Baird Bears Finish Third In Albany Meet

BAIRD-The Baird Bears traveled to Albany Saturday, March 19, and placed third after a closely-fought three-way battle for the championship. Anson finished on top with 101 points, Roscoe placed second with 99 pts. and Baird netted 98½ pts. for third.

Bears placing in the meet were:

Sprint relay(Larry Cauthen, Chris Vestal, Terry Hunter, Dennis Baxter) placed 4th with a 47:1.

Fabian Mendez placed 4th in the 880 with a 2:11:6; Bryant Manning finished 5th with a 2:13:1.

Larry Cauthen won the 120 High Hurdles with a 15:5 and finished 4th in the 330 Intermediate Hurdles with a 43:6.

Terry Hunter placed 5th in the 100 yd. dash with a 10:9 and finished 4th in the 220 yd. dash with a 24:9.

Richard Mendez placed 4th in the 440 yd. dash with a 57:3.

Mo Gonzales won the mile run with a 4:45:3 and Jesse Aguirre placed 3rd with a 4:53:9.

Mile relay(Donny Stovall, Chris Vestal, Gary Smith, Dennis Baxter) placed 6th with a 3:55:3.

Monty Hambrick placed second in the pole vault at 12'6", Chris Vestal was third at 11' and Donny Stovall tied for 6th at 10'.

Jerry Wristen finished 2nd in the shot put with a put of 46'11½", Defosses finished 4th and Sadler was 6th.

Steve Defosses finished 3rd in the discus with a 120'10¾"

Donny Stovall placed 5th in the long jump with a 17'1"

MEDICAL NOTES ON
PULMONARY TUBER-
CULOSIS

Pulmonary Tuberculosis is a specific lung infection caused by a bacteria called mycobacterium Tuberculosis and is characterized by formation of

tubercles in the lung. The infection is classified into a first or primary infection which is usually a self limited disease in children which escapes detection.

Another type is the adult type which has a latency period of months to years. While most people who are infected at any age never develop the disease, it is not always possible to predict which ones are at risk. Certain factors come into play like malnutrition and

debilitating diseases which may predispose to the progression of the infection to disease. Symptoms presented by persons having pulmonary tuberculosis may be absent or mild and non-specific in the presence of activity disease. The most frequent symptoms are cough, malaise, easy fatigability, weight loss, low grade afternoon fever, night sweats and at times back

or chest pains. Cough when present has no specific characteristics although blood in the sputum is strongly suggestive of pulmonary tuberculosis. Pulmonary signs may be difficult to elicit even in the presence of active disease. It should be noted that tuberculosis can be disseminated to other organs of the body like, bones, liver, etc. In the area of preventative treatment close contacts of patients who were diagnosed to have active tuberculosis should check with their family physician so as to determine what tests should be done to determine whether they have the disease. A skin test is usually done which is called PPD skin test and this screening test is based on skin hypersensitivity to a specific bacterial protein obtained from culture

media. This test will enable your physician to pursue further diagnostic studies to determine if you have active tuberculosis. A negative reaction to PPD for all practical purposes rules out tuberculosis etiology of pulmonary disease although your physician may pursue more definitive tests if you have suggestive signs and symptoms of pulmonary tuberculosis in spite of a negative PPD skin test.

As of date very few people die of pulmonary tuberculosis where modern treatment methods are used before the disease reaches a very advanced stage. Most patients including those with advanced disease can be restored to a normal state of health within 12 months.

A good treatment program should result in a 95% cure rate in all cases of initially treated disease of those who remain inactive two years after cessation of proper treatment and less than 1% can be expected to relapse. This will of course entail proper follow up with your family physician and strict adherence to treatment. Life-long surveillance is advisable for all patients who have had more than minimal disease.

Take Steps To Prevent Shin Oak Poisoning

COUNTY — Stockmen in Callahan County will soon be faced with an annual problem that often goes untreated or unnoticed. That problem is shin oak poisoning, notes Greg Gerngross, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Livestock that eat shin oak buds, flowers and leaves as new growth begins in the spring begin to lose weight and have a constant case of diarrhea. Calves are especially susceptible, and some have died from hemorrhagic enteritis and bloody diarrhea after being ill only 24 hours.

Signs of the toxic working within the animal begin with constipation, a decrease in appetite, frequent urination and smaller intakes of water, says Gerngross. Death may occur after the animal has been ill more than a month.

A logical solution to help prevent cattle from eating the poisonous shin oak is to feed them during the time the new growth appears—usually three to four weeks. But this is not enough. A supplement of calcium hydroxide (hydrated lime) needs to be added to the feed mix to serve as an antidote to the poisoning. A feed mix of 600 pounds of ground

alfalfa, 1,080 pounds of cottonseed meal, 120 pounds of vegetable oil and 200 pounds of hydrated lime has proved effective as well as economical. There should be no substitutions in the mix.

Calves should receive the mix creep-fed while older animals need about 4 pounds daily, starting about a week before shin oak buds appear.
