

## Foreman's suggestion saves thousands of dollars for Reese

It's the little things that count, or so goes the old saying, and William Karon, test cell foreman, proved that in a big way through the Air Force Suggestion Program recently.

Karon submitted a suggestion for changing the replacement procedures on pressurizing and drain valve seals that will save \$10,600 annually in tangible benefits, and an estimated \$3,373 in manhour costs. When his suggestion, which he first submitted in July



1980, was accepted, Karon shared in the benefits when he was awarded \$765.

Others receiving cash awards during June and July were: Sgt. Daniel Ubaldo, \$25; A1C Randy Galloway, \$50; Arnold Wuthrich, \$75; Ruth Biggs, \$25 and 1st Lt. Horst Roehler, \$50.

Those who received certificates included: A1C Robert Delisi, 2nd Lt. Christopher Kelleher, Lt. Col. John Roush, SrA. David Beeson, Capt. Mark Sears and SrA Thomas Arnold. Rounding out the list of those award-

ed certificates were: Veta Reed, SSgt. Larry Johnson, A1C Patrick Cosgrove, A1C Lanny Price and TSgt. Jerry Heath.

Karon's suggestion was brought about by what he considered an inefficient method of replacement for the valve seals in aircraft engines. The old practice was to simply wait until a leak developed before changing the seals. This leak was generally brought about by temperature differences, particularly in cooler weather, that would cause the seals to swell and contract.

Heated fuel passing across the seals would cause them to swell and stop the leak, then when the engine cooled the leak would start again. Maintenance procedures required a trouble shooting of the engine when the leak developed. This was done at an average replacement cost of \$466.45 per engine.

Karon's method was to simply replace the seals (at a cost of \$.64 per valve) during periodic maintenance. The total cost of these replacements was \$19.30 per year. The savings were obvious and only awaited someone to recognize and suggest them.

Hal Corbin, suggestion program manager, reports that Reese people have submitted 373 suggestions as of July 31, 46 of which have been adopted. Tangible benefits now total over \$18,000.

Corbin maintains that one area that needs improvement in the program is meeting suspense dates. Regulations allow 30 days for the first evaluation. The program manager says that only extensive testing or building of mockups is sufficient cause to miss this suspense. Even if that is the case, the agency responsible should contact Corbin to let him know the project's status.

## Retirees expect pay adjustment

WASHINGTON (AFNS)—Military retirees can expect to receive retired pay adjustments annually instead of semi-annually as a result of congressional action on the Omnibus Reconciliation Act of 1981. This means the next adjustment would be March 1, 1982, according to Air Force personnel officials.

Retired pay adjustments are based on changes in the consumer price index, which the Bureau of Labor Statistics defines as a measure of price change for a fixed market basket of goods and services.

The next pay adjustment would reflect the change in the CPI from December 1980 to December 1981. Changes in the CPI are also applied to the dual compensation restriction for retired regular officers holding federal jobs.

Currently, they are allowed to retain the first \$5,999.44 plus 50 percent of the remainder of their retired pay, provided the combined sum of federal pay plus retired pay does not exceed the executive Level V ceiling, presently \$50,112.50.

After the act is passed, the dollar amounts to be retained will be adjusted annually in relation to the CPI.

Military members who received retired pay before Jan. 11, 1979, regardless of when they started a federal job, are not subject to the executive Level V ceiling.

# Keesler official witnesses crash

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article appeared in the Keesler AFB, Miss., base newspaper recently following an automobile accident in which two Keesler airmen were killed and another was injured. The author provides an eyewitness account of the grim aftermath of such a tragedy.)

(ATCNS)—The scene is garish and confusing. A tingly, electric feeling grips me as I watch the frenzied activity. Bright spotlights illuminate the area as rescuers try to reach the three airmen trapped in the car.

Close by, emergency medical technicians work with controlled haste to save their lives as red,

blue and amber beacons flash dizzily in the oak-shrouded darkness.

Harried policemen add to the nightmarish scene with swinging flashlights and hoarse shouts as they keep traffic moving. The flat, metallic din of emergency radios assaults my ears as

messages pour out into the otherwise peaceful night.

An ambulance pulls out with sirens wailing. One airman, still alive, is on his way to the hospital. I learned later that he didn't make it. The force of the impact had torn his heart loose from its aorta.

Suddenly, a second ambulance leaps into life, whisking one airman already dead and a second, whose injuries are surprisingly light, off to the waiting emergency room.

Without warning, that charged, tense feeling snaps off—as if someone had flicked a switch. I notice that most of the lights are gone and only a few people remain behind, hooking the smashed car to a wrecker. Their actions are almost in slow motion as everything draws to a quiet, and now unemotional, close.

In the brilliant sunshine of the following morning, little is left to remind me of the nightmare of only a few hours before. The oak tree still stands, solid as ever; even its bark is intact. Only a few sterile wrappings and bits of grill, trim and glass mark the spot of impact.

One thought still bothers me. Why did one live and two die? I head over to police headquarters hoping to find the investigators' report available. I'm in luck. Three of the officers who had responded to the accident are already in.

The lieutenant describes the terrible impact, graphically detailing how far various parts of the car had been scattered. A second officer asks how the driver is doing. While I tell him that the driver is still in surgery but is expected to live, he holds his breath, then lets out a sigh of relief.

He shares with me his part in the rescue and describes his surprise at having found the driver wearing both seat belt and shoulder harness. I ask him if the two passengers were also strapped in; he just shakes his head.

Later, when I have a chance to look at the car again, the first thing that strikes me is the total destruction of the front end. The hood is buckled back against the windshield. The bumper is pushed back under the engine block.



Besides, I feel trapped and can't move.

As I walk around the side of the car, I notice that the destruction virtually stops at the fire wall. The passenger compartment is intact—almost. It's been destroyed from within.

The steering wheel isn't even bent, but the right side of the dash is gone—smashed forward against the fire wall by the impact of the front seat passenger's body. The roof is creased upward and the liner is streaked with blood.

My eyes follow the streaks to where they end at a bulged out section of windshield. I notice that the seats are still secured to the floor and there is plenty of room around them. I imagine where the dashboard has been and I find the answer to my question.

This accident was survivable. There was room to live in that car. As I turn away, I can't stop wondering how different things might have turned out if those two passengers had worn seatbelts.

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
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# Care Line

**\*\*SOMETIMES WE** get so caught up in looking for ways to make changes that save us a few dollars that we overlook the minor changes that can save us thousands. But that wasn't the case with William Karon, our J-69 test cell foreman. Karon suggested changing the procedure for replacement of a \$.64 valve that will result in almost \$14,000 per year in savings of manhours and lost sorties.

**\*\*I WOULD LIKE** to add my congratulations to the many received by 1st Lt. Guy R. Morris, this year's coordinator for Camp Blue Yonder. The exceptional program he put together afforded a good time to many local children, and that is always a rewarding experience.

**\*\*THE THRIFT** shop will reopen today in the old Caprock House. We owe the ladies who donated their time and effort to the project a vote of thanks. If you get a chance, stop by between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. to see what's available.

**\*\*ONE OF THE** unfortunate things about writing this column is that there is not always a satisfactory answer to a problem. A Reese Village resident called with a very legitimate complaint about water standing in the street in front of his house, stagnating and creating a health and safety hazard.

The problem is a recurring one. The flat land in this area presents a drainage problem that only major street repairs can alleviate. Funds are simply not available for this large an undertaking. I appreciate the concern of the caller and wish I could give a solution other than to just do your best to spread the water and allow it to dry.

**\*\*HAPPILY, SOME** solutions are simpler, such as the air conditioner problem in the control tower. When both the primary air conditioner and the exhaust fan broke down in the tower, the controllers were left with the alternative of using the noisy back-up unit, or sweltering in the heat. A lack of parts brought about the delay in repairs.

The parts have since arrived, been installed and the units put back into operation. In addition, a check on the back-up unit has been scheduled to see about lowering the noise level so it can be used in the event the primary unit goes down for repairs again.

**\*\*WITH ALL THE** rain we've had lately it seem strange to address the question of sunglasses, but a caller wanted to know why the BX charges \$27.75

for non-prescription lenses when they are available downtown for \$10-\$12.50.

The difference is in quality. The chapter lenses used for comparison are of low quality and are not even carried by the exchange concessionaire. BX lenses are optically ground photo-grey lenses which have a retain value of between \$38 and \$45.

**\*\*AND THEN THERE** are those questions that can only be answered by saying, "It's the regulation." Another village resident wanted to know why he was written up for parking his small trailer in this carport during a grounds maintenance inspection. Since parking for trailers, boats and recreational vehicles has been provided on base, we like to keep them out of the housing area to present a cleaner, neater image, and to prevent cluttering of carport areas.

It was to this end that wing pamphlet 90-1 included instructions on where to park these special-purpose vehicles. Individual parking spaces are allocated by morale, welfare and recreation and a space may be obtained by calling Ext. 3346.

**\*\*PROBLEMS DO** crop up everywhere, and sometimes these problems require an adjustment in operating hours to correct. That's why the pool was closed two hours early one day last month. Foreign matter, chemical imbalances or inclement weather often necessitate a minor change to posted hours, though the MWR branch attempts to make these changes as minor and rare as possible.

## Two gain SOS honors

Two Reese officers were recently selected as distinguished graduates of Air University's Squadron Officer School at Maxwell AFB, Ala.

Capt. David R. Hensley of the 54th Flying Training Squadron and Capt. Mark K. Wells of the 35th FTS were in competition with 619 students in Class 81-D and graduated in the top 20 percent of their class. In addition, their selection for this honor was recommended by a review committee and approved by the SOS commandant.

Squadron Officer School is the first of the Air Force's professional military education schools. The mission of the eight-and-one-half week course is to provide for the professional development of company grade officers so they can better perform and value their role in the conduct and support of the Air Force mission.

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
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# AECP offers openings

Some 400 airmen will be selected to attend civilian schools for engineering or technical degrees under the Airman Education and Commissioning Program during fiscal 1982.

The exact number depends on congressional authorization and funding for the program, according to Air Force Manpower and Personnel Center officials here.

Last year only 300 slots were available under the program, one of which went to TSgt. James Ilg, a mechanical engineering major at Texas Tech University. Sergeant Ilg is a quality control inspector in the 64th Field Maintenance Squadron.

Boards are tentatively scheduled for this September and March 1982 at the Air Force Institute of Technology, Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio. Applications for the September board are due at AFIT by Aug. 21.

Those selected will attend school to complete a bachelor's degree and enter Officer Training School. After OTS, the new second lieutenants will receive assignments in computer science or engineering career fields.

The program includes openings for 240 airmen in electrical engineering, 50 in computer science, 35 in aeronautical engineering, 30 in aeronautical

engineering, 15 in civil engineering, 10 in mechanical engineering, 10 in industrial engineering, and 10 in nuclear engineering.

Members with degrees in other fields may apply for AECP, but they will have to meet eligibility requirements and attend school to earn a lateral degree in engineering or computer science.

According to Reese's education officer, Bill Trafton, South Plains College is now offering courses in math and sciences directly targeted toward fulfilling AECP requirements. More information on these courses may be obtained by contacting the education office at Ext. 3469.

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# JAG announces July legal actions

Eleven article 15s were handed out along with one vacation of suspension on a staff sergeant and one article 15 that was set aside on a senior airman during the month of July.

There was a total of \$1,548 forfeiture in may (\$820 suspended), ten reductions in grade (six suspended), 186 days extra duty and 14 days restriction to base.

For possession of fireworks an airman basic and airman were given 14 days extra duty with the airman basic restricted to base for 14 days and a forfeiture of \$250 for two months (\$100 suspended). The airman was given a suspended reduction to airman basic.

One senior airman learned that stealing government property valued at only \$1.75 cost him \$200 (\$130 suspended), a suspended reduction in grade and 30 days extra duty.

Two senior airmen and one airman were charged with failure to go, a violation of article 86, all received suspended reductions in grade, a total of \$634 in

forfeitures and 35 days extra duty. One staff sergeant who was reduced in grade to sergeant received a vacation of suspension for failure to go.

For being disorderly in station, an airman basic received 45 days extra duty along with 30 days of correctional custody.

An airman was reduced to airman basic for violation of article 86, absent from organization for three days, the airman was given 14 days extra duty.

Intent to deceive and sign a false statement cost a senior airman one stripe, forfeiture of \$200 and 30 days extra duty.

An airman first class who was not convinced that possession of marijuana and rolling papers is illegal was reduced to airman and paid a \$130 forfeiture.

Failure to maintain quarters cost an airman first class a forfeiture of \$130, suspended reduction in grade and 14 days extra duty.

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

## New head chaplain takes spiritual reins

Reese received a new spiritual leader last week when Chap. (Lt. Col.) Phillip E. Grimmitt arrived to replace Chap. (Col.) Arnold G. Johnson as installation chaplain.

Ironically, when Johnson first arrived here in July 1977 it was to replace Grimmitt who was being reassigned to Mather AFB, Calif. "When you get sand i your blood it's hard to get it out," quipped the returning chaplain.

Grimmitt's denominational affiliation is United Methodist and he received his degrees, both bachelor's and master's, from Southern Methodist University. His civilian background includes pastoral experience at Aldersgate Methodist and Wheatland Methodist, both in the Dallas area.

No newcomer to the Air Force, the chaplain received his commission through the Reserve Officer Training Corps in 1953 and served as a Communications Electronics Officer until he entered seminary training in 1955. Even while in seminary Grimmitt maintained his ties with the

military as a reserve officer. He received his chaplain's commission in 1958.

With the services recently coming under fire with charges of wide-spread drug abuse, the chaplain explored the question of "military morality."

"I don't think that the military society is any different from society overall. We mirror very well the society at large. It's true that basic morality is deteriorating, and rampant drug use is a symptom of that deterioration.

"The military is no more prone to drug abuse than any other group, it's simply more visible because we actively seek out the abusers. Whereas a civilian may be able to use drugs without detriment to those around him, a crew chief who's stoned could radically affect the safety and welfare of others."

Since Grimmitt is currently recovering from a fall that left his leg in a cast, he will not be involved in services at the chapel until mid-September.

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
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# Reese Rattlers capture two of three tourneys

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
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

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
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
