132nd jurors find bonding firm owes partial repayment

A 132nd District Court jury Tuesday found that a contract between Bharat N. Bhakta and Mercury Bonding of Snyder and Sweetwater was "breached" by Mercury, Jesse Browning, the bonding firm and, as a result, testified Monday that although awarded a partial return of monies to Bhakta.

In April of 1985, Bhakta, charged with murder in connection with the choking death of his wife, paid Mercury \$6,000 in cash in exchange for the company Clark of Snyder. posting a \$40,000 bond in his

days of testimony, ordered that \$3,750 of this amount be returned Tuesday. to Bhakta. The \$6,000 amount originally paid by him the April 25, 1985 choking death of represented 15 percent of the his 25-year-old wife, Kumud.

bond amount set by the court. Testimony indicated that in late July of 1985, the bonding company revoked Bhakta's bond, prompting his re-arrest and his incarceration until he went to trial in August.

Bhakta, 34, was found guilty of voluntary manslaughter on Aug. 23, 1985 and sentenced to 18 years in prison.

The reasons cited for the bond's revocation was Bhakta leaving the U.S. to visit his native country of India prior to his jury trial.

Mercury officials claim they informed Bhakta that his leaving Scurry County would be grounds for them to revoke his bond.

No one knows the enormity of Bundy's crimes. FBI officials said years ago he might be implicated in 36 slayings throughout the West. But Bundy's confessions included deaths to which he had not previously been linked, such as two in Idaho, and he did not give specifics on at least 10

"I don't think we have even scratched the surface with Bundy," Sheriff Pete Hayward of Salt Lake County, Utah, said after the execution. "Somewhere there is someone Bundy has told

Bundy confessed to eight Utah killings, but because he identified COLOCIO RESILE SHOP only two victims there,

Investigators said Bundy would not answer when asked about his connection to two Utah deaths in which he is a suspect, including the October 1974 strangulation and beating death of Laura Anne Aime, 17, of Salem, Utah.

But there was no doubt Tuesday in the mind of her mother that Bundy killed her child.

"He needed to die very badly, Shirlene Aime said, but she conceded the last minutes of waiting for his execution were "horrible."

"It made me feel guilty," she said. "Despite all the things he did to my daughter and all the other girls, I started to think, 'How low am I, waiting for a man to die?' "

Her long-sought relief at Bundy's death was slow to come, she said.


"I still have this empty feeling. I'm sick to my stomach. It's an uptight, horrible feeling. But it is a relief to know he's gone, and he won't do it again.'

Bundy was executed for the 1978 rape and murder of 12-yearold Kimberly Leach of Lake City, Fla. He also was convicted of killing two women in 1978 at a Florida State University sorority house. His gush of confessions in the four days before his electrocution did not include those

Robert Keppel, an investigator for the Washington state attorney general, said the law student dropout from Tacoma was unwilling in interviews to talk about some cases that gave him "painful memories," and balked at confessing to deaths before 1973.

'That seemed to be where he drew the line," said Keppel, who spent about two hours during the weekend extracting confessions from a shaken, tearful Bundy

There's no excuse

"Darn!" exclaimed South. "I knew I should have bid a slam." So he won the ace of spades, played a heart to dummy's ace and ruffed a heart. Then he played the club ace and ruffed a club. Next he ruffed another heart with the seven of diamonds. Surprise! West overruffed with the nine of diamonds and returned a diamond. Now the 12 tricks that South hought were in the bag dwindled to 10.

Declarer's responsibility is to ensure making his contract if possible. Here unlucky distribution could always have wrecked his chances. What if the second heart was overruffed, or even the second club when that suit was first ruffed in dummy? But once declarer scored one ruff with a low trump in his hand and another with a low trump in dummy, he had no excuse for going set. All of dummy's re-maining hearts can be ruffed with the A-K-J of diamonds, and declarer's third and fourth clubs with dummy's Q-10 of diamonds. Then the last club can be ruffed with dummy's diamond eight. Of course the defenders will eventually come in with their trump nine, but declarer will still have 11 tricks and his contract.







DEAR DR. GOTT: Cystitis has been plaguing me for about a year. Is there any new therapy available?

DEAR READER: Cystitis (bladder

infection) bac a variety of causes. In general, the disease appears in two

Acute cystitis begins suddenly with painful, frequent urination. The urine often contains blood. Acute cystitis almost always affects women, is usually related to sexual intercourse and is caused by bacterial infection. The diagnosis is established by a urine culture, a test in which a sterile urine sample is obtained. The bacteria in the prine are identified and tested against an array of antibiotics. In this manner, the most effective antibiotic

Treatment is almost always successful. To prevent re-infection, women can carry out two simple

First, women should wipe themselves from the front after urinating, from the back after defecating. This technique will stop intestinal bacteria from entering the bladder opening

and causing cystitis. Second, women should empty their bladders after sexual relations. This will prevent residual bladder-urine from becoming infected and will wash out the urethra (bladder

Acute cystitis, although common, is

readily treated and prevented.

On the other hand, chronic cystitis is more of a problem. This debilitating disease has an unknown cause and is associated with urinary frequency and abdominal pain. As many as 90,000 women may suffer from chronic interstitial cystitis. However, experts estimate that the actual number of undiagnosed cases may be five times this number. Treatment with antibiotics is inappropriate. However, many cases respond to periodic dis-tension of the bladder (with water through a tube) under anesthesia. Women with chronic cystitis should be under the care of urologists, specialists in diseases of the urinary

If you have had repeated symptoms of cystitis for a year, you need to know whether this is due to a series of attacks of acute cystitis or whether you have chronic cystitis. A urologist can help you.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm five weeks pregnant. I've been taking 500 milligrams of caffeine daily to boost my energy. As soon as I found out I was expecting, I stopped but am wondering if it will have any effect on the baby.

DEAR READER: To my knowledge, the caffeine you took should have no effect on the baby. Alcohol and nicotine are far more damaging to a developing fetus.

However, caffeine is a drug and you should tell your obstetrician you were using it.





Gaylord bid to get Rangers is rejected by the AL owners





WASHINGTON (AP) - The Air Force removed the 10-warhead payload from five MX missiles late last year, several months after an accident in which a missile came loose and fell in its underground silo, a published report says.

The service is still trying to decide how to repair the five missiles, which account for 10 percent of the nation's MX force, The Washington Post reported today Despite taking the warheads off five missiles, the service still

claimed last month that the MX had reached "full operational capability" on Dec. 30. The decision to remove the warheads followed an incident last

June in Wyoming. According to the newspaper, one of the missiles became "unglued" from its underground launch canister. The missile fell six inches to a foot and had to undergo extensive

repairs, the Post said, quoting unnamed Air Force officials. An Air Force investigating panel concluded that the missile was one of a batch of five which had production problems, the Post said:

Air Force officials responded to the report by ordering removal of the 10-warhead package atop each of the five suspect missiles, according to the newspaper.

The Air Force has been authorized to build 50 of the missiles and denlov them in underground silos in Wyoming and Nebraska. The weapon will join the Minuteman as the core of the nation's landbased nuclear missile deterrent force.

"I don't want to die, I'm not going to kid you. ... (but) I deserve, certainly, the most extreme society deserves to be protected from me and from others like me," Bundy said in the interview with James Dobson, a religious

broadcaster and psychologist. He said between sobs he hoped the interview would spur society to protect itself from the widespread influence of pornography, TV violence, and X-

rated movies. Although he said he felt remorse for the sex-related murders, which authorities believe could total 50 or more nationwide, Bundy said, "There is no way in the world that killing me is going to restore those beautiful children to their

Detectives in Washington, Idaho, Colorado and Utah have said in the past week that Bundy has confessed to 23 killings there but that he did not provide names for all of the victims. But an FBI agent gave a higher number in a story published today.

The Miami Herald reported that FBI agent Bill Hagmeier told Florida prosecutor Jerry Blair that Bundy's confessions closed the books on 13 killings in Washington, Utah and Colorado; provided information that may never be confirmed on 14 more cases in Washington, Utah, Idaho, California, Vermont and Pennsylvania, and touched on at least 20 more slayings in various states dating back to 1969.

Added to the three Florida killings of which Bundy was convicted, this would put the number of victims to Bundy to at least 50, all girls or young women.

Hagmeier, a specialist on serial killers who interviewed Bundy last weekend, could not immediately be reached for comment today. He checked out of his Starke motel this morning to return to his Virginia headquarters.

But Blair confirmed today that Hagmeier had given him those rough figures.

Including the Florida killings, Blair said, "there were 30, based on Bundy's statements, that he appeared to be clearly linked ... and perhaps up to another 20 where he was a suspect or a probable, I think, is the terminology he used."

"I don't know that it's far off from the figures everybody has bandied about anyway," Blair said today. "Those are the figures I've heard for many years. I don't think we'll ever know exactly how many."

Handcuffed and sitting at a table across from Dobson, Bundy alternately sobbed and smiled during the 29-minute interview. He was dressed in the peachcolored, short-sleeved shirt worn by Death Row inmates.

He appeared to ponder each question carefully, sometimes pausing at length before

answering articulately. Dobson, who has a daily radio

"What did you feel after that?"

"I have lived in prison for a long time now, and I've met a lot of men who were motivated to violence just like me. And without exception, every one of them was deeply involved in pornography," he said.

Claiming he was "essentially a good home, Bundy said:

"People need to recognize ... those of us who are or who have been so much influenced by violence in the media, in particular pornographic violence, are not some kind of inherent monsters. We are your sons and we are your husbands and we grew up in regular families. And pornography can reach out and snatch a kid out of any house to-

But Dr. Dorothy Otnow Lewis, a psychiatrist who examined Bundy as part of a last-ditch attempt to save him from execution, said Bundy's first home was that of his maternal grandparents, with a grandfather who was "an extremely violent and frightening individual." The grandfather would kick dogs, swing cats by their tails, beat people who angered him and read pornography voraciously, the New Haven, Conn., psychiatrist said.

Some abortions may be prohibited

AUSTIN (AP) - A spokeswoman for a woman's rights group said a state proposal to ban abortions based on the sex of the fetus is an attempt by anti-abortionists to rally support

State lawmakers and pro-life forces Tuesday proposed legislation to stop what they said is the growing practice of women having abortions after learning the sex of the fetu

'Surely, this is the most frivolous use of abortion yet invented," said Bill Price, director of the Texas Coalition for Life.

Price said the women prefer to have a male child and get an abortion if the fetus is a female.

"In other words," said state Sen. J.E. "Buster" Brown, R-Lake Jackson, "abortion on demand has given rise to boys on demand." Brown and state Rep. L.B. Kubiak, D-Rockdale, said they will introduce legislation that would make it illegal for doctors to perform

an abortion based on sex selection. But Danalynn Recer, a local spokeswoman for the National Organization for Women, said there is no evidence to indicate socalled sex selection abortions are on the rise.

Counsel says build more prisons

AUSTIN (AP) - Alternatives to incarcerating people can't work properly unless there also are enough prisons, the governor's general counsel told a House subcommittee.

"To have an alternative, you have to have sufficient capacity, so it is a choice for the right reason, not a dumping ground for convicted felons," said Rider Scott, general counsel and director of the criminal justice division in Gov. Bill Clements' office. He spoke Tuesday to a subcommittee studying alternatives to prison construction.

Clements has called for nearly 11,000 new prison beds financed by \$343 million in bonds. The expansion is needed along with such alternatives as literacy programs, drug testing, vocational training and increased use of intensive-supervision probation and parole, Scott

"A bed in prison these days is harder to get than a ticket to a Michael Jackson concert," Scott said. "We have a system out of control, where defendants who prefer to rob rather than work now choose the penitentiary over probation, and why not? They can serve a two-year sentence in just 90 days.'

Scott said that in Texas in 1987, the average sentence for an inmate entering the Texas Department of Corrections was 98.5 months. But he said that because of insufficient capacity, the average length of stay was 19.7 months, placing Texas among the lowest in the nation in that category.

Although incarceration costs money, he added, crime also is expensive. He said studies have estimated the cost per crime to taxpayers at \$2,300 and have put the average number of crimes by each freed offender at a minimum of 187 a year.

The cost for each prisoner - including TDC operations, construction costs and the loss to society of, for example, tax payments would be generously figured at \$25,000 a year, he said.

Workers rescue

HOUSTON (AP) - It took city crews and volunteers more than seven hours to rescue a black puppy who fell into an acc pipe leading into an apariment sewer system, officials said.

The puppy, Baby Bear, a sixweek-old terrier, fell into the sewer Tuesday while playing in a yard with the three children of Jeri Robinson.

Mrs. Robinson and her children Krystina 6. Adolph. 5. and Krystal, 3, spent most of the day inside, listening to the roar of machinery and the shouts of people as holes were dug, pipes cut and tools pushed and pulled in the rescue operation.

Rescuers included a crew from the city Public Works Department's Southeast Quadrant Maintenance Branch, Citizens for Animal Protection, Houston Fire Department, city Animal Spring Control Bureau and Branch Volunteer Corps.

George Huebner and Cynthia Shaw of Citiznes for Animal Protection spent a long afternoon with their arms and faces thrust into pipes flowing with raw sewage.

"I've been in a sewer before but not having to chew up a whole lawn," said Ms. Shaw, the Harris County Animal Rescue League's 1988 Volunteer of the Year.

The problem was that Baby Bear was a very frightened pup, and all the noise apparently caused him to creep even deeper, about five feet below ground.

Apartment maintenance workers had first tossed him bits of bread and hamburger in an effort to lure him out to where they could reach him. When this failed, they began to dig.

Using a backhoe, crews quickly ripped a huge hole in the lawn, exposing the six-inch, white plastic sewer line. But when the line was cut, and after much poking and careful probing with a towel-wrapped rod, Baby Bear still could not be seen. He had wiggled into another pipe.

Workers then ripped another hole in the yard and more sewer lines were found and cut. Through still another access opening, the Public Works crew began snaking in a long orange hose normally used to flush out blockages. Baby Bear was still not to be seen, but his cries were
