one. He designs products, buildings, packaging. He has formed his own business."

Host of 'Newton's Apple' knows why certain bicycles never fly

LOS ANGELES — You've always heard that once you learn to ride a bicycle you never forget, but have you ever wondered what allows you to stay upright in the first place as you pedal along?

Ira Flatow will not only tell you why, he'll show you why and demonstrate some bicycle designs that will never get off the ground.

He'll also tell you everything you ever wanted to know about mummies, whales, owls and hot air balloons.

Flatow is the host of "Newton's Apple," a weekly science show now in its second year on public television. He's also National Public Radio's science correspondent and regularly contributes free-lance articles on scientific subjects to magazines.

"It's like being a kid in a candy store," said Flatow on a brief visit to Los Angeles. "What I love about the show is I get to do all the things I've always wanted to do. Like the special we did on how do you become an astronaut? And the segments we do on animals. We've run out of animals that we can bring into the studio, and now we have to go on location with the animals."

Flatow lives in Connecticut and during the 13-week production schedule he flies every Sunday night to Minneapolis to tape the show for the KTCA public television station. He returns home each Thursday.

The show came about because KTCA was looking for a program that would "take science out of its ivory tower," Flatow said.

"We wanted a show that would make science understandable, enjoyable and fun to learn," he said. "The technique we use is answering questions. Like, why does a bicycle stay up? What is sound?"

Flatow was originally called in only as a consultant to help set up the show.

"An old colleague of mine, Jim Russell, was at KTCA and he asked me to come out and advise them on
