## Bush plans to visit troops; military maneuvers continue

By The Associated Press

U.S. and Saudi troops backed by hundreds of planes staged maneuvers near the Kuwaiti border today, and Secretary of State James A. Baker III was in Europe for talks to include the Persian Gulf crisis.

President Bush was to leave Washington this evening to join Baker for further discussions with alices, then spend in morning accident Thanksgiving with U.S. soliders in Saudi Arabia in the first troops since Vietnam.

Iraqi President Saddam Hushe could release foreign hostages Colorado City Highway. if Bush promised not to attack

But U.S. officials are gauging international reaction to a possible Security Council resolution to Western Texas College. authorize U.N. force to drive Iraq from Kuwait. Some diplomats say the resolution could come by the end of the month.

East envoy, Yevgeny Primakov, said talks on a "face-saving" Iraqi withdrawal from Kuwait could include discussions on the Palestinian question.

About 1,000 U.S. troops and an unknown number of Saudi soliders are taking part in the six-day "Imminent Thunder" maneuvers, which began Thursday about 100 miles south of the Kuwaiti border.

#### **Prison bill**

HOUSTON (AP) -Members of the Harris County legislative delegation planned to file a bill today that would raise the population cap on Texas prisons and free more beds for inmates left in county

State Rep. John Culberson, R-Houston, who is sponsoring the bill, said the legislation would raise the cap from 95 to 120 percent of the system's capacity and allow 12,346 beds to be available by next March.

The Harris County delegation on Thursday agreed to back the legislation despite the fact the Legislature currently has no control over the courtordered jail and prison population limits.

#### Consumer prices rise in October

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rising energy prices hit American consumers for the third straight month in October, pushing inflation up a sharp 0.6 percent, the government reported today

The 0.6 percent rise in the Consumer Price Index followed jumps of

0.8 percent in both August and September. That means that in the three months since Iraq invaded Kuwait inflation has risen at an annual rate of 8.9 percent, the fastest threemonth advance since the 1981-82 recession, the Labor Department said. During all of last year, inflation rose 4.6 percent.







TCU quarterback Matt Vogler suffered a shoulder injury last week and it's questionable whether he will start. If not, TCU coach Jim Wacker has his



### **Doctors say Stormie died** of acute heart rejection

PITTSBURGH (AP) Stormie Jones, the world's first heartliver transplant recipient, died of acute rejection of her heart, doctors said today.

The cause of her death surprised doctors at Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh, where Stormie had her historic operation in February 1984. It is unusual for heart rejection to occur so long after surgery, said Dr. F. Jay Fricker, a pediatric cardiologist.

"I've never seen it occur or reported in the literature before," he said at a news conference. "It's unique that it happened this late and so acutely.

Stormie died Sunday at Children's Hospital after being rushed from her home in White Settlement, Texas, with a sore throat and fever. She was 13.

Fricker said it's not known why the heart was rejected. He said Stormie showed no signs of heart trouble.

Meanwhile, Stormie's mother said Thursday she cherished the time she had with her daughter because she knew time was

"Everything that Stormie did was to me special, because I always knew that some day we wouldn't have Stormie any more," Lois "Suzie" Purcell said in her first public comments since Stormie died.

In the six years since the historic transplant operation, Stormie had endured organ rejection, hepatitis and a second liver transplant last February.

Mrs. Purcell thanked the hundreds of people she has never met who sent encouraging wishes during Stormie's six-year struggle To show their gratitude the family has arranged public visita-

tion at Laurel Land Funeral Home in White Settlement through today. A public service is scheduled for 2 p.m. CST Saturday. About 1,500 people are expected to attend. "I wanted to make sure that everybody understood that I ap-

preciate all the comfort, the financial help, the moral support that these people have been over the last seven years," Mrs. Purcell said.

In another development, a Texas wildflower's common name will honor Jones, says a botanist who co-authored a scientific paper with the plant's discoverer.

Some Texans began an effort to rename the species of yellowflowered violet after Stormie's death Sunday. The violets will keep their scientific name, Viola guadalupensis, but their common name will honor Stormie.

"In my opinion, it is a wonderful gesture," Dr. Michael Powell. a botanist who chairs Sul Ross State University's biology department, said Friday.

'Everyone knew about Stormie Jones. It is a timely gesture. It is a natural because it is a special little species for this special lit-

'As a tribute, it's a wonderful marriage of the botanical name and the common name."

But Powell said the flower, discovered in 1987 at Guadalupe Mountains National Park by Ranger Brent Wauer, could eventually have several common names, including the Stormie Jones

'Common names can be given by anyone. They are just colloquialisms, and have no status under the international rules, said Powell, a botanist and plant taxonomist who was shown the new flower by Wauer.



drome. She has no pectoral muscles or breast on her left side. The left side

of her face is sunken in, and the left

eye only closes when she is asleep. Her doctor can't explain what caused

this abnormality. Can you?
DEAR READER: Mobius syn-

drome is an extremely rare hereditary disorder in which, during fetal

development, certain key nerves in

the brain (cranial nerve nuclei) fail to

grow. Without these nerves to stimu-

late them, certain muscles also fail to

grow. The syndrome is marked by ab-

sence or weakness of many facial

muscles (facial palsies), including the muscles of one or both eyes, as well as

the muscles of the upper extremities

There is variation in what parts of the body are affected: the face, almost always; one or both arms, com-

monly; the chest muscles, on occa-sion. The cause of the syndrome is unknown, and no treatment is

However, children with the disorder can often be helped by a combined therapeutic approach that includes physicians, speech therapists and

physical therapists. Although I doubt

anyone can provide the answer about

why your daughter suffered Mobius

syndrome, much can be done to assist her in coping with it.

DEAR DR. GOTT: How does a woman deal with a husband who is going through a midlife crisis? I have a history of breast cancer, and my husband has indicated he wants a 35vear-old woman with a 40-D bust as his housekeeper. He has pictures of large-busted women strategically placed around our house. I'm at a loss to put this all together.

DEAR READER: Putting it all together, I conclude that your husband has a problem with breasts. This has taken the form of a breast fetish: an abnormal preoccupation with wellendowed women. This unfortunate attitude is clearly maladaptive and hurtful; I wonder if he realizes how much pain you are experiencing as a result of his thoughtlessness.

From your brief description, I'd worry that your husband wants more rom the prospective housekeeper than someone to do the dishes and dust. Although at this point, the pic-tures and his fantasy are relatively harmless, his preoccupation with breasts could easily lead to behavior

that would undermine your marriage.
