Q-How many states have safety belt laws? Can you legally be stopped simply for not wearing safety belts or do you have to be committing some other infraction at the time?

A-Thirty-six states and the District of Columbia have mandatory safety belt laws. Seven of those states, including Texas, have a "primary enforcement," safety belt law which means you can be stopped for driving without safety belts. In the other 29 states, some other law must be broken before a safety belt citation can be issued.

Officials campaign for voters to vote

election official has a simple message: Vote or shut up.

Secretary of State George Bayoud has been traveling across the state trying to register voters and telling people if they don't vote in the Nov. 6 general election they have no right to gripe about the results.

"That would be a mistake. It's imperative that all Texans who are eligible to vote participate in Democratic process," Bayoud said.

The League of Women Voters is also using voter registration drives and direct mail campaigns to try to increase the tur-

nout. "Voting is the most basic step for citizens to make a democracy work," said Diane Sheridan, president of the League of

Women Voters of Texas. Sunday is the deadline for registering in time to participate in the Nov. 6 general election, although mail registration will be accepted until Oct. 9.

DEAR ABBY: Last November, my husband and I went to awaken our 3 1/2-month-old son, only to find him dead in his crib! The cause: Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS), more commonly known as "crib death."

Almost as devastating as the loss of our son was the confusion and frustration that followed. Because so little is known about SIDS, parents are often left to face cruel questions from well-meaning but unenightened friends and family. It is difficult to understand how a child who appears to be perfectly healthy and normal could die so suddenly for false accusations and unnecessary guilt for people who have already suffered enough.

Abby, will you please print the following facts to enlighten your

1. SIDS is the sudden and unexpected death of an apparently healthy infant; the cause remains

unexplained, even after an autopsy. 2. SIDS is the No. 1 cause of death among infants between the ages of 1

week and 1 year, although it is most likely to occur between the ages of 2 to 4 months.

3. An average of 7,000 babies die of SIDS every year.

4. SIDS is not caused by suffocation, aspiration or regurgitation. Most SIDS victims appear to be healthy before death, although a few may show symptoms of a slight cold shortly before death.

5. SIDS is not caused by child abuse or an immunization; it's neither contagious nor hereditary; and it occurs in families of all social and economic levels.

6. SIDS cannot be predicted or prevented. While the chilling question, "Why did your baby die?" still cannot be answered, SIDS experts today believe that some subtle abnormality in infant development hope in learning more about this tragic death lies in research.

Parents who experience this tragedy have special needs. The best advice I can offer to their families and friends is: Don't say, "You'll have more children." Don't set limits on how long the parents should grieve. And, above all, don't try to substitute other children in the family to 'replace" the one they've lost. Each child is irreplaceable.

The best advice I can offer parnts is: Please become better educated about SIDS. Had I known more about it, I wouldn't have tortured myself with guilt and blame for my baby's death. Sign me





So I went through three legal sized scratch pads to convert the measurements.'





Moreover, the state court said, Texas Ranger Wesley Styles, who headed the investigation, janitors separately when he conducted a "walk through" of the events of the day of the murder.

murder. District Attorney Peter Speers of Montgomery County, Texas, took the appeal to the Supreme Court. State Attorney General Jim Mattox refused to go along, saying Brandley's conviction was 'racially tainted."

Railroad Commission votes against raising oil production now

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Railroad Commission voted today against raising oil production in the East Texas Field, siding with independent oil producers who argued the increase would deplete reserves.

Commission Chairman Kent Hance voted to raise production, but was outvoted by commissioners Jim Nugent and John Sharp. The commissioners voted without discussion.

The measure would have allowed producers in East Texas to boost production from 86 percent to 100 percent, raising oil output in that area by about 12,500 barrels a day.

Commissioners considered the action following a request from the U.S. Energy Department, which wanted to increase Texas oil production to help offset oil lost due to the Iraqi invasion of

After the vote, Hance said he doubted the subject would be brought before the commission again.

"Unless there are some unusual circumstances ... I don't see this coming back any time in the near future," he said. Many independent oil producers in East Texas opposed the in-

crease, saying it would result in some oil being bypassed. Larger oil companies, who favored the increased production, said it would boost the ultimate recovery. According to the Railroad Commission, the state produced 1.78

million barrels of oil a day last year, down from 3.36 million a day in 1974 and 2.55 million a day in 1980. The Railroad Commission voted last month to allow wells to pump at maximum capacity for 90 days, which was expected to

bring in an additional 20,000 barrels of oil a day. Most of the higher production is coming from fields in the Austin Chalk in South Texas.

Nugent wanted more information before deciding.

As program coordinator for Crime Stoppers, which has 181 all-volunteer community programs, Cobos heads a state staff of only three, including himself, within the governor's office.

The local programs accept anonymous crime tips, with \$1,000 rewards offered for indictments in certain crimes.

Before Crime Stoppers, Cobos said, there was no liaison between citizens and law enforce-

ment agencies. Now he'd like to hook up the Texas Department of Public Safety's Missing Persons Clearinghouse, which began operation in 1986, with the nationally syndicated Crime Stoppers television program.

Cobos would go further.

One proposal would be to insert in Texas newspapers the monthly DPS bulletin on missing persons, which now is distributed primarily to law enforcement agencies. "That way it would end up in the home, where it needs to be," Cobos said.

Overall, however, "It's going to take a big hand from the media," Cobos said.

SEAGOVILLE, Texas (AP) — The federal prison in this Dallas suburb isn't showing its age these days as much as it's showing how much society has changed since the facility opened in 1940.

Fifty years after the institution was built, its brick buildings are tastefully painted with beige trim, its gardens are planted with impatiens and roses, and its neatly manicured lawns and tennis courts still give the prison grounds the appearance of a college campus.

But the two rows of 12-foot metal fences topped with barbed wire symbolize how times have changed at the Federal Correctional Institution, just southeast of Dallas.

FCI Seagoville opened Oct. 10, 1940, as a women's reformatory. It had no fences and housed about 200 offenders. Construction cost about \$2.1 million.

Now Seagoville is a medium-security prison that operates on a yearly budget of \$10.3 million, has a staff of 250 and houses 911 male inmates. The majority of them are serving time for drug

And the institution is getting a little tougher. Soon it will become a higher-level medium-security facility with closer controls and tighter supervision to accommodate inmates with

In 1945, the institution became a minimum-security prison for men, which it remained until 1980, when it became medium-

Warden Ron Thompson knows things have changed. We had a golf course here year ago. Those are matters of

history now," he told The Dallas Morning News. 'I think we strike a good balance here," he said. "I don't think the taxpayer would come in and say it's inhumane or come in

DEAR DR GOTT Is there any truth to the statement that potassium supplements relieve allergy symptoms' If not, is there any vitaminmineral supplement that will help? DEAR READER No to both auestions.

Allergies are caused by a reaction of the body's immune system to allergens, foreign substances that enter the body from the environment. The allergic reaction is not mediated by or related to potassium, a mineral that however, vital for normal

Potassium deficiency, a common consequence of many diuretics (drugs that wash fluid and potassium from the body), is marked by weakness, constipation and potentially lifethreatening irregularities of the heartheat

Neither potassium supplements nor any other vitamin/mineral supplement will relieve allergic symptoms. which can run the gamut from hay fever and rash to a serious shock state. and are treated with antihistamines.


