Grandpa Hunt, the aged father of Mrs. Emily Clark, was struck by a car and thrown to the pavement on Market street, Thursday night of last week, resulting in injuries to his head causing concussion of the brain. He was carried to the hospital where everything possible was done but he never rallied from the shock and died at 10:40 o'clock Saturday night.

The accident occurred in front of the Holmes Drug store when Mr. Hunt was walking across the street to listen to Judge Tom Bledsoe who was speaking for Mrs. Ferguson.

The car, which struck Mr. Hunt was driven by Miss Doris Cooper, who was deeply grieved over the accident which was said to have been unavoidable.

The remains were carried to the Wylie Funeral Home and prepared for burial and lay there until the hour for the funeral which was 4 o'clock, Sunday afternoon at the Baptist church where the services were conducted by Rev. Joe R. Mayes, the pastor and interment made in Ross cemetery.

Noah Allen Hunt was born in Missouri, Jan. 11, 1850. He came to Texas in boyhood. He is survived by his daughter Mrs. Clark, with whom he has made his home for several years also another daughter, who lives at San Saba and two sons, Oscar Hunt of Weede, N. In the State Senators race, Wellborne B. Collier of Eastland was elected over Oliver Cunningham of Abilene present incumbent.

In the Congressmen-at-large race George B. Terrell was elected for Place 1 over Pink Parrish. Joseph Weldon Bailey Jr., for Place 2 over J. H. Cyclone Davis, and Sterling P. Strong for Place 3 over Joe Burkett.

Wm. Pierson was elected Associate Justice of the Supreme Court over J. E. Hickman of Eastland.

C. V. Terrell was re-elected as Railroad Commissioner, 6 year term, over Lee Satterwhite; and Ernest O. Thompson, 4 year term, over W. Gregory Hatcher.

Mrs. Ferguson carried Callahan county by a majority of 486 votes, and is leading Gov. Sterling in the State by a majority of 2,398 of the 950,000 votes cast in the state. Gov. Sterling has given notice that he will contest the election charging much illegal voting. The Fergusons are making similar charges. The State Democratic Committee will begin the tabulation of the vote Monday.

The County Democratic Executive Committee will tabulate the county vote Saturday and full returns of the county vote will be given in The Star next week.

History Will Acclaim Them

Abilene Reporter-News

The bitterness and disagreements of the recent primary will soon be forgotten, the wounds inflicted in partisan fervor will heal over, and Texans will remember that there are a few things in life more important than winning a political victory, or losing one.

For instance, the six years of the Moody-Sterling administrations will stand out in history as the Golden Age in highway construction and development in Texas. Long after the passions of the campaign have subsided and ruptured friendships are resumed Texans will everywhere be reminded that the highway department under Sterling and Ely builded well for the future.

The passing of the years will serve to confirm this opinion, for the highway department has been building for the future.

Here is an achievement that should not be viewed in the light of partisanship. Texas has carried out one of the most ambitious and successful history of the world, and she has done programs of road development in the it without a single instance of corruption, scandal or under-hand dealing.

The credit for bringing order out of chaos in the administration of highway affairs belongs to the little group of men who took charge at the end of the Ferguson regime of 1925-26. Dan Moody, for picking three highly competent and conscientious men—Ross Sterling, Walter Ely and Cone Johnson; this trio for the magnificent work they did and the results they achieved; and D. K. Martin, who succeeded Sterling on the commission and has carried on the good work.

Texas, in the years to come, will look back upon the Moody-Sterling administrations as the high water mark in the creation of a great system of public roads. Political enmities are too close now to bring about a unanimity of opinion on this point, but after the lapse of a few years, when bitterness is laid aside, Texans all will acknowledge the state's debt to Messrs. Moody, Sterling, Ely, Johnson and Martin, and their subordinates in the highway department.



PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 3a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 3a. When an election is held by any county, or any number of counties, or any political sub-division of the State, or any political sub-division of a county, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State and which may or may not include towns, villages or municipal corporations, or any city, town or village, for the purpose of issuing bonds or otherwise lending credit, or expending money or assuming any debt, only qualified electors who own taxable property in the State, county, political sub-division, district, city, town or village where such election is held, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932. (A correct copy.)

H. J. R. No. 21. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved that the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 14 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 14. There shall be elected by the qualified electors of each county at the same time and under the same law regulating the election of State and County officers, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes, who shall hold his office, for two (2) years and until his successor is elected and qualified; and such Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall perform all the duties with respect to assessing property for the purpose of taxation and of collecting taxes as may be prescribed by the Legislature."

Sec. 2. That Section 16, of Article 8, of the Constitution of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 16. The sheriff of each county in addition to his other duties shall be the Assessor and Collector of Taxes therefor; but, in counties having ten thousand (10,000) or more inhabitants, to be determined by the last preceding census of the United States, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall be elected to hold office for two (2) years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932. (A correct copy.)

PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to-wit:

First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

Second: Idiots and Lunatics.

Third: All paupers supported by any county.

Fourth: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exceptions as the Legislature may make.

Fifth: All soldiers, marines and

seamen, employed in the service of the Army or Navy of the United States. Provided that this restriction shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserves, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States Army, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States Army, Navy and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy and Marine Corps."

Sec. 2. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States Army, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States Army, Navy and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy and Marine Corps."

Sec. 3. That Section 40 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one Civil Office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States Army, Navy and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States; or retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, from holding conjunction with such officer any other office or position of honor, trust or profit under this State of the United States, or from voting at any Election; General, Special or Primary, in this State when otherwise qualified."

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next General Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932. (A correct copy.)
