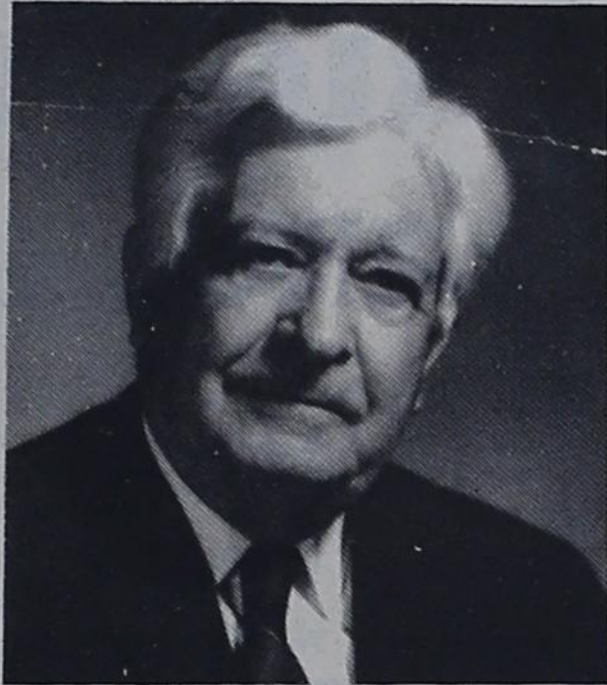

Rape Charges Filed Against Pioneer Man Here Tuesday

At the Hillcrest Motel in Cross Plains a woman in the motel was apparently raped early Tuesday morning, September 6th.

The manager at the motel received the call and contacted the operator. The operator immediately relayed the message to the Cross Plains Highway Patrol.

The Sheriff's Department received the first call at 2:25 a.m.. Herbert Hooten Cross Plains Police Chief, was first on the scene of the crime. Upon calling for assistance, in a search for the suspect, Police Chief Hooten was joined by Texas Highway Patrols, Don Gosnell and Bennie Callaway.

Tony Wyatt from the Cross Plains Police Department, L.D. Brown from the

Sheriff's Department, Deputy Fry of Clyde and Deputy Duckworth of Baird, participated in the search of the rape suspect.

Glen Curtis, the Baird constable, was also on the scene of the offense.

After a search, Bobby Stark, resident of the Pioneer Community, was apprehended and taken into custody.

The arrest was made at the Pancake Drilling Yard by Tony Wyatt, C.P.D., and Deputy L.D. Brown of the Sheriff's Department.

Formal charges were filed in the 42nd District Court against Bobby Stark, Tuesday, September 6th.

Deputy L. D. Brown stated to the Callahan County Star that there would be continued investigation of the crime.

Mike will continue in the contracting business while Jack, his brother, runs the Lumer Company. Mike will be at the company for management and bookkeeping purposes mainly.

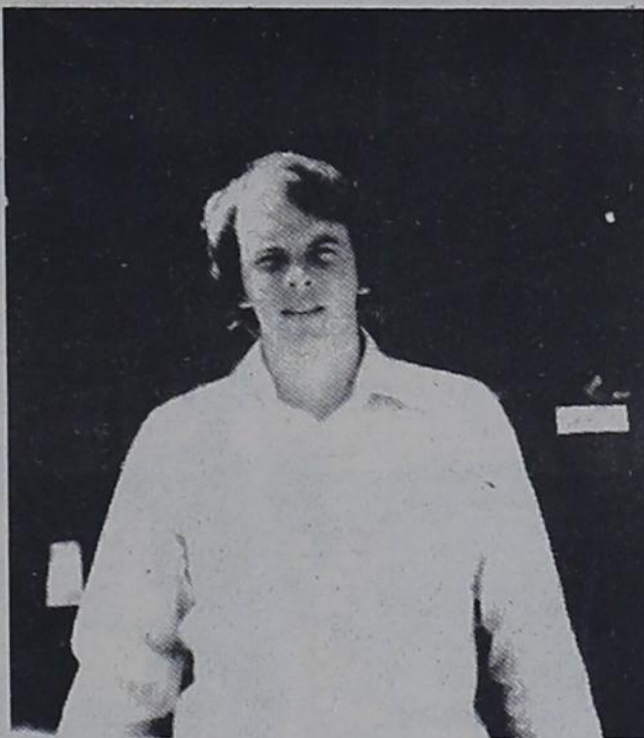
Mike and his wife, Betty, are newlywed and are remodeling a home on 320 Cypress in Baird. They both hope that the house will be ready in four to six weeks.

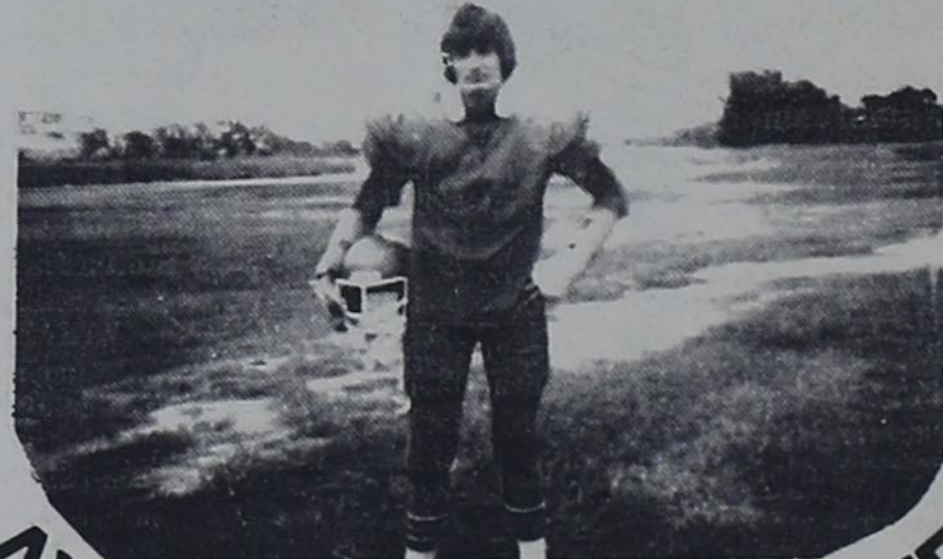

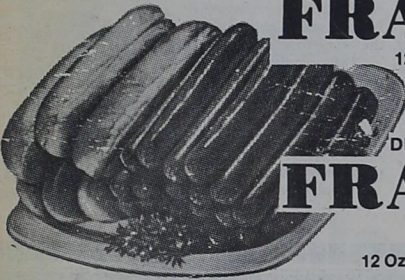

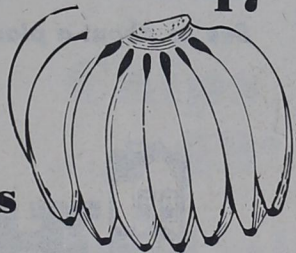

David McIntosh Gets Ribbon Home Buyers Should Not "Wait 'Til Next Year"

Master Sergeant David C. McIntosh, whose parents are Mr. and Mrs. Preston McIntosh of Route 2, Baird, Texas, is now wearing a distinctive service ribbon as a member of an organization which recently received the United States Air Force Outstanding Unit Award.

Sergeant McIntosh is a packaging supervisor at Barksdale AFB, Louisiana, with the Second Transportation Squadron that earned the award for the meritorious service from July 1, 1975 to June 30, 1977.

The sergeant is a 1959 graduate of Baird High School. His wife, Wanda, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.V. Adams of Route 1, Clyde, Texas.

The average cost of a new single-family home has increased more than 100 per cent in 10 years, and this trend is likely to continue, says Kenneth E. Graeber, economist in real estate with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. His information is based on the recent U.S. Department of Commerce Reports.

Given population and inflation trends, Graeber projects an average home appreciation rate of 8 per cent annually. "If the trend continues, home selling for \$35,000 today might sell for \$63,000 in 10 years," contends the Texas A&M University System Specialist.

"Many families have postponed purchasing a home

in hopes of saving to buy or build 'their dream home'. However, inflation may prevent these individuals from ever owning their own home,"

Studies indicate that buyers of similar income levels who previously owned homes pay 20 to 30 percent more for homes than buyers who previously rented. "This is, in part, due to an accumulation of equity in the first home which can be reinvested in the next," pointed out the economist.

"Other individuals have postponed purchase until interest rates decline. Any benefits gained by waiting for lower interest rate could be offset if homes cost increased.

"A properly selected and

cared-for home will remain one of the better investments for most families," contends Graeber. "The motto of 'Wait 'Til Next Year' might best be reserved for football."

Joe Christie Makes Plans

State Board of Insurance Chairman Joe Christie resigned Thursday, saying he plans to decide during October whether to seek U.S. Sen. John Tower's seat next year.

"As you know, I am considering running for the United States Senate against John Tower, and I want to make that decision on my own time—not at taxpayers expense," Christie said. "The Christie Committee tells me things look good and that there are strong grassroots support for my candidacy. I am encouraged by this, and I will announce my final decision in October."

Christie said he was proud of his work at the board, singling out several reforms he initiated as its chairman.

"We cut our budget by \$1.7 million. We were the only state agency to cut our budget, to reduce the number of employees and increase our workload," Christie said.

"We have closed the loopholes and eliminated the fine print in accident and health insurance policies, making the board a truly consumer-oriented agency."

In addition to deciding whether to make the Senate race, Christie said he plans to "get more active in the oil business and continue my law practice."

Seeing Wright

I am sure that we can all recall when "far-out" was far away and "dynamite" was an explosive. Our language has taken on so many different meanings that it must be difficult to keep up with the changes in hopes of communication.

Yes, you have guessed it—This is all leading up to something.....

When someone identifies something as "meek" we (most of us) think as Webster. Webster says that meek means shy, cowardly, withdrawn and a couple of other similar adjectives.

Actually, before this was brought to my attention, I totally agreed with Mr. Webster. But a very dear friend of mine told me about the word and his experience with it and "shined his light" on the subject.

It seems that some hundreds of years ago, before the time of Jesus Christ, that there was a king who ruled his kingdom and his belongings with a firm but guiding hand.

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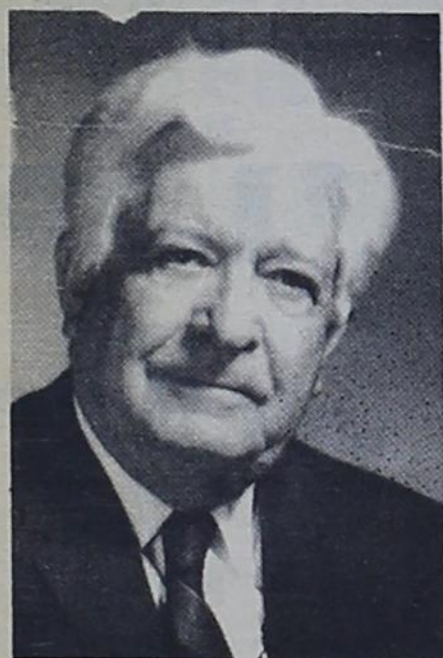
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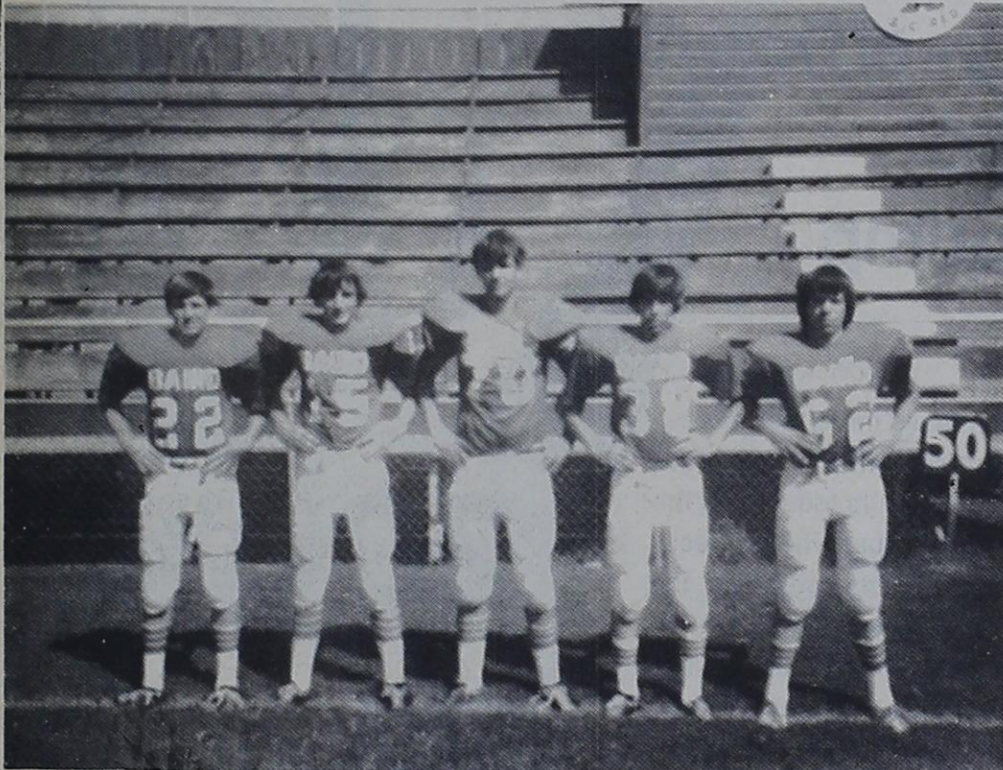

Previously a pastor at Bradshaw Baptist Church while he was a student at Hardin-Simmons.

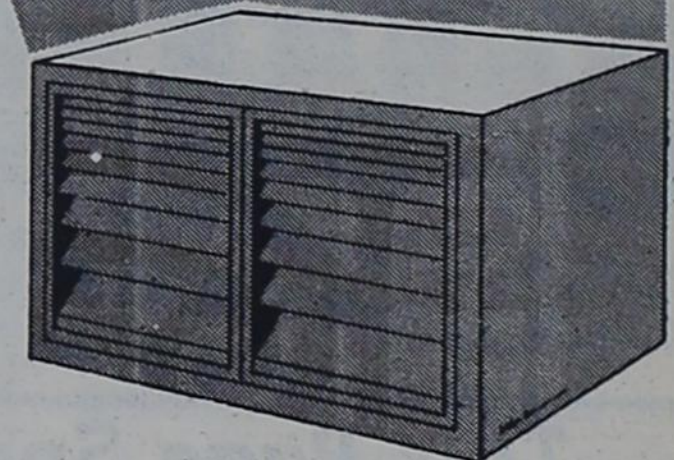

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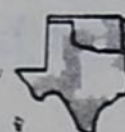
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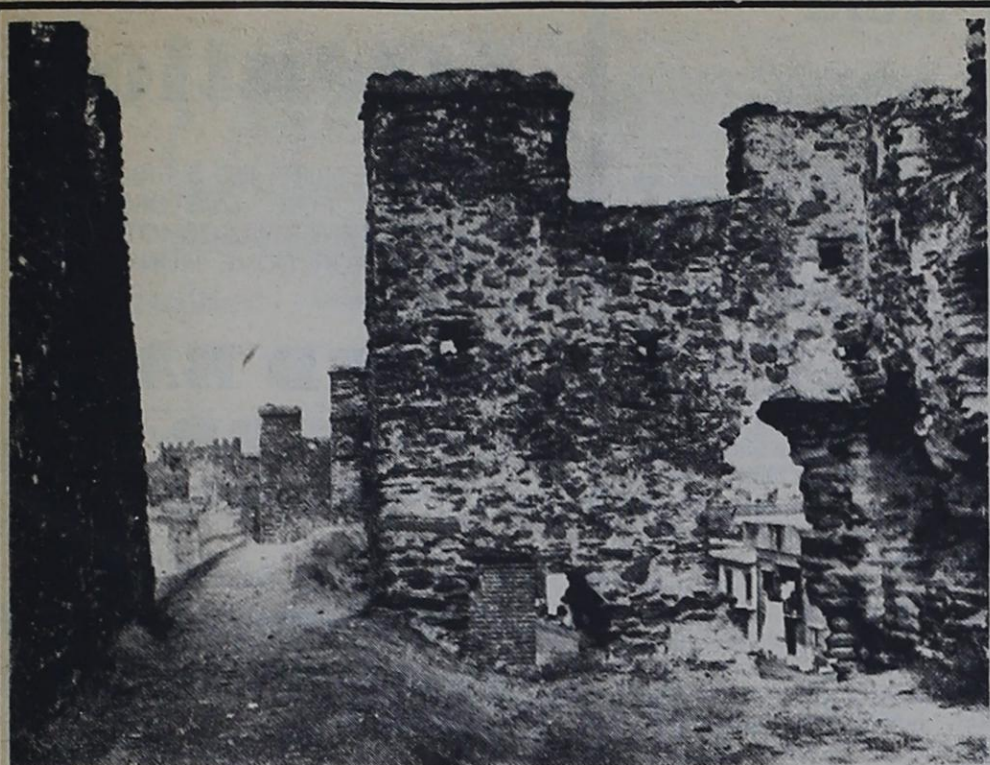

their help in the fight for millions of children across the nation who suffer from lung damaging diseases, namely Cystic Fibrosis.

This campaign will be conducted from door-to-door as part of an abundant annual effort to raise

funds for The Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. Contributions to these campaigns will help support a national network of over 100 CF centers, research projects and various educational programs.

CF affects one out of every 1,500 infants born each year.

About 15 years ago most children born with CF were doomed to early deaths. At this time, most youngsters with the lung-damaging disease did not reach school age.

Although a cure has not been found for CF there has been a lot of progress made in treating those with the disease. Today, almost 50 percent of those with CF live past their 18th birthday and become productive

young adults who are going to school, college, working and marrying.

The advances in treatment that are brightening the futures of children with CF are being developed by the care and research programs on the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

These programs are supported by the funds raised through the foundation's annual campaign. This concerns not only the parents of children with lung damaging diseases but everyone in the country.

Although, incurable CF can be treated and children with other lung-damaging diseases such as asthma are cured or their problem alleviated.

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
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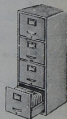
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
