COUNTY EMPLOYS FARM AGENT WITH FEDERAL AID

The Commissioners' Court during their sessions last week contracted for the employment of a County Farm Agent for the period of a year beginning as soon as a suitable man can be found and sent to the county.

The employment of the farm agent was made through co-operation with the State A. & M. College and the Federal Department of Agriculture. The county pays \$500 of the salary of the agent, the state and federal governments paying the remainder.

No announcement has been made of the man chosen for the place nor of the time when he will take up his duties. All his time will be given to Floyd County.

TWO LOADS LAMBS SHIPPED TO KANSAS CITY MARKET

Greer & Hall Tuesday shipped two cars of prime lambs to the Kansas City market from their pastures west of Floydada.

The sheep market has been good for a long period and many Floyd County stockmen are realizing good profits from their herds.

INFLUENZA PREVENTS PREACHING AT CHURCHES IN CITY

The influenza epidemic and the resultant order by city authorities preventing public assembly for a period of two weeks caused all church services to be suspended last Sunday in Floydada and unless announcement is made changing the necessity for no public assembling, services will not be held again next Sunday.

No recent serious cases of influenza have been reported, and there will probably be no reason, in the opinion of authorities, why the period of closed assembly doors should be extended.

WIDOW OVERTAKES FLOYD COUNTY BOY IN VIRGINIA

Steward Mercer, a young man, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Mercer of Lakeview, died Thursday, October 17th, at Penman, Va., after a brief illness and the remains were laid to rest in Lakeview cemetery Monday afternoon of this week, the corpse reaching Floydada Monday.

The Mercer family have not lived in Floyd county a great while. Steward Mercer had been in the employ of the Dupont Engineering Co., at Penman, Va., for some little while, leaving home to obtain the work.

Miss Greer was practically reared in Floyd County and has been a teacher in the county for the past two years. Mr. Rose also formerly lived in this county. He is a brother of C. L. Rose, and Mrs. Rose will make their home at Clovis, leaving this week for the place.

SCHOOL RE-OPENS MONDAY

Floydada Public Schools will open again Monday morning of next week, October 28th.

Parents and pupils are urged to keep the date in mind to the end that a full attendance may be recorded the first day.

In the belief that the influenza epidemic has practically run its course and that by next Monday the need for the suspension of the public schools will have ceased, City Health Officer Hopkins and County Health Officer Andrews in conference with the School Board of the District have decided that it will not be unsafe to begin school again Monday of next week, which is October 28th.

It was stated, in connection with the announcement that the school would re-open, that should the need be apparent the latter part of the week, that school could more easily be suspended on short notice than it could be convened with full attendance, and the statement was made that unless an official announcement was made to the contrary that school would re-open here next Monday at the usual hour.

S. D. GREER STILL VERY ILL FROM TYPHOID FEVER

S. D. Greer, who has been sick for several weeks from typhoid fever, is still in a very critical condition, it is stated, and fear is expressed that he will not recover.

His condition has been unpromising for ten days and no changes for the better have been made recently.

LETTERS FROM PAUL FOSTER INDICATE NOT CAPTURED

Though having been officially notified by the War Department that their son, Paul, is a German prisoner at Essen Darmstadt, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Foster, of this city, are doubtful whether this is the case. Their doubt is based on the receipt of letters from their son received recently, dated and postmarked at later dates than the one on which Paul was reported a prisoner.

On the 19 of September Paul wrote his parents a letter which was postmarked September 21st. This letter told of another visit to the front where he had been on duty. Another letter, telling that he was well and in good spirits was dated September 24th. None of the letters mentioned the matter are written on Y. M. C. A. stationery, labelled "On Active Service."

Mr. and Mrs. Foster are deeply gratified to have this indication that their son is not a prisoner but is yet on the firing line and doing good service. Paul is in the infantry with the 36th Division, which was cited recently by the French General in command as having written the most glorious page in the history of American Arms in the present conflict.

S. E. Duncan has been among the "flu" victims this week. He has been confined to his room since Sunday. He is convalescing at present.

THE ARMY MAN'S BANK



A banking hour in a Y. M. C. A. building of a Southern department camp. The army "Y" is the soldier's financial agent; it takes his savings and deposits them for him in a local city bank; it sells him Thrift stamps; it issues him express money orders, and in certain cases keeps money and valuables for him temporarily in the building. One "Y" man in each building is authorized to act as the agent of the express company to issue money orders to the soldiers. The banking service and the Thrift stamp sales encourage the army man to save his money, and this is made more possible by the free comforts, conveniences and entertainments offered by the Y. M. C. A.

Sunday at two all time all over the country will be set back one hour, which will make time conform to the old standard time which prevailed prior to the daylight saving law which was effective beginning the last Sunday in last April at 2 a. m.

LINGUIST RIVER BRIDGE WILL COST \$9,500

Linguist river bridge, the construction of which was contracted by the Commissioners' Court last week to Austin Bros., of Dallas, will cost \$9,500. This contract was entered into by the court and a representative of the constructing company early in last week.

The bridge will be of steel, with concrete piers and abutments set in clay foundations. The contract calls for completion within ninety days.

The bridge is to be located in the extreme northeast portion of this county. It will give a better trade outlet to an extensive territory in this county and the edge of Hall, Motley, and Briscoe. It will also facilitate mail connections on a new star route from Estelline to Lockney which will be established November 1st.

There are many Floyd County boys in the 36th Division which was cited Monday of this week by the French Commander as having performed a most delicate and important piece of work on October 6th and 7th. The division is described in the official order as "A recent organization as yet incompletely organized."

Continuing the note of the general says: "Although being under fire for the first time, the young soldiers of General Smith, rivaled in their combative spirit and tenacity the old and valient regiments of General Lejeune, accomplished all tasks set for them."

There are perhaps 50 or 100 Floyd County boys in this division, which is made up almost entirely of Texas and Oklahoma contingents.

LIBERTY LOAN SUBSCRIPTIONS ARE \$136,200

LIBERAL OUTPOURING OF FUNDS FOR GOVERNMENT USE RECORD OF DRIVE IN CO.

The total for Floyd County of subscriptions to the Fourth Liberty Loan was \$136,200, as taken from the compilations of the banks of the county at the close of the drive Saturday night. These figures are approximately \$40,000 better than had been anticipated by the campaign managers who are highly elated over the manner in which people responded to the appeals for funds to carry on the war.

The figures announced are \$44,000 short of the quota assigned by the Federal Reserve Bank to the county. But in assigning the quota County Chairman W. B. Clark was told by J. W. Hoopes, Deputy Governor of the Reserve Bank, that the efforts of the patriotic people of this county would be satisfactory to the government, the implied meaning being that the Reserve Bank was taking into consideration the abnormal conditions prevailing over portions of this county and that failure to subscribe a full quota would not be considered an indication of lack of patriotism here.

Every community committee in the county conducted a very thorough canvass and every citizen in the county had an opportunity to subscribe for bonds. For this reason the figures given out as the total subscriptions is considered the maximum effort of the county at this time.

The totals announced from the two campaign centers were as follows: Lockney, \$72,600; Floydada, \$63,600.

WEST SIDE MARKET OPENED IN SNODGRASS BUILDING

The West Side Market under the management of P. H. Flynn, was opened in the portion of the Snodgrass building formerly occupied by the Pack Grocery Co., Monday of this week.

W. A. Robbins and Robt. J. Hall are interested in the enterprise.

COTTON GINNING ESTIMATE PLACED AT 1,500 BALES

At the opening of the ginning season local ginners placed the estimate of the number of bales of cotton to be ginned at Floydada at 1,500 bales, and Tuesday of this week A. V. Haynes, manager of the West Texas Gin Company, said he had no reason to revise his figures as to the number that would probably be ginned.

On Monday the 400th bale had been ginned and the gins had to run on overlapping time Saturday afternoon to take care of the cotton that came in. A steady run had also been made this week up to Tuesday night, and only inclement weather conditions will prevent further steady runs for some time, the ginners say.

Especially interesting attaches to the cotton crop from the fact that it is producing good revenue this year. The Food Administration price on seed to the farmer is \$61 and the lint has been selling from 29 1-2c to above thirty the last few days, after a period of higher prices earlier in the season. These figures would indicate that the value of the crop for the season's marketing here will likely be around a quarter of a million dollars.

MR. AND MRS. L. A. MARSHALL RECOVERING FROM "FLU"

Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Marshall returned home last Thursday from Burk-burnett both sick from influenza, but at this time are recovering.

They had been absent from home several days, Mr. Marshall spending sometime while away in Fannin Co.

DR. L. V. SMITH CONVALESCING FROM "FLU" ATTACK

Dr. L. V. Smith has had the tables turned on himself the past several days. Instead of dosing out medicines he has been the dosee or words to that effect.

He has been laid up with influenza since the latter part of last week, but is now getting on his feet.

RAIN HELPS WHEAT PROSPECT

Cloudy weather and some rain, while slowing down the cotton gathering, has considerably bettered the wheat prospect in Floyd County this week. Insufficient fall to make a good season was recorded, but wheat that is already up will be held for some time in growing condition and wheat that was in the ground will come out to a good stand, it is believed. Hundreds of acres had been planted before the rain.

Seven-tenths of an inch fell here. Reports from over the state indicate that while the precipitation here was light it was the most general over the state since June, being especially heavy over the southwestern portions.

Private L. E. Rape, of the Marine Corps, who visited Floydada Thursday night of last week, is a Texas boy. He was raised at Whitney, Texas, and is a friend of the Eubanks family here, also formerly of Whitney. Rape entered the Marine Corps one month after war was declared and saw some of the most bitter fighting both at Verdun and later at Chateau Thierry and west of that point.

W. U. White, prescription clerk at the Triplett Pharmacy, was among those last week who were ill from a gripe or influenza.

Official Building Regulations

The ruling of the War Industries Board on construction work, outside of buildings, railroads, highways and mines, directly connected with WAR WORK, is today as follows:

"Construction projects falling within the following classifications are hereby approved and no permits or licenses will be required therefor:

(2) Repairs of or extensions to existing buildings involving in the aggregate a cost of not exceeding Twenty-five Hundred Dollars, \$2500, and new construction for farm purposes only involving in the aggregate a cost not exceeding One Thousand Dollars."

The above regulation thus allows you, without any permit, and in the usual course of business, to:

A---Contract for "repairs of or extensions to existing buildings," providing the TOTAL COST, including all labor and material, is under \$2500.

B---Contract for NEW FARM BUILDINGS when the TOTAL COST, including all labor and material, is under \$1000.

FOR ALL OTHER CONSTRUCTION WORK A PERMIT MUST BE SECURED FROM THE WAR INDUSTRIES BOARD, and we will be glad to help you place your request before the proper official for this territory.

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neighborliness, one of the things to go to make life worth while, is one of the forgotten things in Floydada, though some who have suffered from influenza and kindred maladies the past several days may have so felt. Visiting among the sick, a very helpful thing, has been discouraged in every way in order to prevent the spread of the sickness to families not affected. Persons who have been sick from influenza and who have not had the many friends calling that they should have liked, should keep this thought in mind. It is much better that one should suffer in loneliness for a time than that many should be made subject to illness through the solicitude of friends. This is said to those who have been ill for those who have not, because in the interest of the community at large some may have felt neglected who have not been visited as they would have liked. The necessity of preventing the spread of influenza has outweighed the desire of friends to comfort those in illness.

Speaking of the drouth relief funds being raised by various agencies, the Colorado Record says: "The trouble about all of these funds is that they have a string to them. The money is to be loaned to the sufferers at a rate of interest (to be sure a low rate) but the borrowers must give security. Now it is well known to the people who are living in this section, and should be known to the governor, state officials and bankers of Texas, that when a man has stayed with the stuff for three years, and is in fact a drouth sufferer he has absolutely no collateral to put on which to borrow money." There has been no practical suggestions or arrangements made to relieve the people of the drouth stricken portions of Texas. Red tape has characterized both state and federal aid. Men most deserving can not get relief. Like the Record says they have no credit. Collateral all swallowed up in the three continuous dry years. A Sweetwater man remarked to the writer Sunday, in answer to a question if the relief funds was of practical benefit to his people that no relief had reached his people, and how they were to get through another year he did not know. The only way that practical relief could reach the people is the doing away with some of the red tape and fix it so people could borrow money and buy feed to make another crop.—Lockney Beacon.

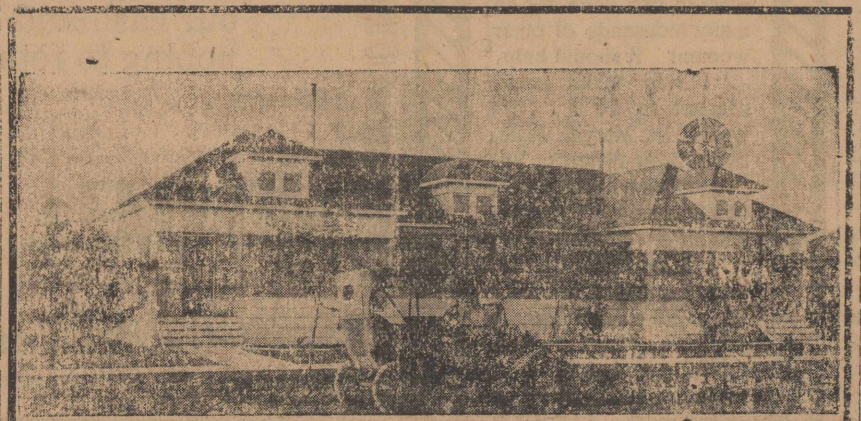

CHAIRMAN WOMAN'S DIVISION U. W. W. CAMPAIGN APPOINTED

Dallas, Texas, October 22.—Mrs. C. E. Craig of Plainview, has been appointed chairman of the Women's Division of the United War Work Campaign for the district including Bailey, Lamb, Floyd, Hale, Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock, Crosby, Yoakum, Terry, Garza, Gaines Dawson and Borden Counties. The appointment was made by Miss Bertha I. Miller, Executive Secretary of the Women's Division of the Campaign in Texas.

Through Miss Miller's department an organization of women is being perfected in the State to take an essential part in the Campaign to be conducted, November 11-18. 287 Floyd county boys in France without gas masks if they have to depend on Floyd county for them.

Last week and week before last a call was made for fruit stones, pits or nut shells, as these were needed in making gas masks to protect our soldiers facing the deadly poison of the Germans.

Every other call that Floyd County has heard, she has gone "over the top" but she fell far short in this one.

It is estimated that 300 boys from Floyd county are over-seas. Only 100 pounds stone pits were donated by the county. It takes 7 pounds of these to make one mask, so only 13 boys from Floyd have been provided with masks by this county.

We can do better than this. Look in your yards, pick up the seeds found there and take them to your nearest grocery store by Wednesday, October 30th.

MARINE TELLS EXPERIENCES AT CHATEAU THIERRY

Attorney Cecil Story, of Vernon and Private L. E. Rape, of the Marine Corps, the latter a survivor of the series of battles at Chateau Thierry, visited Floydada Thursday night and in an open air meeting talked to a large crowd about the needs for liberal subscriptions to the Fourth Liberty Loan.

Private Rape first told the story of Chateau Thierry, of his wounds sustained at that place and his subsequent experiences in the evacuation and base hospitals. He was twice wounded and has been invalidated home at least temporarily.

Appealing to his hearers to help bear the burdens of the war, Judge Story told of the sacrifices being made by the boys in France and of the need for unstinted support of the war measures here at home. "The boys at Chateau Thierry gave their all; you are only asked to lend a part," was the burden of his address.

Because of the influenza epidemic no effort was made to obtain subscriptions at this meeting.

INFLUENZA SHOWS SIGNS OF ABATEMENT IN FLOYDADA

BELIEVED THAT FEW DAYS MORE WILL SEE DANGER OF MALADY'S SPREAD PAST

Influenza in Floydada shows signs of abatement. Within the past two days no new serious cases have been reported to local authorities, who are anticipating that the danger from the spread of the malady will be practically over at the close of this week or the beginning of next.

In all about forty cases of sickness having the symptoms of influenza have been reported within the city proper. Many cases have been reported from other points in the county. Only one death resulted to date from the malady here.

Mayor Boerner said Tuesday that the matter of raising the restrictions against public assembly would be left entirely to the judgment of city and county health officers and to the medical fraternity. When they feel that it may be safely done, he said the restrictions would be raised here.

WHAT "AMERICA'S ANSWER" MEANS

"America's Answer", the U. S. Official War Picture issued by the Division of Films, of the Committee on Public Information, is not the ordinary press-agented film play. It is a chapter of the great drama of the war, registered by U. S. Signal Corps photographers, by direction of General John J. Pershing. It is purely a Government enterprise. No individual has any profit interest in the production. The picture has been made and it is presented for public consideration, not to make money—although it must necessarily produce a revenue in order to meet the expenses involved—but in order to show the millions of contributors to the several Liberty Loans, the purchasers of Thrift and War Stamps, Taxpayers, and those who have so generously given in other ways for the needs of the war, just how the great sums have been expended and what, in a physical way, has been accomplished in France during the first year of America's participation in the struggle for Democracy.

NEWS OF LOCKNEY

From the Beacon:

Last Saturday afternoon there was a liberty loan rally on Main street. Judge J. N. Stalbird presided, and made a stirring speech, full of logic and patriotic appeals to our people. Rev. J. T. Burnett, of the Baptist church, followed in a stirring address, which brought tears to the eyes of his hearers. Next was an address by Elder J. E. Black, who appealed to us as business men, and patriots to stand by the flag at this critical moment.

As a result of the meeting something like \$3,500 were subscribed by the crowd assembled.

Preceding the rally the Boy Scouts of Lockney took the field and sold a number of bonds. Under the leadership of Scout-master, R. A. Collins, the drive was effective. An army tent was erected on Main street, which was scout headquarters throughout the day. In addition to the work of the scouts the lady teachers of Lockney public school worked in the afternoon and sold a great many bonds.

Leonard Randolph, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Randolph, living east of town, and a brother of Everett Randolph, manager for the Farmers Exchange, died at Texline last Sunday night. His remains reached here on Tuesday afternoon, and was interred in Lockney cemetery. Rev. C. A. Joiner conducted funeral services at the grave. A large concourse of sorrowing friends and relatives were present to pay their last respects to the

departed one.

Leonard had been raised in this county, and had a host of friends, who were sincerely grieved to hear of his death. He had just returned from Kansas City with cattle when he took influenza, which developed pneumonia. He was only sick a few days. He was 36 years of age.

Influenza is spreading over the county to all sections of the state and nation. There were several cases in Lockney, but no fatalities to date. There was one death at Floydada Monday morning, that of Mrs. Bob Henry. She was only sick a few days. All the schools in the county have been closed for a period of two weeks or longer if the situation demands. Churches and all social gatherings have been prohibited for the same period of time, likewise the picture show has closed.

The Commissioners' Court of Floyd county in regular session Tuesday awarded a contract to Austin Brothers of Dallas for the erection of a 350 foot steel bridge across the Linguish river on the recently established mail line between Lockney and Estelline. The contract calls for an expenditure of \$9,500.00. The bridge is to be modern in every respect, substantially built and will be the longest and most expensive structure of its kind in Floyd county.

The building of this bridge means a great deal to Floyd county and the Quitaque section, and as a trade feeder it has inestimable value. Already the trade is coming to Lockney from this section regardless of the difficulty in crossing the Linguish. The daily mail to be established November 1st between Lockney and Estelline contract for which has already been granted to the Smith Brothers of Silvertown, adds an important enterprise to Lockney. We will get daily papers from Fort Worth and Dallas along with other mail, 12 hours earlier than we now get it.

Southwestern has made changes in telephone management in Lockney the past week. Mr. J. L. Suits, for several years an employee of the Beacon, has accepted the management at this place.

RURAL SCHOOLS CLOSED, TOO, BY EPIDEMIC

Last week all rural schools in the county were also closed temporarily pending relief from influenza epidemic danger, upon the advice of county health officers Andrews, of Floydada, and Pennington, of Lockney.

It has been thought probable that schools would be started again Monday of next week after the two weeks of closing, but this had not been definitely determined upon the middle of this week. Much depends on whether the disease gains any extensive headway in the county during the remaining days of this week.

WOMEN ENLIST IN BATTALION OF LIFE

Sunshine Division of Home Service Rivals Battalion of Death in Real War Work.

Russia's Battalion of Death made its women immortal by death-defying action at the front. America's Battalion of Life bids fair to merit immortality by its life and strength giving action in the home trenches, connecting directly with the men who go over the top.

A new kind of women's army has come into being. It is called the "Sunshine Division." It started under unusual circumstances. Margaret Woodrow Wilson, the president's daughter, known for her patriotic war service; her aide, Major Oakes, and a small group of friends, including Miss Marjorie Brown of Atlanta, Ga., daughter of one of the leading men of the south, and a relative of the president, were discussing women's part in the war and the importance of enlisting the effort, talent, and activity of every woman in the country. The need of organization and direction of that time and talent not already devoted to definite war work was recognized, and out of the discussion came plans for conserving the patriotic effort of every patriotic woman, and more especially the young women of the country. The "army" to be recruited was designated the "Sunshine Division." Its scope of service is limited only by the ability of the enlisted women to serve, and there is no woman ineligible for service except she who is already doing her utmost to help win the war. The campaign is for funds to maintain the seven recognized organizations which are doing work among the soldiers and sailors to hold up the morale of our fighting men.

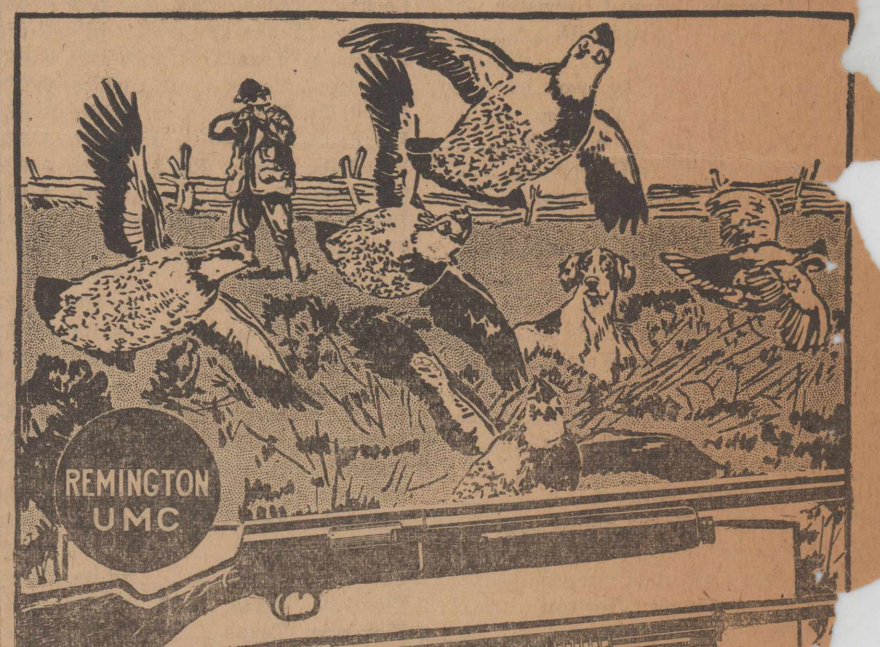

PLANS MADE FOR OVERSEAS CHRISTMAS PARCELS

RED CROSS WILL HAVE SUPERVISION OF MAILING WHICH MUST BE DONE BY NOV 20

By a co-operative arrangement through the War Department, the Post Office Department and the American Red Cross the latter organization has started machinery to turning by means of which every American soldier in overseas duty is to receive for Christmas a Christmas parcel from his family or friends. The Red Cross will have supervision of the mailing of the packages and persons having relatives or friends overseas are asked to observe the following rules which must be followed in order to assure the receipt by the soldier of his package.

Only one parcel will be allowed each soldier, and every package is to be of standard size, 3x4x9 inches. To avoid any duplication of parcels and to make sure that each parcel is correctly addressed, a Christmas parcel label is being issued to the men by the army abroad. The men are being instructed to mail the label to some relative or friend in America, who upon receipt are to apply to the nearest Red Cross Chapter, Branch or Auxiliary, where upon showing the Christmas parcel label he will receive from the Red Cross without charge one of the cartons. The label is not to be turned over to the Red Cross nor to any representative of the Red Cross at the time it is shown. But it must be shown to a designated official to indicate that the holder is entitled to one of the cartons. The person receiving the carton may fill it with any combination of articles which fit in it and which are not barred by the Post Office Department, but when completely packed, but unwrapped and untied the weight of the carton must not exceed 2 pounds and 15 ounces, and it must be presented unsealed at a place designated by the Red Cross not later than November 20th.

After that date no Christmas parcel will be accepted by the Red Cross for shipment. Attention is also called to the fact that in the event a Christmas parcel label is lost no duplicate can be issued. This rule, it is stated, cannot be altered by anybody.

Articles Barred

The following is a list of the principal classes of articles which are unavailable:

- (a) All spirituous, vinous, malted, fermented or other intoxicating liquors
- (b) All kinds of poison and all articles and compositions containing poison.
- (c) Explosives of all kinds.
- (d) Inflammable materials, including friction matches
- (e) Infernal machines and mechanical chemical or other devices of composition which may ignite or explode.
- Note.—Under this classification would come cigarette lighters, etc.
- (f) Liquids or liquefiable articles, fragile articles and other admissible matter when not packed in accordance with the requirements of the Postal Laws and Regulations.
- (g) All other articles which may kill, or in any wise hurt, harm, or injure another, or damage or deface or otherwise injure the mails or other property.

Suggestions

Nothing should go in a Christmas Parcel which will not keep fresh from the time of packing until Christmas.

Dried fruits and other food products should be packed in small tin or wooden boxes, one-quarter to one-half pound size.

Hard Candy, including chocolate, would probably be safe in tin foil or heavy cardboard, but no soft chocolate nor anything that could possibly be crushed should be used, as the remaining contents of the package might be spoiled thereby.

Several dainties packed in oblong tin boxes holding each a quarter of a pound will provide a better variety for a packet than a larger quantity of a single confection.

No liquids nor articles packed in glass should be placed in the package.

For wrapping the gifts, use a khaki colored handkerchief, twenty-seven inches square.

When the package has been packed, it should be taken, unwrapped and unsealed, together with the label and sufficient stamps, to the nearest collection center designated by the Red Cross. After the package has passed the inspection of the Red Cross representatives as to contents and weight and been wrapped in stout paper, the Christmas label bearing the address of the man for whom it is intended is placed on it. The person sending the package, in the presence of the Red Cross worker, is required to affix stamps sufficient to carry it to Hoboken, New Jersey. The postal charges

are to be at the rate of fourth class or parcel post zone rate. A label certifying that the inspection has been completed by the Red Cross is placed on the package, which is left in the custody of the Red Cross until delivered to the postal authorities.

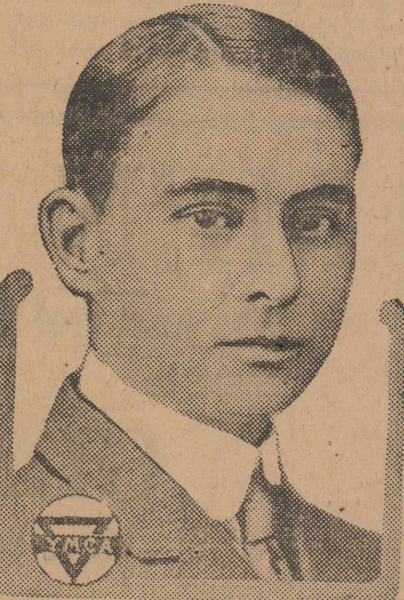
CARTER ANDREWS HELPS BOM NEW YORK CITY

G. S. Bilheimer of Denver, Colo., has been appointed Southern department campaign director for the next big drive for funds to continue the war work being done by the Red Triangle forces in the army camps of the United States and overseas, army Y. M. C. A., the Y. W. C. A., the War Camp Community Service, the Salvation Army, the National Catholic War Council, the American Library Association and the Jewish Welfare Board.

Mr. Bilheimer is one of the foremost men in the Y. M. C. A. movement. He is a member of the international committee of the organization, a member of the National War Work Council and a master organizer and executive. He successfully directed the last army Y. M. C. A. drive for the Southern department, comprised of Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arizona and New Mexico, and was unanimously chosen for the larger responsibility of the approaching campaign, during which the country will be called upon to support the Y. M. C. A. and other important war work agencies.

Mr. Bilheimer will be located at Dallas during the campaign period. He will have an able corps of assistants and specialists on his staff to carry out the various activities connected with a campaign of the magnitude of the forthcoming financial drive.

Mr. Bilheimer was chosen to direct the entire United War Work campaign for funds to finance the work of the seven war work agencies because of his successful experience and his unusual ability. His selection came direct from the New York headquarters of the consolidated campaign, with the solid approval of the people of the six Southwestern states, who are under his leadership, to furnish their part of the \$170,500,000 which the nation will be called on to contribute between November 11 and 18.

CENSUS TAKEN OF TEXAS SILOS

FORT WORTH CHAMBER OF COMMERCE SAYS ONLY 6,625 IN STATE.

There are 6,625 silos on the farms of Texas and their combined capacity is 7,210 tons, according to an agricultural census which has just been completed by the Research and Publicity Bureau of the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce. This is an average of one silo to every 63 farms or one silo to every 2,000 head of livestock. The census includes returns from all but nine of the 252 counties of Texas. Those not reporting are unimportant agricultural counties and complete returns from these will not materially change the totals. Five years ago there were only 500 silos in Texas and two hundred of this number were in Brazoria County, which was the first Texas county to adopt the silo as a permanent part of farming equipment.

In making the silo survey only the most reliable authorities were consulted and data on which the census is based was procured mainly from United States Farm Demonstration Agents, County Food Administrators, Country Bankers and Secretaries of the various Texas Chambers of Commerce.

That the silo is rapidly becoming a universal agricultural institution in Texas is indicated by the fact that less than two dozen counties in the State have no silos, while forty-one counties have fifty or more each.

Gulf Coast Country Leads.

South Texas has more silos than any other section of the State. This applies especially to the Gulf Coast country where they are exceedingly numerous. Brazoria and Wharton Counties have 300 each and rank ahead of other counties of the State, both in total number and capacity. Nueces and San Patricio Counties each have 100 silos. The Panhandle country is also thickly sprinkled with these modern feed storages. Lubbock County has 200; Potter County 110; Dallam 60; Donley 40; Hansford 40, and several other Northwestern Texas Counties have as many as twenty each. The underground or pit silo is generally used in this section of the State.

Due principally to a shortage of farm labor and feed crops the silos in Texas are filled to only 80 per cent of their capacity this year, while in a few communities County Demonstration Agents report that silos have not proved successful and in some instances have been abandoned as impracticable. This is said to be largely due to a lack of understanding on the part of their owners and where farmers have carefully followed the advice and instructions of the United States Farm Demonstration Agents the silo has invariably proved indispensable in livestock feeding.

Bela K. Wilkinson, who is with the American Expeditionary Forces in France, in a recent note to The Hesperian tells that he is well. He is with the infantry. He declares in his letter that he would give a whole hand full of that "wall paper" that is passed for money in France to have a paper from home.

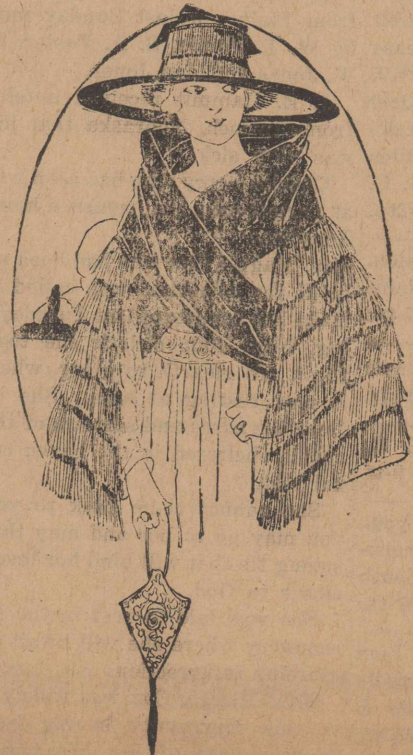

CENTENARY DAY IN NORTHWEST TEXAS CONFERENCE

Methodists Will Be in Session at Lubbock in Annual Conference November 6th

One of the most interesting features of Northwest Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, which convenes November 6th, at Lubbock, Texas, will be the "Centenary Day," which will be observed Nov. 7th. Bishop James Cannon of Virginia, will preside.

Among the speakers who will present the Centenary program will be Dr. W. W. Pinson, Dr. J. L. Neil, Mrs. J. W. Downs, of Nashville, Tennessee; Rev. F. S. Onderdonk, of San Antonio, and E. O. Watson, representing the War Work Commission.

The subjects to be discussed on "Centenary Day" will be "World Reconstruction after the War"; "God's Call to the Church in a World's Crisis"; "The Church's Opportunity to get Out of Littleness into Bigness". Bishop Cannon will be one of the principal speakers. A leading layman will discuss "Can We Put It Over?" and a stereopticon lecture will show the needs of the mission fields.

This year's annual conference session promises to be one of the most interesting and important in the history of the organization and while the Centenary Movement is already well known to the members of the conference, greater interest will be aroused by the coming of these specialists who are highly trained in missionary activities.

The Centenary Movement includes a world program based on a careful sur-

vey of need and opportunity, and a vigorous campaign will be made to release the prayer power of the church by enrolling tens of thousands in the "Fellowship of Intercession" and training them as prayer helpers. The program also includes a Stewardship Drive" to secure enrollment of millions of Methodists who will acknowledge their stewardship by the payment of the tithe.

During the next five years of the Centenary celebration there will be an earnest appeal made for life service, and strenuous efforts will be made to recruit a large number of new workers for the ministry, home and foreign missions, and for service in the local church.

In the next five years, the Southern Methodists expect to raise \$35,000,000.00 to be applied to war work,

home and foreign missions, and church extension.
