Ramos, who is majoring in elementary education, is the daughter of Fernando Ramos of Route 5.

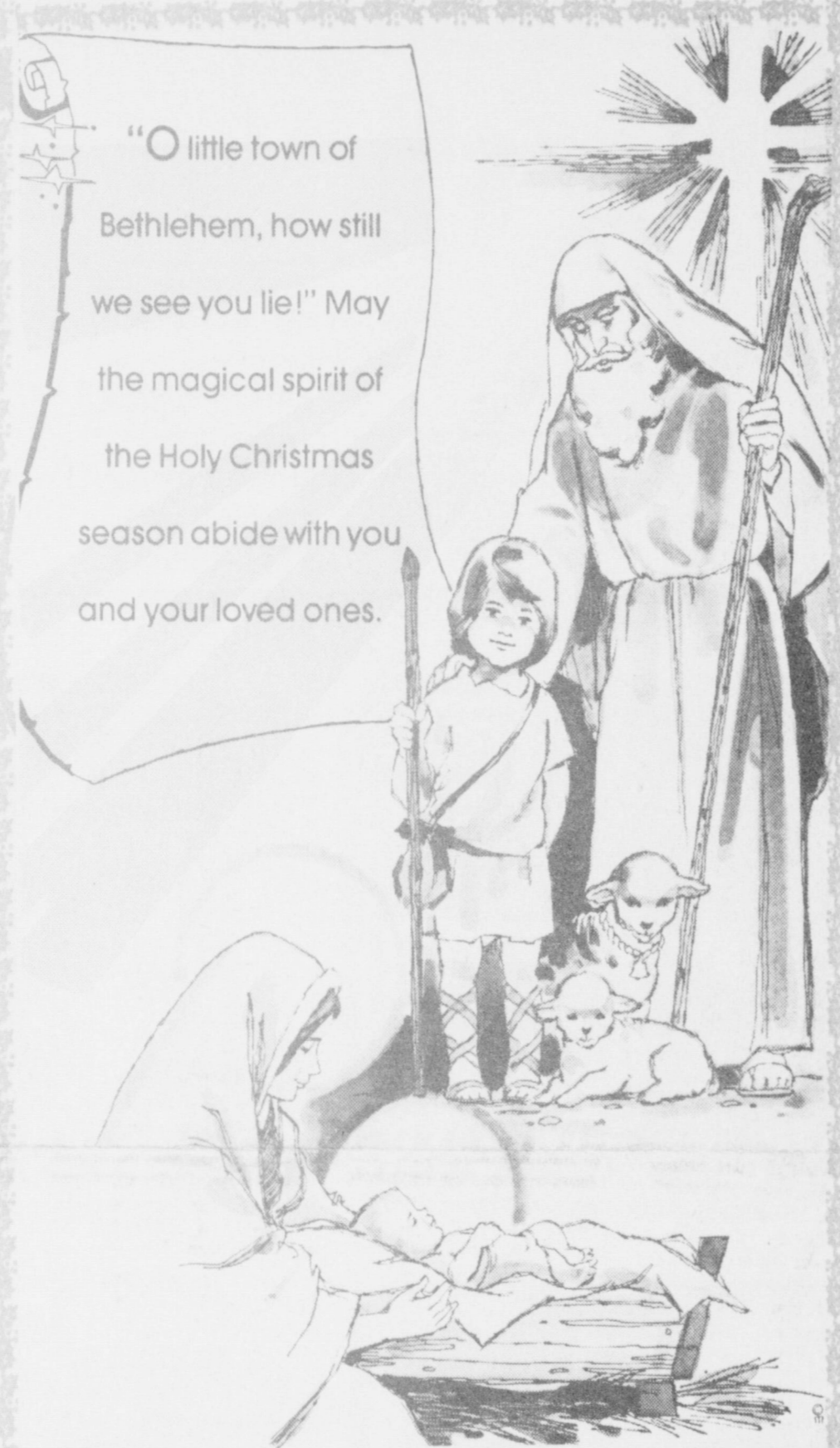

Mules Outplay Opponents In First 9 Season Games

On December 19, the Muleshoe Mules met Petersburg in varsity action, coming out ahead by a slim margin of one point. The final score was 57 to 56 in favor of the Mules. The Murray coached squad is coming around with improvements in each game and boosting their field goal and free throw percentages in good numbers.

Mark Moton slammed in 12 points for the Mules in field goals, hitting eight out of 19 for 42 percent and

attempted one free throw. Darin Shaw followed suit with a total of 15 points for the Mules. He hit six out of 15 on field goals for 40 percent and three out of four on free throws for 75 percent.

Jeff Hamilton had the best percentages in the game and totaled 14 points for the Mules. Hamilton shot for five out of seven field goals for 71 percent and four out of five free throws for 80 percent. Isaac had 8 points out of ten field goal attempts and Donald-

son had four points hitting two out of six for 33 percent. Overall, the Mules shot for 25 out of 59 field goals for 42 percent and hit 7 out of 14 free throws for 50 percent. Petersburg had 52 percent on field goals and 42 percent on free throws. Moton also led the Mules in rebounds with ten to his credit. Isaac had 9, Hamilton 7, Donaldson five, Shaw two and Langford one. Other Mules seeing action included Briggs, Flores and Agee.

Paul's Lake Area Open For Wildlife Observation

The Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge has announced the opening, Saturday, December 24, 1983, of the Paul's Lake area for wildlife observation. Paul's Lake is located approximately 17 miles south of Muleshoe on the east side of State Highway 214. The gate and 1 1/2 mile dirt road leading to a parking area overlooking Paul's Lake will be open through March 4, 1984. The gate will be closed for approximately one hour each Monday morning at sunrise for wildlife counts and the road will be closed during wet weather when the road surface is muddy.

The lake holds the main concentration of sandhill cranes on the refuge and occasionally large concentrations of ducks and geese. A wildlife count on Monday,

On Tuesday, December 20, Muleshoe City Council members approved a final audit on the City of Muleshoe for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1983.

According to Randy Field, CPA, and Dave Marr, City Manager the City finished the year in good shape.

Revenues for general governmental functions in 1983 totaled \$1,083,027, which is an increase of 6.02 percent over 1982. General property taxes produced 38.82 percent of general revenues compared to 37.5 percent last year. Revenue sources for the City of Muleshoe includes: taxes, licenses and permits, intergovernmental revenue, charges for services, fines and miscellaneous.

The assessed valuations of \$71.7 million represented an increase of 7.26 percent over the preceding year. This increase was the result principally, Marr said, of increased personal property value.

Current tax collections were 88.12 percent of the total tax levy, down 3.12 percent from last year, Marr stated. Delinquent tax collections were up by 87.3 percent from last year. A significant increase in effort to collect delinquent taxes

by the Appraisal District plus changes in penalty and interest has contributed to this increase.

Intergovernmental revenues represented 7.77 percent of total government revenues compared with 7.89 percent for 1982. Marr stated, "Considering the current trend in federal funding for municipalities, we are fortunate that we have not come to rely on the federal government to fund a larger share of essential services. Our reliance has been limited to General Revenue Sharing, Comprehensive Employment and Training and occasional Comprehensive Planning Grant Funds."

Expenditures for general governmental purposes totaled \$1,057,827 in 1983; an increase of 13.60 percent over 1982. Increases in levels of expenditures are derived from the functions of: General government, public safety, street, refuse collections, health, public service and debt service. The 5.12 percent increase in expenditures for general governmental purposes is consistent with inflation in the general economy, Marr said.

Outstanding general obligation bonds at September 30, 1983 totaled \$125,000 of which \$105,000 issued for waterworks improvements are considered to be

self-supporting. The remainder of the \$20,000 is considered to be net direct tax supported debt. The City has a balance of \$35,273 in the General Obligation debt service fund with a debt service requirement of \$20,475 in the upcoming fiscal year, according to Marr.

Proceeds of general obligation bond issues are accounted for in Capital Projects Funds until improvement projects are completed. These funds are currently being held for the sole and exclusive purpose for which they were secured. During the current year, \$5,214 was transferred to Con't Page 6, Col. 1

Crop Fertility Needs Will Be Different In '84 Says Agent

Texas fertilizer needs will be influenced by government programs, good wheat and corn harvest, heavy fall rains and an early frost. How have these factors influenced the land we farm? "The best method to grasp an understanding is to examine each category separately and look at the pre-

sent soil fertility trends from soil analysis," says Spencer Tanksley, County Agent.

Soil under PIK. Soils under the government PIK programs have been treated different on the farm. Soil building crops have been planted, wheat crops have been grazed off or the land has essentially laid fallow in Bailey County.

Soil building crops such as Blackeyed peas or Chinese red peas will begin to break down sooner due to the wet mild fall. If you are depending on all your nitrogen to be furnished by the pea crop, you may run short next August if the rains and snows continue. This information is especially true for the Southern High Plains where sandy soils lose their nitrogen. "Test soil nitrogen levels prior to planting," the county agent says.

Soils where wheat was grazed out have gained some nitrogen this summer

but the nitrogen removed from the graze out will normally negate any nitrogen increase for next year. One should soil sample these fields this fall. (Removal of all the stubble generally removes from 20 to 30 lbs/a of nitrogen.)

Summer fallowed lands where the soils are a clay loam or the finer texture clays all are showing an increase in soil nitrogen. The nitrogen levels seen in soil samples are running from 25 up to 35 lbs/a higher in nitrogen. This situation is good for our dry-land wheat producers. After the heavy October rain, insufficient soil samples from Con't Page 6, Col. 1

Economic Emergency Loan Reinstated By FmHA

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will resume making economic emergency loans by the beginning of next year, according to FmHA Bailey County Supervisor Henry W. Taylor, III.

"Economic emergency loans are designed for farmers who are in a cost-price squeeze or face other financial difficulty beyond their control," Taylor said. "In other words, the loans are for a financial emergency rather than a natural disaster such as a drought or flood."

The economic emergency or "EE" program was in operation from 1978 to 1981. The program expired in 1981 but was later reauthorized by Congress. It is being reopened under an order by the U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C.

"Under the program, loans will be available to farmers who are suffering an economic emergency through no fault of their own. They must show that they have tried unsuccessfully

fully to get a loan from another source before coming to FmHA and that they can repay the loan over a period of time, depending on the use of the funds. The funds can be used to finance debts and related uses," Taylor said.

The interest rate for direct loans fluctuates with the cost to the government of borrowing money. The interest rates for guaranteed loans, which are made by commercial lenders and backed by the government, Con't Page 6, Col. 5

rate for local service, with the remaining access line costs paid by users of long distance services. Hearne said that most long distance rates have been set much higher than the actual cost of providing this long distance service, and heavy users have been paying more than their fair share of access line costs.

This condition will change with the rate restructure on services. The access charges will be phased in over a six year period according to FCC rulings, with both customers and long distance companies paying access charges during this period. Access charges for long distance companies will decrease each year, while they will gradually increase for customers. Hearne stated that it is likely that end users will pay the full support of access services by 1990.

Hearne ended his explanations with the statements that both houses of Congress have introduced legislation which could cause changes in the telecom-

munications industry which could affect the proposed situation now. The Justice Department, which ordered the divestiture of the Bell System, could also announce changes. In addition the state regulatory commissions, which regulate the industry in each state, could act between now and then in such a manner that intrastate access charges could change.

The telephone representative also stated that whatever happens to AT&T will affect all other companies. "There are many questions we don't yet have the answers to regarding access charges and how they will ultimately affect customers and companies; yet, we want to share with all of you the information that we do have at this time," Hearne explained. "The FCC and the PUC will determine the ultimate outcome of the changes in the long run," Hearne said. He also urged customers with questions to contact their nearest GTE office for information.

Holidays Can Be Deadly

The Texas Department of Public Safety has estimated that 51 persons will be killed on Texas streets and highways during the Christmas holidays. The estimate is based upon previous holiday death statistics and the number of hours during which motorists are anticipated to travel.

"Last year, 44 persons were killed in traffic accidents during the actual holiday period. However, persons injured in various accidents across the state brought the final death toll to 52," said Colonel Jim Adams, Director of the DPS. Adams said while Texas is experiencing a significant decrease in traffic deaths statewide this year, the holidays can reflect a deadly time for motorists.

"As of noon, Friday, December 16, we had an 11 per cent reduction in traffic deaths and that is 412 fewer people killed. We attribute the reduction to increased DWI enforcement, widespread attention to the drinking driver and a renewed effort by drivers to obey traffic laws.

The DPS director said that holiday weekends are dangerous times to travel.

"We find the volume of traffic increases. Also, we still have some drivers who insist upon drinking and driving and others who exceed the speed limits. These drivers are risking accident involvement," he said.

DPS statistics show that DWI and speed are the two main contributing factors to traffic accidents in Texas.

"We'll have additional available troopers to assist the motorists and to be especially watchful for the

drunken drivers and those who speed."

Adams praised local police authorities for their work in reducing the traffic death toll and be applauded the various local programs to help keep the drinking driver from getting behind the wheel.

Civic clubs, local police agencies and other organizations have begun programs to help prevent drunk driving and this could help tremendously toward accident prevention. However, we will still find a few who will be on the road while drinking or speeding and will be involved in a tragic accident," he said.

The DPS "Operation Motorcade" program begins at 6 p.m. Friday, December 23 and ends 78-hours later at midnight on Monday, December 26. The program is designed to inform motorists of the number of traffic deaths occurring during the holiday in an attempt to increase public awareness of the dangers of holiday driving.

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Clues Indicate 'DWI's Presence

The following article is a public service by the Journal through the cooperation of Linda Guelker County Attorney, and the Prosecutor Council. Its purpose is to make you aware of a prosecutor's role, of your responsibility as a resident of Bailey County and how citizens can work together to alleviate some of society's problems.

This holiday season—with its parties, extra drinking and increased driving -- can be a particularly hazardous time. Still, the toughest laws in the world are not enough if a drunken driver crosses your path. The best defense is knowing how to identify a drunken driver and avoid him.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration suggests the following clues may indicate the presence of a drunken driver:

Turning suddenly, illegally, or in a wide radius.

Straddling the center of the lane marker or weaving from lane to lane, possibly into oncoming traffic.

Stopping inappropriately or without cause in a lane.

Driving at night without headlights on.

Failure to dim lights for

an approaching vehicle. Responding slowly to changes in traffic lights or signaling in a manner inconsistent with driving actions.

Following other vehicles too closely.

Accelerating or decelerating rapidly.

Almost hitting an object or vehicle.

If you see a driver whom you suspect may be drunk, put plenty of space between your car and his. Pull off the road and let him pass, if necessary. If you have a CB radio, give and impaired-driver alert on emergency channel 9. Give the location by identifying the road and direction of travel. Give a description of the vehicle, including model, color, and license plate number. Stand by to answer questions or repeat information.

It is each citizen's duty to report such incidents and be willing to testify about them if necessary. In this day and age we may often feel problems are too complex or massive for the individual to make a difference. But alertness and willingness to act in something that the individual can do to assist law enforcement in this area. We owe it to ourselves

to help out; it is only through our combined efforts that the DWI problem can be lessened.

Together we can give each other a happier -- and safer -- holiday season.

Returning Holiday Gifts

Were all your holiday gifts "just perfect" this year? If not, what do you do with that broken toy, clothes that don't fit, and two brand new waffle irons?

Your success in returning gifts will depend on the type of complaints and store policy, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

Consumers have the right to have their complaints resolved when merchandise is faulty or does not perform correctly," says Nancy Granovsky, a family resource management specialist. If a retailer or manufacturer won't replace faulty merchandise, consumers have recourse through the manufacturer, the Better Business Bureau, the Attorney General's office, or consumer action panels, she adds.

But if the gift doesn't fit, is the wrong color or doesn't suit your tastes, there are fewer options.

"Return policies are voluntarily offered by merchants as a convenience to their customers," says Granovsky. "Returning goods depends upon goodwill, especially if the merchandise is not defective or misrepresented."

Consumers should not expect return policies to be the same at every store, notes the specialist. For example, a liberal return policy may be one of the services you pay for by shopping at higher-priced stores.

the water and sewer fund for sewer improvements. Authorized, but unissued bonds at September 30, 1983 totaled \$80,000. Capital Project Fund balances on hand on September 30, 1983 were represented by \$10,188 in Certificates of Deposit. Marr further stated, "The general fixed assets of the City are those used in the performance of general governmental functions, and exclude the fixed assets of the Enterprise fund. As of September 30, 1983 the general fixed assets of the City of Muleshoe amounted to \$2,065,320, which represents the original cost of the assets and is considerably less than their present value. Depreciation of general fixed assets is not recognized in the City's accounting system. The City of Muleshoe filed applications with the FAA and the TAC to implement the recommendations of an Airport Master Plan to relocate the municipal airport in 1981. The City is

currently trying to locate and acquire a suitable site for the proposed new airport. Marr said that the City's water and sewer utility continued to show moderate gains in operating revenues, number of customers, net income and debt service coverage. During the year, \$39,000 of regularly maturing revenue bonds were retired in the Water and Sewer fund. In addition, \$25,000 of general obligation bonds, serviced with the earnings of Water and Sewer fund activities were retired. In figuring coverage, revenue supported general obligation bonds have been included in order to present a more accurate picture of the Water and Sewer Revenue Supported Debt Structure. The information contained in this report was submitted by Dave Marr, Jr. Muleshoe City Manager with the assistance of Sudduth, Field and Company.

the sandy soils have been analyzed to establish and trend this month. But it is expected that sizeable amounts of mineralized nitrogen has been leached downward by these heavy fall rains. "These fields should be sampled prior to planting in 1984," Spencer Tanksley said. **Good Wheat and Corn Yields.** Examining yield reports from the agricultural producers working this area indicate some bin burster yields. Many of the dryland wheat fields yielded from 25 up to 50 bu/a of wheat. Irrigated wheat showed reports of 100 to 125 bu/a. Records on the 125 bu/a wheat field indicated nitrogen required was 1.8 lbs/a of nitrogen per bushel. This nitrogen rate is very close to the 2 lbs. of nitrogen per bushel suggested by the Extension Soil Testing Laboratory at Lubbock. Corn yields indicate several fields exceeded the 180 bu/a and some over 210 bu/a. Not a bad yield for about a \$50.00 to \$80.00 per acre fertilizer input. These top yields have drained soil

fertility levels somewhat. If one is planning on going back again, such as wheat on wheat or corn on corn, one should sample these fields this fall to check for nitrogen levels. One may need to apply additional nitrogen for stubble break down. "It requires about 20 lbs/a of nitrogen per ton of residue to prevent the soybean from tying up the nitrogen," the county agent says. **Heavy Rain.** October brought record rains to many locations on the High Plains and Rolling Plains. To what effect this amount of rainfall has leached the clay loam soils, we can not say. (In most cases, on clay loam soils, we seldom see nitrogen loss.) Sandy soils south of Lubbock have been leached considerably. **Early Frost.** Early frost this fall stopped sorghum and soybean growth. Yield estimates for soybeans range from 15 to 40 percent loss. Traditionally, soybeans are known as a soil builder which adds nitrogen to the soil. However, soil analysis

on the High Plains show that soil samples following soybean are more frequently lower in nitrogen (90 times out of 100) than the nitrogen level following any other crop. This year a little more nitrogen should be observed in soybean soils due to the immature beans killed by the frosts and left by the combine. Don't count on the soybean furnishing the nitrogen for next year's crop. The early frost has also taken its toll on the late milo crops. Some milo was cut for silage. Here approximately 200 lbs of nitrogen was removed with immature grain and stover. Nitrogen levels on these sites should be tested and checked again next June. If one needs assistance and information on soil testing, consult your county Extension agent.

shooting for three out of six, he has six rebounds. However, Big John Isaac has made the most field goals and has the distinction of being the team's leading scorer and rebounder. Isaac has shot for 122 field goals, making 50 for 41 percent; in free throws, he has hit 14 out of 36 for 39 percent, totaling 114 points for the Mules. Isaacs averages 12.7 points per game. He has a total of 93 rebounds, 17 turnovers, five assists and three steals. Darin Shaw comes up as second high point man in the nine game roundup. Shaw shot for 99 field goals, hitting on 42 for 42 percent and hit 10 out of 21 field goals for 48 percent. He added 94 points to the Mules' total, averaging 104 points per game. Shaw was fourth man in rebounds, with 42. He also had 19 turnovers, 20 assists, and 24 steals. Mark Moton and Jeff Hamilton tied for third place in total points for the Mules, with 87 each, and an average of 9.7 points per game. In field goals Moton hit 37 out of 119 tries for 31 percent and in free throws he hit 13 out of 24 for 54 percent. Moton was also third highest in rebounds. He had 29 turnovers, 24 assists and led the Mules in steals with 29. Jeff Hamilton, while tied for third place in points, averaged a little better on free throws and field goals. He shot for 90 field goals, making 36 for 40 percent and hit 15 out of 24 free throws for 63 percent. He was second high man in rebounding, having 82 to his credit. Hamilton had 16 turnovers, 16 assists, and 16 steals through the first nine games of the season. Rob Donaldson, the tall man for the Mules, was next in line in total points and in rebounds. He had a total of 53 points for the Mules, averaging 7.6 per game. In field goals, Donaldson was 41 percent accurate, hitting 24 out of 59; and in free throws he hit five out of 9 for 56 percent. Donaldson had 41 rebounds, ten turnovers, three assists and four steals. Preston Langford followed next in line for the Mules, with a total of 18 points

overall. In field goals, Langford shot for 17 and made 7 for 41 percent and in free throws hit four out of 10 for 40 percent. He had a two point average per game. In rebounds, Preston had eight; he had six turnovers, four assists and six steals. Trent Hysinger totaled 17 points for the Mules, hitting five out of 15 field goal attempts for 33 percent and seven out of 10 on free throws for a 70 percent accuracy - which, by the way, was the best on free throws percentages. He averaged 2.1 points per game and had 17 rebounds, six turnovers, two assists and six steals. Agee and Briggs tied for total points in the first nine games, with seven each. Briggs hit three out of 12 field goals for 25 percent and one out of three free throws for 33 percent. He had nine rebounds, nine turnovers, two assists and two steals. Agee hit three out of ten field goals for 30 percent and one out of five free throws for 20 percent. He totaled up 13 rebounds, two turnovers, eight assists and two steals. Team stats through the

first nine games read like this: in field goals, the Mules were 37 percent accurate, hitting 210 out of 549; in free throws the percentage was better, hitting 70 out of 142 for 42 percent. They had an overall total of 490 points to their opponents' totals of 483, and averaged 54.4 points per game to the opposition's 53.6. They had 387 rebounds to 335 scored by opponents. In an overview, the Mules outscored out-rebounded and had a higher percentage on field goals than did their opponents in the first nine games. Coach Murray is confident that with some positive playing, the Mules will be a strong force in district competition beginning the first part of January.

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
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

The family endured many hardships — bitter-cold winters as well as stifling summer heat. They lived first in a log cabin, later in a dugout by the creek, then, later in shacks — wherever fate (and Father) moved them. They went through cyclones, droughts, plagues of cicadas, yet the Ingalls family shared love and faith in each other, and they always celebrated the birthday of the Christ Child.

For a Christmas in the big woods, when the house was blanketed with snow, Ma baked bread, beans, cookies...distilled vinegar and baked dried apple pies! Truly a doughy soul. They entertained relatives Aunt Eliza and Uncle Peter and the cousins who arrived on Christmas Eve on their big bobsled, sleigh bells ringing.

Christmas Eve found them aglow with anticipation, in a circle of love.

In the morning the children found gifts in their stockings: a pair of bright red knitted mittens and a stick of red-and-white striped mint candy. Guess who the Christmas Fairy was? She must have earned her reward in heaven, but that Christmas Day she received all the reward she wanted, in the surprise and happiness expressed by every child.
