Very rigid culling has been practiced from the start and a comparatively small number of stallions have been retained entirely. Those which are found to be up to the stand ard which the department and the station have maintained are being distributed throughout the surrounding territory and have been used by the farmers in that vicinity with satisfaction. In the fall of 1912 the division began work in co-operation with the War Department to encourge the breeding of horses suitable for military purposes. Three
