

Snow falls in Panhandle; flooding in North Texas

DALLAS (AP) — The Trinity Dallas as emergency officials of North Texas today. sandbag the levee and prepare to evacuate residents threatened by

flooding. Meanwhile in the Texas Panhandle, snow began falling early today in Dalhart. However, no significant accumulations were reported south of Amarillo, the National Weather Service said.

A flash flood watch was in effect for deep South Texas. Weather Service radar early today detected widely scattered thunderstorms across parts of South Texas.

Torrential rainfall that has claimed at least five lives pushed the Trinity nine feet above flood stage. The storms responsible for Tuesday's deluge moved eastward and weakened, but forecasters said additional rainfall was possible across North Texas during the next few days.

Tuesday was the fourth straight day of heavy rains, but forecasters said the downpours were not as bad as May 1990, when 13 people died from flooding statewide.

Five weather-related deaths have been reported in the state since the turbulence began Friday.

In addition, a Greenville couple was injured when lightning struck their home, and the weather hindered the search for an elderly man who disappeared from his home near Clarksville.

A flood warning was issued Tuesday for the Sabine River in East Texas, the Sulphur River in Northeast Texas, the Trinity River in North Texas, and the Sabinal River, Frio River and upper Guadalupe River in Southwest Texas as new rains brought the rivers beyond flood stage.

Rainfall rates of 5 to 6 inches per hour were reported Tuesday in southwestern Kerr County in the upper south and north forks of the Guadalupe. Near Uvalde, lower sections of Garner Park were flooding as water had risen to about 12 feet over the Frio River dam.

Some street flooding was reported in Corpus Christi early today after 2-4 inches of rain fell in the Texas coastal city.

PROPOSITION 11: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a state lottery."

Background: If passed, this amendment will allow the state to operate lotteries. A division of the Comptroller's Office would be established to operate the lottery. The comptroller would appoint a director of lottery operations who would adopt rules concerning lottery operations, including rules about the types of games, the division of ticket-sales receipts into prizes and state revenue, the price of tickets, the amount of prizes, the frequency of drawings, security for a lottery and advertising. The comptroller would be authorized to contract with private companies or persons for any lottery function. Ticket sales would have to begin no later than the 240th day after the votes are canvassed (no later than late July or early August of 1992). During each twoyear budget period the administrative cost of running the lottery could not exceed 15 percent of the gross ticket sales (20 percent during the first two years of operation). An independent audit of all lottery accounts, transactions and security would have to be conducted each year. It would be illegal to sell a lottery ticket to someone under 18 years old.

Supporters Say: A lottery would be a popular way to raise much-needed state revenue, reduce the need for higher state taxes and help avoid a state income tax. For years, every survey of public opinion in Texas has shown overwhelming support for this voluntary method of raising


"We were dead-on," said navigation chief William Kirhofer.

Because Gaspra is so small and Galileo moves so fast, the spacecraft was programmed to take 150 images of space surrounding and including the asteroid. That way, Galileo was guaranteed to get at least one detailed black-and-white picture and one slightly less detailed color picture of Gaspra from about 3,500 miles away.

Galileo couldn't take pictures of Gaspra during its closest approach because it whizzed past too quickly — at 17,895 mph.





AUSTIN (AP) — The leader of managing partner of a consortium startup of the first leg to 1996-97. He said Texas TGV and the state are close in negotiations on a franchise agreement and that the group has been talking with Mexican officials about a proposed rail leg. He also said Congress is leaning more toward legislation that would help in building high-speed rail projects.

> But Agee bristled at a suggestion from Texas officials to add a state manager to the project that would monitor the day-to-day developments of the more than \$5 billion railroad.

Such a move would slow the project, Agee said.

But Texas High Speed Rail Authority member Lena Guerrero said a project manager would help win public confidence in the system.

Agee asked that the authority maintain general oversight but not a constant presence where it would be "looking over our shoulder."

Authority member Bob Krueger said additional scrutiny is necessary because the rail group is considering using billions of dollars in federal tax-exempt bonds

"That is a general government subsidy, and if there is going to be a subsidy ... there seems to be a role for government officials," he

Agee downplayed the public's stake in tax-exempt bonds, saying new modes of transportation have traditionally been helped by the government.

He said that Texas TGV is considering financing the project through a mix of federal taxexempt bonds and bonds where the interest is taxed.

Houston Independent School District, the state's largest in student enrollment, is among those that has not yet set its rate, Welch said.

The new law, nicknamed the "Robin Hood" plan, is designed to shift hundreds of millions of local property tax dollars from wealthier to poorer school districts within 188 new taxing regions made up of one or several counties.

In this way, property-rich districts share some benefits of their tax base with their poorer neighbors. Some state aid also is shifted

A higher tax rate does not necessarily mean higher tax bills for homeowners in school districts, because of homestead exemptions approved this year by voters. A number of them may even pay less.

Harrison carried the ball 21 times for a 5.2 yards-per-carry average against the Panthers.





AUSTIN (AP) — Bastrop, the No. 1 team in Class 4A, may have to forefeit two games because of an ineligible player, the Texas Education Agency says.

If the TEA eligibility ruling stands, Bastrop (8-0) would forfeit District 26-4A wins over Hays and Lockhart.

Paul Fleming, Bastrop superintendent, said Tuesday he has asked the TEA to rule quickly on an appeal. No date has been set for a hearing on his request.

Fleming said a teacher, in conjunction with the department head, changed a grade from failing to passing for the grading period ending Oct. 14. The student has not been identified.

'The teacher did not violate local policy,' Fleming said. "The decision was made by the teacher and the department head. This had nothing to do with the coaches. The teachers did what they thought to be in the interest of the child.'

Fleming said Bastrop used the ineligible player in its past two games. According to the state's no-pass, no-play law, any student who fails a class is ineligible for all extracurricular activities for a minimum of six weeks.

The player in question is not a starter, Fleming said.

WASHINGTON (AP) - An billion dollars worth of purchases

avalanche of tax-cut legislation has hit Capitol Hill. Billed as efforts to snuff out the recession, the proposals have been unleashed by members of both parties just a month before Congress plans to go home for the year.

Washington today...

Here are questions and answers about Washington's latest case of tax-cut fever.

Q: What's the difference between what Democrats and Republicans want to do?

A: Each party has several plans for action, with no one bill emerging as a final Democratic or GOP position. Some Democrats want to increase spending for social programs while others want tax breaks for the middle class, paid for with either military spending cuts or higher levies on the rich.

President Bush and Republicans want to slash the capital gains tax, paid on investment profits, and extend business tax breaks for

Both parties want to use tax breaks to make it more attractive for consumers to save. One way they would do this is by making Individual Retirement Accounts, or IRAs, more generous, such as by allowing penalty-free withdrawals for college expenses, first-time home buyers and medical bills.

Q: Are tax cuts the medicine the recession needs?

A: That's debatable. Many economists agree that what will help mend the economy is a burst of spending by consumers. And when you cut people's taxes, they can do only two things with their newfound money: spend it or save

Giving tax breaks to low- and middle-income people probably will increase consumer spending. But few analysts think even a few

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will do much for a \$5 trillion economy.

Tax breaks for the rich could do even less. The well-to-do - who studies show would be the main beneficiaries of a capital gains tax cut tend to spend a smaller portion of their tax savings than those less well-off.

Q: Isn't paying for tax breaks with defense cuts or higher taxes on the rich a good thing?

A: Politically, it certainly is appealing for Democrats. But in terms of stimulating the economy, it could be a wash. High military spending in the post-Cold War era might sound anachronistic to some, but it does keep assembly lines rolling and people employed. Shifting the tax burden from the poor to the rich might seem progressive, but it would probably have little net effect on the economy.

Q: What about making IRAs more generous?

A: Proponents of making IRAs more attractive say this is a good way to encourage savings. While increasing national savings is a good long-term diet for the economy, this actually could hurt right now because extra savings are exactly the opposite of what

the economy seems to need. Opponents argue that instead of significantly increasing savings, enhanced IRAs will simply encourage the better-off to shift money they already are saving into IRAs. This would cost the government money because of the tax breaks it would have to give away.

The ruling would prevent states from getting extra Medicaid funds under a practice by which states collect special taxes or "voluntary donations" from Medicaid providers such as hospitals and nursing homes and qualify for a cash match from Washington.

Food Stamps' enrollment records say

WASHINGTON (AP) - Enrollment in the federal food stamp program has set record levels since March and now nearly one in 10 Americans rely on the government to help put food on the table, according to Agriculture Department records.

The increase has added more than 3 million Americans to the program in a year, according to USDA statistics reviewed by The increase probably involves the economic recession and a greater accessibility to the food stamp program.

Consumer activists said the record numbers that indicate the economic downturn has widened its grip in middle-income households.

The Agriculture Department said a record 23.57 million Americans received food stamps in August. A year ago, 20.49 million people were enrolled.



"Fresh lava has poured out onto the summit relatively recently," Wood told a news conference Tuesday as the National Aeronautics and Space Administration released pictures taken by radar cameras on the Magellan space probe. He said "recently" could mean the last few years.

From earlier images, Magellan scientists had concluded that there had been a huge recent landslide on Venus. If that were the case, the planet would still be geologically active, complete with



Most of the surface material on Venus is neither rock nor the same material that erupted from volcanoes, said Wood. It is covered with material that has weathered into soil in the planet's warm, chemically reactive atmosphere for millions or hundreds of millions of years. That soil is quite different from materials in the original rock.

At low altitudes on the windswept planet, the temperature is about 170 degrees Fahrenheit hotter than it is on elevations. One mineral, an iron sulfide, appears in soils only at altitudes greater than three miles and its presence increases the radar reflectivity.

In the NEC World Junior Championmedals were won by the Australians,

who beat USA-1 in the playoff 186-51. A false card by a defender early in the play is a two-edged sword. If it fools declarer into going down in a contract he could have made, it is a brilliancy. But if it fools partner, who makes an error that lets a no-play contract make, it is a blunder.

The Australian pair Matt Mullamphy and Jim Wallis deceived the USA-1 declarer, Mike Cappelletti, Jr., on today's deal.

Mullamphy, sitting West, led the club three because that was his "stronger" minor. Declarer tried dummy's queen, but then withheld his ace when East produced the king.

At this point, it is traditional for East to return his original fourth-best club, the seven. But Wallis false-carded, leading back the club two.

Now look at matters from South's point of view. West led the club three and East returned the two. All the evidence pointed to a 4-4 club split. And if South ducked this trick, West might switch to a diamond, removing a vital dummy entry before the heart suit was established.

Suitably convinced, declarer rose with the club ace at trick two. Now. West completed a good defense by un-blocking his jack. He knew that if declarer held the club 10, he would have

played low from the dummy at tricl one to guarantee two club tricks. When declarer led his heart 10, West won and played his last club, East cashing three tricks in the suit to de-

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

DEAR DR. GOTT: Your article regarding honey for burns interested me. Actually my favorite remedy for burns is the juice from the leaves of an aloe vera plant. Comfrey from my garden quickly heals sprains when a tea is made from the leaves and the injured hand or foot is soaked in it. Discoloration disappears and bones knit rapidly. A common name for this herb is 'bone set.' Isn't Nature wonderful?

DEAR READER: Indeed, Nature is wonderful. In fact, Nature has provided the basis for many medical therapeutics, the most outstanding examples being digitalis (a heart stimulant derived from the foxglove plant), penicillin (developed from a common mold) and various anti-cancer drugs (derived from plants, such as the periwinkle).

As you point out, the sap from the leaves of the aloe vera plant is useful in treating burns. I am less confident recommending comfrey for sprains because I don't see how a tea made from the leaves could penetrate the skin to heal the deep tissues injured by a sprain. This type of acute injury is more suitably treated with ice packs and elevation of the ankle.

I have received several letters from readers responding to my request for information concerning the use of honey to treat burns. While the success stories are largely anecdotal and do not lend themselves to scientific scrutiny, many people are in the habit of applying honey-salves to burns; the substance seems to aid

Actually, the body has a miraculous, natural ability to heal itself, a fact we often forget or disregard in our electronic age. While many herbal remedies are touted to cure various ills, what we may really be seeing is

the result of natural healing powers contained in the body itself.

Despite my reliance on storebought remedies, I continue to have an open mind about (and a healthy respect for) time-tested herbal drugs. After all, doctors don't know everything.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have an anal fissure that causes streaks of blood to appear in my stool. A gastroenterologist inserted a long, lighted tube into my rectum and found nothing further, but the problem continues. What

DEAR READER: Anal fissures are cracks in the tissue around the bowel opening. They sometimes hurt and often bleed.

When you were examined by the gastroenterologist, the specialist investigated other sources of rectal bleeding, such as cancer, colitis and hemorrhoids. Having found nothing more serious than anal fissures, the doctor should have advised you what

Although anal fissures usually heal by themselves, you can accelerate the healing by not straining when you defecate, using a stool softener (such as Colace), paying strict attention to bowel hygiene and applying an antibiotic cream (such as Neosporin) to the irritated area.

The federal prison system on April 1 housed 62,000 inmates, including 27,000 estimated by prison officials as having "moderate to severe" substance abuse problems.

An inmate has a "moderate to severe" problem if one or more major lifestyle categories — such as family, work, school or health was negatively affected by use of drugs or alcohol in the two years before arrest.

The GAO faulted the Bureau of Prisons for initially restricting admissions to inmates with 15 to 24 months remaining on their sentences. Prisoners can now enroll at any time during their incarceration.


