Every pound of energy must employed during the present Dlanting and growing season and解 rasonable economy must by the well-to-do, especially-if we are to sustain the soldiers now fighting our battles in Eu rope, and they alone must cio the fighting ior a whole year while other year.
Nobody in Washington, in a position to know the truth, expects the war to end in 1917. The wisest of our statesmen are calculating upon two years at
We will win-of that there is no doubt-sooner or later. But the quickest and surest way to win is to feed our armies and ourselves to keen energy at its lighest efficiency,
We may depend upon it that government will feed its rations of civilians.
Every farm and every con self-sustaining its utmost to be self-sustaining, or it may not be any price.
It is unnecessary here to sug. gest crops or methods of farming. Each farmer and each community knows best what can be done in each case. Common ouncil will find the wisest way, But if all is done that can be done in planting, and if the land Yields its utmost bounty, the suphe people on the present scale of living and supply the armies besides. The farmers will do well if they increase staple crops 10 to 20 per cent; the weather nd the insects may not permit any increase. The consumers must economize. They can easiysave another 10 to 20 per cent without the least sacrifice of only control their luxurious tastes and appetites. We are the most etravagant and wasteful people in the world.
Extra effort for production on one hand and a little self-sacrifice on the other will save a situa tion which otherwise will cause wide-spread suffering and nation al humiliation.
The extension service of the Agricultural and Mechanical college will be glad to mall planting data to any inquirer, but the main point now is to drive home the truth that the people of the vorld, confront a arave whole feed crisis, which is to be met only by increased production on the one hand and economical con sumption on the other.
