## AFA supports pay boost

Washington, D.C., May 8—The Air Force Association in behalf of its 157,000 members has come out strongly in favor of the proposed 5.3 percent military pay raise planned for July 1, but currently in great difficulty on the Hill.

In a joint effort with the Army Association and the Navy League, the Association sent letters in support of the measure to the Chairmen of the House and Senate Armed Services Committees and the Appropriations Committees. The letter was signed by the presidents of all three military associations.

"We are certain the Congress has the same facts we do, but we fail to understand how some members of Congress can reach such different conclusions about the inadequacy of military pay and the necessity to rectify it," the letter stated.

Military pay lags 14.7 percent behind inflation since the advent of the All-Volunteer Force and 19.5 percent behind civilian pay increases. The 5.3 percent pay raise does not restore pay to the 1972 comparability levels because it was based on white collar occupations which account for only 12 percent of military skills, the letter states. If blue collar and technical skills which comprise 75 percent of military jobs are included, military pay is 11.4 percent behind civilian sector jobs as of October 1, 1980.

Officers and enlisted people continue to cite inadequate pay as the most significant reason for leaving the military, even after the 11.7 percent adjustment last October.

"Between October 1972 and October 1980, real disposable income of service people declined 13.4 percent

for recruits and 25.8 percent for senior officers due to inflation," the letter states. Bus drivers in Washington earn more than second lieutenants or ensigns and this comparison includes basic pay, housing and subsistence allowances and the tax advantage.

The letter cites Bureau of Labor Statistics as confirming that basic pay and allowances for Senior Airmen, Sergeants, Staff Sergeants and Technical Sergeants lag behind the average civilian hourly wage. When comparing pay and allowances for new recruits with the pay for civilian production and non-supervisory workers in the lowest paid skills, the recruits lag behind by 14.2 percent. Technical Sergeants are paid 56.8 percent less than the highest paid civilian skill among production and non-supervisory workers.

"If military pay cannot be made comparable and thus help stem the loss of the career force, the Congress faces the unhappy prospect of examining other ways of manning the Armed Forces," the three organizations believe.

The three military associations urged the Chairmen to support the across-the-board 5.3 percent military pay increase as a pay comparability issue. "This action would send a vital signal to members of the Armed Forces that the Congress was sensitive to their needs.

The Air Force Association, a national, nonprofit, nonpolitical organization, supports a strong national defense posture for the security and peace of the nation and the free world, and is dedicated to the application of aerospace technology for the betterment of all mankind.

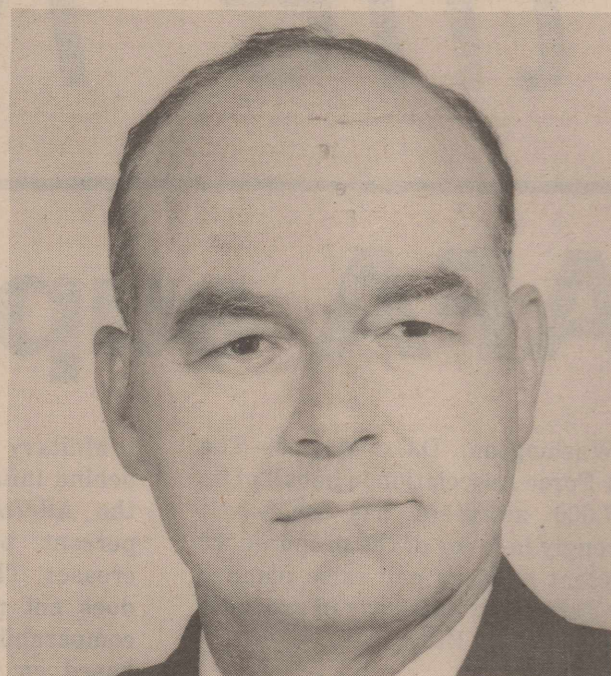

# Bicycles require extra caution

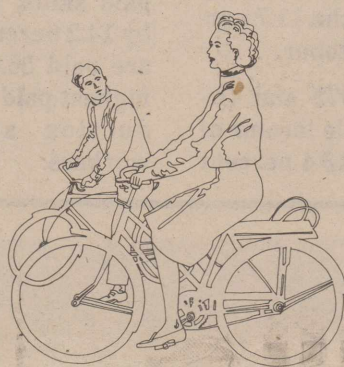
Want to improve your health, save money and have fun? Try bicycling.

Millions of Americans are picking up the bicycle habit. If you are one, take some basic safety rules along for the ride.

Know your bike. Ride the right size for you, and keep it in good condition. Check the hand brake and cables often. A small adjustment mistake can mean less-than-dime-size stopping distances or a head-over-heels accident. Check tire pressure before each ride.

Clothing counts. Wear a helmet. It's not required, but it is highly visible and tags you as a serious cyclist. Drivers respect that. Wear bright clothes for visibility. Avoid loose-fitting clothing that could get caught in the spokes or chain. Wear — and use — an eyeglass-fitted, rear-view mirror, rather than one on the handlebars.

Ride defensively. Ride on the right-hand side of the road, and if you have lights, use them. Don't



take up more than your share of the lane. You're riding a vehicle, not a toy, and it belongs on the road, not on the sidewalk or lawn. Signal turns well in advance, then keep both hands on the

handlebars when making the turn. Cross railroad tracks at right angles. Watch out for sand, loose gravel or wet leaves, especially on curves. Remember, water makes the tires extremely slick, so avoid water if possible. Listen for traffic approaching from behind.

Report to the police the tag numbers of anyone who drives dangerously around cyclists.

There are several points for motorists, as well. Watch out for cyclists. They are going slower, have less visibility and are not concentrating just on you.

Remember that a bicycle can't stop as quickly as you can. Don't assume a cyclist sees you when you back out of a driveway or cross an intersection. Leave cyclists enough time to react.

Don't antagonize or go after cyclists. They may report you to the police. And police take a dim view of 3,000-pound (1,350 kilograms) cars picking on 175-pound (78.8 kilograms) cyclists.

# Watch gifts to superiors

The members of Col. Gumshoe's staff are having a problem. The colonel is retiring after 30 years of service and the staff cannot decide on an appropriate gift.

Maj. Adams suggested that since Colonel Gumshoe is an avid photographer, a nice camera would be appropriate. He stated that he could get an expensive camera at a discount and suggested that each member of the organization be assessed a percentage of the purchase price.

Capt. Baker objected to the

assessment. He suggested that the organization buy something that both Colonel and Mrs. Gumshoe could use, a silver service. He explained that this would not only be a fitting gift, but also since Mrs. Gumshoe is a dedicated member of the Officers' Wives Club, the Club could assist in collecting donations.

First Lt. Clark commented that any gift given to Colonel Gumshoe should be reasonable in price and suggested the staff give the colonel a simple engraved plaque, plus a small personal gift.

**You be the judge!**

**Unable to reach a decision they come to you. What do you suggest?**

Occasionally, in our haste to pro-

perly honor a transferring or retiring superior, we fail to check the governing regulations. In this case you should consult Air Force Regulation 30-30, Paragraph 6. This paragraph prohibits the solicitation of contributions from DoD personnel for gifts to an official superior, as well as the acceptance of such gifts by the superior.

It does not prohibit voluntary gifts or contributions of nominal value on special occasions, provided the gift does not exceed a reasonable value.

"Nominal" or "reasonable" value are terms of "art." No specific dollar amounts have been set. What is "nominal" or "reasonable" will de-

pend upon the status of both the donors and the recipient of the gift, the nature of the gift, and the occasion.

Within these broad guidelines two rules should be observed. To begin with, the gift should not be of a nature or value as to give the appearance that the recipient is personally profiting from his official position.

Expensive items such as silver, cameras or jewelry would not be appropriate even for retirement gifts.

Finally, any contributions should be in fact completely voluntary, and not be obtained or appear to be obtained through orchestrated solicitation.

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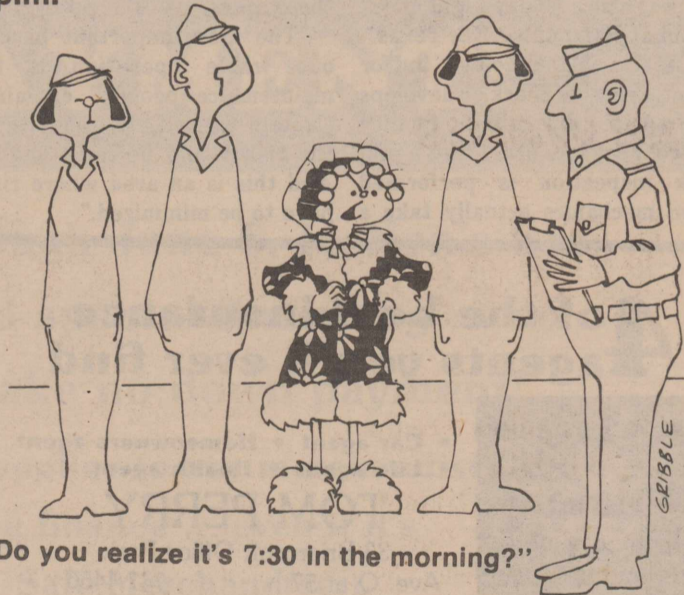

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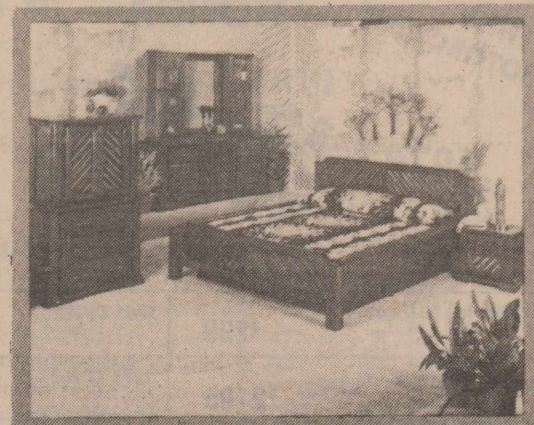
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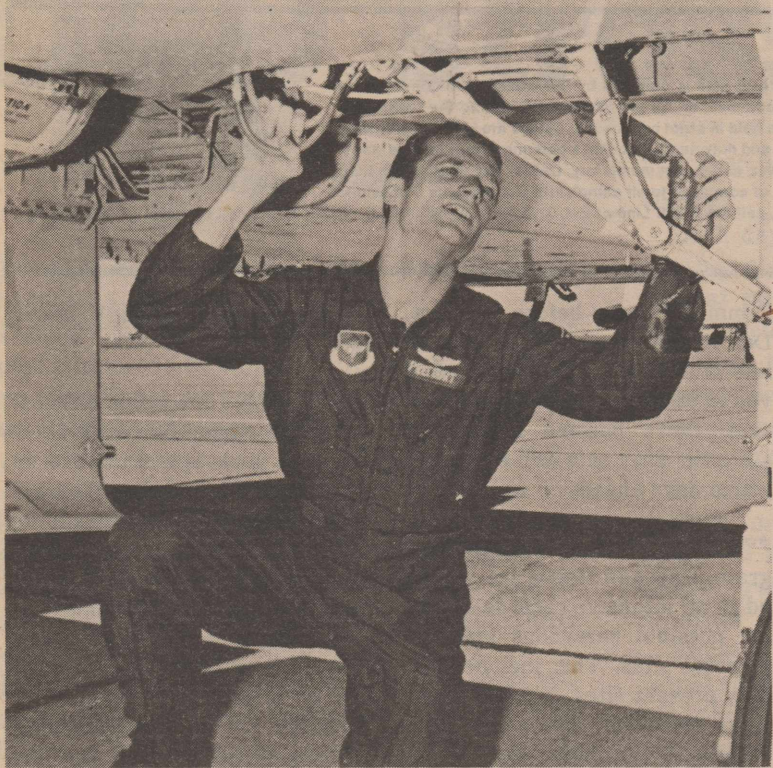

## 'Confidence' is key

Confidence is the key to overcoming the pressure and tenseness of a functional check flight pilot, according to Capt. Lowell Gossell.

Captain Gossell, himself a check flight pilot, has been at Reese since 1979. His job entails much more than just flying an aircraft, however. He is considered a quality control officer that checks and rechecks all mechanical difficulties of an aircraft while it is in the air. Some trick.

Actually, it is all very routine and Captain Gossell says that there is very little risk involved. In order to become an FCF pilot, one must have 1,000 flight hours if not an instructor pilot, or 800 hours if instructor qualified. There is also a 30 day flight check school at Randolph AFB, Texas.

After a plane comes in for either a routine check or develops mechanical difficulties quality control goes to work. First, a pre-dock inspection is performed when mechanics actually take a

plane apart, check all systems and put the pieces back again.

The process in routine checkups takes approximately seven days according to Lt. Col. Robert Imle, quality control officer.

Then Captain Gossell and his four colleagues take over. Beginning with a ground check, the FCF pilots inspect all systems prior to takeoff. When airborne, the pilot makes 15 different checks while ascending. At 4,500 feet the aircraft will level off where the turbos are checked. During descent another 15 checks are performed.

Some major problem areas the pilots may encounter are engine flameouts, engine fire lights, flight control malfunctions and supersonic flight shudder. FCF pilots carefully check each of these areas.

"The most important part of our whole operation is the maintenance people," explained Captain Gossell. "Without them, the risk would be much higher. And this is an area where risks have to be minimized."

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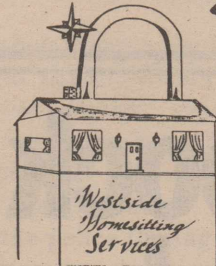
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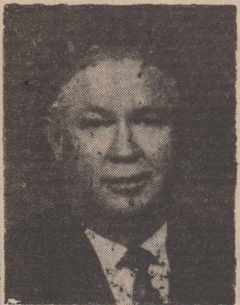
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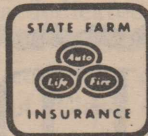


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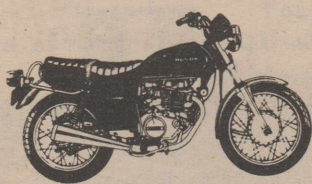

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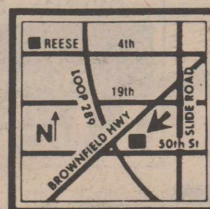
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**Budding artist**

**Safety Wise**

He then applied ample starter fluid, which was contained in a one pint squirt can. He lit the fluid. A few minutes later, in an effort to hasten the fire, he squirted more starter fluid on the hot charcoal particles. There was an instant flash-back and the airman's new clothing, purchased while TDY in the far East (and probably made of silk), caught fire. He panicked and ran to the front of the house where his father caught him and extinguished the fire with a water hose. The airman was hospitalized; he died a week later as the result of third degree burns to eighty percent of his body between the shoulders and knees. 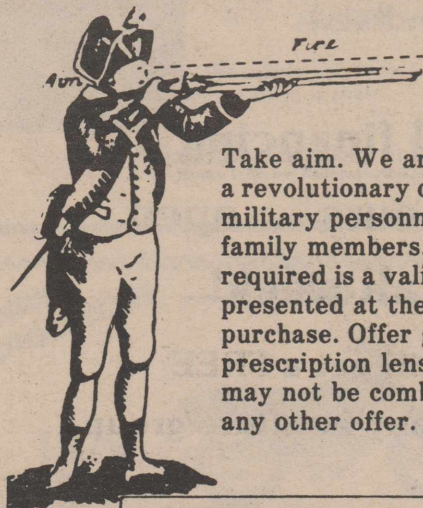

# CHAMPUS won't cover all

(ATCNS) — A bill for \$10,000 was recently presented to an Air Force health benefits advisor by a very upset retired service member. He had been hospitalized in a civilian institution which had charged \$40,000 for his extensive treatment.

His bill represented the co-payment for which he was responsible under CHAMPUS — 25 percent of the reasonable charges for covered medical care for each stay in a civilian hospital.

The retiree didn't have \$10,000 and wanted to know what the Air Force was going to do about the bill. He was told the Air Force could do nothing.

The belief that "Uncle Sam will take care of my medical bills after

I retire" is a common but ill-founded one among many military retirees as well as those approaching retirement.

It's true that retirees are eligible for health care in uniformed services medical facilities. However, if the specialty is not available at the military facility, or if extenuating circumstances exist, the beneficiary may be referred to civilian sources under CHAMPUS, CHAMPVA or Social Security Medicare.

Having to rely on these programs to offset civilian health care costs for serious illnesses or injuries could be a very expensive ordeal for the average retiree's family.

Many service-oriented groups

and some private insurance companies offer group or individual insurance policies that offset all or most of the beneficiary's cost-sharing portion under CHAMPUS, CHAMPVA or Medicare. There are many plans and rates vary, but an individual can normally find one that provides essentially 100 percent protection.

None of these programs is government-sponsored nor endorsed by the Air Force. However, a list of service-oriented groups that offer supplemental health coverage has been prepared to assist members who desire additional information. Contact your local health benefits advisor for details.

## DEERS checklist

Use this check list to make sure you bring all the necessary documents when enrolling your dependents in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS). Bring copies or originals of the documents that apply to you and your dependents. Check them off as you complete the list.

- Retirement orders (DD Form 214)
- Marriage certificate
- Birth certificates for children
- Death certificate for deceased sponsor
- Certified copy of court order for adoption
- Final divorce order or decree
- Copy of Court Order establishing paternity (illegitimate children)



Statement from licensed physician or medical officer indicating physical handicap and period of incapacity (dependent children older than age 21 who are incapacitated). If Navy or USMC dependent then parent service letter of authorization is required.

Certificate of ineligibility for Social Security from the Social Security Administration (dependents age 65 or older who are ineligible for Social Security).

DD Form 1300, Report of Casualty — required for widows and surviving children.

Certificate of enrollment from school registrar for dependent children age 21 or older.

ID Card number and expiration date (for each dependent). Dependents do not have to accompany the sponsor when he/she enrolls them in DEERS.

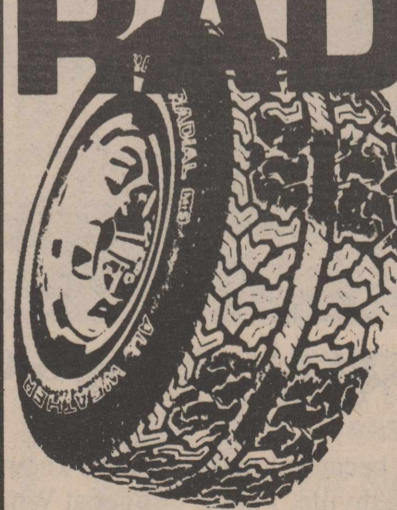

# AFCC pays huge bill

If you got a telephone bill for more than \$240 million, you might be shocked.

That's what Maj. Gen. Robert T. Herres pays each year and he's not surprised. The reason? He's the commander of the Air Force Communications Command, and his bill covers the cost of leasing commercial communications around the world.

Locally, Maj. Kelly W. Cartron, 1958 Communications Squadron commander, pays over \$200 thousand for leasing commercial communications.

The dollars pay for much more than routine telephone service. Using circuits rented from companies like General Telephone Company, Air Force Communications Command provides a wide range of services — telephones,

messages, and computer-to-computer connections — that can pass as many as 20 million words a minute. The command uses these leased services — more than 11,000 circuits, spanning 3.8 million miles — as well as government owned facilities to form nearly half of the system supplying communications for Army, Navy, Air Force and U.S. Marine Corps people around the world. With this system, national leaders and commanders can direct the day-to-day operations of U.S. military forces and order rapid reactions to emergency or combat situations.

You'll find some of AFCC's 49,000 people engineering, installing, operating and maintaining communications equipment, just like the employees of GTE. However, they are also responsible for weather and air traffic

control facilities. In fact, only the Federal Aviation Administration has a larger air traffic services system.

Some command specialists are experts at taking mobile equipment to any spot on the globe to support air force needs, while others design, operate and evaluate the computer systems that give Air Force managers information on supply, maintenance, pay, and medical matters. In addition, some 15,000 members of the Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve stand ready to help carry out the AFCC mission.

On July 1, 1981, the command celebrates its 20th anniversary, and marks two decades of supporting worldwide military operations. During those two decades, the men and women of AFCC have met their motto by "Providing the Reins of Command."

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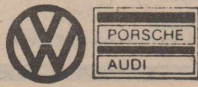


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# Rattler bats explode; Reese wins third title

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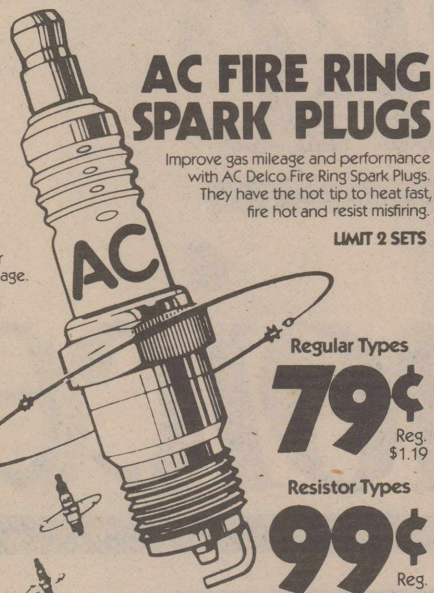
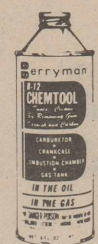
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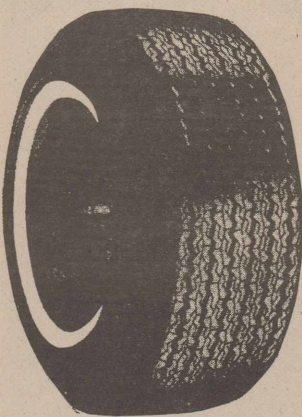

Because of construction on new lanes, the bowling center will be closed June 8-29.



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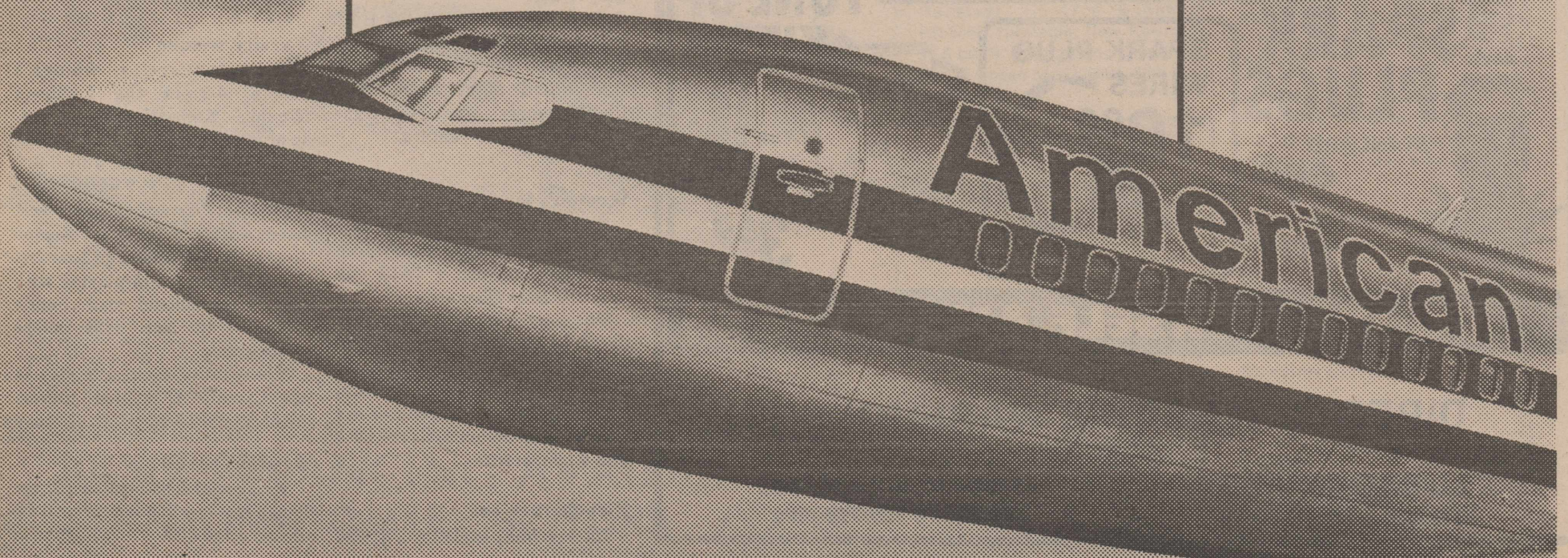
