### Reagans hold family peace talks

LOS ANGELES (AP) President Reagan and his wife, Nancy, held peace talks Friday with the president's eldest son, Michael, and resolved all their differences, according to the first lady.

'It was a nice visit. There are no differences. All is resolved," Mrs. Reagan said in a statement issued by the White House press office after the three-hour meeting in the president's Century Plaza Hotel tower

'Everybody loves each other and this is a wonderful way to start the new year," said the first lady.

According to the statement, Michael and his family exchanged Christmas presents with Reagan and his wife and "enjoyed a pleasant

Michael, accompanied by his wife, Colleen, 5-year old son, Cameron, and 20-month old daughter. Ashley. departed in a station wagon without speaking to reporters.

It was the first time Reagan had seen Ashley.

The meeting, Michael and the president's first since their family feud became public, was held with all the secrecy of an international summit.

Just minutes before Michael arrived in a four-car motorcade, reporters and television camera crews were ordered by the Secret Service to leave the area.

When they got out of the car and began to walk into the entrance, a reporter shouted to Michael, asking what he was going to tell his father. "That I love him," Michael Reagan replied before entering the building.



### Mexican protesters block bridge for third day, stall traffic on another

EAGLE PASS, Texas (AP) — Mexican protesters blocked the international bridge between Eagle Pass and Piedras Negras, Mexico, for a third consecutive day Friday and paralyzed traffic on a second bridge for three hours, authorities said.

Mexican authorities called in fire trucks and threatened to disband demonstrators with firehoses

The protests in Piedras Negras began Wednesday over allegations of election fraud made by Mexico's National Action party. Sympathetic supporters in Ciudad Acuna joined the protest Friday afternoon, closing the bridge between that Mexican city and Del Rio, Texas, according to James Bazemore, inspector with the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service in Eagle Pass.



The National Weather Service predicts showers for parts of Washington, Oregon and California Saturday. Snow is expected for parts of Montana, Idaho and Wyoming. Showers are forecast in a wide band from northern New England to southern Texas.

### Midland has slight chance for showers, thunderstorms

Midlanders may get rained on today but only if the weatherman's slim odds for rain pan out.

The weatherman at the National Weather Service at Midland Regional Airport has predicted a 20 percent chance of showers and thundershowers today and a 20 percent chance of showers Sunday.

The high temperature today is to be near 70, and winds are to increase to 15 to 20 mph and gusty by mid-morning. The weatherman is calling for considerable cloudiness and cooler tem-

peratures tonight. The low is to be in the mid-40s. The high Sunday is to be in the lower 60s.

Friday's peak temperature was 68 degrees, while the record high for a Dec. 28 is 80 degrees in 1964. The overnight low was 60 degrees, and the record low for a Dec. 29 is 9 degrees in 1983.

Tropical air stretching across the state brought unusually warm and humid conditions Friday, with the outlook calling for more of the same through the weekend. By 4 p.m., the mercury was well into the 70s over most of the state, with

only the Panhandle and western mountains in the 50s and 60s. Laredo and McAllen both reported 80-degree temperatures, while El Paso was a cool 56. A weak cool front extended from eastern New Mexico through the Trans Pecos area, bringing westerly winds at 10 to 15 mph, while southerly winds whistled across the rest of Texas at 15 to 25 mph, the National Weather

The low-hanging clouds produced patchy light rain in the High Plains. Light showers dotted the middle Rio Grande plains and southern Hill Coun-

try between Crystal City and Kerrville. Other showers were located along the upper coast from Matagorda Bay to Sargent, Sealy and Sugar Land south of Houston.

The forecast called for more warm and humid weather through Saturday. Overnight lows were expected to range from the 40s and 50s in the High Plains and Trans Pecos to the 60s and lower 70s in northern, central and southern Texas.

NATION

It felt like summer in parts of the Midwest, where dozens of temperature records snapped Friday, but winter storms dumped two feet of snow on Colorado and iced highways in New England and the northern Plains. A frontal system extended from Upper Michigan across northwest Iowa,

northern Nebraska to central Wyoming, separating warm temperatures on one side from bitter cold air on the other. Temperatures in the 60s and 70s were common over the Ohio and Tennessee valleys, the middle and lower Mississippi valley and much of the central

and southern Plains. To the north of the front, readings were below zero or in the single digits from northwest Minnesota across portions of the northern Plains to the

northern Rockies. A travelers advisory was in effect for much of South Dakota and west

central and northeast Minnesota. In North Dakota, gusty northerly winds of up to 25 mph will produce wind chill temperatures between 30 below and 40 below zero, the National

Weather Service said. Freezing rain plagued the Northeast, and travelers advisories were posted for interior sections of Connecticut, Rhode Island, most of Massachusetts, Vermont, New Hampshire and northern New York state.

### OPEC to impose outside audit on members

By HANNS NEUERBOURG

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP) OPEC ministers, struggling to restore their credibility and thereby avert a collapse of oil prices, agreed Friday to break with tradition and impose an outside audit on members' production and pricing prac-

But they left details of the policing plan for a later date, a delay that analysts said would continue to make it difficult to restore confidence in the 13-nation cartel.

A sign of that skepticism came as Conoco Inc., citing current market conditions, announced in Houston that as of Jan. 1, it was slashing the price it will pay for West Texas Intermediate crude, the major grade of oil in the United States, by \$1.30 a barrel to \$26.70.

Most major U.S. producers are still paying between \$28 and \$29 a barrel for West Texas Intermediate, which stood at \$30 in October and is of higher quality than OPEC's benchmark blend, Arabian Light oil.

The Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries is trying to defend its \$29-a-barrel price of Arabian Light, but its ministers failed Friday to resolve the divisive issue of proposed revisions in the cartel's prices of their lower- and higherquality grades of oil.

A proposal before OPEC would increase heavy oils 50 cents a barrel and reduce light oils by 25 cents in an attempt to make them more competitive on world markets. Debate

was to continue today. Because light oils could easily be converted into refined products, such as gasoline, they have traditionally been in high demand. But as prices soared in the OPEC boom years of 1973-1981, with Arabian Light rising from \$2.75 to \$34 a barrel, refiners found it economical to convert plants to process less expensive heavier crudes. The heavy oil sells for several dollars a barrel below Arabian Light and are even cheaper compared with the extra light oils of Algeria and Libya.

Going into Friday's session, Nige-

ria's oil minister, Tam David-West, said he wanted heavy oil prices raised by \$1 to \$1.50 a barrel while leaving light crude oil prices unchanged. Nigeria produces light

Venezuela's oil minister, Arturo Hernandez Grisanti, said going into the price discussions Friday that he would be willing to have heavy crude prices rise "a little bit." Venezuela's main oil output is heavy oils.

Some ministers have insisted that the key to OPEC's survival is agreement on both a system to prevent its members from cheating on production quotas and on the price realign-

Mana Saeed Oteiba, the oil minister of the United Arab Emirates. warned before Thursday's opening session that OPEC would be headed for a price war unless both problems facing the conference were resolved

Following price cuts by independent producers Britain and Norway in October, OPEC-member Nigeria broke ranks with the cartel to cut its

prices by up to \$2 a barrel and increase production. In a special meeting of OPEC later that month, OPEC vowed to defend its official prices by reducing its overall production ceiling to 16 million barrels a day from 17.5 million.

OPEC counted on creating a temporary oil shortage at a time of year when colder temperatures in the Northern Hemisphere could be counted on to increase demand for its oil. But temperatures were not that cold and OPEC's members neither kept to price nor production

The audit accord, reached at a Friday morning session of OPEC's yearend ministerial conference, was an agreement to establish a watchdog panel to verify members production and sales.

But Indonesian Oil Minister Subroto, the conference chairman and acting president of OPEC, said a committee would still have to complete details so that the project could be implemented "as soon as

### Bush to ask Reagan to meet with oilmen

WICHITA FALLS (AP) - U.S. Rep. elect Beau Boulter says Vice President George Bush will ask President Reagan to meet with Texas oilmen who are furious over a proposed tax-reform plan released by the Treasury Department.

Boulter, R-Amarillo, said the proposed tax changes would deal a 'death blow" to independent oil and gas producers in the state.

"It could be just about the last nail in the coffin," Boulter said in a Thursday press conference sponsored by the North Texas Oil and Gas Association.

The representative said he met with the vice president during a recent trip from Washington to

Texas aboard Air Force II. A spokeswoman for Bush in Washington confirmed that Boulter had been on the vice president's jet for the trip, but said that Bush was "off duty" in Texas Friday and could not be reached for comment.

"I explained (to Bush) that, as the vice president should well understand being from Texas and an oilman himself, our energy independence is too important to tax our new domestic production out of

existence," Boulter said.

Boulter said Bush agreed to ask Reagan to meet with oil producers.

The vice president acknowledged that President Reagan himself should hear the concerns of the independent oil industry over this plan," Boulter said.

"With the vice president going to bat for us, I think we'll see that the meeting with the president occurs in the near future," he said.

Bush was "very receptive to the problem the independent oil industry might face if tax plans were passed as written," Boulter said.







### Some bar owners pleased with end of two-for-one drinks

By The Associated Press

Some tavern and bar owners say they're pleased with a state mandate prohibiting two-for-one alcoholic drink specials, but others are scrambling for ways to skirt the new rule.

The rules, announced Thursday and effective immediately, bar two-for-one happy hours, but do not prohibit selling doubles for the price of singles or offering half-price drinks.

Steve Rich, manager of Dallas' Confetti, said the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission's decision will "help eliminate these 'Bar

Wars' we've got. Some places go for five-forone," he said. "It's become a continual contest to see who can offer more for less and lure in

the customers. Houston Restaurant Association executive director Jim Manley said most club and restaurant owners with whom he's spoken say they only have happy hours to stay competitive.

"Somehow this got started and everybody has to meet the com-petition," Manley said. "None I know of are anxious to do it."

The decision may benefit clubs patrons begin to drink at a deliberate pace, said Eddie Gattus, the manager of Monopoly's Park Place in Dallas.

"I agree with the whole concept," Gattus said. "If there were no happy hours or two-for-one's, people might not come out to drink so much and business might slack off initially. But eventually, it'd work out to the management's advantage. There'd be more games, pinball,

talking and more dancing. But other bar owners said they would look for ways around the

"Where does the crud end?" asked Greg Winborn, whose Baxter's clubs in Houston and Austin serve the equivalent of two happy-hour drinks in one big

Winborn said he believes the TABC makes rules as it goes

along "I liken them to the Gestapo," he said.

Kent Leopold, owner of the Caribana, a reggae music club in central Houston, changed a sign advertising three drinks for the price of one to show they will now be sold at a reduced price of

"Whatever TABC tells me to do, I'll do," Leopold said. But he added, "Two or three shots in one drink are more devastating than the same amount of liquor over two or three drinks.

C.W. Ross, manager of Cooters, a southwest Houston club, said the TABC mandate won't affect his business much.

'We feel we have more to offer than drinking at the club," Ross said. "People don't come here just for two-for-one drinks. We have a full-service restaurant, a 20-foot free buffet, shuffleboard and pool.

Ross said his club will serve larger drinks in one glass, instead of two, in compliance with the

W.H. "Buckshot" Price, executive vice president of the Texas Restaurant Association, said the commission's policy is "inconsistent, inadequate and confusing" and doesn't focus on alcohol abuse at home, work and school.

### Women paid less for comparable work, report says

AUSTIN (AP) - Female employees as a group get lower salaries than males for doing comparable work, three women members of a task force that studied state government jobs said Friday.

The state has ignored a 1919 law that prohibits job and wage discrimination because "wage gaps" based on race, as well as sex, exist in state government, a preliminary report by the Texas State Employees Union

The study analyzed employment patterns in five state agencies that employ two-thirds of the state's 91,000 classified workers - the

health-mental retardation.

The Employees Union urged the Legislature to establish a Select Committee on Pay Equity to study "job segregation" and how salaries are set in state government. The union said in a statement that Sen.elect Gonzalo Barrientos, D-Austin, would file a bill to create the com-

Stephanie Young, a union member and an Employment Commission employee, said the task force found that the "state's hiring prac-

Ms. Young was joined at a news conference by task force members Sally Kyle, who works at the Austin State School, and Paula McClain-Mixon of the Department of Human

The report said women comprise 50 percent of the state workforce, and 62 percent earn less than \$16,000 a year, while only 27 percent of men are paid less than \$16,000.

"Female employees as a group are paid less than male state employees," the report said, and added, "As

Texas Employment Commission and departments of human resources, highways, corrections and mental tices tend to channel women and minorities into low-paying, low-status jobs." the system now operates, pay for jobs in state employment often reflects the sex of the job holders rather than the content of their

The report said women account for 72.6 percent of the workers paid less than \$13,000 a year, and of workers who earn \$33,000 or more a year, only 12 percent are female.

As examples of the "undervalua-tion of women's work," the report said an experienced seamstress gets \$235 a month less than a helper-furniture refinisher, and a Nurse II gets \$503 a month less than a Pharmacist


### Brain-damaged girl regains her speech

Shanda Baldwin was "a little chatterbox" until carbon-monoxide poisoning caused brain damage that doctors said would leave her paralyzed and probably speechless the rest of her life.

But nearly a year after the accident, she suddenly regained all of her speech, just in time to wish her startled family and therapists a merry Christmas.

"When she had her accident, they told us if she would live she'd be nothing more than a vegetable for the rest of her life," said the girl's mother, Linda Baldwin of Mayville,

'They told us they didn't think she'd ever speak again, and if she



did, it would be only family...who would be able to understand her," Mrs. Baldwin, 31, said by telephone Thursday from the furniture factory where she works.

She said her daughter was "a little chatterbox" before the accident that occurred Feb. 28 when snow apparently clogged the exhaust pipe of a car in which she was riding,

forcing deadly carbon monoxide fumes into the passenger compart-

Then suddenly on Dec. 17, for the first time since beginning daily therapy sessions last July at the Lake Erie Institute for Rehabilitation, Shanda said "Momma" to therapist Nannette Crawford. Later that day, 'Momma'' became "Mommy,"

slightly more difficult word to pro-

The next day, Shanda began speaking in complete sentences. She turned to therapist Linda Starkey and said, "Good morning," wished her a merry Christmas and asked if she could call her mother.

"There were just tears all over this place. No one could have imagined a better Christmas present," said Michael Plasha, spokesman for the institute. "They never expected her to talk again.'

A staff member called Mrs. Baldwin. "I could only think it was something bad or else they wouldn't call me at work," she said

### FBI enters investigation of museum painting's theft

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The FBI has entered the investigation into the theft of a painting that was stolen from the Philadelphia Art Museum either during or shortly after a dinner-dance attended by Mayor W. Wilson Goode, members of his cabinet and business leaders.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Gregory Miller said the FBI stepped into the case because of the expensive piece of art involved, American artist William Harnett's 1877 painting of a \$5 bill,

valued by the museum at between \$75,000 and \$100,000.







## Cowboys lasso Gamecocks

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) - Tight end Barry Hanna, who had not scored all season, turned Rusty Hilger's short pass into a dramatic 25-yard touchdown with 1:04 left to play, lifting ninth-ranked Oklahoma State to a 21-14 Gator Bowl victory over No. 7 South Carolina Friday night.

The triumph gave the Cowboys a 10-2 record, making them the first team in Oklahoma State's 83-year football history to win more than nine games in a season.

The bitter setback prevented South Carolina from winning for the first time in six bowl trips, although the Gamecocks, also 10-2, are the first team in the school's history to win more than eight games in a sea-

Hanna, a 6-foot-2, 232-pound senior, caught Hilger's pass at the Carolina 21, the 8-yard-line, but dragged three defenders into the end zone.

The winning touchdown capped an 88yard drive in 11 plays, with Hilger completing six of eight passes for 75 yards, including a 13-yarder to Hanna on fourth-and-six from the South Carolina 49.

After an incomplete pass, freshman

Thurman Thomas, who rushed for 155 yards on 32 carries, picked up 11. Hilger and Hanna hooked up for the game-winner on the next play.

Oklahoma State thoroughly dominated the first half and took a 13-0 lead on Thomas' 1-yard run in the first period and his 6-yard pass to Hilger in the second quarter. But the Cowboys had to come from behind after South Carolina scored twice in the third period despite less than two minutes of possession time.

The Gamecocks, whose offense was the nation's ninth best during the regular season, were held to just 71 yards in the first two periods by Oklahoma State's eighthranked defense and were shut out for the first time in any half this season.

And even though they had the football for just 1:42 in the third quarter, they managed to take a 14-13 lead on halfback Quinton Lewis' 24-yard pass to Chris Wade and a 57-yard bomb from quarterback Mike Hold to Ira Hillary. The first strike covered 71 yards in four plays and 56 seconds, while the latter was a two-play, 77-yard thrust that took only 40 seconds.

The Gamecocks' only other possession in the third period ended with a fumble on the first play, one of four South Carolina

Oklahoma State failed to convert after its second touchdown when Jerry Coshow's snap sailed over both holder Adam Hinds and kicker Larry Roach, and Hinds' desperation pass was intercepted.

Oklahoma State's first-half touchdowns capped methodical, time-consuming drives of 69 and 74 yards.

Thomas and Hilger produced all the yards as Oklahoma State took a 7-0 lead on its first possession. Thomas carried eight times for 40 yards, including an 18-yard burst to the 3, while Hilger completed all four pass attempts for 29 yards.

Roach missed a 47-yard field goal attempt 1½ minutes later, but the Cowboys made it 13-0 at 5:21 of the second period after linebacker Ricky Adams recovered a fumble by Hold at the OSU 26.

The 15-play drive included a 20-yard

Thomas. On third-and-goal from the six, Hilger pitched right to Thomas, and the rookie tailback lobbed the ball back to the left to Hilger, who scored easily.
Oklahoma State was threatening to

increase its lead after taking the secondhalf kickoff and marching from its 20 to the Carolina 29 while eating up almost 61/2 minutes. Hilger rolled out on fourth-andtwo, but with ample running room staring at him, he elected to pass and it fell incom-

That was the break South Carolina needed. On the Gamecock's first play of the period, Hold fired a 45-yard pass to Eric Poole at the OSU 26. Three plays later, Lewis took a pitchout and passed to Wade, who was hit by cornerback Windell Yancy at the one, but dragged him into the end

Oklahoma State's winning score came after South Carolina used up more than five minutes in moving from its 36 to the -Cowboys' 41 before Tom O'Connor's punt was downed at the 12 with 3:41 remaining.

## Giants ride defense; Seattle seeks revenge

### Can NY stop Montana?

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - The New York Giants' chances of further survival in the National Football League playoffs depend most on their degree of defensive success against the San Francisco 49ers.

Physically, they have some great players on defense. I have great regard for (linebacker) Harry Carson, in particular," San Francisco Coach Bill Walsh said, analyzing the team his 49ers, 15-1, will play on

The Giants, 9-7 in the regular season, beat the Los Angeles Rams 16-13 last Sunday in the National Football Conference wild-card game. The defense provided some big sparks including four quarterback sacks, a fumble recovery which set up a touchdown, and a yield of only 214 net yards to the offense of the favored Rams.

Carson, a nine-year veteran, is usually mentioned after another of the Giants' linebackers, All-Pro Lawrence Taylor, who had a careerhigh 111/2 sacks this season and led the team in tackles with 114.

But quarterback Joe Montana and the 49ers' ball carriers haven't been thered all that much by games with the Giants, including the one two months ago which Walsh's team won 31-10 at Giants Stadium.

Montana threw for three touchdowns and was sacked just once in that rout. Wendell Tyler's 101 yards paced a rushing attack which

averaged 5.2 yards per attempt. We have an outstanding guard, John Ayers, who has done reasonably well against Taylor - the best

we can hope for is a standoff there and we have a mobile quarterback in Joe Montana who can get the ball off quickly," Walsh said, trying to explain why Taylor and the Giants' other highly respected defenders have generally been frusrated against the 49ers.


In the 49ers' first playoff game of 1981, Ayers' blocking from his left guard position was the main reason Taylor went virtually unnoticed in the game which San Francisco won 38-24 en route to the Super Bowl XVI

'Lawrence played on our right side all the time then. Ayers did do a great job on him. But since then, Lawrence has played different places and the 49ers have handled him several ways," Giants defensive coordinator Bill Belichick said as his unit prepared for another crack at the San Francisco offense. "Ayers has done a great job, but it's just not the one-on-one thing everybody has made it out to be.

Ayers says that although he'll be expecting to take on Taylor a lot Saturday "you never are sure where he's going to be.

On the other hand, the 49ers' opponents never are sure what they're going to try next on offense.

Belichick describes the Walshdesigned attack as a "multidimensional nightmare.

### Hawks remember '83

MIAMI (AP) - Today is encore time for Coach Chuck Knox and the Seattle Seahawks.

When the Seahawks meet the Miami Dolphins at the Orange Bowl in a 11:30 a.m. game (NBC-TV) they will be revisiting the scene of last year's crime, a 27-20 upset that knocked Miami out of the Super Bowl Derby. So in preparing to play the Dolphins again this season, they followed the same script.

With one exception. This year, the Seahawks arrive on time - just before midnight Thursday.

"We did the same things we did last year." Knox said Friday after putting the Seahawks through a short workout at the Orange Bowl. Except that last season we had a four-hour plane delay and didn't get in until the morning and didn't get to bed until 5 a.m. Friday.

Though it's only a quarterfinal in the race to capture Super Bowl XIX, to be played Jan. 20 in Palo Alto, Calif., the game matches two of the National Football League's better teams this year.

The Dolphins finished at 142, best in the AFC and second best in the league and set a host of offensive records en route. The most notable mark was Dan Marino's 5,084 yards and 48 touchdown passes, 18 of which went to Mark Clayton and gave Clayton a single-season record

for touchdown receptions. The Seahawks, meanwhile, seemed headed for the AFC West title before losing their last two games and finishing 12-4. But they rebounded in the AFC wild-card game last Saturday to knock out the defending Super Bowl champion Los Angeles Raiders 13-7 in a game in which they reverted to Knox's favored "Ground Chuck" offense.

That has set up one of the story

lines for Saturday's game. Will Seattle use that rejuvenated ground game to attack Miami at it's most vulernable spot, run defense? Or will it depend on the arm of Dave Krieg, its most dependable weapon after Curt Warner was lost for the season after the opening game?

Miami Coach Don Shula thinks it

when Warner rushed for 113 yards. Or at least that's what Shula's been saying he thinks.

"We've always known they had the running capabilities," Shula said. The Raiders are very good against the run. They tried everyting four linemen, four linebackers and they couldn't stop them.

Knox, naturally, would neither confirm nor deny his game plan, although he did point out another obvious device — a ball-control offense to keep the ball from Marino, Clayton and Mark Duper, the other half of the receiving pair known around here as the "Twin Marks" or the "Marks Brothers." ### Bramble predicts knockout victory

RENO, Nev. (AP) - World Boxing Association lightweight champion Livingstone Bramble predicted Friday he would retain his crown with a knockout of Ray Mancini in a rematch for the title Mancini lost to Bramble seven months ago.

'The fight will not go 15 rounds. I want to knock Mancini out," Bramble told a news conference called to formally announce the fight, scheduled for Feb. 16 in Reno.

"I destroyed Mancini ... I beat him up" he said of their June 1 meeting in which he stopped the badly cut former champion in the 14th round with Mancini leading on two judges' cards.

Mancini would not predict the outcome of the "I just promise I'll go out and fight with my

heart and soul to get the title back," he said. The fight will be held at the 12,000-seat Lawlor

Events Center in Reno, where Mancini, of Youngstown, Ohio, stopped a battered Bobby Chacon of Oroville, Calif., in the third round of their championship match last Jan. 14.

The undercard is scheduled to feature 1984 Olympic gold medalist Mark Breland in his third professional outing against an opponent to be

February's rematch will be the first outing for Mancini, 29-2 with 23 knockouts, since he lost the title to Bramble in Buffalo, N.Y. He currently is

ranked No. 3 by the WBA. Bramble, a native of the Virgin Islands now living in Passaic, N.J., is 22-1-1 with 14 knockouts. His only fight since winning the championship was a 10-round unanimous decision over Edwin Curet in a non-title fight in Atlantic City, N.J.

Adams accounted for 1,689 yards rushing, receiving and returning kickoffs for the Wildcats and is the best career all-purpose runner in Kentucky history.

"Right now I'm not pleased with my career," he said, "not as long as I have one more game to play. I'm never pleased until it's all over.

He said that Kentucky, which lost 20-16 to West Virginia in the 1983 Hall of Fame game, wants to prove that it can win a bowl game in Birmingham.

'And I want to go out a winner so I can always remember my last Hall of Fame

game with a good feeling," Adams

The same was said by the 6-foot-5, 260-pound Sims, whose play for the Badgers has attracted the attention

of pro scouts.

"I want this game to be my showcase," he said. "I'm planning on pulling out all the stops. This is the last one for me for Wisconsin and I'd like to go out with something for the fant to remember me by."

fans to remember me by."

He is "fired up," Sims said. "If I have to make all the tackles by myself, I'm ready to do that. But I know I won't, because this whole team is fired up. But if I have to, I will. That's how fired up I am.'

Adams said he knows that "I'm a marked man in every game I play" but that opponents can't concentrate solely on him.

"If they stop me, we go to our receivers," he said. "We've got a good quarterback in Bill Ransdell and we'll win that way."

Ransdell and Wisconsin's quarterback, Mike Howard, have similar statistics. Ransdell has hit on 148 of 266 attempts for 1,748 yards and 11 touchdowns. Howard is 163 of 285 for 1,924 yards and 10 touchdowns. Each has suffered 11 interceptions.

Sims noted that Kentucky's offensive linemen are shorter than he has


faced in the Big Ten.

### Cavaliers' Welsh sees high-scoring contest

ATLANTA (AP) - The records of Virginia and Purdue indicate that Monday's Peach Bowl football contest should be a high-scoring affair, but "I don't know what to expect," Virginia Coach George Welsh said

Virginia, making its first-ever bowl appearance, wound up with a 7-2-2 record and finished second in the Atlantic Coast Conference while averaging 27.1 points a game.

Purdue, 74 and runnerup in the Big Ten Conference, used a powerful passing attack to amass an average of 23.8 points a game.

Virginia is a three-point favorite in the 2 p.m. kickoff at Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium, with a crowd of 52,000-55,000 expected for the nationally televised game.

It will be Purdue's fifth bowl, and the Boilermakers are unbeaten in the other four, the most recent in 1980. Purdue defeated Georgia Tech

41-21 in the 1978 Peach Bowl. Welsh, who previously coached at Navy, is in his third season at Virginia. He has guided the Cavaliers to their first consecutive winning sea-

Burke Marketing Research Inc. asked executives in 100 of the nation's 1,000 largest companies, "What employee behavior disturbs you the most?"  The result was a "hit parade of things that stick in the boss's craw, the kind of behavior that hits a nerve, "said Marc Silbert, whose temporary personnel agency commissioned the survey. "They can blind employers to employees' good qualities. They become beyond redemption."  Dishonesty and lying topped the list. "If a company believes that an employee lacks integrity, all positive qualities — ranging from skill and experience to productivity and intelligence — become meaningless," said Silbert, vice president of Accountemps.  "This isn't just the guy who steals money from petty cash," he explained. "It includes intellectual dishonesty. We had one employer complain about an employee who took on a job with a Nov. 16 deadline even though he knew he'd be on vacation that week."  The seven other deadly sins, in order of irritation:  2. Irresponsibility, goofing-off and doing personal business on company time. "We found some people literally conducting their own ongoing businesses on company time," Silbert said. "It's not just a guy getting a phone call from his wife to pick up eggs on the way home. This is someone running a T-shirt business out of the office. It's entrepreneurial behavior gone wild."  3. Arrogance, ego problems and excessive aggressiveness. "Employees who spend more time boasting about their accomplishments than on actually getting the job donewho think that being loud or boisterous will have a positive effect' bother their bosses, Silbert said.  "If you have this kind of person in a supervisory role, you don't have one problem, you have 20. Yo

## Big Play artists at work

HOUSTON (AP) - They attack from different positions and with different skills, but Texas Christian's Kenneth Davis and West Virginia's Willie Drewery head the list of big play artists who will perform in the 26th Bluebonnet Bowl in the Astrodome New Year's Eve.

Davis, a 5-foot-11, 195-pound junior, is a first- team All-American who missed the national rushing title by 44 yards to Ohio State's Keith Byars in leading the Frogs to an 8-3 record.

Drewery is smaller at 5-foot-10, 165 pounds, but just as deadly. The senior from Columbus, N.J., ranks third in the nation in kickoff returns and 10th in punt returns. He's the Mountaineers' No. 2 receiver with 30 catches for a 14.7 average.

"TCU is a big-play team that comes at you with the run," West Virginia Coach Don Nehlen said. "They'll go along getting two and five yards and suddenly, they're gone for 60 vards.

Nehlen referred primarily to Davis, who gained 1,611 yards this season. Against Cotton Bowl host

Houston, Davis pecked at the Cougar defense in the first quarter before bursting out with a 57-yard run to set up TCU's first touchdown.

Drewery has been almost as effective in the big-play department for the Mountaineers, who bring a 7-4 record into their fourth consecutive bowl appear-

Drewery's superlatives this season include a 74-yard punt return for a touchdown against Pittsburgh and a 93-yard kickoff return the following week against Syracuse.

"He's a little guy, but he grows a great deal when you put the pads on him," Nehlen said. "He's dynamite when he gets the ball in his hands.

Davis could get big-play assistance from wide receiver James Maness or defensive backs Sean Thomas and Byron Linwood. West Virginia also has big-play potential in kicker Paul Woodside and quarterback Kevin White.

Maness' potential can be measured in his 22.4 yards-per-catch average that includes 16 career receptions of 42 yards or longer

and eight over 50 yards.

Maness had 11 career games of 100 yards or more in receptions. This season he dinged Rice for 202 yards on five catches and netted 131 yards on nine receptions against Texas.

"He just runs down the field and goes for the ball," TCU quarterback Anthony Sciaraffa said. "If he doesn't catch it, he makes sure no one else does either.'

Thomas and Linwood, both first team All-Southwest Conference performers, helped the Frogs through a dream-like sea-son with 12 interceptions between them.

Thomas' eight thefts tied for third nationally. He picked off three against SWC co-champion Houston. Linwood broke up 11 passes, intercepted four more and had 115 tackles in 1984.

the University System Board of Regents, determined the level at which each student is placed. Tyrone Sorrells was placed at the proper level of study in accordance with his testing and evalua-



## Malone lives with ghost

Malone insists, "the ghost of Terry Bradshaw will live in Pittsburgh forever," at least the current Steelers quarterback hopes he won't be forever haunted by it.

Comparisons to Bradshaw, who retired after last season, are inevitable. But Malone has no illusions about duplicating Bradshaw's feat of four Super Bowl titles.

"Terry was a great quarterback and his accomplishments are unrivaled," Malone said. "This is almost like a rookie year for me, and I'm just trying to play as well as I can. That's all I can do."

Malone is a five-year National Football League veteran, but he hardly played until starter David Woodley went down with a leg injury midway through this season.

'At the first of the year, I felt this would be a very important season for me," Malone said. "I felt I was at the point in my career where I had served an apprenticeship and I had learned what I could from studying film, meeting with the coaches and the ball from runners and they watching from the sideline. To make intercept passes, and they make any more progress, I needed game experience.

"It's like going to college. You study the books and try to learn all you can, then you get into the work force and find out what it's really all about. There you can make mistakes and learn from them. I've made some mistakes this season, but I have much more confidence in my

When Malone leads the Steelers, 9-7 and a five-point underdog, against the Denver Broncos, 13-3, in the American Football Conference semifinal game here Sunday, he'll be trying to avoid the kind of mistakes that have plagued most of Denver's

opponents all year - turnovers. The Denver defense has recovered 24 fumbles and intercepted 31 passes this season, and both figures rank second in the league. The defense has scored eight touchdowns.

"Denver's defense makes a lot of big plays," Malone said. "They strip

some big runbacks with those turnovers. That doesn't just happen. I'm

sure they work on it. 'We're aware of it, but we can't go out there Sunday worrying about turning the ball over. From the film I've seen, the Denver defense plays harder than a lot of offenses play against them. The best thing for us to do is go hard and try to make the big play on offense — and not let the defense make it."





AZUSA, Calif. (AP) - Physicians told Kirk Lowdermilk he would be out as long as six weeks after the Ohio State center broke his leg in a game against Wisconsin this fall.

Lowdermilk recalled he was used as an offensive guard for one play with about two minutes left against Michigan.

Unranked Houston, 7-4, is a touchdown underdog going into Tuesday's 49th Cotton Bowl game against No. 8 ranked Boston College, 9-2, but Landry isn't worried.



### Students at NYC high schools use 'credit cards' to record attendance

customers making electronic withdrawals, students at three city high schools have been using plastic identification cards to get into school and have their attendance recorded by computer.

Since the credit-card-size IDs were issued at the schools, security has improved and attendance has risen, Robert Mastruzzi, superintendent of high schools in Manhattan, said Friday.

Another consequence of the year-old experiment has been that the home room period has been eliminated at one of the schools and may be cut from 20 minutes daily to six or seven at the others, he said.

The computer hardware has been lent to the schools by NCR Corp., which hopes the idea catches on nationwide and abroad, said John DeWilde, NCR account manager in suburban White Plains.

Next September, computerized attendance-taking will be expanded to seven more schools, and the city could end up install-ing the system in all 114 of its high schools, Mastruzzi said.

"It's been excellent," he said. "The principals are absolutely

overjoyed.
"My judgment is that the experiment is complete and has proved to be tremendously successful. I think we are going to move in the direction of trying to put them in every school.'

No solid figures were available on the cost of the system, but both Mastruzzi and DeWilde agreed that \$70,000 per school

was a reasonable rough starting

"That's a lot of money when you talk about a lot of schools," said Mastruzzi. "But it's a oneshot cost and you're getting something that's increasing attendance, which means more state aid, and more important, it's something that enables you to be more effective and run the schools safely.'

The only major recurring expense is producing the ID cards, he said. For Park West High School and its 3,000 students, the cost was about \$1 per student, and new cards would have to be issued to each incoming freshman class.

Attendance has risen 3 percent at Park West since the system was put into operation there late in 1983. The two other schools, Fiorello LaGuardia and Martin Luther King high schools, received terminals shortly after the start of the current term.

The attendance improvement probably is due to more accurate reporting rather than fewer absences, Mastruzzi said. This is because the system thwarts what he described as previous "selective cutters.

These are students who came to school on a particular day and attended some classes, cut others and didn't report to home room. The record showed them absent for the day, so they didn't face penalties for cutting, Matruzzi said. Now such students cannot enter the building without putting their cards in the slot, and being recorded as present.

## U.S. suffers trade deficit in November

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States suffered a foreign trade deficit of \$9.9 billion in November as increased demand for foreign oil, cars and clothing overshadowed improved sales of U.S. agricultural products overseas, the government reported Friday.

The newest flood of red ink pushed the total deficit for 1984 to \$115.4 billion with one month yet to

go.
The Commerce Department predicted the deficit for the whole year would hit \$125 billion - close to double the \$69.4 billion record deficit set last year.

Deputy Commerce Secretary

Clarence J. Brown said he thought whether the 1985 deficit would be the deficit would be even worse next year as the dollar remains at high levels.

He said the huge deficits pointed to the need to reduce the federal budget deficit as a way of driving down high interest rates, which have been cited as one of the reasons the dollar is remaining at high

A lower budget deficit will "leave resources available to the private sector to continue investment in improving their productivity and competitiveness and it should also hold down interest rates," he said.

For next year, we have everything going against us in the trade deficit. It has to be \$140 billion to \$150 billion," predicted Michael Evans, head of Evans Economics of

But Allen Sinai, chief economist for Shearson Lehman-American Express, said slower growth in the U.S. economy would reduce Americans' appetite for foreign goods next year, while increased growth overseas would enable foreigners to buy more U.S. products.



### Natural human anti-cancer agents made in genetics lab

NEW YORK (AP) - Two natural human anti-cancer agents that cause mouse tumors to wither and die have been made in the laboratory for the first time, opening the door to eventual human trials of the agents, according to new reports.

'At this point we're trying to understand what they're going to be useful for, but we definitely think they're going to be very important in the clinic," said Rik Derynck of Genentech, Inc. of South San Fran-

Genentech is reporting produc-tion of the substances, called lymphotoxin and tumor necrosis factor. in the current issue of Nature maga-

"The actions of lymphotoxin and tumor necrosis factor seem to be much more pronounced than interferon," Derynck said Friday in a telephone interview.

Interferon has been shown to help fight some kinds of cancer but it has not become the powerful cancer weapon that some of its advocates

The new agents differ from interferon in that they are able to directly attack and kill tumor cells, Derynck said.

"In terms of direct anti-tumor killing, lymphotoxin and tumor necrosis factor are the two major

ones, if not the only ones," he said. The agents are produced in the bloodstream in such small amounts that until recently some researchers doubted their existence, Derynck

Derynck and his colleagues found that the long chemical chains that make up the two substances are partly identical, suggesting that the substances had a common chemical ancestor in evolutionary history.

"It seems likely that they are probably meant to be produced together and act together in the defense against tumors," said Dr. Jan Vilcek, a microbiologist at the New York University medical school who has done preliminary studies of tumor

#### Nebraskans will buckle up

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) - All 13,000 state employees will be required to buckle up while on Nebraska business under a seat belt policy Gov. Bob Kerrey plans to announce in mid-January, according to a government official.

Kerrey has decided that the mandatory seat belt policy for state employees is a good idea because it saves lives, and has established a three-person committee to work out the mechanics, said Don Nelson,

Kerrey's chief of staff. And if two state senators have their way, all Nebraskans will fasten seat belts or face a \$25 fine by the fall of 1985. Sens. Pat Morehead and Shirley Marsh are co-sponsoring legislation requiring that the drive and all passengers wear seat belts.

### Galileo launch delayed

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The space craft Galileo will be launched 31/2 months later than originally scheduled so the probe will have the option of passing close to an asteroid while on its way to Jupiter, a National Aeronautics and Space

Galileo will be launched from a space shuttle in May 1986, giving it the flexibility to be diverted toward the asteroid Amphitrite about seven months into its journey, NASA announced Thursday.

The decision whether to fly the craft near Amphitrite will not be made until after the launch and will depend on the condition of the spacecraft, said NASA Administra-tor James M. Beggs.



AUSTIN (AP) - D.E. Crumley, proprietor of a rickety country store ammed with jokes and junk, says he's selling out, moving out and hitting the road.

D.E. Crumley Grocery has been somewhat of a local legend since 1968, when Crumley and wife Nova bought the store on the Interstate 35 access road south of town. Now the store is for sale.

'If I intend to enjoy life, I'd better get out and travel a little," said Crumley, 63.

He knows that local land values probably will force his land into a different use. The countrified grocery store - complete with his personal collection of antiques, junk and artifacts - won't survive, he

"I don't think so," said Crumley, who enjoys playing practical jokes using gadgets on customers. "I don't think they can afford it."

The merchant said one party interested in building a motel on the site has spoken with him.

## Ranch operates like beef factory

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - Nestled in the timber and oilfield country about 50 miles south of the Red River, about a three-hour drive east of Fort Worth, the Broseco Ranch doesn't boast the visibility of a 6666 or King ranch.

The ranch even lacks the romance of the Old West in its history. The name Broseco, as much as it sounds Spanish, is an acronym for a Baltimore, Md., firm called Brown Security Co. Brown bought the 44,000 northeast Texas acres in the early 1960s and has developed Broseco into one of Texas' largest ranching

operations The Broseco is among the top 15 Texas commercial beef producers in the nation's leading cattle-raising state. And in East Texas, where farms and ranches tend to be smaller than the state's average, the Broseco is among the largest.

is unique in the Southwest for its combination of management, owership, production volume and almost fanatical dedication to land and cattle-breed improvements. The Broseco is ramrodded by a committee of owners, on-site cowboys and Fort Worth bankers. This

relatively unkown group rides herd

Its managers believe the Broseco

on some 5,600 mother cows that give birth to an annual harvest of 4,200 to 4.500 calves off about 24.000 acres of improved pasture grasses. Even though ranchers rarely compare production notes, the Broseco's olume may well put it high on a top

In ranchers' parlance it is a cowcalf operation, meaning that its chore is to harvest heavyweight calves as efficienty as possible from pastures. These aren't the pampered purebreds. These are beeves that, after passing through feedlots, will yield tender lean meat. Broseco's tale begins with Brown

Security, founded by the late Donaldson Brown and now evolved into Broventure Inc., owned by five Brown offspring. Vaughan and Frank Brown, two of the Maryland sons, are among the active Broseco owner-managers. They head what one Broseco

expert calls "a venture capital company with large landholdings in Maryland, agricultural interests, and large timber and mineral holdings in other states.

In fact, the land that became the Broseco first attracted Donaldson Brown with its timber and mineral interests. The ranch sits in the Pewitt oil and gas field, a lucrative old East Texas collection of wells near Mount Pleasant in Titus The Browns began to clear swaths

of acres to handle more cattle and to channel mineral income into improvements in pastures and the breed of bovines thereon. Last fall, the Browns, other man-

agers, the ranch's on-site crews and hired hands conducted their weeklong roundup - the calf harvest. Joining in that annual task was Tom Woodward, a vice president and agricultural trust officer at

Woodward was there to help gather the calves for sorting, weighing, loading and shipping. Broseco's uniqueness cannot be separated from its relationship with TAB/Fort Worth. Big banks often oversee the man-

Texas American Bank/Fort Worth.

agement of ranching estates held in trusts for young heirs and heirs who don't want to be tied to the constant chores. The Broseco is not held in trust. Yet its owners have chosen to

keep a tie to the expertise of the Ranch & Farm Management Department of the Trust Division of TAB/Fort Worth. Woodward manages that department. "The bank originally got involved by helping Donaldson Brown buy

the property and set up a corpora-tion to run the ranch," Woodward 'We've developed to the point that we're the management agent

for the ranch," Woodward added. Frank Brown is chairman of the board. Walter Carter is ranch superintendent, and Phil English is Broventure's vice president in

charge of the ranch - all on the

management team.

Woodward calls Carter's job synonymous with "ranch foreman" and his own job "a troubleshooter, a con-A former Dallas district agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Woodward was educated in agriculture both at the uni-

versity level and through direct ranching experience. "We hold a telephone conference once a week, every week," he said. 'In the conference, we talk about everything, budgets, pasture management, bull purchses, land purchases ... wildlife management and cattle sales.

### Presbyterian minister's wife will be leading prayer renewal workshop

Helen Jacobsen, wife of Presbyterian Minister David Jacobsen of Mill Valley, Calif., will be leading a prayer renewal workshop Jan. 12-13 at 2800

The workshop will be held from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Jan. 12 and 1 to 5 p.m. Jan. 13. The Saturday session includes lunch, and a nursery will be provided both days.

The workshop is designed as a renewal of individual personal prayer life. It stems from years of practice by the Jacobsens in providing an experiential approach to God through clarification of communication using relaxation techniques, guided meditation and specific communication tools. Cost

is \$15 per person; \$25 per couple; and \$7.50 per student or persons over 55. Mrs. Jacobsen has acted as co-leader of prayer renewal workshops with her husband for the past 12 years. She is a graduate of the University of California at Los Angeles. She currently is presenting a seminar on prayer at the Presbyterian Congress of Renewal in Dallas.

Her husband holds a bachelor of divinity degree from San Francisco Theological Seminary as well as a master's degree in pastoral psychology. He has trained extensively in clinical method and is a licensed marriage, family and child counselor.

### Bishops against South Africa policy

WASHINGTON (AP) - The nation's Roman Catholic bishops are stepping up pressures on the Reagan administration's policies toward South Africa, particularly for not opposing South Africa's military occupation of neighboring Namibia.

The bishops' president, Bishop James Malone of Youngstown, Ohio, said in a letter to President Reagan that current U.S. policy "is alienating the black people of Namibia and other African countries and has the cruel result of prolonging the suffering of the Namibian people.

Malone said detentions without trials are continuing there, along with 'beating, torture, spare diet and solitary confinement.'

Malone note that the United Nations General Assembly, the U.N. Security Council and the International Court of Justice have concluded that South Africa's occupation of Namibia is "contrary to international law and should be terminated immediately.

### Vatican letter deals with abortion

WASHINGTON (AP) - The general secretary of the National Conference of Catholic bishops says church law impelled the recent Vatican letter asking several priests and nuns to renounce their views allowing abortion or face dismissal

Msgr: Daniel Hoye says canons 696, 697 and 698 specify that "spreading doctrines condemned" by the church is "cause for dismissal from religious life." He noted the canons also provide for due process and right of

He said the Vatican's Congregation for Religious and Secular Institute, in contacting superiors of 26 nuns and priests, had acted on the basis of those canons and the church's "constant teaching" of the "immorality of abor-

## Drive-in church attracts many people

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — When the Rev. Lawrence Green looks at his congregation each Sunday morning he sees Chevrolets,

Hondas, Cadillacs and pickup trucks.
"I can always tell by the car if they're regular attenders," said Green, who conducts a drive-in worship service every Sunday on the parking lot of the Albuquerque Community Church and neighboring businesses

"We get people from all cross-roads of life," he said. "We get the wealthy and we get the poor. We get the middle class and we have everything from little Japanese cars to Cadillacs.

Green, 63, who has been a pastor for 40 years, said the drive-in church service meets the needs of many people who won't attend a traditional church.

'We discovered in doing contact work in our community there were lots of people who didn't want to become involved in church," he said. "There were people who just didn't want to come inside.

It appeals to the elderly, the ill and the handicapped, he said. 'We've had people through the years who were terminally ill who spent their church life here at the drive-in.

He said the drive-in church also attracts people who want "a certain privacy," such as those "with domestic problems who don't want to go to RELIGION

regular church but come to the drive-in.

And for many, it's convenience. 'One man with five children in their pajamas came to church," Green said. "That's fine with us."

Some even bring their dogs, "and we've even had a monkey come with one of the families," he said.

He noted, however, that most drive-in churchgoers tend not to be so casual — many dress as if they were going to walk-in church ser-

Louis Bessen, who is in his 60s, has 'just about completed his 500th Sunday," said Green's wife, Nina. "He has never missed a single Sunday' since he began attending drive-in church. He now is drive-in manager, responsible for getting facilities ready for services.

While the concept of drive-in church is not traditional, the services are, said Green, who wears a robe when he preaches.

He said the interdenominational church is "Christ-centered and Bible-centered." The congregation and the choir sing as the organist and pianist play and the ushers collect the offering.

But "the people can't clap and applaud like they do in other places," he said. "So when something comes along they particularly like, people toot their horns.'

He said one guest musician commented it was gratifying to "play for the cars and have them all toot at

The Albuquerque Community Church began holding services at a local drive-in theater in 1971 as an 'outreach mission," said Green.

'We wired the sound from all our mikes into the theater sound system and put the sound to the people's cars through the regular theater system." he said

A radio studio on wheels later was designed and was moved to the church parking lot in 1976 just before the shutdown of the theater.

Today, Green stands on a platform outside the portable studio to preach his sermon while the 36-voice choir, the organist and pianist are inside, protected from the cold, wind and

"I feel much better out there with the people," he said, noting he wears an overcoat under his robe in the winter and stands under an

umbrella when it rains. But, "I move in if it rains very hard," he said.

Meanwhile, the members of the congregation - in 30 to 250 vehicles worship in the comfort of their cars with their radio dials tuned to 1050 AM.

"We have full congregational participation," he said. "In the summer time, they roll the windows down and sing." And in the winter, there's solar heat. The cars face the northeast and "it's the sun that warms the

Those who want to meet with the pastor for counseling or to discuss church membership give a note t

the ushers or call the pastor.
Green, a Grand Junction, Colo., native, organized the Albuquerque Community Church in 1963 and moved to the present location in 1965. It now has about 150 indoor members.

Green's wife, their three daughters and their sons-in-law all are involved in the church's work. One son-in-law, Jim Simpson, is minister of music, and another son-in-law, the Rev. Curtis Ballinger, is assistant pastor

The drive-in church is different from others, he said, because the people sitting in their cars are having their own worship service - not just listening to the regular church service on a speaker.

We have a very positive ministry," he said. "When they feel their needs are met, that's worthwhile.'

SANTA FE, N.M. — The San Miguel Chapel, built in 1610, is said to be the oldest church still in use in the United States. It may be only fitting, therefore, that its caretaker appears to have a longevity distinction of his own.

Brother David Tejada, 76, has acted as guide and eventually historian at the simple adobe church for nearly one-sixth of its existence. Tejada was named one of the caretakers for the Roman Catholic facility when he turned 20 years old in 1927.

A member of the Christian Brothers order, he also taught at nearby St. Michael High School for for 49 years. Now he spends

most of his time at the church, open to visitors and only three blocks from Santa Fe's historic Plaza and the Palace of the Governors, the oldest public building still standing in the United States. Mass is celebrated each Sunday at the church.

"Oh, there are other churches that predate the Church of San Miguel, but they are in ruins or no longer exist," Tejada said. Only two walls of San Miguel are part of the original structure built by Indians.

It sparked discussions of beliefs from both President Reagan and his Democratic rival, Walter Mondale, and sideline fireworks from his running mate, Geraldine Ferraro.

## Number of Latin American priests 'growing rapidly'

RIO DE JANEIRO - The number of young Latin Americans choosing to become priests is growing rapidly as a result of the Roman Catholic Church's increased involvement in social problems, according to the church authorities here.

They say that the thousands of new candidates will help alleviate a chronic shortage in the world's largest Catholic region. For decades the church has had to bring missionaries from Europe, Canada and the United States.

In contrast to the past, when priests were often drawn from the well-to-do, the new seminarians in the region are coming overwhelmingly from among the poor, bishops here said.

But the serious shortage of Catholic clergy, churchmen believe, will take a long time to overcome.

"We are still a long way off," said Msgr. Jose Maria Vasconcelos, rector of the Sao Jose diocesan seminary, tucked under the giant statue of Jesus that towers over Rio de Janeiro. "In Brazil we have now one priest for 9,000 people. It would be ideal to have a priest for every 1,000.

Still, the surge of new candidates has filled the region's main seminaries to capacity, according to the church authorities. At the Sao Jose diocesan seminary, another wing is being built.

The opposite trend has occurred in countries that have traditionally produced many priests, a spokesman said. In the United States, over the same period, the number of seminarians fell from close to 13,000 to about 7,000 and in Western Europe from 33,000 to 25,000, he said.

Countries where growth is fast include Argentina, Brazil, Colombia, Mexico and Peru. In Argentina, vocations jumped 50 percent in just three years, from 1,100 seminarians in 1981 to 1,650 in 1984. Brazil, the continent's largest Catholic country, has seen an increase of 15 percent every year since 1978, according to the Center for Religious Statistics in Rio de Janeiro.







LOS ANGELES (AP) - Sam Peck- loway, a long-time aide. inpah, the two-fisted, maverick movie director who made the classic western "Ride the High Country" and the graphically violent "Straw Dogs" and "The Wild Bunch," died Friday of heart failure, an assistant said. He was 59.

who was convicted of helping a client escape from prison, has landed a new job but state officials won't say what it is because she is disturbed by the media's interest in her life. Ms. Evans, 28, is living at the

Chattanooga Community Service Center as part of a work-release program until her scheduled Feb. 4 parole date.

"In any other case, we would be glad to tell you what kind of job a work-release inmate is doing. But given how well-known she is and how much interest the news media has in her - and she is concerned about her own security - we are not going to tell you," said John Taylor, spokesman for the state Correction Department.

Ms. Evans is "very disturbed about the interest the news media has shown in her. She is concerned about someone finding out where she works," he

John Patterson, warden at the Community Service Center, would only say that Ms. Evans new job is in Chattanooga and that she selected it from several

Ms. Evans pleaded guilty in March to helping convicted armed robber William Timothy Kirk escape from Brushy Mountain Penitentiary in March 1983. The two spent 139 days on the run and were captured in Florida.

Ms. Evans was sentenced to three years in prison and forced to surrender her law license. Kirk, 37, was sentenced to 40 years for escape and armed robbery, and later received a life sentence on the prison murder

DePlanche, 47, was discharged Thursday from McPherson Community Health Center, said a hospital switchboard operator who refused to give her name.

The postman, who had not accepted telephone calls since he entered the hospital Monday, could not be reached for comment Friday at his home. His line was busy on repeated attempts to

Postal officials initially planned to fire DePlanche, a 29-year postal veteran, after one of his customers complained that he delivered 540 unstamped Christmas cards to people on his

But DePlanche's superiors reconsidered after the case caused public outcry. DePlance instead was suspened without pay for five days and was required to pay \$70 postage due on his cards.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (AP) -Andy Griffith, who drew on his North Carolina memories to help create the TV town of Mayberry, says he's "embarrassed" that a fan club is looking for a town to adopt its name.



### Polish policeman testifies about plan to kidnap, kill other priests

TORUN, Poland (AP) - The court Piotrowski made me believe I was heard evidence from a secret police lieutenant Friday about plans to kidnap and possibly kill other Polish priests, in addition to the Rev. Jerzy Popieluszko, with the support of

high-ranking officials. Lt. Leszek Pekala, 32, took the witness stand for the second day in a trial in which he and three other secret police officers are charged in the kidnapping and killing of Popie-

luszko last October He gave a detailed account Friday of how the pro-Solidarity priest was repeatedly beaten unconscious when he kept trying to escape from the car driving him off to be killed.

Reporters covering the trial said he also testified the abductors had a pass which got them through police checkpoints, and said it was vital to their carrying out their deed.

The court was read testimony by Pekala given in the pre-trial investigation, in which he said, "I was sure the kidnapping was part of a very wide operation and (Capt. Grzegorz)

taking part in a noble cause," the reporters said.

The report on the pre-trial investigation said Pekala mentioned the other possibly targeted priests as the Rev. Henryk Jankowski of Gdansk, a close adviser of Solidarity leader Lech Walesa, and the Rev. Stanislaw Malkowski of Warsaw.

Pekala, Piotrowski, 33, and Lt. Waldemar Chmielewski, 29, are charged with Popieluszko's abduction and murder. A fourth Interior Ministry official, Col. Adam Pietruszka, 47, is on trial for aiding and abetting them.

The four defendants face a possible death penalty if convicted.

The trial, which started Thursday, is unprecedented and is expected to be one of the most significant cases in Poland in 40 years of Communist

The death of Popieluszko, 37, an outspoken defender of the outlawed Solidarity free trade union movement, stunned the Polish public,

which is more than 90 percent Roman Catholic.

In written evidence read into the court record, Pekala said, "I had the impression there was permission for this plan very, very high." He quoted Piotrowski as telling

him the plan for a wide-ranging operation had the support of a deputy interior minister.

But when questioned Friday by Chief Judge Artur Kujawa, Pekala said he was mistaken. He refused to give the minister's name. He said he 'probably misunderstood" what Piotrowski told him about high-ranking support for the operation. Now I realize I had no reason to

think that illegal actions can be under the protection of the Interior Ministry," Pekala said.

The Interior Ministry controls Poland's police forces

The report on the investigation quoted Pekala as saying Piotrowski told him and Chmielewski the campaign against militant priests could include Malkowski.

On Saturday, 83 Poles left the Rogalin and stayed in Travemuende, West Germany, rather than return to their homeland. And on Wednesday, 112 more Poles failed to return to the ferry Pomerania in Trave-

Twelve of those who left the Rogalin in Amsterdam reported to police after the ferry sailed for the Belgian port of Zeebrugge on Thursday night, police spokeswoman Heleen van der Weijden said.

PEKING (AP) — Soviet Deputy Premier Ivan V. Arkhipov signed three economic agreements with China on Friday, but heard his Chinese host say at a banquet that night that arduous work lay ahead in translating the pacts into reality.

The banquet concluded the highest-level Soviet visit in 15 years.

Arkhipov and Chinese Vice Premier Yao Yilin signed the accords earlier in the day, and at the ban-quet, the Soviet official spoke of moving reunions" with colleagues from the 1950s, when he was the Kremlin's chief adviser in Peking.

Yao told the diners that Arkhipov's nine-day visit "had important significance for mutual understanding and development of Sino-Soviet relations, and helped advance normalization.

'Comrade Arkhipov's visit has been successful and our talks have achieved results," said Yao.

But Yao cautioned: "Although we have signed three agreements, we must translate them into reality. There is a large amount of work to

monitor and promote cooperation. Arkhipov agreed on terms for a 1986-90 trade pact that is to be finalized in the first half of next year. Arkhipov, 77, in charge of eco-

nomic relations with foreign countries, said he found a "realistic, constructive and well-intentioned atmosphere" awaiting him in Peking. He was the highest-ranking Soviet visitor to Peking since Premier Alexei Kosygin met his counterpart Chou En-lai in 1969

The positive experience of our talks has advanced the development of Soviet-Chinese relations and One senior diplomat in Peking, who spoke on condition of anonymity, remarked: "The visit has given as opened new possibilities," Arkhipov said in a banquet toast.

He said that besides sharing scientific data, exchanging scholars and experts, and studying industrial renovation possibilities, the agreements foresee cooperation in fisheries, marine research, hydropower and anti-pollution measures.

We were fortunate to have moving reunions with our old friends comrade Chen Yun, comrade Wan Li, comrade Peng Zhen and comrade Bo Yibo," Arkhipov said.

Chen is a member of the Politburo standing committee and a senior economic planner. Wan is senior vice premier. Peng is chairman of the National People's Congress, and Bo is vice chairman of the Central Advisory Commission.
